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TAKE STEPS TO PUT DOWN REVOLUTION

Ten Thousand Government Troops Take Field Against Spanish Revolt

Madrid, Dec. 13.—(AP)—In a furious battle near the town of Ayerbe at dawn today Federal troops took a hundred prisoners, seized rebel equipment and drove a revolting regiment of infantry back upon the garrison town of Jaca, where rebellion flared yesterday.

General Berenguer, the prime minister, asserted that the engagement had terminated the revolt and that Federal troops were in control of the Jaca area.

The prime minister made this announcement after a brief audience with King Alfonso this morning. The royal troops from Saragossa, he said, continued a march on Jaca after the battle.

Madrid, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Ten thousand troops in full field equipment have gone into action against the revolting garrison at Jaca in the north of Spain, converging upon the frontier town of Ayerbe where rebellious infantrymen had artillery engaged a loyal detachment in a battle at daybreak this morning.

So far as could be learned in the face of demoralized communications, the mutiny had not spread beyond the province of Huesca where the rebels, variously estimated at between 1,000 and 6,000, had massed their forces.

The mutineers, censored information indicated, had only such arms and equipment as could be seized in the Jaca garrison, and the government professed confidence that the revolt would be put down speedily.

There were unverified reports that the uprising had extended to Saragossa, where Major Ramon Franco, the picturesque aviator, was said to be at the head of the movement, but virtually all telephone and telegraph communication with that area was cut off.

There were rumors also that the rebels were holding six Federal officers as hostages, threatening summary execution if loyal troops moved into battle. The report was that these captures had been made during the night while the rebels marched from Jaca to Ayerbe, where a right skirmish preceded this morning's battle.

Madrid remained in almost complete ignorance of the true state of affairs although the authorities insisted the trouble had been confined to the region in Huesca about Jaca. It had spread to Saragossa, the uprising was conceded to have assumed a much more serious aspect inasmuch as that city is the garrison for a considerable number of Federal troops.

The city newspapers today complied with a government order and completely ignored the story. The Huesca country in which the fighting appeared to center is a rugged mountainous region in the grip of a severe cold wave. Snow has fallen within the past day or so over much of the territory the federal must traverse before reaching the rebel stronghold.

House Democrats Urged to Oppose Farm Loan Cut

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—House Democrats were urged today to oppose all efforts to reduce the \$60,000,000 appropriation approved by the Senate for loans to farmers of the drought area.

Representative McDuffie, Alabama, the assistant minority leader, predicted the \$30,000,000 House committee bill would be brought up early next week with a proposal to suspend the rules a procedure that would prevent the offering of amendments.

He denounced this as "gag rule," and sought to rally his party colleagues to defeat the motion to suspend the rules.

J. F. Smith Dies Near Bethel

Seeks Cabinet

Names of Two Prominent Political Leaders Stand Out Among Hundreds of Others Mentioned for Position; Governor Is Expected To Make Choice Before Nightfall

Raleigh, Dec. 13.—(AP)—One of two men, Clyde R. Hoey or Shelby or Cameron Morrison of Charlotte, named today as United States Senator from North Carolina to succeed Senator Lee S. Overman, who died yesterday.

From hundreds of names that have been sent in to Gov. O. Max Gardner from every section of the state the names of former Congressman Hoey and former Governor Morrison stood out today and before nightfall it was expected that governor will announce one of them as his appointee.

Governor Gardner left Raleigh shortly before noon to attend the funeral of Senator Overman at Salisbury.

The governor had expected until late last night to announce his senatorial appointee this afternoon after the funeral services had been completed but developments may result in no announcement until tomorrow.

Mr. Hoey, a brother-in-law of the governor and a life-long friend and companion, was believed today by persons close in touch with the situation to have the "inside track."

If Mr. Hoey wants the senatorship, it was said, he can have it but it was generally believed that he would refuse it. Being related to the governor by marriage was interposed as one reason the Shelby man would decline the job and another was that he has a very lucrative law practice.

A state official close in touch with the situation said this morning that if Mr. Hoey wanted the job "the governor would give it to him and there would be hardly any way he could get out of it if he wanted to."

On the other hand, if Mr. Hoey eliminates himself, the single name left prominently in the picture as the Governor left Raleigh was Cameron Morrison.

Mr. Morrison, long outstanding in political circles of the state and already an announced candidate for the seat which Senator Overman held, defeated Governor Gardner when the Shelby man sought the governorship in 1920.

With the names Hoey and Morrison predominating the picture mentioned was still heard of O. M. Mull of Shelby, another life-long friend of the Governor; Mrs. Edwin T. Gregory, daughter of Senator Overman; W. C. Newland of Lenoir; R. A. Doughton, chairman of the State Highway Commission; A. L. Brooks and C. L. Shuping of Greensboro and others.

