BIG PART OF NATION FEELS STING OF COLD

Cold Wave Carries Sub-Zero Temperature to Middle West; South Also Hard Hit

Most of the nation felt the sting of cold today as in many places there was heavy snow.

The cold wave which brought sub-zero temperatures to points in the middle west extended throughout the south with freezing weather as far down as the Gulf and unwarmed low temperatures in North Florida. At Atlanta the mercury went to 22.

Readings ranging from one to six degrees below zero were recorded in Ohio and North Dakota, also some parts of Illinois.

Hundreds of motorists were marooned in Northwestern New York by a blizzard which piled drifts 10 feet high in places in the vicinity of Dunkirk.

A snow storm paralyzed traffic in Cleveland where the mercury fell to 8 above.

Along the Atlantic Coast sub-freezing weather prevailed. New York City experienced the coldest day of the season with temperatures well below freezing. Similar temperatures were felt along the New Jersey Coast.

Chicago, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The midwest, shivering from unseasonably low temperatures that have brought suffering and death to a score or more persons, was still feeling the effects of the cold snap today as word came that another disturbance was developing in Alberta, in Canada. The Canadian storm was reported moving south-eastward.

Although the weather bureau, predicting for the Chicago forecast area, said there would be some relief today in most sections of Nebraska, Kansas, North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Missouri and Wisconsin, colder weather again tomorrow was forecast for most of these states.

Varied reports, meanwhile, told of additions to the number of dead resulting directly and indirectly from the storm. In Chicago two men were found victims of exposure; another was reported found on a freight train at Hammond, Ind. while a fourth met a similar fate at Springfield, O. A woman was killed near La Fontaine, Ind., as her automobile ploughed into a snow drift and then hit a telephone pole and in Cincinnati a boy was killed, coasting.

Ask Administration Probe In New York

New York, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Because of testimony as to corruption, demands went to Governor Roosevelt today for a non-partisan legislative investigation of the city administration.

Norman Thomas, leader of the Socialist party, and Paul Blanshard, secretary of the city affairs committee, a civilian organization, have written the governor at Warm Springs, Ga.

Declaring that "our city government is shot through and through with corruption," Blanshard in his letter referred to evidence of sale of positions on the bench and police graft from vice.

"Blue-ribbon jury" was discharged yesterday when it failed to return a verdict in the trial of Martin J. Healy and Thomas T. Tommaney, former city employees and Tammany figures, charged with accepting a \$10,000 bribe to secure the appointment of George F. Ewald as magistrate in 1927. The date for their re-trial was set for December 8.

Fear Plane Pilot Perished In Storm

Cleveland, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Fear that William S. Griffin, Cleveland airplane pilot, may have perished in storms while flying Tuesday from Hamilton, Ontario, to Buffalo, N. Y., were expressed at Cleveland Airport today when his wife reported him missing.

Griffin, employed by Wing's, Inc., was flying a small cabin monoplane alone.

EATS TWO DINNERS BEFORE EXECUTION

Chicago, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Two Thanksgiving dinners were eaten by Leon Brown, negro, before he was placed in the electric chair today for his part in the murder of Martin French, bank guard slain in an attempted bank robbery in 1928. A goose dinner on the holiday noon was followed by a turkey dinner just before midnight.

THANKSGIVING DAY PASSES QUIETLY HERE

Observance Marked By Union Service At Memorial Baptist Church

Thanksgiving Day was quietly observed in Greenville yesterday. All public buildings and stores were closed practically the entire day in order that employees might enjoy the holiday which is widely observed throughout the nation.

There were no accidents or disorders of any kind to mar the serenity of the day in and around Greenville. Sheriff Whitehurst stated today that he did not receive a single call during the day, and things were similarly quiet with the city police department.

The principal feature of the observance here was the union services of all churches at the Memorial Baptist church yesterday morning at 10:30 o'clock. The service was simple but impressive, and the building was packed almost to capacity by a grateful people desiring to show appreciation for the many blessings bestowed upon their community during the year.

Rev. Lee S. Sadler, pastor of the Eighth Street Church of Christ, delivered the sermon. He expressed deepest gratitude for the blessings sent to the community, and declared that through present depression, he realized that God was working with a great end in view.

A special musical program was rendered by members of the various church choirs of the city. Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of the church, presided over the services. The opening prayer was made by Rev. W. A. Lillycrop pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal church. The scripture lesson was read by Rev. W. S. Harden, pastor of the Presbyterian church, after which prayer was made by Rev. E. L. Hillman pastor of the Methodist church. A collection was taken for the orphans.

