DAVIS GAINS HIS SEAT IN U. S. SENATE

Senator From Pennsylvania Seated Today Despite Protest From Senator Nye

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—James J. Davis of Pennsylvania gained his seat in the Senate over a protest from the Campaign Funds Investigating committee today.

A motion by Chairman Nye of the investigating committee to deny the oath to Davis was rejected by 58 to 27.

Senator Reed of Pennsylvania had objected to Nye's request that Davis step aside and insisted that "the rights of the Senate-elect and of the state be observed." Nye then presented the resolution to deny the oath.

Senator Reed countered by insisting that the resolution lie over a day but Vice-President Curtis upheld Nye. The roll call followed.

Nye submitted a special report which said it was "quite apparent from information before the committee that well in advance of \$600,000 was expended in support of the Brown-Davis ticket. Francis Shunk Brown was the gubernatorial candidate and was defeated by Clifford Pinchot for the nomination.

The report noted that the "fight in the Republican primary campaign in Pennsylvania was in the main a battle between candidates for governor" and said money raised for the Brown-Davis campaign committee "was without a doubt principally available because of the gubernatorial fight."

The combined expenditures of Mr. Davis and the four Brown-Davis committees was placed at \$368,962, but the committee said it had learned within the last few days that additional sums were spent, jumping the total to above \$600,000. Davis was said to have spent only \$10,807 personally in the primary. The Nye committee intends soon to report on expenditures in behalf of senatorial candidates in those states where the successful candidate is just beginning service. These states are New Jersey, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Tennessee, Kentucky, Kansas and Wyoming.

State Makes Good Showing for Site of Great Hospital

Charlotte, Dec. 2.—(AP)—North Carolina made a good showing in the presentation of its advantages as a site for the \$2,000,000 national soldiers' hospital in the south.

Gen. George H. Wood, representative of the administrator of national homes, said as much here yesterday at the conclusion of a three-hour hearing of the state's claims for the home. General Wood and Surgeon-General Hugh S. Cumming, of the U. S. Public Health Service, conducted the hearing.

Several state officials and a dozen or more other prominent North Carolinians appeared to present the state's claims at the hearing.

Thirty-four cities entered applications for furnishing the hospital site if North Carolina wins the location. A general brief for the state was presented by the Department of Conservation and Development.

General Wood and Surgeon-General Cumming left here to open a hearing today at Columbia, S. C., hearings also will be held at several other southern cities.

Speaking At First Session of His State Council for Unemployment Relief, Gardner Says State Will Right Itself "Quicker Than Any Other State In the Union"

Raleigh, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Gov. O. Max Gardner, opening the first session of his state council of unemployment relief, today declared North Carolina faces its most critical period since the Civil War but "will win out, and will win out quicker than any other state in the union."

All of the 15 members of the council were present for the meeting and the governor congratulated them on their "patriotic" response to an urgent call from the state.

The governor briefly outlined conditions in the state as he sees them and then John B. Blandford, a member of President Hoover's committee on unemployment, discussed means and methods being used over the country for relief.

North Carolina can see vividly the signs of depression, Governor Gardner said, as the last thing a person gives up or retires is an automobile and in this state 30,000 have been retired in 11 months of 1930.

This means a loss to the state of \$400,000 in license tag revenue and more than \$1,000,000 in total revenue, the governor told the council, and a similar decrease is being seen in every tax the state collects.

"I am not pessimistic toward the future," Governor Gardner said. "But I feel we must consciously recognize the present condition. North Carolina has gone through worse and won out."

"I am sure the organized consciousness of this state will respond to the needs of the unfortunate at this time but I do not hesitate to say after an intensive and careful study we are facing the most critical period since the Civil War and the individuals and institutions of the state must realize the condition."

ROBBERS MAKE \$500 JEWELRY HAUL IN CITY

Small Amount of Cash Also Obtained At Laurens Candy Palace Last Night

Making one of the largest hauls reported in this community this year, robbers last night entered Laurens Candy Palace, on Evans street, near Five Points, and obtained jewelry valued at approximately \$500. A small amount of money left in the cash registers for change was also reported missing. Police today were without any clue that would lead to a solution of the theft.

The robbery was not discovered until the building was opened for business this morning. John Laurens, owner of the establishment, stated the entire haul consisted of jewelry and the small amount of change found in the cash registers. The most expensive jewelry had been placed in the safe when the store closed, but the safe was not molested.

