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NEW RIOTING IS REPORTED AT MADRID

Numerous Arrests Follow Clash Between Strikers and Spanish Police

Madrid, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Rioting broke out anew on the streets of Madrid today as strikers clashed with police in various parts of the city.

Numerous arrests were made. Some of the rioters were wounded in the clashes.

Forty thousand construction and metal workers quit work this morning in protest against police methods in putting down riots yesterday when three persons were killed and between 50 and 100 were injured.

Business in Madrid was paralyzed today. There were no taxi cabs and until today's rioting there had been relatively few persons in the streets.

Five thousand university students also joined in the strike. Medical students hoisted a red flag at San Carlos University and walked out of their class rooms.

Both universities in recent months have been scenes of serious fighting between students and police.

Extra police have been placed around the university districts. Scattered groups of strikers milled through the streets in many parts of the city. The police dispersing them frequently.

The situation grew worse in the afternoon. Several mounted police charges against the demonstrators were made.

Free for all fights took place between strikers and other workers who had refused to quit their jobs. About twenty arrests were made.

Strikers warned shops in the principal business streets to close their doors and many shops put up iron shutters against possible mob violence.

Several street cars were overturned by mobs before the motormen and conductors joined the strike and several automobile trucks were attacked and also overturned by mobs.

DO-X Alights Near Bordeaux

Bordeaux, France, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The giant German seaplane DO-X alighted at Gauriac in the Gironde Estuary, 30 miles northwest of Bordeaux this afternoon.

The big seaplane which made a forced landing along the French coast last night, resumed its interrupted flight to Bordeaux at 11:55 A. M. The weather was misty and the plane flew low throughout the trip this morning.

After passing Royan at the mouth of the Gironde Estuary, the DO-X suddenly swerved southeast and entered the mouth of the river. It was flying low at a speed of about 70 miles an hour and made a perfect descent on the water where the Garonne melts into the Gironde river.

The huge plane after circling twice skinned the surface of the river for three or four hundred yards and then came to a halt.

An officer on the bridge signalled: "All well."

Callahan Heads Governing Boards of Universities

Chapel Hill Nov. 15.—(AP)—John Callahan, Wisconsin State Superintendent of Education, today was president of the association of governing boards at state universities and allied institutions.

Callahan was elected yesterday at the final session of the association's three-day meeting here. Leslie Well, trustee of the University of North Carolina, was one of three vice presidents chosen.

Delegates to the sessions today were invited to inspect North Carolina State colleges and to play golf at Pinehurst.

STATE PRISON WELFARE HEAD SPEAKS HERE

Loomis Goodwin Tells the Kiwanians About Operation of Penitentiary

District farms as a means of utilizing state prisoners was advocated by Loomis Goodwin, of Raleigh, director of the State Prison Welfare department, speaking at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the Greenville Kiwanis club last night.

Declaring that the fair prison population was costing the state several thousands of dollars annually, the welfare director asserted the best solution to the problem lay in the creation of district farms where the prisoners might be employed with profit to the state. He said it would be the purpose of these farms to provide the products for the state institutions and schools, and in that way create a direct saving to the taxpayers of the State.

Although the address was the highlight of last night's program there were several other interesting features which added to the pleasure of the occasion. President B. B. Sugg presided and the usual number was enjoyed. Several numbers were recited by the Greenville Social Service quartet, an organization composed of colored singers, who have won much favorable comment as result of their broadcasting from the radio station at Raleigh on various occasions.

Visitors were Mrs. E. L. Hillman, Miss "Ethna" Hooper, and Miss Mamie E. Jenkins.

Miss Jenkins, a member of the faculty of East Carolina Teachers college, representing the American Association of University Women, told the Kiwanians of National Book Week to be observed throughout the nation next week and urged their co-operation in making it a success in this community. She said the association would emphasize the value of books during the week through window displays and story telling hours at the St. Paul Memorial Library.

She urged the Kiwanians to encourage the giving of books as Christmas presents and in that way place more interesting reading matter at the hands of the children. Boy Scouts will canvass the city for old books next week, she explained, and members of the association hope the people will give liberally of used books, including copies of popular magazines.

