

DEMOCRATS SWEEP N. C.

Roosevelt Victorious
In State Of New York;
Heflin Meets Defeat

James Hamilton Lewis Leading Mrs. Ruth McCormick by 70,000 Plurality In Illinois; LaFollette Wins By Landslide in Wisconsin; Norris Leading by Four to One in Nebraska; Morrow Ahead in New Jersey

New York, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democrat, was elected governor of New York today by a margin which threatens to rival the record Democratic plurality of state history—Alfred E. Smith's 385,000 edge over Nathan L. Miller for governor in 1922.

Charles H. Tuttle, Roosevelt's Republican opponent, who campaigned on the issue of alleged Tammany corruption and charged the governor with failing to act against it, conceded tonight, less than three hours after the polls had closed, that Mr. Roosevelt would return to the capitol at Albany for another two-year term.

In the Democratic landslide, to which up-state communities traditionally Republican, contributed in numbers, several Republican members of Congress were jeopardized—notably in the silk-stocking nineteenth district of Manhattan, where Mrs. Ruth Pratt, member of the House of Representatives since 1922, was falling steadily behind Magistrate Louis Brodsky, Democratic nominee.

In this district Heywood Brown, newspaper columnist and Socialist nominee for the National House, made the race triangular, but he acknowledged defeat at an early hour.

Governor Roosevelt's plurality over Tuttle when two-thirds of the state had reported was 370,000. That this would likely be diminished by returns from rural up-state districts was deemed likely.

Montgomery, Ala., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Senator J. Thomas Heflin, seeking re-election on a Jeffersonian ticket, tonight fell far behind John H. Bankhead, Democratic nominee, as a third of the ballot boxes were counted.

Tabulation of 790 of the state's 2,115 boxes gave Bankhead 52,722; Heflin 27,830.

Rockford, Ill., Nov. 4.—(AP)—The Rockford Morning Star, controlled by Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick, on the basis of returns available at 9:10 p. m., conceded the election of James Hamilton Lewis, her Democratic opponent for United States Senator from Illinois.

In Chicago alone, the Democratic Senator "whip" of the Senate during the Wilson administration, had gathered to himself a lead of 66,000 votes and in the 171 down-state precincts tallied at that time he was 4,000 votes ahead.

In its first election edition, the Chicago Tribune, published by the brother of Mrs. McCormick's late husband, carried the streamer: "Lewis Sweeps to Victory," and described the result as a Democratic landslide in Cook county with Col. Lewis leading also down-state and capturing some old Republican strongholds there.

The tabulation of Illinois votes for U. S. Senator at 7:45 p. m., gave Lewis 126,495; McCormick 53,262 and Mrs. Lottie Holman O'Neill, Independent dry, 4,685. Included in these were 97,478 for Lewis and 31,693 for McCormick in Cook county.

William L. O'Donnell, campaign manager for Lewis, claimed the victory in a formal statement issued at 8 p. m. No word had come at that time from Mrs. McCormick.

Montpelier, Vt., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Republican Vermont voted early today and elected all major candidates of the Republican party by the usual sweeping majority except in the first congressional district, where the Republican candidate won by a decreased margin.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Wisconsin set another LaFollette landslide in motion tonight. Early returns showed LaFollette, Republican nominee for governor, ahead

New Bern, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Watchers at the second ward polling place where Senator F. M. Simmons, Democratic incumbent defeated in the June primary by Josiah W. Bailey, cast his vote said he voted the straight Democratic ticket—from senator to constable—today.

The senator, the watchers said, displayed his tickets before folding them and dropping them into the ballot boxes.

Senator Simmons will retire in March after three decades of service in the Senate.

CLEARS BLOCK
IN THIS CITYFloors Of All Nine
Warehouses Completely
Cleared During Sales Yesterday.

The Greenville tobacco market sold approximately 1,300,000 pounds of tobacco yesterday, and was able to start out with a clean slate this morning.

Cwing to the fact that figures of the sales had not been compiled late yesterday afternoon, it was impossible to give the exact number of pounds and the amount paid out by the market during the day's activities.

Although the market was blocked with one of the largest offerings of the season Monday, the floors of all nine warehouses were cleared yesterday afternoon and sales got away to a new start this morning under much more favorable conditions.

The market averaged over seventeen dollars per hundred pounds on approximately a million, four hundred thousand pounds Monday. A considerable amount of good tobacco was in evidence and bidding was active. Good grades, it was stated, continued to command the attention of the buyers yesterday and bidding was spirited.

