## BATTLE FOR VOTES GROWS INTENSE IN N. C.

### Speakers Laud Cause of Parties From Corners, Platforms and Over Radios

Charlotte, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Campaigners on the political front called on their reserve vocal artillery today in order to bolster an offensive they hope to strengthen to the winning point before Tuesday's battle of ballots.

Words were flying thick and fast and there were so many speakers on the corner, on the platform and on the radio that it was hard to get out of earshot of the rumbling pleas for votes.

Governor O. Max Gardner, Democrat, joined the fray for the second time last night when he spoke his mind in Greensboro on the question of prohibition and politics.

Both Josiah W. Bailey, Democrat, and George M. Pritchard, Republican, aspirants for a seat in the United States Senate, are dry. The governor said, and prohibition is not an issue as far as the two men are concerned.

"But," the chief executive asked, "is Mr. Hoover, the head of the Republican party, as strong a prohibitionist as Mr. Pritchard or Mr. Bailey?"

The governor thought not, asserting that the "only thing done by Mr. Hoover in these 18 months is indicate his position has been the appointment of the Wickham commission—a remarkable aggregation that is with-holding its report until after the election."

Despite Governor Gardner's opinion on the subject, Mr. Pritchard stated to Rutherford county voters that "prohibition is the principal issue" in North Carolina politics this year. This he said is particularly true when it comes to choosing between him and Mr. Bailey.

Mr. Bailey ignored the cause of prohibition at Wilson and centered his attack on what he termed "Hoover prosperity." He suggested that "it would be a good idea to send President Hoover and his party leaders to China to see if they can't help matters there," because, he said, the Republicans were blaming the business depression on the condition of foreign lands.

Leslie Mortimer Shaw, former secretary of the treasury and one-time governor of Iowa, offered a check for \$1,000 to "any Democrat in this audience who will name a single industry that has developed in the last 100 years that owes its origin to Democratic legislation."

Mr. Shaw, sent to North Carolina by the Republican National Committee, was speaking at Wilmington. While all the speeches were being reviewed today, Charlotte was preparing to entertain Mr. Pritchard and a few other Republican candidates at a county-wide rally. The renegade candidate will top off his campaign with an WBT. He will speak from 9 until 10 p. m.

## High Point Business Man Kills Himself

High Point, Oct. 31.—(AP)—William C. Jones, High Point business leader and Democratic candidate for representative to the State Legislature from Guilford county, was found shot to death in his office here today.

He was lying on the floor of the office with a pistol by his side. A bullet, entering his right temple, had passed through his head.

Relatives, who said he had been in ill health for some months, expressed belief he had killed himself. A coroner's inquest was set for late today.

Mr. Jones was a member of one of High Point's pioneer families. He was engaged in real estate and insurance business. He was 58 years old.

## Jury Deliberates In Manslaughter Case At Raleigh

Raleigh, Oct. 31.—(AP)—The fate of three prison camp officials, who are charged with the manslaughter of a 19-year-old negro convict rested today in the hands of a jury that had considered the evidence overnight.

Gordon Watkins, camp supervisor, Vance Mangum, truck driver, and Swanwick Council, guard, were arrested in connection with the death of Willie Bellamy, whom they are charged with treating brutally just before he died.

When the jury advised Judge H. Hoyle Sink late yesterday that an early agreement was not likely, the jurist ordered the 12 men locked up for the night.

## Fire Authorities Enforce Strict No-Fire Rules In Part of City; Every Fireman on Duty; Five City Schools Closed and Roads Blocked to Traffic; Deafening Roar Distinguishable Throughout City

Oklahoma City, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Flowing an estimated 60,000 or more barrels of oil a day, a wild gusher at the southeast doorstep of Oklahoma City threatened residence and business districts today. The fire hazard led to closing of schools, breakfastless, fireless homes and traffic blockades.

Chief danger of fire lay in great clouds of gas which clung to lowlands surrounding the well. As a light southeast wind sprayed business and residential districts with oil, rigid no-fire regulations were enforced in homes south of Seventh street. Hope of removing the fire hazard rested with increased wind.

The well, No. 1 C. E. Stout of the Morgan Petroleum Company, is located on the Canadian river bank just east of the city limits, less than a mile from the heart of the downtown shopping district.

State fire inspectors were ordered to exercise "extreme police power," in enforcing no-fire regulations over a danger area two miles square.

