FIVE MEN DIE AS BOAT SINKS ON FLA. COAST

Coast Guardsmen Search for Bodies of Eighteen Men Lost On Craft In Cal.

West Palm Beach, Fla., Nov. 10.—(AP)—A churning, hiccapped sea today hid the fate of five men who disappeared as the barge Northern Light sank in a storm that harassed the Florida coast. Searched by air, fruitless thus far, was ordered continued in the dimming hope of effecting a rescue.

Breached by a raging surf the tug Messenger was in a precarious position near Jupiter while two other vessels crippled by the pounding breakers proceeded northward at greatly reduced speeds.

The Northern Light, en route from Tampa, Fla., to Wilmington, N. C., with a cargo of phosphate in tow of the tug Ontario of Mobile Ala., went down off Carys Fort reef yesterday. The Ontario picked up only J. Stewart of the Barge's crew of six.

The barge company's office of Mobile reported the names of the missing as John W. Heath, master; C. B. Pittman of Mobile; K. Legs, address unknown; R. S. Watson, and L. Bodden, Tampa.

Pilot Bob Moore of Miami flew over the area in a plane for four hours yesterday and the Ontario stood by on the chance that the missing had launched a lifeboat or taken refuge on a nearby key.

Captain Charles Russell and a crew of six were rescued with life lines at the Jupiter Light House Saturday night when the messenger was tossed on the beach. It was in its way to aid the tug Lillian, whose propeller had fouled against a can buoy chain. In the meantime, however, the Lillian, owned by the Baltimore and Carolina lines, was floated with slight damage.

The freighted Unshur, disabled Thursday night, today was being towed by the tug McCulley, to Jacksonville. She is owned by the Merchants and Miners line.

San Francisco, Nov. 10.—(AP)—While a warning storm tossed wrecked the lumber schooner Brooklyn at their feet, Coast Guardsmen searched today for the bodies of 18 men who went down with the little wooden craft Saturday on Humboldt Bay in Northern California. Meantime a determined crew of 41 refused all offers to be taken off the creaking Richmond oil tank or Tamahau, aground since Thursday night on Pescadero Reef, 50 miles south of San Francisco. Six wreckers aboard and three tugs waited for heavy seas to subside before beginning salvage attempts. A breeches buoy was ready to take the crew ashore in case of emergency.

A third ship, caught in the same storm which wrecked the Brooklyn was in tow of the Coast Guard cutter Saragoe. This helpless vessel, the once proud navy cruiser Missoula, with 11 men aboard, broke loose off the Oregon coast from the cable with which the tug Roosevelt was towing her to San Francisco to be scrapped.

Determined to maintain his schedule, Captain T. Tufvesson steamed the lumber-laden Brooklyn out of Eureka for San Francisco Saturday in the face of one of the worst northern California gales in years.

When the danger of trying to cross the treacherous bar outside Humboldt Harbor became apparent, and before the ship could be put about, she was caught by towering waves. They tossed the 333-ton craft over on its side like a plaything.

Giant seas split the wooden craft in two as easily as a man would break a match, said Captain Ahlin whose lumber schooner Whilington was but a quarter mile behind. A few minutes after she was caught, Ahlin said, the Brooklyn sank with all hands on board. No boats were lowered.

WILL DISCUSS COTTON CROP AT MEET HERE

Public Gathering Is Called By North Carolina Co-operative Association Thurs.

A short crop of cotton, selling at less than the cost of production, is affecting not only the farmer who produced it, but also his merchant, his banker, and every line of business which depends upon agriculture for its welfare. The growing demand for information concerning the disposition of the 1929 and 1930 cotton crops has caused a number of leading farmers and business men to request the North Carolina Cotton Growers Association to call a meeting here to discuss the many questions which are being raised and to discuss the best method of handling the present cotton situation. In answer to this request, the Cotton Cooperative Association has called the meeting here this week, and one of its executive officers will be present to discuss the world-wide condition as it affects the cotton industry, and to give complete information in regard to the handling of the 1929 and 1930 crops through the cooperative associations. The meeting will be held in the court house at Greenville, Thursday, Nov. 13, at 2:30 o'clock.

