S. S. AMERICA RUSHES TO AID OF FREIGHTER

Hero of Many Rescues At Sea Again Trying to Render Assistance to Stricken Vessel

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S. S. America, Nov. 19.—The steamship America, answering an SOS call from the Swedish steamship Ovidia, reached the side of the stricken vessel this afternoon.

The crew of the sinking ship, after a council among themselves, started abandoning the craft in their own boats shortly after 12:15 p. m. EST.

Captain George Fried, the America's skipper and hero already of two ocean rescues, the Antiope and the Florida, brought his vessel alongside the Ovidia after a sharp run of ten hours off his course to reach her side.

In addition to the America the steamships Mauretania and Endicott also stood by the floundering Swedish ship which had been taking water in her No. 2 hold.

The Ovidia was listing badly. Before the decision to abandon ship, she had been trying to reach St. Johns, N. F., and had asked the Endicott for a tow.

The barometer was falling and the weather was freezing up.

The America sighted the Ovidia at 11:30 a. m. EST in latitude 42° 35' north and longitude 51° west.

This placed her about 300 miles south and somewhat east of Cape Race and due east of Boston.

S. S. America, Nov. 19.—(AP)—An S. O. S. signal from the Swedish steamship Ovidia, which radiated that she was sinking 400 miles south by southeast of Cape Race, took the America off her course at 2 A. M. today to speed to rescue of the stricken vessel, a freighter of 1,898 tons.

Captain George Fried, the America's skipper, hero already of two ocean rescues, the Antiope and the Florida, expected to reach the Ovidia, which was bound from New Port News to Saint Nazaire, France, about 2 P. M. E. S. T. this afternoon.

The America's position at 2 A. E. S. T. was 45° 10' North Longitude and 49° West, about 200 miles southeast of Cape Race. The Ovidia's position was roughly 200 miles southwest of the America, or 400 miles south by southeast of Cape Race.

The American freighter Endicott also proceeded to the assistance of the Ovidia, officers hoping to reach her about noon.

Captain Carlsson of the Ovidia sent this message:

"Taking water hold number 2. Heavy list. Trying to keep afloat but pumps unreliable."

On January 28, 1926, Captain Fried, then skipper of the President Roosevelt, rescued 25 men from the British tramp steamer Antiope, which sank during a storm in the North Atlantic.

His heroism in that rescue when it was necessary first to locate the sinking ship and then to stand by during days of grueling weather, won him unstinted praise on both sides of the Atlantic and the United States Navy Department awarded him the Navy Cross.

At the time he sent the Associated Press a brief but graphic account of the happenings and for his feat and his simple story of it was made an honorary reporter of the organization and awarded a gold watch.

Nearly three years to a day after the Antiope rescue Captain Fried, who meanwhile had taken command of the America, went to the rescue of the steamship Florida, in distress in mid-Atlantic, and rescued 32 mariners.

Again he was honored at home and abroad for his feat, and after a municipal reception was given medals and a scroll commemorating his feat by Mayor Walker at the New York city hall.

DENIES MORE FEES TO CO-OP LAWYERS

Raleigh, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Claims of the three attorneys involved in the receivership of the tri-State Tobacco Growers' Co-operative for \$25,000 fees today was denied by a United States District Court order signed by Judge I. M. Meekins.

The three attorneys have been allowed \$5,000 fees each, but they sought additional compensation. The attorneys are: P. W. Gildwell, of Reidsville; E. P. Buford, of Lawrenceville, Va.; and the late W. M. Person of Raleigh and Louisville.

METHODISTS HOLD ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Ninety-fourth Annual Session to Continue in Henderson Until Monday Night

Henderson, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The sacrament of the Lord's Supper formally opened the ninety-fourth annual session of the North Carolina conference, Methodist Episcopal church, south, here today.

The conference continues through Monday when Bishop Edwin D. Moulton, of Charlotte, will read the appointments of ministers.