With completion of sales yesterday afternoon the seasons' total passed the forty million pound mark. This was about five million pounds ahead of the same period last season. It was believed the late season here would be in operation to near the ninety million pounds mark.

Calls On Ex-Service
Men To Aid In Cam-
paign For Members.

An appeal for all world war veterans to aid the local post of the American Legion to win a special membership citation during American Legion Week which closes on November 11, was issued today by J. S. Elliott, post commander here.

The citation is known as "Special Citation for Most Distinguished Service" and is awarded by the Legion National Headquarters.

"The week beginning November 4 and ending on Armistice Day has been set aside as American Legion Week for Legion posts throughout the country to make an intensive drive for 1931 members," Commander Elliott said. "Every post that attains a 100 per cent membership by November 11 will be given national recognition in the form of a special citation from the national headquarters. It will be a high honor to receive one of these citations and our post is bending every effort toward that objective."

"Every 1930 member can help us win a citation by paying his 1931 dues as promptly as possible and on or before Armistice Day. The eligible veteran who was not a member this year can likewise help by joining up now for the coming year. There is no reason why we cannot enroll the equivalent of our 1930 membership by the date set and thus place our post in the up-and-going class. To win this citation, however, we will need the cooperation of all who were enrolled for 1930, as well as all other veterans who are eligible for membership. Don't wait for the post adjutant to send you a bill for due but hunt him up and get on the honor roll."

It is pointed out by national headquarters, he said, that an early membership is essential to the success of the Legion program in the coming year. The fact that the Legion began its work in 1930 with more than half of its membership quota on the books at national headquarters on January 1, is believed to be responsible for the unusual success of the Legion program for 1930. With an early enrollment the Legion can begin work on its various activities without having to delay the year's program by concentrating extended time, attention and effort on membership.

J. W. Bailey Elected
To The U. S. Senate By
A Majority Of 100,000Disorders Reported
Around Boone, N. C.

Boone, N. C., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Six inches of snow this morning failed to cool off the heat of the election campaign and disorders were reported at several points in the county.

L. H. Holter, Republican candidate for sheriff, received flesh wounds when he is alleged to have resented the way the ballot boxes were placed in the 4th precinct here under the terms of the new election law. He is said to have been attacked by several men. The trouble was soon quieted and voting resumed.

Nila Byers, Republican judge of elections in Lowell Creek precinct, was arrested on a charge of interfering with the election. His arrest grew out of an argument over the correct arrangement of voting boxes under the new Australian ballot law.

Other disorders in several precincts were precipitated by election officials ordering persons at the polls to "stand back" from the election when not voting.

Charlotte, Nov. 4.—(AP)—An early lead taken by Democratic candidates for the Senate and House swelled to impressive proportions early today as unofficial returns from the general election were tabulated here.

With more than half of the states 1,811 precincts accounted for, including all of the larger boxes, J. W. Bailey, Raleigh attorney who defeated Senator F. M. Simmons in the primary, had what appeared to be a safe majority over George M. Pritchard, Asheville Republican, for the United States Senate.

Democratic nominees for Congress were leading in all districts. Representative Warren, in the First District, had no opposition, and Democrats appeared to have commanding margins in the Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth Sixth and Seventh Districts, they were leading in the Eighth, Ninth, and then Tenth, the last two of which were won by the Republicans two years ago.

While but scant returns were received from the state contests, the reports available indicated the Democratic trend toward victory was maintained throughout the ticket, with only a few counties near from the early returns were unfavorable to the three proposed amendments to the constitution.

Unofficial returns from 977 precincts gave Bailey 193,747 against 95,492 for Pritchard, a majority of 98,000 votes. Pritchard, however, refused to concede the election of Bailey.

In the Ninth District, Major A. Lee Bulwinkle had 33,355 votes to 25,807 for Representative Charles A. Jones, who defeated him two years ago in the Hoover landslide. Returns had been compiled from 177 precincts out of 248, and all counties in the district were represented except Yancy. Both Republicans and Democrats claimed Yancy but admitted the majority would be small.

With 92 precincts accounted for in the Tenth District, which has 348, Zebulon V. Weaver, Democrat who was ousted two years ago by Pritchard was leading his Republican opponent, Brownlow Jackson, 25,176 to 15,758. Graham, Henderson, Macon and Swain counties had not been heard from when the tabulation was made.

Representative R. L. Doughton, in the Eighth, had a majority of nearly 100,000 over E. F. Wakefield, with Alexander, Ashe, and Watauga counties unreported.

The vote, from 89 of 162 precincts was: Doughton 26,191; Wakefield 14,346.