The Cotton Cooperative official will come prepared to furnish detailed information concerning the activities of the Federal Farm Board in regard to cotton, the Cotton Stabilization Corporation, the American Cotton Co-operative Association, and the work of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Co-operative Association. This information will include the basis of settlement with association members on the 1929 crop of cotton, upon which a loan of 16 cents per pound, basis middling, was made. A complete explanation of the advances which are being made to members on the 1930 crop will also be made, so that there may be no further misunderstanding as to the office of W. O. Saunders, fierying. A report on received up to this time will be made at this meeting. An answer will be made to the propaganda which is being circulated concerning sales of cotton by the cooperatives this season. These are questions which cannot be properly explained by newspaper articles or by letters, and every cotton farmer and every business man who is interested in the cotton growing industry is urged to attend this meeting and get information which cannot be otherwise obtained.

General Bliss to Be Buried Wednesday

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—General Tasker Howard Bliss, war time chief of staff, is dead, ending more than half a century of service of his country. The soldier-statesman succumbed early Sunday morning to an intestinal illness, several days after the physicians attending him at Walter Reed hospital had given up hope of saving him. He was in his sixties of his seventy-seventh birthday. General John J. Pershing, Admiral W. S. Benson, Admiral Hugh Rodman, Major General Hugh L. Scott, William Crozier and Brigadier General Stanley D. Embrick, together with Newton D. Baker, former Secretary of War and Col. E. M. House, will be his honorary pallbearers.

Colorful Parade To Open Armistice Day Exercises In Greenville Tomorrow

Groups From Various Schools of the City, Military Unit, Boy Scouts, and Legionnaires to Take Part In Pageant; J. C. B. Ehringhaus Will Deliver Address

One of the most colorful parades since the signing of the armistice twelve years ago will mark the Armistice Day celebration to be staged in this city tomorrow. Final plans for the pageant were announced this morning by J. H. Rose, chairman of the parade committee of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion, under whose auspices the celebration will be held. Groups of children from various schools of the city will participate in the parade, as will the high school band, Boy Scouts, military unit, and members of the Legion and auxiliary.

The principal address of the day will be delivered by Hon. J. C. B. Ehringhaus of Elizabeth City. This will be the crowning feature of the exercises at the campus building at East Carolina Teachers College at 11 o'clock, after which the Legionnaires and veterans of all wars will be treated to an elaborate spread of barbecue.

Members of the Legion have requested the various business houses of the city to close from 10 to 1 o'clock in order to give employees an opportunity to attend the parade and exercises at the college. It was expected that the closing in the business district would be general during those hours as the store owners and their employees join the Legionnaires in making the occasion truly representative of the day when armed forces of virtually all nations on earth laid down their arms to returned to peace.

Commander Elliott has extended an invitation to all former service men to visit the city and take part in the exercises. He said that only in this way could they hope to make the affair as great as desired. During the afternoon and evening, picture programs will be presented at each of the theatres here. Pictures have already been extensively advertised and big crowds were expected to be in attendance, especially in view of the fact that the performances are being given for the benefit of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion. The parade will form at the Coast Line depot and will begin moving down Dickinson avenue promptly at 10:15 o'clock. Arriving (Continued on page three).

Would Put Idle Men To Work Relieving Traffic Hazards In This Nation

Secretary Lamot Suggests New Plan for Helping Unemployed People to Keep Wolf Away From Their Doors During Winter Months

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The hunt for ways and means of cutting down bread lines was brought from Secretary Lamot, the suggestion that he be put to work removing traffic hazards during the winter. It was a double barreled relief measure which the commerce executive advanced as the cost of traffic accidents and losses in transportation efficiency are estimated by his department to involve an annual economic loss of three billion dollars.

