

ASK REMOVAL OF TROOPS IN STRIKE ZONE

Governor Pollard to Consider Recommendation Upon Arrival At Danville

Richmond, Va., Nov. 29.—(AP)—Governor Pollard, who left Richmond this morning for Danville to personally investigate, protests against the dispersing of strikers' pickets at Schoolfield will have for consideration upon his arrival a recommendation that four companies of the state troops be removed from the strike area.

The recommendation was made by Colonel H. L. Ople, commanding the 11th Infantry, and was received today by Adjutant General W. W. Sale. The removal of the troops will be subject to the approval of the governor.

Just prior to leaving Governor Pollard said he desired to personally survey the situation. Officers of the Danville local United Textile Workers of America telegraphed the governor on Thursday, protesting against the dismissal of union pickets at the entrances of the Dan River cotton mills by military authorities since receipt of the telegram Governor Pollard has been studying reports on the affair.

Governor Pollard was accompanied by Colonel John A. Cutchens, commanding the 29th Division, Virginia National Guard.

Danville, Va., Nov. 29.—(AP)—The strike situation in Schoolfield remained unchanged today with troops patrolling a five mile area throughout the night when the mercury sank to 17 degrees. Mill village streets revealed little activity.

The Danville situation remained quiet and in control of civil authorities. Police said few gates had been picked today.

Interest in the strike situation today centered chiefly on what preparations are being made by county and city authorities to cope with the situation, should troops be recalled, necessitating setting up a new civil control.

The Danville police commission was to meet today to act on a proposal that, during the emergency, city and county should block out a technical line separating them and co-ordinate policing of all mills in and out of the city.

Asheville Takes Check of Finances

Asheville, Nov. 29.—(AP)—The City of Asheville today was taking stock of its financial conditions by checking collateral back of securities held to protect deposits of \$4,653,112, which were in the Central Bank and Trust company which failed to open November 20.

A list of the securities protecting the deposits was compiled by the city secretary-treasurer yesterday and the city attorney's department today was engaged in checking over the collateral back of the notes and other items which have been held in a safety deposit box to secure the bank deposits.

The face value of the securities listed Mayor Gallatin Roberts explained today is \$5,296,909.77 but it will be impossible to check their actual value possibly for some months. It likewise will be some months before it can be determined how liquid they are.

Securities are classified as follows:

Collateral notes, \$389,640.51; real estate mortgage notes, \$2,249,353.97; endorsed notes, \$249,436.62; chattel mortgages, \$22,452.23; notes of corporations, \$303,053.44; and debenture bonds, \$1,635,000.

REUNION OF TYSONS HELD THANKSGIVING

Dr. J. Y. Joyner, of Raleigh, Is Principal Speaker at Exercises At Tyson's Church

Farmville, Nov. 29.—The annual family gathering of the Tyson descendants and their families, was held on Thanksgiving Day at Tyson's Church, the ancient assembly ground of this organization.

The exercises began at 11 A. M. with an address by President Smith of Ayden, in which he stated that there was some misunderstanding about the printing of the invitations and programs, which together with the freezing weather probably accounted for the crowd being smaller than usual. Communications from distant relatives were read, and resolutions of respect for Senator Laurence D. Tyson, a distinguished Pitt County kinsman, were read and adopted, and a committee was appointed to draw up resolutions for John David Cox, late secretary and a zealous member of the Tyson organization.

The secretary and treasurer, Mrs. O. H. Jackson of Winterville, reported to the collection of material for preserving the records, which include a scrap book. An important piece of business was the change in date of the reunion, from Thanksgiving Day to the last Thursday in September, for the reason that the former date interfered with individual family reunions which ideal this body would promote.

In the election of officers, Mrs. J. L. Shackleton of Farmville was made president; Dr. John Joyner of Greenville, vice-president; Mrs. O. H. Jackson of Winterville, re-elected as secretary and treasurer; the executive committee composed of Dr. B. T. Cox of Winterville, Walter G. Sheppard and T. C. Turnage of Farmville, was re-elected, and Miss Tabitha DeVisconti of Farmville was re-elected as chairman of the genealogy committee.

