FAIL TO REACH DECISION ON WAR MATERIAL

Conference Strug- gles Through An- other Fruitless Ses- sion At Geneva

Geneva, Switzerland, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The preparatory disarmament commission struggled through a confused session today without reaching any conclusion on the problem of how to limit land and war material.

The sitting was adjourned in the midst of consideration of a British resolution which sought to summarize conflicting attitudes in the commission and after a rather sharp exchange between Lord Curzon, the British delegate, and Maxim Litvinoff, the Russian.

The American delegation took no part in the discussion.

The British resolution, the first two sections of which were adopted almost unanimously read:

"The commission (1) approves the principle that there should be the fullest possible interchange of information respecting armaments between parties to the proposed convention (2) records the desire of most of the members of the commission to find some method which will provide for limitation of war material in a more precise manner than can be achieved by publicity alone (3) recognizes that a majority of the commission are of the opinion that as to land war material, the most practical method of securing this more precise limitation is by budgetary limitation. That other members of the commission are of the opinion that the most practical method is by direct limitation by specific enumeration, and that a certain number would desire to see some combination of the two methods."

Voting on the third section was postponed in order to give Lord Cecil time to adjust defects to several suggestions.

The British spokesman said the purpose of his resolution was to determine exactly where the commission stood so that its opinions might be transferred to the text of the draft convention.

The only opposition to this move came from Litvinoff who made a warm attack upon it. He rejected each section in turn declaring in effect that they were of no value and did not accomplish what the commission was assembled for. People expected the commission to fix some method of limitation, he said, and did not care whether the members of the commission "are good fellows or whether they are inspired by pure motives and high purposes."

The confusion in procedure became so marked today with the profusion of proposals being dumped before the commission that Lord Cecil threw up his hands as if in despair saying to Chairman Tardieu: "I beseech the chairman to let us have something clear and definite to vote on."

The French delegate informed the commission today that before this session ends he will answer certain questions raised by Count Von Bernstorff and insists that they be discussed fully.

This was understood to refer to Germany's demand that all nations entering the general disarmament treaty must bring the level of their armaments down to that of Germany and the other defeated states as is prescribed by the peace treaty.

Count Von Bernstorff also has insisted that the method of general disarmament shall be the same direct method to which Germany is subjected. France and her allies are expected to oppose this thesis vigorously.

Gaston Means Investigates Reds In U. S.

New York, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The New York World says that Gaston Means, former agent of the department of justice, and ex-convict, had been employed as an investigator of communists for more than a year by the National Civic Federation.

Means said he could not discuss the matter until he appeared before the Fish Congressional committee on Nov. 24 in answer to a subpoena. The World said he had been receiving as high as \$500 a week salary and expenses.

Gaston Means is a native of Concord, N. C., and members of his family now live there. Nearly 20 years ago he was the central figure in a sensational murder trial at Concord, being charged with killing Mrs. Maude King, wealthy widow who was shot to death while in Means' company. He contended that the shooting was accidental and was acquitted.

During President Harding's administration he was with the department of justice and his name was brought into the oil scandals.

SHOWDOWN ON PROHIBITION LOOMS IN '32

Fess Denies Report That He Would Re- sign In Face of Wet Criticism

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—A climax in 1932 for prohibition's career in national politics appeared today the objective both of its opponents and some of its supporters.

Either as an issue between the parties in the presidential election or in the form of a popular referendum, a 1932 showdown has been advocated in statements from both wets and dries in Congress.

The prohibition clamor, which has risen to the pitch of published forecasts that Senator Fess of Ohio, would resign as chairman of the Republican national committee because of his active stand, drew a denial from him last night.

"That is a forecast made out of whole cloth," said Fess. "They don't know what they are talking about." He reiterated his assertion that the recent warning against a repeal move within his party was an expression of personal opinion only. Yet before his denial, close associates held to the belief he would hold the party post rather than be silent in any major prohibition conflict.

The close wall of secrecy surrounding the law enforcement commission's efforts to draw up a report for the President on prohibition has let out word from dry members of the group that "astounding" things have been discovered. But none would go to the length of indicating what conclusion the surprises led to.

