## LIGHT VOTING REPORTED IN PITT COUNTY

Greenville Township Had Cast Approximately 600 Votes Up to Noon Hour

Pitt county voters were rallying behind Democratic candidates in today's election in no uncertain terms, according to information reaching the city early this afternoon. The report also indicated that a light vote would be cast, this being attributed largely to overcast skies which gave forth threat of rain during the morning and early afternoon.

In Greenville township approximately six hundred votes had been cast up to the noon hour, and it was not expected that the afternoon would bring the total much above the 1200 mark. In fact, George Clark, chairman of the Board of Electors, expressed opinion that the vote would be similar to that cast in the second primary in July when the precinct barely passed the 1200 mark. The vote in the first primary, however, was considerably above the figure.

Principal interest in today's election centered about the contest for United States Senator in which J. W. Bailey, the Democratic nominee, is opposed by George M. Pritchard, Republican.

Locally, attention was confined almost exclusively to the race for the County Board of Commissioners in which two Republicans are attempting to wrest two seats from the Democratic nominees. The campaign preceding election was strenuously prosecuted in many sections of the county, and was given additional stimulus by the support of an element that has opposed activities of the county government over a period of several months.

The Republicans were also offering contest for the State Senate, House of Representatives and sheriff. Only minor interest was attached to the races in these fields, as it was believed the Democratic candidates would emerge from the race with overwhelming majorities.

The Democrats concluded their campaign fight last night with an address at Farmville by J. C. B. Ehringhaus, of Elizabeth City, prominently mentioned as a candidate for governor. The speaker told of the prominent part which the Democratic party had played in the life of the State, and scored the Republicans for their failure to live up to promises. He gave the Farmville people something to think about in the way of tariff and special privilege question and urged them to go to the polls and vote the Democratic ticket from top to bottom.

In case weather conditions should improve during the afternoon, political leaders expressed belief that the vote would be considerably increased in some of the districts. Some precincts were expected to vote almost normal, but the vote in the larger polling places, it was expected, would be much less than in the primary in June.

## Youth Charged With Slaying Young Girl

Wise, Va., Nov. 4.—(AP)—A 17-year-old boy faced charges here today in the slaying of a high school girl the same age.

Earl Renion, of Ironside, was arrested yesterday soon after discovery of the body of Bertha Hood, of East Stone Gap, on railroad tracks near the girl's home. Renion was charged with having knowledge of the girl's murder and his hearing set for today. A second youth, "Shorty" Hopkins was held as a material witness.

Authorities quoted the boy as saying he shot the girl accidentally.

## Slow Voting In Times Square

New York, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Although its daytime population is among the densest in the city, one Times Square election district today yielded but a single voter.

