## Witnesses Tell Story of Killing

Lexington, Nov. 20.—(AP)—  
Thomas Marion's story of the slay-  
ing of his wife as told to them  
was related by state witnesses to-  
day in his trial on a charge of  
murder.

G. H. Gray, garage man, and  
others, Blackwelder and Swanson,  
of the High Point police, were the  
witnesses. All told the same story,  
almost identical with that recounted  
at the preliminary hearing.

They said Marion took the body  
of his wife home, six miles from  
the alleged scene of the slaying,  
came up town, reported first, that  
he had been robbed of \$20 by an  
unknown negro and then added  
the statement that the negro had  
killed his wife.

Officer Swanson testified he ac-  
companied Marion to the place de-  
scribed, finding there no signs of  
a struggle or other evidence to  
support the man's story.

Both Swanson and Blackwelder  
said there were discrepancies in  
Marion's version of his struggle  
with the highwayman.

## Couple Held On Murder Charge

Portland, Ore., Nov. 20.—(AP)—  
Nelson C. Bowles, 34, retired capi-  
talist, and Mrs. Irma Loucks Paris,  
25, his former secretary, were  
arrested here today charged with  
the murder of Bowles' wife, Mrs.  
Leona Bowles, 33, society woman.

Mrs. Bowles died November 12 in  
Mrs. Paris' apartment. A knife  
had been plunged into her breast.  
Mrs. Paris and Bowles told police  
they were in the apartment at the  
time but asserted Mrs. Bowles had  
stabbed herself.

Mrs. Paris and Bowles were ar-  
rested on orders of District Attor-  
ney Stanley Myers.

Myers said an admission by Dr.  
Paul D. Cooper, who was called to  
attend Mrs. Bowles, that he "was  
false in a highly material matter  
in his original statement," was the  
culminating cause for the murder  
charges against Mrs. Paris and  
Bowles.

Dr. Cooper's alleged false state-  
ment was understood to concern  
the exact time Mrs. Bowles died.  
Picole said Dr. Cooper had told  
them Mrs. Bowles was not dead  
when he called an ambulance. Au-  
thorities asserted last night Dr.  
Cooper admitted Mrs. Bowles had  
been dead about 20 minutes when  
he called the ambulance in which  
the body was removed to a private  
mortuary.

## Search for Flier Lost In Storm

Denver, Colo., Nov. 20.—(AP)—  
Storms which have spread a deep  
blanket of snow over the west  
were vanishing today, only to be  
replaced by tumbling temperatures.  
Overcast skies for the most part  
were giving way to clear skies.

Defying forecasters' predictions,  
snows continued in the Rockies  
yesterday—paralyzing highway and  
seriously handicapping railroad  
traffic. Scores of automobiles  
were stalled between Palmer Lake  
and Colorado Springs. The Palmer  
Lake City Hall was transformed  
into a house of refuge for the ma-  
rooned travelers.

High Winds tossed the white  
blanket of snow and abandon in New  
Mexico, blocking highways, piling  
five feet of snow in the streets  
of Raton and marooning hunting  
parties in the Gila Mountains.

