THREE WOMEN SHOT DOWN IN BANDIT RAID

Dog Attacks Robbers Who Begin Firing On Inmates of Chicago Road House

Chicago, Nov. 24.—(AP)—A Great Dane, pitted his courage and strength against eight robbers and although defeated, the wounds he inflicted, police believed, may lead to the apprehension of the men who shot to death three women entertainers in a roadhouse.

The dog, fighting furiously, dashed right and left at the invaders, but guns and pistols, blazing in the darkness as the lights of the resort in suburban Summit went out, won. Besides the three women slain another was probably fatally wounded and three men injured, all apparently hit by the gunmen's bullets.

Despite the fact that holdups escape, police were hopeful that they might be able to trace them, if and when, they appeared at a doctors' office for treatment for wounds inflicted by the dog. Their lost totalled but \$200.

As one of the holdup men began pushing Harry Goetz, owner of the resort, the Great Dane leaped to the aid of his master, sinking his teeth in the man's leg, and the gunman in sudden fright began to fire. The next instant the place was in darkness. Panic reigned as shots flew in all directions. Apparently one of the invaders, in attempting to turn on more lights had touched the wrong switch.

When the lights were turned on again, they revealed Miss Mary Brink, 22, formerly of Champaign, Ill., and Miss Alice Ward, of Milwaukee, dead, with bullets in their backs. Miss Mary Ganev, owner of a beauty parlor was wounded, fatally, John Cates, a railway detective also was wounded.

While the panic was at its height, Lieut. Micus added to the din by firing at the invaders. They used two motor cars to escape when they would not have been able to.

The holdup, which occurred early today just as Miss Ward prepared to sing a request number for the dance, was the major crime of a series that Chicago and vicinity suffered over the week-end. Guyton's Paradise, a dance hall on the West Side was bombed, but the damage was slight. Police blamed the bomb on the holdup. Among the other crimes was the holdup of an oil filling station in which police shot and killed one of the robbers.

Policeman Hubert J. Dillon was shot and killed by a drunken negro, who in turn was killed by Dillon's fellow officers.

William Cooper Dead At Raleigh

Raleigh, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Funeral services were held here this afternoon for William A. Cooper, 62, former state councillor and national chairman of the Junior Order, who died suddenly yesterday.

Mr. Cooper, a native of Forsyth county, came to Raleigh 36 years ago. He was a leading figure in the business and civic life of the city.

Convicted Killers Rushed to Raleigh to Avoid Violence

Raleigh, Nov. 24.—Waller and Casey Bryson, convicted murderers, who were rushed from Franklin late yesterday to avoid possible mob violence, occupied cells in State's prison here today. Warden H. H. Honeycutt announced this morning.

The men were brought here from Asheville last night in a speeding automobile filled with armed deputies and carrying New York license tags on the machine.

Franklin, N. C., Nov. 24. Waller and Casey Bryson, brothers, were given long prison sentences here yesterday by Judge Cameron P. McRae, after conviction of second degree murder in connection with the shooting of Mack Carringer, Monroe police chief October 7.

Waller was given 30 years in state's prison and Casey 15 years. After sentence was passed the prisoners were taken to Asheville, where Judge McRae ordered them moved to Raleigh at once in order to prevent any trouble.

The Brysons and Jeff McPherson were halted by Chief Carringer and three other officers, who were looking for suspects in a Tennessee robbery case. In the gun battle that followed, Carringer was instantly killed, and McPherson was seriously wounded that he died in jail a few days later.

The case against the Brysons was given to the jury Saturday afternoon but a verdict was not reached until yesterday.

URGES PEOPLE TO OBSERVE THANKSGIVING

Governor Gardner Issues Annual Proclamation or Thanksgiving Day

Raleigh, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Governor Gardner reminded his fellow citizens of North Carolina, in a proclamation published today, that they had many things to be thankful for, and called upon them to observe Thanksgiving Day "in the spirit of the fathers."

