BITTER COLD WAVE SWEEPS OVER NATION

Low Temperatures Reach From Rockies to Maine; Blizzard Hampers Shipping

It was co-oo-o-o today, from the Rockies to Maine, and only in the far south and on the extreme Pacific Coast was the weather anything but uncomfortably sharp. Four degrees above zero in Boston, Albany and Portland; six in New York; eight in Detroit; ten in Chicago; twelve in St. Paul; fourteen in Kansas City; twenty-two in Norfolk, Va.; thirty in Abilene, Tex.—These 8 A. M. (EST) temperatures, all under freezing, told the story of an almost nationwide cold wave, which reached its height with a mark of seventeen below zero in Owls Head, N. Y.

In the northeastern states, the bitterest weather was felt. White River Junction, Vt., recorded fifteen below, Northfield, Vt., felt the bite of fourteen below weather. At Berlin N. H. and Malone, N. Y., it was ten below, and at Springfield, Mass. the mark was minus five.

In Canada's maritime provinces and Newfoundland a blizzard yesterday left a cloak of snow.

Charlotte, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The weatherman had the Carolina hills looking forward to rain in the snow today, but there was no snow.

All the neighbor states had their white fall. Christmas weather forecast for North and South Carolina, however, failed to materialize. Wilmington and Henderson only reported flurries, that melted quickly.

Temperatures did a tumble, sub-freezing weather prevailing. The mercury fell to 19 and 23 above at Henderson and Rocky Mount, respectively.

Raleigh's low was 24.4. Charlotte reported 28. Sumpter, S. C., 28.5. Greenwood and Spartanburg, S. C., 30 and 31.5. Other cities were warmer.

Skies were clear and winds gusty from the west.

The same weather man thought it would be partly cloudy tonight, with temperatures falling on North Carolina's coast and in northern and eastern South Carolina. He predicted the clouds would thicken tomorrow, with temperatures rising.

Halifax, N. C., Dec. 16.—(AP)—The maritime provinces and Newfoundland were under a blanket of snow today, laid down by a 12 hour blizzard which caused distress to shipping and interrupted communication and traffic.

Four seamen were lost off Newfoundland and several fishermen were missing from North Sydney.

A heavy northeast-gale which accompanied the snow drove the schooner, Arawana, aground on her way from St. John, to Digby. The vessel was later floated and put in at Centerville.

Bernard Taylor and Allan King, fishermen, were rescued by life-savers from the Bayview station when their small boat was blown out to sea.

This service and rural mail deliveries on the island was brought to a standstill by the storm. Officials said several days would be required to restore communications to normal.

BOAT PROBE COMES TO A SUDDEN HALT

Survivors Charge Federal Investigators With Attempt to Whitewash Crew

Miami, Fla., Dec. 16.—(AP)—A federal investigation of the disaster that overtook the excursion boat Eureka 2nd near here Sunday, in which three persons are known to have perished was halted abruptly today on demand of survivors who insisted the board of inquiry was attempting to "whitewash" the crew of the sunken craft.

Minneapolis, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Captain W. L. Stiles, master of the excursion boat Eureka II, which burned and sank near here Sunday evening with the loss of at least three lives, testified at a federal investigation of the disaster today that panic or hysteria prevailed as his passengers abandoned the burning craft and leaped into the sea.

The inquiry is being made by Spencer Houston and John Nolan, of Jacksonville, representatives of the U. S. steamboat inspection service. Many of the survivors of the disaster were at the hearing as witnesses.

Captain Stiles expressed the belief a spark from the engine generator ignited oil in the engine room. He described little efforts by himself and others of the crew to combat the blaze with fire extinguishers and his warning to passengers to abandon ship when it was evident the flames could not be checked.

He placed the total number of persons aboard at 133, including 121 passengers, and 12 members of the crew. He testified there were 114 adult passengers, a number of children, and two infants.

He said the craft carried sufficient life preservers for all aboard and declared he knew positively no one jumped into the water without a life belt.

"There was no panic or hysteria," he said, and added it was about 25 minutes before the first rescue boat reached those struggling in the water.

The Newly Appointed Member to Senate Maintains Silence on Question of Power Commission Appointment As He Goes to Washington to Be Seated

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The Senate Interstate Commerce committee today postponed until tomorrow afternoon consideration of the nomination of Frank R. McNinch, of North Carolina, to be a member of the Federal Power commission. The postponement was ordered to await the arrival of the new North Carolina Senator, Cameron Morrison.