LEAF MARKET PAYS OUT OVER NINE MILLIONS

Sales On Local Market Neared 65,000,000 Mark With End of Week's Sales

The Greenville tobacco market during the present season has paid out over nine million dollars to the farmers of this great bright leaf territory, according to the official report made this morning by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales. It was also indicated that sales here had nearly reached sixty-five million pounds.

The report disclosed that the market would close for the Christmas holidays Wednesday night, December 17, and would re-open Tuesday, January 6. This will give the tobaccoists, many of whom live in other sections of the country, time to go home and spend the holidays with relatives and friends.

The official report of the supervising placed sales for the season at \$1,706,744 for which the market paid out \$9,048,858.18. The general price average was \$13.98 per hundred pounds. Sales for the corresponding period last season were \$9,350,510.

Sales for the week just closed were estimated as 3,311,746 pounds for \$466,310.20, the general price average being \$14.08. For the same period last season the market handled 1,817,476 pounds.

Political Activities May Bar McNinch From Post On Power Commission

Outspoken Opposition Comes From Member of Senate Interstate Commerce Commission Following Testimony From North Carolina Man Yesterday

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Frank McNinch's anti-Smit activity in 1928 loomed today as possibly an effective barrier to his confirmation as a member of the Federal Power Commission.

Outspoken opposition to the North Carolina man who led the anti-Smit campaign in that state came from one member of the Senate Interstate Commerce committee yesterday after it had inquired into his qualifications for the post to which President Hoover appointed him. The member definitely taking a stand against his confirmation was Senator Hawes, Democrat, Missouri.

Hawes based his opposition to McNinch on the fact that he did not vote for the Democratic Congressional nominee this year and opposed the Democratic presidential nominee in 1928.

President Hoover nominated the North Carolinian as one of the two Democratic members of the bipartisan commission of five.

McNinch testified before the committee that he voted for Chas. A. Jonas, Republican, unsuccessful candidate this fall for re-election as representative to Congress from the Ninth North Carolina District.

From the nominee the committee also heard some of the details of his work as generalissimo of the anti-Smit forces in North Carolina in 1928. McNinch said the campaign for his committee for that campaign totalled \$30,993.

He denied any of the money had come from the "power" sources, and asserted he could account for all of it except \$6,000. This sum, he related, was collected through J. L. Morehead, of Durham, N. C. A letter written by Morehead to McNinch and presented to the committee said none of the money had come from power companies either directly or indirectly. Morehead said he had the names of the contributors in confidence.

Ward H. Wood, of Charlotte, N. C., banker was related as the contributor of \$1,800 while Curtis B. Johnson, Charlotte publisher, listed as having given \$500.

Approximately one-third of the money was received from out-of-state donors. These donors include J. M. Morehead, of New York later appointed by President Hoover as minister to Sweden. Morehead gave \$1,000 as did R. L. Patterson, of New York, member of the Winston-Salem, N. C. Patterson family.

Hoover May Strike Back At Opposition Existing In The Senate Chamber

Delicate Situation Between Senate and President Postponed, However, Until After Week-End Recess; Watson Says No Real Division Exists

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—A week-end recess moved today to postpone further moves in the delicate situation between President Hoover and the Senate.

Until next week also was passed the final clean-up of the administration unemployment and drought relief program, upon which the two branches of Congress must get together.

The possibility still existed that President Hoover might strike again at his congressional opponents somewhat as he did last Tuesday when he told the country what he thought of moves which interfere with his program. This prospect did not fail to stir uneasiness among his Senate supporters.

Senator Watson, of Indiana, the Republican leader, hastened to assert there was no real division between his group and Mr. Hoover and that he had served no ultimatum in the request—Thursday—that the President help his Senate aides by letting them in on plans for any such maneuvers as last Tuesday's attack.

There was a rare possibility that conferees of the House and Senate would get together today on amendments made by the latter to the public works emergency appropriation bill. In any case action by the two Houses upon the report could not be obtained before next week.

Besides increasing the bill's total to \$118,000,000, the Senate knocked out the clause granting power to the president to shift funds from one project to another. This change is viewed by the administration as likely to cut down actual relief and the House has disagreed with all the Senate's amendments.

The drought bill amended in committee to appropriate only \$20,000,000 for loans, none of its applicable to food purchases, is to come up in the House Monday or Tuesday under the most stringent procedure the leaders can obtain. They are seeking to keep the Senate's \$60,000,000 figure from getting tangled in the proceedings.