E. G. Flanagan was in charge of the program and introduced the principal speaker of the evening. Mr. Goodwin gave a graphic description of the operation of the State Prison, and showed what a difficult job it is to run such an institution. Two hundred and twenty-five thousand people are confined behind the grim walls of penal institutions in this country at the present time and it is costing the country the staggering sum of \$70,000,000 annually to operate the prisons.

In North Carolina he pointed out, 2,400 people are in the prison and state road camps at the present time, and authorities are presented with a tremendous problem in providing for them. He declared it was the purpose of the state to return these prisoners to public life better prepared to take their place in society, and far more capable intellectually, morally, and spiritually. The prison is not merely a place of confinement, but for removing criminals from society—but it is a place where men and women are taught.

SALES NEAR 50 MILLION MARK HERE

Greenville Tobacco Market to Date Has Sold 49,307,044 Pounds of Leaf

Sales on the Greenville tobacco market during the present season were today estimated at 49,307,044 pounds by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales, in making his regular report of activities on the local market. For the same date last season the market had sold 41,111,648 pounds.

The report of the supervisor also indicated that sales for the week amounted to 5,243,524 pounds at a general average of \$14.42 per hundred pounds.

The total amount paid out by the market was given at \$736,468.08. For the corresponding week last year the market sold 3,728,204 pounds.

For the entire season the market has paid out to the farmers of this section of the state a total sum of \$6,883,593.63. The general market average was estimated at 13.96 per hundred pounds.

Sales are slightly over eight million pounds ahead of the same period last year, lending belief to predictions that the market would be able to reach its goal of 75,000,000 pounds for the present season. Sales were expected to continue heavy until the Christmas holidays by reason of the fact the farmers held back their offerings during the first part of the season to await improvement of the price situation.

Although there was approximately 1,300,000 pounds of tobacco on the market yesterday, all floors were cleared during the late afternoon. This enabled the warehouses to start out with a clean slate next week.

Cagle Released By Miss. A & M.

Starkville, Miss., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Christian Keeper Cagle former West Point football star, was released today from his two year contract as football coach at Miss. A. and M. College.

President Hugh L. Fritz, sent a telegram to Cagle, in Birmingham with his team for a game with Auburn, informing him of his release.

Cagle several days ago asked the college president to release him November 25, in order that he might play professional football. Cagle plans to leave here Monday to join the New York Giants and play in a game against the Green-bay, Wis. Packers.

Golfer Captures Real Birdies

Elizabeth City, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Whit Woodley staged a wild goose chase over the links of the local golf course—and got the wild goose.

He is busy now perusing provisions of the migratory bird treaty to determine whether his birdie was in accordance with the rules.

The goose strolled from the marshes, and Woodley, bank cashier, gave chase. With his two hands he captured it. Although the bird apparently was hale and hearty, it made no reference to fly.

HOOVER SEES DEFICIT FOR PRESENT YEAR

View Reduces Hope of Maintaining Current Reduced Income Tax Rate

Washington, Nov. 15.—(AP)—President Hoover believes the end of the fiscal year and his view today reduced hope of maintaining the current reduced income tax rate.

The necessary expenditures are expected by the president, without cause for alarm, to exceed revenue "by a comparatively small percentage."

"As we have had surpluses over many years," he said yesterday, "We probably can stand a small deficit over one year without disturbing the stability of the government."

He did not say the temporary one percent income tax cut made last year would have to be abandoned, but the chairman of the Senate Finance committee, Senator Smoot of Utah, said he opposed continuance of the reduction. His word on fiscal affairs is considered authoritative and so is that of Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, who had preceded the Utah-an in saying he did not believe the low rate could be renewed.

President Hoover said final consideration of appropriations estimates was being held up to afford the maximum possible information on the government's income. Among other items the amount he will recommend for expediting public construction has not been determined.

Earlier in the year both the Chief Executive and Secretary Mellon had voiced confidence the emergency rates could be continued this year. Their expressions had followed, however, a prediction by treasury experts that the extended reduction had little chance.

FLIERS WILL REMAIN HERE THRU SUNDAY

Good Will Aviators to Continue Exhibitions At Hooker Field One More Day

The Good Will fliers, who have been in Greenville the past week putting on exhibitions of stunt flying, will remain here over the week-end, it was announced today. One plane will be held here over Sunday and will pull off several stunts over the Hooker Field, on the Ayden highway, on the outskirts of the city.