Josephus Daniels, Raleigh publisher and former Secretary of the Navy, addressed a preliminary meeting here last night. Mr. Daniels upheld the stand of the Methodist church of prohibition and other "social and moral" questions.

"The Methodist church," Mr. Daniels declared, "has of late been the target of criticism because of its militant hostility to the saloon and still and its consistent support of prohibition."

"Methodism from the beginning have sought to end drink and drunkenness," he added. "They will never retreat."

The former secretary said critics of the church say the churches should ignore these questions and "save the world by preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ."

"The teachings of Jesus embrace conversion that lifts men out of sin, but they do not stop there."

After his address, Mr. Daniels was elected president of the conference historical society, succeeding the Rev. B. C. Thompson.

The Rev. L. T. Singleton, the Rev. H. C. Smith and the Rev. O. I. Hinson were elected vice-presidents. T. M. Grant, secretary, and T. A. Sikes, treasurer. A resolution offered by the Rev. M. T. Plyler that historic Methodist spots in the state be marked was unanimously adopted.

Approximately 500 delegates were in attendance when the conference opened this morning.

This afternoon the conference was to hear a sermon by the Rev. O. P. Fitzgerald, and tonight Dr. Henry Louis Smith, of Greensboro, former president of Washington and Lee University, will speak on prohibition.

Walnut Cove Bank Closes Its Doors

Walnut Cove, N. C.—(AP)—The Bank of Stokes, capitalized at \$60,000 and with offices at Walnut Cove, Danbury, Germantown and Kirtland, failed to open for business today.

The State Corporation commission was notified to send a representative to take charge of the four institutions. J. W. Neal, Walnut Cove, is president.

No reason for the closing was given.

Raleigh, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The State Banking department was notified by telegram this morning that the Bank of Stokes County, with four operating offices in the county, had closed today.

The statement of the condition of the bank as of September 24 listed capital at \$60,000; deposits at about \$1,500,000; bills payable \$285,000; and total liabilities including deposits, capital, bills payable, etc., at about \$1,000,000, the banking department said.

C. J. Taylor, of the department will reach Walnut Cove late today to take charge of the bank for the department.

Plan for Relief in Storm Areas

Washington, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Further relief for drought and storm stricken regions—sixty million dollars worth—was on its way today to the final plans stage.

Arrangements were set for a get-together at Secretary Hyde's office. The goal is to get the funds at work by Christmas.

State chairman of drought committees in 21 states, members of the National Association of Agriculture Commissioners and members of the Senate and House Agriculture committees meet with Hyde tomorrow for two days.

Chairman McNary, of the Senate Agriculture committee, and Representative Aswell, of Louisiana, ranking minority member of the House Agriculture committee, have drafted resolutions to provide loan funds for seed and fertilizer. President Hoover proposed the step.

Under the present plan, Aswell said, the resolutions will be introduced on the first day of the short session. Immediate action will be sought in both branches so the funds can be available to farmers in the southern states where it is necessary to begin the planning of crops early in the new year.

Charlotte Will Put Down Crime

Charlotte, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Charlotte's determination not to become a "Little Chicago," announced by city officials, police and citizens, gave the city semblance of a deserted village last night and early today.

One attempted hold-up, an effort to rob a grocery store, and the arrest of three negroes, were armed, in contrast to the violence of the week-end just past, constituted the night's ripples in the crime wave.

J. M. Cox, a local man, reported he knocked a pistol from a negro's hand, using an automobile crank as weapon, when the negro stepped upon the running board of his auto mobile.

Chief R. Horace Moore, who announced yesterday that all late letters would be questioned and detained if their answers excited suspicion, said uptown streets and suburbs of the city were particularly cleared of automobile and pedestrians alike by 9 o'clock last night.

The local camp of the United Spanish War Veterans today had added its voice to the many demanding better police protection.