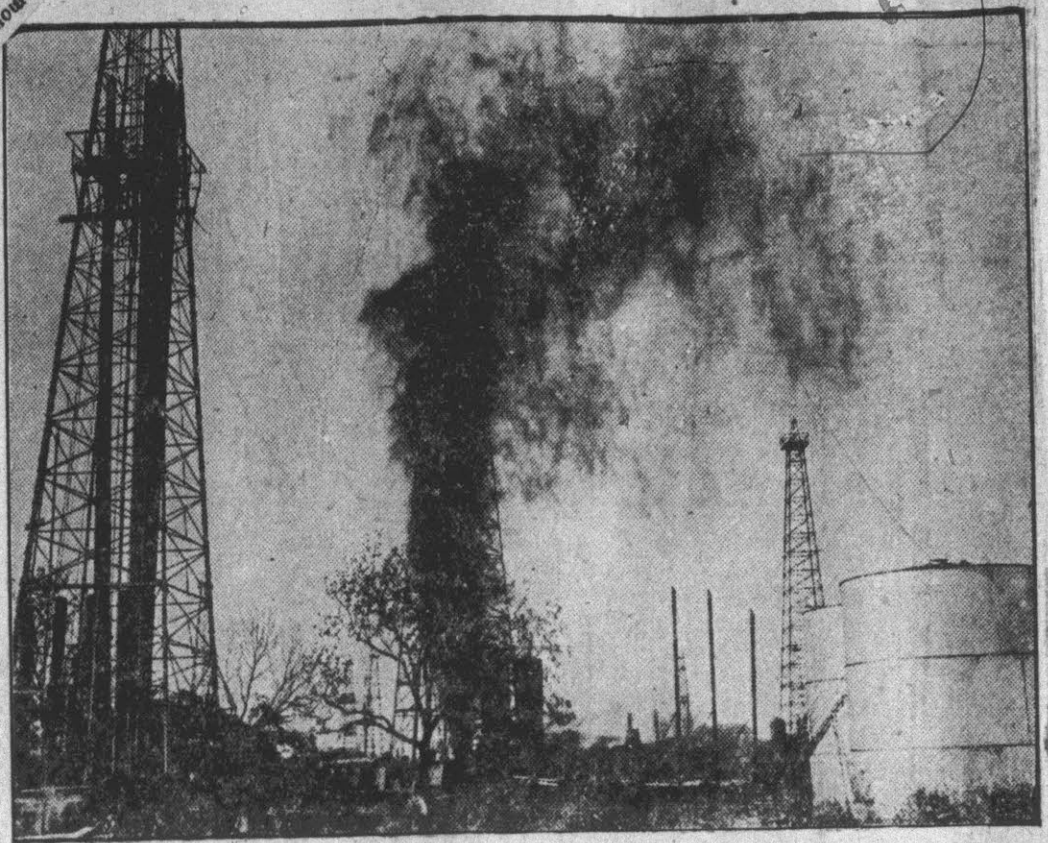
It was the 38th precinct of the 10th assembly district, west of Broadway in 40th street, where George Schrader, who tends a boiler in a nearby skyscraper, cast his solitary ballot.

Election officials said Schrader's vote cost the city \$1,127.65. Six election employees and four party watchers were required to handle the ballot.

## North Carolina In Midst Of Ballot Battle Today; Senate Fight Features

### State to Elect a United States Senator, Ten Congressmen And Minor Officials; Bailey - Pritchard Contest Holds Eyes of the Nation

Charlotte, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The steady patter of rain around the polling places kept the fall of ballots down to a drizzle during the morning hours today as the North Carolina electorate said the final word to Democratic and Republican claims.

Indications were that a far smaller vote than party leaders had anticipated for this politically "off-year" would be cast.

Rain was general over the state and high winds raged over most of Eastern North Carolina, the solidly Democratic section. Early reports said the vote was extremely light there while it was reported below normal in other sections.

High Point was among the cities reporting a heavy vote. Despite the rain, the balloting was unusually heavy there.

Charlotte, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The voices that have praised the platform, raised the issues and denounced the opposition were stilled today and a mighty North Carolina electorate was given the final word in the State's 1930 political argument.

The fire of vocal battle had died down and out of the skies of words and predictions arose a host of voters who went forth to speak their minds by making marks on a ballot.

As the sun sinks beyond the horizon today, scores of election officials will begin counting votes. When the tally is completed, North Carolina will have elected a United States Senator, ten Congressmen and numerous lesser officials.

The candidacies of Josiah W. Bailey, Democratic Senatorial nominee, and George M. Pritchard, his Republican opponent, have wide interest for the State and a large part of the nation.

Bailey captured the public eye when he defeated the veteran Senator F. M. Simmons in the Democratic primary in June. Simmons, in 1928, refused to support Alfred E. Smith, Democratic presidential nominee. Out of the party split his action brought about, was born the nomination of Bailey.

Pritchard, swept into office by the Hoover landslide in 1928 that also gave the Republican nominee North Carolina's electoral College vote, has served as Representative from the Tenth Congressional District for the last two years.

The Congressional District Mr. Pritchard deserted to go in search of Senatorial laurels blossomed into a hot-bed of politics that ranks second only to the Ninth District campaign in state-wide interest.

Zebulon Weaver, whom Mr. Pritchard defeated, is seeking to return to Washington on the Democratic ticket. His Republican opponent is Brownlow Jackson, former United States marshal for the Western North Carolina district.

