In North Carolina Josiah William Bailey is carrying the honors for the Democratic party in the battle for the Senate. He has preached the gospel of Democracy in virtually every part of the state and by reason of the fact the people are better acquainted with the various issues than they have ever before.

Congressmen from various districts will also be chosen. In this district Lindsay Warren is running for re-election. He completed his platform engagements with an address at Black Jack Saturday night. He told the voters the tariff is one of the greatest handicaps to prosperity in this county, and admonished the voters that it would be necessary to stick to the Democratic party if they would have a continuance of prosperity and good times in North Carolina.

Rounding out one of the most intensive campaigns in years, W. E. in that way give definite expression to their desires through the ballot. There should be no half way mark in this campaign. The issues are clearly defined and the voters should be fully cognizant of the true facts in the case.

Civic clubs of this city have played an important part in the life of the community the last several years, and there should be no letup in efforts in the future, in the opinion of Bruce Sugg, president of the Greenville Kiwanis club.

At the last meeting of the organization, Mr. Sugg impressed the Kiwanians with the important part which clubs of this kind had played in the upbuilding of the city and community in recent years, and urged the Kiwanians to be on the alert to render even a higher standard of service in the future.

J. C. Galloway, of Grimesland, also told the Kiwanians that "the community is in need of more industrial plants," and urged them to do everything in their power to bring such industries to Greenville during the next year. He said plants of this kind would create weekly payrolls and put more money in circulation all the year around.

Other men connected with the business life of the city believe that diversification of industry is necessary if the section is to go forward in the future as in the past, and members of the various clubs are doing what they can to make such things possible.

Five sets of buyers on the Greenville tobacco market have made it possible for the farmer to market his offerings and return home the same day. This fact has been demonstrated time and again since the fifth set of buyers began action, and hundreds of farmers who were forced to wait from a day to two days to dispose of their offerings have been considerably impressed by the improved conditions.

The Greenville market ranks among the largest markets in the world at this time, and the farmers who sell here may rest assured of receiving the best of service it is possible for a market to afford. In addition to this, they are assured the highest price for the weed every day.

Although the Greenville goal was set at seventy-five million pounds of leaf the beginning of the season, the fifth set of buyers is going to make it possible for them to go beyond this mark. The market is already nearly five million pounds ahead of the same date last season and this leads to the belief that the end of the season will find the figures between the eighty and ninety million pounds mark.

Farmers who have been selling on other markets have expressed keen appreciation of the splendid service here, and especially those who have come from a long distance. They not only appreciated the treatment which they received but commended the tobaccoists on the rapid way they removed their offerings. They also said they would come again, and not be long about it.

New York, Nov. 3.—(AP)—All cops looked alike to Catherine Stuhlmueller, of Union City, N. J., so she wasn't much surprised to learn that the traffic officer for whom she was gunning in Long Island City last night wasn't the man she was looking for.

Miss Stuhlmueller went up to Traffic Patrolman Innie at the Long Island end of the Queensboro Bridge last night and opened fire. Two shots went wild, and by that time he had the revolver.

"This cop looked like the one I was after," she explained at headquarters. "But I find he's not the man." She said she had trouble with police.

BELIEVE RUM RUNNERS TURN TO KIDNAPPING

Police Investigate This Theory In Inquiry of Kidnapped Man At Detroit

Detroit, Nov. 3.—(AP)—The theory that downriver rum runners have turned to kidnapping because of unfavorable conditions in the "importing" business is being investigated today by detectives of the Detroit police blackhand squad in their search for Charles Kaier, reputed wealthy retired real estate dealer, held since last Thursday night by kidnapers.

Inspector John Hoffman, said that with the passage of the Canadian law forbidding export of liquor to the United States, rum runners have turned to "shaking down" wealthy people who for various reasons would not appeal to the law for protection.

He said they found this less hazardous than running liquor across the river. Up to the past few days however, threats rather than acts have been used to obtain money.

Kaier was taken from his home Thursday night by four men who posed as Federal prohibition agents.

One of them showed a badge and said they were taking Kaier to the United States District Attorney's office.

Shortly after her husband left with the men, Mrs. Kaier received by telephone a demand for \$100,000.

ransom. She did not communicate with police but managed to induce the kidnapers to accept \$2,000.