In addition to material prosperity, the governor said, every one should be thankful for "the adventures which stir us from our ignoble ease and self-content and sting us into new strength; for the call to these perils and arduous tasks that make us men; for the which holds us in our places and pressure of work and responsibility steadies us under the allurements of indolence and luxury; for a secular state which can in truth say to its citizenship: 'for their sakes sanctify I myself'; for the highly realized sense of this commonwealth which breeds in us infinite compassion and gives us the power of sympathy; for all our deep experiences, which in the hour of our anguish, make us aware of the greatness and the immortality significance of life; and for a divine love which seeks not our comfort but our growth and spurs us no trial if only it can bring out the best in us."

FAMOUS FLIER ESCAPES FROM SPANISH JAIL

Major Romon Franco Makes Getaway After Imprisonment for Seditious Utterances

Madrid, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Major Ramon Franco, Spain's premier aviator who Friday was sentenced to eight months imprisonment for alleged seditious utterances, escaped today from the cell where he has been incarcerated for more than a month.

The trans-Atlantic aviator forced the window of a section of the old prison, making his getaway sometime between 3 a. m. and dawn.

Another aviator, Eduardo Reyes, escaped with Franco. Prison authorities said that neither had been watched very closely and that both had given their word of honor not to attempt a getaway.

Fearing that Major Franco would attempt to get a plane to fly out of Spain the government established a watch at all aviation fields and airbases. Information of his escape was broadcast and instructions were given police to keep a close scrutiny of clubs, cafes and homes of relatives and friends where he might find shelter. The authorities conceded that he might find a haven in the home of a friend and hide there until he could leave the country in disguise.

Shortly before noon Premier General Berenguer went to the palace to inform King Alfonso of Franco's escape.

The prison from which he and Reyes fled is an old convent on the outskirts of Madrid, used for the most part to keep political prisoners and convicts of a higher type. The authorities said that almost any strong and determined man could get out of it quite easily, particularly since most of these confined were on their honor and were not watched closely.

Major Franco was not locked in his cell but was at liberty to go about the prison corridors and buildings freely.

Thus it was easy for him and Reyes to force the bars of a flimsy old window near the ground and drop into the street. The authorities said that it was unnecessary for him to have gone to that trouble since he could have walked out of the front door unobserved under a promise to return.

Major Franco originally was jailed for "military offenses" never officially specified publicly, but commonly construed to have reference to alleged Republican activities. He was continually in conflict with the dictatorship of Gen. Primo De Rivera, and lost favor with the government of General Berenguer, soon after Primo's fall.

After his imprisonment he continued to write occasional articles, and it was on some of these that the government based their charges of seditious utterances, three charges being pending against Franco.

He was received as a national hero after the flight of his plane, the Plus Ultra, from Palos, Spain, to Pernambuco, Brazil, in 1926 with Major Francisco De Aida. Another tumultuous welcome was given him last year after an successful second attempt to cross the Atlantic when he fell and was lost for a week off the Azores.

FLOOD OF CASH POURING INTO WESTERN N. C.

Deposits Increase By Leaps and Bounds As Hysteria Gives Away to Confidence

Asheville, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Floods of deposits were pouring into Western North Carolina banks today as the wave of hysteria which swept the section last week gave way to confidence.

From Marion to Murphy, bank officials viewed the situation with high satisfaction and relief. Customers whose faith in bank institutions had been shaken during the crisis Thursday, Friday and Saturday, returned to banks today with deposits they had withdrawn. Many new accounts were reported to have been opened.

A check of all institutions by the Times showed today that business was going on as usual. Not a single new name was added to the list of 15 banks, closed last week.

The First National Bank, of Waynesville, said that the deposits of the institution had been swelled Saturday to \$21,000 more than the average. The only other bank in the town, the Citizens Bank and Trust Company, was closed on Friday.

The Farmers and Traders Bank, Waynesville, said that the deposits Monday morning's business, D. J. Weaver, president, informed the Times. At Fletcher, deposits withdrawn by untrusting customers were replaced. Officials said all customers had regained confidence.