Mr. Sadler, at the outset, told his hearers he was not going to attempt to deliver a sermon, that he desired to talk frankly and friendly about the things which the nation should be thankful for and health, when hundreds of people are confined in hospitals and clinics, unable to enjoy the fullness of life. He said he was deeply thankful for his ability to be able to serve with his mind and body.

He was thankful that he was able to sit down to a table bountifully filled with food when thousands of people in other nations are at the point of starvation. The people of this nation, he pointed out have been reared in the lap of luxury, and at times forget the extent of their blessings.

He expressed his appreciation of the sovereignty of a land blessed by the Bible which has released the minds of men, and given them a greater insight into the intrinsic value of life.

Boards of Directors of New Cotton Exchange Instant Need or Industry At This Time Is a Restoration of Public Confidence

New Orleans, Nov. 28.—(AP)—A governmental policy of "hands off" in the cotton market would bring relief to the present cotton situation, the board of directors of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange said today in its annual report.

"The instant need," the board's report said, "is the installation of confidence which can best be secured by removal of obstacles which have in a manner assisted in bringing about existing conditions."

"Naturally, individual speculators are averse to competing with the government and with the constant interference by Congress and the operations of the Farm Board, the life of speculation and investment has been more or less stifled."

"Private initiative, which successfully handled the monster crops of 1925 and 1926, and even far more difficult situations, can do the same thing with the present situation provided the government affords relief by amendment of the Farm Relief measure or some assurance of hands off."

The board endorses co-operative farm marketing as being "fair, competitive trade methods."

The report showed a falling off of gross handlings of the port of New Orleans from 2,202,912 in 1929 to 1,965,630 in 1930. Press handlings increased the board reported from 728,233 in 1929 to 1,140,968 in 1930 while spot business stood at 1,550,000 bales in 1930 against 1,400,000 in 1929.

"The decrease in gross handling," the report said, "was due mainly to falling off in through shipment from Texas points en route to southern mills via New Orleans, which is more apparent than real, as an indication of the trend of our local business which expressed by the press handlings shows a handsome gain."

Carolina Beats Virginia 41-0

Charlotte, Nov. 28.—(AP)—It was more, after all, than the scoreboard showed.

North Carolina beat Virginia University 41-0 at Charlottesville, Va., yesterday NOT 40-0 as the Associated Press and a half dozen newspapermen reported to the public. Officials revealed that today.

In the semi-haze of late afternoon George Houston, reserve North Carolina fullback, plunged three yards for the sixth North Carolina touchdown. Houston then took the ball and ripped his way across to convert. At the far end of the field where the press sat, the scoreboard bore out that belief.

Today "Dad" Brice, Auburn, referee yesterday told the Charlotte News and the Associated Press when questioned, that the officials met after the game, noticed the scoreboard error and decided the extra point counted.

Order Increase In Phone Rates In Three Towns

Raleigh, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The State Corporation commission today ordered increases in telephone rates of the Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company at Weldon, Roanoke Rapids, and Columbia.

The rates will be increased effective December 1 under the orders. Increases at Roanoke Rapids and Weldon will add 20 percent to the former rates while former rates at Columbia were not available.

The Carolina Telephone Company has recently improved its services to the three towns, including erection of modern exchange buildings at Weldon and Roanoke Rapids and rebuilding of the outside plant at Columbia.

The new monthly rate for Weldon and Roanoke Rapids will be \$4.50 for special business lines compared to a former rate of \$3.75 and \$4.00 per month for a two-party business line. Special residence lines will be \$3.00 per month against an old rate of \$2.50 and two party residence line will be \$2.50 per month.

The monthly rentals at Columbia will be \$3.25 for a business special line and \$2.00 for a residence special line.

SIX KILLED IN THIS STATE ON THANKSGIVING

More Than Dozen Persons Also Injured In Highway Accidents During Day

Charlotte, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Death, in its various violent forms, stalked through North Carolina on Thanksgiving Day, leaving six victims in its wake while more than a dozen persons were injured in highway accidents.

When the heavy truck he was driving left the highway near Rutherfordton, Allen Price, 18, son of a Gastonia mill worker, was instantly killed. His two companions were slightly injured.

Two deaths occurred on railroad tracks in Greensboro within a few hours of each other. Mrs. Annie Hodgins, 61, wife of E. N. Hodgins, of Guilford College, was fatally injured when struck by a train. A few hours earlier, an unidentified white man had been found beside the tracks, injured. He died without regaining consciousness.