The fliers stated that considerable interest had been manifested in flying by local citizens during the past week, and it was this fact that caused them to decide to remain here through Sunday.

It was stated that although local people exhibited strong interest in flying, they were apparently afraid of the chance involved in making a trip through the clouds. This was attributed largely to the lack of aviation in this community, and should be overcome, it was believed, by closer contact with men interested in development of aviation and actual flying.

The fliers are visiting several states of the Southland for the purpose of determining the air-mindedness of the various communities. Their findings are reported to the Aeronautical department so that the department may be fully familiar with conditions existing throughout the nation.

In order to encourage interest in flying, the Good Will fliers have been taking passengers for a spin through the skies at a charge of \$1.00 per passenger. Numbers of persons have taken advantage of the offer. It is not a money-making proposition, but a step in looking to the elimination of fear of flying as encountered in communities isolated from the great aviation centers of the country.

The fliers expressed appreciation of the many courtesies which have been shown them during the visit here, and expressed belief that development of aviation here held bright promises for the future.

The Good Will fliers are headed by Major W. C. Brooks, who has won considerable recognition in the field of aviation. The other members of the organization have seen long service in the air, and are experienced stunt fliers.

GIVES AWAY 1000 NICKELS DAILY IN N. Y.

Cut - Rate Rival of John D. Rockefeller, Feeds Floating Poor At Metropolis

New York, Nov. 15.—(AP)—John D. Rockefeller with his dimes has cut rate rival with nickels who, under the Polyantha sobriquet of "Mr. Glad," feeds the floating poor.

He has stood near the corner of Lafayette and Leroy streets every day for a week now, this "Mr. Glad," his pockets bulging with the buffalo-faced coins; a kindly old gentleman of distinguished mien, dressed in light tweed with a gray hat and dark glasses.

At first some folks thought it was a publicity stunt, but the empty pockets were not curious as to the source of the shiny charity, for a nickel means coffee and a roll whether it comes in a wrapper of philanthropy or advertising.

Each day at 1 P. M. "Mr. Glad" and his secretary appear in the wake of two patrolmen who plough a path through the crowds to a spot in the middle of the block on Leonard street. Without ceremony a line forms and the people pass by each getting a nickel from the hand of "Mr. Glad."

The secretary hands each man circular which says: "The amount I give you is small but it will get you a cup of coffee or tea and a roll, and I am glad to do it because my heart is filled with gratitude."

The circular adds that "Mr. Glad" was given up for dead six years ago, and suffered the loss of his entire fortune. The nickel charity had been undertaken, he said, in gratitude for the recovery of both his health and his fortune.

A thousand nickels are given away each day.

2,000 Persons Put to Sword By China Reds

Hongkong, Nov. 15.—(AP)—An unverified report from Canton today said Communists retreating from Kian, had passed through the town of Hingpu, which they put to the sword and set fire, killing some 2,000 men, women, and children in a few hours.

Two thousand houses were set afire in the raid, the report said. The invasion occurred last week. Some 5,000 more of the inhabitants were carried off for ransom by the Reds, and approximately \$2,000,000 (gold) damage was done, according to the report.

The Reds, under the prominent Communist leaders, C. N. Teh, Mao Tsui Tung and Pan Teh-Oai, were driven out of Kian by Nationalist forces last week, unconfirmed dispatches said.

The Communist forces, numbering about 20,000, fled Southward in the direction of Kanchow, hotly pursued by the Nationalists, and were reported to have been headed away from that city by a large force of Fukien Province troops from Foochow.

Secretary of Clara Bow Is Held For Embezzlement

Los Angeles, Nov. 15.—(AP)—District Attorney Burton Pitts today avowed was preparing to present to the grand jury an alleged confession of Daisy DeVoe, former secretary to Clara Bow, admitting the embezzlement of \$35,000 from the film actress. The statement that Miss DeVoe had made a confession was contradicted in a declaration coming from Miss DeVoe, who had been arrested and for whom no warrant had been issued.

Miss DeVoe asserted she had made no confession. Pitts said the grand jury would be given the case next Thursday.

Miss DeVoe announced she intended to file a damage suit against Pitts' office for being held in "Technical custody" unjustly for more than sixty hours and for forcing her to open her strongbox and surrender its contents.