Incoming trains "doused" their fires as they entered the danger zone, coasting into stations. One outgoing Oklahoma City, Ada and Atoka train was not allowed to leave at 7:45 a. m.

Six schools were closed giving 2,320 pupils a vacation until Monday. The Walnut Grove school is but three blocks from the well. Parents were notified not to send their school children to the building, where gas was thick.

Motor cars within many blocks of the well were covered with oil. Boiler fires at drilling wells were extinguished as the gas failed to lift and fires at an asphalt plant near the gusher were put out.

State Fire Marshal C. R. O'Neal, said the condition was the most serious ever faced by the city.

Pockets and clouds of gas would remain a hazard for days after the well is capped, he said.

Every fireman in the city was on duty.

### Boy Scouts to Collect Bundles to Assist in Helping Care for the Poor

Saturday, November 8, has been arranged as Bundle Day by the several Boy Scout Troops of the community. The town has been divided into districts and each district will be under the direction of a patrol leader to see that each home is visited for a bundle of clothing.

Many families of white children are not getting advantage of school opportunity by reason of a shortage of clothes. Clothing for children from fourteen years down is in greatest demand. Several suits of men's clothes for the old disabled men can be used now and for the winter months coming on. Bed clothing and women's coats, dresses and other material that can be cut up and children made clothing from is especially asked for in these bundles. Good used shoes for children can be of service. Anything in the way of wearing apparel will find a place as the winter comes on. All bundles will be delivered to the court house, there it will be given to those in greatest need. It is hoped by the Boy Scouts doing this good turn that a Bundle Day will be made up in every home in Greenville. Merchants and clothiers in the city are urged to donate shop-worn goods to this cause as much material as possible may be collected at this time for the poor and underprivileged class in this community.

Bundle Day is being directed by Dr. M. B. Massey, K. T. Futrell, Joe Taff, William Tyson, Dick Forrest and Zack Vandyke.

## JURY INDICTS ROAD HEAD IN BRIBERY CASE

### C. B. Fancher Also Cited by Grand Jury On Two Charges of Embezzlement

Three separate bills of indictment, involving charges of embezzlement and attempt to bribe a State's witness, were returned against C. B. Fancher, road superintendent, in charge of the convict forces of this county, by the six-months grand jury of the criminal term of Pitt County Superior court yesterday.

The bill of subornation charged that Fancher attempted to bribe with money one Herbert Daugherty, not to testify against him in the investigation by the grand jury. It was alleged that Fancher attempted to get Daugherty to leave town and in that way not be present when the grand jury called for him to testify.

The other two charges are for embezzlement of property belonging to the county and distributed through the Pitt County Highway commission. It was declared that Fancher had applied food supplies, horses feeds, gasoline, oil, auto parts, to his own use.

Fancher has been connected with the county road forces for several years, and is said to be one of the most efficient men ever to have held that job.

In addition to returning the bills of indictment, the grand jury in its report to Judge Small recommended that Fancher be suspended until the charges against him had been settled. No action has been taken in the matter by the highway commission.

Fancher vigorously denied the charges today and will stoutly defend himself when the cases come up for hearing, it was said.

## Man Slays His Mother-in-Law And Then Self

Sparksburg, S. C., Oct. 31.—(AP)—Police today sought a motive for a triple shooting here last night that took three lives.

H. E. Kennedy shot his 32-year old wife, Mrs. J. L. Jolly, his mother-in-law and then shot himself. Kennedy's wound proved fatal almost at once. Mrs. Jolly, wounded in the back and arm, died today. Mrs. Kennedy, shot in the right lung and shoulder, may not survive, hospital authorities said today.

Kennedy, 35, World War veteran, shot them in his home here last night after he had gone to his brother in law's house to bring them home. Neighbors were summoned to the house when Mrs. Jolly ran into the street shrieking. They found Kennedy and his wife lying on the floor of a bedroom, where their small children had been asleep.

## STILL STUDY BULLETS IN BAKER CASE

### Conclusion of Experts' Test Will Be Introduced in Trial At Washington

Washington, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Justice Jesse C. Adkins, before whom Herbert M. Campbell is on trial on a charge of murdering Mary Baker, announced today that Calvin Goddard, prosecution ballistics witness, still was studying bullets turned over to him and conclusions of his tests would not be introduced.

William H. Collins for the prosecution, said in his opening argument that Campbell's action and stories about the Baker murder were proof that he had some knowledge. Collins reviewed in detail the events leading up to the Campbell arrest, said there were gaps in his alibi claims, and dwelt on testimony by ballistics experts that Campbell's gun killed the girl.

