METHODISTS SEEK UNION OF CHURCHES

Resolution of Western N. C. Conference Favors Unification of North and South.

Greensboro, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Western North Carolina conference today adopted a resolution looking toward unification of the northern and southern Methodist churches, and providing for a committee to work for the union program.

The conference, at its closing session, also went on record as favoring the abolition of night work in mills, and urged stricter regulations for child labor.

A report submitted showed 146,000 members in the conference.

Introduced by J. Norman Willis, layman of Greensboro, the resolution provoked a long and at times heated discussion.

It proposed that the conference petition the general conference commission on Methodist Union to call a meeting of the general conference looking to union of the two denominations.

It was decided that the members of the Methodist Protestant church in the South go ahead with a movement looking toward union with the Methodist Episcopal church, south, whether or not Methodist Protestant churches in the north united with the Methodist Episcopal church.

Another group, led by Dr. G. I. Humphreys, of High Point, president of High Point College, contended there should be no withdrawal of congregations from the Methodist Protestant church for purposes of union with another denomination unless the entire church arranged for a union.

The debate continued at length this afternoon although the conference was scheduled to adjourn at noon.

Swarm of Meteors Nearing The Earth

Philadelphia, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Coasting earthward down a 17 degree slope in space the thickest swarm of meteors known to science is nearing this planet.

So vast are its numbers that although its main section is still three years distant its advance guards to the number of a dozen or more an hour are expected to appear in the early morning of Saturday, November 15, as well as for a few days before and after this.

The swarm is the Leonid meteors known for 1,000 years past, visiting earth three times a century, and occasionally filling the sky with a rain of fire.

Figuratively they are coming down upon earth because their orbit is inclined 17 degrees to the plane of the earth's orbit.

Astronomers plan to count the outbursts of this meteoric host from November 11 to 17, because the maximum seen may indicate whether the Leonids are likely to put on another great fireworks display in 1933, or to throw a dud, as they have done more than once in the past.

A call for volunteers to assist in watching both Saturday and Sunday morning was issued here to-day. Volunteers from the lay public, hardy persons willing to spend the night out in the cold, to strain their eyes for hours to see perhaps a few dozen meteors, and to spend their own money for a two-cent stamp to inform science of the results.

This is real scientific service, and those who attempt it will experience some of the ordinary routine of astronomers, including paying their own expenses.

Western Carolina Conference Ends

Greensboro, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Western North Carolina conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, today wound up with the reading of appointments for the new year by Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon.

Preceding the reading of appointments, the conference heard routine reports and an address from M. T. Plyler, of the Christian Advocate, church paper, urging increased support of it.

C. S. Kirkpatrick appealed for support of the ministers' supernatant fund.

News Bulletins Picture First Armistice Day In U. S. Twelve Years Ago

Graphic Portrayal of Unutterable Joy On This Side of Atlantic As Flashed Across The Wires to Hundreds of Newspapers In The United States

Washington, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Armistice day, 1930!

Twelve years ago today official word came tapping over thousands of miles of waiting wires that the world war was ended—the armistice signed.

Three hours later, at 11 o'clock a. m., Paris time—6 o'clock for a vast army of sleepy war workers in Washington—the last gun roared on the western front. The carnage had ended; the post-war chaos begun.

One moment, as that fateful message came in over wires held idle for hours to receive it, the nation was girded for war.

Virtually in the next instant all was changed—as if a control lever in some titanic engine had been set over. The nation was in reverse from its war effort.

Nowhere is the American story of that 24 hours of the first Armistice day told more graphically, more succinctly than in the minute-by-minute report that went from Washington over Associated Press wires that day.

It takes more than 100 pages of closely-written newspaper "filmy" to tell it—pages now drowsing untouched for years, amid files of the Washington office.

There must be nearly 20,000 words of that day's "story" out of Washington—a book in itself. Yet it could only mention briefly happenings of utmost importance to the whole nation.

Recreate from the files the scene of that November night in the Associated Press bureau at Washington:

Midnight of November 10 has come and gone, and still wires are peeping the story of that day to morning papers of the far west.

