Two - Day Session of Education Association Convenes At the College Tonight

With speakers of national reputation on the program, the eighth annual convention of the North-eastern District Teachers of the North Carolina Education Association will convene for a two-day session in this city this evening at 8 o'clock. SAYS BRITAIN WILL STICK TO INDIA PLEDGE

Prime Minister MacDonald Says Nation Behind Stable Government Plan

London, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Prime Minister MacDonald today told the Indian round table conference that the British Government would not go back on any pledges it had made toward the achievement of a responsible Indian government.

He referred particularly to the British pledges prior to the Montagu Chelmsford declaration of 1917 pledging the greater association of Indians in the Indian government and the development of self-government in Indian institutions.

There had been much interest among the delegates in what the prime minister would say but he spent most of the time summarizing only the views presented before the conference.

Extremist Indian delegates were disappointed that no more definite line had been given or immediate intentions of the British Government. The majority however, were reported to have realized it would be impossible for Mr. MacDonald to pursue any other course at this early stage of the protracted round table conference negotiations.

After Mr. MacDonald's speech, the plenary session adjourned and the burden of the conference was transferred to the Federal Relations committee of thirty-two members represented sections of Indian life.

Says There Should Be No Uneasiness About Banking

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Eugene R. Black, governor of the Atlanta Federal Reserve Bank, said today "with resources of approximately ten billion dollars in southern banks there should be confidence that fundamentally our banking situation is sound."

"And with our agriculture, our industry and our banking resources there should be no uneasiness as to our general situation," he said.

Mr. Black by virtue of his position as governor of the sixth federal reserve district is in close and intimate touch with the banking and business situation not only in his district but throughout the south. Prior to his connection with the Reserve Bank he was one of the leading bankers of Atlanta, and as such, kept in close touch with affairs throughout the entire territory.

Mr. Black's statement follows: "At this time by reason of the closing of a number of southern banks it may be well to consider our fundamental situation."

"We have just harvested our various crops. All of these crops were large and yielded large cash returns. Our tobacco and cotton crops were larger than last year, and the cash returns from them were very large. The millions received from these crops are distributed in all the southern states from Texas to Virginia."

U. S. BUSINESS DECLARED ON THE MEND NOW

Survey of 18 States Points to General Improvement of Industries

New York, Nov. 21.—(AP)—A survey in 18 states has convinced the National Association of Manufacturers that business conditions are on the mend.

Discussing the survey, John E. Edgerton, president of the association, told the New York State Chamber of Commerce last night that industrialists and business men generally were unanimous in the belief that the nation was "only just now taking a breathing spell in the tremendous industrial strides it has made as its own race."

The states surveyed were California, Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, New York, Ohio, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, Utah, Washington, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Georgia.

Twelve states reported improvement in status and four reported a decline of which one was in the drought area, another in an exclusively mining region, and a third in an exclusively lumber section.

Regarding unemployment, twelve states showed a "fairly encouraging situation," 14 were optimistic of improvement in the late winter or early spring, one anticipated no change, and three which were in agricultural, mining or lumber regions, thought the situation unfavorable.

Industries on the upswing, Mr. Edgerton listed as steel, textiles, public utilities, shoes, paper, building, beet sugar, stock yards, numerous specialties, railroads in some sections, automobiles and allied lines, and mining in parts.

MAN HELD FOR ABDUCTION OF COLLEGE GIRL

Grover, N. C., Married Man May Be Charged With Violation of Mann Act

Anderson, S. C., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Willie Wilson, Grover, N. C., man held for the alleged kidnapping of 17-year-old Esther Furcra from Anderson College here kept his peace today about the charges.

Wilson said he would tell his story in court.

Federal officers were expected here today for an investigation, following the request of Rev. W. E. Furcra, Grover Baptist minister whose daughter the girl is, that Wilson be charged with violating the Mann Act.