An overhead shafting in a Lexington twine mill fell and crushed the skull of Mrs. Frankie Palmer, 29, an employee.

Dynamite he was using to blow up stumps exploded and fatally injured James Lanier, of Handy, Davidson county.

Major Thorpe, 10-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Thorpe, of Maiden, was killed late Wednesday when struck by an automobile driven by E. D. Baird, of Lenoir.

Three persons were injured in wrecks at High Point, including Fred N. Tate, furniture manufacturer, whose car struck a train at a grade crossing.

Another grade crossing accident near Charlotte brought serious injuries to James R. McCall, 20, Miss Mary Griffin and her brother, Sidney Griffin, of Jackson, were injured in an automobile collision here.

Four persons were injured in automobile accidents in Winston-Salem, including Hoyle Estridge and Franklin Johnson, Mount Holly high school students.

When his car crashed into a parked machine, Howard Weatherly, of Greensboro, was severely injured.

Four unidentified persons narrowly escaped injury when their automobile plunged into the Southern Railway's Piedmont Limited near Reidsville.

When their cars crashed in Concord, Mrs. G. R. Little, wife of a South Carolina government official, and Fred R. Bost, of Concord, were slightly injured.

Home Dobbis, of Concord, was accidentally shot in both knees while hunting. His condition was not considered critical.

Another hunter, Charles McKinley, manager of a Concord department store, suffered a severed tendon in the wrist and loss of part of the wrist bone when his gun barrel exploded.

Chadborn Loses Bank and Then Gains New One

Chadborn, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Chadborn was in the position today of having lost one bank and gained a new one—all in three days. The Bank of Chadborn, only bank in the town, closed its doors Wednesday. Yesterday, officials of the Waccamaw Bank and Trust Company at Whiteside, announced they would open a branch in Chadborn today. "Frozen assets" was given as the reason for closing of the Bank of Chadborn. It was capitalized at \$20,000 and on the last date of call listed deposits of \$50,000.

President of Closed Bank Kills Himself

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 28.—(AP)—With a shoe lace drawn around his neck the body of R. E. Donnell, 33, president of the closed Liberty Bank & Trust Co., an institution which he organized, was found in a hotel room here early today.

Search for Mr. Donnell had been made for several hours before it was learned that he had registered at the hotel. Repeated telephone calls to the room went unanswered and the door was opened. M. D. Johnson, assistant cashier of the bank, identified the body.

An envelope on which was written "to Ridley E. Donnell, Jr. from daddy" and containing his watch and chain was found in his vest pocket. The lace from his left shoe had been removed and tied around his neck over a handkerchief.

Police said Mr. Donnell had committed suicide and that no inquest was necessary.

Since the bank closed the night of November 12, friends of the banker said he had worked almost ceaselessly in an effort to re-open it and as a result had been under a constant strain.

GIANT PLANE FOR PROPOSED ATLANTIC SERVICE

Members Of Congress Try To Consolidate Positions On Troublesome Problems

Representative Reece Declares He Is Preparing Compromise Senate and House Deadlock on Muscle Shoals Issue; No Inclination to Shirk the Various Issues

Washington, Nov. 28.—(AP)—With the assembling day for Congress almost here, members today were engaged in consolidating their positions on troublesome issues.

Three prominent House members, active on as many points of conflict gave out word calculated to gather support for their efforts. The assistant Democratic leader, Representative McDuffie of Alabama, sought to reconcile dissatisfied members of his party to the co-operative position assumed right after election by seven out-standing Democrats.

The House and Senate deadlock over private versus government operation of Muscle Shoals drew from Representative Reece, Republican, Tennessee proponent of the first policy, an announcement he was preparing a compromise offer.

Representative Beck, Republican, Pennsylvania issued a call to members from the industrial states to resist any effort to eliminate alien population from the census count used in reapportioning the House. McDuffie contended there was no suggestion of an inclination to shirk duty nor any hint of enclaves for Democratic victory in the pledge against legislative obstructionism which former presidential candidates and active officers of the party had issued. He reiterated however, that "in this time of nation-wide distress and trying conditions of course the leadership of the Democratic party is more interested in the national welfare than in seeking party advantage."

Reece, chief House conferee on the Muscle Shoals question, said by modifications of the House bill he hoped to obtain agreement. But without disclosing specific changes he indicated he was maintaining his stand against government operation, for which the Senate has held out consistently. He maintained disposal of the plant was primarily a fertilizer question and should not be used as a symbol in the hydroelectric power controversy.

