## FINAL PLANS ARRANGED FOR ARMISTICE DAY

### Business Houses Asked to Close During Parade and Exercises At College

Members of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion were putting final touches to plans today for the Armistice Day celebration to be staged in Greenville next Tuesday. Preparations provide for one of the greatest occasions of the kind in years and all former service men have been invited to take part.

Although there will not be a general suspension of business during the day, business houses have been asked to close during the exercises at the campus building at the college building in order to give employees an opportunity to hear the principal speech of the occasion. The speaker will be Hon. J. C. B. Ehringhaus, of Elizabeth City, who will pay tribute to the splendid sacrifices of the American doughboy on foreign battlefields.

The program for the day also provides for a colorful parade which will be participated in by members of the Legion and auxiliary, local military unit, Boy Scouts high school band, and school children. Immediately after the speaking the Legion and veterans of other wars will be treated to a barbecue dinner at the college.

The two theatres here have provided special picture programs for the afternoon and night. At the State the "Lottery Bride," one of the outstanding operatic productions of the year, will be exhibited. At the New Theatre, Manager Corbett has provided "Under Texas Moon," a two-gun romance of the cattle country.

Heretofore the Legion has requested business houses to close for the entire day, but this year they have been asked to close only during the parade and speaking, or from 10 to 1 o'clock. This will give employees, many of whom served during World War, an opportunity to attend the main features of the celebration.

Commander Elliott stated this morning that he hoped every ex-service man in the county would come to Greenville and participate in the activities. He said a cordial invitation was also extended to the public, and that they hoped to have the largest attendance in recent years.

## Florence Claims Crack Pistol Shot

Charlotte, Nov. 8.—(AP)—J. M. Aske, of the Florence, S. C., police department, today held the title as the best pistol shot among policemen in the Piedmont, Carolina.

Aske scored 94, 94, and 92 out of a possible 100 each time, in a field day contest here yesterday to take first place among the sharpshooters.

A team made up of the four best shots from North Carolinians by the score of 355 to 351.

First place in the contest for shooting teams representing cities at the meet went to Charlotte. Florence was second and Greenville, S. C., third.

## Increase Money for Missions

## Says Prohibition Slaughtered in the Houses of Friends

Winston-Salem, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The Eighteenth Amendment, in the opinion of Judge Johnson J. Hayes, presiding over Federal court here, is being "slaughtered in the house of its friends."

Addressing the members of the Billy Sunday club here on "law enforcement," the jurist contended the amendment is the "greatest piece of legislation ever enacted by a civilized government."

It has been sadly abused, however, he added. "This great instrument of righteousness has not been given a fair trial. Judge Hayes asserted, declaring it had been used as a political football for promotion of selfish desires.

## Secretary Hurley Announces Additional Measure by Government Relief Forces to Relieve Acute Distress Among Poor During the Winter Months

Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Secretary Hurley announced today that all available army cots and blankets would be placed at the disposal of unemployed to relieve acute distress this winter.

In the absence of legal authority to issue the army equipment, the war secretary said he would assume full responsibility.

The secretary's decision was contained in a telegram to Governor Emmerson of Illinois.

"Your telegram November 6 received," the secretary's message to the governor said. "You ask that the army loan cots blankets and other army equipment that may be indispensably necessary to assist in coping with unemployment situation. You state that equipment furnished will be received and accounted for by your commission on unemployment.

"Letter to you under date November 4, 1930, by the acting secretary of war, states the law correctly. I am without legal authority to comply with your request. Under existing conditions, however, I assume the responsibility for authorizing the use of all available army cots and blankets without unduly depleting the supply for the armed forces and in your opinion necessary to relieve conditions of acute distress due to unemployment.

"I suggest that for National Guards cots and blankets you direct the use of armories and other public buildings and keep equipment in control of your state military establishment. Where equipment passes from under control of military authority you should require bond from parties responsible for its safe keeping and replacement. I am sending a copy of this telegram to the general commanding the Sixth Corps area and I am directing him to use regular army cots and blankets for the same purpose and under the same conditions where in his judgment, after conference with the unemployment commission and yourself it is found to be necessary. The commanding general, sixth corps area, has been instructed to communicate with you."

At the same time Chairman Woods of the president's committee today urged jobless men and women to seek work at home first to limit what he described as futile labor migration.

Woods also announced a check of the unemployment census in selected areas is under consideration by a statistician devising plans for complete information on the trend of unemployment in industries.