Pitts said the matter came to Miss Bow's attention on her return some time ago from New York. He said she missed various articles, including an emerald coat.

Without naming the complainant Pitts said his office received a formal budget for a criminal complaint against Miss DeVoe for embezzling money and property belonging to the actress.

During an investigation, the district attorney continued, "Miss DeVoe made a thirty page confession," and "a great deal of Miss Bow's money and property was found in her possession."

FOUR ROBBERS NEGRO KILLED SENT TO JAIL IN ACCIDENT AT CHARLOTTE

Men Charged With Robbing American Trust Co. Money Car Sentenced Today

Charlotte, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Four men who robbed the American Trust company's money truck of \$64,600 in a fake holdup here October 1 today were sentenced to prison terms following pleas of guilty to larceny in Mecklenburg Superior court.

Judge J. M. Oglesby imposed the following sentences: Victor Hunter and Walter Thomas, of Weddington, seven to ten years.

Carl E. Bailey, Charlotte, former guard for the bank, three to five years.

Richard McManus, Weddington, one to two years.

All are to serve their sentences in State Prison at hard labor.

The four pleaded guilty yesterday. McManus wept when sentence was passed as did women relatives of the other defendants.

All the money except approximately \$3,000 was recovered when the four were arrested soon after the robbery. Bailey then confessed to planning it.

He told how he arranged with the other three to appear at the express office here carry through the pre-arranged plan for the fake holdup.

Rum Boat Captured At New York With \$25,000 Shipment

New York, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Trailed through rain and fog, the open sea Dory Patricia was captured by a Coast Guard patrol in Gravesend Bay early today with its crew of three and 500 bags of bottled liquor valued by Federal prohibition agents at \$25,000.

The seizure followed closely upon arrest last night of 15 men on a woman and the uncovering of liquor worth \$116,000 in a drive against rum runners operating a fully equipped radio-directed smuggling syndicate.

Arrests also were made in Manhattan, Brooklyn and New Jersey under a secret indictment handed down by a Federal grand jury on Thursday, and the liquor was seized in two warehouses in the lower part of the city.

The ring is understood to own a fleet of ocean-going steamers, numerous motor craft, a string of wireless stations at strategic points along island and New Jersey coasts and a large number of warehouses in New York and New Jersey.

From radio stations ocean vessels were directed to transfer their liquor to smaller boats, which were in turn ordered to dock at points where the cargoes were shifted to cars and trucks. It was then taken to warehouses and later distributed throughout the metropolitan area.

Dr. Humphreys Installed As Head H. P. College

High Point, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Dr. Gideon Ireland Humphreys today was installed as president of High Point College before an assembly of North Carolina educators and High Point officials of the Methodist Protestant church which supports the college.

The 49-year-old educator is the second president of High Point College which was founded in 1923 with Dr. R. M. Andrews as its head. Dr. Andrews resigned last Spring. Dr. Charles Lucius Clark, chancellor of American University, Washington, D. C., delivered the literary address.

Taking "flaming youth" as his subject, "He upheld modern youth as much maligned. "Youth," he said, "is neither very good nor very indecent; neither moral nor immoral, but more nearly unmoral."

He termed youth a pinnacle upon which to place a flag to be fanned by the wind of hope from the hills eternal rather than a foundation on which to build a super-structure.

FLIER TELLS ABOUT ESCAPE FROM CHILE

San Francisco Aviator Held for Connection With Revolt, Makes Get Away

Buenos Aires, Nov. 15.—(AP)—A thrilling account of how he made his way over the snow covered trails of the Andes in his escape from a Chilean military prison, was told the Associated Press correspondent today by Orville De Larm, San Francisco aviator, who was arrested in connection with an abortive revolt against the government.

DeLarm arrived in Buenos Aires last night after his 500-mile trip in which he faced sleet, snow and hunger and wore out four horses.

He escaped from the military prison at Concepcion on November 1, after laboriously filing the hinges of his cell door with a hack saw blade obtained at the gunshop of the Carabinero barracks.

Avoiding the highways as word of his escape and his photograph had been broadcast, he walked all night and by the next day had gained the comparative safety of open country where he sought a horse.

Aided only by a tourist map and the compass of the plane in which he flew a party of six revolutionists from Argentina, to Concepcion, the same plane flew the Atlantic to Europe—he set his course for the Argentine.