Entrance to the building was made from the rear of the second story. The robbers reached the windows by climbing upon a single story structure behind an adjoining building.

After entering, one of the robbers went to the front of the store and extinguished a safety light to prevent anybody who happened to be passing along the street at that time from seeing them at their work. At least this was the opinion of employees of the store who found the light had been put out when they went to work this morning.

Police immediately began work on the case this morning, but up until the noon hour nothing of any definite nature had been accomplished. Chief Pierce said he believed, however, that they would be able to trace the goods some time in the near future, and in all probability affect the arrest of the guilty parties.

This was the most daring of an epidemic of burglaries reported in and around Greenville the last two months. Although police have brought about the arrest and conviction of the majority of the responsible parties, some of them still remain at large despite the untiring work of the police to bring about their arrest.

Missing Woman Aviator Lands Safely In Bahamas; Forced Down By Weather

Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller Gives Graphic Portrayal of Landing On Remote Link of Islands After Being Tossed Far Off Her Course By Adverse Weather

Nassau, Bahamas, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller, Australian aviatrix, for whom a widespread search was made after she failed to arrive in Miami, Fla., Friday on a flight from Havana, today told of being forced down on a remote link in the Bahamas Island chain by adverse weather, which tossed her far off her course.

She said compass failure and a fuel shortage also were contributing causes to her descent on Andros Island Friday. Andros Island is approximately 125 miles south by east of Miami and search was not made in that vicinity for aviators, recalling a 30 mile an hour wind Friday had expressed the belief that her reconnoitered plane would be blown westward.

Mrs. Keith-Miller, whose "Bullet" was without radio, bank and turn dials or equipment for blind flying, said she ran into a heavy gale soon after leaving Havana and came down in the bush, five miles back on Dickinson avenue by Rev. W. H. Covert, pastor of the Immanuel Baptist church, and Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of the Memorial Baptist church. Burial was made at Cherry Hill cemetery. Mrs. Johnson was a member of the Immanuel Baptist church and was held in the highest esteem by a wide circle of friends.

Besides her husband, she is survived by a son, Harry G. Johnson, Greenville, and one sister, Mrs. J. H. Mitchell, of Suffolk, Va. Mrs. Johnson was the mother of Herbert Johnson one of the Pitt county boys who sacrificed their lives during the world war. Shock and grief over the death of her son was believed to have been responsible for the illness that resulted in her death.

The local unit is under the direction of Captain and Mrs. Armstrong, who have made many friends during the short residence here, and who hope to be able to increase the activities of their forces to no little extent.

The campaign was launched by a series of services in the city churches Sunday and also a public gathering at the State theatre during the afternoon. The entire Divisional Staff, headed by Colonel Fred Celler, was in attendance, and took part in the observance.

President Hoover Urges Congress To Give Relief Measures Right Of Way

To Discuss Organization Of Canning Factory At Public Meeting Thursday

Mass Meeting Called At Court House At 7:30 O'clock; Two Members of State Conservation Department to Speak; Business Men and Farmers Urged to Attend

A mass meeting will be held at the court house in this city Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock to discuss the organization of a canning factory in Greenville. Both business men and farmers interested in the project have been urged to attend the meeting and take an active part in the discussion.

Misses Kelley and Sykes, representatives of the State Department of Conservation and Development, will attend the meeting and discuss the possibilities of a canning factory in this community, and the important part which similar enterprises have played in the life of other localities.

Promoters of the canning factory movement stated today that enough people are already interested to virtually assure the erection of the factory, and that main interest at this time centered about providing the raw product.

The plant will eat tomatoes and string beans, and farmers interested in raising these two products have been urged to attend the meeting and engage in the discussion. Everybody will have an opportunity to ask questions and take part in the discussion. It is a community-wide proposition and those who have been promoting the movement over a period of several months are anxious for large attendance at the meeting.

The proposed plant, it was stated, will employ approximately 125 people, and will play an important part in relieving the unemployment situation which has affected the community over a period of many months. It will also have a tendency to create a regular weekly payroll, thereby contributing to the general business life of the community.

In addition, the plant will open up a new source of income for the farmers who have been depressed by low prices for principal crops during the past several years. Those who signify a desire to raise beans and tomatoes will find a ready market for their products at the factory, and will receive a regular contract price.