Miss Furcra, found at Athens, Ga., a fortnight after her disappearance, said Wilson enticed her away, declaring her sweetheart was waiting to marry her. He kept her prisoner throughout a wide automobile tour of the southeast she said.

Charlotte, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The Charlotte News today says avert attached to the local office of the Justice Department's Bureau of Investigation have investigated the alleged kidnapping of Esther Furcra, 17, Anderson College student.

Willie Wilson, married man of Grover, N. C., was arrested Wednesday at Rock Hill, S. C., on a warrant charging him with the kidnapping.

ASKS PUBLIC FOR SUPPORT OF RED CROSS

Mrs. J. L. Hassell, Seeks Support of the Roll Call Campaign Now Under Way

Mrs. J. L. Hassell, chairman of the Pitt County Chapter of the American Red Cross, urged the people today to accept membership in the organization during the Roll Call, Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day.

Mrs. Hassell said the committees were working diligently in all parts of the county but that their efforts would prove futile without the united support of the public. Pitt county has never failed to come across in a campaign of this kind, the county chairman declared, and it was hoped that efforts would be redoubled during the days intervening between now and Thanksgiving.

This year's roll call is a re-dedication to Red Cross duty, in the opinion of John Barton Payne, chairman of the central committee of the American Red Cross.

Mr. Payne says: "Again the American Red Cross appeals to the Americans to accept its invitation to membership during the roll call period, Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day. The 3,500 Red Cross chapters are asking the citizens in every section of the United States to join the fellowship of service to humanity."

"We are in the midst of many situations of human distress. The demands upon our Red Cross are most heavy. Since our resources depend upon support through membership, the appeal to join the Red Cross must be vigorous and unhesitating."

"Every news-aper and every radio broadcaster has informed the people of today's service commitments of their Red Cross. The chapters in this roll call are therefore appealing to an informed constituency. By wholehearted invitation to take membership in the Red Cross, the needed increase in enrollment can be attained."

"We look with confidence to the result of this roll call. Let us prove as we approach this fiftieth year of our Red Cross activity, that with greater membership and unimpeded resources, we have rededicated ourselves and our beloved organization to another half century of duty in the cause of humanity. Let us, by the results of this roll call confirm the faith of our people that their Red Cross shall unflinchingly advance to the work they have placed in its hands to do."

Five Men Held In Explosion

Danville, Va., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Five men were arrested today in connection with an explosion early this morning at the home of Jim Swann, negro employee of the Schoolfield mills, whose union employees are on strike. The explosion occurred near the dwelling but did no damage.

State police arrested R. I. Cook, J. B. Barrow, L. L. Yates, Floyd Suttill and Dan Suttill. All five said by Chief of Police Cole to be union members, were placed in jail.

Police Detective J. C. Lewis said he was hiding in Danville Hardware store yesterday when Dan Suttill bought six sticks of dynamite, and saying the present situation is "almost as serious" as time of war, he called upon members of both parties to meet it with constructive measures.

Paris, Tenn., Nov. 21.—(AP)—The First State Bank and Trust Company located here did not open today. A note on the door said the affairs of the bank had been turned over to the state bank examiner. It was capitalized at \$100,000. Its last report in July showed resources of more than \$1,000,000.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 21.—(AP)—D. D. Robertson, state superintendent of banks, announced today the Peoples Bank and Trust Company, operated by Negroes, failed to open this morning.

He said the directors would meet with a bank examiner today and decide what course to pursue.

SEED LOANS SOUGHT FOR DRY STATES

Probably \$60,000,000 Will Be Asked for Relief of Drought Districts

Washington, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Requests to Congress for lightening the burden upon state and county finances were planned today by the national drought conference.

The President's drought committee and chairmen of committees from more than a score of states jointly recommended a large federal seed loan. No amount was set, but a figure of \$60,000,000, the largest in the nation's history, was used in discussion. It has been favored by congressional leaders.

