TELLS STORY OF SINKING OF BIG SCHOONER

First Officer of the "Brooklyn" Drifted 70 Hours on Wreckage Before Rescue

Eureka, Cal., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Jorgen M. Greve, first officer of the lumber schooner Brooklyn, which sank off Humboldt Bay Saturday with all hands, lived today to tell how he drifted more than 70 hours on a bit of wreckage in a gale-madened sea.

He was rescued yesterday by the crew of the fishing boat Two Sisters five miles from shore slightly north of the place where the Brooklyn sank. Greve was clinging grimly to wreckage and life, semi-conscious, bleeding from numerous cuts inflicted by the constant battering of heavy seas and with his clothes all tattered. He was rushed to a hospital where physicians said he would live. He is the only known survivor of the crew of 18.

Last night he revived sufficiently to tell a graphic story of the disaster and the agonizing hours that followed. He told of the mountainous waves striking the bow of the little schooner, making it impossible to steer. Something must have happened to the engine, then, he said.

The pilot house, then the superstructure were torn away as gigantic seas swamped the vessel, he said. "The next time the Brooklyn turned over, she came keel up," he said. "The men climbed the side and caught hold of the keel. I saw the skipper (Captain T. J. Tufvesson) in the water and some of the men alongside of him. They looked glassy-eyed."

A wave struck the hull, sweeping Greve and his mates into the water. Greve's three days adrift, without food or water, began, when he swam to a piece of bulkhead torn from the Brooklyn.

"I swam as far as I could from the wreckage," he said. "Later I found a piece of bulkhead, four feet wide and eight feet long with a beam six by six inches standing out two feet on each side. Then I took two pieces of one by four inch plank. I used them for paddles."

He said he was carried opposite Trinity Head, 20 miles from the scene of the wreck, Saturday night. He could see the lights flickering and "yelled until I thought my lungs would burst, but no one seemed to hear me."

Sunday at daybreak he was opposite the old whaling station at Trinity and summoned all his strength to paddle to shore only to be fought back by currents.

Waves piled over him, throwing him against the wreckage, breaking and tearing his clothes.

"I don't remember much else," he finished, exhausted.

Probe Sky Liquor Transport In Miss.

Columbia, Miss., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Inauguration of sky liquor transportation in the south was believed to have had its wings clipped by sheriff's deputies who today guarded a large cabin plane pending arrival of new planes of federal prohibition investigators.

The plane, said to be the first liquor carrier in the southern district, was destined for Grand Rapids, Mich., when forced down late yesterday at Sandy Hook, Miss., just across the Louisiana state line. Officers believed that vigilance of the Canadian border patrol prevented a plan to ship liquor from the south.

The pilot, James W. Kulpa, of Muskegon, Mich., was arrested by Sheriff W. B. Waldorf and was quoted by the latter as saying he knew he was carrying a heavy load but had no idea it was liquor. The sheriff did not detain the plane's passenger, Jack Miller, of Grand Rapids.

The sheriff said Kulpa took off from New Orleans for Grand Rapids but offered no details as to where the cargo was loaded and to whom it was consigned.

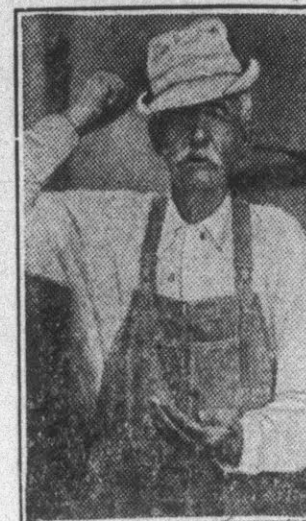
Reed Recommended As Power Chairman

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Governor Clyde M. Reed, of Kansas, has been recommended to President Hoover by Senator Allen, Republican, Kansas, for appointment as chairman of the Federal Power commission.

The nominations of three members of the reorganized commission were sent to the Senate for confirmation during the last session, but they were not acted upon. After receiving an opinion from Attorney General Mitchell, the President decided to withhold recess appointments to the commission. He expects to send nominations for the full commission personnel to the Senate early in December, it was said today at the White House.