Interest in the senatorial and House contests overshadowed other contests to such an extent that reports on the balloting for state offices and on the proposed amendments were virtually ignored by county sources.

Nathan O'Berry, of Goldsboro, state treasurer, had 18,193 votes against 7,129 for I. G. Greer, his Republican opponent.

George F. Bell and Stanley Winborne, Democrat, were leading T. J. Prevette and B. C. Campbell, Republicans, by about four to one for membership on the Corporation Commission, with about 10,000 votes tabulated.

Raleigh, Nov. 4.—(AP)—J. W. Bailey, Democratic nominee to the United States Senate, issued the following statement, last night: "The returns indicate an unprecedented majority for the Democratic ticket throughout the State. The party is united and triumphant. News from other states is equally gratifying."

"We will now press on to national victory in 1932. I am deeply grateful for the great vote I have received."

If the journey saps the Bulldogs' power they may be easy the following Saturday for Tulane.

The other side of the picture projects the figure of a harder Bulldog that will come back from New York with enough energy left to eliminate Tulane, but will be worn out by the time of the Thanksgiving Day meeting with Alabama. Both of those interesting theories are fraught with "ifs" and a glance into the record book shows that while Georgia's tie with Florida cast a stigma on both teams neither has been whipped inside the conference and each still has a chance for the championship rating. A few more ties and a stray upset would do the job nicely.

As the situation stands today most experts give the edge to Alabama on the basis of the high calling of opponents who were included in its six straight conquests. Scarcely a shade behind is Tulane, beaten by Northwestern on the Big Ten, but unconquered in five other engagements which encompassed a Grant Field triumph over Georgia Tech.

Florida gets another chance to do the unexpected this Saturday when it entertains Alabama in opening a new stadium at Gainesville, Fla. Some of the 'Gators partisans are arguing vigorously that Alabama is due for a let down after vanquishing Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Kentucky on successive Saturdays.

The Salvation Army

Salvation
Finance of The Salvation Army is an important subject and one without which you will readily realize no department of the Army could operate. From the first days of Salvation Army activity, when contributions were few and the work, comparatively speaking, undeveloped, the founder recognized the necessity for, and importance of, keeping reliable accounts. As the work spread from country to country and new enterprises embarked upon, the principle was, and is still, strictly enforced. All monies received at the various headquarters (Territorial and Divisional) are at once acknowledged, and receipts issued for every amount paid in, all such transactions being recorded by competent, trustworthy accountants in accordance with a complete and highly approved system.

The Salvation Army has thought out its financial system with the same care and thoroughness which it has devoted to every other part of its work. The magnitude of Salvation Army operations naturally necessitate a tremendous expenditure of money. These expenditures have necessitated the evolution of a financial system commensurate to the rapid growth of the organization. In this our leaders have risen to the occasion and the Salvation Army system of accountability has gained the confidence and commendation of business men, bankers, and financial experts all over the world.

The Army has two Central Funds to each country, one for the support of its Evangelistic work, and one for its Social Service Work. It is regrettable that a considerable body of people around the misapprehension that the Army is not in need. Money is always urgently needed, because the work is always extending; and, it is of (to) impossible to embrace fresh and important opportunities for service through lack of funds. This is especially the case with regard to the Social Service and Missionary Work. The Army has no reserves for this work and no endowments.

Army accounts are, without exception, subject to a rigid periodical examination by officers duly appointed for the purpose. The Central Fund accounts are audited by public auditors and local funds by traveling auditors. All monies collected are strictly applied to the purpose for which the are contributed in accordance with the explicit regulations of the Army. Balance sheets of each Central Fund are published annually, and have been every year since the inception of the work. Copies of the current issues can be had free on application from the several headquarters.

Then again each corps or unit has its own Corps Funds supported by the contributions of the Soldiers composing the corps, by collections, and principally, by its annual home service appeal (or in some cities by the Community Chest). This fund is for the maintenance of local work both Evangelical and Social Service.

The Salvation Army has been given the reputation of being able to make a dollar go farther than anyone else, and I would add, that they put that dollar to better use. It is a well known fact that the Salvation Army can maintain a post with all of its various religious and charitable activities at much less expense and with more satisfactory results than most organizations with not half of its responsibility. Its salaries of officers are very small, in comparison with others; a Salvation Army Officer is not guaranteed full salary and draws none until current bills are paid. Some people wonder how the Salvation Army, under such conditions, gets and keeps its officers, the most of which are educated and trained workers. It is because these men and women are devoted to God and the Service of Humanity. They have given up personal ambitions for service to others.