The last regular news story of November 10 out of Washington was "cleared" at 1:15 a. m., November 11. It was a battle communiqué from General Pershing's headquarters in France:

"A series of local operations by the first and second armies resulted in considerable gains today. . . . between the Meuse and Moselle," it said. . . . In the Woëvre, despite stubborn resistance. . . . the towns of Marbacheville and St. Hilaire were taken and Bois Dommarin cleared of the enemy."

Then a half hour's pause with Washington silent.

At 2:45 a. m. comes this message:

"FLASH: ARMISTICE SIGNED."

At 2:52 this follows:

Washington, Nov. 11.—The World war will end this morning at 11 o'clock, Paris time. This announcement was made by the state (Continued on page six)

EMPLOYEES OF STATE WILL TAKE DAY OFF

General Holiday Will Be Observed By the State Departments At Raleigh

Raleigh, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Raleigh tomorrow will observe Armistice Day with a general holiday of State employees.

The Supreme court, for the second successive week, will not hear appeal arguments until Wednesday, when 17 cases from the 14th Judicial District will be called.

All state offices will observe the holiday. Banks will also close.

A parade will be held tomorrow morning and Con C. Johnston, state American Legion commander, will speak at exercises after the parade.

The Supreme court will not have a single appeal in a criminal action facing it this week but among the cases is that of the State Bar Association against H. L. Strickland, attorney at law at Charlotte. Mr. Strickland was tried on charges of soliciting professional business and was disbarred from practice in North Carolina. Mr. Strickland, taking 20 exceptions to conduct of the trial, brought the case to the high tribunal.

Two Men Die In Fire in Arkansas

Stuttgart, Ark., Nov. 10.—(AP)—A lighted match dropped into gasoline spilled about a wrecked automobile near here last night is believed by authorities to have started a fire that has caused the death of two men.

E. C. Gray, 43, of Little Rock, was rescued from the driver's seat of the wrecked and burning car but died soon afterwards. Henry Ross, also of Little Rock, was found crawling on his hands and knees some distance from the fire. He was delirious from severe burns on his body but he lived until early today.

A negro living nearby told officials the car was wrecked in a ditch and he went for his mules to pull it out. He said he left Gray and Ross standing beside the car but when he returned soon afterwards the fire was burning furiously.

Officers advanced the theory that the men sat down in the car while waiting for the mules and that one of them struck a match that accidentally ignited the gasoline.

Hero of Holdup Held In Shortage Of His Accounts

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 10.—(AP)—Two years ago Alvin J. Daigler, assistant treasurer of the Federal Manufacturing Company, was the hero of a holdup in which he saved the greater part of the company payroll.

Today Daigler was under arrest charged with grand larceny in connection with an alleged shortage in his accounts. The amount of the shortage, according to detectives investigating the case, probably will total more than \$50,000. Daigler was arrested several days ago but his detention was not made public until today.

Says Germany Will Repudiate Young Plan

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany and now treasurer of the Democratic National Committee, predicted today that Germany probably would repudiate the Young plan for reparations payment within 18 months.

Expressing doubt that the German people would carry on the payments much longer, Mr. Gerard said that people who bought German bonds would never see their money again.

CURTIS SAYS HE DID RIGHT IN RUM CASE

Upholds Stationing of Undercover Agents In Senate Several Months Ago.

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Vice-President Curtis said today that his plan for the stationing of an undercover agent in the Senate office building several months ago was a minor one, but he thought it was the right thing to do.

"Several complaints were made that a bootlegger was using the Senate office building," Curtis said. "I was told about it and said I thought the thing to do, if he was violating the law, was to catch him. My opinion was asked about placing him (the agent) in the building and I also said I thought that was all right if it was absolutely necessary to stop the law violations."

Curtis said he did not sign an order to place the agent in the building.

"I had no authority to sign that order," he added, "but I did say that if he (the bootlegger) was selling liquor in the Senate office building something should be done to stop it and I haven't changed my mind. I did not know when the agent was placed in the building, nor when he left."

Fail in Attempt To Stop Action Against Tunney

New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Council for Gene Tunney, who retired as heavyweight boxing champion of the world with close to two million dollars to show for his ring career, tried once more and in vain today to obtain dismissal of the \$500,000 breach of promise suit brought against him by Timothy Mara.