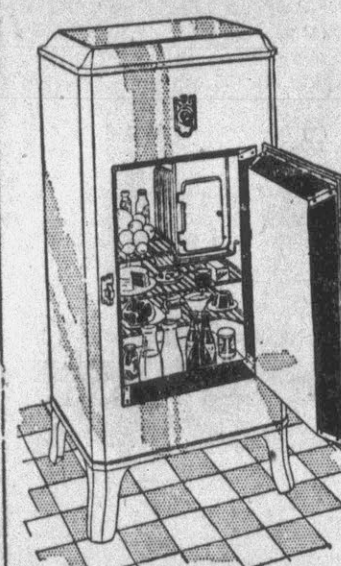

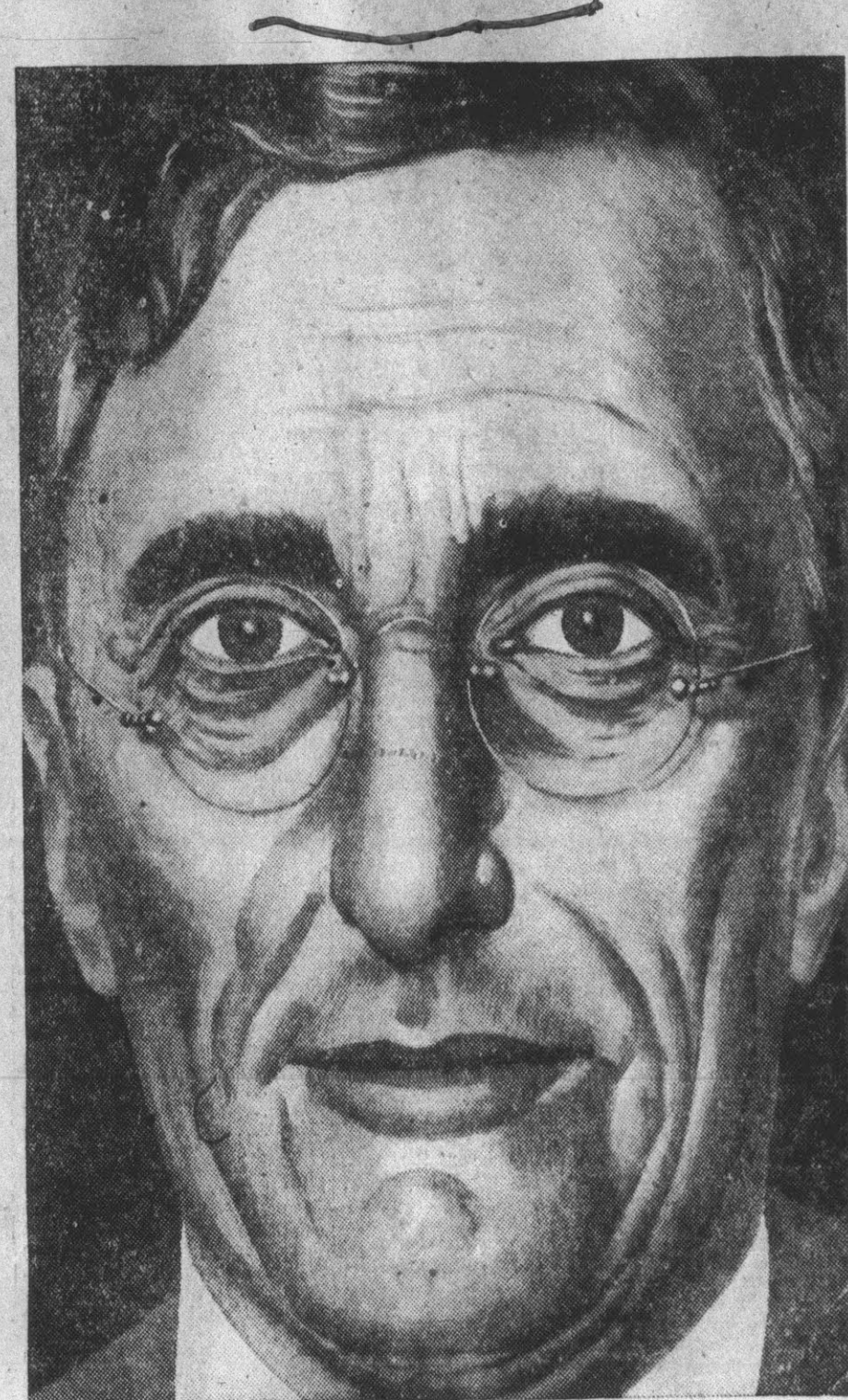

Martin Jonas, center, University of Utah, weighs 178—Best center ever developed in Rocky Mountain district, kingpin of great Utah line. Very speedy and does a lot of blocking for ball-carriers in addition to regular job. Has never made a poor pass from center.

Burt Metzger, guard, Notre Dame weighs 154—Despite size, rated by Rockne as one of the best guards he ever developed. Most of Irish line plays directed through him, because of his almost perfect execution of charging and blocking jobs.

Wade (Red) Woodworth, guard, Northwestern, weighs about 190—Big hard and fast. Powerhouse of the Wildcat line, along with Frank Baker, star end. Besides being deadly tackler and blocker, can tote the pigskin.

George Van Bibber, tackle,

Purdue—Mainstay of another great line. Has everything, brains, brawn and speed. Helped whip Wisconsin and Baylor. Also a good kicker. Running mate last year of Red Slight, All-American.

Louis Weller, the full-blooded Caddo Indian from Andarko, Oklahoma, weighs less than Albie Booth but he has built up a great reputation as a broken-field galloper for Haskell Institute of Kansas.

The vital statistics show that the 135-pound Haskell field leader got off at least one long run in every game. His most spectacular afternoon was against Oklahoma Aggies when he returned a kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown and later ran 95 yards for a touchdown after receiving a punt. Last year Weller turned in the season's longest dash by romping 105 yards from kickoff for a touchdown against Creighton.

Among his numerous accomplishments, Weller can pass with either hand but dispatches do not state whether he also gives the tribal warwhoop after each crossing of the enemy goal.

Speaking of tackles, Alabama's pair, Freddy Sington and "Foots" Clement, so named because of his No. 14 brogans, have been churning up a lot of Dixie gridiron shores.

### Mother India Makes Plea for Her Country

London, Nov. 20. — (AP) — The voice of Mother India was heard at the round table conference today for the first time when the beautiful Begum Shah Nawaz addressed the assemblage to ask that her country's future government be built along lines of an Indian federation.

On this day of days in her life, when she was to plead for all that she held dear in country and people, the Begum came to Saint James Palace garbed in a pale blue sari, or shawl, edged with silver embroidery, and attire which was

a delicate wisp of blending color and jewels. She was quite nervous as she arose to speak to the more than 200 men in the conference hall.