In a splendid talk, County Solicitor William S. Tyson of Greenville traced the observance of Thanksgiving Day from the Canaanites through Scotland, England, to America, and up to the present day. His theme was the perpetuation of the names and histories of prominent families of the state with mention of what other countries are doing along the line of developing the family in the way of state allowance, contributory insurance, and the equalization system. He also spoke of the Tysons met during a recent trip abroad.

Echoes of the United Confederate Veterans' reunion at Biloxi, and an account of a visit to Alabama relatives on the return trip, were given by Mrs. J. L. Shackleton under the subject of "Tysons in Other States". Mrs. T. C. Turnage, recent of the local chapter, D. A. R., and candidate for the State regency, was present and made a brief talk in which she endorsed the idea of family reunions, and stated that "The D. A. R. organization is the handmaiden of the family." She also told of the chapter house being planned by her group, as a community center and museum.

The main address of the day was delivered by Dr. James Yarker Joyner introduced by Walter G. Sheppard as the man whose name in the miracle like progress of education in North Carolina since put to bed with chills.

President Hoover Plans To Place World Court Adherence Before Senate

Discarding Contrary Advice by Leaders of His Party, President Will Submit Controversial Issue At Next Session; Quarrels With Senator Watson

Washington, Nov. 29.—(AP)—discarding contrary advice by the leaders in his party, President Hoover will place World Court adherence up to the Senate this session.

In announcing his decision, however, the President said he was for the Senate leaders to decide whether the proposal should be brought up for action at the show term.

"Certainly," he said, "it should not be made an instrument of obstruction in attempts to force an extra session."

It was just this that some disappointed Republicans were fearful of today. Among them was Senator Watson of Indiana, the party leader. He conferred with the President before the announcement, urged strongly against submission of the controversial issue now. There were indications he had quarreled with Mr. Hoover.

Chairman Borah of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, opponent of American entry of the court, announced he would promptly put it before the committee.

"I assume it would not be sent up if it was not desired to have it disposed of as soon as practicable," said Borah, "I shall proceed upon that theory."

Senator Swanson of Virginia, ranking Democrat on the Foreign Relations committee, expressed pleasure at the president's decision but suggested consideration be postponed until next December. The assistant Democratic leader, Walsh of Montana, on the other hand urged action now on in a special session. Both opposed permitting the issue to interfere with emergency relief measures.

Watson said he was withholding final opinion on the 'World Court but that he had always opposed joining it as well as the League of Nations and now saw no reason for changing his mind.

"Unless there is some modification of the World Court protocol I shall oppose it as I always have," he concluded.

This is the situation which now brings up the question of ratification.

Four years ago the Senate voted to enter the World Court, but attached six reservations. One provided the court should not render advisory opinions on questions in which the United States has or claims an interest. It was never accepted by the other nations.

Elihu Root two years later drew up revised court rules to meet this reservation. President Hoover approved it, so did the League of nations. The President signed the revised protocol a year ago and by his decision now it is again before the Senate.

Supporters of adherence are confident of the two-thirds majority needed for ratification, but they recognize a group of about 20 opponents who could block approval for a long time—far too long, many fear, to permit disposal of all necessary legislation in the brief three months remaining before this Congress passes out of existence.

COLD WAVE TO ABATE DURING THE WEEK-END

Slowly Rising Temperatures to Break the Cold Spell in Carolinas Today

The slightly warmer temperatures the weather man sees for the Carolinas this week-end bashed fully made their debut today but the rising mercury was still far below the freezing point.

Henderson, with a low mark of 14 today in contrast with a 12 yesterday, remained the coldest city in the two states.

Greensboro's low of 13 yesterday was replaced today with a 16 but High Point lost a point and dropped from 17 to 16.