Another recommendation was for an appropriation of \$50,000,000 for highway construction in drought states to be made available without the usual equal state contribution. This state share would be recovered by deduction spread over ten years.

A third proposal was that the government defray the full expense of maintaining county extension agents in drought areas, relieving the counties of their share until June 30, 1932.

These recommendations were additional to the Department of Agriculture and Budget Bureau plans to have \$125,000,000 in highway construction funds for 1932 made immediately available upon passage of the Agriculture Department supply bill. By this the states would receive their appropriations probably before March 1 as against July 1, as ordinarily.

Notwithstanding the largest possible use of local resources, the conference reported "credit facilities throughout the drought area will fall short of the needs of crop production."

Many countries were said to be "unable to collect sufficient taxes to meet current expenses."

DRIVERS LAW WILL REDUCE DEATH RATE

M. K. Blount to Advocate New Legislation in Address At Charlotte Nov. 24

"The highway death rate in North Carolina may be expected to be reduced approximately 20 percent, when North Carolina enacts a real Drivers License Law," according to statement made in interview with Senator M. K. Blount of Greenville today, who is to address the Carolinas Street and Highway Traffic Conference in Charlotte, November 24th and 25th.

Continuing, Mr. Blount said, "States with automobile drivers license law statistics show that highway accidents have been reduced some 20 percent. On first examination, 25 percent of the applicants failed to pass, while 3 percent never passed. A drivers license law in North Carolina, rigidly enforced, is in my opinion, the paramount need of the State today."

"Another law which North Carolina should consider carefully, is one to remove from the highway, mechanically unfit vehicles. Statistics show that 15 percent of all accidents result from the operation of mechanically unfit motor vehicles upon the highway. This is, motor vehicles without proper brakes, without proper headlights, adequate signal device, or defective steering apparatus."

Senator Blount said that indications pointed to a splendid attendance, and that many cities will be represented by their city attorneys, chiefs of police and mayors.

Captain Ammel Hurt When Plane Wrecks On Takeoff At Colon

Colon, Canal Zone, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Captain Roy W. Ammel, Chicago broker and flier, was injured today as his plane, the Blue Flash, went into a ground loop while taking off on a non-stop flight to his home city.

Captain Ammel was unconscious when he was removed from his wrecked plane but apparently he had been critically injured. There was no time for a diagnosis and he was placed in an army transport plane which pushed him to a hospital in Panama.

GRAHAM ASKS FOR INCREASED SCHOOL FUND

President of University Tells Advisory Budget Commission of School's Needs

Raleigh, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The Advisory Budget Commission today heard Frank P. Graham president of the University of North Carolina plead for \$1,889,466 for his institution for the biennium 1931-33.

President Graham requested \$926,273 for the first year of the period and \$963,193 for the second year. The university had \$848,100 appropriated for 1929-30 and \$875,300 for 1930-31 but due to the cut of 2 percent ordered by Gov. O. Max Gardner used only about \$750,000 and \$700,000. President Graham said.

Immediate need for a new physical education building to comply with requirements of educational associations of which the university is a member was presented the commission by President Graham, who also asked for funds for a new generator for the college power plant and for funds to enlarge the University sewage disposal plant. The latter improvement has been ordered by health authorities, the president said.

Requests from six other state institutions were heard as follows: Eastern Carolina Teachers College: Appropriated \$204,000 each year; requests, \$268,600.

Negro Agricultural and Technical College: Appropriated \$65,000 each year; requests, \$68,000.

Western Carolina Teachers College: Appropriated \$66,740; requests, \$80,983 and \$86,210.

Cherokee Indian Normal School: Appropriated \$27,200 and \$28,000.

Winston-Salem Teachers College: Appropriated \$51,200 each year; requests, \$77,400 1st year and \$77,525 second year.

Fayetteville State Normal school: Appropriated \$40,000 each year; requests, \$46,125 and \$51,435.