Charlotte, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Cameron Morrison, elected by some observers with holding the key to the position the U. S. Senate will take on the McNinch appointment, was silent on the question today as he moved to take his seat in the Senate.

Leaving Charlotte early today, Morrison expected to reach Washington tonight and to be sworn in tomorrow. He was appointed Saturday by Gov. O. Max Gardner to succeed the late Senator Lee S. Overman.

A number of friends of Frank R. McNinch, like Morrison a Charlotte man, looked to the new North Carolina Senator to be the deciding factor in whether the Senate will confirm McNinch's appointment as member of the Federal Power Commission.

They indicated they believed that if Morrison, a Democrat without guile, were to put his ok on McNinch, whose democracy has been bitterly assailed, and other Senators would follow him. They felt that if on the other hand Morrison should turn "thumbs down" on his fellow North Carolinian, confirmation of the President's appointment of McNinch would be doubtful.

Celer was lent to this view by the action of the Senate Interstate Commerce committee, investigating power commission appointees, in deciding yesterday to withhold judgment on McNinch until Morrison's arrival. The committee acted favorably on four other appointments.

Morrison himself, as he prepared to leave Charlotte for Washington, declined to state his position on McNinch. He said he felt any statement by him before he was sworn in would be premature.

The storm of protest over McNinch's appointment centered about his desertion of the Democratic presidential nominee in 1928 and his leadership of the anti-Smith forces in the state. Josiah W. Bailey, U. S. Senator-elect, charged the appointment had been given McNinch "as a Democrat" for "service to the Republican party."

McNinch, admitting on his appearance before the Senate committee last week that in this year's election he also failed to vote the full Democratic ticket, described himself as an "independent Democrat."

TAKE STEPS TO ORGANIZE NEW BANK IN CITY

Plans for Institution to Succeed Old National Bank Outlined Today

Definite steps toward the organization of a new bank for Greenville to succeed the recently closed National Bank were taken at a meeting today of stockholders of the closed institution and a few interested citizens. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the organization of the new bank and the possibilities of taking over the National Bank of Greenville if suitable arrangements could be made with the Federal Banking Department.

This plan, it was outlined, would assure depositors of the closed bank full payment of their deposits over a reasonable period of time, while if no new bank were formed and the old National Bank was liquidated, the depositors would receive only a portion of their deposits.

The new bank, it was pointed out, would be an entirely new organization under new management, and several business men, speaking before the meeting declared that such a bank would not only save money for the depositors of the closed institution but would prove a great asset to the town, county and section.

It is the plan to organize a bank with \$100,000 to \$150,000 capital and probably \$50,000 surplus. The exact amount of capital stock and surplus necessary cannot be determined until bank examiners have completed their listing of the assets of the closed bank. Indications today were that this work would be completed within the next week or ten days, at which time another meeting of stockholders and interested citizens will be held and the definite organization of the new bank perfected.

Under the plans outlined each of the stockholders of the old National Bank would subscribe to an equal amount of stock in the new bank plus 25 per cent or 50 per cent, as was found to be needed. A poll of the stockholders present this morning netted subscriptions in excess of \$60,000 and those interested felt confident that the remaining stockholders and other interested citizens would subscribe more than the amount necessary for the new bank. A thorough canvass for stock subscriptions will be made during the next few days and every interested citizen and business man in the city will be given an opportunity to subscribe stock in the new institution.

Before adjournment a stock subscription committee of J. J. White, J. B. Kittrell, J. H. Blount, H. L. Hodges and J. T. Little was named.

CONFEREES APPROVE THE RELIEF BILL

\$116,000,000 Emergency Measure to Be Sent to the Senate for Action Today

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Conferees of the Senate and House agreed today to the \$116,000,000 emergency employment appropriation in the form which drew opposition yesterday in the Senate. The report will be returned to the Senate later today.

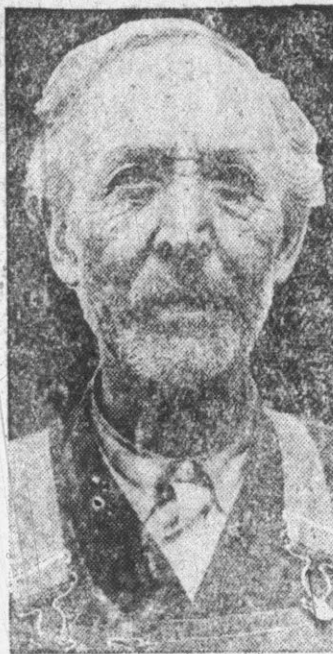
The revised bill contains the provision giving President Hoover authority to use the funds as he sees fit. If emergencies arise, this had been stricken from the bill by the Senate.