The canning factory has been under consideration here for several months, but this is the first concerted step taken in direction of actual organization. Promoters of the project have conferred with representatives of large canning factories in other sections of the country, and have discovered that this immediate locality holds forth great opportunity for development of the industry.

One of the most pressing needs of the city for years has been manufacturing enterprises, and opinion has been expressed that the plan now under way to establish the canning factory will meet with hearty approval on the part of the business interests and the farming element. In fact, so much attention has been given to the proposition that promoters feel confident organization will be perfected in the next several days.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the mass meeting called for Thursday night, a prominent business man said this morning, in discussing the project, and it is to be hoped that representatives of all branches of industry will be present and take part in discussions looking to organization.

JAMES AGAIN ELECTED AS PITT ATTORNEY

J. T. Clifton Re-elected Auditor By New Board of Commissioners Yesterday

After their formal induction into office and election of H. V. Staton of Bethel as chairman, the new Pitt County Board of Commissioners late yesterday afternoon re-elected J. B. James as county auditor and J. Thomas Clifton as county auditor.

Mr. James has held the position of county attorney for a number of years, and has rendered the government notable service in numbers of cases. Mr. Clifton became auditor a few months ago, having been elected to succeed C. C. Coppedge.

Unable to complete all business awaiting disposition, the commissioners called an adjourned session for Friday evening at 7:30 o'clock at which time they will consider the question of election of a tax supervisor and superintendent of the county home.

All employees of the court house were invited to attend the meeting as the question of salary reductions is to be considered.

Pledging themselves to a policy of strict economy in government, the commissioners ordered that the court house be opened every morning at 8:30 and closed at 5 o'clock. This plan, it was believed, would result in an appreciable saving in the electric light bill.

Chairman Staton during the closing session yesterday called upon members of the various departments of the county for short talks. The speakers pledged their every effort in behalf of the administration and signified a desire to reduce expenses wherever this was found possible.

ESCAPED CONVICTS STILL AT LIBERTY

Raleigh, Dec. 2.—(AP)—None of the 13 prisoners who escaped from two prison camps of State's Prison Sunday night had been recaptured today, prison officials said.

Nine convicts saved their way to freedom at the granite quarry camp near Salisbury and four "trusties" left the Roxboro camp in Person county.

Chief Executive Recommends Priority for Unemployment and Drought Relief; Emphasizes Absolute Necessity for "Rigid Economy" in Government If An Increase In Taxes Is to Be Avoided; Praises the Naval Treaty

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Pledging for immediate action, Congress today received from President Hoover recommendation that unemployment and drought relief legislation be given priority.

The annual presidential message was read first in the House, the membership listening attentively to the administration's program for prompt relief and disposal of unfinished business, including the controversial Muscle Shoals bill.

Authority to make increased temporary advances for Federal road aid was asked by the President, together with a request for \$150,000,000 to expedite construction and provide work.

"Such action," the President said, "will imply an expenditure of over \$650,000,000 during the next twelve months."

Republicans and Democrats, already pledged to a bi-partisan emergency relief program by their leaders, vied with one another in putting forward measures to carry it into effect.

No figure was mentioned in connection with drought relief, but Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, has prepared a bill, bearing Republican support, which calls for a \$60,000,000 loan fund.

The Chief Executive foresaw a deficit of \$180,000,000 for the current fiscal year and a surplus of only \$30,000,000 next year, even with discontinuance of the one percent tax reduction on 1929 incomes.

"I can not emphasize too strongly the absolute necessity to defer any other plans for increase of government expenditures," he wrote.

"Rigid economy," he necessary, he said, if an increase in taxes is to be avoided.

He praised the London Naval Treaty and said that during the past year "our relations with foreign countries have been maintained upon a high basis of cordiality and good-will."

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Suspension of immigration in aid of the unemployment "was asked in a bill introduced today by Representative Cable, Republican, Ohio."

President Hoover's message recommending an appropriation of \$150,000,000 for emergency unemployment relief had hardly been read in the Senate today before a bill was introduced to carry out his program.

Senator Glenn, Republican, Illinois, introduced a measure to create immediately a \$15,000,000 emergency fund to be used to accelerate the construction of public works, including Federal aid highways, heretofore authorized by Congress.

A joint resolution to require that resident labor be used in the construction of public works and be paid the highest prevailing wage as an aid to unemployment, was introduced today by Senator Coughlin, Republican, Michigan.

