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FRIGID WAVE SWEEPS OVER MIDDLE WEST

Ten Lives Claimed by Storm and Cold Weather in the Western States

Chicago, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Old Man Winter hovered today on the flanks of the Northwest. Advancing across the international boundary line from Canadian plains under cover of a sleet storm, he struck at North Dakota and Minnesota with a blizzard while a gale-like wind sailed from the Southwest, scheduled to sweep into Chicago, routing balmy weather of the past few days here and in the middle west.

A half-inch coating of ice in eastern Minnesota with temperatures holding near the freezing mark in various sections together with snapped power lines, hindering telecommunication, and traffic tie-ups, rail and highway, were the booty of his first raid. Ten passengers of a street car escaped serious injury in Moorhead, Minn., when two power poles fell upon it and nearly 1,000 Fargo, N. D., homes were without electric current at various times. The moisture precipitated at Moorhead was 1.32 inches, the heaviest record since August 1928.

The rain and snow extended well into central Minnesota. A strong wind and falling mercury at Milwaukee with a forecast of possible snow, prediction of freezing temperature for Omaha, and storm warnings to Great Lakes shipping as a 40-mile an hour gale lashed the Chicago shore yesterday indicated the extent of winter's foray.

San Francisco, Nov. 17.—(AP)—The United States Weather Bureau predicted that the storm which has prevailed over western states for the last three days and claimed two lives on San Francisco Bay would sweep itself out in California and Nevada today.

Storm clouds will give way to clear skies in these two states by tomorrow, observers predicted, with mercury falling in Nevada and the Sierras. Overcoats should still be worn in the Pacific northwest and Rocky Mountain regions where winter had a more tenacious grip, prognosticators warned.

A youthful duck hunter and a soldier fisherman lost their lives on wind-swept San Francisco Bay yesterday. Carl Hoppe was drowned and Henry Rothman rescued after exhaustion after their rowboat capsized. A wife whipped Private Van Dyke of the Thirtieth Infantry off the dock from which he was fishing near Golden Gate. He was drowned.

Edward Schuff and Clarence Stevens, imprisoned by snow since Friday in a cabin four miles above the camp on Mount Hood, Oregon, were the objects of a rescue party. Ten feet of snow marooned them with but two days provisions.

Search for six missing aerial travelers in British Columbia was held at virtual standstill by adverse flying conditions. Two navy ships enroute from San Diego to join the search were forced down by snow storms at Medford, Ore. Coastal mail planes were kept on the ground at Redding, Cal., and Eugene, Ore., over the week-end by heavy snows. Mails were carried over the storm swept mountains by train.

Rain and snow swept over Oregon and Northern California, at times turning into blizzards. Automobiles were stranded in the mountains and train and motor stage schedules disrupted or delayed. Telephone and telegraph communication was interrupted.

Woman Faces Trial for Aiding Murderer

Sumpter, S. C., Nov. 17.—(AP)—Alleged to have aided in the slaying of Ezra Hodges, 60, Mrs. Mabel Timmons and Lewis Jennings went on trial in General Sessions court here today on charges of being accessories to murder.

Jennings is the son of Frank Jennings, farmer, convicted Saturday on a similar charge largely through the testimony of Caesar Cockerell, confessed slayer of Hodges. Cockerell was the first witness today and told the same story he related in the trial of Frank Jennings. He said Frank Jennings hired him to kill Hodges and that Lewis Jennings secured the gun used in the killing from Mrs. Timmons and gave it to him.

The confessed slayer also said Lewis Jennings drove him to the Hodges home in an automobile when he killed the farmer. Destruction of a still by prohibition officers led to the decision to kill Hodges, Cockerell said. He and the elder Jennings, he said, operated the still and believed Hodges told the officers of its location.

Old Man Gloom To Be Taken On Ride At Chicago

Chicago, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Old Man Gloom, if a group of Chicago business men have their way, is going to be taken for a ride.

One hundred business men, headed by Andrew J. Weisburg, hotel and restaurant owner, have organized a "better day" committee which will produce business pessimism in effigy, represented as "Old Man Gloom," place him on trial, prosecute him and condemn him to death.