In the Ninth District, Major A. L. Bulwinkle is attempting a comeback against Representative Charles A. Johns, who defeated him two years ago.

## PROSPERITY DOLLARS ON THE HOP HERE

### One Dollar Passed Through Hands of 24 Merchants By 5 O'clock Yesterday

The four prosperity dollars placed in circulation at the beginning of "Prosperity Week" yesterday morning apparently were accomplishing their mission late yesterday afternoon. The Reflector received a report on one of the dollars at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. The report came from the Store of W. A. Bowen where the dollar was held at that time. It was stated that the bill had passed through the hands of twenty-four merchants during the day, and had been received at the Bowen store six different times.

Although no report was sent in on the other three dollars, it was believed they had been circulated freely among the merchants in various parts of the city. The dollars were released yesterday morning by The Greenville Banking and Trust Co., the National Bank, State Theatre, and the Merchants Association. Merchants have been requested to report the progress of the dollars at the Reflector office each afternoon at 5 o'clock.

The object of "Prosperity Week," which was launched through the Merchants Association with a proclamation by Mayor J. C. Lanier, is to encourage the circulation of money, and in that way attempt to relieve the economic depression which has existed in this section the last several months. As a part of the program, the citizenship has been urged to settle up debts, and to create as much new employment as possible during the week.

Hundreds of people thronged the business district during the first day of "Prosperity Week." They were attracted here largely through the special features of "Cow Day," another event launched by the Merchants Association, and bought liberally of the countless bargains which the merchants had to offer them.

The bargain features will continue throughout "Prosperity Week" in order to encourage the circulation of money.

C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the Merchants Association, said this morning that another "Cow Day" would be held on December 3rd. It will be marked by interesting events and the offering of additional values to the thousands of shoppers of the community.

## Association Issues Call for 250 Rooms

The Merchants Association issued a call for 250 rooms to take care of members of the North Eastern Educational Association who will assemble in convention here November 21-22.

The association has assumed the responsibility of providing suitable rooms for the visitors, and the public has been urged to co-operate in the effort to take care of the crowd.

The convention will continue for a period of two days, and many of the visitors will be here two nights. The association will allow \$1.00 a day for each room.

## SEVERAL MEN GO ON TRIAL FOR LYNCHING

### Defense Attempts to Prove Alibi in Case of Seventeen Men At Walhalla

Walhalla, S. C., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Trial of 17 men on a charge of murder as a result of the lynching of a negro here last spring today centered around a defense effort to prove an alibi for Mayor R. L. Ballentine, one of the defendants.

J. E. Rorden, a defense witness introduced by consent before the prosecution had completed its case, gave the mayor an alibi.

Rorden said Ballentine came to his house two hours before Allen Green, 52, negro, was taken from the jail here and lynched. The mayor called, he said, to cancel an engagement for a fishing trip and was talking with him at the time the mob gathered before the jail.

The defense was permitted to place Rorden on the stand at this time because he had business engagements which would make it inconvenient for him to testify later.

When Rorden had completed his testimony, the state turned its attention to introduction of testimony designed to connect Ballentine with the lynching.

Albert Buchanan, a state witness, said he talked with Ballentine the night before the lynching.

He quoted the mayor as saying, "Something ought to be done" with Green who was charged with attacking a white woman.

"Ballentine got into my car," he continued, "and we rode around Walhalla. We made two stops and each time Ballentine got out and walked off into the dark."

The purpose of the ride was not brought out.

Buchanan also quoted Alvon Jones, Walhalla night policeman, as saying:

"If anything happens, the police have business on the other side of town."

Other state witnesses described the arrest of John Sanders, identified yesterday by Sheriff J. L. Thomas as a leader of the mob.

## ASK PEOPLE TO OBSERVE NOVEMBER 11

### President Hoover Issues Proclamation in Behalf of Armistice Day

Washington, Nov. 4.—(AP)—President Hoover today called on America to observe Armistice Day with gratitude that the agencies of peace have been strengthened and the nation's relations with other countries "are firmly grounded in amity and accord."