Prohibition interest centered largely today on the conferences for which Director Woodcock of the prohibition bureau, yesterday returned to the capital after abandoning an inspection tour to Honolulu.

In advance of conferring with Attorney General Mitchell, who recalled him from the Pacific coast, Woodcock would not discuss the objects. However, he reiterated conviction that the present enforcing system was the best that could be devised.

Quebec Liquor Brings Profit Of \$9,560,791

Quebec, Nov. 13.—(AP)—A profit of \$9,560,791 is shown for the Quebec liquor commission in the financial statement for the Province for the fiscal year ending June 30, last.

The figure represents the largest yearly profit in the nine years history of the commission. Licenses from shops, hotels and restaurants, brought an additional \$2,248,611.

Force of Two Hun- dred Infantry Sent to Cerro De Pasco Mining Region Where Fifteen Men Were Killed in Anti- Foreign Conflict

Lima, Peru, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Martial law was established by the government in the departments of Junin and Lima today in an effort to put down wide-spread disorders of a distinct anti-foreign complexion.

A force of 200 infantrymen was sent to the Cerro De Pasco copper mining region where 15 men were killed and 23 wounded in riots yesterday growing out of dissension between the American and British mine operators and native employees.

Two Americans were among those killed. One of these, John W. Chapman, was from Chicago, the home address of the other, E. L. Tripary, all foreigners in the neighborhood, including about 350 Americans and British subjects, evacuated in special trains for Lima, 125 miles distant.

Meanwhile another serious threat developed at Lima and Callao, the capital's port, where a general strike was ordered by the general federation of workmen as a consequence of a dispute between the British cotton mill firm, Duncan, Fox & Co., and employees.

The government decree establishing martial law stated that all workmen desiring protection would be assured full guarantee of safety while remaining at their posts. The decree outlaws the general federation of workmen, and states that all those, including foreigners, who incite the workmen to strike will be arrested and expelled from the country.

The general federation of workmen threatened to extend the general strike to other Peruvian cities if its demands of the British concerns were not fulfilled. Workers on the central railways of Peru, the line which leads to Cerro De Pasco voted to adhere to the strike. It was not known if this would send the special trains bearing the refugees from the region affected by the mine riots.

Fred M. Dearing, United States ambassador, called on Ernesto Montagne, Peruvian foreign minister, and is understood to have discussed the situation with him, making formal request for protection of Americans in the mining zone.

The Cerro De Pasco riots occurred after a small body of police attempted, unsuccessfully, to turn back 1,500 Peruvian workmen who were on their way from Oroya to Mal Paso, where one of the American mines is located, for a demonstration.

Chapman, an electrician, and Tripary, a storekeeper, were killed in a futile attempt to drive away the invaders.

MAN SENT TO COUNTY ROAD FOR LARCENY

Several Other Cases Disposed of In Regu- lar Weekly Sitting of County Court

Henry Smith, of the Grifton community, charged with larceny, was sentenced to three months on the county roads by Judge W. L. Wheeler in the regular weekly session of County court yesterday. He was charged with stealing chickens. He was also given a six months' suspended sentence to the roads in another case.

Oddie Doughy, colored, was sentenced to four months on the roads on a charge of larceny and illegal use of state license.

Charged with stealing chickens, Johnnie Dennis of Grifton section, was given a suspended sentence of ninety days to the county roads.

James Holloway received a 90 days' suspended sentence to the roads on a charge of larceny.

Charged with the theft of twelve pounds of tobacco from the floors of a local warehouse, Pearly Bullock was given a six months' suspended sentence to the roads.

Convicted on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon, David Creech was fined \$25 and cost. He filed notice of appeal to Superior court. His son, David Creech, Jr., was adjudged not guilty in the same case.

The docket yesterday was one of the lightest in sometime and required only a comparatively short time in disposition.

Hope To Expedite Action Of December Congress To Avoid a Special Session

President Hoover Be- gins Series of Con- ferences To Bring About Activity of Both Parties; Intra- Party Action Hoped For

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Believing Democrats to be opposed to an extra session of Congress next spring, Senator Glass, Democrat, Virginia, suggested today that President Hoover sound out members of his own party on their attitude before trying to bind up the Democrats against a special session.