The date of the "execution" was set for December 31 when a huge balloon bearing the effigy is to be set free after flying ceremonies in Grant park. Telegrams sent to the mayors of other cities throughout the country have urged making the better-day movement national in scope.

Believe DO-X Flight Will Not Take Place Until Next Spring

Deaux France, Nov. 17.—(AP)—The feeling grows here that the flight of the DO-X, giant German seaplane across the Atlantic to New York will not take place until next spring.

Aviation circles it is declared that the motors of the plane have not functioned as well as had been hoped. Although the ship was designed to fly 125 miles per hour it has not yet averaged 100. Dr. Claude Dornier, designer and builder of the craft, insists that the flight has not been abandoned, but that a definite decision will be made at Lisbon, Portugal, from where the plane has intended to take off for Horta Azores, first stop on the projected trans-Atlantic flight.

The plane will leave here tomorrow for Corunna, Spain, stopping for an hour enroute to San Sebastian.

Governor's Sister Passes At Shelby

Shelby, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Funeral services were to be held here this afternoon for Mrs. J. A. Anthony, 61, a sister of Gov. O. Max Gardner. Mrs. Anthony was found dead in her bed early yesterday, a victim of heart failure. Mrs. Anthony, who also was a sister of Mrs. Clyde Hoy, wife of the prominent Shelby attorney, is survived by six children. She died at her son's home, Oliver Anthony.

JEN. BORAH WILL NOT BE STAMPEDED

Refuses to Be Hurried On Legislation Before the Next Congress Convened

Washington, Nov. 17.—(AP)—In blunt terms Senator Borah of Idaho, Republican independent leader, has served notice he will not be stampeded in the disposal of legislation at the coming term of Congress. Returning to the capital yesterday the Idaho Senator used the term "superlative impudence" in discussing implications he saw in the administration quest for assurances from leaders of both Republicans and Democrats in Congress against a filibuster to force an extra session in the Spring.

"I have not heard of any such threats from the Democrats, neither have I heard any such threats from the progressives," he said. "I think it an exhibition of superlative impudence to be stating in effect that the progressives or the Democrats have now just as keen a sense of responsibility and quite a intelligent conception of their duty as the regulars."

He added he never had filibustered and did not intend doing so now but did not propose "to be stampeded out of giving prompt and necessary consideration to appropriation bills and such other important legislation as we know is now pending."

His statement immediately was interpreted here as a sign the independents will demand full consideration for their favored measures. Among them is the Norris resolution for government operation of Muscle Shoals, which now looms a stumbling block to speedy disposition of vital appropriations. Also there has been talk of reviving the export debenture and equalization fee plans of farm relief, which have been fought by the administration.

POOR BUILD HOMES AMONG DEBRIS PILES

Chicago's Homeless and Hungry Find Secure Shelter Against Cold

Chicago, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Sharp winds foretelling winter's rapid approach today found many of the Chicago's homeless and hungry secure in shelters they have built amid a mass of brick, stone and junk.

A block square in Canal street, just west of and in sharp contrast to Chicago's towering Loop skyscrapers of steel and concrete, is the "city of the homeless," where color and creed mean nothing, and where the one concern is whether the police department will become too interested in its "citizens."

Here—in, over, under and between the mass of broken brick, stone, cement block, tin, junk, boards and dirt—at least four score of the city's unemployed have constructed "model" hovels for winter hibernation.

This small group, those who want to work and can't, and a greater number who habitually avoid any form of remunerative exercise, have built a city that reflects more the appearance of ruined Pompeii than structural Chicago.

Homeless men, and hungry too—three times a day—the Canal street camp exemplifies one minority of a mass of 115,000 registered, and many more, unemployed.

The home-made huts represent almost the primitive in architectural design. The materials—principally brick and tin—are more modern but they have been combed from the huge debris ground that is bounded by Canal and Harrison and Clinton and Polk streets.

Some have been erected with particular care. The crevices are filled with mud and rags and dirt. Inside may be a strip of discarded carpet spread on brick or bare earth. Every hut has its stove: Each original enough to patent.

Here every man's a king every day. There is no legislature, no fire department, no Circuit court, and no commissioners of public highways.