Raleigh was another point reporting colder weather today, the mercury there continued its drop and landed at 19. The coldest of the year, Winston-Salem reported a low of 20 that gradually advanced to the 25 mark early today. Wilsor also had 20 degrees. Spartanburg's thermometer advanced four degrees to give the South Carolina city a mark of 21.

Charlotte lacked less than a half a degree of breaking a 52-year old cold weather record today. The low reading there was 24, one point higher than yesterday.

Greenville, with 27, and Columbia, with 28, were the warmest cold cities in the two states. Today's marks were three to four points higher than those of yesterday.

With the slight rise in temperatures, the sister states are scheduled to see increased cloudiness, the weather forecast said.

President Selects Virginian to Fill Vacancy of James J. Davis As Labor Secretary

Washington, Nov. 29.—(AP)—In expressed defense of equal opportunity to office, President Hoover has gone outside the American Federation of Labor ranks to fill the cabinet vacancy left by James J. Davis.

William N. Doak, of Virginia, has been chosen Secretary of Labor. In announcing the appointment late yesterday, the president said the assertion of William Green, president of the federation, that the post should be filled from within his organization, laid on the Chief Executive "the duty to maintain the principle of open and equal opportunity and freedom."

WILL TRY TO AVOID EXTRA U. S. CONGRESS

Speaker Longworth Expresses Unalterable Opposition to Another Session

Washington, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Speaker Longworth today declared unalterable opposition to an extra session of congress and said he would do everything possible to avoid one.

"What we want," he said "is the recovery of business and the cessation of unemployment. Legislative uncertainty would retard business and prolong unemployment."

Longworth said he favored settling the Muscle Shoals controversy at the short session.

Meanwhile, Chairman Hawley of the House Ways and Means committee said treasury receipts "will not warrant a renewal at this time of the one percent reduction in income taxes," and added:

"Neither will there be any increase in taxation."

Legislation for administration of the Alabama war time project is in conference between the Senate and House. The speaker expressed hope for a report, whether of agreement or not, so that the House could vote to dispose of the matter.

The Senate favors government operation; and Longworth said such operation could be undertaken at Muscle Shoals as an experiment without committing the government to such a policy.

At the same time, he said if the Norris resolution to change the short session meeting time of Congress were amended to fix a day of adjournment of the second session, he would favor it.

Governor Becomes Delta Kappa Member

Durham, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Governor O. Max Gardner today became a member of the Duke University chapter of Omicron Delta Kappa, National leadership fraternity.

The governor was initiated here this morning. At the same time President Frank P. Graham of the University of North Carolina, Chief Justice Stacy of the State Supreme Court, and W. N. Reynolds of Winston-Salem were inducted into the order.

Dr. R. L. Flowers and Dean Pustiner of the faculty were also initiated today as were seven undergraduates: Preston Moses, Chatham, Va.; Gaither Pratt, of Winston-Salem; Paul Erwin Charlotte; Lee Davis, Waynesville; William Simons, Wilmington; Joe Mann, Greensboro; and George Hoopy, Lenoire, Pa.

German Seaplane Damaged By Fire In Lisbon Harbor

Lisbon, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Fire broke out in the great German seaplane DO-X, moored in the harbor here today consuming one of the huge wings before it was extinguished.

The wings of this big ship contained quarters for some of the crew and important parts of the mechanical equipment. They were passageways to the motors, and while the craft was in flight the narrow spaces were filled with a tremendous roar.

Inside the wings the girders holding the ship together looked like the tangle of steel which is the skeleton of a skyscraper.

Passenger quarters, the kitchen, the smoking room, and quarters for the officers and some of the crew were in the main hull of the plane.

Hundreds of gallons of gasoline had been poured into the great tanks of the flying ocean liner a few hours before the first wing suddenly burst into flames.

When the fire was seen by members of the marine aviation staff ashore sailors and Portuguese pilots volunteered by the dozen for the perilous job of fighting the fire, but even their valiant efforts could not save the big ship. The left wing was destroyed.

