COLD WAVE VISITS THE SOUTHLAND

Piercing Winds, Near-Freezing Temperatures and Snow Flurries Reported

Threatening to steal the few remaining days of fall, winter advanced on the Carolinas today, sending temperatures down near the freezing point.

Snow flurries accompanied the drop in parts of western North Carolina and were also reported from Lowndesville, Abbeville county, South Carolina.

Columbia and Charlotte had early morning temperatures of 34 with clear skies. At Raleigh the mercury dropped to 35.

From the weather bureau at Charlotte came a warning of low temperatures tonight with subsiding weather promised for the Western and Piedmont sections of the two states. The forecast, however, is for rising temperatures tomorrow.

Rain and sleet fell during the night at Salisbury, although most of the Carolina cities had fair weather.

Cold winds blowing in from the north dropped the temperatures at Henderson to 29 degrees early today, but by 10 o'clock this morning it had risen to 39.

Spartanburg, Sumter and Greenwood each had lows of 32.

At Anderson and Greenville the mercury went to 30. It was the lowest temperature of the fall for Greenville.

Atlanta, Nov. 25.—(AP)—The south looped up its extra overcoat buttons today.

Piercing winds, near-freezing temperatures and snow flurries brought into Dixie for its first extended visit. The mercury plummeted to 31 at midnight. Atlanta's reading was several degrees higher and in Richmond, Va., and Charlotte the temperature was dropping through the low forties.

The weather observer at Candler field, Atlanta air mail depot, reported a scattering of snow flakes for a ten minute period late yesterday. A light snow fell at Parrott and Fayetteville in northeast and northwest Arkansas, respectively.

The forecast was for lower temperatures today and a heavy frost to the coast tonight in the Atlantic states. Extreme north Florida also was warned against frost.

Asheville, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Winter reigned over the western North Carolina mountain region today with a sceptre of snow and ice.

Much of western North Carolina today at noon had clear and sunny skies but in several sections snow was falling and below freezing temperatures were reported throughout the entire mountain district.

Banners Elk, in Avery county, one of the highest points in this section of the state, was experiencing a snowdrift that approached blizzard proportions. The temperature was around 20 degrees.

The coldest point in western North Carolina today was the peak of Mt. Mitchell, highest peak east of the Rockies, where a temperature of zero was recorded at 7 o'clock. A light snow fell in the vicinity of the mountain last night but it was clear there this morning.

Asheville and its surroundings were blanketed lightly with snow this morning. Approximately three inches of snow was recorded during last night by the weather bureau but only a thin covering remained on the ground. The sun was shining over Asheville at noon today but it was cold and windy.

At 8 o'clock this morning it was 23 degrees in Asheville, which was 30 degrees lower than the maximum temperature for yesterday. The mercury dropped to 22 degrees at 9 o'clock but climbed to 25 by 11 o'clock.

May Reorganize Peanut Co-Ops

Suffolk, Va., Nov. 25.—(AP)—If enough contracts can be obtained to control 300,000 bags of peanuts a North Carolina-Virginia peanut cooperative may be organized in this section.

Addressing representatives from 19 counties here yesterday, C. S. Wilson, Federal Farm Board representative, estimated that this number of bags would be necessary to obtain federal aid for a new cooperative.

Mr. Wilson advised the growers to return to their homes and by conferences with other growers and banks determine whether reorganization of a cooperative was regarded worthwhile.

Reiterating Stand for National Prohibition, the Democratic Leader, Predicted His Party Would Not Declare for Repeal of 18th Amendment in 1932 Platform

Washington, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Desire to avoid an extra session of Congress was voiced today by Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, upon his return to the capital.

Reiterating his stand for national prohibition, the Democratic leader predicted the Democrats would not declare themselves for repeal of the eighteenth amendment in the 1932 platform. He expressed the opinion also that the prohibition amendment would not be repealed in the early future.

Senator Robinson issued a statement which he said was in substance that which he wrote to President Hoover recently regarding an extra session of the new Congress.

The statement follows: "It seems to me that discussion now of the question whether an extraordinary session of the Congress will be necessary following the fourth of March is premature.

"From my standpoint it is desirable to avoid it if practicable.

"The Congress was in extraordinary session throughout the spring and summer of 1929. We dealt principally with the agriculture problem and with the tariff in its relation to farm relief.

