CITY TO PUSH COLLECTION OF BACK TAXES

Delinquent Taxes Considered at Regular Monthly Session of Aldermen

The subject of delinquent taxes occupied the attention of the Board of Aldermen in regular monthly meeting at the city hall last night, and it was decided that action looking to collection would be taken immediately.

City Clerk J. R. Gaskins was instructed to write a letter to citizens who had not paid their taxes for the year 1929, explaining the law, and impressing the fact that the city would be forced to bring suit if payment is not made in the near future.

Mayor J. C. Lanier explained that the law as passed by the last Legislature made it mandatory for all cities and counties to bring suits against delinquent taxpayers, and that the city would be dealt with severely if it should fail to comply with the legislation. He said he would begin preliminary arrangements for collections and will file suit against those who failed to make payment after they had been notified by letter.

The meeting last night was one of the shortest of the year, lasting about two hours. One of the outstanding features of the session was the absence of visitors.

Alderman Waldrop reported that the bond for Clerk Gaskins had been obtained, bringing an end to a question which had been a source of discussion for the last three sessions of the board.

George Gardner, chief of the fire department, reported completion of a list of the fire alarm boxes of the city, and that all boxes responded but three. Mayor Lanier explained he had been informed that the fire whistle was worn out and could no longer be of service to the city. Alderman Boyd suggested that the Water & Light Commission be requested to provide adequate fire whistle service, and the board decided that this request should be made at once.

George Clark, superintendent of city streets, called attention of the board to the danger of a flag pole atop the city hall. He said the pole was leaning over toward the street, and threatened to fall. He was given permission to remove it.

Members of the fire department reported in good standing, were exempted from poll tax payment.

Alderman Waldrop presented a letter requesting curbing and gutter for Jarvis street, but it was filed away for future reference. It was explained that the city had no money available for such work at the present, but would give attention to programs of this nature as soon as possible.

Michigan Girl Dies After a Long Siege of Hiccoughs

MT. CLEMENS, Mich., Nov. 7.—(AP)—The best minds of the medical profession and the volunteer aid of hundreds of persons who offered some remedies failed to save Virginia Mae Coppins, 19-year-old high school girl, who is dead here of the hiccoughs after more than a year of suffering from the malady.

In September, 1929, she was seized with her first attack while in a Detroit hospital for an operation. The malady apparently was checked after 53 days of almost constant hiccoughing. During one of her attacks in succeeding months she was visited by thousands of physicians who were in Detroit to attend the national convention of the American Medical Association. Her case was studied by no less than 5,000 medical men.

Four weeks ago an attack began which lasted two weeks, and the attack which brought death yesterday began a week ago. During her final fight against the baffling malady her temperature reached 107, with a pulse of 140 and respiration of 40.

The hiccoughing was caused by a spasmodic contraction of the diaphragm brought about through the peculiar reaction of a nerve. Physicians believed that an operation might bring relief but did not perform one because of the girl's generally delicate health and a weak heart which induced inflammation of the brain.

During the girl's illness her parents received hundreds of telegrams and letters from persons who offered "cures" ranging from sudden fright to liberal dosage of snuff, salt, sugar and raw clay. One man came in a taxicab from Cleveland to her home in East Detroit with a patent medicine he was certain would cure her.

LEGION READY FOR COMING OF ARMISTICE DAY

Former Service Men Invited to Take Part in Exercises Here on Next Tuesday

Members of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion today were completing plans for the celebration of Armistice Day here next Tuesday. The Legionnaires have extended an invitation to all service men of the country to attend the celebration and in that way aid in making the occasion one of the most important since the ending of the war.

The program for the day is a varied one and contains something of interest for everybody. The principal address will be delivered by Hon. J. C. B. Ewing, of Elizabeth City, one of the most gifted orators in this section of the State. The address will come as a climax to exercises in the campus building of the East Carolina Teachers' College.

Other features of the day will include a parade in which former service men, Boy Scouts, High School band, military unit, members of the Legion and auxiliary will take part, and there will be a special motion picture program both afternoon and night at each of the local theatres.

Immediately after the exercises in the college, the Legionnaires and veterans of other wars will retreat to the annual barbecue dinner.

Owing to the fact that this week has been designated American Legion week throughout the nation, members of the local post are putting forth extra efforts for enlarging the membership of their organization. An intensive drive for new members is under way and apparently was meeting with good results today.