Members of the Greenville Lions club are going to play Santa Claus to the poor people of the community during the Christmas holidays. At the regular meeting of the organization at the clubhouse on Dickinson avenue last night it was decided to distribute clothes, food, and toys on Monday before Christmas.

Walter Harrington was elected as chairman of the general committee for Christmas relief, and Person Nicholson was named chairman of the committee to have charge of providing the toys.

The Lions abandoned their usual supper last night, and contributed to the relief fund the money devoted to this purpose.

Vance Perkins presided over the meeting last night in the absence of President Sam Carson who was out of the city on business.

It was decided to hold a meeting of the club on Christmas day. A special program celebrating the Yuletide season will be presented at that time.

Every member of the club was enthusiastic over the movement to carry happiness into the homes of the poor, and it was expected that the contribution would enable the club to care for a number of families. The entire fund will be raised among members of the club.

WILL ATTEMPT TO RE-OPEN BANK HERE

Stockholders to Consider Reorganization of the National Bank Tuesday Morning

An effort will be made to reorganize the National Bank of Greenville, which failed to open Wednesday morning following heavy withdrawals by depositors.

This information became known this morning with the issuance of a notice asking stockholders to meet at the City Hall next Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock to arrange plans for reviving the institution. All stockholders were urged to be present and take part in the deliberations.

Federal bank examiners have been in charge of the bank the last few days, checking up on its condition and their report is expected to be made public within the next several days.

Numbers of men in close touch with financial circles expressed opinion that the institution would be able to reopen its doors in the near future and continue business as usual. This opinion was voiced the day following the closing, and has gained in scope the last two days.

The decision to close the bank came at a conference of directors last Tuesday night. The step was taken to protect the depositors, it was said, from withdrawals which had continued over a period of several days.

The announcement of the reorganization plans was received with considerable interest in business and financial circles this morning and set at rest, at least temporarily, all uncertainty as to what steps would be taken by officials of the institution in settling the matter.

Agitators Arrested In Effort to Quell Disorders in Cuba

Havana, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Proceeding quietly, the government is making numerous arrests of agitators whom it believes responsible for the disturbances of the past few days which have provoked the island-wide suspension of constitutional guarantees.

Dozens of warrants have been obtained against leading nationalist figures and others prominent in the anti-administration movement.

A hurried exodus to the United States on the part of many whose names are on the list for arrest and trial has been noted, many who have been unable to escape.

Some newspapers, accused of exaggerating and falsifying reports on disorders have been arrested. Among them are Julio Gunaard and Ramon Arroyo, connected with the comic weekly Karikato. Jose Ignacio Rivero, director of Diario De La Marina, Cuba's oldest newspaper, took a 30-day leave of absence and departed for the United States after government objection to an editorial in which he strongly criticized the administration.

SEN. OVERMAN LAID TO REST AT SALISBURY

Thousands Attend the Final Rites for Distinguished Statesman This Afternoon

Salisbury, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Lee Slater Overman came home today for his last long sleep.

A special train bearing the 76-year-old Senator's body from Washington where he died early yesterday after more than 50 years in the service of the state and nation arrived here at 9:03 a. m.

With bowed heads his neighbors who knew him as a kindly friend, stood as the gray casket, banked with yellow chrysanthemums and red roses, was lifted tenderly from the train.

A flag escort from the local post of the American Legion led the slow march from the railway station. With scarcely a breath of air stirring, his banners hung lifeless from their staffs as though, too, bowed in sorrow.

Delegations from the House and Senate where Overman served for 37 years accompanied the body from Washington.

On the train, too, were Mrs. Overman, her three daughters and other relatives and friends.

Health prevented Senator F. M. Simmons, friend of Senator Overman for 65 years, in college, private life and public service, from attending the funeral. He had been appointed head of the Senate delegation of 21 to attend the services, but his physician advised him it would be unsafe for him to make the journey.

Simple rites were to be the final tokens of tribute to Senator Overman here at the First Methodist church where he had worshipped since boyhood. The services were placed in charge of Dr. J. H. Barnhardt, pastor, and Rev. H. W. Sprinkle, presiding elder.

Gov. O. Max Gardner left his official duties in Raleigh to attend the burial and with him came many other officials and friends of the late Senator from Raleigh.

A guard of honor from the local post of the American Legion was formed to accompany the body from the church to the Chestnut Hill cemetery. There was no other military escort.

Friends from all walks of life and associates in public service were selected as honorary pall bearers. Members of the American Legion escort were active pall bearers.