The following proclamation was issued:

"Whereas the 11th day of November 1918 is forever memorable as the day upon which ended the World War, with its attendant suffering and vast wastage of human life; and

"Whereas it is fitting that the anniversary of this day should be commemorated by exercises which shall do honor to all those who served our country, and especially to the memory of those who died in its service, believing that their sacrifice was in the cause of peace, which we thereby are solemnly bound to do all in our power to advance and secure; and

"Whereas by concurrent resolution of the Senate and the House of Representatives, in 1926, the President was requested to issue proclamation for the observance of Armistice Day;

"Now, therefore, I, Herbert Hoover, President of the United States of America, in pursuance of the said concurrent resolution do hereby order that the flag of the United States be displayed on all government buildings on November 11, 1930, and do invite the people of the United States to observe the day in schools and churches, and other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies, giving expression to our gratitude that this year past has seen the agencies of peace sensibly strengthened and that our regulations with other peoples are firmly grounded in amity and accord.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the seal of the United States.

"Done at the city of Washington this fourth day of November in the year of our Lord, 1930 and of the independence of the United States of America 155th.

(Signed) HERBERT HOOVER.

## Outcome Of Election Is Marked With Uncertainty As Nation Goes To Polls

### Election Officer Is Kidnapped In Kansas; Negro Fatally Shot

Kansas City, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The kidnapping of John Hendrick, of Buckner, Mo., chairman of the Jackson County Board of Election, and the arrest of two armed political workers here were the first untoward incidents of the election in this county today. A heavy early vote was polled.

Hendrick's motor car with both doors flung open was found abandoned on a country road less than an hour after he left his home. No trace was found of Hendrick, a Republican and cashier of the First State Bank at Buckner.

Several Department of Justice agents assembled here to investigate possible election disturbances were sent by W. L. Vandeventer, United States district Attorney, to search for Hendrick.

Danville, Ky., Nov. 4.—(AP)—An election quarrel at Turkey Pen precinct here today resulted in the fatal shooting of Ed Doneghy, negro, by Joe Hayden, 60, a white Democratic election

challenger. Doneghy was killed when he visited the precinct to "straighten out" a trivial disagreement as to negro voting at the booth.

Hayden was arrested by Sheriff James Bean, made bond in a few minutes and returned to the election booth to continue his work. He claimed he shot in self defense.

Witnesses said the Negro came to the voting booth and said he had heard there had been trouble. He announced that he would regulate the situation and became involved in an argument with election workers.

The negro, witnesses said, directed his attack at Hayden; the row became heated and Doneghy reached for his hip pocket. Hayden fired four bullets into the negro's body and as he fell, witnesses said his hand clasped a pistol.

The sheriff's office said Doneghy had a reputation for being "bad" and caused considerable trouble before.

## Democratic Swing Away From Republican Majorities in 1928 Conceded; Republican Leaders Concede Big Gains to Democrats in the Senate and House; Both Parties Offer Stiff Competition

In an election weighted with uncertainties the nation is deciding today who shall sit in Congress and in the places of authority at thirty two state capitals.

A Democratic swing from the great Republican majorities of 1928 is conceded, but the extent is so befuddled, even in the private reckonings of party leaders, that only the returns themselves can tell the story.

Basing their campaign of attack on President Hoover's conduct of his administration in the business crisis, the Democrats are acknowledged even by the Republican stalwarts to have menaced seriously Republican dominance in the House and reduced the Republican margin in the Senate. As a result, control of Senate or House, or both, by a Democratic-Independent coalition, was a possibility.

Prohibition, unrecognized by either party as a national issue, has all but monopolized the stage in many localities and any overtures were to be scrutinized with extreme interest; by wets and dries.

Not only are the possible fortunes of President Hoover in 1932 thus entangled with today's verdict at the polls, but the result is fraught with potentialities for other outstanding figures in American politics.

Among other things, the election will decide whether Franklin D. Roosevelt, groomed by his supporters for the presidency, will be re-elected governor of New York or voted out of public life.

It will determine the time has come to confer the title of senator-by-election on a woman, Ruth Hanna McCormick of Illinois.