President Hoover has written to Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, to determine his views, and those of the minority party on a program which will assure completion of the necessary legislation at the approaching short session of Congress.

"I do not know of a Democrat who wants the extra session," commented Glass, "but I certainly have heard some Republicans talking about the extra session. I think Senator Robinson would be justified in replying to Mr. Hoover with a suggestion that the President fix up his own party first."

Senator Glass yesterday took to task the seven Democratic leaders who issued the pronouncement of cooperation, chiding them for their "apology for a Democratic victory" in the last election.

The Virginian made it clear today, however, he did not intend to support any obstruction moves. He emphasized that he was speaking of the time when the newly elected Congress steps into office.

The Virginia Senator said he had received notice from many Democrats in Congress of support for his statement of yesterday.

Washington, November 13.—(AP)—An administration drive was on today to avert a special session of the next Congress by expediting legislation at the December term, with Democratic co-operation if possible.

President Hoover himself took hold, initiating conferences with leaders of the Republican forces in the Senate and House. Further, it developed last night, the Chief Executive has written Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, in regard to the program for the approaching session.

So far, apparently Robinson, away from the capital, has not replied. Hopes for inter-party co-operation at the short term which begins December 1, have been current since seven leaders of the Democratic party, including Senator Robinson, issued a post-election statement that the party gains would not be used for obstructive purposes. Since the full accretions to Democratic strength will not be available until the next Congress, application of the leaders' pledge to the current term remained a question. SLAYS THREE CHILDREN AND THEN HIMSELF

Prominent Union- town, Pa., Lawyer Also Probably Fatal- ly Injuries Wife

Uniontown, Pa., Nov. 13.—(AP)—Three children were shot and killed today by their father, R. W. Playford, 55, prominent Uniontown lawyer and banker, who then killed himself, apparently while suffering under the delusion that the family was facing poverty. Playford's wife was wounded probably fatally.

A maid in the Playford home was the first to discover the victims. The girl, Viola White, said that she heard shots about 7 A. M., but believed the reports were caused by heating radiators. A short time later, she said, she saw Playford leave the children's room and enter his own. She heard another shot, and upon investigating, found her employer's body on the floor.

All of the bodies except that of the mother were in their beds. The children and Mrs. Playford apparently were sleeping when the shots were fired.

The dead, besides the father, are Nancy, 13, Margaret, 10, and Pauline, 9. Mrs. Playford, 45, before her marriage to Playford was Nancy Sterling, member of a prominent Baltimore, Md., family.

Playford was a director of the Fayette Title and Trust company which merged recently with the National Bank of Fayette County. He also was a director of the merged bank.

Friends of the family said Playford had said recently that he feared he would go insane because of business worries. He was quoted as saying that his family might have to go to the poor house.

Despite these expressions of fear, Playford generally was regarded as still wealthy. Police said they believed his business worries had caused temporary insanity.

The condition of Mrs. Playford was such that physicians said she could not live. She was not taken to a hospital, so critical was her wound. The two oldest children, (Continued on page four)

N. C. BAPTISTS HEAR KITCHEN AT NOON HOUR

Wake Forest Presi- dent Delivers Mes- sage to Convention On College Campus

Wake Forest, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Christian education was fittingly the principal theme of the Baptist State Convention today as it transferred its centennial meeting from Raleigh to the campus here.

The celebration of the hundredth birthday of the denomination in the State will end this afternoon with the election of officers and completion of business.

At noon the convention heard Dr. Thurman D. Kitchen, newly installed President of Wake Forest, discuss "The Mission of Truth in the World."

This afternoon reports included those on theological seminaries, the historical commission, the Baptist foundation and memorials. Dr. High C. Moore represented the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention at today's session. H. T. Stevens discussed the Baptist's Centennial campaign for schools and colleges and M. A. Huggins presented the report on education.

"The mission of truth," Dr. Kitchen said, "may be summed up in these words: 'Preservation of the body, education of the mind, freedom of the soul, these three, but the greatest of these is freedom of the soul.'"

The first of the three, the speaker said, has seen men search, find and apply scientific facts to fight disease. The quest for God's hidden truth," Dr. Kitchen said, "has developed man's mind, founded the world's notable institutions and made the great souls of Christendom. Your speaker thinks of Christian education as the progressive search for truth, in the name of Christ, and for the service of humanity."