W. T. ALLEN LAID TO REST LAST SUNDAY

Prominent Farmer of This Section Died Saturday After One Year's Illness

Funeral services for William T. Allen, 44, prominent farmer who resided on the Farmville road, three miles from Greenville, were conducted from his late home Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. Rev. R. F. Pittman, of Agden, and Rev. M. A. Woodward, of Winterville, conducted the final rites. Burial was made in the family burying ground at the old Allen homestead.

The funeral was largely attended by relatives and friends of the deceased and an extensive floral tribute spoke in eloquent terms of the high esteem in which he was held.

Mr. Allen died Saturday night after an illness extending over a period of a year or more. His condition became worse several days ago, and his death was not unexpected.

He was a native of Pitt county, being born and reared in the neighborhood where he died. He was one of the best known growers of his community, and for many years took an active interest in the political life of the county. He was at one time candidate for the office of sheriff of Pitt county, and for years was active in the politics of the section in which he spent his entire life.

He is survived by his wife, who before her marriage, was Miss Neva Forbes, and a daughter, Miss Elizabeth Allen. He is also survived by the following brothers and sisters: Albert, Roy, Jim and Fennell Allen, and Mrs. W. B. Vandford and Mrs. George Allen, all of this county.

He was the son of the late Tom and Minnie Allen, the father at the time of his death being considered one of the wealthiest men of his community.

The following acted as pall bearers: Frank Manning, A. B. Moyer, Leon Tyson, R. T. Tyson, Marshal Joyner and Jim Tucker.

Prince of Wales Goes for Ride On German DO-X

Calshot, Eng., Nov. 12.—(AP)—The Prince of Wales looked over a part of the Kingdom which some day will be his from a cabin window of the great German seaplane, DO-X, today.

For half an hour he rode in the huge ship, taking off from the naval harbor here, nosing over toward the Isle of Wight, and dropping back to the harbor again.

Sir Phillip Sassoon accompanied him and Dr. Claude Dornier, inventor and builder of the plane, showed his royal visitor through the ship.

When the flight ended, the prince climbed back into the amphibian plane, in which he had flown from London, and returned to the city.

The royal passenger, obviously pleased with his brief trip, shook hands warmly with Dr. Dornier and R. H. Wright, who left their plane, and congratulated Commander Friedrich Christiansen of his handling of the craft.

Exercises Opened With Colorful Parade Yesterday Morning; J. C. B. Ehringhaus of Elizabeth City, Delivered Principal Address in Campus Building At College

The twelfth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice was observed with appropriate exercises in this city yesterday. The program was in charge of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion and numbers of people from different parts of the county were in attendance.

The city was gaily decorated in keeping with the spirit of the occasion. Flags flew along the sidewalks in the principal business district and were also in evidence in the residential sections. Business houses closed from 10 to 1 o'clock in order to give their employees an opportunity to attend the exercises.

The program consisted of a parade, exercises at the campus building of the East Carolina Teachers college, the showing of special pictures at the tow theatres and a barbecue dinner.

The principal address of the occasion was delivered by Hon. J. C. B. Ehringhaus, of Elizabeth City, prominently mentioned as a candidate for Governor of North Carolina. The speaker paid splendid tribute to the sacrifices of American soldiers on foreign battlefields, and declared they had not died in vain. He urged the Legion to continue its fight for the objective of the world war—peace—and to use its influence against those forces tending to encourage economic hatred and warfare.

The program got under way at 10:30 with one of the most colorful parades ever staged here before. The parade formed at the Atlantic Coast Line station, passed down Dickinson avenue to Five Points, up Evans street to Fourth street, down Fourth street to Washington street, down Third street to Evans street, and from Five Points to the college.

The parade was headed by two members of the Greenville police department on motorcycle, and was followed by the Greenville High School band, a group of second grade children from the Model School in a safety contest, Boy Scouts in uniform, group from the Third Street school in costumes illustrating the American flag, a group from the West Greenville school in costumes conveying a short history of the United States, a group from the Intermediate school showing schools of yesterday and today, and freshmen civic classes from the High School carrying out the idea of the United States as the "Melting Pot," a float representing the Salvation Army, members of the Legion Auxiliary in automobiles, the local military unit, and members of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion.

Prizes had been offered for the best showing made by groups from the various city schools and the winners were announced as follows: West Greenville, first prize, \$10; Model School, second prize, \$7; High School third prize, \$5.