When Supreme Court Justice Hatting declined to direct a verdict for Tunney, counsel began their summations and the court announced the case would be given to the jury before night.

Mara claims half a million dollars of Tunney's pugilistic earnings for services he contends he rendered the ex-champion before he won his title from Dempsey in Philadelphia in 1926.

CRAZY NEGRO YOUTH BITES THREE PEOPLE

Henderson, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Arrangements were being made today to place in the State Hospital for the Negro insane a Negro youth named Wright, who bit five men Saturday.

The men bitten: J. L. Cash and Henry Hamm, policemen, and Cooper Ellis, Melvin Grissom and David Lee Newman, firemen. Wright had been taken into custody and was being removed to the county jail when he attacked his captors.

Brilliant Exercises To Feature Celebration Of Armistice In This City

Charges Communists With Attempt To Bring About World-Wide Revolution

Vice-President Of Georgetown University, Testifying Before House Communist Committee, Planned World Wide Economic Depression by Use of Enslaved Labor

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The assertion that the Soviet's five-year industrialization plan was designed to bring about such disastrous economic conditions as to accomplish a world revolution was made today by the Rev. Father Edmund Walsh, vice-president of Georgetown University, in testimony before the House Communist committee.

Father Walsh, who was with the American Relief Commission in Russia several years ago, said the Soviets planned to create world-wide economic depression by dumping into the world markets products of enslaved labor.

He read from a book by G. T. Grinko, creator of the five-year industrial plan, which said that "the five-year plan is an important part of the offensive of the proletariat of the world against capitalism; it is a plan tending to undermine capitalist stabilization; it is a plan of world revolution."

He said the Soviet Department of Labor had issued decrees authorizing the government to send 30,000 workers into the mines and forests to produce without any compensation, coal and lumber for export.

The educator presented to the committee a copy of a book written by Gregorie Bessedowsky, formerly charge d'affaires at the Soviet embassy in Paris, revealing how he was to be sent to the United States presumably for trade relations, but specifically to promote Communist propaganda.

The book said annual subsidies for Soviet activities in the United States amounted to \$100,000 while the cost of maintaining military and naval spies was \$50,000 annually.

HEFLIN LAYS FRAUD CASE BEFORE NYE

Charge of Irregularities in Alabama Election to Be Taken by Committee

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Senator Hefflin, Democrat, Alabama, today laid charges of fraud in the Alabama election before Chairman Nye of the Senate campaign funds investigating committee.

Nye told Hefflin that he would present the charges to the full committee when it meets in Denver on November 13 and a decision made later. Hefflin running as an independent Democrat, was beaten by John H. Bankhead, Democrat.

Hefflin said he was sure at least 75,000 votes had been taken from him by "skulduggery." He said thousands of votes by Republicans were thrown out contrary to law, that absentee voters had been allowed to vote illegally, and that there had been widespread intimidation of his supporters. He said one instance of this had come to his attention from Montgomery where employees of an industrial concern had been "threatened with dismissal" if they voted for him.

The Alabama Senator said he was sure an investigation by the committee would disclose that he won the election.

Automobile Sales Reflect Increase In North Carolina

Raleigh, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Sales of new motor vehicles in North Carolina during October showed an increase over September figures but were short of sales in October 1929. Sprague Silver, director of the motor vehicle, announced today.

Sales of passenger cars last month totaled 2,938 and trucks aggregated 766, a total of 3,704 vehicles. In September 3,107 vehicles were sold and in October 1929 the total was 5,864.

Total automobile licenses issued by the State Department of Revenue through Saturday aggregated 470,720 this year, a decrease of 26,732 under the total of 497,452 licensed to the same date last year. A. J. Maxwell, commissioner of revenue, said today.

Pitt County Post of American Legion to Provide Program Filled With Interest For Everybody; Colorful Parade To Lead Off Activities at 10:15; Hon. J. C. B. Ehringhaus, of Elizabeth City To Speak At The College

One of the most colorful parades since the signing of the armistice twelve years ago will mark the Armistice Day celebration to be staged in this city today. Final plans for the pageant were announced yesterday morning by J. H. Rose, chairman of the parade committee of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion, under whose auspices the celebration will be held.