J. C. Elliott, commander of the Pitt County Post, said today he wished to impress the fact that all former service men are cordially invited to take part in the Armistice Day exercises Tuesday. He said he hoped every man in the county who took part in the great World War would visit the city on that date and do his part in observing the signing of the armistice over twelve years ago.

Urges Methodists to Stand by the Church

Greensboro, Nov. 7.—(AP)—If some members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, are "under fire" it is the plea of Bishop Edwin D. Morrison, of Charlotte, that their church brethren "stand by each other more than ever and stand by the church."

Bishop Morrison, speaking before the annual session of the Western North Carolina Conference, yesterday declared that "if there has been any division in politics, we should forget all about it, and if any have strayed from the fold they are invited to return."

Methodism is under fire because we are thoroughly alive," Bishop Morrison said, "and it is because we stand for something. You never saw anyone kick a dead dog. Let us determine this year to make this great church of ours a big brotherhood. Let's love our own people. If some of us are under fire, let's stand by each other more than ever and let's stand by the church."

The bishop did not name any members of his denomination as being "under fire."

Hoover Asks Nation To Observe Thanksgiving By Extending Help To Poor

In Annual Thanksgiving Proclamation, President Requests Aid for Those in Need and Suffering From Causes Over Which They Have No Control

Washington, Nov. 7.—(AP)—President Hoover today called upon the people of the United States to observe Thanksgiving Day by extending aid to those who are in need and suffering from causes beyond their control.

In his annual Thanksgiving Day proclamation, the Chief Executive said this country has many causes for Thanksgiving. He added that as a nation "We have suffered far less than other peoples form the present world difficulties."

His proclamation follows:

"By the President of the United States, a proclamation: 'Notwithstanding that our forefathers endured the hardships and privations of a primitive life, surrounded by dangers and solaced only with meagre comforts, they nevertheless bequeathed us a custom of devoting one day of every year to universal Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the blessing of life itself and the means to sustain it, for the sanctity of home and the joys that pervaded it, and for the mercies of His protection from accident, sickness, or death.'

"Our country has many causes for Thanksgiving. We have been blessed with distinctive evidence of Divine favor. As a nation we have suffered far less than other peoples from the present world difficulties. We have been free from civil and industrial discord. The outlook for peace between nations has been strengthened. In a large way we have made progress upon the enduring structure of our institutions. The arts and sciences that enrich our lives and enlarge our control of nature have made notable advances. Education has been further extended. We have made gains in the prevention of disease and in the protection of childhood.

"Now, therefore, I, Herbert Hoover, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday November 27, 1930, as a national day of Thanksgiving, and do enjoin the people of the United States to observe it, calling upon them to remember that many of our people are in need and suffering from causes beyond their control, and suggesting that a proper celebration of the day should include that we made sure that every person in the community, young and old, shall have cause to give thanks for our institutions and for the neighborly sentiments of our people.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the seal of the United States.

"Done at the City of Washington, this sixth day of November, in the year of our Lord 1930, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the 55th.

Kiwanians Down to Business at Raleigh Meeting

Raleigh, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Kiwanians of the Carolinas waded into business here today in fast fashion at the first formal session of their annual meeting.

More than 150 Kiwanians from out of town had registered today.

Kiwanis, according to District Governor Allison W. Honeycutt of Hendersonville, who made his annual report today, is needed in times like these "for business and economic stabilization."

"In times like these, Mr. Allison continued, 'we need the fighting optimism of club membership, the fighting, indomitable spirit of Kiwanis.'

The convention was welcomed to Raleigh by Mayor E. E. Culbreth and Attorney General Dennis G. Brummitt.

In his report, delivered immediately after the welcoming exercises, Governor Honeycutt stressed work in student loan funds and work for underprivileged children. The lieutenant governors also made their district reports today, most of them reporting that membership was holding its own in the face of the stringency of the times. Some had membership gains.

Brookhart Will Aid Democrats In The Senate

Washington, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, said today he would support the Democratic organization of the new Senate if that party would sponsor a legislative program which he considered satisfactory.

He said if the election just held was to amount to anything the Democrats and Progressives should demand the resignation of Secretary Mellon and of Ogden Mills, under secretary of the treasury.

"If the Democratic victories do not mean 'two-deeds-for-one' Brookhart said, 'I for one will not let organization of the Senate stand in their way and will gladly give them the organization to get results.'

"I will not do this as a political move but will gladly do it to correct the evils of Mellonism which have brought us to our present conditions."