The bright costumes of the school children added color and life to the parade, and proved a source of considerable interest. The portrayal of the history of the United States by students of the West Greenville school was unusually interesting, and came in for considerable commendation. The other schools also were highly praised. The parade was in charge of J. H. Rose, chairman of the parade committee of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion and superintendent of city schools.

Between two and three thousands and persons attended the exercises at the college. J. C. Elliott, commander of the local post, presided. The program was opened with a selection by the High School band, followed by a song by the entire assemblage. A minute of silent prayer was offered in memory of departed comrades. In commemoration was made by Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of Memorial Baptist church. A song was rendered by the student body of the college, led by Mrs. J. Knott Proctor with Miss Kuykendall acting as instrumental accompanist.

Dr. R. H. Wright, president of the college, extended a cordial welcome to the visitors, and declared that they would always be received with pleasure by the college.

Mrs. J. Knott Proctor rendered a solo number, accompanied at the piano by Miss Kuykendall.

Commander J. C. Elliott expressed appreciation of the co-operation of those who had helped to make the Armistice Day program a success.

Two Republicans Launch Vigorous Attack Against National Party Chairman

Representative Britten, of Illinois, and Former Senator Wadsworth, of New York, Seek Removal of Senator Fess Because of His Views On Prohibition

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Two prominent Republican anti-prohibitionists were joined today in open opposition to the expressed dry views of their party's national chairman.

Senator Fess of Ohio, chairman of the Republican National committee, was made the target of a vigorous attack by Representative Britten of Illinois, and former Senator James W. Wadsworth of New York.

Britten demanded the selection of another chairman, if, he said, "Senator Fess is so blind or so intolerant that he cannot analyze the desires of millions of voters in progressive northern states."

Wadsworth spoke of a split in the party and asked: "What kind of a split is better, a split caused by a straight-out manly declaration on the fundamental importance of repeal or a split caused by a half-hearted and transparently insincere adherence to prohibition?"

Leaving the Democratic south out of future Republican calculations, Britten said, the success of the party is dependent upon its success in "such Republican states as New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Ohio," together with "many smaller wet Republican states."

Mail Pilot Descends In Parachute As His Plane Gives Out Of Gas In Fog

Shelby, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Dick Merrill, air mail pilot, found the gasoline tanks of his fog-bound plane empty above Cedar, 22 miles from here, early this morning, and "bailled out" with a parachute at 5,000 feet.

He landed safely a half mile from a farmhouse. His ship, crash landed nearby, was completely wrecked but the mail was not damaged.

Merrill, brought to Shelby early today by the farmer who sheltered him until daylight, had only a slightly twisted ankle and a thrilling story of a blind leap for a mist-shrouded earth as a result of his experience.

The pilot had not been reported since he left Charlotte shortly after 11 o'clock last night, northbound. Airport officials had felt concern for his safety because of the "soupy" night.

Merrill's first knowledge that he was far off his course came when he narrowly avoided striking

a mountain, he said. Cedar is at the foothills of the North Carolina mountains.

After flying two hours in what he believed was the direction of Greensboro, his next stop after Charlotte, Merrill said he became alarmed and turned back in an effort to pick up signal lights. The fog hid them. Two hours found him in the mountains and the fuel ran short.

At 6,000 feet, Merrill made his first effort to leave the plane. He had one leg out on a wing when the craft went into a spin.

Britain And India Begin Deliberations Looking To New Indian Government

King George Convened Representatives of Two Nations Today With Hope That Future Government of India Would Give Expression to Honorable Aspirations

London, Nov. 12.—(AP)—King George, ruler over the most extreme empire of all time, today convened representatives of Britain and India in a conference which during the coming winter will attempt to evolve a government for the Asiatic empire satisfactory to its restless millions.

His Majesty, expressing anxiety at the course of events in India, told his hearers that he would follow their deliberations with closest attention, but with confidence in their success. "It is my hope that the future government of India," he said, based on foundations of mutual obligations and their recognition and fulfillment "will give expression to her honorable aspirations."