"The Hawley-Smoot act gave impetus to economic depression. It did more harm than good.

"The farm marketing act has not been effective to reverse the downward tendency of agriculture.

"Conditions have been steadily getting worse until in many parts of the country economic and business distress is appalling.

"In my judgment it is imperative that measure of an emergency character be acted upon as speedily as possible.

"While no doubt other important subjects will also require attention by the Congress I regard it as indispensable to the public welfare that all cooperate in the passage of measures for relief in the drought-stricken areas.

"The unemployment situation is acute and demands consideration.

"It is quite doubtful whether the intense agitation of partisan differences, which cannot be reconciled, will be helpful while both houses of Congress are evenly divided and the executive is in control of the Republicans.

"Of one thing I am certain, it is no part of my duty to filibuster against appropriation bills, and I have no intention of doing so.

"Readiness to cooperate in the passage of appropriation bills and emergency measures in no sense implies support on my part of the policies of the Republican party or the approval of its record.

"To determine now that an extra session is unavoidable inevitably will result in postponement of action on measures and subjects which ought to be disposed of during the regular session."

Washington, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Killing the "lame duck" Congress has been prevented by the House these many years, but at least one majority of the rules committee is for it now.

Representative Michener, Republican, Michigan, today predicted the Norris resolution to eliminate the short session would pass the House at this time.

Senator Norris, of Nebraska, the independent Republican, named this resolution as one item in the four-point program on which he demands action as the price of averting a possible extra session in the spring. Through amendment to the Constitution it would deprive defeated representatives of legislative power and seat each Congress two months after election.

Schools May Get Change in Books for Next Session

Raleigh, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Pupils of North Carolina public schools may have new arithmetic, drawing and writing books next year.

The textbook commission has recommended changes in these books. Whether the changes are made, Dr. A. T. Allen, superintendent of public instruction, said yesterday, will be determined by the Board of Education when bids for new books are considered.

The proposed change would affect approximately 650,000 school children.

RED CROSS ROLL CALL UNDER WAY

Soliciting Committees Meet With Hearty Response During Morning Hours

Today was annual Roll Call with the Pitt County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Members of the organization canvassed the business and residential sections during the morning and afternoon obtaining memberships for the new year. It was indicated at the noon hour that the canvassers were receiving a fairly heavy response.

Similar drives are being put on in the principal towns of the county today, and it was the hope of Mrs. J. L. Hassell, chairman, that the subscription fund would be equally as great as the previous year. Freshman Flogged At Okla. School

Norman, Okla., Nov. 25.—(AP)—Another flogging, allegedly at the hands of the D. D. M. C. secret society of the University of Oklahoma, attracted the attention of university officials today.

Sam Kaplan, a freshman, reported to W. W. Kraft, superintendent of utilities at the institution, that he was taken from his room after midnight last Wednesday night and struck ten times with a belt by a score or more robed and hooded men with the D. D. M. C. insignia emblazoned across their chests.

Kaplan said the men told him he had been found guilty of being a "steal pigeon" and informer of campus infractions of the "N. O. C." rule. He exhibited red and blue welts, Kraft said, and denied he had reported any infractions.

The utilities superintendent said he would take the matter up with W. B. Bizell, president of the university.

FLOODS CARRY DESTRUCTION BEHIND STORM

Storms and Floods Claim Approximately Fifty Lives in Western Europe

London, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Flood waters washed over farms and through populous cities and towns today in England, Ireland, Belgium, Holland, France and Germany, spreading damage and destruction.

The gales which lashed western Europe and Great Britain over the week-end died down during the night, leaving murky skies and lowered barometers which threatened another blow. Estimates on the number of deaths charged to the storm ranged between 40 and 50.

In Paris a further rise of 20 inches in the level of the Seine was forecast but municipal authorities did not believe the city could be flooded with less than a 40-inch rise. The river already is over piers and so high that navigation is impossible. Several suburbs are under water and 3,500 are homeless at Vry-Chatillon alone.

Water receded from the Belgian lowlands in some localities, but the area along the Scheldt between Antwerp and Termond continued in the grip of one of its worst floods in years. Either criticism of the government for not having provided against further flooding catastrophes, or strengthening the Scheldt's levee was heard in many quarters. The Kiel hospital at Antwerp had to be evacuated because of rising water.

