ABOUT TOWN

Greenville is host today to the district meeting of the Northeastern Conference of Welfare Workers. The city extends a cordial welcome to the visitors and everybody will hope their visit will prove both pleasant and profitable.

The conference has as its topic "Dependence and Unemployment," and as the question is one of the foremost of the present day it was expected many ways and means for improving the conditions as it affects this section of the state would be suggested.

Dependence has assumed a greater scope in this country today than ever before by reason of the six millions of people walking the streets in quest of jobs. It is a question that even the government is attempting to find a solution for, and the winter no doubt will bring forth one of the most determined campaigns against human suffering in the history of the great and prosperous nation.

In the opinion of Josephus Daniels, of Raleigh, Secretary of the Navy during the Wilson administration, the people of this nation cannot expect any relief from existing depression until the tariff laws are changed.

Addressing the gathering of Democrats here Tuesday night, the distinguished statesman said the tariff bill as passed by the Republican members of Congress, was driving business away from the country and forcing hundreds of industries to close their doors.

It has resulted in the closing of the doors of world markets against products of the American farmer, and this is largely responsible for the low prices prevailing throughout the nation.

The farmers cannot look to the Republicans for relief, the speaker said. They represent the "privilege" class, the people who realize enormous profits as result of the tariff wall, and no improvement is in sight until the tariff is lowered and business is permitted to continue under normal circumstances.

Bear in mind the fact that next week has been set aside as "Prosperity Week" in the city of Greenville and everybody will be expected to do his share in making the occasion one of the greatest of its kind ever staged in this part of the country.

The object of "Prosperity Week" is to put more money in circulation, and everybody can assist in this direction by paying up all long-standing accounts as well as those of recent date. Then, too, the purchase of winter wearing apparel will help to some extent and those who take advantage of the hundreds of bargains which the merchants have to offer will be doing their bit.

Residents who have any work to be done around the house could aid the unemployment situation by letting the contract immediately. The more men employed the greater will be the amount of money in circulation.

Every citizen can make his contribution to the success of the week by cutting loose some of his money. If you need anything in the way of merchandise, make it a point to buy it "Prosperity Week" and in that way let the rest of the city know you are doing your part.

Foster Testifies At Seed Inquiry

Raleigh, Oct. 29.—(AP)—William Fraser, Jr., of Charlotte today described to the Federal Trade Commission here a cotton linters business which aggregated more than \$3,000,000 in 1922-23 and was in bankruptcy in 1927 after it refused to abide by ruling of an arbitration committee of the interstate cottonseed crushers association.

Mr. Fraser, who testified he had been in the linters business since 1911 with various firms, said many mills, most of them in Texas, refused to sell linters to his firm after it was expelled from the Interstate association in 1924.

The firm, William Fraser, Jr., Inc., was expelled when it refused to pay an arbitration ordered by a committee in a contract dispute with the consumers cotton oil company of Texas.

The arbitration ordered was \$3,700, Mr. Fraser said, and after the consumers company sued his firm the claim was settled out of court for \$2,000.

This did not, however, Mr. Fraser testified, end the refusal of the mills to do business with his firm. Mr. Fraser gave the names of a number of cotton oil mills which he said "boycotted" him following his refusal to pay the arbitration.

Defense Offers Evidence In The P&N Controversy

Spartanburg, S. C., Oct. 30.—(AP)—Introduction of documentary evidence in the form of a letter from the postmaster general addressed to "Interurban railroads" was the first defense step today in the Interstate Commerce Commission's injunction suit against the Piedmont and Northern Railway. Members of the defense counsel said the letter was introduced for the purpose of showing the manner in which it is P. & N., in electric railway, handled mail as well as passengers and freight traffic. The P. & N.'s principal contention in fighting the I. C. C.'s suit to prevent extension of its lines is that it is an interurban railway not subject to the commission's jurisdiction.

Attorneys for the commission and for the seven steam railways which intervened in the suit objected to admission of the letter as evidence. Presiding Judge J. Lytle Glenn overruled the objection, said his ruling did not signify the letter would have influential bearing on the final decision.

E. B. Hardin, auditor for the P. & N., who was on the stand when court closed yesterday afternoon, was again introduced by the defense.

WELFARE WORK TALKED HERE

Interesting Program At One Day Session of the N. E. Welfare Conference

The North Eastern Welfare Conference met in a one-day session at the Episcopal church in this city this morning. The program for the occasion centered around a discussion of dependency and unemployment.