History Repeats Itself At Alabama Polls This Week

Montgomery, Ala., Nov. 7.—(AP)—Alabama has put two Bankheads in Congress.

In defeating J. Thomas Hefflin in Tuesday's election, John H. Bankhead gained the seat which Hefflin won upon the death of Bankhead's father.

History repeated itself for years ago a brother, William Bankhead, defeated the father's successor in the House and served there while his father was enjoying an advancement to the Senate.

Tuesday William was elected for an eighth term as a Representative.

\$55,000 TAKEN IN HOLDUP OF PACIFIC TRAIN

Consignment of Money for San Francisco Banks Falls in Hands of Bandits

Oakland, Calif., Nov. 7.—(AP)—An eastbound Southern Pacific passenger train was held up at 7:30 a. m., today near Nobel and, according to reports received here, robbed of \$40,000 to \$55,000 in cash consigned by the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco to the American Trust Company in Pittsburgh, Cal.

The money was to be used by the Columbia Steel Works at Pittsburgh for its payroll today.

Southern Pacific officials in San Francisco received a report the robbers took \$15,000 in registered mail but that the Columbia Steel Works payroll was untouched.

This angle was being checked. One of the five bandits boarded the train between Berkeley and Nobel and held up the engineer and fireman, forcing them to stop the train at Nobel, which is not a regular stop, the station agent at Stege reported. At Nobel, a sedan was waiting with other members of the gang.

No one was hurt and so far as could be learned no passengers were molested.

The steel company pays in checks but the checks were based on the cash which was expected to arrive at the bank today.

The workers were lined up ready to receive their checks when the company learned of the hold-up. Payment of employees was delayed.

E. E. Lemery was the engineer of the train and S. E. O'Brien the fireman. The baggage man, also held up, was John McClintock.

The same train, Southern Pacific No. 33, was held up on June 22, 1929, by a gang allegedly led by Jake Flegle, notorious outlaw, slain by officers recently at Brandon, Mo. A Southern Pacific payroll of \$18,000 in cash consigned to a town in the San Joaquin Valley was taken.

TWO NEGROES EXECUTED AT CAPITAL CITY

Will Sloan and Willie Massey, Confessed Slayers, Were Put to Death This Morning

Raleigh, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Will Sloan and Willie Massey, negroes, confessed double slayers, were electrocuted at state's prison here today.

Massey, who was convicted of killing his sister and her husband in Durham county, was the first of the two to die. Massey admitted killing the two but claimed it was in self-defense. He owed his sister \$10,000 and the double slaying followed a quarrel about payment of the sum.

Sloan, who died for the killing of Phoebe Gillis, aged Person county negro, was also the confessed slayer of rs. Elsa Marshall, white woman of Westchester county, N. Y.

Sloan admitted his guilt of the Person county crime several weeks after confessing that he "accidentally" killed Mrs. Marshall. Today, just before he went to the chair, Sloan admitted criminally attacking Mrs. Marshall and then murdering her. The crime was described by Westchester officers who came here two months ago to take Sloan's confession as one of the most brutal murders in their county in years.

Sloan's home, he said was in Columbia, S. C. He was tried and acquitted there 10 years ago on a charge of murder. He was suspected of the murder of Rev. E. Frank Lee of Durham early this year and was believed to have been implicated in the killing of a Washington, D. C. policeman sometime ago. He had received sentences in South Carolina and New York.

Democratic Prospects For Control Of House Virtually Destroyed

Russian Soviet's Stage Great Demonstration In Celebration October Day

Thousands of Communists Parade In Moscow, Bearing Red Flags With Soviet's Success and Words Boosting the Execrations Against Capitalism

Moscow, Nov. 7.—(AP)—One of the greatest processions of Soviet history marched past Communist and government leaders in Red Square this afternoon in a parade celebrating the thirtieth anniversary of October Day, the date on which proletarian uprising had its beginning.

The parade began early this morning with infantry leading. Following them were tanks, artillery, cavalry and numerous military bands. Citizens marched past by the thousands carrying red banners on which were inscribed words of boasts of Communist successes and execrations of capitalism.

The reviewers, led by Joseph Stalin, secretary general of the Communist party, which is the real ruler of Russia, Michael Kalinin, president of the central executive committee, Rykov, who is premier and head of the Soviet cabinet, and other important figures such as Gadjiev, Rudzutak, Molotov, Kaganovich, and Kuibishev stood at the corner of Lenin's new tomb during the inspection.