A bill to establish a department of national defense, with a separate air force and co-ordinating it with the army and navy under a single secretary, was introduced today by Chairman Williamson of the House Expenditures committee.

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Robbers Attempt To Enter Best's Jewelry Store

WORLD COURT PROVES WORRY FOR SENATE

How to Dispose of the Problem Without Stripping Gears Is Question

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—How to dispose of the World Court protocol without stripping the gears of the Senate machinery at this session remained today one of the most serious problems.

Friends of American adherence to the international tribunal have started a move for definite postponement of the issue until a year hence. Some of its enemies want it given immediate attention. The question of adherence is not yet before the Senate but President Hoover has announced he will submit it shortly.

There was no immediate assurance any agreement was in sight. Senator Borah of Idaho, chairman of the foreign relations committee, has announced his committee will take action on the protocol if the President sends it up. Senator Watson of Indiana, the Republican leader—he fears a fight over the court will force a next session—conferred with Borah yesterday, but neither had any decision to report.

Senator Swanson of Virginia, ranking Democrat on the foreign relations group, is one of those who would like the year's delay. He is a strong court supporter. Senator Vandenberg, Republican, Michigan, also a committee member, is another favoring deferment.

An agreement on procedure in the Senate was suggested by the President himself, but in so doing he did not specify whether he would be satisfied with such a long delay. Some administration supporters, however, believe he would have no objection, particularly as neither friends nor opponents of the court have any real expectation that the Senate could complete action at the present short session.

Jefferson Life Gains Control of The Pilot Life

Greensboro, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Purchase of a block of stock for approximately \$600,000 today had brought control of the Pilot Life Insurance Company into the hands of the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company. Both companies are located here.

Officials of the Jefferson Standard yesterday announced purchase of the block of stock and said this, with stock already owned, gave control of the Pilot company. The number of shares bought was not disclosed.

Both companies will continue to operate separate and distinct, it was announced.

At the close of last year, he Jefferson Standard had \$265,736,258

insurance in force in 27 states and Porto Rico. The Pilot had \$103,601,195 in force in 12 southern states and the District of Columbia.

Claims Invention Will Eliminate Monoxide Fumes

New York, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Out of the death of an airplane pilot in 1928 has come a device which its inventor claims will eliminate carbon monoxide fumes from gasoline engines and save more than \$1,000,000,000 annually in the nation's fuel bills.

Dr. Miller Reese Hutchinson, chief engineer for Thomas A. Edison form 1909 to 1918 and originator of the Klaxon and the acousticon, demonstrated the invention yesterday before Captain Frank M. Hawks, flying speed king, and others.

The instrument, known as the "moto-vita," was developed primarily to increase the efficiency and flight range of airplanes as the result of the accidental death of Dr. Hutchinson's son, Harold, an airplane pilot. It employs the principal of catalysis to prevent the waste of fuel through improper carburetion and imperfect combustion.

The "moto-vita," as exhibited by the inventor, weighs about a pound and a half and can be produced at a nominal cost. It consists of a thermo-couplet "bridge" of platinum and nickel wires so attached to the motor that the gases constantly pass over it, recording automatically the percentage of unburned gases escaping and enabling the driver to increase the quantity of air in the fuel mixture.

Dr. Hutchinson described the instrument as "an infallible and intelligent means of eliminating the guesswork of carburetion" and said its value had been proved in six months of flying by his older son, Jack Hutchinson, a transport pilot.

Captain Hawks said he would test the device on his flight to Memphis, Tenn., Thursday.

first story of her adventurous ex-
perience:

"A terrific gale blew me off my
course somewhere between Havana
and the mainland," she said. "Then
my compass went haywire and I
flew seven hours looking for a
place to land."

"The gas began to run low and I
got panicky. I didn't know whether
I was in the Gulf of Mexico or some-
where over the Atlantic. It was a
fearful feeling until I could see a
spot of land. I thought it was
Florida."

"But it was this village called
Kemps Bay or Andros Island. There
was a terrific wind but I came in
with full motor, then stalled her
and pancaked into the thick bush-
es. I looked the ship over and it
was O. K."

"I started out to walk and it was
sixteen miles to the first telegraph
station I came to. I walked all
night over the rockiest beach I ever
saw. My feet were blistered and I
was mighty tired. I am sorry I
can't send you more."

That last reference was to the
telegram in which this interview
was contained. The aviatrix sent
it by wireless from Nassau to Miami
and it went thence by cable to the
Associated Press bureau at Havana.