No type of ignorance, President Kitchen continued, has ever helped the Kingdom of God. Jesus' words, he added, are as true now as when he spoke them: "He that walketh in darkness knoweth not whither he goeth." Christ, at the close of his ministry, in the great commission, commanded "Go and teach all nations." Dr. Kitchen said, "Thus putting education as a distinct requirement of the Christian program."

Entire Hill Crumbles Burying Scores of People Alive In Their Homes; Nine- teen Firemen and Seven Policemen Trapped In Second Collapse; Several Injured Taken to the Hospital; Former Premier Heriot Sup- erintends Rescue

Lyons, France, Nov. 13.—(AP)—A disastrous landslide taking the lives of between sixty and one hundred persons has thrown the city of Lyons into mourning.

The entire Fourviere Hill surmounted by the Noble Basilica of St. Jean slid into the city proper bringing ten houses down in ruins. This afternoon, more than twelve hours after the first of three recurrent collapses, not a single body had been recovered although eleven injured had been taken to a hospital. Twenty-seven persons, unhurt but badly shaken, also were being cared for at the same hospital.

Former Premier Herriot, mayor of Lyons for 25 years was personally superintending rescue work, arising from a sick bed where he had been confined for several days. He sent an urgent call to army headquarters at Grenoble asking that two companies of engineers be dispatched to Lyons to lead volunteer rescue parties now but poorly organized.

Confusion among the rescuers was caused by the death of 19 firemen and 7 policemen who were trapped by a second collapse at three a. m. today while attempting to rescue the victims of the first landslide.

Later this afternoon, three bodies including those of two firemen, were recovered. To add to the horror of the catastrophe, it came shortly after midnight when the occupants of houses at the foot of the hill upon which stands the great cathedral, were asleep.

The first landslide, loosened apparently by heavy rains of the last two days, rushed down and crushed three buildings in the twinkling of an eye. Police and firemen rushed to the scene but hardly had they entered the area than a house collapsed above them, burying them in their turn.

Other landlides, some of them smaller followed, and by the time the rumbling earth had subsided, ten houses had been crushed. While it was still impossible to gauge the full extent of the tragedy because of the tons of earth that must be removed, latest estimates place the number of dead between 60 and 100.

"A sinister crackling like a 'hunderclap,' was the way Pauline Monier, an elderly woman, described the landslide. "I was surprised," she said, "because the sky was clear and many stars were visible."

She was rescued by firemen. Yvonne Charbouillot who also was rescued, said she was awakened by a terrific noise while her house shook frightfully.

"I had the impression it was an earthquake," she said. Pierre Glien, who lived in one of the destroyed houses along with fifty other tenants, said:

"I rushed out at the first noise. I thought it was an explosion. Fifty feet away I watched the house crumble. I still don't know how many of my friends were trapped and buried."

It may be days, so dangerous is the further work of removal of the debris, before the total number of dead is known. Some few persons, residing on the edge of the collapsed area, have been taken from the ruins seriously injured, and sent to hospitals.

Robbers Overpower Night Watchman; Rifle Safe of \$100

Taylorsville, N. C., Nov. 13.—(AP)—Two men early today overpowered the nightwatchman at the Rhodes - Whitener Manufacturing plant near here, tied him to a tree and robbed the office safe of approximately \$100.

Ben Thompson, the nightwatchman, said the two men surprised him about one o'clock this morning and before he could resist had the "drop" on him. He was tied to a tree outside the plant.

The safe in the office was blown open. Nothing else about the plant was disturbed.

5 ROBBERIES REPORTED IN PITT COUNTY

Goods Valued at \$2,- 000 Taken In Series of Store Breaks Last Night

Visiting stores, filling stations and a tobacco barn, robbers obtained property valued at approximately \$2,000 in a series of robberies in different sections of the county last night. Two of the robberies were in Greenville, but the loss was slight compared with some of the other territories.

Following investigation this morning, county officers stated that they hoped to be able to bring the robbers to justice within the next few hours. In fact, Sheriff Whitehurst said he had obtained a clue that would result in a solution of the case in the next day or so.