Some 100,000 refugees from the floods. Several townships including Zwolle and Eindhoven were inundated. The water broke between Lier and Uffel was breached in 20 points, and the harbor wall and sea dike at Berenoppe has broken down. The Maas and Waal rivers have flooded large areas. The Rhine and Moselle in southern Germany still threatened.

Yast areas in western and Eastern counties of England were under water today, not at a great depth, but sufficient to interrupt communications and isolate scattered dwellings. The rivers are greatly swollen and the mountain streams of Wales have been converted into raging torrents. There was several inches of flood water in parts of Belfast, northern Ireland.

The rivers of northwest France continued to rise today and there was no prospect apparently for dry weather. The Seine and its tributaries, the Yonne, Yonne and Aube, and streams and brooks which feed them swelled and submerged thousands of acres and fields, inundating the low-lying quarters of river-side towns.

Brands As Untrue the Statements Declaring He Plans to Ask Congress to Extend Racketeering Laws; Seeks Enforcement of the Present Laws

Washington, Nov. 24.—(AP)—President Hoover said today that reports that he would propose to Congress new laws for the control of gangster activities were untrue.

"What was needed, he said, was enforcement of existing laws, not enactment of new statutes.

Every state has sufficient laws of its own to control these activities, he continued.

He receives no satisfaction from reports giving the impression that the only way for the federal government to convict gangsters was through their failure to pay taxes on incomes from criminal activities.

The text of the President's remarks follows: "The report that I am proposing to Congress any extension of the federal criminal laws to cover racketeering is untrue.

"Every state has ample laws that cover such criminality.

"What is needed is the enforcement of those laws, and not more laws.

"Any suggestion of increasing the federal criminal laws in general is a reflection on the sovereignty and the stamina of state government.

"The federal government is assisting local authorities to overcome a hideous gangster and corrupt control of some local governments. But I get no satisfaction from the reflection that the only way that this can be done is for the federal government to convict men for failing to pay income taxes on the financial product of crime against state laws.

"What we need is a more widespread public awakening to the failure of some local governments to protect their citizens from murder, racketeering, corruption and other crimes, and their rallying of support to the men of these localities that are today making a courageous battle to clean up these places."

Appoint Receiver for Kentucky Bank

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 25.—(AP)—Appointment of a receiver for the Bank of Kentucky, holding corporation for the closed National Bank of Kentucky and other financial institutions, and the reopening of the Security Bank at Louisville are the latest developments in the Kentucky financial situation.

J. S. Laurent, Louisville attorney, was made receiver for the Bank of Kentucky late yesterday.

Officials of the Security Bank reported large deposits during the first day of business after the reopening.

The closing of the Bank of Gern Creek yesterday brought to 17 the number of Kentucky banks that have suspended operations in the past ten days.

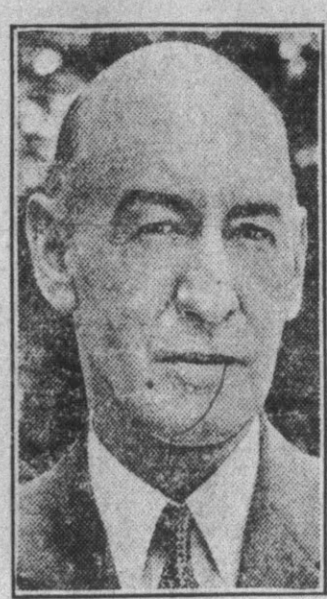

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AGAIN DENIES LAWYERS FEE IN CO-OP CASE

Judge Meekins Refuses to Grant Petitioners Further Allowances

Raleigh, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Judge I. M. Meekins, in a document containing over 3,000 words, today denied petitioning attorneys any further allowances for the part they played in placing the Tri-State Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association in receivership.

Discussing the part the petitioning attorneys played in the receivership in detail, Judge Meekins closed his opinion by writing: "I am certain that when time has dulled the disappointment of petitioners and healed the grievance they may feel, they will realize the righteousness of my opinion and admit the justice of it."

The petitions of the attorneys, E. P. Buford, of Lawrenceville, Va., P. W. Glidewell of Reidsville and the late Willie M. Pearson of Raleigh and Louisville, have twice been denied by Judge Meekins. On appeal after the first, decision the case was remanded to Judge Meekins. The second decision was announced about ten days ago. J. Crawford Biggs, Raleigh attorney and counsel for the petitioners, has not said whether he will appeal again or not.