Peck, anti-prohibitionist, specifically attacked the move of the Methodist Board of Temperance and Public Morals for elimination of aliens.

Nettleton Abandons Plane In California After Futile Battle Against Cold

San Diego, Cal., Nov. 28.—(AP)—Instead of holding a new junior trans-continental flight record, Col. Nettleton, 20, of Toledo, Ohio was enrolled today as the youngest member of the famed "Caterpillar Club."

Nettleton made a 10,000 parachute drop to escape from a blinding rain and snow storm which enveloped his plane near here yesterday as he was within less than an hour of finishing his trans-continental flight.

He drifted gently to earth near a ranch house as his plane crashed a mile away. Except for being rained out and extremely cold, Nettleton was unhurt. He made his way to a ranch house and topped off his adventure with a big turkey dinner.

"The weather was 'sloppy'—rain fog and snow," said Nettleton. "I couldn't see, ten feet. The instrument 'froze' and since I couldn't see, there was only one thing to do and that was jump."

"I fought the weather as long as I dared. I hated to leap, but I was my only alternative. So I leaped the plane off, cut the switch, closed the throttle and rolled out the door."

"The last I saw of the plane it was floating gently. I had fallen several minutes and did not see the earth until less than 200 feet from it. That's how bad the weather was."

At the time young Nettleton leaped he was about 40 miles to go in his attempt to break the 21-hour three minute record held by Stanley Boynton, 18, of Rockland, Me.

The mercury did not improve any during the night as far as warmer weather is concerned and stood at 19 degrees this morning when denizens first poked their heads from under the cover.

MORE COLD IS PREDICTED IN CAROLINAS

Weather Man Forecasts Fair and Cold Next Twenty - Four Hours

The weather, and weather man offers his best prediction as basis for the statement, will be fair and cold in the Carolinas for the next 24 hours.

It might also be added that the weather is fair and cold in the Carolinas, so cold that every spot in the two states had a lower than freezing temperatures yesterday and today.

Henderson, with a mark of 12, took first place in the low mercury contest. It was the coldest November 27 night on record and a thin skin of ice formed on both lakes at the waterworks a rare occurrence. Greensboro was a close second with a reading of 13 while Hickory and Spartanburg each had 16. High Point, Salisbury and Goldsboro shivered with the thermometer at 17.

Asheville for the first time this year, failed to report the coldest weather, twenty degrees was the lowest the mercury dropped in the mountain city.

Greenswood got off with a minimum of 24 degrees while Raleigh's low was 23.4. Rockmount had 25 and Sumpter's low of 22 had been pushed up to 28 by a pleasant morning sun.

Along with the freezing weather came cracked automobile radiators in the garages of those who forgot to prepare for winter. The plumbing business also picked up with frozen pipes giving impetus to the work.

While the temperatures in the other states continued as low or lower than yesterday, the weather man promised an abatement of the high winds that have been swirling icy blasts northwards. It will be just as cold, the prediction said, but those who brave the out of doors will not mind it so much.

Asheville, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Still shivering in the grasp of its first cold wave of the winter season of 1930-31, the Asheville district looked forward to a break in the cold tomorrow.

Today's forecast of the weather bureau was for continued cold today and tonight but fair and warmer weather tomorrow. Early yesterday morning, Asheville experienced its coldest temperatures of the season when 11 degrees was registered. The mercury did not climb above 27 the entire day.

The lowest temperature for the city last night and this morning was 20. It was 20 at 8 o'clock but by 11 o'clock the mercury had climbed to 27 degrees. Skies were clear and the sun warmed the air.

A light blanket of snow remained over the mountains around Asheville today although most of that which fell inside the city Wednesday was gone.

Fox Has Hard Time Around Greensboro

Greensboro, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Henry Fox was a visitor in Greensboro over Thanksgiving, through no fault of his own.

Fox vied to a car load of race horses, got off the train here for a bite to eat. Unceremoniously the train pulled out, leaving Fox.

He spent the night in the warmth of the city hall's furnace room, and Thursday caught a side-door express for Washington. Ere the freight train got outside Greensboro city limits, Fox tumbled off, badly injuring an ankle.

Illington, N. C.—(AP)—Ten children and the driver were slightly injured when a school bus collided with a truck here.

NOTED SOVIETS TO TESTIFY IN MOSCOW TRIAL

Several Prominent Figures Called In Hearing of Plot to Overthrow Govt.