Make Search for Missing Plane

Lebeck, Cal., Nov. 19.—(AP)—A party of foot searchers who had spent the night combing the Tehachapi Mountains for a missing P. A. T. air mail plane and the three persons it carried, walked into Lebeck today and revealed they had seen what they believed was a camp fire about four miles west of Frazier Mountain, where the craft may have landed.

Twenty planes immediately were sent out from various fields in this vicinity to comb the country west of Frazier Mountain and automobile and horseback parties also hurried to the scene.

Search leaders took the reports of the camp fire as an indication the plane had landed safely and that the three aboard, Miss Jean D. Markow, 18, of Los Angeles, the passenger; F. A. Donaldson, pilot and George Rogers, mechanic, had started walking west toward the highway, stopping enroute to build a fire.

PROHIBITION ENFORCEMENT TO COST MORE

Will Ask for Appropriations Totaling Over Seventeen Million Dollars

Washington, Nov. 18.—(AP)—The better enforcement of prohibition planned for next year is to cost more than ever, but not so very much more as that.

In contrast, in the considerable sums which both friends and foes of prohibition in Congress have sought to appropriate from time to time, the government's enforcement officials plan to ask for a raise of \$2,400,000.

The appropriation requests prepared by the liquor bureau of the Justice and Treasury Departments, calls for a total of approximately \$17,400,000. For the increase they intend to offer the taxpayers 500 new dry agents and 90 more medicinal liquor industrial alcohol inspectors. And there will be larger staffs of clerks to handle the work turned in by the new agents, which the dry chiefs confidently expect will be far extensive and efficient than ever.

Of the total, the Justice Department's enforcement unit under Director Amos W. W. Woodcock, is seeking \$11,200,000. During the current fiscal year the unit is getting \$9,200,000 out of the \$15,000,000 allowed by Congress for prohibition work. If Congress grants this request, Woodcock will have 2,000 regular agents, plus 200 special men for big conspiracy cases, several inspectors and the 24 instructors who now are teaching the agents just what to do and how to act.

The Treasury's industrial alcohol division headed by Commissioner James M. Doran seeks about \$200,000 on top of its current \$6,000,000 share of enforcement money. Salaries and administrative expense involved in adding the 90 inspectors will account for that.

Chicago, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The attitude of the American Bar Association toward the 18th amendment as determined by referendum of its membership is in favor of repeal.

With approximately three-quarters of the organization's membership voting, the vote was 13,779 to 6,340 in favor of repeal. In the opinion of Hon. Orle L. Phillips, chairman, whether any definite steps will be taken toward urging repeal, probably will not be determined until the next annual meeting. This will be held in Atlantic City next September.

TUNNEY ELECTED TO LITERARY SOCIETY

Twenty-Three Are Dead More Than a Hundred Injured Result Tornado

Storm Demolishes Country School House and Sweeps On to Wreck Nearby Village; Death Toll May Increase

Oklahoma City, Nov. 19.—(AP)—At least twenty-three persons were killed and more than 100 injured today by tornado winds that did heavy property damage in the village of Bethany, seven miles from here.

Early this afternoon the bodies of seven victims had been recovered from the wreckage of smashed homes and business buildings.

Thirty injured were in Oklahoma City hospitals.

It was feared the list of dead and injured would be increased.

Before the storm struck Bethany it demolished a school building near Campbell Creek killing Marguerite Zurling, 14, Delbert Sharp, 12, and an unidentified person.

Miss Mary Proctor, the teacher, and several other pupils were injured. Farmers pulled the dead and injured from the wreckage. Jack Zurling, a brother of the girl killed, brought all of the victims to an Oklahoma City hospital.

Telephone lines into the storm area were down, but reporters were rushed to the scene. A number of houses were reported badly damaged.

Bethany is populated largely by members of the Nazarene church, denominational school. Bethany Peniel College is located there. The town is about seven miles west of here. The surrounding area is thickly settled.

Emergency relief quarters were established at the broadcasting plant of radio station WKY, a short distance east of Bethany.

At 11:25 a. m. three dead were brought to the General hospital here. Twenty injured were at another hospital.