Apart from the simple task of removing snow from clogged streets and cutting out obstructions to view, Secretary Lamot suggested development of highway and railway grade separations, street widening, pedestrian safety islands and other similar aids to safety.

He went further in calling attention to the practice of some cities of building subways for pedestrians near public schools. Such tunnels, he said, have eliminated a considerable source of accidents in Los Angeles at a cost of less than \$20,000 each. With the added feature that lowered police costs paid for the outlaw in a few years.

President Hoover, besides announcing on Saturday that emergency appropriations for both unemployment and drought relief would be asked when Congress convenes, added a word of urging to the relief movement in his call for support of the annual Red Cross drive beginning tomorrow. He expressed hope that the public this year would be "more responsive than ever before."

MAN KILLED BY CAR NEAR FARMVILLE

Greene County Farmer Victim of Accident on the Snow Hill Road

Farmville, Nov. 10.—Dave R. Summrell, 59, well known farmer of Greene county was instantly killed Saturday night about 9:30 on the Middle Swamp dam, the bridge of which marks the Greene county line on the Farmville-Snow Hill highway, by a car driven by R. K. Pipping, of the same county, both men being en route for their homes. Mr. Summrell, who was alone, was supposedly cranking his car when the accident occurred. Mr. Pipping and his brother, Richard Pipping, were returning from Athens Church services, near Marboro. The headlights of an approaching car behind Mr. Pipping, who was driving a T model Ford, and the Summrell car was not seen until struck by him. Mr. Summrell's body was badly mutilated. He leaves a wife and four children.

Coroner Ed S. Williams, of Greenville, conducted an inquest at the scene of the accident, and the jury exonerated Pipping of responsibility.

HOLD ANNUAL BANQUET FOR PITT GROWERS

County Farm and Home Agents Described Work At Meeting

The farm men and women had their annual banquet at the Rotary Club Saturday night, which was presided over by J. E. Winslow, chairman of the Pitt County Board of Agriculture. In addition to reports made by the county farm and home agents Captain Harris, sheriff of Beaufort county, who was introduced by E. P. Welch, county agent of Beaufort, gave a very dramatic story of sea life back in the days when only sailing vessels were used, which included the wrecking of a sea going vessel of which he was the only surviving member. This feature of the program proved very interesting to the entire group. The live-at-home program was stressed by a number of speakers including J. C. Galloway, Dr. R. L. Carr, John R. Carroll and W. H. Woolward, vice president of the Greenville Banking & Trust Company. Following these talks two resolutions were unanimously passed, the first one requesting that the county and city government provide an adequate marketing place for the farm men and women who are now and may in the future sell on the curb market. The second resolution was offered by J. C. Galloway, endorsing the movement on hand to establish a canning factory in Greenville which pledged the support of this organization to the movement. Farm men and women were present from practically every community in the county.

Funeral For W. L. Hall Held Here Yesterday

William Lunsford Long Hall, who died at his home on Fourth street late Friday afternoon, was laid to rest in Cherry Hill cemetery yesterday afternoon. Services were conducted from St. Paul's Episcopal church, of which he was a vestryman, at 3 o'clock. Rev. W. A. Lillycrop, rector of St. Paul's church, and Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of Memorial Baptist church, officiated. The funeral was attended by scores of persons, number of whom came from other parts of the State, and an extensive floral tribute attested the high esteem in which he was held.

Mr. Hall died after seven years illness, from sleeping sickness. He was 48-year-old, and prior to his illness, one of the best known business men of the city. He was a former president of the Greenville Rotary club, a former member of the board of aldermen, and a member of the local Pythian lodge. He was a native of Weldon, the son of the late William Weldon Hall and Mrs. Maria Long Hall. He came to Greenville in 1903, engaged in the cotton and tobacco business, and later entered the mercantile field.

DO-X Lands At Calshot, Completing Second Leg Of Flight To The U. S.