The DO-X arrived here on Thanksgiving day after a shake-down flight about Europe in preparation for a trans-Atlantic trip either to New York or Brazil.

It was to have left today or tomorrow for Cadiz where the engines were to have been overhauled.

John D. Rockefeller Gives Interview Thanksgiving Message For All The World

Arriving At Jacksonville En Route to Ormond Beach, World's Richest Man Repeats Prayer of Praise and Blessings He Receives

Jacksonville, Fla., Nov. 29.—(AP)—John D. Rockefeller — "Neighbor John" to his Florida friends — turned inquiringly upon an interviewer as he arrived here this morning, en route to his winter home at Ormond Beach.

Hardly had greetings been exchanged, when he said he had a message of thanksgiving for the world.

Falteringly but clearly he read: "If I am weak and you are strong, 'Why then, why then, 'To you the braver deeds belong, 'And so, again, 'If you have gifts and I have none, 'If I have shade and you have sun, 'Tis yours with freer hand to give, 'Tis yours with truer grace to live, 'Than I, who, giftless, sunless, stand, 'With barren life and hand, 'He explained it was a part of the daily reading at his breakfast table each morning.

"That is," he said, "a beautiful and timely sentiment, written by one of our well known poets."

There is also morning prayer at the Rockefeller board. He said he found solace in a prayer of thanksgiving and the "golden rule."

Again he read: "Lord, make us willing to share with others the blessings wherewith Thou hast crowned our lives. Help us to understand that our really greatest gain is in sharing with others what Thou has so graciously given to us. Freely we have received from thy bountiful hand; may we in turn freely give of ourselves to those who need what we can give. As our Lord made each life that touched him richer thereby, so may we make our lives a source of blessing for His sake, remembering that as we give to others we give to him—Amen."

"Neighbor John" sat in thoughtful silence for a moment.

"If I could get that message to the world," he said, "I would feel that I had done a good deed. Nothing I might say myself could express my sentiments half so well."

Appearing in fine spirits and enjoying "splendid health" Mr. Rockefeller said his party had a "delightful trip" to Florida.

"Our friends everywhere are so kind," he said smilingly. "Members of the family and neighbors motored to the train with us. We had to leave at six o'clock in the morning but none seemed to mind."

Asked about his golf, the general "Mr. R." as he is known to his household staff, quickly replied: "Never better. It is a splendid game and keeps us out in the open. Do you play?"

He appeared immediately interested in the subject of his favorite sport. He could not say if he would be able to play this year with his companion, General Ames. Mr. Rockefeller was not certain the general would be south this winter.

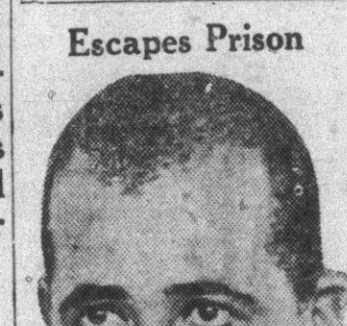
Sitting in the early morning sunshine, beside a window of his special car, Mr. Rockefeller turned to a discussion of writing. He said he was an ardent admirer of the writings of Calvin Coolidge.

"They express so much," he added. "I wrote him when I read the first one of his articles and congratulated him."

Alertly interested, Mr. Rockefeller glanced over the headlines of the newspaper his secretary placed beside him.

As the train pulled out of the last stage of the journey to Ormond Beach, Mr. Rockefeller hailed his interviewer long enough to give him a collection of shiny new dimes—"One each," he explained, "for each member of your family."

PREMONITION OF DISASTER HAUNTED FLIER

Mrs. Keith - Miller Cast Aside Fears In Attempt to Fly From Havana to Miami

Havana, Nov. 29.—(AP)—A premonition of death which she thrust aside through fear of being thought a coward, haunted Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller, plucky Australian aviatrix, whom air officials here believed today to have perished in an attempt to fly from Havana to Miami yesterday.