The three attorneys each sought \$25,000 in additional fees for their work in putting the cooperative in receivership though they were paid \$5,000 each for their services.

W. B. Jones, of Raleigh, surviving member of the firm of Jones and Horton which was also active in the receivership move, has not made any formal petition for further fees, Judge Meekins said, but in response to a query said he felt he should receive an additional \$10,000, which would make a total of \$25,000 to his firm if the petitions of the three attorneys were granted.

M. L. Carey of Richmond, Va., one of the three receivers for the delinquent cooperative, announced last week that about \$500,000 would be distributed among 35,000 or more members of the association in the Carolinas and Virginia before Christmas unless the attorneys appealed from Judge Meekins' second order.

In his decision Judge Meekins pointed out "it was my understanding at the time petitioners received the last \$2,500 each on allowance that they accepted same in full compensation for services rendered in connection with the whole case, before and after the receivership. It cannot be that it was mistaken with regard as at the time no petitioners made any reference whatsoever to me, or so far as I am advised, to either of the receivers, that he had any claim against the estate which had not been compensated in full."

Hickory Company Takes Suit to U. S. District Court

Raleigh, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Their motion for dismissal denied by U. S. Judge I. M. Meekins here, attorneys for the Home Mortgage Company of Hickory, today took the case involving the receivership of the company to the U. S. District sitting in Baltimore.

Unless the Court of Appeals quashes the case, hearing on proposed permanent receivership will be held here Friday.

The company now is in the hands of temporary receivers, T. L. Bland of Raleigh, and W. G. Branham of Durham.

Attorneys for the plaintiff in the proceedings, Mrs. Margaret Ramsey, of Norfolk, Va., yesterday in Federal Court here examined O. N. Hutchinson, of Charlotte, who is directing a check of the company's financial condition. Mr. Hutchinson said in his opinion the company was not in sound financial condition.

Attorneys for the mortgage company sought from Judge Meekins an order of dismissal and supercedas. He refused their motion.

An agreement was reached that if the Court of Appeals ruled against the company, the receivership hearing would be held Friday instead of December 1 as originally scheduled.

DESERTER RETURNS TO ARMY, HUNGRY AND COLD

Wilson, Nov. 25.—(AP)—For the sake of "three squares and a place to flop" this winter, James S. Price, 42, is going back to the United States army, whence he came as a deserter.

Price walked into Sheriff A. O. Glover's office and confessed his desertion at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, in 1928. Unable to find employment, he was broke, hungry and cold, he told the sheriff. He asked to be "turned in."

Sheriff Glover took Price to Fort Bragg today.

BOBBY STILL FINDS TIME TO GOLF SOME

Atlanta, Nov. 25.—(AP)—There's a standing golf mate for four Atlanta business men early every Saturday afternoon at the East Lake Country club here.

One of the quartet is a short, chunky 28 year old player, sometime called the greatest golfer the world has ever known. The others are his father and two close friends.

Business worries end at Saturday noon for the junior and senior members of the law firm of Jones, Ewins, Powers, and Jones, and 1:30 p. m. generally finds the foursome ready to drive off the first tee.

Occasionally Bobby Jones finds time for a round during the week, but every Saturday he plays with his father, Robert P. Jones, Chick Ridley and "Tess" Bradshaw. Ridley sells automobiles and Bradshaw insurance. Both have known Bobby since childhood.

Bobby generally pairs with his dad and gives his opponents six strokes for each nine holes.

This round with his buddies is about all the time the young lawyer, Robert Tyre Jones, Jr., now can give to the game that brought him fame wherever golf is known.

Bobby gets a real kick out of this play. His friends see an almost careless, jubilant youngster enjoying his occasional poor shot or hot putt.

Let Bobby play on any other course, and you'll find a gallery following him, but at East Lake he's just another member.

Everyone has a friendly greeting for Bob but it is seldom that the others trail him. Bobby admittedly is enjoying golf more than he has for years. He loves the game, and with tournament play a thing of the past, Bobby can drive chip and putt without worrying about his shots. He's retiring to the Jones o' la decade ago, unburdened by crowns.

And occasionally—when there are no onlookers—the other members of the foursome see a rare sight, Bobby actually throws down a club now and then when calamity Jane, the putter, or his midiron behaves badly.