Snow and sleet fell daily during his crossing of the Andes making the footing so precarious that his horse fell twenty-three times. At the outset he had supplied himself with dried beef and bread, but lost his provisions when the horse fell many days, he lived on pine nuts.

In avoiding the frequented trails, he crossed the border three times before gaining a path that led him through the lofty mountain range and was forced to swim the Bio Bio river twice by hanging to his horse's tail.

He traveled mostly during the night and slept in the day to throw off pursuers and protect himself from the extreme cold by wearing two suits of clothing and a native poncho. He changed horses four times as the unshod hoofs of the animals became disabled from the rough footing.

Finally, almost exhausted, he arrived on November 13 near the ranch of a wealthy Turk, ten leagues from Zapala, Argentina. At Zapala he took a train for Buenos Aires.

He said the Chilean authorities had not filed any formal charges against himself or Reid Smith of Mechanicsville, North Carolina, his mechanic, and that the latter had not been informed of the real purpose of the expedition. He said he had been obliged to leave Smith behind in the prison because of illness. DeLarm plans to leave for the United States shortly.

Police Use Tear Bombs On Striking Montana Students

Bozeman, Mont., Nov. 15.—(AP)—A student strike, marked by tear gas bombs and campus pickets disturbed Montana State college today.

The students body deserted class rooms yesterday after demanding seven changes in governing rules, particularly those relating to social conduct. Leaders of the strike said it would continue until their demands are met.

Police armed with tear gas bombs dispersed a group of students early yesterday who sought to force entrance to the school heating plant to announce the strike by a blast of the whistle.

Throughout the day pickets stood around bonfires at campus entrances asking fellow students not to enter the grounds.

The dissatisfaction originated when Una B. Herrick, dean of women, issued an order compelling women students to be in dormitories or sorority houses by 11 P. M. week-end nights instead of 2:15 A. M., the former "dead line."

Twenty of Bozeman's leading business men have signed a petition approving the students' cause.

Other focal points were Jacksonville, Fla., where Clemson will tackle the University of Florida; Birmingham, Ala., scene of the Auburn-Mississippi Aggies conflict; Charlottesville, Va., battle ground for Virginia and Washington and Lee and Lexington, Ky., proving site for Virginia Military and Kentucky.

Would Know Why California Gets Best Grid Men

San Francisco, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The proposal of R. L. "Dink" Templeton, Stanford University track coach, for an investigation to determine "why the University of Southern California gets the best football players and other athletes" threw the coast football situation into a turmoil today.

"The future of Pacific Coast athletics depends on an investigation," Templeton told a gathering of California and Stanford alumni and officials at Oakland yesterday.

Coach Howard Jones of the University of Southern California, at Los Angeles, issued a quick reply, asking the Stanford coach to "prove his insinuations or shut up."

The turmoil evidently centered around the 74 to 0 defeat handed California by Southern California.

"Until Stanford and California get a break on athletic material there is no chance for them to compete with Southern California on an even basis," Templeton declared.

"All coaches know that the first principle of success is man power," he said. "They've made a lot of accusation. Now let's have some proof."

Coach Jones declared the veiled charges of subsidizing demanded proof.

"If either Templeton or these California supporters with their veiled remarks on subsidizing have anything to prove, I'll be more than glad to listen," he said. "They've made a lot of accusation. Now let's have some proof."

Coach Jones said except for three men the 1929 Trojan football team was the same eleven which lost to California 15 to 7 in 1928 after which no hint of subsidizing were heard.

W. B. Owens, Stanford professor and president of the Pacific Coast conference, said Templeton's remarks were his personal opinions and did not represent Stanford's attitude.

SPORTS SLANTS

For a change, this little story is about a small college star, one of the youths who might have his name frequently in the big headlines and a lot of chatter about his all-America qualifications, if he happened to be playing on a team such as Yale and Notre Dame or Southern California.

His name is Kermit Lange, which sounds good enough to remember, anyway. He is the backfield star of Baker College, Baldwin, Kansas.

In his first six games he scored a total of 115 points, in any league.

Of course Baker College doesn't figure much in the headlines outside of Kansas, and Lange's name will not be widely mentioned, but the town of Baldwin is satisfied the all-American pickers have overlooked a very good thing.