Groups of children from various schools of the city will participate in the parade, as will the high school band, Boy Scouts, military unit, and members of the Legion and auxiliary.

The principal address of the day will be delivered by Hon. J. C. B. Ehringhaus of Elizabeth City. This will be the crowning feature of the exercises at the campus building at East Carolina Teachers College at 11 o'clock, after which the Legionnaires and veterans of all wars will be treated to an elaborate spread of barbecue.

Members of the Legion have requested the various business houses of the city to close from 10 to 1 o'clock in order to give employees an opportunity to attend the parade and exercises at the college. It was expected that the closing in the business district would be general during those hours as the store owners and their employees join the Legionnaires in making the occasion truly representative of the day when armed forces of virtually all nations on earth laid down their arms to return to peace.

Commander Elliott has extended an invitation to all former service men to visit the city and take part in the exercises. He said that only in this way could they hope to make the affair as great as desired.

During the afternoon and evening, picture programs will be presented at each of the theatres here. Pictures have already been extensively advertised and big crowds were expected to be in attendance, especially in view of the fact that the performances are being given for the benefit of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion.

The parade will form at the Coast Line depot and will begin moving down Dickinson avenue promptly at 10:15 o'clock. Arriving at Washington street, the pageant will move up Washington street to Third street, down Third street to Evans street, and down Evans street to Five Points. From Five Points the marchers will pass down Fifth street to the college where the principal exercises will take place.

The parade will be headed by an escort of police. Following the police will be the high school band, a group of second grade children from the Model school in a safety contest. Boy Scouts in uniform, group from Third street school in costume illustrating American flags group from West Greenville school in costume, conveying a short history of the United States, group from the Intermediate school showing freshmen civic classes from the high school carrying out the idea of the U. S. as a "melting pot," the Legion Auxiliary in automobiles, military company, and members of the Legion.

The parade, if in progress at the 11 o'clock hour, will pause for two minutes of silent prayer. The public has also been requested to pause at that hour for prayer.

Preceding the formal opening of the congress tonight will be a meeting of the executive board this afternoon. Miss Frances Hays, of Washington, secretary of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, and Mrs. Raymond Dinford of Guilford College, president of the State Parent-Teacher Association, will address the opening session.

Early this afternoon approximately 200 delegates had registered.