Order Liquidation of Collateral Held By City of Asheville

Asheville, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Mayor Harry W. Plummer today issued instructions to the city's legal department to begin immediately the liquidation of collateral held by Asheville to protect its deposits of more than \$4,653,000 in the Centre Bank and Trust Company which failed to open November 20.

To secure the deposits of public funds in the Centre Bank, Asheville held in safety deposit vaults collateral with a face value of \$5,349,841.31. The collateral includes stocks, bonds, notes, and various other securities. A complete list of securities has been made by the city's legal department.

Under the plan to liquidate the collateral, the legal department first will examine the list to find out what notes and securities are due or overdue. Collection upon these then will be started.

Liquidation of matured collateral is the first step in the city's program of financial retrenchment. City commissioners, while starting this as a temporary measure to raise funds to meet current obligations, now are engaged with a study of how to refinance and meet the \$4,500,000 in short term notes that will fall due during the next six months.

The city commissioners yesterday afternoon renewed a \$65,000 city hall note which would have matured Monday. The short term renewal matures June 13.

CLOTHING WORK DONE BY DEMONSTRATION CLUBS

Home demonstration club women made the following clothing articles in 1930, according to home demonstration methods: 66 guide patterns, 151 street dresses, 1,161 house dresses, 513 children's dresses and 593 pieces of underclothing. Subjects stressed during the clothing work were: Clothing Selection, the Making of Tested Guide Patterns, Alteration of Patterns, Line and Design, Underclothing, Shoes and Hose, Children's Clothing, Seam Finishes and Decorative Stitches and Clothing Accessories. The 4-H girls made 900 articles including underwear, school dresses, club dresses and hats.

SIR HUBERT WILKINS AT COLLEGE LAST EVENING

A submarine trip from Spitzbergen to Alaska, 2,100 miles undersea, seemed no more hazardous than any other vacation trip, with little more danger of icebergs in Arctic regions than in any ocean voyage, and it seemed just as feasible as any other expeditions, to those who heard Sir Hubert Wilkins last night at East Carolina Teachers College when he told of the plan for his submarine expedition, in just a few off-hand sentences, in the midst of his account of experiences "Plying Both Ends of the Earth."

Adventures, hardships, airplane crashes, failures of plans, 50 degrees below zero weather, narrow escapes from crashing into mountains of ice, the battling against Arctic blizzards, all seemed just a part of life as Sir Hubert told the pictures, "making running comments on these," he went along. These hardships are encountered on a polar expedition no greater than those endured by Norwegian whale-hunters, he said; the difference was that the Norwegians did not have newspaper publicity. His account of the flight around the world in the Graf Zeppelin was given as if it were merely an insignificant incident in life—but pictures of his standing at the window looking down on flying fields, mountains, cities, countries, and oceans, gave glimpses of what it meant. At the end, one picture of the demonstration on Broadway was dismissed with the statement that he did not wait to take part in that as he was eager to be "off to the south" meaning to the South Pole, and Little America, the Antarctic expedition.

According to Stefansson's definition of adventure, he said he guessed he could qualify as one who had had adventure. This is: "Adventure are the outcome of inexperience, ignorance and incompetence." The then proceeded to show the pictures and make running comments and explanations, which gave an excellent idea of what the life of an explorer must be, the experiences he has, and the disheartening failures and disappointments he must meet with, as well as the triumphs and success. One could easily see why an explorer is a modest, fair-minded man, paying tribute to the "unlucky," the ones who do not survive the failures, and why they do not gloat over success. His tributes to the brave Ben Eielson were splendid. He expressed regret that the brave man, after having been with him through years of exploration was not with him in his flight over the South pole and his last Antarctic expedition. He showed pictures of others who shared his labors, failures and successes. Always there was a lack of boastfulness, a rare modesty, as he let the pictures and the events speak for themselves.

Throughout there were touches of humor, bits of anecdote and little stories that added human interest to the whole evening. One of these was the story of Ben Eielson's greatest thrill. When asked what it was, the brave hero of many adventures recalled one thriller after another, and Sir Hubert gave these and finally reached the climax—when they were welcomed in Europe, the pretty wife of one of the men

in her enthusiasm, gave him a kiss—that is what he decided was his greatest thrill.

The pictures of the Antarctic and Arctic showed very great differences between the two regions and the wide differences in the experiences explorers have in them. The Eskimos gathering around the plane, their excitement and their activities made the pictures of the section around Fairbanks and Port Barrow seem a part of the civilized world. He said they were civilized enough to charge five dollars a day and food. The only signs of life in the Antarctic regions were the penguins and the whales and those pictures were fine.