The contour of the huge debris field resembles somewhat a golf course. The "streets" of the Vagabond Village are in the valleys. The piles of broken rock and brick form most instances form three sides of a hut. The cave design is predominant as this requires the building of but one wall.

MADRID BACK TO NORMAL AFTER RIOTS

Heavy Street Fighting Reported Between Police and Strikers Elsewhere

Madrid, Nov. 17.—(AP)—After three days of riots and disorders accompanied by a 48-hour general strike, Madrid was getting back to normal today.

At the same time trouble developed in several other cities, the most serious being at Barcelona where there was heavy street fighting between police and workers. Thousands of workmen abandoned their shops and factories in a general strike apparently in sympathy with the Madrid workers.

Carpenters and several other groups of workers went on strike in Valencia and it appeared that the metal workers and printers might also go out.

Two policemen were injured by bottles and stones in the Barcelona disorders. The strike leaders at first ordered a 48-hour general strike but said later that the walk-out would continue indefinitely until the government recognized their right to organize.

The pinch of a food shortage in Madrid was one of the chief factors in today's quieting down of the situation here. The bakers were on the job before daylight and army bakeries were pressed into service to supplement the regular city supply.

THREE KILLED BY STORMS IN TWO STATES

Scores Also Injured By Sporadic Winds In Louisiana and Mississippi

New Orleans, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Sporadic storms of tornadic velocity lashed Louisiana and Mississippi over the week-end, claiming at least three lives, injuring scores, and causing considerable crop and property damage in rural communities.

In Mississippi it was estimated more than 300 were without shelter their dwellings raised or unroofed. Isolation of the stricken sections impeded reporting of the damage.

Mrs. George Davis, 24, was crushed to death as the home in which she and her husband and two children lay sleeping, collapsed in the Red Star community near Brookhaven, Miss. The husband and children were unscathed.

A negro infant was killed near Winnsboro, La., when hurled a distance of 75 feet, and Mrs. Ella Diamond, 72, of the same section, was critically injured. Falling debris killed a negro in the Bush community, near Alexandria, La.

Swirling through a narrow, restricted part of Franklin county, Mississippi, a terrific wind leveled more than 35 dwellings, barns and killed livestock. An emergency medical unit was established at Roxie, Miss. A swatch a mile wide was cut through Nubioke county, near Macon, Miss. 22 negroes were hurt slightly when a church where they were attending a funeral "waked" blew down. The body and the casket were hurled into an adjacent field.

ONE KILLED IN ACCIDENT ON HIGHWAY

Mrs. W. J. Midyette, of Washington Dead, and Three Others Badly Injured

A slippery, fog-enshrouded road early last night claimed the life of one person and resulted in the injury of three others, one probably fatally, when an automobile collided with a truck on the Greenville-Washington highway, about two miles east of Grimesland.

The dead: Mrs. W. J. Midyette, 48, of Washington. The injured: W. H. Midyette, husband of the dead woman; Otis Mann, both of Washington; and Mrs. Lena Payne, of Hyde county.

Mrs. Payne, a sister of Mrs. Midyette, who is confined in a local hospital, was reported in a precarious condition today and her recovery was problematical. She suffered compound fractures of the thigh and arm, a broken knee and probably fractured skull. Midyette and Mann suffered severe injuries about their heads and bodies, and were said to be getting along as well as could be expected at the Washington hospital where they are receiving treatment.

Coroner E. S. Williams started an inquiry into the accident this morning but the hearing was postponed until the injured recovered sufficiently to enable them to attend.

The entire party had spent the day at State Sanatorium on a visit to Miss Ruby Midyette, the only daughter of the Midyettes. They were returning to Washington when the accident occurred. Two miles east of Grimesland the Midyette car driven by Mann, an employee of Mr. Midyette left the road and hit a slick abutment. As Mann attempted to right the machine it skidded and crashed into the rear of a truck driven by Owen Powell of Vanceboro, who was on his way to Greenville with a load of tobacco. Powell was knocked unconscious, but his injuries were described as negligible.

Mrs. Midyette was killed instantly. Passing motorists rushed to the assistance of the wreck victims and in the confusion Mrs. Payne was sent to Greenville and the remainder of the injured to Washington.