This decision of the conferees reached tentatively Saturday, was assailed in the Senate yesterday by Democrats. Senator Robinson the part leader, agreed to the restoration of this provision in the interest of hastening the legislation, however.

Chairman Jones of the Senate appropriations committee will report the formal agreement to the Senate. He expressed doubt a vote would be reached today.

The conferees report also eliminated the amendment of Senator Couzens, Republican, Michigan, requiring that contractors spending the fund employ local labor and pay the highest wage scale prevailing in the localities.

PLAN ARRESTS AFTER RUL ON RALEIGH BANK

Mayor Threatens the Prosecution of Those Charged With Spreading Rumors

Raleigh, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Mayor Eugene E. Culbreth of Raleigh announced today that he "detested" arrests and prosecutions as a result of a "rum" made here yesterday on the Commercial National Bank.

After doing the "biggest" day's business in the history of the financial institution, including times when lines of persons at the tellers windows extended into the street, bank officials announced last night that deposits yesterday had exceeded withdrawals. Cash paid out totaled \$42,766 and deposits aggregated \$54,697.

Today at noon bank officials estimated deposits today to that hour to have totaled \$423,000, including a \$200,000 cash deposit by the State. They were practically no withdrawals today, they said.

Mayor Culbreth, commenting on the rum, said that the Raleigh police chief "has the names of some of those charged with spreading false rumors about the bank's condition and there will be arrests and prosecutions under that section of the state banking laws making it illegal to make derogatory statements about banks."

Special Judge Hoyt's "Sink of Lying" was what he meant to say for with Gov. O. Max Gardner, told newspapermen that he expected to call the attention of any grand jury he may charge in the state in the future to the section of the statute prohibiting malicious gossip about banks.

Yeggs Get \$13,000 From Kinston Store

Kinston, Dec. 15.—News of a \$13,000 robbery in the W. H. Davenport department store here leaked out today after police, vainly seeking the thief, had suppressed it for some days. Davenport said collections from farmers the day before the theft were heavy. The money was locked in the store safe overnight. The loss was discovered at opening hour next morning. A skylight had been broken, a rear door forced and the safe looted. The thief left no clue.

The store owner was inclined to blame a professional. He recalled that a suspicious man entered the place several times the day before the robbery, asking questions about merchandise but purchasing nothing.

Famine Threatens Spain As Revolution Develops Into Wide-Spread Strike

Million Dollar Cargo Of 'Dope' Seized By Customs Officers In N. Y. Harbor

Narcotics Shipped From Turkey and Enclosed In Cases of Furs Discovered Aboard the Steamer Alesia; Importers of Contraband Not Cap- tured With Haul

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Huge quantities of narcotics termed at the Treasury the largest seizure ever made in this country, have been taken from the steamer Alesia, in New York harbor.

Customs agents reported today it totaled 1,050 pounds, and said the market value ran above \$1,000,000. Importers of the contraband were not captured.

The narcotics were shipped from Turkey, enclosed in cases of furs that originated in Constantinople. Announcement of the seizure was made by Assistant Secretary Lomen who said that it resulted from the joint work of the customs and narcotics bureaus.

The Alesia, enroute from Turkey, first touched at Providence, R. I., where customs agents kept it under surveillance. Nothing was landed there. When the vessel proceeded to New York, customs boats and agents followed, keeping a close watch.

In New York, the cargo was permitted to go to the customs house in hope it would be claimed. The 25 cases, billed as furs were not called for.

The narcotics were in small tin boxes. A legitimate shipment of narcotics made to druggists in this country under permit and carried in safe deposit vaults of the Alesia, was cited by customs officials as a possible cause of the smugglers being tipped off. One box of the legitimate shipment was missing when the Alesia reached New York. Officers started an intensive search to locate it. This, it is believed, frightened the smugglers.

PRICES SHOW NEW LIFE ON LEAF MARKET

Floors Cleared Late This Afternoon After Heavy Sales Yesterday and Today

The Greenville tobacco market yesterday sold 1,080,000 pounds of tobacco for a total sum of \$140,429.64 at an average price of \$13.00 per hundred pounds, according to the official report of sales made this afternoon by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales.