They wore no top hats, tail coats, or other evidences of the bourgeoisie, but were dressed simply, most of them in soft shirts or blouses, and lounge suits, or in military uniforms.

Meanwhile the innumerable bands played the Internationale and other Communist music. Airplanes soared above in formation, while on the streets about the square police had to fight with the enthusiastic mobs which fought to break the restraining cordons. M. Voroshilov, commissar of war, made the only speech to the troops.

Some of the inscriptions on the enormous flaming-red placards and symbolic wooden floats manipulated by the marchers, men, women, and children were:

"Hurrah for the thirtieth anniversary of the revolution."

"Three cheers for the approaching world revolution."

"Down with capitalism, up with Socialism."

"Capitalists of all countries are preparing an armed intervention. Workers of the world, protect the Fatherland of all proletarians."

"We will complete the five-year industrialization plan in four years. All energy to the construction of new industrial plants of the new state and the collective farms."

"We will destroy the Kulaks (rich peasants) and exterminate them as a class."

"Shame to those who desert."

"Down with counter-revolutionists of all types."

"Cheers for the Communist party and its central committee."

"Down with the Right and Left wing position."

Seize Gangland Records In Raid At Chicago, Ill.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Raids early today on his loop hotel quarters and north side apartment failed to trap elusive Terry Druggan, reputed beer baron, but yielded a mass of records and armament.

The raids followed issuance of capias by Judge Lyle, re-elected for "public enemies," who forfeited Druggan's bond of \$10,000 on a vagrancy charge.

Druggan had obtained several continuances of his court appearance on ground that he was suffering from numerous physical ailments.

Correspondence seized by the raiders included a carefully worded letter which the officers said intimated an attempt on the life of Al Capone, gangland dictator, was contemplated.

"The letter said the writer would do anything with reference to Capone which Druggan wanted," Judge Lyle said, "and it was couched in terms which led us to believe that Druggan has been planning his (Capone's) assassination."

All papers were to be examined at leisure by Roche.

UNIVERSITY WILL BATTLE STATE TODAY

Charlotte, Nov. 7.—(AP)—North Carolina and N. C. State went forth today to do battle in their annual football game at Chapel Hill while Duke, surprise package of the 1950 season, waited until tomorrow before putting its five-game winning streak at stake against Kentucky.

The biggest of the "Big Five" have arranged their schedules at the last minute so as to avoid conflict and the fan who likes his games fast and more often will be able to see both major state contests this week-end.

The other two members of the select quintet, Wake Forest and Davidson, will deploy against two South Carolina teams tomorrow, the Demon Deacons visiting Asheville to meet Presbyterian College and the Wildcats being at home to Wofford.

Not content with playing once a week, Appalachian State has checked out today for Newport News, Va., to play Naval Apprentice School tonight. Tomorrow the big, husky team from Boone will move over to Virginia Beach to play Atlantic University. The same men, unless they are injured, will play in each game and what's more Appalachian expect to win two games this week-end.

The Guilford Lenoir-Rhyme clash at Hickory and the Catawba-Bridgewater go at Salisbury tonight will open the intra-state engagements of "Little Seven" teams.

Duke is preparing for and hoping for the biggest crowd at the Kentucky game since Pittsburgh dedicated the Blue Devil stadium in 1929 with an exhibition of touchdowns-making that is still talked about in North Carolina. Approximately 23,000 persons saw that debacle.

Coach Harry Gamage has announced that "Shipwreck" Kelly, his most potent backfield threat, will not play in the game because of injuries. What's more, the Kentucky mentor said in Asheville yesterday that he expects to start only three regulars, all line-men.

On the other hand, Jimmy DeHart is making no secret of the fact that he covets a victory over the Wildcats and Duke's finest will