Several of the best known welfare workers of the State were in attendance. Mrs. W. T. Best, of Raleigh, presided, and spoke on the "Relation of the State Board of Public Welfare and Its Relation to 'Dependency and Unemployment.'" Dr. M. T. Frizzelle, of Ayden, spoke on the subject, "Health Problems, a Result of Present Economic Conditions." A. D. Franks, member of the faculty of East Carolina Teachers College, addressed the gathering on the subject, "Government Responsibility," and R. C. Deal, of the same college, spoke on "The Responsibility of Private Agencies." K. T. Futrell, director of the Welfare Department of Pitt County, discussed the welfare situation in this county, and was followed by J. E. Winslow, who talked about "Conditions as They Exist in This Section." Mr. J. L. Hassell spoke on "The Present Outlook for Pitt County."

The welfare workers were guests at a luncheon at one o'clock. Dr. R. L. Carr, chairman of the Pitt County Department of Welfare, presided, and the principal address was delivered by Dr. Carl Taylor, of North Carolina State College. The convention came to a conclusion this afternoon after an interesting round table discussion.

The Salvation Army

In the early days, the Army to fight old by-laws in order to their Sunday marches and mid-night open-air meetings. At one time 160 officers were sent to prison by local magistrates for violating what was afterward declared in the British Parliament an obsolete by-law, marking its progress as well as its evolution as a social salvation power in the county.

The launching of this Darkest India Scheme had the effect of changing the attitude of the general public toward the Army to a popular endorsement of it. Royalty recognized it when General William Booth was invited to mark King Edward in Buckingham Palace. Nearly all the governing heads of Europe followed King Edward's example, and in his missionary trips around the world, William Booth received more honors than any given apart from royalty to any other distinguished citizen of the British Empire. In America he was hailed as a benefactor of the world, from the White House to the mayoralty. He led the prayers in the Senate. He visited Japan and confirmed a policy of advance that placed the Army in that progressive country at the head of the procession. In India he sanctioned the organization of buildings for the care and discipline of criminals, famine relief stations, schools, hospitals, training colleges, and a network of the merciful and life-saving institutions. In Korea he agreed to a similar development. He was a ceaseless worker. The pen was seldom out of his hand, when on the deck of a steamer or in the corner of a railroad car. He was a great evangelist. He spoke in halls, circuses, theatres, open-air amphitheatres, pandals in India, as well as among the jungles of Ceylon. In the Tow Hall of Jerusalem city, forty men and women knelt at the Army's penitential-form.—The Army's altar of repentance representing ten different nationalities. The great issue of his life is of

course, this wonderful Salvation Army, which now comprises, eighty-six countries and colonies, in which nearly a million and a half soldiers (men and women) who are given all their spare time to the cause, led by over twenty-six thousand officers preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ in seventy-two different languages.

In April, was celebrated his eighty-third and last birthday. Twelve thousand people were present in the Albert Hall, London, England, and in an effecting scene he waved his hand to the disappearing crowd, saying, "I will meet you in the morning." One of his favorite methods of demonstrating the world-wide achievements of the Army was in the form of an inter-rogation, which he would picture as receiving when standing before his Maker, "What have you done with your life?" to which he would reply, as if addressing his Heavenly Father, "My Lord, behold the Salvation Army!" Today he is revered by mankind and the Army has still within itself the progressive, propelling power of "greater things to come."

STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Share prices again sank lower in a liquid stock market today, as Wall Street was inclined to restrained bearishness.

Little stock was offered for sale, but after the meagre success on the bull side earlier in the week, traders were willing to turn bearish on almost any pretext. An abrupt decline in some of the beverage stocks was attributed by financial news tickers to the belief that they would be adversely influenced should the campaign for the return of legalized beer prove successful.

Coca Cola was an outstanding spot, dropping 13 points and Canada Dry and White Rock were also carried lower. It was pointed out in brokerage circles that Coca Cola had not declined proportionately with the rest of the list, and had thus been left in a vulnerable position. Eastman Kodak was again under pressure, losing more than 6. National Biscuit, Aitison, American and Foreign Power lost 3 or more, while U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, International Harvester, and Union Carbide. Some of the independent steels, including Crucible, Ludlum and Newton, reached new lows, as did United Aircraft, Gillett and Checker Cab. Radio sagged to its previous low of 20.

There was little in the days news to influence the market, which seemed to be largely governed by widespread discouragement over its inability to rise for more than two successive days. The small volume of general liquidation, nevertheless, had convinced many traders that the market was thoroughly sold out, and its failure to make a sharp technical rebound has caused some confusion in the minds of traders who expect it to follow its well-known pattern. Bearishness was decidedly not aggressive. Some of the large operators recently active on the short side did not participate in the selling.

Call money was offered in the outside market as low as 1 percent, and the demand was negligible. The official rate, however, remained pegged at 2, presumably on the theory that a lower figure would cause withdrawals from out-of-town.