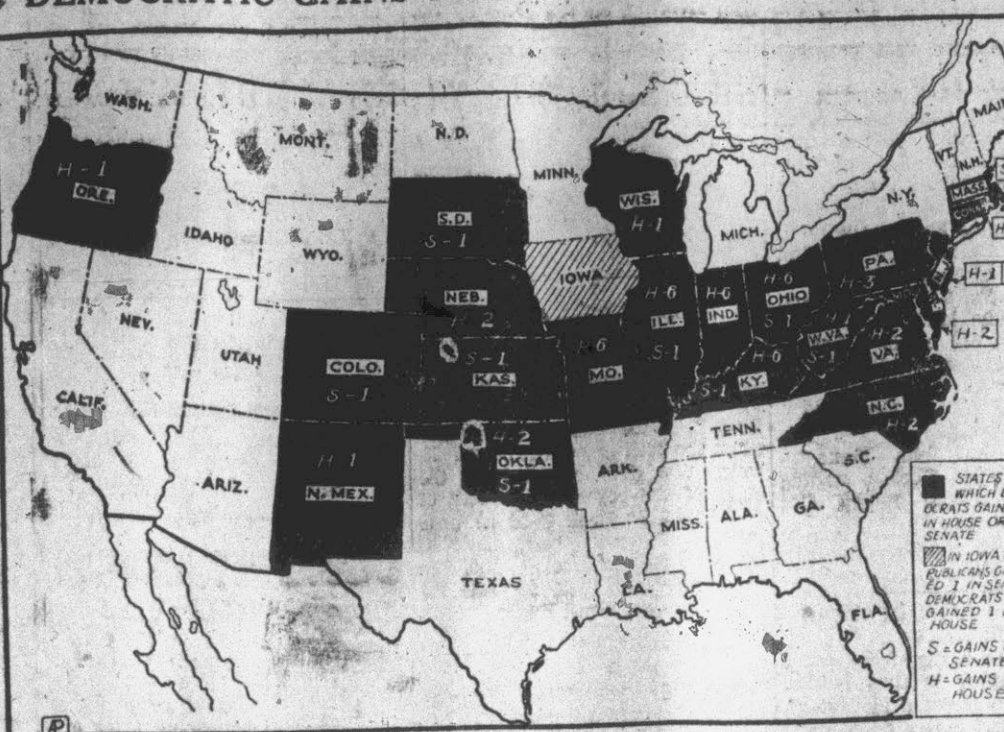

All of us can vividly recall the moment which held sway from the end of the land to the other end of the world at 11 o'clock when the war was over—that peace had been declared. It was an occasion in which the world had never known before. It affected practically every side in all the principal nations, even in homes which had given life to their life's blood, the joy of unutterable joy was felt, today those boys who fought there and their loved ones assemble and pay tribute to the sacrifices of the men who never came back. Dear in mind the fact that you expected to give liberally to poor during Boy Scout Bundles. The Scouts will canvass the homes of the city during the day, and collect all bundles which the home owners wish to contribute to the poor.

This is a campaign in which the citizenship should be interested and it is hoped nothing will be left undone in the effort to provide suitable clothing for the winter months.
It is impossible to say how much the Scouts will be able to collect during their one-day drive, if the people will give as liberally as they should the majority poor people should be well provided for in this respect.
Much suffering may be eliminated by liberality during this campaign and it is to be hoped that everybody will go through his wardrobe and give as liberally as can. It is a drive in behalf of humanity, and after all, the cause of humanity is the greatest cause we have to consider.

Last week was "Prosperity Week" in Greenville, but the end of the week did not see the end of prosperity, by any means.
In fact, it was the idea of the promoters of "Prosperity Week" that it might continue permanently, that its spirit might permeate the home and enable the people to forget the period of depression which existed during the summer of last months.
The prosperity produced by the campaign last week will continue definitely if the people will continue to practice the policies made during the week. By paying accounts, the liberal purchase of the things needed in the home, which money should be placed in circulation to enable everybody to

recover from the financial stringency to some extent.
Then, also, the giving of jobs to the unemployed should help the situation. When people are at work, they are able to spend, and when people spend, money is kept in constant circulation finding its way into the pockets of the entire citizenship.
Remember that what "Prosperity Week" did last week, the application of its principles will do any other week, and get busy and from now on do your part by permanent relief of the hard times.

Irregular Work Problem Faced By Fla. Women

Florida's fame as a tourist state has brought distinct problems to its women workers in the form of long hours and irregular employment, according to a recent statewide survey of hours, wages, and working conditions of wage-earning women made under the direction of Ethel L. Best of the United States Women's Bureau. Its golden climate brings yearly floods of tourists into Florida, with a resultant seasonality of employment in hotels and restaurants, in laundries and in other lines of business. The chief woman-employing manufacturing industry of the state, cigar-making, also is distinctly seasonal in character.

Due partly to this characteristic and partly to the staid industrial development of the state Florida has remained one of only five states that have no laws limiting the number of hours in a day or week for which a woman may be employed, although this very irregularity described increases the need of such legislation.
The Woman's Bureau survey of Florida found both daily and weekly hours of work to be long, a daily schedule of 10 hours or more being required of 15.3 percent of the white and 69.1 percent of the Negro women in factories, stores, and laundries, while only 16.3 percent of the white women and none of the Negroes had a day of eight hours or less. A weekly schedule of 48 hours or less was found in only eight firms, employing less than 5 percent of the white women and between 5 and 6 percent of the Negroes.

Seek Escaped Men In Buncombe

Asheville, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Buncombe County officers and convict camp guards today sought for five of seven prisoners who Saturday night sawed their cell bars and escaped from the prison barracks at Craggy.
Two of the prisoners, Earl Galloway and a youth named McMahon, were returned to the camp last night by the parents. The youths had gone to their homes but the parents took them back to the prison camp.