The fifteen closed banks were in the hands of the state corporation commission or of the comptroller of currency. In all of them accounts were at work checking up on assets, preparatory to a settlement with depositors.

Reports today as to the normal conditions in Western North Carolina banks were received from Marion, Swannanoa, Burnsville, Bryson City, Sylva, Murphy, Andrews, Canton, Maconville, Franklin and Marshall.

CITES DO-X AS BIG CIVIL WAR MENACE

Abrupt Departure of Russian Delegate From Geneva Creates Sensation

Geneva, Nov. 24.—(AP)—A picture of the DO-X, huge 12-motored German seaplane, armored and equipped as a bombing plane and a formidable weapon of war was drawn for the preparatory disarmament commission of the League of Nations today by Hene Massigli, French Representative.

The allusions to the DO-X were made before a gathering already started by one sensation, the abrupt departure of Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet commissar for foreign affairs, from Milan, Italy from where after conferring with the Russian Ambassador at Rome, he will proceed to Moscow, abandoning his work with the disarmament commission.

M. Massigli's reference to the DO-X crew, who said that the giant plane could become a formidable weapon of war capable of dropping bombs on London, Paris, Rome or other capitals.

Geneva, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet commissar for foreign affairs, hurriedly left Geneva this morning, taking a train for Milan where he will interview the Russian ambassador to Italy.

After a conference there he will proceed to Moscow by way of Berlin, abandoning altogether his share in the proceedings of the preparatory disarmament commission of the League of Nations, in which he has been taking a prominent part.

At his departure he denied that his leaving had anything to do with alleged disturbances in the neighborhood of Moscow and Leningrad. He repeated that there had been no such disturbances.

Associates of M. Litvinoff said he left Geneva because he thought he had done all possible in pressing the Soviet disarmament program before the commission and that he considered no further opportunity would be presented here to influence the character of the disarmament convention.

Independents May Force Extra Session Congress; Showing Great Strength

Administration Leaders, to Avoid Special Session, Will Have to Listen to Demands of Senate Independents for Passage of Certain Legislation

Washington, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Though the balance of power given them by the election applies to the next Congress, the Republican Independents already are showing new strength.

The administration leaders, to avert an extra session in the Spring, will have to listen to their demands this winter. The Senate Independents plan to get together before the final session of the present Congress meets, to draw a plan of action.

Already, Senator Norris of Nebraska, one of the group's leaders, has served notice he will insist upon votes at the approaching session for four measures: The Muscle Shoals resolution, the Labor anti-injunction bill, and Constitutional amendment against "Lame Duck" sessions of Congress, and the Wagner Unemployment measures.

The Senate has approved three of these. Thus, the contest apparently will be between the Republican Independents in the Senate and the administration controlled House. The Independents could force the extra session by various methods and Norris has warned this might be done if the votes he asked are not forthcoming.

Even if the House where the Republicans have an overwhelming majority in this session, the party leaders are going to have to listen closely to the demands of the Independents. For in the next Congress, the Republicans have only a majority of one. Any defections mean loss of control, and threats made now may go a long way.

Two Held For Theft of Auto

Fayetteville, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Miss Georgia Smith's automobile was stolen, recovered 13 miles away and returned to Fayetteville where Miss Smith knew it was gone.

A white boy, Elbert Harrelson, flagged Sheriff McMillan of Robeson county, between Fayetteville and Lumberton and asked gasoline. Then, recognizing the sheriff, he said he had with him a negro who had stolen the automobile.

Sheriff McMillan returned the pair to Fayetteville. There the negro accused the white boy of the theft.

Officers took both in charge and called upon Miss Smith.

"Where," they asked, "is your automobile?"

"It's parked just outside," said Miss Smith.

Toledo Flier Leaves Mainland

Midland, Texas, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Determined to reach San Diego, Calif., by night, Gerald Nettleton, Toledo aviator, took off here at 8:30 A. M. today on the final stage of his junior trans-continental east-west flight.