John Hutchinson, who brought several of the injured to Oklahoma City, said at least 100 buildings had been destroyed in and near Bethany. A steady rain fell as rescue squads worked in the storm area.

The entire eastern half of Bethany was razed by the wind, Hutchinson said. He believed many persons had been buried in the wreckage as roofs and sides of houses collapsed. One hundred buildings were believed to have been destroyed.

More than a foot of water was standing in the stricken town.

Governor W. J. Holloway issued orders for all available space at the University hospital here to be converted into emergency operating rooms.

Employees of the State Health Department were sent to this institution, to help render first aid.

Officers Probe Dynamite Case

Asheville, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The Buncombe county sheriff's department today was investigating further the dynamiting of John Runyon's cafe at Woodfin and an effort to ascertain who wrote a threatening letter to Magistrate Enoch S. Morgan, promising him the same experience, was being made.

Don Fair is charged with destruction of personal property by setting off a stick of dynamite at the Runyon cafe and Clarence Watt is charged with aiding and abetting in the dynamiting. Straley Hall, Gay Ball, and John McFall, who were at the cafe at the time of the dynamiting Monday, are being held on a charge of drunkenness.

Magistrate Morgan said he believed that persons he had prosecuted for law violations were responsible for the letter. He will not move, he said.

Kinston, N. C., Nov. 19.—(AP)—Henry Capps, 40, a farmer of Kenly, N. C., was killed and three others injured when their automobile overturned near here today.

Milton Daugtry, 21, driver, undetermined, is believed to be seriously injured. Harvey Capps of Kinston and J. E. Allen of Kenly, also were hurt.

Police are looking for Earl Kinsey, of Kinston, believed to have been the fifth occupant of the machine and also the driver. Kinsey disappeared after the accident.

Capp's neck was broken. He is the father of seven children.

STATE DEPTS. ALL ASK FOR MORE MONEY

Library Only Department Not Requesting Larger Appropriations This Year

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 19.—(AP)—The Advisory Budget commission today received requests from seven state departments for funds for the 1931-32 biennium and in each instance except two increases were asked over the present appropriations.

The State Library was the single department which asked for less money during the next two years than was received during the 1929-31 period. For 1929-30 the library got \$12,525 and the same amount in 1930-31, while its request is for \$11,765 for 1931-32 and \$12,195 for 1932-33. The Motor Vehicle Bureau asked for less for 1931-32 but more in 1932-33.

The various divisions of government were directed by Gov. O. Max Gardner to draw up their budget requests on the basis of 80 percent of their 1929-31 appropriations, on which basis they are supposed to be operated at present.

Most of the departments, however, explaining needs of expansion to the budget body, have put their 1931-32 request higher than the total 1929-31 appropriations. The requests are, though, lower in most instances than the original budget petitions in 1929. Thirteen state departments presented requests yesterday.

The departments appearing this morning and 1929-30 and 1930-31 appropriations compared with 1931-32 and 1932-33 budget requests follow:

Department of Labor and Printing: Appropriated, \$29,715 and 29,840; requested, \$58,718 and \$52,562.

State Library: Appropriated, \$12,525 each year; requested \$11,765 and \$12,195.

State Library Commission: Appropriated, \$24,900 each year; requested, \$28,200 and \$32,680.

County government Advisory Commission: Appropriated, \$12,500 each year; requested, \$55,000 each year.

This afternoon the budget body will hear requests from three other departments. The State Fair request is not ready for presentation. Those to be heard this afternoon, with amounts asked and appropriations for the current biennium are:

Industrial Commission: Appropriated, \$42,000 each year (the industrial Commission in 1929-30 also received \$37,703 from the state contingency fund); requested, \$96,548 and \$99,530.

Department of Agriculture: Appropriated, \$50,000 each year; requested, \$54,157 and \$54,582.

Board of Public Buildings and Grounds: Appropriated, \$49,090 and \$110,560; requested, \$44,488 and \$81,976.