And why not? Against one opponent he did all the punting or a 55-yard average, scored six touchdowns, kicked three goals and hit the line for another extra point after touchdown. The following Saturday he led his team to another overwhelming victory by personally advancing the ball 285 yards and scoring five touchdowns.

If there's one man who he picked up, as the keystone of Yale's great line defense this year it is Freddy Loefer, the chunky center-rush who has all the traditional tenacity of the Eli bulldog.

Loefer was so banged up in an auto accident that it was concluded last year that his gridiron days were over. In fact some outcry was raised as to Yale's disregard of the youth's future by ever permitting him to play this rough game any longer.

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Tony Canzoneri New Champion of Lightweights

New York, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Two years ago they said he was through but Tony Canzoneri, the little Italian who began his fantastic boxing career as a backblack on the streets of New Orleans, is the lightweight champion today.

In less than it takes to tell it, Tony, who two years ago lost his featherweight title to Andre Ross, and a year later was badly whipped by Jackie Kild Berg, floor manager at the count of ten and won the lightweight title at Madison Square Garden last night.

Two clean punches, both left hooks to the jaw, returned the smiling Italian to the top of the boxing world.

When Canzoneri's had was raised in token of victory one minute and six seconds after they had shook hands in the center of the ring was the third time that the lightweight title had changed hands in less than a year. More than 25 years ago Joe Gans, the immortal, knocked out Frankie Erne at Fort Erie, N. Y., in 54 seconds and last summer Singer lowered Sammy Mandell, then holder of the title, in a little more than two minutes.

The Italian was easily the master of the Jewish champion, who won the title less than five months ago. For one minute they bobbed and weaved but not a blow was struck. Then Canzoneri came out of the clinch, stepped back and let loose with a terrific left hook. Singer staggered, but recovered and dodged the next of the same kind but the third hook he could not escape and went down face flat on the mat.

At the count of seven he rose to one knee but as the time keeper tolled off the remaining seconds, fell again, tried to get up and staggered through the ropes a defeated champion.

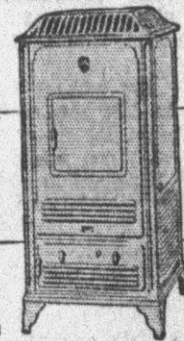

"The problem of unemployment has assumed in the past few years an entirely new aspect," R. C. Deal, member of the faculty of East Carolina Teachers College, told members of the Eighth District Welfare conference which met here recently.

"Instead of the unemployed facing a short period of lack of work he is now facing an indefinite and indeterminate period of no work with all the attendant ills and evils that go with it," Mr. Deal continued. "The idea that no one in this country can suffer if he is willing to work is no longer a fact. The contrary, indeed, is true. David, I believe, said he had never seen the need of the righteous begging bread. I have seen what the great Psalmist did not see. At least, I have seen the seed of the righteous object of charity.

"To attempt to enumerate the causes of unemployment and dependency would require considerable time. I shall attempt only to include the causes in this statement. We have exploited nature beyond our social and economic evolution. We have hitched two horses to the sulky plow without considering what has become of the man who walked behind the other walking plow, or what has become of the man who made the Dixie plow.

"We have been mechanically and scientifically striding along in seven league boots, while socially and economically, we have been tripping in dance slippers. We have installed the Mergenthaler type-setting machine and have not concerned ourselves with the six type setters that it displaced. We have employed the moving machine, harvester and binder and have not even wondered what has become of the scythe and scythe maker.

"In time of prosperity we have employed thousands of laborers and in time of adversity have simply turned them loose.

"The natural result, with no criminal blame attached to anyone is that these twin sisters of misery, unemployment and dependency, are walking hand in hand throughout our land, and unless signs fail, promise not to be visitors but permanent dwellers with us.

"The problem is a distressing one, and no assurance of a solution is going to be had until both government and private agencies awaken to the seriousness of the situation, and awaken to the realization of the fact that the problem is both economic and social.

"Economically, the situation will eventually become impossible, for it will simply mean that those employed and those who are not em-

played and are making more and more to take care of those who are not employed and are making less and less. In addition, as the ranks of the unemployed increase, wages and opportunities for wages will decrease. The result of this situation has in time past been revolution, sometimes anarchy, and in one nation at least has resulted in Bolshevism. Understand, please, that I am not prophesying this. Such a condition in this country can be forestalled, but such a condition is by no means unimaginable.