Moscow, Nov. 28.—(AP)—N. B. Krikenko, the most feared prosecutor in all Soviet Russia, today called unexpected witnesses in the dramatic trial of eight men charged with plotting to overthrow the Soviet government.

The thousands of Communists who have been listening to this trial over the radio thought that when the last of the defendants confessed and repented yesterday, the four judges would move immediately to pass sentence.

But Krikenko, who has slashed his way through trials like this before, required the presence of several notable Soviet figures to bring out more - incriminating facts - against the accused and the "industrial party" through which they are alleged to have plotted with foreign "capitalist" powers.

He called P. S. Osadchii, a member of the central executive committee and vice-president of the state planning commission; L. N. Gurovsky, former member of the finance committee, and several other past and present government officials. He did not say what he expected to draw from these witnesses, but it was understood he hoped to bring out further details of the parts played by foreign powers in the anti-Soviet intrigue.

It was more than likely, however, that their statements would be received in secret session, for the court ruled yesterday that there was to be no more open testimony regarding "friendly foreign powers."

Paris, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Matin, a Paris newspaper, today demanded that the French government break off diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia. The demand was in answer to accusations at the trial of eight Russian engineers in Moscow that the French government plotted armed intervention to destroy the Moscow regime.

Frank Kellogg Wins Nobel Prize

Oslo, Norway, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Frank B. Kellogg, whose initiative as American Secretary of State led to a world ban on wars of aggression, has been awarded the Nobel Peace Prize of 1929.

The peace prize award for 1930, announced simultaneously by the prize committee here, goes to Dr. Nathan Soderblom, Archbishop of Uppsala, Sweden, and pro-chancellor of the University of Uppsala since 1904.

Mrs. Kellogg, who is now a Justice of the World Court at the Hague, and Dr. Soderblom are both expected here Dec. 10 to receive the awards, which have a value this year of 73,000 kroner or about \$48,000.

It has been predicted for some time that Mr. Kellogg would receive the prize. In conjunction with Aristide Briand, French Foreign Minister, he drew up the Kellogg-Briand anti-war pact, which virtually every civilized nation now has signed, and which bans in principle, wars of aggression.

Mr. Kellogg was the Secretary of State in the cabinet of President Harding and of President Coolidge, retiring with inauguration of President Hoover. Upon resignation of Charles Evans Hughes from the World Court bench to become Chief Justice of the United States he has elected in Mr. Hughes' stead.

Dr. Soderblom received the 1930 award in recognition of his peace propaganda and efforts through church union.

Czar of Moviedom Marries a Widow

Washington, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Will H. Hays, czar of moviedom, and former postmaster-general, was married yesterday to Mrs. Jessie Herron Stutesman, widow of a former American minister to Bolivia. The marriage took place at the Bethesda, Maryland, home of the bride's brother, Colonel Charles D. Herron. Mrs. Hays is the daughter of Mrs. William Parke Herron, of Crawfordsville, Indiana.

Her first husband was James F. Stutesman, also an Indian, who died in 1919. She has made her home with her mother in Crawfordsville and with a brother, Major Frederick Herron, in New York.

The wedding, a quiet ceremony, was attended only by relatives of the two.

Sicks to Bible White Plains, N. Y.—Since her 100th birthday Mrs. Mary Dunbar Chamberlain, daughter of a Baptist minister, has read the Bible through twice. Her 101st birthday was on the holiday.

BEER BARON ASKS MERCY AND GETS IT

Chicago Public Enemy Called Back By Illness of His Son and Surrenders

Chicago, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Page ever changing the destinies of men, brought "Big Joe" Salts, "public enemy" and retired beer baron back to Chicago asking for and receiving mercy from Judge John H. Lyle, who had put him in jail as a father of a child was near death.

Wednesday night, Salts, once described as "the curliest gangster" in Chicago was secure from the law at his sanctuary at Winter, Wis., where he could laugh, or sneer, if he chose, at the efforts of Chicago police to bring him to the bar of justice as a vagrant. But in the form of a motor car late stepped in to change his mind.

The telephone at Salts' hang-out rang Wednesday night and conversation that followed brought the information that his 14-year-old son Emil, had been taken to a Chicago hospital, critically injured. One car had bowled him over, and another, following in its wake, had run over him, crushing his skull. Law or no law, Salts came back to Chicago and surrendered.