Governor's Mansion: Appropriated for operation, \$12,950 each year; requested, \$11,655 and \$11,640.

COURT RULES AGAINST HEIR OF REYNOLDS

Dick Reynolds Loses \$1,500,000 Sought Under Thrift Clause of Father's Will

Winston-Salem, Nov. 19.—(AP)—A Superior Court Judge has disallowed a claim by Richard Joshua Reynolds under the "thrift clause" of the will of his father, the late tobacco magnate, and young Reynolds thereby fails in an effort to obtain an estimated \$1,500,000 from the estate.

A clause in the late tobacco king's will provides that the shares of his four children, of whom Joshua is the oldest, be held in trust until each is 28 years old, with a provision that for every dollar of "net profit" earned in a year by each through his own efforts, thrift, and economy, he shall receive "two dollars" payable in Reynolds stock.

In April of last year, Richard Joshua filed with the Safe Deposit and Trust Company, of Baltimore, trustees of the estate, a statement claiming a net profit of \$137,000 for the previous year, and making claim for twice that amount, or \$274,000 in Reynolds stock.

Gross profits were listed as \$50,000 from the estate of his father, who bequeathed that amount annually to each of the children, \$54,000 from the estate of his mother, \$87,000 from the sale of the Roosevelt Airport, and several thousand dollars from other relatives.

The trustee corporation contested Reynolds' claim, contending that the bulk of the money was merely inherited funds, less living expenses, and as such was not entitled to the benefit of the "two for one" provision. Judge John H. Clemens, of the North Carolina Superior Court, yesterday filed an order sustaining this position.

Had young Reynolds' claim been allowed, according to attorneys, he would have received 27,400 shares of Reynolds \$10 par value stock for his \$274,000 claim, with a marked value estimated at more than \$1,500,000 at the present time.

Child Health Conference In Session Today

Washington, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Their "home work" neatly done in printed reports, the 120 experts set to work out the nation's child health and protection problems, assembled here today at the summons of their "whol-bacter, President Herbert Hoover.

With the men and women who have been working for more than a year on child welfare tasks specified by the president, came delegates who will swell to 3,000 the number of those participating in the Vth House conference on child health and protection.

Like a gigantic school, with four separate sessions busy as bees on major phases of the subject, the conference will be in full swing tomorrow. But tonight was set aside to listen to the man who will put the knotty sums on the state. President Hoover's address at 9 P. M. will be radioed by both the National Broadcasting Company and Columbia Systems.

America's 45,000,000 boys and girls most of them busy at their own school tasks, constituted the general theme on which teachers have turned students again. The delinquent, the dependent, the handicapped and the joyously normal shared in the surveys and recommendations handed in to Secretary Wilbur, conference chairman, himself a college president.

Chicago, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The Tribune said today that the prospective marriage of Mafalda Capone, 18, sister of Alphonse Capone, gang leader, to John Maritato, 23, is expected to banish any possibility of future dissension between the Capone and Frank Diamond factions of gangdom.

The newspaper said it had verified reports that young Maritato is a brother of Diamond, who like Capone was named by the Chicago Crime Commission as a "public enemy." It added that Capone was reported to have promised a home and a \$50,000 dowry to his sister. A license for the wedding, plans for which are underway, was obtained last Monday.

WEST IN GRIP OF COLD WAVE

Dropping Temperatures and Snow Thru-out Area Puts End to "Summer"

Denver, Colo., Nov. 19.—(AP)—A long Indian summer was under full flight today, completely routed throughout the west by temperatures seeking new lows for the season and the first heavy general snowfall.

Snow over wide flung fronts ranged from two inches to nearly three feet, with especially heavy falls reported on mountain passes, closing many of them for the winter and tying up motor transportation.

Stockmen and farmers were jubilant in the Rocky Mountain section since the protracted period of fair weather threatened to deplete the range lands and storage reservoirs had little water impounded.

Although air mail planes were grounded, other traffic was not seriously hampered. Trains ran slightly behind schedule in some sections.