Levinisky Receives Decision at Chicago

Chicago, Nov. 7.—(AP)—King Levinisky, the former Maxwell Street fish peddler, wielder of the dramatic right hand, hasn't yet caught up with Jimmy Slattery, former light-heavyweight champion, but he has a 10-round decision over the Buffalo boxing maverick, Levinisky, whose blinding right hand accounted for knockouts over Lemsky, and Tom Kirby in his last two fights, received the decision of the referee, Norman Garrity, and one of the judges, Livingston Osborne, last night in the Chicago stadium, a decision that caused the loudest and longest demonstration of disapproval since boxing was revived in Illinois. 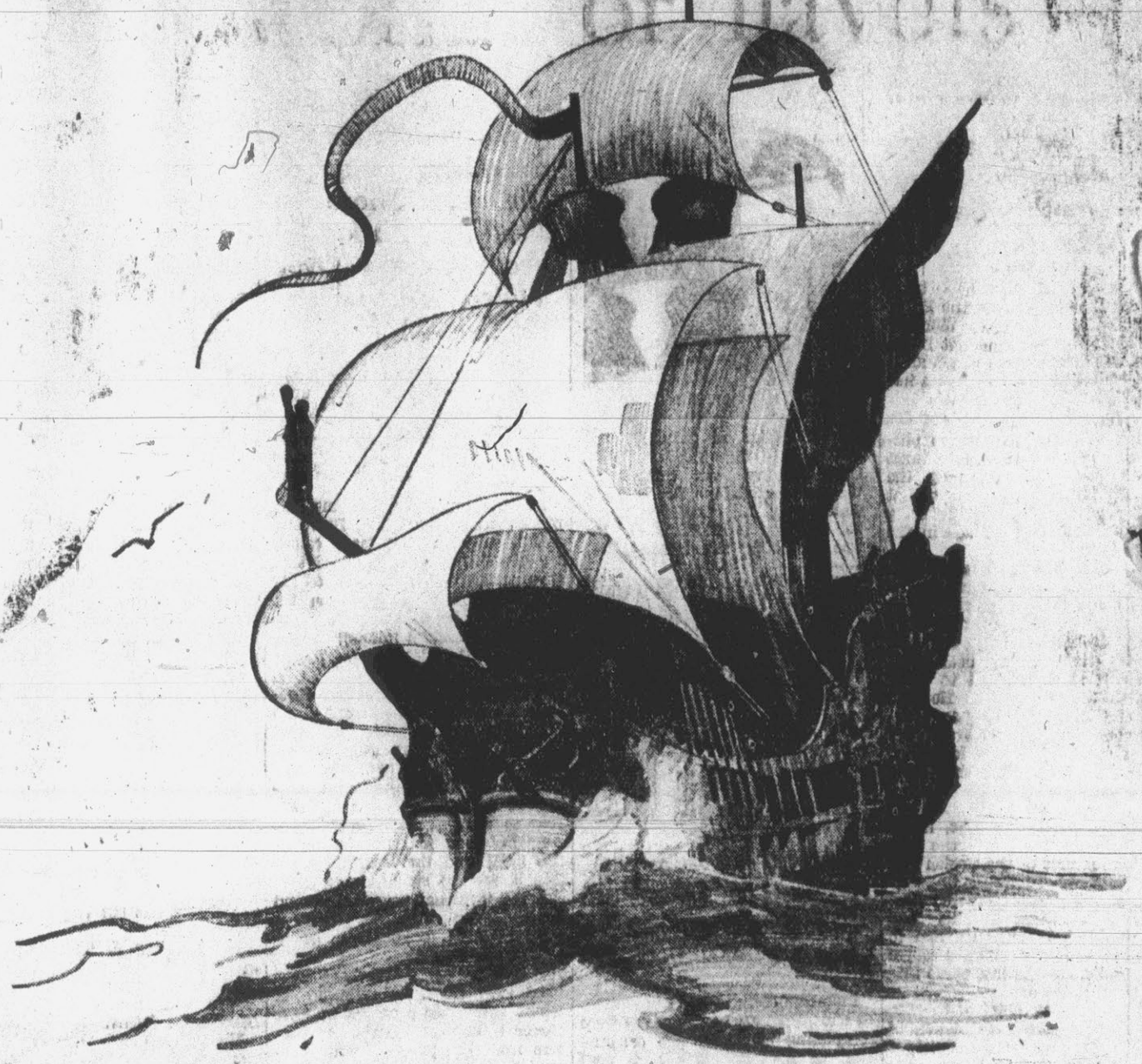

Greenville, Ga., Nov. 7.—(AP)—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt has something more than cheers and handclaps in store for him on his forthcoming visit to the country in which he waged the major portion of his successful fight to regain his health. The added tribute will be a robust Roosevelt for President.

W. E. Irwin, state legislator-elect, said last night that Roosevelt admirers expect to include every voter in Meriwether county in the formal organization of a Roosevelt for President club at the court house here within a week or so.

Warm Springs, which the New York executive has developed as a resort for other sufferers of infantile paralysis, is located only ten miles from Greenville in Meriwether county and regards Roosevelt as an adopted son.