Four Hunters Die As Shells Explode

Otis, Mass., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Four
hunters perished and six others
were buried and wounded by ex-
ploding shells when a camp in
which 14 men were housed was de-
stroyed by fire here early this
morning.

The dead are Otto Rittner and
Joseph Genniv of New Britain,
Conn., and Thomas Hill and Dan-
iel Reilly of Shelton, Conn.

The hunters were awakened
when a stove exploded. The fire
gained great headway so rapidly
that boxes of shotgun shells soon
began to discharge.

Ten of the men, scantily clad,
jumped through windows of the
two story cottage, but the other
four were trapped by the flames.
The weather was frigid, the mer-
cury registering five degrees above
zero.

The camp was located half a
mile from the nearest telephone
and it was only after farmers
noticed the flames that aid arriv-
ed. The injured men, suffering
from burns and wounds, were rushed
to a hospital in Winstead,
Conn., when residents arrived in
automobiles two of the four cars
at the camp were burned, while
the keys to the others were lost in
the blaze.

NOTRE DAME HEADED FOR CALIFORNIA

Chicago, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The address of the Notre Dame football squad today was "heading west" as the undefeated Irish moved from the biting winds of the middle-west toward the balmy climate of Los Angeles where the University of Southern California will be met Saturday.

While nearly a thousand Notre Dame rovers cheered, Coach Rockne and five of his assistants rounded up the squad yesterday afternoon, and boarded a special train for the site of the contest. On the way from their hotel the Notre Dame athletes occasioned as much stir and noise as a famous aviator. An escort of motorcycle policemen, with sirens screaming, accompanied them to the station.

Rockne did not appear bothered about the contest against the powerful aggregation from U. S. C. out of "skull practice," he planned to rest his squad until Wednesday when the trip will be interrupted by a stop at Tucson, Ariz. He said the squad needs rest after amassing nine straight triumphs. Three drills on the University of Arizona campus will cover all of the physical labor. The first will be held Wednesday afternoon, with morning and afternoon sessions Thursday.

Rockne was encouraged over the condition of his reserves. In the early games of the season and well into the middle of the campaign, the Irish shock troops had plenty of chances to work but failed to measure up to Notre Dame standards.

Against Army Saturday, however, they went out there at the start and held their own in great shape.

Piedmont League Placed In Class B

Montreal, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The Piedmont league, made up of North Carolina cities, today had been advanced from C to B classification by the National Board of Arbitration, meeting in connection with the convention of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues.

The petition to the board for advanced classification for the Piedmont was based on the increase in population shown by the six cities which make up the circuit. An aggregate population of at least 250,000 is required for class B rating.

W. W. Bramham of Durham, N. C., president of the league, announced that in seeking the higher rating, the clubs would also seek to maintain the same salary schedule as is now in effect.

Alabama Pointing for Another Record

Tuscaloosa, Ala., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Wallace Wade, whose Alabama team has claimed four southern gridiron championships in eight years, is pointing for another record—two victories in the Pasadena Rose Bowl classic.

Only Southern California has won two Rose Bowl engagements. The Trojans were victorious in 1923 and 1929. Both Washington State and Alabama have won one game each and seek to equal the record made by the men of Troy in their meeting next January 1.

Twice before, in successive years, Wade's Alabama teams have appeared in the Bowl, winning the first game 20-19 from Washington and deadlocking Stanford 7 to 7 in the next.

Since he came to Alabama in 1922, after serving his apprenticeship as a lieutenant under Dan McGugin at Vanderbilt, Wade's teams have won 80 per cent of their games. The Crimson finished well up near the top in 1923 and claimed the conference championship the next three years.

Wade likes "big boys," but a major requirement is ability to get away quick. He doesn't follow any particular system.

A guard at Brown University in 1914-15-16, he agrees with Coach Orion Hollingsberry at Washington State, that "the line wins football games."

Sun Beau Shows Unusual Speed

New York, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Less than three months have passed since Gallant Fox established a new American money winning record but already his mark of \$328,000 stands in danger of being surpassed by Willis Sharpe Kilmer's Sun Beau.

When the Fox galloped through the rich summer stakes to new financial heights and then retired to William Woodward's stud farm, the turf world thought his record would stand for years to come. But it had not reckoned with the five-year-old geld of Sun Beau.