Nettleton's elapsed time to Midland was 16 hours and seven minutes.

Two Youths Begin Flight From N. J. to South America

Caldwell, N. J., Nov. 24.—(AP)—Two youths in a two-cylinder monoplane, Edward Wingerter of Newark and Joseph L. Jones of Riverside, Conn., set out at 9:10 A. M. today on a flight to South America.

They planned to follow the Atlantic seaboard, hop over to Havana and then jump from Cuba to a field in British Guiana.

They expect to stop at almost every airport along the way, for their little ship carries only eight gallons of gasoline and has a cruising speed of but 65 miles an hour.

Wingerter is 25 and Jones is 19, but both are married. Their wives and mothers saw them take off. Jones' mother is sponsoring the flight. The fliers plan to spend the night at Baltimore.

The Baby monoplane, blue and orange, has a wing spread of 25 feet. It was originally designed for one passenger but Wingerter carried 350 pounds of brick aloft to convince the Department of Commerce the ship would carry two.

TOUGH JUDGE DECLARES WAR ON GANGSTERS

John Lyle Forces His Way to Front By Dealing Severely With Outlaws

Chicago, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Out of the comparative obscurity of Chicago's municipal court, a rough-tough judge with a scorn of technicalities has bounded into the forefront of the city's war on crime.

John Lyle, in other words, is on the front page again this time as the harasser of "public enemies"—of Ralph Capone and "Bugs" Moran, of "Fur" Sammons and "Dago" Mangano.

He is saying "50,000 bond" when gunmen demand their "constitutional rights." He is roaring "six months in jail and \$100 fine" in answer to mention of "habeas corpus" and "change of venue."

And he is saying it to a varied response from the town's audience of three million.

"He lacks judicial temperament," the Chicago Bar Association complained in urging his defeat at the recent election. "He is a judge of vigor and independence who has given voice to the aspirations of the law-abiding," responded the Chicago Crime Commission.

The opposing views, clashed Nov. 4 and Lyle, a Republican, rode safely through a Democratic tidal wave that swept ten of his fellow-partisans from the municipal bench.

And John Lyle stayed on the front page.

On the bench he has been a paradox. He will berate one lawyer for wasting his time and rebuke another for trying to rush a case through. He will refuse to listen to one robber's plea, and take a collection for another because his offense seemed prompted by family need. He will scathe the gangsters and condemn them with police for gentle treatment of the equal eloquence for rough handling of minor tramps.

When the slaying of Alfred Linggle, Tribune reporter, whipped Chicago into its most persistent drive on the underworld, John Lyle was in his glory.

He sent two hoodlums to the rock pile for a year on a vagrancy charge before their lawyers had time to get habeas corpus writs. When the crime commission issued its "public enemy" list, he promptly replied with vagrancy warrants for all those named when north side police brought in a herd of petty gamblers and loafers, he cried out against them bitterly, telling them to "go out and bring in Al Capone and Bugs Moran instead."

So it goes with this man of amazing energy who is 48 but looks 35 and whose steely muscles testify to the effectiveness of his daily one-hour workout in a gymnasium. He is a ball-buster at the very other day and was told of the problems of getting "Big Shot" gangsters and behind the bars.

STORMS TAKE HEAVY TOLL THRU EUROPE

Seven Persons Perish and Two Hundred Injured In France, Germany, Belgium

London, Nov. 2.—(AP)—While a week-end gale howled from London to Vienna, doing considerable damage, rivers of France, Germany and Belgium rose past flood stage, threatening today to cut a muddy swathe through populous industrial and farming sections.

Seven persons perished and at least 200 were injured. France had five dead and many injured; a girl was drowned in the lower Rhineland, and in Vienna one person was killed and 100 injured in an 80-mile hurricane.

Belgium appeared the greatest sufferer, with the river Scheldt bursting its dikes and flooding other rivers. Thousands left their homes and plodded to higher ground. There was considerable suffering from hunger.