The Begum's appearance was impressive. Indian potentates, Indian radicals, and British statesmen surrounded the little woman from a Moslem family, who in generations past always observed the custom of "purdah" or seclusion and the veil. As she expressed it herself today it "is an illustration indeed to the fact that the so-called unchanging East is unchanging no longer."

The Begum concluded: "India is bruised and aching and is looking to us—rather not only India but the whole world is looking to us—to spread the balm of good will and friendship. Let us not disappoint

them. May the Almighty God bless our efforts."

As the chamber rang with prolonged applause Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, who is chairman of the conference, hastily wrote her a personal note of congratulation, and the towering bearded Maharajah of Patiala, chairman of the Chamber of Indian Princes, moved from his seat to whisper words of praise into her jeweled ear.

plus of \$150,000 and deposits of \$1,077,397.

The Bank of Biltmore-Oteen was capitalized at \$50,000, and \$25,000 surplus; undivided profits of \$163; and deposits of \$115,051 in its main office at Biltmore and branch at Oteen.

Officials of the Lowell bank said its closing had no connection with other suspensions today, blaming its shrunken deposits as a result of failure of Lowell Yarn Mills to run full time of late.

The closing of the three banks at Hendersonville left that city of approximately 8,000 residents without banking facilities.

Other banks in Asheville said this afternoon that they had experienced some withdrawals, but were in condition to meet any demands their depositors might make of them.

### MITCHELL SAYS BANKS CLOSINGS SHOULDN'T AFFECT OTHER SECTIONS

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 20.—(AP)—The primary cause of the closing of the Central Bank and Trust Company, of Asheville, and other Western North Carolina Banks today was named by John Mitchell, state bank examiner, as the collapse of real estate values in the section from a "highly inflated plane."

In the statement issued here he said:

"The unfortunate closing of the Central Bank and Trust Company, Asheville, N. C., this morning has resulted in the closing of the following banks: First Bank and Trust Company, Hendersonville; American Bank and Trust Co., Hendersonville; Biltmore - Oteen Bank, Biltmore—which latter bank was closely affiliated with the Asheville institution. And, the Citizens National Bank not a member of the state system. The Bank of Lowell also closed later in the day.

"In order that unnecessary hysteria on the part of the public may not develop, the department feels that it should call attention to the contributing and primary cause of the failure of the Central Bank and Trust Company of Asheville.

"Immediately preceding the collapse of the Florida real estate boom, a large number of high-powered real estate operators transferred their activities from Florida concentrating largely in Asheville and Hendersonville. The result of their activities was to produce a highly inflated plane of real estate values. The result collapse in real estate, as well as other values, made it impossible for the failed banks to liquidate their receivables in sufficient volume to meet demands of depositors.

"This situation is purely a local one and does not in any way reflect conditions in the state generally and should cause no uneasiness concerning the solvency of other banks within the State. As of September 24, the date of the last call report of condition, North Carolina State Banks held a cash reserve of fifty-five million dollars and a secondary reserve consisting of marketable securities in the amount of thirty-five million dollars, which is illustrative of the strength of the State's financial institutions."

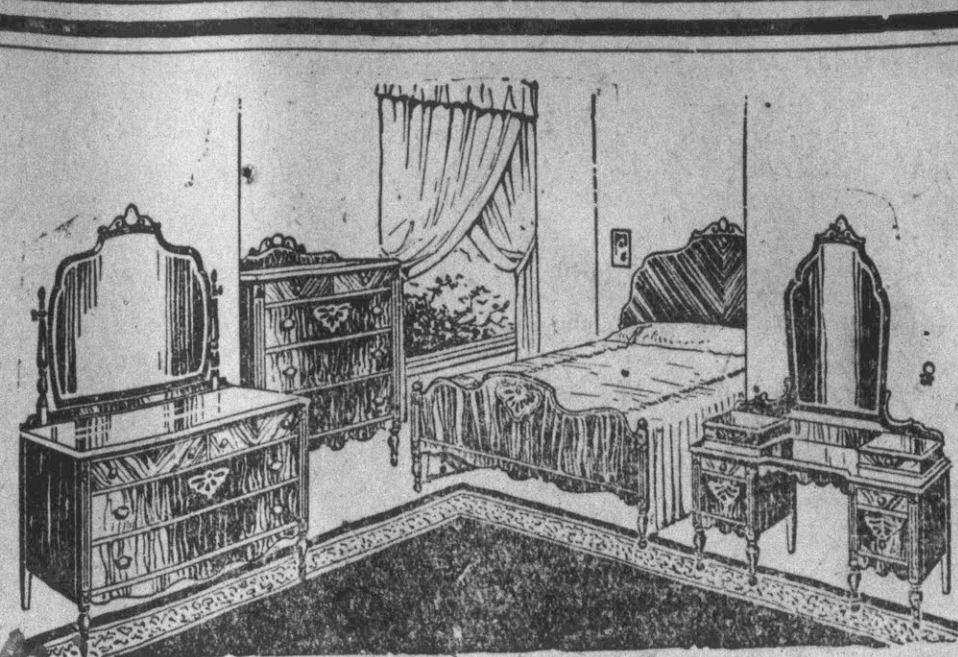