Although heavy sales continued today, the report of the supervisor indicated that floors of all warehouses would be cleared by 4:30 o'clock.

Prices were described as "considerably stronger today." A marked decrease was reflected in the prices for common grades. The market will close for the Christmas holidays tomorrow night and re-open again January 6.

A considerable amount of tobacco will be offered for sale after the holidays, and the Greenville market is expected to be able to reach the goal of seventy-five million pounds set at the beginning of the season. The bulk of the crop usually is disposed of at this season of the year but the farmers' market slowly the first of the season making the sales heavier during the days immediately preceding the holidays.

TROOPS FIRE UPON CIVILIAN AT DANVILLE

Rum Runner Wounded When He Failed to Obey Command to Halt Last Night

Danville, Va., Dec. 16.—(AP)—Colonel H. L. Opie, commanding officer of the 11th Infantry today ordered an investigation of the shooting by guardsmen early today of Lockwood Pickett, of Forest Hills, M. C., who officers said refused to obey their command to halt.

Pickett was in a critical condition at a Danville Hospital and physicians "awaited his reaction from shock before attempting an operation. He was wounded in the spine. Military authorities said Pickett had a woman companion at the time of the shooting who gave her name as Virgie Hobby, of Durham, N. C.

Findings of the military board, which will meet "at the earliest possible moment," will be submitted to Governor Pollard, Colonel Opie said. He expected to have the report completed within two days. (Continued on page four)

Heflin Seeks To Prohibit Trading By Stock Margins

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—A resolution to prohibit trading in margins on the stock exchange was introduced today, by Senator Heflin, Democrat of Alabama, after a speech blaming economic conditions to manipulations on the New York exchange.

The resolution also would limit interest on call money to not over 8 per cent and subject violators of the proposed legislation to fines between \$10,000 and \$50,000 and imprisonment for from two to ten years.

The Alabamian said the "harsh and dangerous" practices now permitted on the New York exchange have seriously injured business.

If the exchange is subject only to state control, Heflin said, there would be no justification for a demand upon Gov. Foxworth to take steps to stop "its harmful activities."

"The friends of Gov. Foxworth," he said, "have suggested him as a candidate for President in 1932. If he is wise enough, his courage, and brave enough to be President of the United States, he will show it now by helping to put an end to this giant evil in his own state."

Martial Law In Force From One End of the Country to the Other; Seventy-Five Thousand Troops Mobilized; King In- formed That Revolt Against the Govern- ment Has Been Sup- pressed; Strikes In All Principal Cities

Famine threatened in a dozen Spanish cities today, under a general strike which appeared to be spreading despite the proclamation of martial law throughout the country. There were serious riots at Santander and those who could were fleeing across the frontier into France.

Seventy-five thousand troops were mobilized through the important centers but at Madrid Premier Berenguer informed the king that yesterday's revolution had been suppressed and that the government was in control at all points, backed by the support of the people.

Meanwhile at Lisbon Ramon Franco, the young aviator who led yesterday's revolt of the aviators was interned by the Portuguese authorities. It was not known whether the Spanish government would demand his extradition and that of his associates.

At Bilbao workmen threw down their tools and walked out under a general strike order. There were no disorders.

Premier Damazo Berenguer in a statement to the Associated Press said:

"Order is being rapidly restored in all parts of the country," he said, "following yesterday's disturbances in San Sebastian, Santander, Seville, and the seditionists at Cuatro Vientos Airfield in consequence of the abortive attempt at Jaca."

"The revolutionary movement failed, absolutely because it received no support from the people, who have given unmistakable evidence of loyalty to and confidence in the government. The current ministry is strengthened by this unanimous support of public opinion and will continue to perform its duties without fear and without reproach."

The government counted four dead and perhaps 20 wounded as the price of yesterday's events, which developed into desultory rioting in widespread cities. Two of the dead were at San Sebastian where two civil guards were killed at Santander.

Aside from several wounded persons their exact number unknown, there were no casualties in the shelling of the Cuatro Vientos air-drome.

The police are continuing a round-up of persons suspected of participation in the conspiracy and hundreds of persons have been arrested, among them many prominent in Spanish civic and professional life.

From Barcelona came reports that the police had been reinforced by 6,000 civil guards. At San Sebastian the walls were plastered with proclamations abrogating all constitutional rights and the civil authorities had surrendered their powers to the military.