Calshot, England, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The giant air liner DO-X completed the second leg of her flight to the United States today, landing at the Calshot airport at 3:37 P. M. (EST). The huge passenger ship came down on the waters off Calshot after a four-hour trip from Amsterdam where it had been waiting for favorable weather conditions for the past week. Visibility was good and the wind was moderate as the great ship, carrying 17 crew members and 23 passengers, descended on the waves. The great flying boat completed in fine style her flight of approximately 325 miles above the waters of the North Sea and the English Channel from Amsterdam preliminary to her projected trans-Atlantic hop.

One of the large Southampton flying boats had gone to the Isle of Wight to meet the DO-X. She carried flares for use in guiding the huge German ship should darkness or haze have made this necessary. The DO-X made a beautiful landing about three quarters of a mile off Calshot Point. No great length of taxiing was necessary and the big flying boat moved along the water smoothly as any lighter craft. She came into sight off Calshot accompanied by a swarm of escorting land and seaplanes. Big crowds were gathered to greet her. Dr. Dornier stepped ashore to be welcomed by air ministry officials and representatives of the German embassy. He shook warmly with Colonel William Forbes-Semphill one of England's best known pilots, who will entertain him while the DO-X remains at Calshot.

POWER BODY BIDS IN FIVE NEWSPAPERS

Properties in Famous Newspaper Suits Sold By Order At Augusta

Augusta, Ga., Nov. 10.—(AP)—The International Paper and Power company of New York today bid in the properties of the Augusta Ga. Chronicle, the Columbia, S. C. Record, the Spartanburg, S. C. Herald and the Spartanburg Journal under the terms of a court sale ordered several weeks ago by Federal Judge William H. Barrett. The price was \$83,130.90. Judge Barrett signed a decree, granting the properties to the International Paper and Power company and issued a permanent injunction restraining either Harold Hall or William LaVarre, former joint operators of the newspapers, from interfering in any way with the stock in the newspapers now held by the paper company. The principal sum involved in the sale of the papers was \$70,000, represented by a joint note signed by Hall and LaVarre, on April 27, 1927, and held by the paper company.

The difference between that figure and the sum bid for the properties, attorneys said, represented the indebtedness since the note was signed in the operation of the papers. The bid was received by Jim Tolbert of Augusta, appointed several weeks ago by Judge Barrett, to receive bids for the newspaper properties. The newspapers were purchased jointly by Hall and LaVarre with the \$70,000 borrowed from the International Paper and Power company. They became involved in litigation over the partnership however, and Federal Judge Bacombe S. Deaver, sitting at Macon, Ga., several months ago appointed J. T. Webb, Jr., of Macon special court commissioner to operate the newspapers until their sale. The bid was received by Jim Tolbert of Augusta, appointed several weeks ago by Judge Barrett, to receive bids for the newspaper properties. Washington News Changes Hands

Washington, N. C., Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Washington Daily News, afternoon newspaper here, has been sold by Frank Pierson, publisher, to W. R. Keyser, of Welch, W. Va., and a group of associates. The new owners took control of the paper today. Keyser is publisher of the Welch (W. Va.) Daily News. Paul B. Mevey who has been connected with the Washington Daily News for the past two and one-half years, will be in active charge of the paper here. Financial details of the sale were not made public.

Republicans Accept Democratic Pledge In "Good Faith"

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Democratic pledge that the party's increased representation in the next Congress would not be used to embarrass and obstruct the administration has been accepted by the Republicans as made in good faith.

The Republican Senate leaders, James E. Watson, of Indiana, last night said in a statement through the party's national committee that the utterance of seven Democratic leaders made right after election was construed as an effort to halt any business action and that it should carry conviction. The Republican party, he said, accepted it "with full faith and credit." "It gives assurance that there will be no attempt on the part of the Democratic party to support disturbing legislation. It is obviously the duty of Republican members to cooperate."