Highway patrolmen, who later investigated the accident, expressed belief that the slick road and fog were responsible for the wreck. All members of the party are well known in this section of the state. The Midyette family lived in Greenville some time ago and later returned to Washington to make their home.

Two Fires Visit This City Over The Week-End

Two fires in Greenville during Saturday night and Sunday did damage which fire department officials today estimated at approximately \$2,100.

The most serious of the fires was that at the Rogers Brothers' tobacco storage house on Tenth street last night. The building was badly damaged as was a considerable amount of tobacco. The Crisp Barbecue stand adjoining the building was also slightly damaged. The total loss was roughly estimated at \$2,000.

A blaze Saturday night shortly after 12 o'clock damaged ball cushions at the Greenville Recreation Parlor on Dickinson avenue. The loss was placed at about \$100. The building was slightly damaged by smoke. The cause of the blaze had not been determined today.

To Shine Up Goddess. Chicago—Ceres, Goddess of Grain who overlooks Chicago, is to be kept shined up. A sand blaste will be put to work by an electric switch whenever the aluminum statue atop the Board of Trade building becomes dirty from smokestacks. In 20 seconds she will be spick and span.

Winton Will Not Collect 1930 Taxes

Winton, N. C., Nov. 17.—(AP)—It has been said of man's fate that only two things are certain—death and taxes. But in this little county seat it seems the only certain thing is death.

The town Board of Commissioners has resolved not to levy and collect any taxes for the year 1930, it having been found that the collection of additional revenue was unnecessary. Winton was first incorporated in 1766, ten years before the Declaration of Independence. It has a population of between six and seven hundred and the town owns and operates large farms.

STATE PRISON HARD HIT BY DEPRESSION

Serious Situation Develops As Result of Over-crowding and Poor Income

Raleigh, Nov. 17.—(AP)—North Carolina state's prison "is at this time confronted with probably its most serious problem of all times," George Ross Pou, superintendent, said today in discussing the over-populated prison condition.

Private and public corporations, businesses and farmers have not been the only ones to feel the "pinch of hard times," Dr. Pou said, as the prison has had a steadily rising population and a decrease in income from farm crops.

There are now several hundred more convicts at state's prison than ever before, Mr. Pou said. The prison is supposed to have permanent quarters for 900 prisoners, but 1,351 are now confined in the buildings. In addition there are about 1,000 prisoners in temporary camps over the state.

Two hundred of the prisoners in temporary camps are idle as the work they were doing has been completed but there is no room for them in the permanent divisions of the prison and the cost of maintenance of the camps is much greater than keeping the same number in one of the permanent sections would be, Mr. Pou said.

Discussing crop conditions, Mr. Pou said the prison sold its peanut crop from 800 acres in 1929 for \$43,000. In 1929, 1,200 acres was planted but the crop brought only a little over \$22,000.

In 1928 prison farms made almost a bale of cotton to the acre, last year they made slightly more than half a bale to the acre. This year indications are peanut and cotton production will be a little better but the prices "are not at all encouraging."

The North Carolina prison, Mr. Pou said, "is operated more efficiently and economically than most other state prisons, and this is substantiated by facts and figures." The special prison commission of 15 members, appointed by the governor, will soon make its report on its study of penal conditions in this and other states.

The body is expected to recommend a general reorganization of the prison system of North Carolina, including the erection of a new central prison plant somewhere in the state to replace the present plant here, which has been termed "a firetrap" by Gov. O. Max Gardner.

National Bank of Kentucky Closed

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 17.—(AP)—The National Bank of Kentucky, the oldest bank in Kentucky, was closed today by resolution of its board of directors and placed in the hands of a national bank examiner. The Louisville Trust Company, an affiliated institution, was also closed by action of its board of directors.

James B. Brown, president of the National Bank of Kentucky, issued the following statement: "Due to withdrawals in the past week and constantly increasing rumors on the streets it was deemed advisable by a majority of the board of directors to close the bank, at least temporarily, for the best interests of depositors and all concerned."