Strikes were in progress at Santander, at Bilbao where Alcala Zamora was proclaimed "president of the republic" yesterday, at Saragossa, a garrison for an important unit of troops, at Lerida, Jaen, Valencia, Cadix, Seville, Huelva, and Gijon.

Bilbao reported its bread supply was exhausted, no bakers working and all provisions stores closed.

The frontier town of Irun whose communications were cut off by insurgents yesterday reported by circuitous route that a bread famine had begun. Supplies were being brought across the frontier from the French town of Hendaye. Similar famines were feared in other parts of Spain as the proportions of strike movement grew.

The civil governor at San Sebastian issued a brief proclamation announcing that the army was in control. Fernando Eizola, the military governor, posted a manifesto asserting the enforcement of martial law and the suspension of all constitutional rights, newspapers were prohibited and street gatherings forbidden. Mounted police trotted through the streets with guns under their arms and guards were posted at all public buildings.

Throughout the kingdom these conditions maintained. Outwardly the populace was quiet, but actually it appeared to be living in the shadow of uncertainty. There were no reports of open rioting but the authorities were on the alert for any emergency.

Graham Marketing Plans Considered By the Farm Board

Raleigh, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The plan of William A. Graham, North Carolina Commissioner of Agriculture, for south-wide co-operation in marketing of fruit and vegetables is receiving the attention of the Federal Farm Board.

W. G. Mial, of the Farm Board came to Raleigh yesterday to confer with Mr. Graham regarding the plan. He also discussed the proposal with Dean I. O. Schaub, of N. C. State College.

Commissioner Graham's plan calls for co-operation of the southern states in maintaining representatives at the large eastern and midwestern produce markets. By this plan, he believes the flow of produce to market can be regulated and the glutting of any one market prevented.

Should the Farm Board approve the proposal, financial aid from the Board in putting the plan in operation is expected.

ARMY DOCTOR TESTIFIES IN OWN DEFENSE

Major Sheppard Says Wife Was Victim of Narcotics and Fear- ed Insanity

Kansas City, Kas., Dec. 16.—(AP) Major Charles A. Sheppard testified today in his trial for the alleged poison murder of his wife that Mrs. Sheppard was a victim of alcoholism and narcotics, was morose and had expressed fears of becoming insane.

In taking the witness stand in his own defense, the army medical officer, who is charged with having poisoned his wife so he would be free to wed Miss Grace Brandon, a San Antonio stenographer, related a story of futile efforts to break his wife of the liquor habit which, he said, had marred their married life from the time of their honeymoon in 1916.

His was the first mention in the trial of narcotics.

Sheppard testified that he discovered a few months before Mrs. Sheppard's death at Fort Riley, Kas., in June 1929, that she was using narcotics.

As on his return to Fort Riley from San Antonio where he took a three months' course in flight surgery at Brooks Field and where he first met Miss Brandon, "A week or ten days after I returned from Brooks Field, my kit was on the ice box where I had laid it," he testified. "Mrs. Sheppard was preparing something there and I asked her about it. She said she was taking a dose of morphine."

"I asked her how long she had used narcotics. She said 'For some time.' She said she suffered so much pain she had to take it. I told her no one using that amount of alcohol could do that (take narcotics) and live."

Tears welled again to the eyes of Major Sheppard and his voice broke when he told of events on May 15, 1929, when Mrs. Sheppard was stricken with the fatal illness. On that day, he said, Mrs. Sheppard was under the influence of alcohol before her collapse.

Mrs. Sheppard, he went on, had access to his medical kit which contained liquor, narcotics, stimulants, sedatives and antiseptics, in addition to other medical supplies.

The government alleges Mrs. Sheppard died of mercury poisoning.

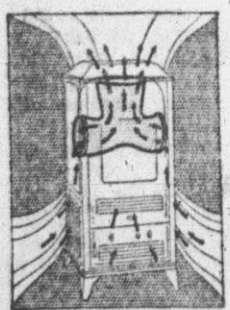

The resignation of Rev. Lee Sadler as pastor of the Eighth Street Christian Church of Christ will be received with deepest regret by the entire city. His loss will be a distinct gain to Indianapolis and for the entire denomination for that matter, as his future work will embrace a field that has long been neglected. He will assist in the raising of a sum of \$8,000,000 for the relief of disabled ministers—men who have served their time in the pulpit and who under the pension plan may be retired with sufficient pay to enable them to live comfortably the remainder of their life. The plan will have a tendency to weed out men who have become disqualified by age or infirmity to longer render active service to a congregation, and eventually should be conducive to greater growth of the church in all sections of the country. Men of Mr. Sadler's type have been picked to carry out the monumental task, and that they will succeed cannot be doubted. Every church is beginning to awaken to the necessity of ministerial relief because in a sense it lifts a burden from the mind of the minister himself and keeps strong, vigorous men forever on the "front lines" taking up and carrying on the fight where their disqualified companions left off. Greenville regrets losing such a gifted champion of the Bible as Mr. Sadler has proved himself to be, but the loss is ameliorated to

some extent in the knowledge that his work is launched in behalf of a cause that means continued advancement of the teachings of Christ.