Today's early morning tide was not so high as was expected and this, coupled with a slight cessation of the wind off the sea, gave hopes of an improvement in conditions.

The Termonde region is completely submerged. Antwerp suffered considerable damage in its suburb of Sainte Anne was marooned and Charleroi Collieries and Steel Works were flooded.

In France the Seine and tributary rivers from Paris to Havre were flooded. Lowland sections were covered with water. At Havre the wind reached a velocity of 70 miles an hour, accompanied by hail and lightning. Two hangars at Ville Coublay lost their roofs and vineyards were damaged at Thiens. At Boulogne 20 craft were driven ashore. A 90-mile wind whistled about the Eiffel tower.

Of the five dead in France, three were Lorient fishermen whose smack capsized in the storm, one was a large captain who was killed when the gale toppled a derrick over his ship and one a sailor at sea.

Southern Germany was hard hit with the Rhine and Moselle many feet above normal stages.

In addition to one dead, 100 were injured at Vienna. Residences were badly damaged.

England, while affected less severely than parts of Europe, had its share of trouble. There was snow in the border counties and rain, hail and lightning in the south.

Cuts One to Death And Hurts Others Walking In Sleep

New York, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Michael Filosa went walking in his sleep with a razor early today and when his journey was over his half-brother had been slashed to death and his mother and half-sister were critically wounded.

Police, summoned by screaming neighbors, found the 28 year old house painter in the front room of his Brooklyn flat with the razor in his hand. In one bedroom they found Salvatore De Hall, 16, dead and in another his mother, Mrs. Anna De Hall, 49, and his sister, 14, suffering from numerous wounds about the face and body. Doctors said there was little hope for their recovery.

Filosa was held on an open charge pending developments. He was unable to give a coherent explanation of the tragedy, except to say that he had been dreaming and did not realize what he was doing. He said he had not been drinking and was on good terms with his family.

Motor Clubs To Discuss Safer Transportation

Charlotte, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Ways of making streets and highways safer will be the principal theme of a two day conference called to meet here today under the auspices of the Carolina Motor Club and the South Carolina Motor Club. A series of group meetings was on this morning's program.

Separate meetings are scheduled by the city managers association and the Association of Chiefs of Police for the discussion of traffic and related problems.

At a banquet tonight, Ernest N. Smith, executive vice-president of the American Automobile Association, will deliver an address on "Laws that will promote safety on the highways."

Short talks will be made by Chairman R. A. Dougherty, of the North Carolina Highway Commission, W. C. Saunders, Elizabeth City publisher, R. C. Peace, of the Greenville, S. C., News, and Mrs. E. M. Land president of the State

Says One Per Cent Tax Reduction Not To Be Continued

Washington, Nov. 24.—(AP)—The prediction that the one per cent tax reduction would not be continued was made today by Chairman Snell, of the House taxes committee.

"We are liable to have an increase in taxes if we are to meet all of the present demands on the treasury," the New Yorker said.

He wished to determine what sentiment exists for further legislation at the short session, and whether to let the Farm Board go along organizing stabilization corporations and purchasing large quantities of surplus crops to check falling prices.

Those invited to the conference, which was executive, were Secretary Hyde, Chairman Legge of the Farm Bureau Federation, Taber of the National Grange, and Huff of the Farmers' Union.

It was likely the advisability of additional wheat purchases by the Farm Board would be discussed, as well as the possible revival by some Republican Senators of the export debenture plan so vigorously opposed by President Hoover.

Many of the farm group in the Senate, including Senators McNary, Norris of Nebraska, and Capper of Kansas, all Republicans, are inclined to give the Farm Board a further trial of present policies. Senators Borah, of Idaho, and Brookhart, of Iowa, Republicans, have indicated they might endeavor again to bring up the debenture, but the overwhelming majority against it in the House is believed still to exist.

Senator Capper's suggestion that Congress might look favorably on a proposal to feed the Farm Board's wheat to the unemployed was another topic for the farm leaders.