## Funeral Services Will Be Conducted From St. Paul's Church At 3 O'clock

William Lunsford Long Hall, 48, died at his home on Fourth street yesterday afternoon shortly after 3 o'clock. He had been an invalid about seven years, a victim of sleeping sickness, and death was not unexpected.

Funeral services will be conducted from St. Paul's Episcopal church tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. Rev. W. A. Lillycrop, rector of St. Paul's church, and Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of Memorial Baptist church, will officiate. Burial will be made in Cherry Hill cemetery.

Mr. Hall, prior to his illness, as one of the most active business men of the city, and used his influence in the upbuilding of the city and community. He was a member of the local Pythian lodge, former alderman, and a vestryman of St. Paul's Episcopal church.

## N. Y. LAWYER ARRESTED IN BANK ROBBERY

## Arrest Follows Attempt to Sell Bonds Taken in Lincoln, Neb., Holdup

New York, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Franklin P. Ferguson, 41, an attorney, was arrested today while police sought \$15,000 in bonds identified as part of the loot taken in the \$1,000 daylight robbery of the Lincoln National Bank of Lincoln, Neb., September 17.

Ferguson was arrested at the Harvard Club and charged with receiving stolen property yesterday after he attempted to sell the bonds through Jepson, Tremaine and Company, security brokers, in whose office he had desk room.

There were 15 bonds in the packet, 10 of the American Telephone and Telegraph company and five of the Missouri-Pacific railroad company.

They were identified as part of the Lincoln National Bank robbery loot when they were sent by Jepson, Tremaine and company to J. R. Smetzer and company, bond brokers, where a cashier checked their numbers. They were sent back to Jepson, Tremaine and company with word they had been stolen.

The bonds were returned to Ferguson who said he would take them back to the man who had given them to him to sell.

Police said he told them he unexpectedly in Grand Central Terminal met a friend, Raymond Sims, a security dealer in Boston, who told him he had \$15,000 worth of bonds which had been entrusted to him to sell to settle an estate.

Ferguson said he offered to dispose of the bonds for Sims and agreed to meet him at 4:30 yesterday afternoon with 15,000 in cash.

After being told the bonds were stolen, he said, he took them to the hotel designated as the rendezvous and waited until Sims appeared at 6 P. M. when he demanded and waited until Sims appeared an explanation.

## Democrats Promise Full Support Of Constructive Legislation In Congress

## Administration To Push Emergency Legislation During Next Congress

## Government Leaders To Make Every Effort to Secure Passage of Nine Appropriation Bills by Next March 4; Other Issues Also Hold Interest

Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The administration plans to concentrate on enactment of emergency legislation and important pending measures at the short term of the president's Congress beginning December 1.

Turning attention from the election, the government heads have determined to make every effort to secure passage of the nine great annual appropriation bills by next March 4, to avoid a special session of the newly elected Congress.

Should any of these supply bills fail of passage President Hoover would be forced to convene the new Congress, the control of which remains in doubt or the government agencies not provided for would have to suspend business at the close of the fiscal year, June 30, 1931.

The short session is for three months but the legislative days probably will not exceed seventy. In view of the usual two weeks of Christmas, holidays and the Sundays. Night sessions of both Houses are almost inevitable to complete the business.

President Hoover is known to be anxious that the present Congress dispose of Muscle hoals. At present legislation for this is deadlocked in conference between the Senate and the House, which sanctioned sale to private interests.

The vast naval construction program under the London treaty is to be formulated. It may call for an outlay of three-quarters of a billion dollars.

Unemployment legislation probably will be one of the administration's greatest concerns. It also will be faced by a farm relief program sponsored by export department advocates in both branches.

There is a strong possibility President Hoover will recommend some changes in the legislation that formed the Farm Board and its \$500,000,000 loan fund. It has been the subject of attack from many quarters.

The president has been represented as most desirous of passage at the coming session of the motor bus legislation bill which forms the unfinished business in the Senate; the Wickersham proposals for relief of congestion in Federal courts, and the proposal for a unified border patrol. All these have been passed by the House.

## Break Up Automobile Racket At Goldsboro

Goldsboro, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The arrest of a man who claimed to be a Bible salesman today had brought to grief what police believed was another "racket" preying on automobilists.

W. B. Phillips, alias J. L. Long, alias F. R. Long, arrested at Mount Olive, was returned to Duplin county today and charged with impersonating a traffic officer in order to levy tribute on motorists whose cars had defective lights.

J. F. Kissner identified Phillips as a man to whom he gave \$5 for the privilege of driving with bad lights. The other motorists said he demanded money of them and cursed when they told him they had none.