Detectives learned of the kidnapping through unannounced sources and trailed Mrs. Kaier to a hotel where she went to deliver \$2,000 of the ransom money.

She waited several hours Saturday afternoon and night, but the kidnapers' agent failed to appear.

Two detectives sat in the lobby near the woman and others were waiting in the street. Mrs. Kaier went home in an hysterical condition, and neighbors called police.

Inspector Hoffman said that Joseph (Peajack) Morgan, alleged rum runner, indicted two years ago in connection with the bribing of two score border custom patrolmen, called at the Kaier home several times and finally was taken into custody for questioning. Entrance of Wozniak into the case led Hoffman to believe that Kaier was acquainted with rum runners and is held by them for ransom.

Two American Vice-Consuls Drown In Cuba

Havana, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Bodies of two American vice consuls in Cuba and of the wife of one were sought today in Matanzas bay after a drowning tragedy in which the two men died in a futile attempt to save the woman.

The three drowned were John Tillison Wainwright, 32, of New York, American vice consul at Matanzas, and Mr. and Mrs. William L. Jackson, of Madison, Ill. Mr. Jackson, who was 36, was vice consul at Havana.

A third vice consul, Sydney Gest of Havana, barely escaped with his life in a futile attempt to rescue the trio when his wife found a long pole and pulled him to shore.

The three vice consuls were spending Sunday with their wives at Matanzas. Mrs. Jackson climbed to the top of a high cliff overlooking the bay. A sudden swirl of wind caught her and blew her over the cliff into the bay.

Her husband, hearing her screams, jumped in after her, but in a moment it appeared certain to those on the shore that his attempt would be futile in the rough water. Wainwright then dove into the bay, and for a moment all three could be seen on the crest of a wave.

A moment later Gest went into the water also but was soon exhausted without seeing the trio again and tried to get back to shore. He probably would have drowned but had not his wife pulled him out with the pole.

Dies From Gunshot Wound

Girl Injured When Thrown From Auto

High Point, Nov. 3.—(AP)—While Billie Aeyiondean, 19-year-old Gastonia girl, lay in a Thomasville hospital, E. J. Barber, of Burlington, was held in city jail here charged with having thrown her from his automobile last night.

The girl, bruised and numbed with cold, was found a mile east of Thomasville last night and taken to the hospital.

She said Barber had offered to take her to her mother's home in Gastonia.

Just outside of Thomasville, she said, Barber turned around and demanded her money. When she refused he threatened to strike her with a bottle. Barber's little brother dissuaded him.

When she continued to refuse, Miss Aeyiondean said, Barber threw her from the car. Falling into a creek, she was knocked unconscious and was not able to call for help until an hour later, she said.

Bailey Asks Gardner to Denounce Political Ad In Today's Paper
Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 3.—(AP)—J. W. Bailey, Democratic Senatorial nominee, in an open letter to Gov. O. Max Gardner with the request the governor read the letter during his radio speech here tonight, today denounced a political advertisement which appeared in at least one North Carolina newspaper today as "false and fraudulent."

Governor Gardner told the Associated Press this afternoon that he expected to embrace the letter in his talk, which will formally close the Democratic campaign in the State.

Mr. Bailey asserted in his letter that "just on the eve of the election" appeared an advertisement "in which language is attributed to me which I have never used and never thought of using."

The advertisement appeared in the Raleigh News and Observer today and was signed "(Anti-Smith) Principled Democratic Committee of Wake County" and charged that Mr. Bailey in 1928 said of anti-Smith Democrats as follows:
"They must be boiled in oil, soaked in concentrated lye and carbolic acid before they can be admitted back to the fold."

Bullet Fails to Pass Through His Vest

Detroit, Nov. 3.—Walker, filling station art, didn't get enough to suit a jail last night and the bullet failed.

One Killed In Attempt to Get Out of Sing Sing

Qing, N. Y., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Sing Sing prison authorities sought to learn today how pistols were smuggled to four inmates whose attempt to shoot their way out resulted in the death of one of them and the wounding of another prisoner and guard.

An autopsy indicated that Harry Gordon, 23, the inmate who lost his life in the unexpected break Saturday night, committed suicide after he had wounded a guard and had been shot twice by the guard.