Charles H. Smith, Virginia lawyer heading the defense counsel, in his reply savagely attacked the testimony by Goddard and Souder that Campbell's gun was the death weapon.

He said Goddard's failure to complete the tests in time for them to be offered in evidence by the prosecution conclusively proved that he did not know what he was talking about.

Smith said the government had no case against Campbell, that the testimony it had produced was a change combination of "rumor, gossip and supposition" and the testimony of witness after witness for the defense clearly proved that the defendant could not have killed Miss Baker.

The case is expected to go to the jury today.

## LEAF SALES PICK UP ON MART HERE

### Market Sold 784,704 Pounds of Leaf Yesterday At An Average of \$16.63

Yesterday, according to the official report of K. Y. Cobb, supervisor of sales, was one of the most unusual days in the history of the Greenville tobacco market. Because of bad weather there was only about 40,000 pounds of leaf on the floors of the nine warehouses when sales opened yesterday morning. But the sunshine came out a short time later and the farmers began hastening to market with their golden offerings. When sales were suspended during the afternoon, the market had disposed of a total of 784,704 pounds of leaf for \$124,544.01. The general average for this amount was given at \$16.63 per hundred pounds.

The report of the supervisor also indicated that there was approximately one million and three-quarter pounds of tobacco on the floors today. He said the sales forces would conclude the day's work with 1,600,000 pounds to their credit.

Both prices and quality showed a distinct improvement this morning, the report also indicated, and it was expected the average would go beyond that of yesterday.

## WOMAN FOILS KIDNAPPERS IN ILLINOIS

### Courage of Mrs. Yocum Credited With Arrest of Two Husband's Captors

Kewanee, Ill., Oct. 31.—(AP)—A woman's courage was credited by the authorities today as an important factor in bringing failure—and a worthless wooden block—to the men who kidnapped Earl Yocum, wealthy banker.

The fortitude of the banker's wife in cooperating with the Illinois Bankers' Association in tracking down the members of the kidnap gang was pointed to by them as important in the strategy that led to the arrest of two of the men and he hunt for their two companions. The woman, herself, however, was incommunicative, except to reiterate previous statements that she was "handling the matter by herself."

Mrs. Yocum's part in the effort to forestall the kidnappers—that of turning ransom letters over to J. A. Newell of the Bankers' Association while her husband was held captive—was revealed, simultaneously with the confession of Verne Ahlgren, a Galva mechanic, who told the police said, how the banker's abductors asked for \$200,000, then \$150,000, then \$100,000, and finally by getting a package containing the wooden block. It had been placed by the authorities as a decoy on a road at Leland, Ill.

Ahlgren, seized yesterday at a farm where he was hiding, was quoted by the police as saying that he and his companions figured that "Mrs. Yocum was so scared she wouldn't dare double-cross us," and adding that he would "tell the world he was a smart woman."

Ahlgren's confession was made while a hunt was on for Orville Whiskers and Lloyd Winslow, his companions, who with Harry Whiskers, brother of Orville, were implicated by Ahlgren in the plot. Harry Whiskers was arrested last Tuesday as a result of an alleged effort to induce Howard McKee, farmer, to allow the kidnappers to hold Yocum a prisoner on his farm.

The search for the two missing men was continued today. All of them, if tried and convicted, may face the prospect of death in the electric chair.

When the alleged kidnappers found they had been duped they telephoned Mrs. Yocum Wednesday night threatening to bomb her house, and Andrew Anderson, cashier of Yocum's bank was sent to Princeton for a meeting with the gang. His conference was followed by a chase in which the men escaped, after abandoning their car. It was not until noon yesterday that Ahlgren was finally caught.

Confident that the package left for them would contain their "easy money," Ahlgren said, had led the kidnappers to release Yocum last Wednesday at Atkinson, after holding him prisoner in a hunting lodge on the banks of the Illinois river near Lacon. Yocum, who was kidnapped last Saturday evening, was back at work in the bank today, apparently none the worse for his experiences.

## COURT STILL HEARING THE WHITLEY CASE

### Manslaughter Action Expected to Be Completed During the Afternoon

Introduction of testimony continued in Superior court today in the case of Jodie Whitley, of the Penny Hill section of this county, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Paul Forbes, well known planter of the same community. The case was expected to reach the jury late this afternoon.