Because of the utility of attempting immediately to solve the question of control in the next Congress in view of the close balance of Republican and Democratic force, the leaders are concentrating now on lining up their program for the approaching short session of the old Congress. It will open three weeks from today for a bare three months in which much must be accomplished. President Hoover has announced he will seek emergency appropriations for both unemployment and drought relief. The major changes of the election will be felt one year hence. In spite of the conciliatory attitude expressed by the leaders of both parties there was no assurance that all of the rank and file would seek to avoid trouble. There has been no open revolt against the Democratic statement, which was signed by three of the party's Presidential candidates, two executives of the national committee and the two leaders in Congress but signs have appeared that some members were none too pleased.

to market from two to three times
a day. One man last week was
known to carry as many as three
loads of tobacco to market the
same day.

The market not only excels from
the standpoint of service, but also
from that of prices. The best prices
are paid for the farmers' offer-
ings here all seasons of the year,
and this fact has been responsible
for the rapid growth of the market
during the past ten years.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The virtually uninterrupted bear movement in stocks rolled into its third month today, having already broken most endurance records.

The list had a brief rallying spell for a time in the morning, but fresh weakness of the utility and rail shares soon turned the entire list emphatically downward, driving prominent issues to the lowest prices in two years or longer.

Union Pacific dropped 8 points and Atchafalaya, North American, American Tobacco B. Macy, Public Service B. N. J. Liggett & Myers B. Delaware & Hudson, and Kansas City Southern were among the issues declining 3 to more than 5 points. Such issues as U. S. Steel, American Telephone, General Electric, Radio, and American Can declined 1 to 2 points to new lows. Standard Oil of N. J. dropped 2 points to 49, going below the price of 50 at which a bid for 1,000,000 shares checked the decline a year ago.

Several commission houses had predicted a substantial technical rally today, but the upturn during the morning was disappointingly short-lived. The day's business and corporate news failed to shed any light on the situation. The appointment of a receiver for Corden Oil, a small unit in the industry, had been foreshadowed by the recent action of the stock, but possibly it served further to aggravate the unsettledness in the market.

The stiffening in the tone of the call money market noted last week seemed to be passing. The rate held at 2 per cent at the loan desk, but concessions in the outside market were again reported.

years. They started out in a small way and the lovely young bride had to be practical and thrifty. Willingly she bent her shoulders to the wheel doing her full share, and proving herself a real help mate. As the years passed bringing with them affluence, always she was the same tender loving, helpful companion. Fortune brought children who added brightness to the home and were tenderly guided and deeply loved by the mother. After they had gone out to seek homes of their own her inexhaustible story of love was poured out on the grandchildren who came.

The creation of a happy home—this Mrs. Brown believed to be woman's work in the world, and in this she was successful to a marked degree. From the struggle of her early days to the end radiance and sunshine emanated from her presence and her family basked in the atmosphere of happiness and contentment born of her efficient management, her bright and cheery smile, her never failing thoughtfulness and consideration.

After she felt that someone else should take it over, she was regular in attendance, and as long as her health would permit was present at every service, always in her accustomed place.

To know Mrs. Brown was to love her. Her gracious womanliness, her beauty of character and personal charm endeared her to a large number of friends who gave her their sincere admiration and deep and lasting affection. Not only by her family and close friends was she appreciated, but people of all classes knew her generous spirit. Among the many who have called at the home today to offer sympathy has been represented all walks of life, the poor and needy who knew the ministrations of her hands, colored servants who have themselves been beneficiaries of her generosity as well as the friends whose lives touched hers.

From the time she came to Greenville to make her home, a radiant and charming young girl, until today when she went to receive the crown which she has so justly earned, her life has been a benediction. Never failing in any sense, the sweetheart of her husband, the adored of her children, beloved of her friends, her passing leaves pain and sadness in hundreds of hearts, but it leaves also a glorious memory, that of a rich and beautiful life which was never for a moment "weary in well doing."

Mrs. Brown, the mother of Mrs. J. B. James, of Greenville, was well known here. She had visited here frequently in past years and greatly endeared herself to the community. Mr. and Mrs. James were at the bedside at the time of her death.