High up in the Tehachaple range, near Lebec, Calif., an intensive search was under way for a missing Pacific Air Transport ship with three passengers.

Fear was expressed for the safety of Robert Hamilton, 16, who set out in that area and temperatures drop rapidly as a search was started for the youth.

Montana reported falling temperatures 12 below at Helena. Two feet of snow in the mountains and more than six inches on the range lands delayed traffic in Wyoming, but all highways were kept open today. A light snow fell in New Mexico was accompanied by a high wind.

Denver had three inches of snow with the mercury hovering between 29 and 33 degrees. Colorado was blanketed with mountain passes closed.

Cold weather under clear skies held throughout California with a heavy snowfall in the mountainous country in the southern part of the state. Frost warnings were issued in the San Bernardino and San Fernando Valleys in Southern California.

Eastern Oregon reported minimum temperatures of 29 degrees, while the southern section of the state had a forecast of clear skies and a rising thermometer.

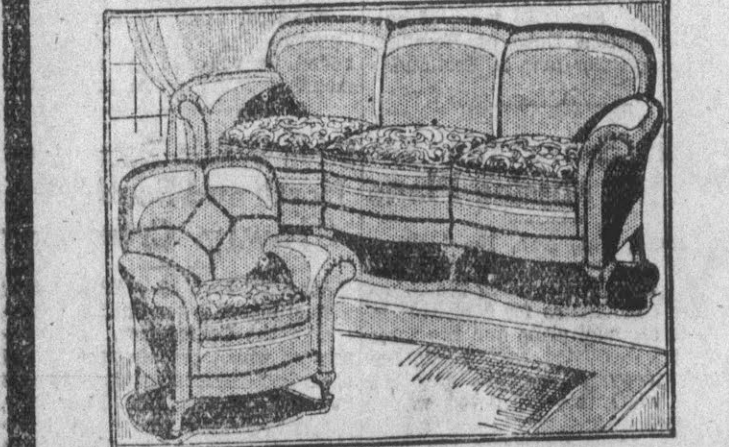

Members looked for no repetition of the bitter battle for control that ended in the National Collegiate Athletic association delegates walking out of the council room at the last quadrennial meeting here.

Leaders of the A. A. U. and the N. C. A. A. were firmly resolved to keep the hatchet buried while at the same time determined to give their respective organizations as strong a voice as possible in Olympic affairs.

Meeting every four years, the association, headed by Dr. Graeme M. Hammond, faced the task of doing in a single day all the organizing ground work for America's participation in the Olympic games at Los Angeles a year from next summer.

Among the delegates were many of the individuals prominent in the A. A. U. convention which ended yesterday with the re-election of President Avery Brundage of Chicago.

BOBBY JONES MAY QUIT GOLF COMMITTEE

New York, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Bobby Jones' retirement has brought up the question of his eligibility to continue to sit on the councils of the United States Golf Association as a member of the executive committee.

In formally at least, Herbert H. Ramsay, president-elect of the association, has taken the position that there is no reason why Jones' withdrawal from competition should persuade him to resign from the committee.

Jones, who with Harrison R. (Jimmy) Johnston of St. Paul, has been the only player in recent times to be selected for the executive committee, may solve the whole problem by resigning. Close observers were of the opinion that he would do so when his term of office expires.

DUKE HEADING TOWARD STATE GRID CROWN

Atlanta, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Drills on the southern football front were confined today to a few stray salutes in preparation for Saturday's Auburn-Vanderbilt and North Carolina State-South Carolina tilt, the pre-season post-season chat continued.

Interest in the New Year's Day Rose Bowl game at Pasadena, Cal., was heightened by announcement of the definite selection of Washington State as the Western participant. Both Alabama and Northwestern were reported under consideration as invading teams.