Mr. Irwin said one membership list distributed for the club already contained 500 names and that another list at the office of the county ordinary had been signed by virtually every voter in Greenville.

The entire county has followed with keen interest the impressive Roosevelt triumph in his campaign for re-election. Wednesday at Warm Springs a joyous crowd of patients, many of whom have improved so much that they, like Mr. Roosevelt, can drive their own cars, held an automobile parade.

U. S. Commission To Study Liquor Conditions Abroad

Washington, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Moving on toward completion of a report on prohibition now the election is out of the way, the President's law enforcement commission today was engaged in a study of liquor conditions abroad.

Besides considering the mass of documentary data accumulated in past months, the commission yesterday began to study the Sweden liquor control. State Police Superintendent Levi G. Adams, of Pennsylvania, went in to tell the commission about conditions in his state. What was said was kept a secret, and so will the testimony of others who are to be heard.

Morehead's appearance and information that the Bratt system in Sweden was under discussion caused a flurry of excitement and speculation outside the commission rooms until it was learned the Canadian control systems and other plans of limited liquor dispensation also are to be studied.

More speculation connected the sudden recall of Prohibition Director Woodcock to the capital with the commission hearings, but there was no indication whether he would appear to tell the members what he has discovered in his extensive travels surveying prohibition enforcement over the country.

All that was given out about the director's abandonment of an inspection trip to Hawaii was that Attorney General Mitchell wanted from him some information for

President Hoover and also wished to discuss appropriations. Just what the President wished to learn could not be ascertained.

Woodcock will be in Washington by November 13 and the completion of a prohibition report by the commission before that date is extremely improbable.

Says Prohibition Will Be Issue In 1932 Elections

Cleveland, Nov. 7.—(AP)—The Cleveland News today quoted Senator Simon D. Fess, Republican national chairman, as predicting that prohibition will be a party issue in 1932 with the Democrats opposing the wet cause.

"I believe the Democratic party will come out for repeal of the 18th amendment," Fess recorded as saying.

He declared flatly that Republicans would not favor repeal, but when asked if they might adopt a modification platform, said:

"That I can't answer. The crime commission (the Wickersham commission on law enforcement) is now studying the situation and its report may affect the situation."

TEN MEN ARE ACQUITTED IN GA. LYNCHING

Entire Group of Persons Charged With Killing Negro At Walhalla Freed

Walhalla, S. C., Nov. 7.—(AP)—A jury filed into the courtroom here early today to announce it had acquitted ten men on trial for murder as a result of the lynching of Allen Green, negro, here last spring.

Seventeen originally went on trial but seven had been freed by a directed verdict. The entire group which included Walhalla's mayor, R. B. Ballentine, and night policeman, Alvin Jones, was also freed of charges of conspiracy to murder and assault with intent to kill.

Many of the county's citizens had waited up last night through attorneys' closing arguments, the judge's charge and the two-hour deliberation of the jury. Only Wednesday court had been adjourned because of what Judge M. M. Mann termed a "barbaric demonstration of outlaws" when spectators staged a demonstration.

Green, who was once publicly thanked for heroism during a fire here, had been placed in jail on a charge of criminal assault on a

white woman. In storming the jail the masked mob fractured Sheriff J. L. Thomas' skull.

Trial of the alleged members of the mob had been twice postponed before it opened Monday. Sheriff Thomas and his son testified they recognized two members of the mob and the state introduced other similar testimony.

However, the defense offered witnesses whose testimony provided alibis for most of the defendants, including Ballentine and Jones. These two have been indicted for breach of public duty.

Last month damages of \$2,000 were awarded Green's widow, to be paid by Oconee county for the lynching, under a state law.

Salvation Army

THE SOUTHERN TERRITORY

The "Southland" has been considered one of the most difficult fields in the world for the making of a working organization. This being so, it is significant that at the third annual staff council conducted by the commissioner, all around advancement was reported throughout the territory. The divisional commanders stated that their rolls had been cleaned, all losses made good, and substantial gains made. In little more than two years the fighting force has been increased two hundred per cent.

At the opening of the Territory a five year program was launched, in connection with this program it was decided that one hundred and fifty edifices should be erected. At the end of two and one-half years, one hundred and thirty-five buildings for halls, officers' quarters, young people's work, men and women's social institutions, and camp usage have been opened. At these centers the audiences have grown, the commissioner recently announcing an increase in attendance of 10,000 persons per annum for the territory.