The formal, imposing opening of the deliberations was held amidst the gorgeous regal trappings of the royal gallery of the House of Lords, official home of the British nobility. Eighty six delegates were present. Of these 57 were from the provinces of India and sixteen from the native Indian states, including nine powerful ruling princes. Thirteen were members of the British parliament.

Meanwhile, in far-of Hindustan Mahatma Gandhi, picturesque and ascetic leader of the widespread Indian revolt for absolute independence was watching proceedings in London from a Poona prison cell. He and the millions of rebellious, resentful Indians who follow his word were not represented at the assembly, which they voted months ago to boycott.

Could he have visualized the scene in the royal gallery he would have seen a vast hall which was one blaze of "crimson and gold." The king's throne chair stood on the outer rim of two large circles of tables, one circle within the other, to accommodate the delegates. The Indian princes, representing fabulous wealth and power, sat about an inner table making a colorful spectacle in their ornate oriental headresses. Besides the throne was an ordinary chair for Ramsay MacDonald, England's labor Prime Minister, who, after the king spoke, was nominated and made chairman of the assembly.

Delicate questions of rank and precedence among the Indian potentates, all of whom are exceedingly jealous of their rights necessitated particular care on the part of the British officials in seating delegates. One of the most striking features of the amazing spectacle was the presence of two Indian women delegates who sat on His Majesty's right—symbolic of modern India. They were Mrs. Subbarayan and the Begum Shan Nawab.

It was high noon as the king-emperor entered and took his place before the historic assembly, which stood in silent reverence to do him homage. The ruler spoke in measured tones, his striking voice sounding resonant and clear into his own gold and silver microphone which carried his words over a wide-spread radio network to the far corners of the empire and across the Atlantic to the United States. He spoke for seven minutes.

"More than once," he said, "the sovereign has summoned historic assemblies on the soil of India but never before have British and Indian statesmen and the rulers of the Indian states met as you now meet in one place and around one table to discuss the future system of government for India and to seek an agreement for the guidance of my parliament as to the foundations upon which it must stand."

His Majesty said that the true foundation of self-government is the fusion of divergent claims and in a moving sentence he declared, in a ringing voice, that he had in mind: "The just claims of the majorities and minorities of men and women of the town dwellers and tillers of the soil of landlords and tenants, of the rich and poor, of the races, castes, and creeds of which the body politic is composed." "For these things," he said, "I care deeply."

After His Majesty had finished, he shook hands with Mr. MacDonald and then stepped from the low dais on which his throne stood. Bowing first to the delegates on his left and then to those on his right he walked slowly from the hall.

The Prime Minister commented that this was the first occasion on which the Indian princes had met in joint conclave with representatives of the people of India and of Britain, on English soil. His speech, which moved his audience, had its keynote in this one passage: "We

BEGIN PLANS TO FINANCE GOVERNMENT

House Appropriations Considers Legislation for Paying the Nation's Debts

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Formulation of legislation to finance the federal government for the next fiscal year today engaged the attention of the House appropriations committee.

Between December 1, when the short session begins, and the Christmas holidays, Chairman Wood expects the House to pass three of the nine annual measures and send them to the Senate, with the others to be acted on as soon after the holidays as possible.

The nine supply bills, including two deficiency appropriation measures, are expected to call for an outlay of approximately \$1,000,000,000 for the fiscal year 1932, beginning July 1, 1931. For the present year they aggregated \$4,872,461,906 including postal service allotments of \$840,271,353.

As usual, the hearings were behind closed doors with government officials and budget bureau experts testifying before sub-committees designated to handle particular bills.

The Treasury-Post Office measure, heretofore by far the largest, is drafted by a sub-committee headed by Chairman Wood. Under the plan, the hearings are to be completed to permit it to be reported to the House about December 3.

For the present fiscal year more than \$1,100,000,000 was provided for the combined expenses of the Treasury and Post Office Department.

The second bill, that for the Interior Department, was delegated to a sub-committee headed by Representative Cramton, Republican, Michigan. Although in previous years the outlay for this department approximated \$280,000,000 annually, a reduction to about \$65,000,000 for next year was forecast by the transfer of the pensions bureau to the administration of veterans affairs.

Drafting of the Agriculture Department bill will begin November 20, and the measure for the State, Justice, Commerce and Labor Departments November 24. The bills for the War, Navy, District of Columbia, independent offices and for legislative expenses will be formulated in December and January.