"I'll surrender," he told James Burke, his attorney, "but I'd like a chance to make bond. I want to be with my boy, but I don't want to disgrace him by being arrested in the same room with him."

Burke sized up the situation quickly and telephoned the judge.

"I know," he said, "you habitually jail the people you class as 'public enemies.' I know you show them as little quarters as you can—but in a case like this—well, Judge, the boy may be dying this very minute."

Judge Lyle, too, was quick to act. "I'll meet you and Salts at the Englewood police station at once and arrange to free him on bond immediately, so he can stay at the hospital without fear of being annoyed by the police."

It was no sooner said than done. Judge Lyle fixed the bond at \$30,000 which was approved without delay, and set the case ahead for next Tuesday, allowing Salts to hurry to the hospital to be with the boy whose injury had softened the man who is regarded by many as the "toughest" judge on gangsters in Chicago.

Have never gone hungry since the observance of the first Thanksgiving Day over 300 years ago, Mr. Sadler asserted, and there is no foundation for present pessimism over economic conditions existing in virtually all parts of the country. God, he said, has always watched over destiny of the people of America, and He will continue to do so as long as the nation walks in the path of righteousness.

The present depression is to be deplored, the speaker admitted, but he thanked God that the fast pace of the world during the last twelve years had been checked. He said he feared the nation in its prosperity was headed down the path of destruction—the way Babylon went.

He affirmed his faith in the future predicting that a new day lay ahead of the American people a day filled with improvement in the financial and business world with great spiritual changes.