The largest amount of goods was said to have been obtained at the R. A. Fleming store at Grimesland. Merchandise estimated at approximately \$500 was missed when the store was opened for business this morning.

Several tires and tubes were obtained at the White Owl Filling Station, on the Greenville-Bethel road, about a half mile from town. The total value of goods taken at this place had not been estimated.

The W. S. Tucker store on Broad street near a radio and bicycle and minor articles of merchandise. A gas station on the outskirts of Bethel was reported missing. The thieves were believed to have been in quest of money.

Approximately 1,000 pounds of tobacco was removed from a pack-house on the Lum Fleming farm at Black Jack. When Mr. Fleming went out into the yard this morning he discovered that all of his tobacco except about two hundred pounds of an inferior grade had disappeared during the night.

Although officers declined to divulge anything regarding their findings in the investigation today, it was believed each of the robberies was executed by a single band of robbers. They were thought to have sought money at the stores and filling stations, but upon failure to obtain any, made away with merchandise.

BETHEL WILL VOTE ON SALE POWER PLANT

Special Election Cal- led for December 30 to Determine Sentiment of People

A special election has been called by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Bethel, Pitt county, to determine the desire of the people in the proposed sale and grant of the municipal power plant to the Virginia Electric and Power Company.

The election has been called for December 30. A new registration will be required for the election, and books will be open from Saturday, November 29, to Saturday December 20 for those desiring to vote on the question.

The franchise to the Virginia Power and Light company would cover a period of twenty years, according to the notice of election issued by the Board of Aldermen yesterday, and would provide for a general retail and wholesale light and power business in the town of Bethel. The terms of the proposed sale were not made known in the election notice.

The town of Bethel at this time is being furnished power by the Greenville plant, lines having been built from Greenville to Bethel several years ago. As result of its connection with the local plant, Bethel enjoys the same service as the City of Greenville and the several other communities served by the plant here.

FOUR STATE TEAMS SET FOR ACTION

Charlotte, Nov. 13.—With only two "Big Five" games this week, but with four members of that charmed circle in action, North Carolina football followers will be able to concentrate their attention and perhaps pick up a point or two or how the wind is blowing for state honors.

Duke apparently is not getting excited about its game with N. C. State but an outfit with the material of the Wolfpack has to be treated to lightly. The Blue Devils have certainly demonstrated enough power this season to make them confident of a win over state but an unseen handicap will be on the sidelines Saturday in the law of averages, if there is such a statute.

Duke has won six straight games, at least three of them against high caliber teams. The Wolfpack has only two wins to its credit, one over High Point and the other over Mississippi. Both are admittedly weak teams and High Point does not even pretend to offer strong opposition to a team in State's class.

It's hard to win every Saturday, and the few teams that do it usually have either an exceptionally strong team or an easy schedule. On the other hand, almost every team with fighting spirit is able to turn in at least one good game in a season. State has all of these qualities and the Pack showed North Carolina that it can fight when aroused. Duke will be State's last big chance within the state this year.

Instead of showing the effects of a stiff schedule and regular victories, Jimmy DeHart's team has picked up power in each game. Unless they suffer a let-down Saturday, the Blue Devils will not be stopped. If mistakes are made, the Pack will be quick to take advantage of them.

Davidson is planning to put it's all on the game with North Carolina. A win over the Tar Heels would be more appreciated by Monk Younger's Wildcats than victory over any other team on the schedule. Davidson has always demonstrated that it packs an unlimited amount of fight. All the fury that the Cats can muster will be delivered against the university team.

Davidson will go into the game with everything to win and nothing to lose as the Tar Heels are rated considerably above them on paper. If North Carolina wins, it will leave only Duke between the Tar Heels and another state championship. If Duke gets by State, there will be Wake Forest ahead for the Devils before the North Carolina game December 6. That's going to be the game of the year, if Duke and North Carolina supporters can be believed, and the winner will be the state champion.