It will disclose whether Democratic Alabama is to discipline Senator Hefflin, by keeping him at home, because he bolted Al Smith.

It will write success or failure across Gifford Pinchot's spectacular campaign to win the Pennsylvania governorship on the Republican ticket, without the support of powerful Republican leaders.

In Montana, the returns will say whether Senator Walsh, prosecutor of the Teapot Dome investigation, is to return again to the Senate after one of the hardest campaigns in his career.

In Nebraska, the voters will decide between the veteran Senator Norris and his one-time colleague, former Senator Hitchcock.

Maryland will answer whether Albert C. Ritchie is to break still another precedent by winning the governorship for a fourth time.

And, by the degree in which it gives to the Independent Republicans the balance of power in the new Senate, the election conceivably will give scope to other operations henceforth of the Independent Senator Borah.

In two thirds of the states, measures of legislation or public policy are before the voter for direct action in referendum. Prohibition provides the medium for three, Illinois and Rhode Island voting their opinions whether the Eighteenth Amendment should be repealed, and Massachusetts deciding whether to do away with her state enforcement act. Bond issues for public works totalling upwards of a half billion dollars, advocated as a boon to employment, are on the ballots in 20 states.

Fair weather over most of the country augured for a heavy vote, although of course the total, as customary, in off-years, was expected to fall far below the mammoth figure of 1928. Only for the South Atlantic States, did the weather map show signs of rain.

Most of the states closed their polls at nightfall, and comprehensive returns from the east and middle west seemed likely by early evening. The far west will be well behind. In Washington and Oregon the closing time was 8 P. M., Pacific time, or 11 P. M., on the Atlantic Seaboard. Kentucky, under a new law, will not begin to count the ballots until tomorrow morning, a circumstance which held possibilities of leaving an important gap in election-night tabulations. For this year the Blue-Grass state was one of the most bitterly contested among them all.

To gain control of the House—the big prize in every off-year election—the Democrats must make a net gain of 53. Technically, they have 435 chances in 1930, for the

## POLICE BEGIN WAR AGAINST SLOT MACHINES

### One Operator Arrested This Morning for Running a Money Machine

The Greenville police department has declared war on slot machines in various sections of the city. One arrest was reported during the morning hours, and others were expected during the afternoon.

Chief Preston Pierce stated that violations had become of a flagrant nature. He stated that some of the machines were paying off in cold cash. This is a direct violation of the law, he declared, and persons found guilty of such violation will be vigorously prosecuted.

Some of the machines, the chief stated, are being operated within the law in that they give mints in exchange for money. However, some of the others are being used purely as gambling devices and will be treated as such.

When policemen walked in on the violator this morning, he was in the act of operating one of the money machines. "Why didn't you let me know it was against the law to run the machine?" he inquired of the policeman.

He was told that any person ought to know "gambling" is against the law. The operator was told to appear at the next sitting of Police court to answer to the charge against him.

Chief Pierce said the law governing the operation of slot machines would be vigorously enforced from now on, and that no excuses of ignorance of the law would be accepted.

He said everybody, especially store owners, should be acquainted with the law in this connection, and declared that his men would conduct a determined campaign to clean up the city in this respect.

## HEAVY SALES CONTINUE ON LEAF MARKET

### Sales Expected to Be Completed This Afternoon At Four O'clock

Despite heavy rainfall during the night, there was approximately 1,400,000 pounds of tobacco on the floors of the Greenville tobacco market today, according to the official report issued this morning by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales. It was stated that sales would be completed by 4 o'clock this afternoon.

The report also showed that the market disposed of 1,436,082 pounds of tobacco yesterday for \$253,104.79 at an average of \$17.62 per hundred pounds.

The price situation showed a distinct gain on several of the better grades yesterday, and increased strength was indicated at the beginning of sales this morning.

With the completion of sales yesterday afternoon the season total was given at 39,244,214 pounds, practically five million pounds ahead of the same period last year.