The young people's work has made tremendous strides. The company meeting (Sunday school) attendances have grown by over 113,000 and more than 8,000 young people have knelt at the mercy-seat. During the past eighteen months the figures for the life saving organizations have increased by 384 per cent, and there are now 150 prospective units. The corps cadet brigades have added to their membership by two thousand during the past two and one-half years. The young people's attendance at the various camps is well up to 18,000, while the young people's meetings show an increased attendance of over 235,000 for the year.

We maintain that the child is one of the most important and difficult problems. Tomorrow he will take his place in society. How are we training him? Are we satisfied to send him to school, find a job for him and let it go at that? Are we satisfied to expose him to the problems of an age of development, without helping him to round out the various problems he runs into, or will we help him stay clear of prisons, that should be hospitals, with doctors as trustees, corrective institutions that should be specialized choirs with highly trained psychiatric social workers as guards? Should we prepare him for a battle with life, or should we let him start out blindly? Strikes, revolts, murders and all crimes are the outcome of unpreparedness. Community spirit, civic understanding and an intelligent idea of economics is the result of trained work with the youngsters. The Salvation Army is ready to do just that thru its various departments of young people's work.

Since the institution of this territory over 50,000 families have been helped with food, clothing and the other necessities of life, and nearly 200,000 transients have been assisted, not only in a material way, but they have all been told the story of God's love. The most of this work being done through the corps relief system.

Our social service is based upon casework application. We do not go blindly into the administration of assistance, nor do we assist a family without investigating the case. We do, however, in emergency cases administer temporary relief until a clearing of the case and a thorough investigation has been effected. It is not a pleasant thought, but facts tell us that there are an increasing number of unmarried mothers. We have hospitals and maternity homes open for these unfortunate cases. Our work just begins after the confinement. The work to bring father and mother together, to instill responsibility into the father, to form that important unit—the family. Sometimes a case like this is stretched over a long period of time, but the work must go on. A solution must be reached and in the southern territory the Salvation Army is waging a ceaseless struggle against social ailments, searching for the solution.

Subsidizing of Athletes Wanes

New York, Nov. 7.—(AP)—The recruiting and subsidizing of athletes, major evils in college sports pointed out by the famous bulletin "23" of the Carnegie Foundation a year ago, are on the wane, according to Dr. Howard J. Savage, principal author of the bulletin.

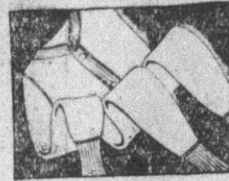
Although the Foundation claims no credit for the change that has taken place since the publication of that sensational sport survey on October 24, 1929, Dr. Savage said yesterday that a partial checkup of conditions of the colleges has shown that there is less recruiting and subsidizing than there was a year ago. He declined, however, to amplify the general statement or cite specific examples.

The Carnegie Foundation now is engaged in following up its original investigation and evaluating progress made, using letters to the presidents of the institutions and a few personal visits, made at the request of college officials, to get the information.

Replies are coming in from the presidents on questions which concerned the particular conditions mentioned in "bulletin 23."