Virtually all hope has been abandoned for her safety, searching parties in six airplanes from here and Miami having flown for hours over the stretch of gulf and Florida Keys without a trace of her or the plane in which she set out at 9:11 A. M. yesterday. She was due in Miami before noon.

Friends Mrs. Keith Miller made here since her arrival last week from Pittsburgh accused them of themselves today for not having prevented her, forcibly if necessary, from making the flight against odds, when were all the odds of a poorly conditioned plane, extremely rough weather and the mental hazard arising from fright when she was flying over water.

"I don't know why it is but something tells me I'm going down," she said just before she took off. "I've had the feeling every since I crossed on the way over from Florida and somehow or other I can't shake it off."

She called her plane an "unworthy crate, one which anybody might refuse to fly."

Explaining that it was a conditionally licensed ship which she had "rescued from a junk pile" and finally reconditioned.

"I am trying to put myself over as a commercial pilot," she said. "If I can make a flight like that in an old ship without any of the usual equipment, it ought to be an easy matter to get some company interested in using me as a regular pilot."

Many of those who came in contact with Mrs. Keith-Miller during her week's residence here remarked at her preoccupation and at her comments of not having been able to eat or to sleep properly. She admitted to some that she was "worried about the water hop," but she refused to consider the idea of not making the return trip in her plane alone, and finally after being held up by weather reports for three days, insisted upon starting even though the weather was still bad.

"Everyone gives me credit for being brave, and to make a go of it I never let them think otherwise."

Several Vessels Reported In Distress or Missing Show Up After Severe Battle With the Elements. No Word Received From Two Missing Fliers Or Stamer Upshur On Carolina Coast

Several vessels reported in distress or missing reached port today as the unexpected fury of winter's first general onslaught abated. Two fliers were still missing, and in some sections threat of snow promised more trouble after the unseasonable cold of the last day or two.

Deaths attributed to the weather numbered more than fifty.

The Canadian grain carrier Mable Bay, feared lost in Lake Superior, passed Salt Ste. Marie undamaged after lying in shelter to escape heavy seas. The freighter Simco reached Cleveland after being unreported for hours in Lake Erie snowstorm and the British steamer Wearbridge, which asked aid yesterday off Cape May, N. J., proceeded on her way.

No further tidings came from the disabled Upshur reported as drifting off Cape Hatteras.

Cape Hatteras, Nov. 29.—(AP)—No word had been received today or at Cape Lookout, where the Coast Guard maintains a radio station, from the steamship Upshur or vessels sent to aid the ship reported in distress 45 miles southwest of Diamond Shoals.

A calm sea, however, allayed fears for the safety of the merchant chandlers and miners line boat, the local Coast Guard said the ship would probably be taken in tow by the tug Wotoco, owned by the Wood Towing corporation, which put into Cape Lookout late yesterday to request assistance in aiding the Upshur.

Coast Guard officials said they had been advised the steamer Upshur, also a Merchants and Miners ship, was standing by the vessel.

Take Definite Step Toward Inauguration Ocean Air Mail Line

Washington, Nov. 29.—(AP)—A definite step toward inauguration of a trans-Atlantic air mail service was taken today by the post office department.

Bids will be opened at noon on December 29 in the office of Assistant Postmaster General Glover for an air mail route from New York by Norfolk, Va., or Charleston, S. C. and the nby Hamilton Bermuda and the Azores or some other practicable route to a point in Europe to be designated by Postmaster General Brown.

The return is to be made over the same route. The contract to run for a ten year period, beginning June 1, 1931.

As planned, service each week will be once a week. The postmaster general will reserve the right to increase the frequency.

The contract would not require the mail carrier to fly east of Bermuda until after July 1, 1931 or later if the postmaster thinks necessary.

Sir Hubert Wilkins Will Lecture Here On December 12

Sir Hubert Wilkins, the great English explorer and aviator, will be the December attraction at East Carolina Teachers College, appearing there on the evening of December 12.