As a precaution against another attempt to escape, 100 guards yesterday searched the quarters of the 2,230 inmates and other parts of the prison.

The found a coil of rope with a hook attached similar to that used by the four in their attempted break, a few table knives and an imitation pistol fashioned from wood.

Edward Ryan, William La Plante, Herbert Davis, the survivors, were held in solitary confinement pending determination of what charges will be made against them for their part in the attempt to escape. The wooden pistol was found in Ryan's cell.

The attempt to escape made after the four re-entered their cell block from the prison chapel about 7 p. m. they thrust four guards and five trustees into a store room, locked them and made their way to the yard where they attempted to throw large hook attached to a rope over the 30-foot wall.

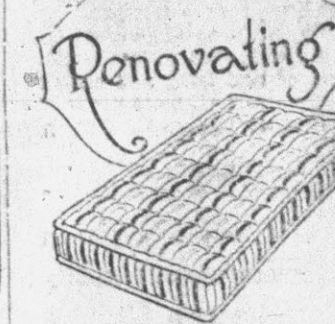

COTTON MARKET

New York, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 9 to 16 points in response to relatively steady cables and favorable reports from the domestic goods market. The advance met some southern selling and considerable realizing but it appeared to be quite readily absorbed by local buying and covering.

After selling at 11.20 early, raw December advanced to 11.27, while May sold up to 11.90 and the market was within 2 or 3 points of these figures at the end of the first half hour with active months showing net advances of 13 to 16 points. December liquidation was more or less in evidence and there was some buying from that delivery to later months. A private crop report was published placing the indicated crop at 14,760,000 bales and estimating the ginning prior to November 1 at 11,148,000 bales.

Liverpool cables reported continental and Bombay buying and said there was an improved demand for cotton cloths from South America and Africa.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Low price records for the season were cut by the corn market today. May and July deliveries both selling at levels not reached heretofore on the 1930 crop.

Farm reserves of corn were reported at 80,000,000 bushels, an amount 3,000,000 more than last year. Wheat went lower with corn and under selling pressure for houses with eastern connections equalled the bottom prices this season despite 2,192,000 bushels decrease of the United States wheat visible supply.

Corn closed heavy, 7-8-13-8c a bushel lower than Saturday's finish. Wheat closed nervous 11-4-17-8c down, oats 3-4c-1-8c off, and provisions unchanged to rise of 2c.

STOCK MARKET.

New York, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Share prices drifted uncertainly in today's stock market, as traders appeared content to accept tomorrow's elections as an excuse for making time.

The market is accustomed to turn dull pending the dissipating of the shadow of uncertainty cast by an approaching election, but this has been but one of many factors influencing speculative quiet during the past fortnight.

A few shares rallied briskly during the morning, apparently reflected closing out of short contracts before the market holiday tomorrow. By early afternoon, however, the list again eased off, most of the pivotal shares, such as U. S. Steel, General Electric, Standard Oil of N. J. and Westinghouse Electric showing losses of 2 to 3 points in such shares as Electric Power and Light, DuPont, Allied Chemical, and Union Pacific, and a point or more in some of the tobacco shares, Public Utilities and specialties, were whittled down.

The week-end business and trade reports were in the main colorless. Wall Street is becoming reconciled to the prospect of quiet and irregular markets for some little time. The weekly advices of the statistical services as well as of most commission houses are in agreement upon this point. While there is a feeling that the present is a better time to buy than to sell, prime equities the advisory services still feel that accumulation should proceed conservatively, and only on reactions.

A few earnings statements for the September quarter were relatively satisfactory. Pullman reported net of \$1.75 a share, which was not far from the \$1.87 earned

in the like quarter a year ago. Coca Cola reported net before taxes somewhat in excess of the third quarter a year ago, but the stock again reacted. Stocks selling at high earnings ratios have been particularly vulnerable to selling of late.

Monetary conditions held stationary. Call loans still held at 1. It is reported that some banks are placing funds directly with brokers, rather than through the loan desk, to avoid a flood of money which might reduce the 2 percent rate, and cause withdrawal of funds by lenders likely to be dissatisfied with a lower figure.