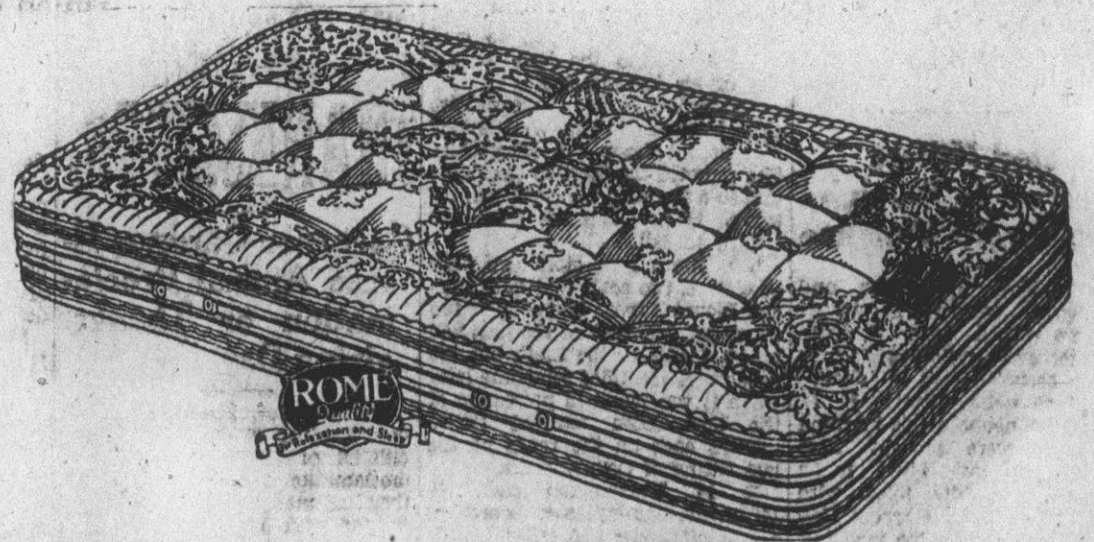

STATE TO SEE THREE GAMES THANKSGIVING

Charlotte, Nov. 24.—(AP)—For their Thanksgiving day entertainment, Tar Heel football fans will have the choice of three major gridiron encounters—a Southern conference tilt at Durham, a battle royal traditional North Carolina-Virginia clash at Charlottesville.

Wake Forest and Davidson, for a number of years chronic uncereous but now acclaimed for their prowess as hope-wreckers for more favored teams, will settle their respective merits at Charlotte, in a melee whose outcome is regarded more or less as a toss-up.

Wake Forest showed its strength in an early season encounter when it held Chuck Collins' eleven to a one-touchdown victory. Davidson came along later and messed up the Tar Heels' ambitions for a clear title to state honors by losing them out 7 to 6.

Then, last Saturday the tough Deacons from Wake Forest put an abrupt end to a seven-game winning streak of Duke's onrushing Blue Devils, by holding the Durham representatives to a 13-13 tie.

Charged by this unexpected halt to their victorious march, Jimmy DeHart's men today will begin to what their pitchforks in earnest, optimistic of bolstering their Southern conference standing at the expense of the unsuccessful Generals of Washington and Lee.

On the face of statistics, the odds are heavily in favor of Duke. The Generals have won a conference game, the best they could do being one tie and three defeats. Duke has won three within the conference and has been defeated once, by South Carolina in its opening battle.

The Luc Devils have amassed 133 points against 48 for their opponents in four conference tilts, while the Generals have run up only 102 against 135 for their antagonists in the same number of games.

In a similar way, the figures favor North Carolina over the Cavaliers. Both have played six conference games. The Tar Heels have won three, lost two and tied one. The Virginians have won two and lost four. Carolina has scored 112 points against 103 for her opponents, while Virginia has scored 144 against 174 for her competitors.

North Carolina State's Wolfpack has put away gridiron togs for the season. The luckless lads from Raleigh wound up their drabdest record of a decade Saturday by taking another beating, this one from the South Carolina Gamecocks, 19 to 0.