Officials at the prison camp today said they had not yet checked to learn the names of the five missing prisoners but that posers were hunting for them. Bloodhounds were being used to facilitate the man hunt in the Craggy and Elk Mountain sections.

To View Automobile Believed To Be That Of J. M. Langston

Goldboro, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Wayne county officers left for Lehigh county today to view a burned automobile which they believe possibly is that of J. M. Langston who was tried for murder of P. E. Flinchum, prohibition agent, and acquitted.
Flinchum was shot to death from a liquor-running car. Langston, arrested, said his car had been stolen. The state which had expected to use it as evidence in his trial was never able to find it.

N. C. People Spend More For Pleasure Than For Education

Raleigh, Nov. 11.—The people of North Carolina spend \$1.40 for certain luxuries—tobacco, soft drinks, ice cream, candy, chewing gum, theatres and movies, jewelry, perfumes, cosmetics, sporting goods and toys—to every \$1.00 spent for public schools, according to a recent study made by the research division of the National Education Association. It is learned today from the State Department of Public Instruction.

The annual bill for certain luxuries for this state in 1928 was according to the result of this investigation, \$65,936,995, while the cost of public elementary and secondary schools and colleges was \$47,047,191.

North Carolina spends 4.38 percent of the annual income of its citizens for schools, according to the bulletin issued by the National Education Association. The \$65,936,995 spent for certain luxuries, on the other hand, represents 6.14 percent of the annual estimated income of \$1,073,028,000 for 1928.

In the nation, as a whole, \$2.61 is spent for candy, chewing gum, theatres, and similar items, for every \$1.00 spent for schools. We expend \$640,650,000 for the limited list of articles and amusements given above, while all the public schools are allotted \$2,449,633,561.

"In presenting these figures," comments the bulletin of the N. E. A., "it is not implied that one should limit himself wholly to the necessities of life. We should not be willing, however, it says in effect, to give luxuries preference over essentials in the spending of our income."

GRID INTEREST SHIFTS NOW TO NEW ORLEANS

Atlanta, Nov. 10.—The Dixie gridiron championship scene shifts to New Orleans this week as Tulane and Georgia attempt to reduce the field of first rate contenders for the Southern Conference crown to two teams.

Alabama, the only other eleven unbeaten in conference competition, tackles Louisiana State at Montgomery, but the Tide figures so much stronger than the Tigers from Baton Rouge that an elimination there seems only a remote possibility.

During the past fortnight while Georgia was facing two strong teams over the Mississippi Aggies and Auburn. But both these comparatively easy games were played on home fields, while Georgia was forced to make train rides for both of its encounters.

Georgia is conceded to have one of the strongest teams in its history, but whether the Bulldogs, after two such strenuous games on foreign fields, will have enough strength to turn back Tulane's great Green Wave, is doubtful.

Eight other conference tussles bring together Florida and Clemson at Jacksonville; Auburn and Mississippi A and M at Birmingham; Duke and North Carolina state in Raleigh; Kentucky and Virginia Military in Lexington, Ky.; Maryland and Virginia Polytechnic in Norfolk; South Carolina and Sewanee in Columbia; Tennessee and Vanderbilt in Nashville and Virginia and Washington and Lee in Charlottesville.

Most interest probably will be centered at Nashville as Tennessee hopes to repeat its last year's victory over a strong Vanderbilt team. Duke is a heavy favorite to beat N. C. State, with only the University left in its path toward a North Carolina flag.

The intersectional challenge is carried north by Georgia Tech, Oglethorpe, Loyola of New Orleans and Kentucky Wesleyan. Tech's Golden Tornado faces Pennsylvania at Philadelphia, while Oglethorpe tackles Villa Nova in the same city. Loyola, victorious in three outside battles thus far, travels to St. Louis to meet St. Louis University, while Little Kentucky Wesleyan invades West Point for a tilt with the Army.

Presbyterian leader in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association enters group wars again against Erskine at Clinton, S. C. Other S. I. A. A. encounters for the week-end bring together Georgetown and Western Kentucky at Bowling Green; Birmingham Southern and Mississippi College at Clinton, Miss.; Centre and Transylvania at Danville; Louisiana Tech and Millsaps at Jackson, Miss.; Spring Hill and Union at Mobile; the Citadel and Chattanooga at Charleston and Southwestern Louisiana and Miami.