Court began consideration of the case Wednesday afternoon. A long string of witnesses testified for both the State and defense. Examination of witnesses for the State was still in progress when court recessed at the noon hour today.

The case had its inception in an affair at a tobacco barn on Forbes' farm last summer. Whitley, alleged to have struck Forbes' daughter, was in turn hit with a hammer by Forbes, suffering painful injuries. After this episode, according to testimony, Whitley went home. He came out on the highway sometime later in company with one of his children. As he passed the Forbes' residence, Forbes came out with a shotgun under his arm. Whitley, fearing violence, fired at Forbes, a single shot from the discharge taking effect in the latter's head.

Forbes died a few days later, but there was some question as to the cause of death. The county coroner ordered an autopsy and this revealed that the shot from Whitley's gun had passed through the eye of his adversary and buried itself in the back of the head. This produced a severe hemorrhage which, it was said, resulted in death.

Whitley, meantime had disappeared in Martin county, but surrendered a few days later. He was held in jail here until the last term of criminal court when he was released under bond of \$2,500.

The defense is contending that Whitley shot in self defense, and at the noon hour today had introduced considerable evidence in this connection.

## In Report to Judge Small, Jury Also Calls On County Officers to Reduce Expenses and Taxes; Modification of the Highway Act and Road and School Expenses Also Suggested

Recommending the suspension of C. B. Fancher, road superintendent, the six-months grand jury of the criminal term of Pitt County Superior Court yesterday afternoon submitted its report to Judge W. L. Small, of Elizabeth City, who is presiding over the one week term which convened here last Monday morning.

The jury recommended that Fancher be suspended until certain charges of embezzlement and attempt to bribe a state's witness not to appear before the grand jury to testify against him were cleared up.

The report of the jury also contained other recommendations dealing with the general affairs of the county. Officers of the county were called upon to make every reasonable effort to reduce expenses and taxes. It was also suggested that the farm and road forces be consolidated under the direct control of the Board of Commissioners.

It was further recommended that Pitt's representatives in the General Assembly use their influence in bringing about a modification of the County Highway Act, and further that they cause to be modified road and school expenses now resting on the county.

Officers of the county were found to be in good condition, and Judge Small was commended for the fair and impartial way he conducts his courts.

The report in detail follows:

TO THE HONORABLE WALTER L. SMALL, JUDGE PRESIDING: Your Grand Jury for this term submits the following report:

We have carefully considered and acted upon all bills submitted to us, and made due returns on same.

We have visited the several Public Offices of the County, Clerk of Court, Register of Deeds, Superintendent of Education, Treasurer, Sheriff, Welfare Department, County Farm Agent, County Auditor and Tax Supervisor. We find each of them in excellent condition, and the affairs of the county being well cared for and efficiently managed.

We have visited the following named County Institutions, and reported thereon as follows: The jail was found to be in good condition, prisoners well cared for; the County Home, under the management of Mr. Corbett, was found in good condition, the inmates seemed to be well cared for and contented; the Convict camp was in good condition and seemed well cared for. We recommend that our Road Superintendent, Mr. Fancher, be suspended at once and until present charges which are against him are cleared up.

Under present conditions we feel it our duty to give some recommendations to the general affairs of the County. Thereupon we recommend that the officers and employees of Pitt County make every reasonable effort to reduce county expenses and taxes. That under present business conditions, readjustment of the County's business affairs must be made. It seems that the citizenship will have great difficulty in paying the 1930 taxes. We suggest it is to the best interest of Pitt County that is Farm and Road force be consolidated under the direct control of the Board of County Commissioners. And we further recommend that our members of the General Assembly cause to be amended our Pitt County Highway Act, and further that they cause to be modified road and school expenses now resting on Pitt County. Specifically, we urge that our Representatives cause to be removed those conditions which now seem to prevent local self government.

We commend the Presiding Judge for the manner in which he conducts his courts and express our appreciation to him, the Solicitor, and all other officers for their courtesies to this Grand Jury.

#### WOMAN'S POSITION IN THE ARMY

To put it in a nutshell, woman's position in The Army is just what she herself makes it.

With remarkable insight, early in the history of the organization, the great hearted founder discovered (until then) more or less hidden capacities of womankind for public and social service, and offered her scope for her exercise and development.

In former centuries women of outstanding character, ability or courage had just occasionally seized unique opportunities, and by their very audacity had brought themselves into the limelight of public notice. Like brilliant stars they shone for a moment on their generation, and then passed out of sight, leaving womankind as a whole still in obscurity, fettered and bound by sentiments and traditions of the past.