## No Election Held At Gibbs Wood

Elizabeth City, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Tuesday was election day in 48 states, their various counties and various precincts.

In Gibbs Wood Tuesday was just November 4.

Vox Populi wasn't even a whisper in the Currituck township. The registrar's wife was sick, the 15 qualified voters were busy farming, fishing and hunting and Gibbs Wood elected Josiah W. Bailey to be elected Senator without its assistance.

## Still Claiming Dominance of Legislative Branches of Congress Despite Republican Lead in Election, Party Leaders Assert They Will Do Everything Possible to Aid Country to Recover From Depression

Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Into the confused congressional situation brought about by the near deadlock of election results, seven Democratic leaders today had thrown a pledge of non-obstruction.

The executive heads of the party and three former Democratic presidential nominees last night issued a statement claiming dominance of the legislative branch of government but asserting the party would place the welfare of the country and the restoration of prosperity ahead of political advantage and the desire to show power.

Ignoring the latest compilation of results which gave the Republicans the narrowest of majorities in both Senate and House, they said the Democrats, to the extent of their ability, would steer legislation in the next Congress.

"The seventy-second Congress will not be an obstructive body," they said. "It will not seek to embarrass the President of the United States, but will be glad to co-operate with him and with members of the opposite party in the House and Senate in every measure that conduces to the welfare of the country."

"There will be no holding up of necessary appropriations, no rejection of fit appointees to important places merely because these appointments are made by a president of the opposite party."

Their statement came on the heels of the only expression President Hoover has permitted himself in regard to the election. It was a single sentence:

"The job for the country now is to concentrate on measures of co-operation for economic recovery."

This, he made clear, was the only answer to numerous written questions which had been submitted to him by newspaper correspondents in connection with the election.

The Democratic pledge bore the signatures of James M. Cox, John W. Davis, and Alfred E. Smith, the last three presidential candidates of the party; Senator Joe T. Robinson and Representative John N. Garner, the party leader in Congress, and John J. Raskob and J. P. J. Shouse, the executive heads of the Democratic National committee.

"No rash policies," and no general revision of the tariff, they promised, would be part of the Democratic program. They did not abandon criticism of the tariff, however, referring to a qualification "to whatever changes may be considered necessary to rid the present act of its outstanding enormities."

Subject to recounts the final returns showed:

The House, Republicans 218; Democrats 216; Farmer-Labor 1. The Senate, Republicans, 46; Democrats, 47; Farmer-Labor 1. Records are being demanded on a number of closed rolls on which the Republican House majority. The Republicans also may seek to take away some seats gone Democratic by a handful of votes.

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The schooner sent out SOS call early today and the fruit steamer Aztec, bound from the West Indies to New York, changed its course to go to the schooner, 46 miles away. The Durham Wheeler, bound for Jacksonville, had lost five sails in heavy weather.

Coolseemee, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The management of the Erwin Cotton Mills here, Davis county's largest industrial plant, has announced resumption of full time operation. The industry employs 700 persons.

## LEAF PRICES PICK UP ON LOCAL MART

## Final Sales of Week Saw a Pronounced Advance in Prices Here Yesterday

The Greenville tobacco market sold 6,255,088 pounds of tobacco during the week just closed, it was indicated today in the official report of K. W. Cobb, supervisor of the market. The market paid out a total sum of \$994,425.77 and the average price was \$15.90 per hundred pounds.

For the corresponding week last year the market sold 4,788,120 pounds.

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## Christians Favor Prohibition Law

Raleigh, Nov. 8.—(AP)—National prohibition "is the best method yet devised for the control of the alcoholic beverage traffic" in the opinion of the North Carolina Christian Missionary convention.

The opinion was expressed yesterday in a resolution that called upon members to pledge themselves to "observe morally and by ballot officials trying to enforce the law."

The convention also endorsed three proposed laws looking toward the protection of North Carolina's working children.

Judge Guy Elliott, of Kinston, was elected president of the convention to succeed the Rev. F. E. Harlow, of Charlotte, New Bern was selected as the 1931 meeting place and Bon Clarken, near Hendersonville, as the scene of the 1931 youth conference, to be held from June 8 to 14.

## Crew Rescued From Distressed Boat

New York, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The crew of the four masted schooner Durham Wheeler, in distress off Cape Canaveral, Florida, was taken off the vessel today, according to a message picked up by the West Palm Beach, Fla., station of the Mackay Radio Company.

The message said: "Steamship Aztec arrived alongside schooner Durham Wheeler at seven forty A. M., and at eight twenty picked up all the crew and proceeded on voyage."