Bank Robber Killed By Oklahoma Police

Marland, Okla., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Two young bank robbers ran into a hail of officers' bullets as they left the Marland State Bank today with \$2,000. One, Jimmie Jackson, 20-year-old Indian of Pawhuska, was killed and the other, Carter Camp, 18, also of Pawhuska, was wounded and captured.

Six officers, informed in advance of the robbery, lay in wait in two stores overlooking the bank and opened fire as the youths entered their automobile after the robbery.

Jackson was shot through the heart and in the right arm and died almost instantly. Camp was struck by four bullets, but it was believed he would recover.

The money was recovered.

LIQUOR ISSUE AGAIN UNDER G. O. P. FIRE

Wets and Drys Come to Grips As Law Enforcement Body Talks Prohibition

Washington, D. C., Nov. 12.—(AP)—President Hoover's law enforcement commission convened today to continue work on its prohibition report as Republicans wets and dries came to grips on the liquor question as a possible issue in the 1932 presidential race.

As usual, the meeting of the enforcement commissioners was executive, and Chairman Wickersham stood on his announcement of a few days ago that all reports speculating on the commission's findings were "guesses."

With former Senator Wadsworth, of New York, and Representative Britten, of Illinois, Republican anti-prohibitionists, in dispute with Senator Fess, Republican prohibitionist from Ohio, as the latter's assertion that the party would split if it favored repeal, Rep. Beedy, Republican, Maine, is a prohibitionist came out in favor of making prohibition an issue in the 1932 elections.

"I believe," the Maine member said, "that the matter of prohibition should be thoroughly discussed in the 1932 campaign and that it would be much better if the people of the country would have the right to voice their opinions."

Beedy is an ardent prohibitionist and has opposed on the floor of the House repeal of the eighteenth amendment.

Beedy said he thought it advisable to settle the prohibition question and that it would be a "helpful thing for everybody concerned."

Replying to Fess, Wadsworth said: "We want our party to be right on the only fundamental constitutional issue that has arisen since the days of the civil war and we will fight to make it right, split or no split."

Britten urged a new chairman be selected for the Republican National committee, if Fess "is so blind or so intolerant that he cannot analyze the desires of millions of voters in progressive northern states."

From two of his colleagues of the French army, Marshal Petain and General Weygand, the French Chief of Staff, there came late yesterday messages of grief and condolence in which they were joined by Minister of War, Maginot.

East Bend Doctor Died Last Night

East Bend, N. C., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Dr. John Pinkney Nicholson, 94, retired physician, died here last night following an illness of several months.

Dr. Nicholson was one of the best known physicians in Yadkin county and Northwest North Carolina. He retired in 1913 and had been living at the home of Phil Pressnell here.

REGAINS STANDING IN ORGANIZED BASEBALL

Chicago, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Jim "Hippo" Vaughan, one time Cub southpaw has regained his standing in organized baseball, apparently to become a member of the army of unemployed.

Vaughan, who deserted organized baseball in 1925 because of salary differences, still is the property of the Cubs, but President William L. Veeck yesterday said it was likely that waivers would be asked on the 43-year-old hurler.

SPLENDID PROGRAM MARKED OBSERVANCE OF ARMISTICE IN GREENVILLE YESTERDAY

success, and said the Legion felt
deeply indebted to the public and
various organizations for their loy-
al support in observance of the day.
Captain J. C. Lanier introduced
Mr. Ehringhaus as the next gov-
ernor of North Carolina, and praised
him for the high type of service
which he had rendered the state in
past years.

Mr. Ehringhaus complimented
the Pitt County Post for its record
of service. He declared the post
had attracted the attention of sur-
rounding communities by reason of
its activities in behalf of Legion
principles, and predicted that its
growth in the future would be as
great as the past.

He paid tribute to the sacrifices
which American soldiers made on
foreign battlefields, and recounted
the staggering loss facing the world
on the first Armistice Day twelve
years ago.

He said the property loss at
that time was \$300,000,000,000 with
12,000,000 lives having been sacri-
ficed on the altar of war. In
addition, there were 2,000,000
crippled men to return to their homes
to bear living testimony to the
horrors of the great conflict. He
declared that this awful toll should
cause men to turn away from
thoughts of war, and inspire them
to try and carry on to permanent
peace.