William and Catherine Booth scored their triumph in the field of permanency and generally, scoring sentiment and breaking free from tradition, they blazed the trail for women of every class and clime to stand shoulder to shoulder with their brethren and fight with them for the salvation of souls, and for uplift of the oppressed and down-trodden.

No door of opportunity in The Army is closed to woman. No position is impossible of attainment. The only limitation of achievement is her own willingness to enter the door, or ability to rise to the position offered her. Hence the contention that woman's position in The Army is what she herself makes it.

That women have had the ability, and have not been lacking in the courage to grasp the opportunity, the annals of the Army provide ample example. There are those remarkable personalities whose powers of leadership, public oratory and administrative ability have marked them out as pioneers of Army work, or Territorial leaders, as divisional commanders (sometimes termed the "Bishops" of the Salvation Army) women are carrying equal responsibility with their male comrades, and are given oversight to as many as thirty or forty corps, while as commanders of the corps units, they are leaving their impress on the cities, towns, villages and hamlets, and in the inhabitants of the wretched slum areas.

Many single women have found their peculiar niche in the carrying out of what may be termed special work, for example, in the training of cadets, in the building up of such beneficial enterprises as mothers and other hospitals, as doctors, as nurses in the Leper Colonies of the East, among women inmates of many lands as missionaries in the dark heathen countries, as matrons of industrial and children's homes, as writers, editors and reporters.

That the Army has not many

more prominent single women leaders is due somewhat to the foresight of our best men officers. Capable men are not long out of training before they discover that two who thoroughly understand each other can pull together better than one can pull alone. Then to make sure of having an assistant who will not be changed by circumstances or promotion, they choose, in many cases, a promising woman leader, and, in seven cases out of ten, perhaps she accepts the choice. Henceforth she is Mrs. Somebody or Other, and she sometimes falls into the background a little.

Not a few, however, of these women, in addition to tackling the problem of home and child, have continued their public service and left their names indelibly stamped on the peoples of many districts and lands.

The open-door presented to the woman-officer is extended, in her sphere, to the soldier, and in the corps spiritual and administrative positions, such as corps sergeant majors, secretary-treasurer, young people sergeant major are frequently filled by women. Throughout the Army world woman is, in actual fact, playing the same part as man, and playing it with equal efficiency.

### WOMBLE GIVES TESTIMONY AT SEED INQUIRY

Charlotte Man Denies That He Charged Commission With Fixing Prices

Raleigh, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Dental that he made a statement that the Federal Trade Commission had "fixed" the prices of cottonseed was given the commission today by J. B. Womble of Charlotte, who appeared as a counter witness.

Last week J. B. Linker, a Concord ginners, testified that he was told by Mr. Womble, who is mill manager for the Southern Cotton Oil company at Charlotte, and by two other mill officials connected with the Buckeye Cotton Oil company, that the Federal Trade Commission was "responsible" for the fixing of the price of seed.

Mr. Womble said today that Mr. Linker had misunderstood his statement.

"I told Mr. Linker that we, op-

erated under a code of ethics which had approval of the Federal Trade commission in part," Mr. Womble testified. "He misunderstood me when he said I made the statement the Federal Trade Commission fixed the price of cotton seed."

Mr. Linker testified last week that he became so mixed up on the alleged price fixing of cottonseed that he wrote President Hoover to find out what relation the Trade Commission had to the cottonseed industry.

The Trade Commission opened a hearing here October 7 in continuation of its probe of the cottonseed industry under senatorial direction.

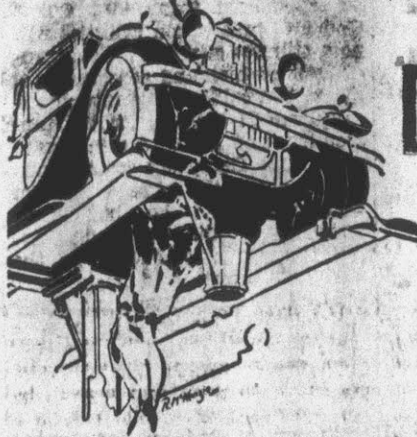

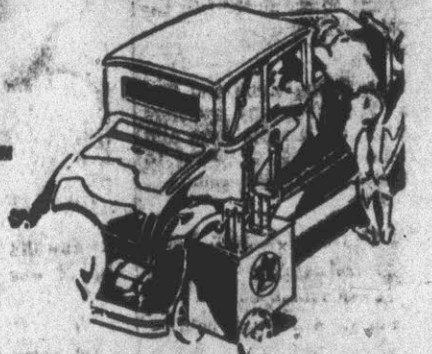

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## AN OPEN LETTER TO MR. C. W. HEARNE.