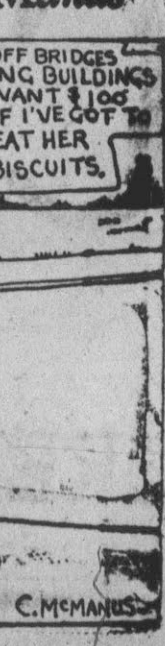

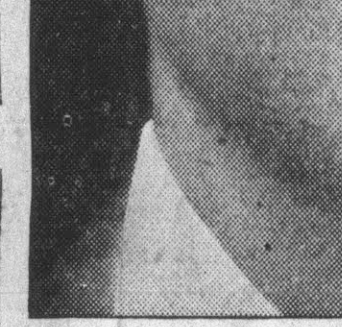

STOCK MARKET
New York, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Share prices rallied for the third successive day in today's stock market—a phenomenon not witnessed in weeks—but the recovery was not continued until another flurry of selling had been absorbed in the morning.

Union Pacific and Western Union advanced 7. American Telephone and Loew's fell off 3 points, then recovered. U. S. Steel sold off a point, then rallied to show a moderate gain.

Short covering was in large volume, as the bear retreat was accelerated by various rumors, which were, nevertheless, uncomfortable or denied. The report that the stock exchange was considering punitive measures against certain bears was revived, but it gained no encouragement at the exchange.

Double Misfortune Brings End to N. Y. Endurance Flight

New York, Nov. 13.—(AP)—An attempt to shatter the world airplane endurance record ended in double misfortune early today. The "American Legion" burned in a forced landing and its refueling ship, "Miss Queens," fell into Jamaica Bay near the Jamaica Sea Airport.

Captain John S. Donaldson, promoter and pilot of the endurance ship, was uninjured, but his co-pilot, Edward Weimer, former war flier, suffered a broken ankle and lacerations. Captain Donaldson said after the double crash that lack of gas and a heavy fog were responsible for the accident. As early as one o'clock he said, he radioed the mother plane to ascend and Adams had just got into the air when the plane refused to function and settled toward the water.

About five hours later a second plane was aloft to make contact with the American Legion but it was too late.

The endurance ship engine began to sputter and Captain Donaldson glided down, as the plane hit the roadway the landing gear was torn off and the ship burst into flames. Donaldson and Weimer scrambled out. Both were taken to a hospital.

The "American Legion" had flown only 16 hours toward the record of 67 hours set by Dale Jackson and Forrest O'Brien last summer, when the mishap occurred.

Condemned Man Thanks Court For Decision

West Palm Beach, Fla. Nov. 13.—(AP)—T. Southworth today expressed "thanks" to the State Supreme court. The court moved to allow his execution in an opinion upholding the validity of the Florida electric chair law, which was attacked on technicalities.

Convicted April 5, 1929 for the slaying of Horace G. Wells, Southampton, L. I. auto dealer during the holdup of a bridge party here, Southworth was sentenced by Judge Tom Rigg of the court's decision.

Southworth recently wrote Attorney General Fred H. Davis asking that litigation over the execution law not be allowed to prevent his own execution. Southworth said he was pleased the court had given him so much consideration.

Despite his attitude, the jailer ordered a search of his cell to make sure no implements for a possible suicide attempt were available. The search was fruitless. Southworth attempted suicide in his cell after his arrest and in connection with the slaying, authorities said.

"I've waited here a long time and know I should go to the chair. I want to go," asserted Southworth.

Five other condemned slayers, whose executions have been held in abeyance pending the outcome of the litigation were affected by the decision. New dates for the executions are to be set by the governor.

Clerical Error Not To Vitate N. C. Game Laws

Raleigh, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Clerical errors, which if uncorrected will destroy an Act of the Legislature or defeat its operation, will not be allowed to vitiate a statute in this State when the North Carolina Supreme court is called upon to interpret the law.

In an opinion of file here today, the court held that an error in the writing of an amendment to the state game Act, an error which was obvious to the court, would not be sufficient to take away the force of the entire law.

The case came before the Su-

preme court on the appeal of Bryant and Gaston Sizemore, of Stokes county, who were convicted of hunting foxes out of season. There appeal contended that the 1927 Legislature, in amending the game Act passed earlier at its session, had repealed the section requiring all hunters to have licenses. The court held otherwise.