He ranks among the three or four greatest living explorers and has a record second to none along some lines. He has a long list of "firsts" to his credit, among them, the first to make a trans-polar flight in the Antarctic on November 13, 1928—the first to discover new land from an airplane and the first to make moving pictures of a battle-field from the air.

He has made three Antarctic trips, the first in 1919, the second in 1921 with Shackleton, and the third last year and the first part of this.

Right now, when interest is centered on the Antarctic, because of the Byrd expedition, is the time for Sir Hubert Wilkins' visit, for it gives one a chance to follow up what he has read and heard and seen through the movies and appreciate all the better what this great explorer has to tell and show.

Wilkins began his exciting career which has been filled with adventure as well as with scientific research of every great value by doing aviation work in the Balkan Wars, before the world war. In 1913 he went into the Arctic with Stefansson as motion picture photographer, and left him for the purpose of enlisting in the world war.

He served with the Australian forces, showed unusual bravery on the French western front, leaving the service with the rank of captain. In 1928 he made a flight to the Arctic with Amundsen.

The theory that he is now working on is that the North Pole can be reached by submarine in the summer time and he will tell of his plans for testing that theory in another expedition in the near future. He will also tell of his experience in both the Arctic and the Antarctic regions and will show pictures taken while in those sections.

This promises to be the most thrilling evening of entertainment that has been offered by the college.

1902 ranks next to that of Governor Aycock.

Dr. Joyner stated that his would not be a formal speech, but a heart to heart talk with his kinsmen or "The Needs and Benefits of Family Reunions." He contrasted the environment of the old pioneers, of their sacrifices, dangers, the intimacy of family life made necessary by sparse population, with that of the present generation, mostly urban, which with its radios, automobiles, and noisy and speedy devices in these days of artificiality, restlessness, and mad rush for pleasure tend to weaken and dissolve family ties, thereby causing the crumbling of the pillars of civilization.

He gave as example Rome, Babylon, Greece and other lands and nations, which has seen the fulfillment of the curse in the myth of Midas, another name for Mammon, and made a strong plea for the exaltation of man above gold, and service over selfishness. In speaking of the growing tendency to scoff at sentiment, he declared that "Sentiment is the finest thing in life, and it would be the salvation of this civilization, if planted in the hearts of your children and allowed to pass on to coming generations."

in appointments to public office."

Green immediately expressed disapproval on behalf of the federal officers. His statement refrained, however, from saying whether opposition would be carried to the length of seeking a Senate refusal of confirmation.

Doak is legislative representative of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, a union not affiliated with the federation. He is the first native American named for the post. He was considered by many Mr. Hoover's choice for the post two years ago, but federation opposition was strong.

There has been no indication in the Senate so far that objection will be raised to the appointment. The president said Doak bore the endorsement of several score labor unions, a number belonging to the Federation, and pointed out that Green himself had expressed high personal regard for the man.

"I know," said Mr. Hoover, "that Mr. Doak will represent all labor in his public duties, and that he will reinforce the sympathetic attitude of the administration to the great problems of the wage earner."

"I feel many times like giving it up because I know it's eventually going to get me. But I can't—people would think me a coward. I guess I've just got to keep on until it does get me. Life at its best is short anyhow, so I guess I have no complaint coming."

She commented that what worried her most was that she had no blind-flying instruments or turn or bank indicator. Asked why she had not equipped her plane with the latter instrument, she said "frankly, I could not afford one."

Aviation officials, returning on the two planes which flew over her route last night, declared that "not even a scout plane could stay aloft in those waves. That 'bullet'—so her plane was called—lived up to its name; it went straight down if it had to make a pancake drop."

COTTON MARKET

New York, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 4 to 7 points in response to relatively easy Liverpool cables and a continuation of the recent selling which appeared to come from Southern and local sources.

There was also selling here for Liverpool and the Continent, which sent the price of May contracts off to 10.96, or 10 points net lower and about 125 points below the high level of October 28th. There was considerable trade buying and covering on this decline which steadied the market toward the end of the first half hour. Trading was moderately active.