Cornell Dan McGugin let it be known that his assistants and a majority of the Vanderbilt players favored a game with Sewanee for charity in Nashville December 6. McGugin pointed out that the sanction of school authorities still was necessary for the game, which Sewanee alumni proposed. Vanderbilt and Sewanee last year concluded a Thanksgiving Day series which had its inception in 1922.

Considerable enthusiasm is being churned up for Duke's rush to ward a North Carolina State championship. Suffering a setback from South Carolina at the start of the season, Duke has gained momentum rapidly. Navy and Villanova, intersectional foes, and Kentucky, strong conference eleven, were swept aside by the Durham N. C. Blue Devils. Davidson, conqueror of North Carolina University in a big upset, fell before Duke, 12 to 0 and North Carolina State went down under an 18 to 0 count.

Saturday Wake Forest furnishes a state hurdle for Duke and on December 6 the Blue Devils run up against the University Tar Heels. In between Duke takes on Washington and Lee in a Thanksgiving Day battle, but the Generals have been below from this season and neither they nor Wake Forest is considered formidable opposition.

SPORTS SLANTS

After long and perhaps painful research into the past season's American league records, Harry P. Edwards, the indefatigable dispenser of baseball information, has developed the fact that no less than eight pitchers were able to win a majority of the games they pitched against the world's champion A's.

The research doesn't reveal any subtle cause for this scattered ascendency of certain moundsmen over the greatest of present-day ball clubs for the list includes withered veterans like Urban Fieber and Sad Sam Jones, sensational youths like Wesley Ferrell and Lefty Stewart,

Boston and New York were the teams he failed to upset the famous pitcher at all, but where as the Red Sox failed in seven attempts to do so, the Yankees had only one opportunity.

Grove's record, in summary form was as follows: Boston 7-0, Chicago 3 to 1, Cleveland 5 to 1 and Detroit 6 to 1, New York 1 to 0.

St. Louis 4 to 1, Washington 2 to 1.

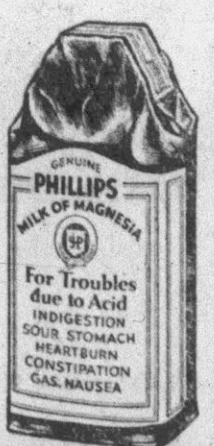

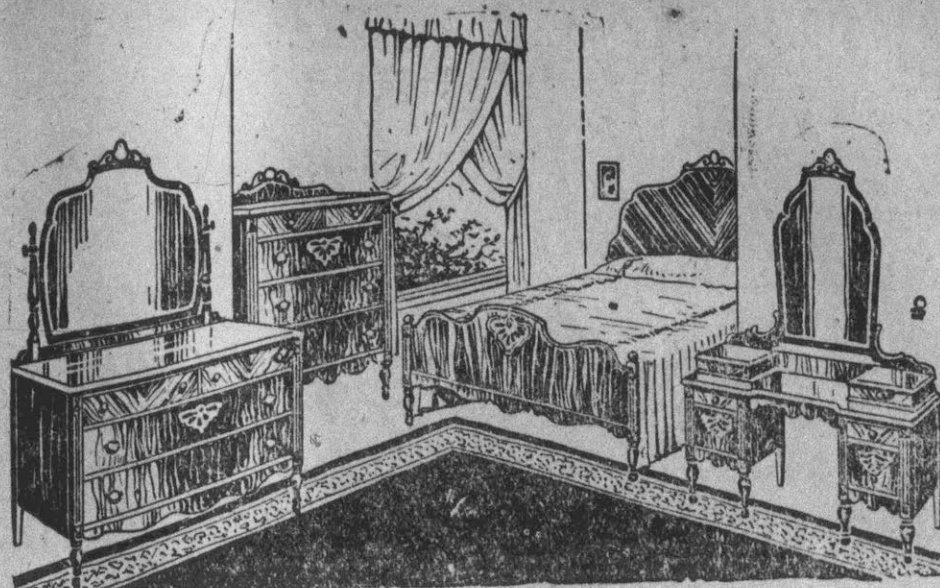