Dear Mr. Hearne:

In another column on this  
page appears your letter in  
which you charge that our  
editorial warning the people  
of our county against "cer-  
tain parties" (you and your  
ang) who are trying to get  
control of the county's af-  
fairs, is a reflection on the  
Democratic Party of our  
county. As a matter of fact  
our editorial was an appeal

stead of reducing it during this  
period of depression." The state-  
ment quoted is a reflection on the

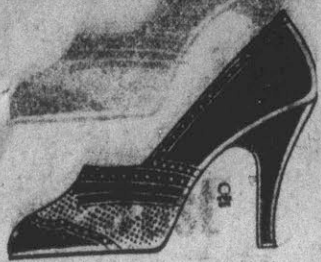

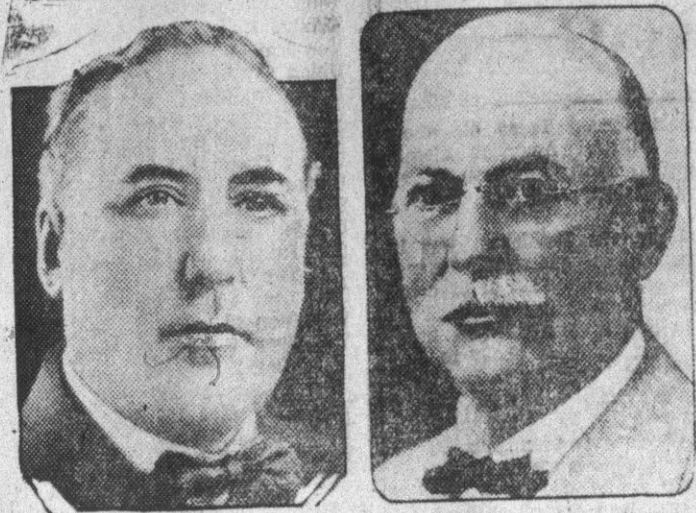

Negroes living in river bottom flats fled their homes as the crude oil from the gusher, unstemmed by earthen dykes, poured into the river.

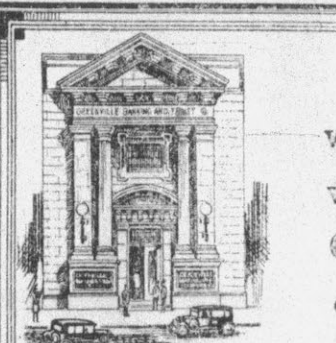

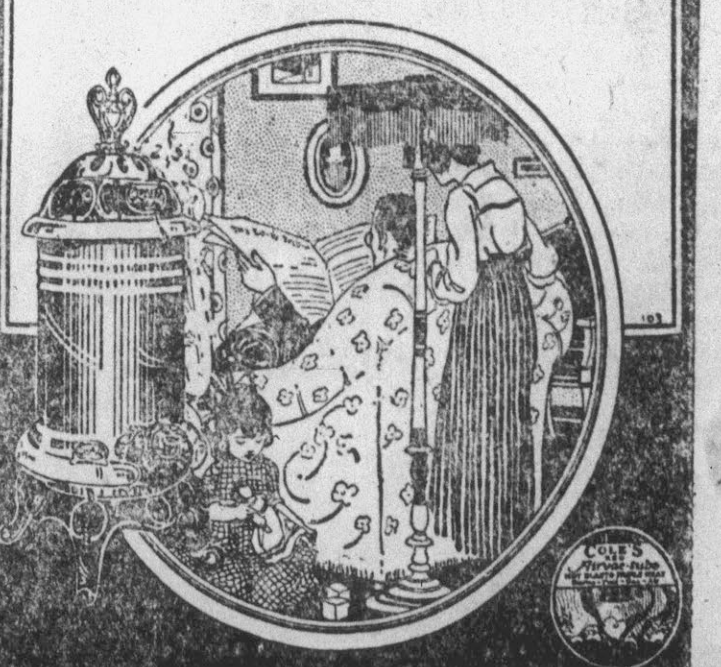