Presidents of other Louisville banks issued statements that their institutions were solvent. The National Bank of Kentucky, founded in 1834 as the Bank of Kentucky, and capitalized at \$5,000,000, in its last statement listed total resources as \$54,701,633.36 and deposits of \$41,145,794.40.

TWENTY-SIX BANKS CLOSE IN ARKANSAS

Institutions Suspend Payment to Depositors for a Period of Five Days

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 17.—(AP)—Officials of the A. B. Banks company, Arkansas financial institution, announced today that 27 banks in the state with which the company is affiliated have suspended payments to depositors for a period of five days.

Eight other banks affiliated advised the A. B. Banks Company they were remaining open.

The company officials said they had not heard early today from twelve others, in the affiliation as to what action they were taking. The decision of the board of directors of the American Exchange Trust Company of Little Rock, the largest bank in the state, to suspend payments and close for five days resulted in the temporary closing of the others, the Banks company announced.

A. B. Banks, president of the American Exchange Trust Company, is interested in the other affiliated banks.

Arkansas banking laws provide a bank may suspend payments to depositors for five days and re-open at the end of that period or be placed in the hands of the state banking department.

With the exception of the American Exchange Trust company here, the Merchants and Planters Trust company of Pine Bluff and the Merchants and Planters Bank at Helena, those closing are comparatively small institutions.

J. J. Harrison, vice-president of the A. B. Banks and Company said he expected "at least half" of the banks will re-open. The temporary closing of the American Exchange Trust Company was attributed to the directors to public excitement resulting from the placing of Caldwell and Company, investment bankers of Nashville, Tenn., in receivership on November 7.

A statement by directors of the American Exchange Trust company said the suspension was "forced upon us" by excessive withdrawals totalling more than \$4,000,000 during the past ten days, following the announcement of financial difficulties of Caldwell and Company, investment bankers of Nashville, Tenn.

The American Exchange Trust Company in Little Rock had deposits of approximately \$15,000,000 on September 24, the date of the last bank call.

The Pine Bluff bank on September 24 had deposits of approximately \$2,638,000 and the Helena Bank at the close of business Saturday had deposits of \$726,000, officials said.

Orders Indictment Against Lieut.-Gov. of South Carolina

Gaffney, S. C., Nov. 17.—(AP)—Judge S. W. G. Shipp, presiding over Cherokee County Court of General Sessions, today ordered bills of indictment charging Lieut. Gov. Thomas B. Butler with irregularities as receiver of the Bank of Blacksburg withheld from the grand jury on the grounds that members of the jury commission were depositors in the bank at the time of its failure.

Judge Shipp cited a ruling of the Supreme Court in a similar case and said he did not wish the case to be thrown out of court on a technicality. He said the bills would be withheld "temporarily" until he could make a further study of the case.

Wet Gains Declared Incidental in the Recent Elections

Washington, Nov. 17.—(AP)—The Methodist Board of Temperance in an editorial in its clip-sheet today said the recent elections were a Democratic sweep "and wet gains were largely incidental."

The board said that "despite the use of hundreds of thousands of dollars," the anti-prohibitionists succeeded in electing less than one-third of the membership of the House and less than one-fourth of the Senate membership.

The editorial said the dry strength in the next House would be over 300 and in the Senate over 70. "A strength greater than when the prohibition amendment was submitted for ratification."

The election of Gifford Pinchot as governor of Pennsylvania and the return of Senators favoring prohibition from several states were referred to as dry victories.

"Senator Allen was defeated in Kansas," the editorial said, "but no one would claim that Kansas is a wet state. Where both candidates were dry, as in West Virginia, the Democrats won; where both candidates were wet, as in New York, the Democrats also won. Professor Carroll, the independent dry candidate in New York, without organization or a campaign, rolled up nearly 200,000 votes."

The Republican party of New York is committing suicide. They bid for the wets whom they cannot get, betray the drays who cannot help them in power, and have lost both senators and governor time after time by that route."

Underwriters Meet.
Pinehurst, Nov. 17.—(AP)—The three-day semi annual convention of the Southeastern Underwriters Association was assembled here this morning, with President E. N. O'Brien, Atlanta, presiding.