FAMINE THREATENS SPAIN AS REVOLUTION DEVELOPS INTO NATION-WIDE STRIKE

their attempt to overthrow the Spanish monarchy and establish a republic because the artillery corps, after pledging adhesion to the movement, backed out at the last minute.
"When the artillery opened fire against us," he commented, "there was only one alternative—surrender. Nevertheless nothing can arrest the republican movement which will soon sweep Spain. In one month a republic will be proclaimed."
He said that the object of their attempt was "to establish liberty and impose a constitution on the Spanish people which republican or other wise no matter which would permit Spain to breathe freely. I wished out of patriotism to put an end to the tyranny which lasted eight years and that's what we decided to do."
Major Franco declined to say how he had escaped from prison a few weeks ago but said that he "had been hiding in a village near Madrid. I do not want to go too far away from the government or his majesty for I knew that a revolution was inevitable."
General Queipo de Llano, Y. Sierla, general of brigade, reported chief of the revolutionaries and one of the 12 men to arrive here in airplanes from Madrid, said that the failure of their plans was due primarily to the rashness of Captain Fermin Galan-Rodriguez who was executed after suppression of the revolt at Jaca Saturday.
"It was unfortunate," he said, "that Galan spoiled everything by his impatience. We had recruited men upon whom we thought we could count but they failed to keep their engagements. Galan always obsessed with the idea of being a precipitated things. He wanted something more than a republic and so as to bear the head of the revolutionary movement he decided to start three days before the date fixed. The government's repressive measures and the police did the rest."

TROOPS FIRE ON CIVILIAN AT DANYVILLE, VIRGINIA

Danyville, Va., Dec. 16.—(AP)—A motorist who, National Guardsmen said, refused to obey their command to halt, was fired on and wounded early today as the troops kept lookout for cars bearing dynamite into the textile strike area around Schoolfield.
Guard officers said they found 60 gallons of whiskey in the automobile.
The occupant, Lockwood Pickett, of Forest Hills, N. C., was said by the physicians who examined him to be dangerously wounded in the back near the spine, paralysis of the lower limbs resulting.
"Several hours later," physicians said Pickett appeared slightly improved but that the operation "was being delayed until he recovered from shock."
The driver swerved his machine when the order to halt was called out by a patrol across the road. Major E. W. Ogle, of the guard headquarters staff, said in a dictated statement. The firing was in pursuance of orders, he said, one bullet from a soldier's gun piercing the car and striking Pickett. The officer was authority for the statement that the liquor was discovered in the machine after it was stopped.
The wounding of Pickett by the troops followed a series of bombings around Schoolfield during the week-end. An explosive was set off under a porch of the home of Margaret R. S. Pitts, Schoolfield police justice, early yesterday. Wrecking the front of the house. No one was hurt.
A filling station was dynamited Sunday night and the residence of a non-union worker was damaged slightly by explosives Saturday night. A fourth bombing caused no damage.
Immediately after the charge exploded at the Pitts house, R. S. Pitts, Jr., who lived next door to his father, saw an automobile drive away.
Last night police patrols supplemented the military guards in the outskirts of Schoolfield as a special effort was made by both military and civil authorities to prevent recurrences of the dynamiting.
The strike area was quiet when the mill gates were opened at dawn for non-union workers going to work. Strikers had the regulation number of pickets on duty at the gates at both the Riverside Mills in Danyville and the Dan River Mills at Schoolfield while National Guard and city and county police units patrolled the section.

WOULD PUNISH TRICKSTERS ON GRAIN MARKET

Department of Agriculture Wants Flying Squadron to Handle Irregularities

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—An enlarged flying squadron of confidential inquirers to track down and prepare to prosecute those responsible for irregular transactions on the country's grain markets, is desired by the Department of Agriculture.