Other Thanksgiving day contests include: Catawba and High Point at Salisbury; and Elon and Lenoir-Rhyne at Elon.

SPORTS SLANTS

Add the tumult and the shouting from the vicinity of Palo Alto and Berkeley to the celebration of the first anniversary of the publication of the Carnegie Foundation's famous college football report.

The shrill echo of the squawks has carried across the country since Southern California's steamroller rolled over 115 points at the expense of Stanford and California.

If "the future of Pacific Coast athletics depends on an investigation," as Dink Templeton has suggested, it seems a trifle late to bring the subject up.

The Carnegie investigators a year ago turned up their findings in very specific fashion. To refresh memories, their report is quoted in part again:

"On the Pacific Coast, soliciting for athletes are keen... to an intensively organized, sometimes subtle system that may utilize or coordinate numbers of agents on or off the campus (Michigan, Northwestern, Oglethorpe, Southern California, Wisconsin).

"Recruiting correspondence... at a few of the larger institutions is likely to be taken care of by the head football coach... On the other hand, a majority of head coaches at larger universities do not regard such tasks as part of their duties (Cornell, Harvard, Missouri, Princeton, Southern California, Washington, Wisconsin, Yale, for example).

"At one university (Southern California) alumni supply fraternities with tickets to football or other contests on the understanding that the fraternities will entertain prospective athletes whom alumni have invited to visit the campus.

*Co-operation between fraterni-

ties on the one hand and individuals, whether alumni or members of the athletic staff who solicit athletes, on the other, has been developed at a number of universities (California, Columbia, N. Y. U., Ohio Wesleyan, Oregon Agricultural, Purdue, Southern California, Wisconsin and others).

"At one (Southern California) a fraternity had listed for 'rushing' the outstanding athletes of the region....

"Athletes... have been subsidized under the guise of clothing store clerks (California, Drake, Ohio State), motion picture employees (Southern California).

"The result of awards from certain funds that are provided by special regulations and that go principally to athletes is the same as in bestowing athletic scholarships (Southern California, Southern Methodist, Stanford)... Indeed, for the actual appointments, or the nominations that are their principal equivalents, made by alumni or coaches, the officers of a university may merely act as recording agents (N. Y. U., Southern California, Stanford, Catholic institutions).

"The sources and value of such special scholarships... Southern California, \$40,000; alumni contributions (Stanford, approximately 50 scholarships).

A few universities have felt it unwise to publish full statements of scholarship awards (Southern California, Stanford) with the result that natural but harmful suspicions have been aroused among athletic opponents."

Why, I have been frequently asked, does Knute Rockne remain at Notre Dame at a comparatively small salary when bigger, richer universities would pay double or treble for his services as football coach?

The answer to this borders the risk of prying into a man's private and personal affairs, yet Rockne's busi-

ness is of sufficiently public character to warrant a few notations and remarks.

I do not, of course, delve into the details of the Rock's financial arrangements with Notre Dame. The understanding is he receives a salary of \$10,000 a year. The rumors have been that he gets a "cut" of the gate receipts. He quite emphatically denied this and there is no reason to question the denial.

Rock probably could command a salary of \$25,000 at perhaps three or four other universities. He once almost signed with Columbia at something like that figure. Yet, I believe, all things considered, he is in a better situation, financially, artistically and otherwise, as the mainspring of Notre Dame football than he would be anywhere else in the country.

Why? Because, first, Rockne and Notre Dame are as closely allied institutions as anything in sport. One, without the other, would be as inappropriate as the Athletics without Connie Mack, as Hamlet without the Dame.

The combination has bred remarkable success Rockne's forceful personality, his ingenuity and skill have developed the maximum from the remarkable material the university furnishes him. Nowhere else, perhaps, could Rockne's powers be so brilliantly reflected, so consistently. Moreover, faith in Rock is unshaken through all circumstance at South Bend. He can lose a game or two without having the alumni on his neck. He is, in short, in complete command.