In the beginning of the evening he told a few things about his boyhood in Australia that threw light on the whole story of his career as a scientist, an explorer and aviator. He claims that he was "pushed into exploration," especially polar exploration. As a young Australian scientist, he became greatly interested in weather problems, as the failure of crops in Australia and the starvation of sheep was seemed to be so greatly influenced by lack of knowledge of weather casting. He began studying the atmosphere and found that it was not merely the atmosphere over Australia but over the whole world that needed to be studied. He had the chance to join Stefansson's 1913 expedition, so welcomed the opportunity to study polar regions. That was the beginning of his work of that kind, and he has never once lost sight of the scientific side though last night he said that he would not stress that in his talk.

He made an airplane of his own when a boy that did actually fly, although he had never seen a plane, but only pictures of them. He arrived in England, a country boy, a stranger from another continent. He was hanging around an air-drome, saw a man there and made inquiries about the possibilities of getting into training there, and asked about Grahame-White, remarking that he heard that he was "quite conceited." The man proved to be the great flyer himself and gave him his chance at learning aviation. On his first trip to the Arctic, when he expressed the belief that the airplane was the means for exploring polar regions, Stefansson did not agree with him, saying that it might do for discovery but not for exploration.

The whole evening was most illuminating to the audience. He showed maps of his explorations and explained the trip that he proposes to take in a submarine next summer. He will reverse the order made in his 1928 flight over the top of the world. He will begin his trip under the water in Spitzbergen and move west, instead of eastward, planning to come up near where he started before.

Capt. Sir Hubert came directly here from Greensboro and Winston-Salem, and left immediately after the lecture to go to Washington, D. C., where he was to take an airplane for Philadelphia where he has an important engagement this afternoon, one involving large sums of money for his submarine expedition. If he ever comes to Greenville again he will probably come in an airplane and not risk anything else. The car engaged to be waiting for him at the close of the lecture to take him to Wilson to catch a night train failed to show up, so some of the college teachers drove him over there and made the train. He remarked that he had had "such trouble with the Eskimos." He dryly remarked that he would have been willing to buy the car if that had been necessary rather than miss that train.

He looked so much like his recent pictures that he was instantly recognized when he arrived on the campus. His black whiskers excited some interest. The story goes that when the car stopped for gas, and he stepped out of the car, a social bystander said "You must be an old-timer. I haven't seen such whiskers in a long time," and then asked the distinguished visitor if he

lost anything in the bank.

Sir Hubert's next engagement is in Rochester on Monday evening. His operator had more time for packing up, as they will meet in Rochester.

There has been a longer interval than usual between the entertainments at the college, but this one was worth waiting for. After Christmas there will be a succession of interesting attractions. In January the Cherniarsky Trio; in February, Albert Spalding; in March, Gay McLaren, and a glue club sandwiches in between. Definite dates for these will soon be announced.

COTTON MARKET

New York, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady at a decline of 2 to 7 points under a renewal of liquidation and reports of increased southern selling. Relatively easy Liverpool cables and weakness in the stock market tended to increase liquidation in old long cotton and the decline soon extended to 9.57 for new December, and 10.17 for May or 12 to 14 points higher. Some stop orders were uncovered and trade buying, prices were within a point or two of the lowest at the end of the first half hour. The census report showing domestic consumption of 414,887 bales compared with 541,153 last year was about in line with expectations.

Liverpool cables reported that Bombay buying in the market had been supplied by liquidation and trade calling.

Breaks in wheat here and in other grain were associated with reports of cheaper offerings of Canadian wheat abroad, and with downturn in the stock market and in commodities, especially cotton.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Unnerved by fresh breaks in some of the commodities, the stock market which has lately been undermining its bottom levels of the year, took a decisive plunge today.

U. S. Steel, American Telephone and other prominent issues broke through recent resistance points. Numerous losses ranged from 1 to 4 points, with a few wider and the list as a whole reached a new low since 1927.

The market sold off rather sharp in the first half hour, met support for a time, but sank further in the last half hour. Trading was moderately active, sales for the two-hour session aggregating 1,950,000 shares.

U. S. Steel touched a new minimum at 136.3-8, and closed at 134. American can dropped 4 to 107, also a new minimum. American Telephone touched 178.1-8, a fresh bottom, and closed at 178.3-4, off about 2. North American lost 2.3-4, but held well above its 1930 minimum.

A further drop in cotton futures, reaching the lowest since 1915, was in response to the Census Bureau's November consumption report, showing 414,887 bales, a drop of nearly 30,000 from October. This was disappointing in view of the marked improvement in the textile industry which had been noted in September and October. Furthermore the far east, a large consumer of cotton, is again troubled by the decline in silver to new low levels.