Four known lives were lost, considerable property damage done and losses of livestock resulted as the storm swept its relentless way from Oregon south to Arizona and from California to the plains country.

Sunshine cleared the trans-continental airways in Wyoming, but highways were not so easily made passable. Overcast skies in New Mexico were beginning to break degrees at Albuquerque.

A minimum mark of 23 degrees was recorded at Denver. Hundreds of men secured employment clearing the streets of 18 inches of snow. Mountain passes in Colorado will not be open for several days.

Although conditions in Montana were still somewhat unsettled, temperatures were rising from the minimums of yesterday when Havre and Miles City recorded two above and Kalispell a few points above freezing.

Five Ministers To Receive Full Accessory, Now Held for Murder

Orangeburg, S. C., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Accused Wednesday on a charge as being an accessory to murder in the slaying of State Senator E. J. Dennis of Berkeley County, Glenn D. McKnight was under bond today for trial on a charge of murder in the case.

Two indictments against McKnight's death were returned against the former prohibition officer, charged by W. L. Thornley, clerk of the court, with having bribed him to kill the Berkeley man. Failing to win a conviction on the accessory charge, the state has turned to that of murder.

Thornley, who faintly yesterday as he was found guilty of murder with a recommendation of mercy, sometime today was to begin his last journey to Columbia. For, once there, he is to spend his life behind the bars of the state penitentiary.

Despite state objections to granting bail for McKnight, he was released under bond of \$2,500. The state also sought to delay sentencing of Thornley by Judge W. H. Crimball because it wanted him as a witness against McKnight.

The special term of General Sessions court called here to try the Berkeley County cases moved on a change of venue adjourned sine die late yesterday.

It has not been indicated when McKnight would be brought to trial.

BEGIN TO DIG OUT OF SNOW IN MID - WEST

Lower Temperatures Predicted At Chicago; One Death Is Reported

Chicago, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Lower temperatures, the weather bureau predicted, were due in most of the midwest today.

Meanwhile residents of North and South Dakota, Northwestern Minnesota and Western Nebraska were attempting to restore normal conditions following severe snow storms.

One death, that of the year and a half old child of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Moffitt of Moffitt, N. D., was indirectly attributed to the storm. The conditions of the child who had been ill, became worse when the parent's automobile was stalled in a snow drift. They were finally rescued, but the child died at Steele, N. D.

South Dakota apparently was hardest hit of the northwest states. Sub-freezing temperatures were recorded. Telephone and telegraph lines were down by the hundreds. Trains between Pierre and Huron were despatched last night by short wave radio communication in lieu of regular telegraph facilities.

Sidney apparently suffered more than any other point in western Nebraska. The snow was reported to have drifted as high as the eaves of houses. One pioneer resident said the storm was as bad as that of 1868, but additional detail were lacking due to crippled wire communication. Eastern Nebraska escaped with light snow which melted rapidly.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Clearing skies brought a truce today in the west's first major skirmish of the season with the hosts of winter.

Disrupted highway and rail transportation while not yet normal was gradually being set in order as mountainous drifts were cleared. Wire communication, prostrated by heavy snows, was re-established.

"A driver's license law in North Carolina, rigidly enforced, is in my opinion, the paramount need of the state today." These are the words of Senator Marvin K. With an ever increasing death toll from highway accidents every effort should be made to so control the operation of automobiles on our highways as to reduce the hazards to a minimum and there can be no doubt that the driver's license law is the surest way to bring this control about. There has been marked decrease of accidents in those states that have removed the careless, reckless and physically unfit drivers from the highways through a rigidly enforced driver's license law and North Carolina's case should

prove no different from the others.
More safety on our highways is essential and it is to be hoped that the next legislature will provide such safety by requiring a rigid examination of every automobile operator in our state.

Officers Search for Clue In Two Killings In S. C.

Bennettsville, S. C., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Marlboro County officers today continued to search for clues in what were apparently two brutal slayings in different sections of the county Wednesday night.
Both victims were found lifeless on highways.