This was revealed today when Agriculture Department's supply bill was reported to the House, accompanied by the transcript of hitherto secret hearings of the House appropriation committee. It was one of the myriad activities of the department's branches upon which experts testified. D. W. Duvel, chief of the grain futures administration, advocated authority for the secretary of agriculture to control short selling of grain by foreign governments—a consequence of the recently disclosed Russian transactions in the Chicago pit. He said it was essential to keep tabs more closely on exchange brokers and commission merchants' activities, to prevent irregularities in handling customers' accounts.

The officials asked funds for "special investigations, mainly in Chicago, and the prosecutions which will result."

Other activities reported by the department's workers was a study of use of turpentine in "making shatter-proof glass to road building. D. W. W. Skinner, chemical technologist, said the right type of turpentine is sought to be turned into synthetic camphor, which in turn becomes celluloid placed between two panes of the shatter-proof glass for automobiles.

"If the turpentine research succeeds," he added, "I see no reason why a synthetic camphor industry should not develop in the south."

The stretching network of airways on the continent and in the territories has put the burden of furnishing the clock information on flying conditions up to the Weather Bureau. So that speeding pilots may take their chances of humans and mail safely through stormy nights and foggy days, the bureau is official.

Investigations designed to cut the farmer's annual fertilizer bill by \$60,000,000 were outlined by D. Henry G. Knight, chief of the chemistry and soils bureau. Fertilizer materials cost \$116,000,000 a year, he said adding that by a new blast-furnace smelting process, the department forecasts a saving of \$17,000,000 on potash-plus \$43,000,000 on phosphoric acid.

Nye to Continue Probe of Election In Pennsylvania

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Confident that still greater exposure in the Pennsylvania Republican primary on behalf of the Davis-Brown ticket will be uncovered, Chairman Nye of the Senate Campaign Funds Investigating committee plans to hold still further hearings.

He announced yesterday that well over \$1,000,000 in expenditures had been disclosed by new reports from investigators of his committee and added: "That isn't the end of it all."

He was not ready yet to say whether any move would be made by his group, or himself, to unseat Senator Davis, who was admitted to the Senate over protest by the committee, but he promised a full report.

He expected to find the additional expenditures covered by Philadelphia and Allegheny counties, but reports from some of the other counties were not to be completed until later this week.

Decisions has been reserved Nye said about the possibility of hearings on the Massachusetts and Alabama campaigns. He said reports indicated a "very serious situation" in the latter state, and said his committee might be "driven" to investigate.

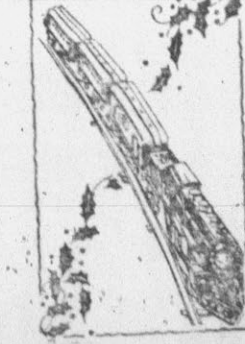

DIXIE GRID CONFERENCE IS FORMED

Memphis Tenn., Dec. 16.—(AP)—The Dixie conference, appeared on the Southern sports scene today. Seven member schools of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association formed it yesterday. They were: Center College of Kentucky, Howard and Birmingham-Southern of Birmingham, Mercer of Macon, Ga., Springhill of Mobile, Ala., the University of Chattanooga and Southwestern of Memphis.

Mississippi at Jackson, Miss., and Mississippi College, Clinton, Miss., were invited to join and announced they were interested. The conference decided to limit its membership to ten, all within or near the area including Tennessee, Alabama, Kentucky, Mississippi and Georgia.

Dean G. W. Mead of Birmingham-Southern, elected president, said the schools did not withdraw from the S. I. A. A. but sought closer bonds within an area narrower and more workable than the south-wide S. I. A. A.

Dr. J. W. Provine re-elected S. I. A. A. president, and head of Mississippi College, one of the schools "interested" in the new organization said:

"To carve out eight or ten or a dozen members from our organization and have them split off would be highly disastrous to athletics within our organization. I am sure the gentlemen sponsoring this movement agree with me. I can't conceive of anything that would be more disastrous. It would split our schools in the Carolinas, Florida, Louisiana and Kentucky, leaving them to themselves, and would never permit as fine or as splendid a fellowship as we now have."

No sooner had the "Dixie" been announced than convention delegates warned to discussion of reports that S. I. A. A. members on the Atlantic Seaboard, especially in Florida and the Carolinas, may form their own "conference within a conference."

ORIOLES HAD REGULAR FIRST BASEMAN AND DIDN'T REALLY KNOW IT

Chicago, Dec. 16.—(AP)—After hunting all over the baseball landscape for another first baseman, the Cubs discovered they bought one from Baltimore last summer although they purchased him for an outfielder.