Liverpool cables said there had been hedging and general liquidation in that market but reported a slight improvement in the demand for cotton goods from India, with increased auction sales in Shanghai. The amount of cotton on shipboard awaiting clearance at the end of the week was estimated at 161,000 bales against 191,000 last year.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Bears gave the stock market an upward tilt today, as they closed out their short contracts at the end of a week of slowly but almost steadily sagging prices.

The market was extremely dull, the turnover of about 650,000 shares making the smallest Saturday total since August, but the list as a whole manifested the best tone since the upturn of a week ago yesterday. Prominent shares generally closed 1 to 2 points up.

A slight stiffening in copper prices, report that the Burlington Railroad plans to pay a sub-

stantial extra dividend, partly from surplus, indications of a slight pick up in retail trade, with expectations of further gains as Christmas club funds are distributed Monday, together with the further drop of \$63,000,000 in brokers loans provided what background there was in the day's news for the advance. Primarily, however, the market appeared to be governed by technical internal conditions.

There was some further selling of rails and utilities in the first hour, but this soon gave way to a gradual upturn. Atchinson, after losing 3 points, rallied to close up 11-4. The rails generally recovered.

Issues gaining a point or more included U. S. Steel, American Can, American Telephone, North American, Kennebec, U. S. Rubber, and Sears Roebuck.

Woolworth was bought in some volume, moving up 2 points. Other shares gaining 2 points or more included Eastern, Goodyear, Air reduction, New York Central and Allied Chemical. Firestone preferred advanced 3. Rock Island, however, declined 2 points to a new low.

Reports from the steel industry indicated further slackening of operations in the Youngstown area next week. It is estimated that output there will be cut from 46 to 43 percent of capacity.

Goodyear Airship To Give Exhibition Flights Here Sunday

A Goodyear dirigible will visit Greenville tomorrow and give several exhibition flights at the Hooker Field on the Ayden road, on the outskirts of the city. The big craft will reach the city tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock, coming from Rocky Mount where it has been giving several flights.

The airship is touring the country in behalf of the advertising campaign of the Goodyear Tire Company, and is stopping over in Greenville as a guest of the John Flannagan Buggy Company, Goodyear distributors here.

The ship is 130 feet long, 38 feet high, and is run by two 110 horsepower motors.

This is the first time a craft of this kind has visited Greenville and it is expected several hundred people would gather at the Hooker Field to take advantage of the opportunity to see the big dirigible. Numbers of persons will also be given the opportunity to take a spin in the clouds aboard the ship.

Fire Department Called Out Twice During Morning

Fire early this morning destroyed two negro houses in Perkins town, and the loss was estimated at between \$3,500 and \$4,000. One of the buildings was owned and occupied by Arthur Mooring. The flames had gained such headway the occupants were unable to save any of the furnishings. The fire department confined its efforts to saving nearby structures, as the two buildings were practically doomed when it arrived.

Fire about the noon hour today also did slight damage to the Wayne House on Dickinson avenue. The flames, believed to have originated from sparks from a chimney, had made little headway on the roof when extinguished. The furnishings were damaged somewhat by water. The loss had not been determined this afternoon.

Sixteen Miners Are Entombed At Oklahoma Mine

Lutie, Okla., Nov. 29.—(AP)—Sixteen men were entombed today by an explosion in the No. 5 mine of the Haileyola Coal Company, a mile and a half east of here.

The entombed men were working in entry No. 10, about 1,500 feet below the surface when the explosion occurred about 12:30 P. M.

H. G. Phillips, foreman, said a rescue crew entered the mine at once, but had been unable more than an hour later to reach the imprisoned men. Their fate was unknown.

The mine employs about sixty men.

SPORTS SLANTS

Anyone with the time and enthusiasm for the project might write a very interesting volume entitled "One Year After" meaning, of course, an account of college football conditions existing a year after the publication of the Carnegie Foundation's famous Bulletin 23.