His head had been badly gashed. The Youth's name had not been learned here.

early yesterday after the negroes had been arrested, warning him "to get those negroes out of town." "If you don't, they are going to lynch them," the police chief quoted the voice over the phone as saying.

TEACHER SHOT TO DEATH

Bath, N. Y., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Miss Elizabeth Reifnot, 24, French teacher in the Bath high school, was shot and killed early today. Lawrence Guiney, 23, was taken to a hospital with a bullet wound under the heart which police said was self-inflicted. His condition was critical. Sheriff Frank Barlett said he believed jealousy caused the shootings.

TWO MORE BANKS CLOSE IN THIS STATE

Business Men Express Optimism Despite the Critical Financial Situation

Asheville, Nov. 20.—(AP)—The First Bank and Trust Company of Tryon and the American National Bank of Asheville failed to open today, bringing to 10 the total number of banks to close in western North Carolina in two days.

The directors of the First Bank and Trust Company posted a notice on its door saying it had closed because of "the closing of several banks in nearby towns." The bank was capitalized at \$50,000 and on September 24, date of the last bank call, had deposits of \$165,000. G. H. Holmes, president, said the bank expected to re-open within a few days.

The notice further stated: "This bank will remain closed until the officers and directors can confer with officials of the state banking department and determine what course of action can be taken."

The First Bank and Trust Company has total resources of approximately \$236,721 and deposits of \$165,000. Its president is G. H. Holmes, prominent business man of Tryon.

A bank examiner arrived in Tryon this morning and began an examination of the records. The bank is expected to reopen within a few days, as the general feeling in Tryon is that it is solvent. Officers of the institution said the suspension of business was merely a precautionary move. A number of accounts were withdrawn yesterday afternoon.

Hendersonville, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Business was virtually at a standstill heretoday as the city of Hendersonville remained without banking facilities, but civic leaders expressed confidence that the community's problems will be worked out satisfactorily within a short time.

All three of the banks in Hendersonville closed yesterday morning. The First Bank and Trust Company remained closed yesterday morning at the usual business hour. The American Bank and Trust Company opened for a few minutes and then closed its doors to protect depositors. The Citizens National Bank was open until 10:30 o'clock when a run became eminent and its doors were closed.

E. W. Eubank, president of the Citizens National Bank today said that the situation was in hand in Hendersonville and that machinery was underway to provide relief from the financial tie-up that has quieted business activity.

"I'm not in a position yet to give out a statement," Mr. Eubank said, "but I can say that machinery is on foot here to solve our problems." While there was little business activity here today, merchants were optimistic and there was no hysteria or undue excitement.

Asheville, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The American National Bank here failed to open this morning, bringing the total number of banks to close in western North Carolina in two days to nine. A note on the door said the bank had been closed to protect depositors. On September 24, date of the last bank call, it listed deposits of \$2,000,000. L. L. Jenkins is president and R. E. Curran is cashier. Failure of the Central Bank and Trust Company of Asheville, fourth largest single bank in North Carolina, yesterday precipitated a financial crisis in this section. Within a few hours seven smaller banks had closed.

Officials of banks which weathered the storm caused by the Central Bank and Trust closing, said their institutions were fully prepared to continue business as usual. More than \$4,600,000 in city funds and \$3,100,000 in county funds was tied up in the closing of the Central Company, but city and county officials announced the greater majority of it is covered by collateral.

Mayor Gallatin Roberts said arrangements had been made to meet all public payrolls.

Decision about the city and county schools will be made at a meeting of the boards of education and other agencies scheduled for today.

Teachers in the various schools have voted unanimously to continue, whether salaries are paid or not, pending the clearing up of the present difficulties.

An armored truck with \$1,000,000 in cash arrived here late yesterday from the Charlotte branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond for the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company. Officials reported deposits in this bank yesterday practically equalled withdrawals.