"Men hungry become men desperate and men desperate are after men without reason. Just as the situation economically may become impossible, if unemployment and dependency increase to a certain point, the situation socially may become intolerable. Self-respect in the laboring man is lost if unemployment continues. Laws are disregarded, crime increases, the family disintegrates, education is curtailed, illegitimacy and immorality becomes more prevalent, disease more common, and almost every form of petty vice flourishes.

"Simply altruism is not going to solve the problem. If the question is propounded, 'Am I my brother's keeper?' answers will fall in three classes. Some will say, 'No. I am not responsible for his condition.' A second class will say 'Yes. A third class by far outnumbering the other class will say 'Yes, but I do not have to keep him too long.' The salvation of the situation lies in the fact that government agencies and private agencies, working wisely and in time can solve the problem. At least to the extent that it will cease to be a menace."

County officers are to be congratulated upon their quick work in rounding up the principal in the series of robberies which occurred in different parts of the county on Wednesday night. It goes to show the sleuths are right on the job and capable of handling such cases with commendable dispatch.

With the number of robberies reported from other parts of the nation from time to time, it would be well for the officers to keep their eyes always open for the appearance of robbers in this community. Eternal vigilance may mean the saving of a considerable amount of property.

Greenville Boy Scouts made their second round of the Bundle Day drive today. Hope has been expressed that the public would give liberally to the cause and in that way enable the boys to carry relief to scores of poorly clad people in this community.

The first Bundle Day drive was launched last Saturday, but the collection of clothing was not the success expected, and Scout leaders decided to make another round today.

The public should do everything possible to encourage the Scouts in this work in behalf of humanity. It is one of the greatest causes in which they could be engaged and with public co-operation they should be inspired to render a higher type of service in the years to come.

It was the second sight-seeing trip she has made since her arrival yesterday morning.
It was understood this morning whether Mrs. Hoover would leave Asheville at 9 o'clock this afternoon or 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon to return to Washington, D. C., as on Friday, Mrs. Hoover today was motoring with Mr. and Mrs. Fred L. Seely, friends of the Hoovers.
On her motor trip yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Hoover visited Biltmore estate, Biltmore forest, and Grove Park. She was impressed with the unusual coloring of the fall foliage of the Western North Carolina mountains, and with the region's rugged beauty. She was interested in the city's school buildings and its business section.
Mrs. Hoover was accompanied here by two secret service operatives. She was met at the Biltmore station by Mr. and Mrs. Seely and by James H. Wood, division passenger agent of the Southern railway. It is expected that President Hoover will come to Asheville about Christmas time with Mrs. Hoover. By that time the younger Mrs. Hoover will have returned here with the three children of the Hoovers, Jr. The children have a nursery at Blue Briar cottage but it is likely they will spend more time in Washington than here in the interest of quiet for their father.

Grandchildren Of President To Stay At White House

Washington, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The huge halls of the White House soon will echo again to childish voices, and a sure enough nursery will have to be established there.
For three little Hoovers, Peggy Ann, Herbert III, and Joan, children of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Hoover, Jr., are being prepared for a transcontinental journey, with "Grandfather's house" as its objective.
The president's wife is now in Asheville, with her son Herbert, who is winning back his health in a mountain-top retreat, while her daughter-in-law has gone to her home in California to bring them home.
The wee three will not tarry long in North Carolina. From the White House today came word they will come to Washington, and probably stay on here.
Three children would be rather too noisy to have constantly about one who isn't well was the judgment at the White House. And since the children's mother has been devoting so much of her time to helping her husband along in his health-building regime, it now appears very probable that President and Mrs. Hoover will have a chance to assume the parental role again.

Wins Life Saving Medal
High Point, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The 325th Insull medal for life saving by artificial respiration today was the property of E. H. Lawrence, power company employee of Southwestern Pines.

Quiet Restored In Cuban Capital

Havana, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Throttled by martial law, opposition to the administration of President Machado had subsided until today this city presented nearly its normal aspect.
Patrols of infantry and cavalry constituted the principal reminder that constitutional guarantees have been suspended and that a rigid military rule is in force. In addition 3,000 police are on duty.
The government intimated today that the martial law would remain in force for several days longer in order to completely break the morale of disturbers, principally students, whose fighting this week with police have resulted in as many as seven deaths and 50 or more wounded.