I find that a good deal of dust has accumulated on my copy of this 383page report, setting forth what its authors considered the details of the "deepest shadow that darkens American school and college athletics." They referred specifically to the subsidizing and recruiting operations. They specified the colleges and the methods. They held up as "lilywhites," a list of 21 American and 7 Canadian colleges or universities.

What has happened since then? What has been the effect of the report? Glance at only a few of the recent dispatches:

"Kansas ostracized by Big Six for playing subsidizing athletics."

"Six George Washington University freshmen dropped from squad after demanding pay for football services."

"Harvard coaches opposes restrictions on early practice."

College head-proposers letting down all barriers, with subsidizing open and above board."

"Western university signs 12 prep school stars for preliminary preparatory to entering college next year."

Kansas has been famous for a number of prohibitory statutes, but from the comment I have in hand, there is a little or no support for the Big Six attempt to prohibit "Jarring Jim" Bausch from doing his stuff in the University of Kansas backfield at \$75 per month.

In effect, they inquire: what concern is it of the Big Six or anybody else if Bausch has a private agreement with an insurance man, providing the football star with a monthly salary for services to be given, so long as Mr. Bausch meets the scholastic requirements of the university, abides by the rules and (no doubt) plays a smashing game at fullback for dear old Kansas?

Carlos E. Hobbs in the Topeka State Journal, remarks: "These football conferences are getting entirely too personal with their rules. Kansas is being made the 'goat' as was Iowa by the Big Ten."

John C. Grover, veteran Big Six official who cast an eagle eye upon the proceedings in the Yale-Army game, comments in the Kansas City Star upon the fine line play typical of these eastern teams "the lack of deception of either offense."

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CHRISTNER IS DEFEATED BY MICK WALKER

Chicago, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Some of the approximately 4,000 who went to the Coliseum last night to see Mickey Walker fight K. O. Christner, today believed the world middleweight champion knocked the Akron rubber man clear out of the ring—but most of them harbored a suspicion that Christner landed among the spectators, at least partly by his own efforts.

The finish of what was listed as a ten round encounter in which Walker gave away 35 pounds in his second round among the heavyweights, came after 38 seconds of fighting. Walker charged out of his corner, smacking Christner with a hard right to the jaw and left to the head, dropping him in front of the three members of the Illinois State Athletic commission, General John V. Clinin, Fred G. Gardner and George Gelz. He arose at the count of three and retreated to the opposite side of the ring where another left hook caught him and he sailed between the second and top strands of the ring.

Christner landed among the spectators and rolled over the press table, falling to the floor where he lay as the officials tolled off 20 seconds. Under Illinois rules a fighter knocked down from the ring is entitled to 20 seconds during which to return.

At the end of the count he staggered to his feet and struggled through the ropes, limping on his right leg. He was helped to his corner where he said he could not continue. The fight was awarded to Walker.

General Clinin would make no statement as to whether the commission planned to investigate the bout.

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NOTRE DAME PLAYS ARMY AT CHICAGO

Chicago, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Army versus Notre Dame, the choicest football bit of the season, between two great, undefeated eleven, with around 125,000 spectators to watch it on Soldier Field today.

Everything was at stake for both teams. Victory for the Army meant the Cadets' greatest campaign. Triumph for Notre Dame meant one more stride toward national championship honors. Conditions were fitted to test the merit of every man to the utmost, with promise of an icy gridiron and midwinter temperatures.

Had the game been scheduled for New York, the Cadets might have been at even money with the Irish, but in the west Notre Dame always is the favorite and the Rough Riders from South Bend ruled at 2 to 1 a healthy drop from the 5 to 1 quoted earlier in the week. There was little wagering, however, with most of it on a points basis.

Coach Knute Rockne, who kept his men in South Bend until this morning, indicated he would send out his best line and the second Notre Dame backfield. Major R. Sasse, Army's head coach, had available his most powerful command it out at the star.