A mass meeting of 2,000 citizens was held last night in West Asheville and expression of confidence in the Bank of West Asheville were made. Officials of the National Bank of Commerce, another of the City's large financial institutions, said the bank gained in deposits yesterday.

Banks besides the Central Bank and Trust company to close yesterday were the Biltmore-Oteen Bank at Biltmore, Asheville suburb; the First Bank and Trust Company, the Citizens National Bank, and the American Bank and Trust Company, all of Hendersonville; the Bank of Lowell, at Lowell; the Clay County Bank, at Hayesville; and the Bank of Leicester, Buncombe county.

The total of deposits tied up by the closing is more than \$22,000,000.

Dr. Cyrus Thompson Dead At Jacksonville

Jacksonville, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Dr. Cyrus Thompson, one of North Carolina's best known physicians, is dead.

Dr. Thompson was a member of the State Board of Health, and past president of the North Carolina, tri-State and Seaboard Medical societies.

He died late last night at his home here. He had contracted pneumonia Saturday. Dr. Thompson was 75 years old.

Years ago when Republicans were strong in the state, Dr. Thompson played a big part in politics. He was secretary of state for Governor Russell, whose term from 1897-1901 marked the last Republican regime in the state.

In 1897 and in 1913 Dr. Thompson was an unsuccessful candidate for the United States Senate on the Republican ticket. He declined his party's nomination for governor in 1912.

Funeral services will be held here Saturday.

Dr. Thompson is survived by eight children. He married Florence Garland Kent, of Richmond, Va., in 1883.

Ask \$5 An Acre For Timberland In Smoky Area

Sevierville, Tenn., Nov. 21.—(AP)—A value of \$5 an acre "with all merchantable timber removed" had been placed on Champion Fibre Company's 37,500 acres in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park area by H. F. Holt, Knoxville engineer.

His testimony as witness for the Champion Fibre Company was presented yesterday to a jury, chosen to fix a price on the company's lands and timber. The state is seeking the track for the park and asking to condemn timber on a total of 39,488 acres belonging to the company.

Three witnesses for the company have now presented estimates and figures fixing value of between \$6-600,000 and \$7,000,000 on the land and timber.

Through cross examination state attorneys sought to show it will cost Champion Fibre a large sum of money to build a network of rail lines and inclines into the Tennessee area to remove the timber to their plant at Canton, N. C.

Holt, who made a survey of the property estimates it would cost Champion Fibre Company \$689,501.86 to build railroads and inclines and \$184,000 for logging equipment.