All money collected by the Army is administered by responsible officials, the accounts being balanced up each week. The finance connected with each section of the Army work is regulated by means of an annual budget showing beforehand estimated expenditure and proposed means of raising the needed money. Afterwards the actuals are carefully compared, month by month, with the estimated figures. Thus does The Salvation Army apply modern and businesslike methods to every aspect of its finance, the smallest detail receiving close attention.

Roosevelt Victorious In State of New York; Heflin Meets Defeat

by nearly 8 to 1. The figures in 115 of the 288 precincts gave LaFollette 8438 and Charles Hammett 1714. If this ratio is maintained LaFollette should win by more than 200,000 votes.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Senator George W. Norris, Republican, got off to a four to one lead over his Democratic opponent, Gilbert Hitchcock, on early returns from Nebraska's senatorial contest.

Newark, N. J., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Dwight W. Morrow, Republican nominee for both the short and the long terms in the U. S. Senate from New Jersey, stepped into an immediate lead tonight in a vote count made by a cumbersome ballot.

The handful of districts to report have Morrow a better than 2 to 1 lead.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Virginia Democrats failed in an effort to unseat one Republican congressman, defeated another by a huge majority and were leading in the remaining districts now represented by a Republican, on the basis of unofficial returns.

Congressman Menclius Lankford's victory in the second district was conceded by his Democratic opponent Joseph T. Deal, when practically complete returns gave Lankford a majority of over 2,500 votes.

In the seventh, John W. Fishburne, Democrat, had a lead of 3,543 votes over Congressman Jacob A. Garber, Republican in the vote in 155 of the districts 168 precincts being Fishburne 12,105 and Garber 9,181.

In the ninth district, John W. Flanagan, Democrat, was leading Congressman Joseph C. Shaffer, Republican, 9,291 to 7,341 with 64 of 260 precincts reported.

The three congressional races overshadowed completely the contest for the U. S. Senate in which Senator Carter Glass, veteran Democrat, overhauled J. Cloyd Byars, Independent, and Joseph Morgan, Socialist. Democratic nominees in other congressional districts won easily.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Nov. 4.—(AP)—In the Oklahoma state, swinging back to Democratic after a recession since 1928 election, was carrying W. H. Alfalfa Bill Murray toward the governor's chair tonight by a lead of more than two to one over his Republican opponent, Ira A. Hill.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 4.—(AP)—The Democratic State ticket, headed by Richard B. Russell, Jr., for governor and United States Senator W. J. Harris were elected in Georgia today without opposition.

All of the Georgia Democratic candidates for Congress were also elected, ten with opposition.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 4.—(AP)—On the basis of unofficial and incomplete returns, it appeared at 11:15 o'clock tonight that Dr. Wilbur L. Cross, dean emeritus of Yale University graduate school, had been elected Governor of Connecticut, the first Democrat to be elected to the State House since 1910.

Kills Two Men In Preference To Taking Drink

Chicago, Nov. 4.—(AP)—A confessor that he killed two men in a fight to resist their efforts to make him drink a glass of liquor was made today, police said, by Edward Kotowski, 21. He surrendered, claiming self defense.

Kotowski, according to Police Lieutenant James Burke, said he shot to death Frank Smurlo and William Sierza in Sierza's beer flat last Sunday, after the two men had carried him up the stairs and attempted to force him to take a drink. Previously, while passing the place, Sierza invited him to drink, but he refused.

"Drink or we'll blow a hole in you," Kotowski quoted Smurlo as saying after the two men had pushed a glass of liquor toward him. As he spoke, Smurlo, Kotowski said, pointed a pistol which the young man wrested from his grasp and fired, killing him. Meanwhile, Sierza, Kotowski added, had started to fire with another weapon, but he too was fatally wounded.

Kotowski fled from the scene and remained at liberty until he walked into a police station accompanied by his father early today.

Meanwhile the police had been speculating with deaths, theorizing that a liquor or gambling war might have motivated them.

German Expert To Change Motors For Helium Gas and Crude Oil Motors.

Berlin, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener surprised the annual dinner of the American Chamber of Commerce tonight by announcing that as a result of the recent disaster to the British dirigible R-101 he had changed the plans for the Zeppelins now under construction so as to provide for helium gas and crude oil motors.

Amid thunderous applause he said he had received word from America that helium gas, which is non-inflammable and non-explosive, would be available to inflate the airships in whatever quantities desired.

Dr. Eckener said that had it not been for an explosion the crash of the R-101 in France several weeks ago would have resulted in minimal damages. As it was the great airship burned to almost nothing and 48 British lives were lost.

Frederick M. Sackett, American ambassador to Germany, was another speaker at the dinner.