## Oil Fires Subside At Oklahoma City

Oklahoma City, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Oil fires which swept along the surface of the North Canadian river east of here had consumed their fuel and subsided today after destroying two bridges and endangering the Harrah plant of the Oklahoma City Gas and Electric company.

**LEGION OUT FOR MEMBERS**

**Local Post to Make Effort to Increase Its Membership During Winter Months**

"The American Legion has a wonderful program of service for 1931, but its success depends largely upon its strength in early membership, and every veteran of the world war should join our post immediately," J. S. Elliott, post commander of the Legion here, said today in an appeal to bring a new record of membership to the local organization.

"In years past, the Legion has taken membership more or less for granted, and extended the privilege of joining throughout the year. Now, however, we have learned that membership is a necessary factor in Legion success, and that the earlier we meet this problem, and get it out of the way, the quicker we can devote our undivided attention to the Legion's program of service," he said.

That program of service for 1931, the Legion official pointed out, consists first, of helping solve the unemployment situation now confronting the United States; of sponsoring national legislation when Congress meets in order that needed hospitalization bills can be passed in behalf of disabled veterans; of carrying on the Americanism activities, which include the building up of patriotism through the education of our youth; and in extending the Legion's work on behalf of children.

Recently the national commander of the Legion, Ralph T. O'Neill, called upon every Legionnaire in the United States to help bring back good times, by providing a job, in some way, or using his influence to create work, for idle veterans. The national commander pointed out that members of the Legion are men of stability in their own communities. This fact, O'Neill said, was shown by the increase of membership in the Legion last year to the highest point in the history of the organization, at a time when the depression was fully felt throughout the country.

The American Legion has a financial foundation of more than \$7,000,000, including the \$5,000,000 endowment fund, raised to carry on the work of rehabilitation and child welfare; and the national commander called attention to the fact that Legionnaires are rather proud of their reliability and standing in their regard.

The full force of Legion influence the local official said, depends to a great extent, upon the support given the organization by veterans through their membership at this time. Work for the year is planned on the basis of that strength. Junior baseball, the promotion of Boy Scouting, the two hundred or more different kinds of community service, and many other endeavors await such membership to be started on its 1931 year of record-breaking achievements.

In the Dutch East Indies, where eye diseases, until treated at birth or in early childhood, account for the very large percentage of blind people, the Salvation Army is doing remarkable curative work in the William Booth Eye Hospital. # GIVES AWAY DRINK OF RUM AND IS FIRED

## Federal Agent Admits Being Discharged After Caught In Trap By "Friends"

Boston, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The Boston Evening American today quotes James J. Donovan, assistant prohibition administrator of New York whose home is in this city, as admitting he has been suspended for having given a drink of whiskey to two supposed friends. He told the American he afterward discovered the two had been induced to help him by evidence against him.

Donovan was chief aid to Maurice Campbell, prohibition administrator for New York, who resigned from the service last summer after declining to accept a transfer to Boston.

Donovan charged, the American said, that Campbell had been "forced out" because he enforced the prohibition law in New York and added, "It was only natural that his chief aid would soon follow in his footsteps."

The American said every effort had been made to keep Donovan's suspension a secret until after the election, but these efforts failed when it became known that he had been in this city since last Friday, Administrator Andrew McCampbell, who succeeded Campbell, finally admitted Donovan was through for the time being.

"There is no particular mystery in this affair and fortunately there are no scandalous charges which can be preferred against me," Donovan said.

"The actual charge against me is taking a drink of liquor and giving a couple of drinks to two men whom I had always considered close personal friends and whom I have since learned were working for the highrups in the department to get evidence that would sustain a charge against me."

"It all happened two months ago," The American quoted Donovan.

"The two called at the office in New York. I invited them home to dinner. One of them asked if I was drinking anything and I said, 'No, not for nearly two years.' They both begged me for a drink and I had to go out to a neighbor's house and borrowed a pint from which we each had two drinks."

## OUTCOME OF ELECTION IS MARKED WITH UNCERTAINTY AS NATION GOES TO POLLS

entire membership comes up for election. Actually, however, the field is much narrower. A total of 94 nominees, most of them Southern Democrats, have no candidates against them. In the four main districts, Republicans already have been elected, for Maine votes in September, and was the only state casting no ballots today. In many other districts the result was a foregone conclusion, one way or the other.