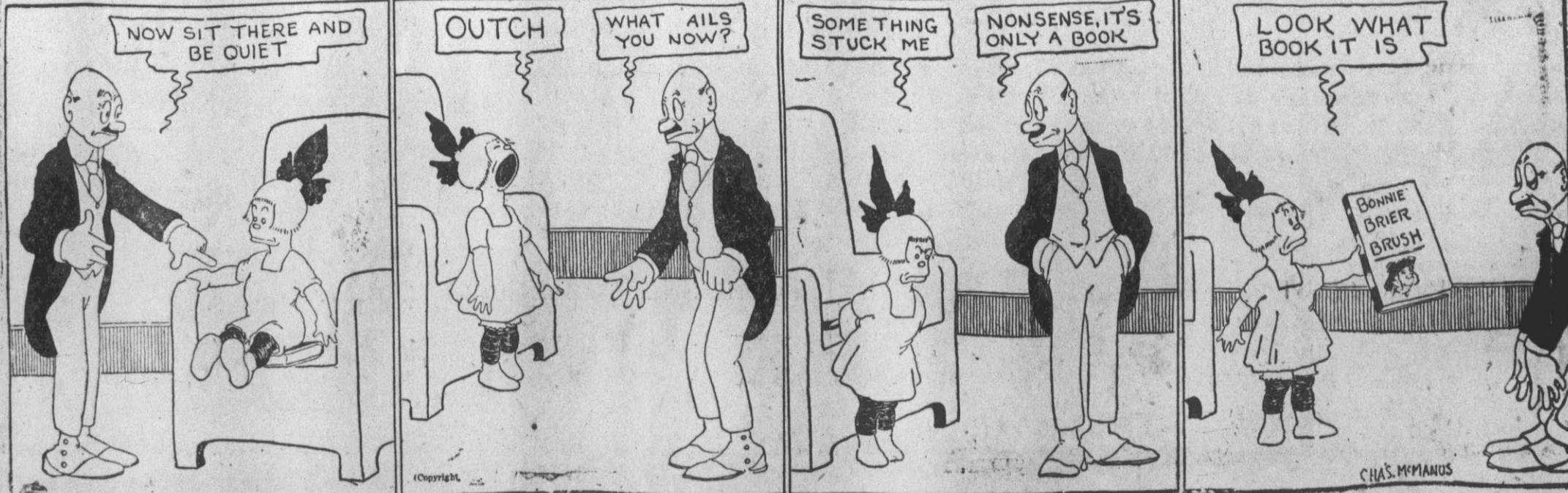

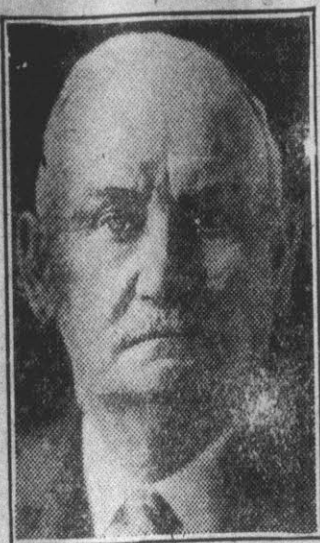

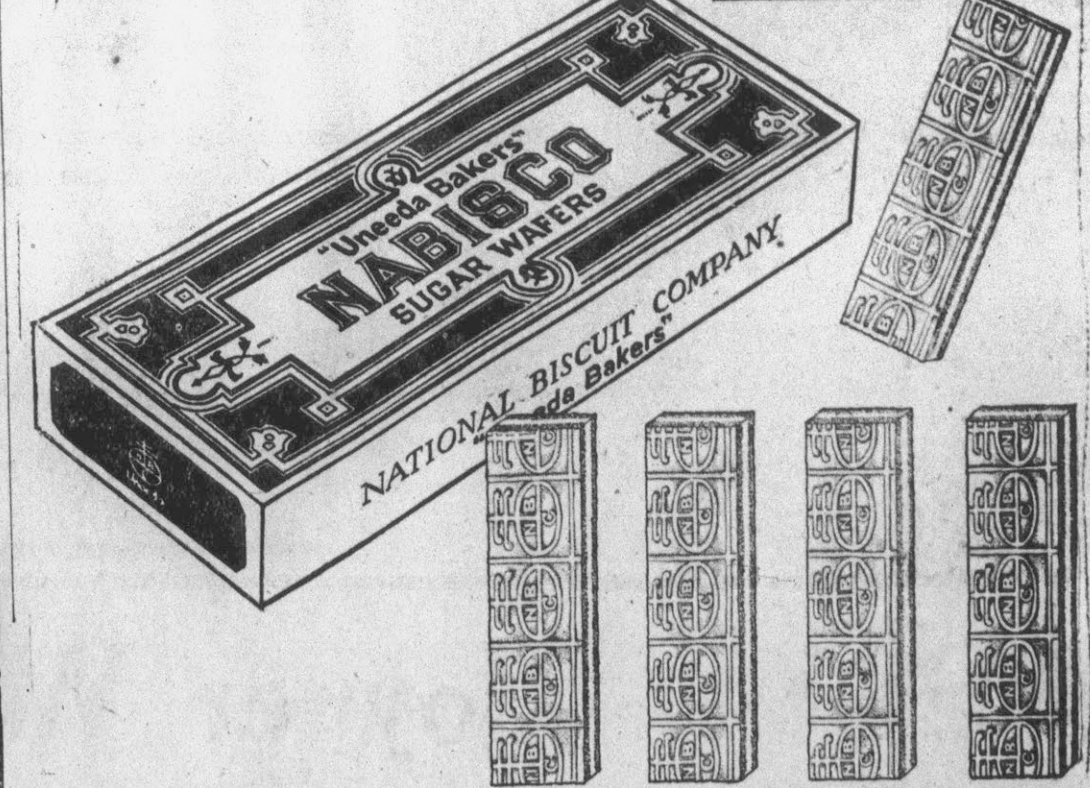

ALABAMA WILL PLAY IN ROSE BOWL JAN. 1ST

Los Angeles, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Alabama's undefeated Crimson Tide was selected today to oppose Washington State College, Pacific Coast conference champions, in the annual east-west gridiron classic at the Pasadena Rose Bowl New Year's Day.

Earl Foster, graduate manager of Washington State, extended the invitation and President George H. Denny of Alabama announced at Tuscaloosa that it would be accepted.

It will be the third visit of the Crimson Tide to the Pacific Coast for the annual Tournament of Roses game pitting east against west.

Alabama defeated the University of Washington 20 to 19 in 1925 and a 7 to 7 tie was played with Stanford in 1927.

Washington State was invited several days ago to represent the west. The Cougars awaited the outcome of Alabama's game with Georgia yesterday before extending the formal invitation.

Atlanta, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Buck Bailey, line coach of Washington State, told the Atlanta Journal today in a dispatch from Birmingham that "the west is going to see one of the most versatile teams in the country."

Bailey scouted the Alabama-Georgia game yesterday when the Crimson Tide took the game by 13-0 score.

He said the high light of the game "was Alabama's fine tackling and blocking." He praised the work of Cain and Suther of Alabama in running with the ball and termed the work of Campbell in his run returning a punt behind interference "the best of the game."

For pure unadorned power I haven't seen a team in three years with as much power as Alabama showed against Georgia," he said. And imagine how tough Alabama can be when they are throwing forward passes.