Apparently unnoticed by the majority of racing fans, Sun Beau has picked up rich handicap after handicap this fall until today he is fourth to Gallant Fox, Zev and Blue Larkspur with earnings of \$264,819. Blue Larkspur earned \$270,000 before being retired mid-way in the season. Zev picked up more than \$313,000 in his sensational turf career.

SPORTS SLANTS

Win, lose or draw, Yale football coaches perhaps have less to worry about, so far as their jobs are concerned, than 90 per cent of their teaching brethren.

The Eli system is not badly predicted upon a winning streak, nevertheless three successive setbacks at the hands of dear old Harvard have not been calculated to inspire additional confidence in the system of coaching practiced by Dr. Marvin Allen Stevens, the good-looking young man who came to New Haven from Kansas and turned in one great season as a halfback.

Stevens was a star with Memphis Bill Mallory's 1923 eleven, an undefeated Blue array that rolled up 40 points against Princeton and Harvard. The young doctor has not been able to produce anything approaching that great Eli team, even with the help of dynamic A. Walsh of Notre Dame as line coach, and it is not strange that there is grumbling where Yale men gather to talk of the gridiron as well as business depression.

There was an outcry for the scalp of T. A. D. Jones years before he finally retired with distinction from the position of Yale's head coach. The indignation was highest in 1922, after Yale had lost four straight to Harvard.

But Jones came back with his "recher" the next year, wading through all opposition, and the demands for a shake-up disappeared. In fact he continued in charge until after the 1927 season, finishing with a

five-year record of four triumphs and a tie in the climax battles with Harvard.

Stevens will remain as head coach for 1931, but it will not be surprising after that to see Yale depart from its ancient policy and select Adam Walsh, one-time captain of the "Four Horsemen" of Notre Dame, as his successor.

As a matter of fact, the selection of Stevens was a semi-departure from the Eli graduate system. "Ma" had only one year of varsity football eligibility left when he came to Yale to get a degree, then enter the medical school. He began his college career at Washburn, Kas., starting in four sports before shifting his activities to New Haven.

Walsh, a graduate of Notre Dame, is understood to be studying for another degree at Yale so that when the time and opportunity comes for him to take charge of the Eli gridiron forces, possibly in 1932, he will qualify as a "Yale man," even if a transplanted one.

William Barry Wood, Jr., has picked up for the Crimson where George Owen left off in the all-around objective of making things unpleasant for "Old Eli Yale."

Owen took over the job of harassing the Blue from Eddie Casey, and was a leading factor in three straight football victories for Harvard in 1920-21-22. Owen also left his mark in baseball and hockey.

Wood, another all-around ace, has gotten off to a brilliant start against Yale. Opposed to the brilliant Albie Booth, Wood has twice carried off the football honors in a struggle that has one more year to go. Like Owen, Wood also is a star at hockey and baseball to which he adds unusual talent as a tennis player.

The way to win this fight is to recognize that we have got to adjust our expenditures to our incomes.

After Mr. Blandford had outlined public building programs and other methods used in other states for unemployment relief Governor Gardner called his attention to the fact that North Carolina "led the United States during the past 12 years" in town, city county and state expansion and development.

"Today the state has exhausted its ability to build and contemplates its 'ability to pay,'" Governor Gardner told the council.

"Conditions in our state are not as bad, though, as they could be," the governor continued. "Our textile mills, or many of them, are running more now than during the summer and I am informed that Eastern Carolina is materially feeling the beneficial results of my live-at-home program."

The governor told the council he was ready to recommend \$5,000 for financing its work and that he expected it to function through March. The funds would largely come from the state department of labor.

Begin Audit of County Records At Asheville

Asheville, Dec. 2.—(AP)—An audit of the county books for the incoming county Democratic administration, was started this morning. The audit is being made by the firm of George G. Scott, of Charlotte.

The audit for the retiring administration is still under way. It is being done by Ernest and Ernest. Both audits will show the condition of the county books as of December 1, the day on which the administrations changed.

Claude L. Felmet, chairman of commissioners, said today he did not know how much time the Scott audit would take. The task is expected to require several weeks, and it is the opinion of county officials that the task will be more difficult than usual, because of confusion in the county financial situation.

S. Johnson. The four latter all were awaiting trial on larceny charges.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The stock market again found the line of the least resistance led upward today, but it was not enthusiastic about it.