In addition to his law work, Bobby is a director of the First National Bank, vice-president of the Atlanta baseball club of the Southern Association and local counsel for one of the South's leading railroads.

Price Resigns As Head Coach In California

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 25.—(AP)—As a climax to a football season which brought four consecutive defeats, C. M. (Nibs) Price has resigned as coach at the University of California.

His resignation which applied also to his post as basketball coach was accepted last night by the student executive committee, whose action is final.

The committee, however, urged the athletic council to retain Price as basketball mentor. He has been basketball coach for five years and head football coach for four.

The executive committee also reinstated Arthur Arlett as director of the Daily California, student publication. The militant editor was removed last Wednesday night by the committee for his editorials and for implying players were subsidized at the University of Southern California, whose 74 to 0 victory over California two weeks ago started the furore. Stanford routed 41 to 0 Saturday.

The executive committee voted to pay Price the full amount due under his contract, which runs for another year. His salary was reported to be \$12,000 a year.

"My resignation was due to my belief that it was the only way to prevent the disension that was bound to follow the present unsuccessful football season," Price explained. "No coach can hope for success without the support of public opinion as represented by the alumni."

SPORTS SLANTS

Does a good football team affect a college's growth and development? Perhaps not, as a rule and on the basis of some evidence that Sol Metzger has set forth, yet it may be noted that St. Mary's of California, in 10 years of consistent gridiron improvement under the Notre Dame system, has expanded its student body from a mere 70 in 1921 to a grand total of 700 in 1930.

Edward Patrick (Slip) Madigan, famous as a Notre Dame center, better known as a coach and disciple of the Rockne system in the Far West, hardly would either demand or receive credit for this extraordinary growth of the college that in a decade has shifted from old brick buildings in Oakland to a \$2,500,000 campus group in the Moraga Valley.

Unquestionably a combination of factors developed St. Mary's, yet its success in football, attracting national wide attention, has played an important role. Not since Centre came out of the Kentucky hills just after the war to beat Harvard has so small a college as St. Mary's moved up into the very front rank of "big teams," culminating in a cross country trip to conquer the hitherto unbeaten Fardham eleven in New York.

Centre's enrollment did not keep pace with its football rise, nor did its passage from the gridiron heights develop any scholastic decline. The rawboned Kentuckians and Texans, led by Bo McMillin and Red Roberts, were a colorful, curious collection when they first invaded Cambridge in 1920.

St. Mary's furnished a marked contrast in 1930. The Galloping Gaiacs journeyed in style from California. The team stayed at the fashionable Westchester-Biltmore Country club; the executive staff and camp followers set up reception headquarters in an exclusive New York hotel.

St. Mary's showed a critical New York crowd two of the most capable performers of the year in Harry Ebbing, bare-headed end; and Fred Stennett, triple threat back; also a wild buffalo of a fullback in Angel Brovelli.

Industrial Alcohol, Ingersoll Rand, and International Business Machines. The mail order shares sagged, after yesterday's brisk upturn, and the motion picture shares declined moderately.

The reopening of some of the recently closed banks in the south and southwest, together with reports from banking commissioners indicating that the crisis had passed, had a salutary effect upon sentiment, while these difficulties had been isolated and due to local situations they had been an adverse psychological influence at a time when gloom was already deep.

Sevierville, Tenn., Nov. 25.—(AP)—Champion Fibre Company, whose lands in Tennessee are being condemned by the state for the Smoky Mountains National Park, expects to finish with evidence before Thanksgiving Day, attorneys announced today.

The state is expected to begin presenting testimony to the jury of view December 1.

William L. Hall, consulting forester, and chief witness for the Champion Fibre Company, yesterday testified the quantity and quality of spruce growing on the company's 39,000 acres in Tennessee is the best he has ever seen. He said he was with the United States Forestry Service for 20 years.

Hall testified he believed it "practicable and feasible to remove the timber from Tennessee" to the company plant at Canton, N. C. He placed a value of \$20 to \$21 a long cord on the spruce delivered at Canton, and an \$8.50 stumpage value.

He valued hemlock at \$12.60 a cord delivered, hardwood at \$9 on the stump.

In a list of figures submitted to the jury of view, it was disclosed that the company spent \$1,700,671 in acquiring 39,549 acres in the Tennessee mountain area, most of the land, the report showed, was bought in 1917 and 1918.