Associate Justice Adams, in writing the opinion, stated that "this is no correcting legislation, but giving effect to obvious intent." The court also dismissed the appeal of W. B. Ellis, Davie county man, who has spent more than a

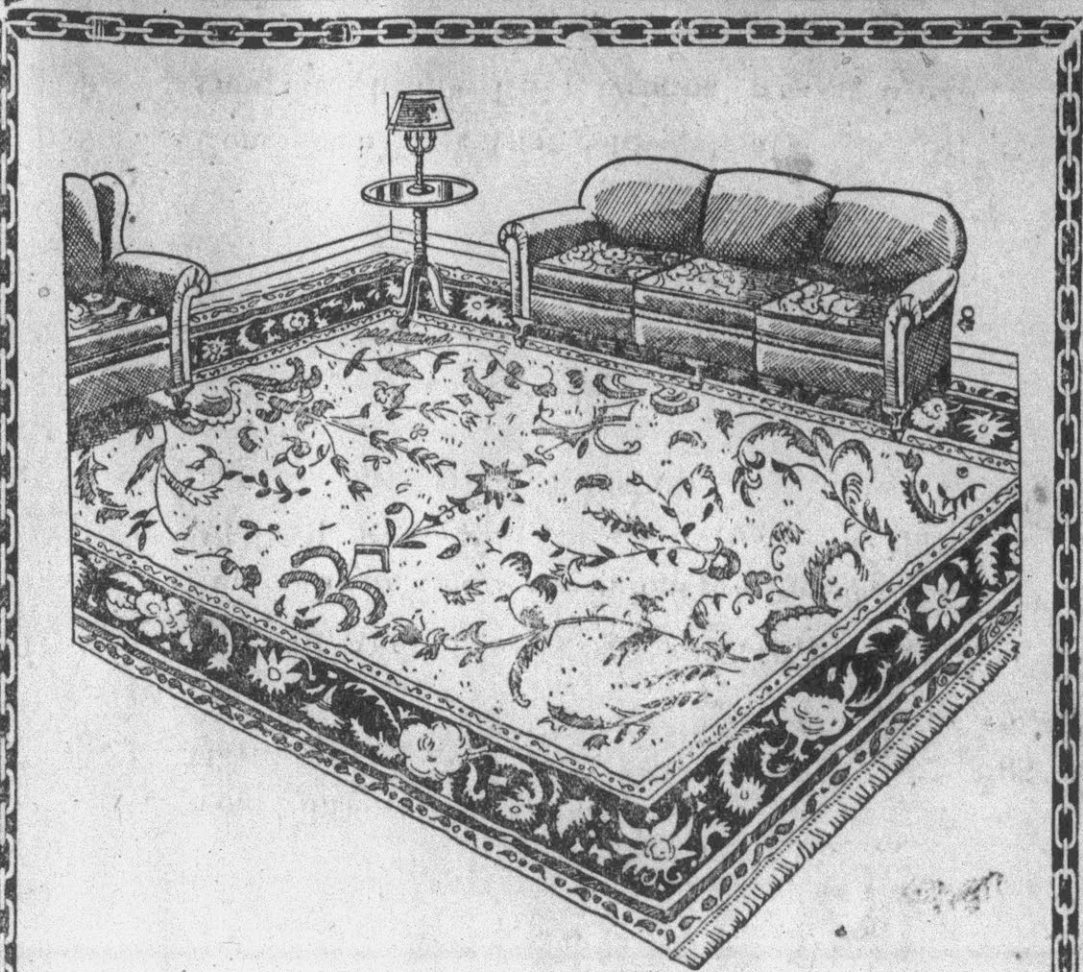
quarter of a century in efforts to have himself adjudged sane. Ellis, in appealing from a refusal of Judge Stack in Forsyth county to grant a change of venue to his home county of Davie on a hearing as to his sanity, was allowed to argue his own case before the court.

Ellis was adjudged insane in New York 25 years ago. He contends his family and the "tobacco interests" had stripped him of a substantial fortune.

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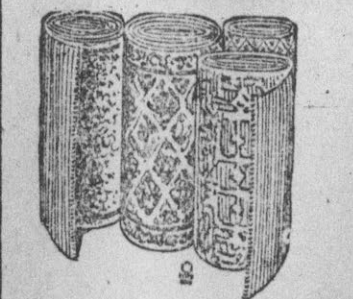
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