The situation, therefore, not only is a happy one for Rock, but its colorful combination of circumstances enables him to reap a rich harvest, financially, from such by-products of his coaching job as radio speaking, newspaper and magazine writing. The ratio of their value would not be so great, in all probability, were Rockne located elsewhere than where he is.

Rockne writes his own stuff or, if hard-pressed for time, dictates very rapidly. He is an accomplished, witty speaker on almost any athletic subject and a convincing orator. Even when he is spending a large part of his time flat on his back a year ago, the Rock could out-argue anybody in the room. I have heard him do it.

"What makes this year's team better than those of other years? That's easy. This is the best blocking team I ever coached."

The words are Ike Armstrong's and the team his Utah Indians, champions of the Rocky Mountain conference, but it is probable that Knute Rockne of Notre Dame, Howard Jones of Southern California and Wallace Wade of Alabama would make the same sort of an answer if similarly questioned.

Market Report

Cotton--Stocks--Grain

COTTON MARKET

New York, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today unchanged to an advance of 4 points and sold about 4 to 11 points net higher during the next few minutes on covering and trade buying which appeared to be influenced by a belief that the December notices would be promptly stopped at about the prevailing difference.

Spot house brokers were users of December sending the price of the new December contract up to 10.80 or about 8 points net higher, while later months showed net advances of 4 to 11 points. These bulges brought in a little more liquidation, however, and the market was 5 to 6 points off from the peak at the end of the first half hour. According to early estimates notices representing about 39,700 bales were issued in the market here this morning including 41 notices against old December and 356 against new December contracts.

Liverpool cables said that Bombay buying had been supplied by hedging and liquidation but reported a well sustained demand for cotton cloth with more machinery working than recently.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 24.—(AP)—After having some difficulty in maintaining its foothold during the early hours of trading, the stock market managed rather feebly to resume its climb today.

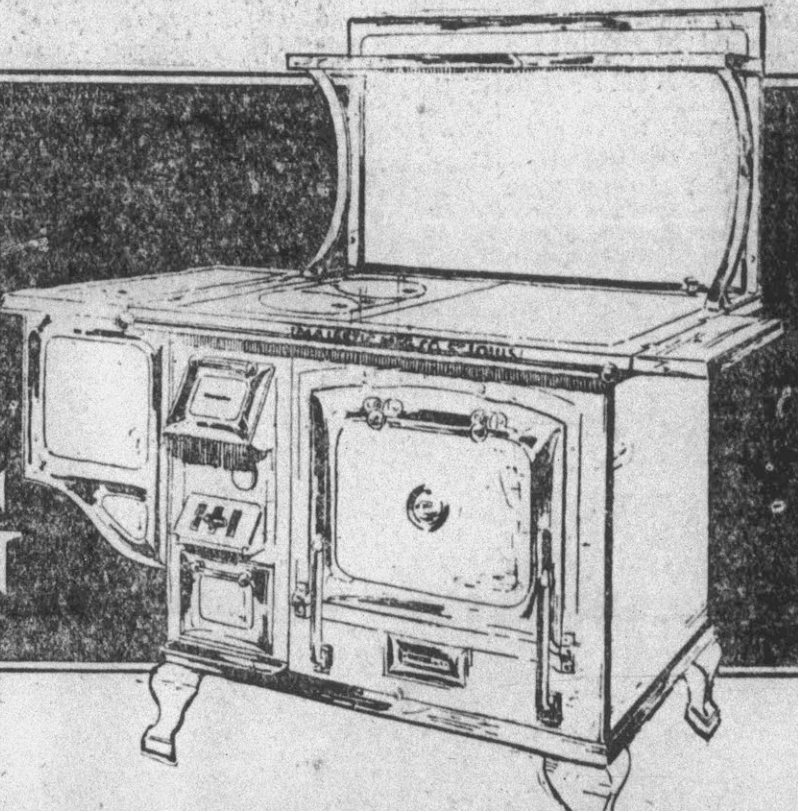