The veteran Dan McGugin, coach at Vanderbilt since football in the south was in its infancy, when told of Cody's resignation said today he would urge Vanderbilt to employ his former pupil as a line coach.

Cody was a star tackle for Vanderbilt, and later assisted McGugin in coaching. He also coached at Mercer before coming to Clemson four years ago.

SPORTS SLANTS

The influence of sweet charity has been paramount in submerging the football differences of Army and Navy for the time being, to bring about their post-season gridiron battle of December 13, but it is entirely possible the service rivals combatants and non-combatants alike, will find out how much they have missed each other and agree that continuation of their break is so much petty foolishness.

The wish here may be father to the thought, for football fans have missed the glamorous touch of the Army-Navy finale since the breach developed after the 1927 season. Deep-rooted differences between the two academies exist over eligibility. However, if they can sink them in the interests of good sportsmanship, restoring a full bloom a natural rivalry and a keen football contest.

The trouble is that both academies have felt offended by rival propaganda ever since the Navy initiated three-year rule upon Army. Navy, since then, has adopted the more conciliatory attitude. Army has stuck to its guns. The probability is that if Army was conceded its point for a year or two, the military academy then would make concessions leading to a new agreement. In short, Army wants fulfilled the old contract, which had three years more to run, before listening to any compromise proposals.

Meanwhile, for charity the two service schools will attract the biggest football "gate" for their game at the Yankee Stadium since they drew something like \$750,000 at Soldier Field, Chicago, in 1928. Top price at Chicago was \$10, the highest ever asked for a football ticket, except by speculators. The scale of New York prices will be from \$5 to \$50, with no "Annie Oakleys" whatsoever.

The cause of charity has helped to make the late-season gridiron schedule the most extensive and attractive in many years, with the climax well into December instead of around its usual spot on the calendar. Thanksgiving.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The rail shares coasted downward with the brakes off in today's stock market, dragging the rest of the list after them.

Trade was unusually light, however, and most of the prominent industrial shares resisted the decline after getting down a point or two. With only a day and a half between the holiday and the week-end, speculative interest was at low ebb.

Missouri Pacific dropped 6 points to 25, the lowest price in 6 years; then recovered moderately. Illinois Central slid down 4 points to a new low for the past 30 years. New York Central slipped back 3 to the lowest point since 1928. Such issues as New Haven, Norfolk and Western, Union Pacific, Southern Railway and Atchafalpa lost 3 to 5 points. Industrials and utilities lost 2 to 3 points, including U. S. Steel, Am. Car, American Telephone, Westinghouse Electric, Royal Dutch, Eastman, Dupont, Loews, Goodyear, North American, Consolidated Gas, Case and Allied Chemical. These shares, in the main, held well above the lows of November 10.

Business news appearing over the holiday seemed a shade more cheerful, but the market was evidently not impressed with it. Building contracts awarded during the third week of the month were substantially higher than during either of the first two weeks. The recent decline in electric power consumption was checked, the volume for the week showing a gain of 1-5 of one per cent from the previous week. October railway operating income reports continued to show improvement over September, with an aggregate decline of less than 25 per cent from the like month a year ago, as compared to September's drop of about 30 per cent from that month in 1929.

Publication of a statement by Charles C. Paulding, vice-president of the New York Central, describing the present predicament of the railroad as fully as serious as that which faced them in 1929, and demanding sweeping revision of the transportation act, appeared to have provided impetus to the decline of the carrier issues, although Wall Street has been inclined to regard the determined stand being taken by rail executives for an easing of their burdens as encouraging. Mr. Paulding's assertion that the present difficulties of the carriers are due to fundamental changes in transportation, rather than the temporary effects of the business depression, tended to dissipate any cheer which might have been extracted from the October earnings reports, nevertheless.

The recent decline in railroad bonds has been in unsettling development. In the case of Illinois

Central, however, the fear that earnings would fall below the New York state legal requirements on bonds for savings banks appeared unduly pessimistic, as the management estimated final quarter net at about \$450,000 over the like period of last year, which would lift the year's earnings above the minimum requirement. In the case of Missouri Pacific net for the common stock after regular preferred dividends aggregated \$3.64 for the first ten months. The situation is obscured, however, by the large accumulation of unpaid dividends on the preferred.

Call money was appreciably tighter, but this was regarded as more encouraging than otherwise, as it presumably indicated an increasing demand for funds for the holiday trade. Loans held officially at 2 per cent, and no concessions were available in the outside market, where funds have recently gone begging at one per cent.