Discussing the changes that had
taken place since the end of the
war, he asserted that nations were
aided in time of distress even at
this moment were turning hands
of economic hatred toward us, and
that Heaven alone could say what
consequences were wrapped up in
this attitude. "We cannot turn
our backs on history," the speaker
declared. Economic conditions, he
said, had been the cause of wars in
the past, and that war even now
had not been obliterated, the dan-
ger of armed conflict had not pass-
ed.

He declared that the objective of
war—peace—had not been accom-
plished. The bugle call which de-
noted the signing of the Armistice
did not end war—it was merely a
cessation of hostilities—not an end-
ing of war or orderly adjustment
of conditions.

He said he did not intend to
make a plea for the League of

Nations, but expressed the hope
that the ideas advocated by the
league might some day bring about
the ending of wars so that "these
men may not have died in vain."

He discussed the dangers con-
fronting the nation at this time,
and paid special attention to the
situation in North Carolina. He
deplored the teaching of the doc-
trine of "high bred" Communism in
this state, and vigorously declared
that "the flag shall never dip in
salute to Lenin." He deplored
the wide-spread tendency toward
lynching, vicious suggestion against
judicial integrity, and the forces
tending to disrupt the economic
life of the community and create
"rich" people at the expense of the
poor.

He told the Legionnaires that by
combating the spread of such
conditions they should be able to
render a high type of service to
the Commonwealth. He said it was
a great thing to die for one's coun-
try, but a still greater thing to live
for one's country. He concluded his
address with an inspirational toast
to the American flag.

During the afternoon and even-
ing special picture programs were
presented at the two theatres un-
der auspices of the Legion. The
picture at the State was "Lottery
Bride," and the New Theatre fea-
tured "Under a Texas Moon".
Good attendance was reported at
all shows.

After the exercises at the
college the Legionnaires and veter-
ans of all wars enjoyed a deligh-
tful spread of barbecue.

COTTON MARKET

New York, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 4 to 10 points on overnight buying orders which were attributed partly to the trade and a continuation of the covering movement which developed here yesterday afternoon.

New December sold up to 10.98 and May to 11.64 on this early demand, but offerings increased after the call and prices showed reaction of 3 to 10 points from the best by the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables said there had been covering, local and continental buying supplied by realizing in that market and reported a poor demand for cotton cloths from India and China, but fair sales to the Argentine.

The New York cotton exchange service estimated domestic consumption of cotton of all growths for October at 441,000 bales compared with 395,000 in September and 639,000 in October a year ago.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The stock market was a pallid affair during the early hours of trading today, but yesterday's flush of recovery reappeared during the afternoon, with announcement of firmer copper prices.

The market was quiet but save in a few prominent shares, it was unable to resist light selling pressure, and loss of 2 to 5 points were numerous. An unexpected advance of 1-2 cent in copper to 10 cents a pound, with reports that large producers were holding out for still higher prices, caused a rally in the copper shares, but further heaviness in the copper shares which gradually spread throughout much of the list kept the market unsettled.

U. S. Steel sold off 2 points, then recovered. American Telephone dropped 4 and recovered 2. Shares declining 3 to 5 points to new lows included Union Pacific, Atchafalaya, Missouri Pacific, preferred, Radio preferred B, Penn. Lehigh Valley and American Tobacco B.

Shares selling off 2 to 4 included American Water Works, DuPont, Air Reduction, American Gas, Coca Cola, Consolidated Gas, General Electric, Radio, Westinghouse and Allegheny Corp., Kennecott and Cerro de Pasco rallied 2 and Anaconda 1.

The weekly steel trade reviews showed further pronounced slump in ingot output. Iron Age placed operations at 44 per cent of capacity, the lowest of the year, against 48 a week ago. Such a decline early in November is in keeping with the expected season trend, but starting from the recent low levels makes an unusually adverse showing.

Steel trade circles hope, however, that the sharp decline in production together with the firm stand against further price reductions recently initiated by U. S. Steel, will place the industry in a position for substantial improvement after the first of the year. "The drastic character of the deflation of inventories is counted on to add force to the rebound in demand early in 1932," said Iron Age.