North Carolina and Mississippi go outside the conference ranks, the Tar Heels opposing Davidson at Chapel Hill and Ole Miss playing Southwestern Friday in Oxford.

Army and Navy Unable To End Their Dispute

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—A joint statement by Secretaries Hurley and Adams today acknowledged that the Army and the Navy were as yet unable to settle their differences over the question of the resumption of athletic relations.

"At a conference of the secretary of war and the secretary of Navy this morning it was agreed," the joint statements said, "that no mutual ground had yet been found for a resumption of football between the two academies."

Secretary Hurley expressed a willingness to continue discussions with the Navy on the subject. The discussions, he said, have been limited to the question of a general resumption of athletic relations and not to that of a post-season game suggested by outside sources to raise unemployment funds.

Then in brief "bulletins" follows a summary of expected terms of the armistice, as yet unknown. They were striking close on later comparison with actual stipulations of Marshal Foch.

For almost 24 hours thereafter, at intervals of a few minutes, followed such developments as these: 5:11 a. m.—Armistice terms will be made public after 8 a. m. 7:38 a. m.—The World was ended at 6 o'clock this morning, Washington time, with revolution in Germany and William Hohenzollern, former emperor, a fugitive from his native land—this a "general lead" of several hundred words rounding up the whole situation at that hour. 8:43—By that time a column and a half story on probable steps in civil and military demobilization had been sent.

9:11—"Washington's joy.... quietly manifested"—the first item on popular reception of the news. 9:25—Preparation to cancel draft calls for 300,000 men during November, "some of them moving to the camps this morning."

9:52—President Wilson cancels November draft calls.

10:06—Text of President's proclamation of announcement to "My Fellow Countrymen."

10:13—President to read terms to joint session of Congress at 1 p. m.

10:28—Secretary Baker outlines draft cancellation plans; Secretary Daniels says navy calls stand temporarily.

10:27—Probable place, time, composition in personnel and outline of major problems of peace conference—a full column on this.

10:45—Text of telegraphic cancellation order to 4500 local draft boards.

Two American Missionaries Are Slain In Brazil

New York, Nov. 10.—(AP)—News of the killing of two American missionaries and the infant daughter of one of them by the interior of Brazil has been received by officials of the American South American Missionary Union.

The victims were Arthur S. Tylee of Worcester, Mass., his two-year-old daughter and Miss Ebel Kratz, 24, a nurse of Chicago.

Alfred H. Vroom, treasurer of the Missionary Union, who received cablegrams telling of the slayings, said the messages did not state who made the attack, but it was assumed that the missionaries were killed by savage Indians among whom they were working.

The attack occurred at an isolated station near Jurueña, three weeks' journey by bullock cart from the nearest civilization.

TWO YOUTHS KILLED ON WASHINGTON HIGHWAY

Richmond, Va., Nov. 10.—(AP)—Automobiles which ran into two groups of hitch hikers on the Washington highway near here last night cost the lives of two youths and seriously injured another.

Joseph Gallagher, 25, of New York City, was killed almost instantly when a hit-and-run driver ran him down near Fredericksburg. A companion, Ralph Mouser, of Bellefonte, Ohio, suffered both legs broken and other serious injuries.

Shortly after midnight Francis Reis, 20, of Cedar Grove, N. J., was struck by an auto near Ashland and fatally injured, dying in a Richmond Hospital. Reis was walking along the highway with his brother, Frederick Reis, also of Cedar Grove. William E. Allen, of Ladysmith, Va., who police said was driving the car, brought Reis to a hospital. He was arrested.

Model Plane
New York—A model of a plane which he hopes will take 170 passengers across the Atlantic in 24 hours has been brought from Germany by Dr. Edmund Rumpel, air plane designer. Engines of 10,000 horsepower will be in the wings, which will spread 260 feet.

Goldsboro.—(AP)—It had to happen. A two ton truck here hit a "bantam" automobile. The truck driver heard the noise and climbed down to see. He found the miniature car overturned, undamaged, no windows broken and the occupants, Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Kelly, unhurt.