Many scattered districts, one or two to a state, were on today's list of the actually disputed, but Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia and Missouri were the states which were feeling the full force of the Democratic shock troops.

In the Senate, where seats but one third of its membership this year, the Democrats need a net gain of 10 for a majority, and the whole number of really disputable states numbered only about a dozen. States which today were writing the verdict, on especially aggressive Democratic efforts to unseat Republican Senators include Colorado, Delaware, Illinois, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Ohio, Oklahoma, Rhode Island and West Virginia.

## Princeton Suspends Forty-Two Students for Part in Rioting

Princeton, N. J., Nov. 4.—Their conduct described by the dean as being beneath the standards of Princeton University undergraduates have been suspended for participating in a riot last Wednesday. The names of those suspended were not given out by Dean Christian Gauss. Four were dropped for a year; two until the end of the Christmas vacation; five for one month; three for two weeks; four for one week and fourteen for an indefinite period.

The riot was an aftermath of a football rally designed to arouse enthusiasm for the Princeton-Ohio game last Saturday which ended in a scoreless tie.

After the rally the students rushed into Nassau street, blocked traffic and pushing parked cars into the middle of the roadway, wrecked a theatre ticket booth, rocked buses, turned on fire hydrants and ended by pulling the statue of "The Christian Student" from its pedestal and dragging it through the street.

## STORM WARNING

## RACKETEER IS SLAIN IN BED AT NEWARK

### Four Men Arrested As Murderers of Dominick Paselli Last Night

Newark, N. J., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Four men were arrested today as police pursued the murderers of Dominick Paselli slain last night in a hospital bed where he had sought to hide from his enemies.

Two of them, police believed, might be the pair who walked quickly past the information desk went directly to the obscure room where Paselli was a patient, and killed him instantly with three shots.

The four prisoners were Ralph Russo, pugilist, Harold Corbett and Ernest Klumja, each 25 and of Newark, and Tony Bove, 39, of New York's bowery. They were held on open charges.

Paselli, known in the underworld as "the ape," was called by police a "finger man" in holdups—the advance agent who went ahead of gunmen and spotted their prey. He also had a reputation as a small time beer runner, hijacker and "muscle man."

Newark, N. J., Nov. 4.—(AP)—A racketeer who sought sanctuary in the private room of the Newark General Hospital was tracked down by two gunmen last night and killed in his bed.

Walking by the information desk without a word, the slayers went directly to the room occupied by John Paselli, known in the underworld as "the ape," and fired three shots, killing him instantly. They then walked out in the confusion and escaped in an automobile.

Paselli, who had been listed at the hospital as Joseph Garuso, walked into the institution Sunday with a slight scalp wound and bruises. Hospital attaches said he told them he had fallen from an automobile. His injuries were dressed, but he insisted on staying in the institution and asked for a private room.

Police said they believed his injuries were received in jumping from a moving automobile when he realized he was being taken for a ride and that his killers, balked in their first attempt, trailed him to the hospital. The police attributed the killing to New York gangsters, saying Paselli had been attempting to cut in on the New York grape racket by which gangsters levy a tribute on the shipments of grapes.

Doctors and nurses at the hospital were taken to police headquarters to view roguish gallery pictures in an attempt to identify the slayers.

## Storm Heading For Eastern Carolina

Baltimore, Nov. 4.—(AP)—A heavy Northeast storm swept over the eastern shore of Maryland today, and after lashing the ocean front and farm lands for miles inland, brought a driving rain in its wake.

Shipping in the lower Chesapeake Bay felt the full force of the blast, which followed porting of storm warnings from the Carolinas north to Provincetown. Increasing winds reaching gale force were forecast for tonight by the Weather Bureau, with the storm centering over Eastern North Carolina.

Though fish traps at Ocean City, where the beach was pounded by heavy seas, and other points along the coast were damaged the eastward and Bay shipping was hampered but not placed in danger by the gale.