Call money was again freely offered in the outside market at 1 1/2 per cent, or lower, although it held officially at 2.

Desire Russian to Appear Before House Committee

Washington, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Gregory Bessedovsky, former in charge of affairs at the Soviet embassy in Paris who leaped into international prominence when he declined to return to Moscow a year ago to stand trial, has informed his friends here he is planning on coming to America within a month.

The House committee investigating Communist activities in this country is anxious to have him testify and Chairman Hamilton Fish says he will help the Russian obtain a temporary visa permitting him to remain in the United States for six months.

A special meeting of the Communist investigating committee is to be held early in December at which time Bessedovsky will be invited to testify. Chairman Fish, however, made it clear that the committee would not pay his expenses.

Bessedovsky was for years regarded as one of the outstanding members of the Russian Communist party and a leading diplomat, having served in Tokyo and Warsaw before going to Paris. He was appointed in 1928 as president of the Amtorg Trading corporation in New York but was denied a visa.

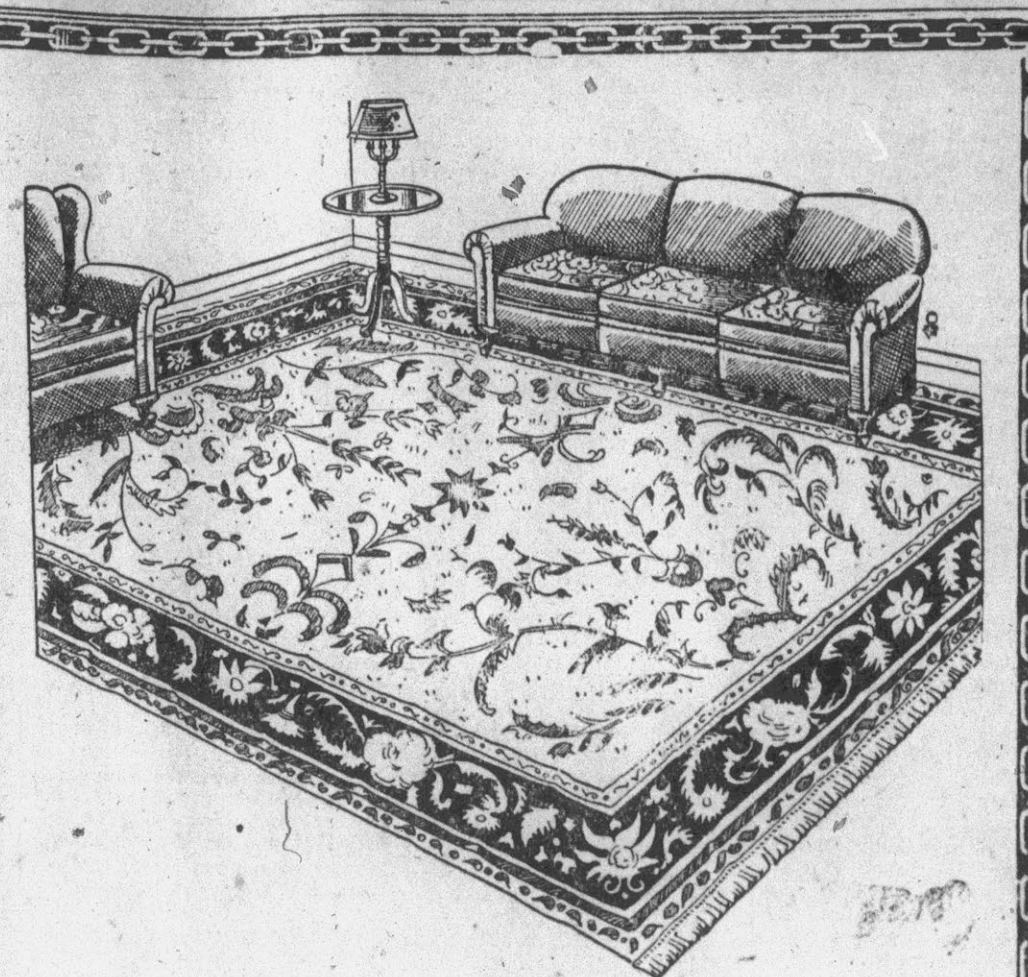