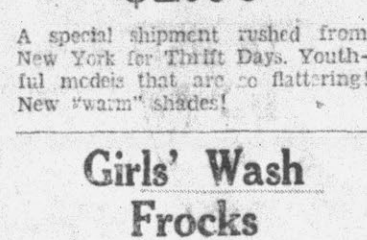

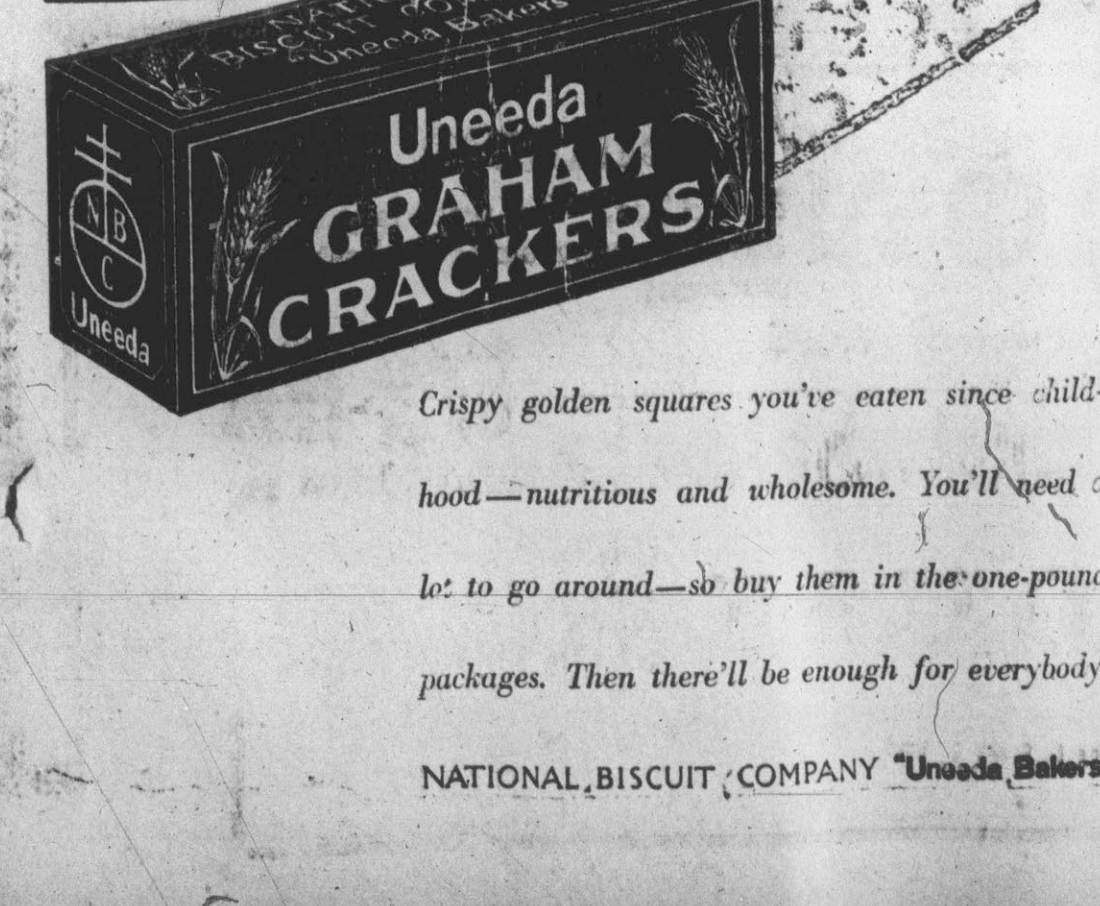

COTTON MARKET

New York, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 6 to 11 points in response to the earlier showing of Liverpool while there appeared to be some trade and Liverpool buying as well as covering accompanied by talk of an improved technical position.

New December sold up to 10.88 and May to 11.52, on the initial demand or about 7 to 11 points higher, but these prices seemed to meet a little Southern resistance further liquidation and the market lost 3 or 4 points of its gains by the end of the first half hour. Two more private crop reports were published, one of them placing the indicated crop at 14,159,000, while the other made it 14,148,000, but these figures were not generally mentioned in connection with the price movement.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 7.—(AP)—The stock market burrowed still further into new low price strata today, after yesterday's brief respite from selling pressure.

Rail shares broke sharply, several prominent issues recording the lowest levels in past few years, and weakness spread throughout the list. The pressure against the utility shares showed no sign of lifting, and the leading industrials, after resisting the trend for a time, dropped through their recent resistance points. Losses ranged from 2 to 7 points in the more active issues. The selling, however, was in only moderately large volume.

Bethlehem Steel, North American Union Pacific, Allied Chemical, Coca Cola, Canada Dry, and Norfolk & Western tumbled 5 to more than 7 points. Issues losing 3 to

more than 4 included Atchafalaya, American Can, Westinghouse Electric, American Water Works, Air Reduction, Johns Manville, New York Central and Procter & Gamble. Such issues as U. S. Steel, American Telephone, Consolidated Gas, Public Service of N. J., Pennsylvania Railroad and New Haven, all declined 2 point or more to the lowest levels of the bear market. The Standard Oil issues also sagged to new minimum prices.

The demand for call money was more active than for some time, and although the rate held at 2 per cent, there was virtually none available at lower levels in outside market, where funds were abundantly offered as low as 1 per cent a few days ago. Other monetary accommodations, however, were easy. The demand for commercial paper exceeded the supply, and a little short term paper moved as low as 2 1-2 per cent.

Unsettled in the rail shares may have been aggravated by announcement that bankers were working on a plan to avert receivership for Seaboard Air Line, although this is an isolated situation.

Orphanage Head Found Guilty of Embezzlement