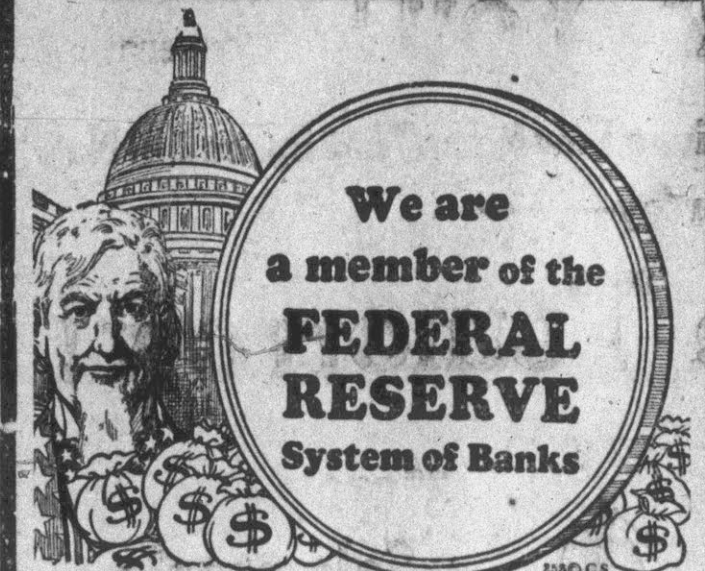

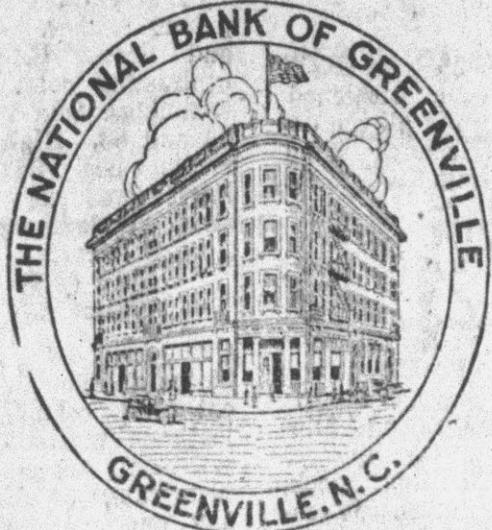

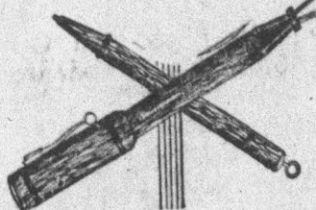

New York, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 1 point. Some buying was reported on the relatively steady showing of Liverpool but there was liquidation and southern selling which increased right after the call and sent the active months about 2 to 6 points net lower during the early trading.

The selling was supposed to include some hedging while there was local selling on rather higher ginning figures than anticipated. The Census Bureau reported 11,962,264 bales ginned prior to November 14 compared with 11,890,066 last year. This report was slightly above the average recent private estimates but while the selling was quite active during the first few minutes it was well enough taken by covering and trade buying to steady the market and cause rallies of 2 to 3 points from the lowest by the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables said hedging there had been taken by local covering and continental buying.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The stock market again crept back to the best levels of the recovery to-day, after shying away yesterday.

The selling which appeared in the last hour of the previous session was carried over into today's early trading, causing further recession of a point or two, but it was soon completed, and the advance resumed. Trading was dull, but shares advanced more readily than they had declined, and numerous gains of 1 to 6 points were recorded.

Most of the trading appeared to be professional, and strength of some of the specialties suggested resumption of pool activities. Shares advancing 3 to 6 points included Allied Chemical, Air Reduction, Foster Wheeler, Vanadium, Worthington, Simmons, Electric Auto Lite Case and Electric Power and Light. Shares selling up 2 or more included American Can, Westinghouse Electric, American Brown Boveri Common, American Power and Light, Eastman, Byers, United Aircraft U. S. Pipe, and Eaton Steel. Such shares as U. S. Steel, American Telephone, Radio, Kennecott, North American, National Biscuit, Atchison New York Central, Chrysler, Loews and Fox advanced moderately.

Statistics for building were less favorable. F. W. Dodge's report for the first half of November shows a reduction in contracts let east of the Rockies of about 9 percent from the level of October. Electric Power consumption in the second week of the month showed somewhat more than the seasonal decline, with a reduction of 8-10 of one percent from the previous week.

The further drop of \$50,000,000 in brokers' loans was favorably improved. Credit conditions remained about stationary, with call money available "outside" at 1 percent. An important commentary on the resumption of the market was the pitch-

Would Adopt Budget System For the Navies

Geneva, Switzerland, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Over the opposition of the Americans, French and Japanese, the Disarmament Commission today approved employment of the budgetary method for limiting naval armaments.

This principle had previously been adopted for land war materials, although Hugh S. Gibson, the American delegate, made clear that the United States could not accept this system for itself.

Lord Cecil of Great Britain who championed today's action recognized the impossibility of concluding a general convention providing budgetary limitation for fleets unless some way of accommodating the American and Japanese position could be found.

He declared this scheme for fixing a maximum figure for naval expenditures was regarded by the British as purely supplementary to the direct method embodied in the Washington and London treaties.