"That achievements of the past thirty years in the field of public health have changed completely the attitude of the public to health and disease problems. All of us know that epidemics of serious import have been conquered and that we no longer entertain fear of typhoid fever, smallpox, yellow fever and other disease now under control. With our forces functioning in perfect accord with the stand-ard health forces to the world we must assuredly prepare to cope with the increase of disease result- ing from the economic depression through which we are at present passing. Fortunately, pellagra is the only disease at this time about which there is great concern in this state. Prior to 1900 pellagra was practically unknown in Amer- ica. From that year up to 1920 this disease has increased in this sec- tion of America very rapidly. In 1920 there were 297 deaths in North Carolina from pellagra; in 1929 there were a total of 981 deaths from this disease in our commonwealth. In the past decade the general population of North Carolina has increased 45 percent approximately, while pellagra has increased approximately 230 per- cent. Hence pellagra has become in this State a problem of the first magnitude.

"But pellagra, now rampant in the State, continues its rate of in- crease, irrespective of despite all efforts to check and eradicate it, in view of the poverty of the vast majority of its victims it would seem humane for the State Board of Health to establish therapeutic clinics for the treatment of pella- grains, free of cost; a fund should also be provided for the purchase of fresh milk, yeast, and fruits which mean so much to the pellagrins in the battle to live.

"Such provision for such patients of the respective counties of the state would unquestionably save in human capital value many times its cost. The immediate outstand- ing duty of all public and private agencies of human welfare through out the State is to spare, if possible, through the approaching winter the great body of destitute people of our state, the pangs of starvation, disease and death. It is a great task for a great people. In a large measure it can be done."

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Frustrated by last week's prolonged rally, the stock market suffered a pronounced relapse today.

The market lacked last week's stimulus of short covering as the bear retreat appeared to have swept the amateur shorts from the field or the moment. Furthermore, investors were unwilling to make further purchases at advancing prices pending further testing of price levels. The market, therefore, showed little resistance to profit taking sales.

Although trading was in moderate volume, a long list of popular stocks dropped 2 to 6 points. But few came within striking distance of their recent lows. Bethlehem Steel, DuPont, Eastman and Case fell 4 or more, and Allied Chemical and Dye six points. The copper stocks, which showed the way to higher levels last week, reacted substantially. Anaconda, Kennecott, Teno de Pasco, and American Smelting lost 2 to 3 points. Other heavy losers 3 or more included U. S. Steel, Westinghouse Electric, A. F. and T. Columbia Gas and North American.

The action of the market was about in keeping with Wall Street's expectations, although some observers had expected the rally might carry over a day or two longer.

Intensive efforts to stabilize the grain market tended to make speculators in stocks hesitant until more decided results appear. A statement by Premier Bracken of Manitoba that there appeared no foundation for the fear that the Canadian pool would dump a large quantity of grain on the market was reassuring.

There was little demand for call money, and funds were freely offered in the outside market at 1 percent, although the loan desk rate was still 2.

Wave of Banditry Hits Charlotte

Charlotte, Nov. 17.—(AP)—A masked woman wrote the latest chapter in a wave of banditry sweeping Charlotte by firing at a negro janitor who discovered her in the Myers Park Manor, fashionable apartment house, early today.

The woman, accompanied by a man, also masked, was in the act of rifling the cash drawer of a cigar stand in the apartment when the negro discovered them. The man fled, but the woman drew a pistol and fired at the negro before following her companion. No money was taken.

Police were without clues to their identity, but thought they possibly were the assailants of John Spring Myers, 14-year-old Boy Scout, who was shot and seriously wounded by a hold-up man Saturday night.

The boy was carrying a rifle on his way home from an indoor target range and apparently the hold-up man, who escaped in an automobile driven by a companion, fired upon suddenly discovering the youth was armed.

Myers was shot in the face and neck. He is expected to recover. Two unidentified negroes attempted to hold up a filling station last night, but were frustrated by Jack Kellough, 16 attendant at the station. He struck at a revolver held by one of the negroes who fired once and fled. The bullet struck the boy's cap.

Kellough secured a gun and fired at the negroes. He said one of them shouted "Oh, my God!" and he believed he had wounded one of them.