Gains were extended a little, and trading showed signs of picking up for a few minutes after financial news tickers printed summaries of President Hoover's message to Congress in the early afternoon, but the list soon wavered, and part of the advance was lost.

After a momentary sag in the first half hour of trading, the list crept almost steadily upward until early afternoon. Most of the prominent shares recorded net gains of a point or so, while a handful gained more than 2. U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, Johns-Manville, Allied Chemical, American Banknote, and Continental Baking "A" were among shares advancing 2 or more points. Some of the office supplies were conspicuously strong. International Business Machines gained 6 points, and Underwood Elliott half as much.

The President's recommendations appeared to have been almost fully discounted previously, since they were closely in line with brokerage forecast. If Wall Street had been in a bullish frame of mind, the suggestion that anti-trust laws be changed to conserve natural resources and prevent wasteful competition might have been greeted with enthusiasm. Efforts of the copper and oil in-

dustries to stabilize prices have been cautious, owing to the danger of running afoul of the Sherman law.

Strength in the steel issues seemed to reflect fresh rumors that large producers were planning an advance for the first quarter of 1931. The coppers moved up a little here and there, as at least one custom smelter sold the red metal at 111-2 cts., against 101-2 last week, and trade circles were even more optimistic over the outcome of the efforts of large producers to stabilize the price at 12 cents.

Plan to Launch Renewed Attack Against Dry Law

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)— Enemies of prohibition in the House of Representatives plan tomorrow to hold a caucus of their own to push forward their attacks on the dry laws.

They already are armed with a capacious supply of ammunition. In the first day's pile of new bills, the members placed two proposals for national polls on repeal of the 18th amendment. In addition bills went in to permit the manufacture and sale of wines and beer.

The call for the wet meeting cut from Representative Linthicum, Democrat, Maryland, who last session generated the anti-prohibition block, managing the wet presentation of evidence at the lengthy dry law hearings of the Judiciary Committee.

He wants to lay out an aggressive campaign for modification or repeal starting at this session, but with the next Congress principally in mind. In that group, which meets next year, the wets are confident they will have superior strength.

OPPOSE USE POISON GAS IN WARFARE

Delegates to League's Preparatory Disarmament Commission Defer Action

Geneva, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Delegates to the League's preparatory disarmament commission, with Hugh S. Gibson, the American, taking an active part in the discussion, today registered a concerted opposition to the use of poison gas in warfare.

It was a spirited discussion, but definite action on prohibitive measures was referred for final decision to the general disarmament conference.

On Ambassador Gibson's motion the preparatory commission invited all governments to set their experts to work on this issue and to come to the general conference ready to draft an agreement which would clarify the interpretation of restrictions in chemical warfare.

By a vote of 6 to 5 the commission rejected budgetary limitation for air forces, with the American delegate not voting. Lord Cecil of England directed particular attention to the narrow margin by which this measure was defeated.

The German proposal to prohibit use of tanks of all kinds and use of cannon above certain calibre—as imposed on Germany by the Versailles treaty—was defeated by 10 votes, one of which was Gibson's. Only the Swiss delegate supported Count Von Bernstorff's proposal.

The poison gas discussion began when Lord Cecil asserted that Britain interprets the Geneva protocol of 1925 as prohibiting gas, and he asked the delegates to consider embodiment of the interpretation in a disarmament treaty draft.

Gibson, however, pointed out that this matter is so profoundly technical for a wide decision not and suggested that it be studied fully before any action be taken.

Charlotte, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The College of Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, which holds its regular fall meeting here December 12-14, will hear reports from each of its members on its status of Methodism in his respective area.

Bishop Edwin D. Moulton, resident Bishop of Charlotte, will be host to the college. Bishop W. N. Ainsworth, of Birmingham, will preside. Bishop John M. Moore of Atlanta, is secretary of the body.

The vote on the judicial council legislation enacted at the last general conference, will probably be received by the college by the several annual conferences before it can become law.

All members of the college, including Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of Washington, against whom several Methodist ministers have brought charges that may necessitate a church trial, are expected to attend the meeting here, except Bishop Paul B. Kern, who is in China.

General Contractors Meet At Charlotte

Charlotte, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The Carolina branch, Associated General Contractors of America, met here today in its annual convention to discuss problems confronting the building trades industry in the two Carolinas.

Among the questions up for discussion were: The effect of curtailment of labor, tax, and the matter of municipalities erecting their own construction instead of letting it out supply dealers furnishing irresponsible contractors.