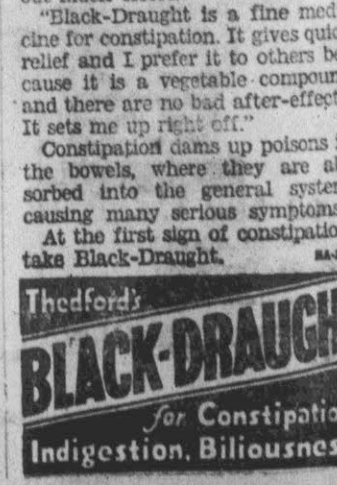

COTTON MARKET

New York, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 2 to 7 points under week-end realizing or liquidation and some southern selling which may have been influenced by relatively easy Liverpool cables.

New December sold off to 10.92 and May to 11.64 or about 6 to 8 points net lower under these offerings, but there was considerable buying believed to be for trade account as well as covering and the market soon steadied. Prices recovered to about yesterday's closing quotations but advances were held in check by continued realizing with the market steady and about net unchanged to 2 points higher at the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables said that hedging and liquidation had been taken by trade calling in that market and reported a fair turnover in cotton cloths for the British home trade and shipment to the Argentine. The amount of cotton on shipboard awaiting clearance at the end of the week was 195,000 bales against 197,000 last year and 203,000 two years ago.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The stock market came through to the end of the week today maintaining the advance from the three-year lows of Monday for the fifth successive day, making one of the most prolonged upward movements of the year.

The day's advances were largely moderate, but the market managed to close with widespread gains of 1 to 4 points, when a week-end decline under profit taking on the gains of the past four days was expected in many quarters.

At the end of May, the market closed higher for seven consecutive days, but the advances were small, and lacked uniformity. One must go back to the third week of March to find a prolonged advance comparable to this week's, and the gains then were smaller.

The market sold off a little during the first hour, as considerable profit taking appeared in the copper, but the reports of large sales of the metal at the new price of 12 cents checked and at the same time, shorts were driven to cover in the motion picture shares, which had been bear targets of late. The list developed considerable buoyancy in the last hour, although prices slipped off a little from the top in the last few minutes.

As had been expected, Chrysler stock had already discounted the cut in the quarterly dividends from 75 to 25 cents late yesterday. It slid off a little, then rallied to close a fraction higher.

While there was no money market today, its condition was clearly shown by the announcement that the \$125,000,000 issue of Treasury bills had gone at an average rate of 1.72, the lowest on record for this type of financing.

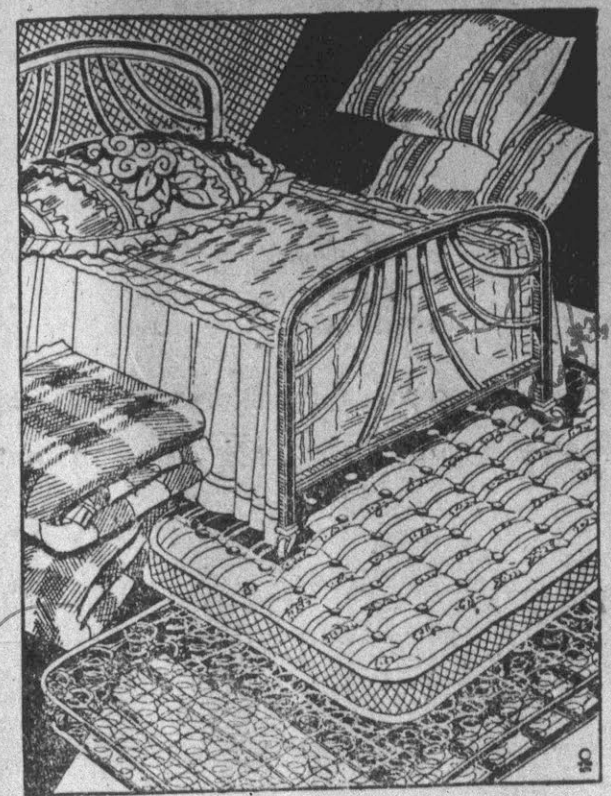