FIFTH GAME FOR CHARITY CONSIDERED

UNCLE SAM TO HELP CHICAGO FIGHT GANGS

Government Moves to Effect Deportation of Bodyguard of Alphonse Capone

Chicago, Dec. 16. (AP)—The government has stepped into the fight to rid Chicago of its gangster element.

Tony "Mops" Volpe, bodyguard for Alphonse Capone and ranked by the Chicago crime commission as second only to Capone as a "public enemy," was the first subject of attack. His deportation to Italy as an undesirable alien was sought.

Arrested last night by immigration authorities on a warrant issued by Secretary of Labor William N. Doak, Volpe was taken to the detective bureau and held in \$10,000 bonds, despite his protest of American citizenship. Almost simultaneously a report became current that the activities of a score of alien gangsters were under surveillance of immigration authorities.

An old charge—Volpe's conviction in 1925 in connection with a \$1,000,000 counterfeit war savings stamp plot—was made the basis for the warrant. Volpe, who came to America when 15 years old, was naturalized a few years later, but the government charged he had made false statements in his application for citizenship. The papers were subsequently revoked. He served a short term for his alleged part in the war savings stamp case. Local agents of the immigration bureau predicted that within another month Volpe would be aboard a steamer bound for Italy.

for Aerial Survey of Flooded Regions

Memphis, Tenn. (AP)—Aerial photographers eclipsed their fond dreams in mapping a portion of the mighty Mississippi.

They allotted themselves five months to snap pictures of 8,000 square miles of the river and its alluvial valley. At the end of one month they had photographed 2,470 square miles.

Where they expected to spend the entire winter at the immediate task they were able to map an average of 200 square miles daily covering on exceptionally good days nearly 1,000 square miles.

The work was done under contract by the Curtis-Wright flying service for government engineers who are using the aerial photographs to make a monster detail map to aid in flood control work.

In the two seasons a complete mosaic portrait of the river and its alluvial valley from Cape Girardeau, Mo., to a point 60 miles south of Memphis has been provided by the surveyors.

The entire map being prepared by army engineers as a project of the Mississippi flood control commission will cover not only the Memphis district, but the Vicksburg and New Orleans areas.

Its purpose is to provide an up-to-date chart on a large scale of the complete flood region of the river.

The aerial work this season, which involved taking 14,000 separate pictures, was carried out with four planes equipped for flying at a constant altitude of 12,400 feet and with enough fuel to stay in the air for eight-hour stretches.

State Continues to Amass Evidence In National Park

Sevierville, Tenn., Dec. 16. (AP)—The state today continued to amass evidence in its suit to condemn the Tennessee mountain land of the Champion Fibre Company for the Great Smoky Mountains National park.

Attorneys on both sides have indicated the case will not be completed before Christmas.

M. B. McMahon, Sevierville lumberman and states witness, told a jury of view yesterday the company's 37,500 acres of land and timber in Tennessee is worth around \$771,475. W. A. Seymour, land appraiser for the Florida East Coast Railroad, placed a valuation of \$650,000 to \$660,000 on the property.

McMahon said at present prices spruce and timber the Champion Fibre Company would lose approximately \$1,430,245 in removing timber from the area to its plant at Canton, N. C.

"Butch" Slaughter Weds At Raleigh

Raleigh, Dec. 16. (AP)—E. R. "Butch" Slaughter, football line coach at N. C. State college, and Miss Mary Hoke of Raleigh were married at 10 o'clock this morning at the Church of the Good Shepherd here. Miss Hoke is a daughter of the late Judge and Mrs. W. A. Hoke.

Following the ceremony, which was performed by the Rev. Theodore Patrick, Jr., rector of the church, the couple left Raleigh by motor to visit Mr. Slaughter's mother at Louisville, Ky.

The audit was started under the supervision of J. E. Gibson, city secretary-treasurer and O. L. Childers, of the George C. Scott Auditing Company of Charlotte.

The audit is being made the mayor explained, as a double check on the preliminary survey of collateral which was made by the city's legal department.

"We want," Mayor Plummer said, "to know just what we have to protect our deposits and to be sure that none of the protecting collateral has been changed or removed."

It probably will require several days to complete the audit of the Trust Company.

Yesterday they heard a protest from organized labor against prison-made goods and made plans for a conference at an early date with

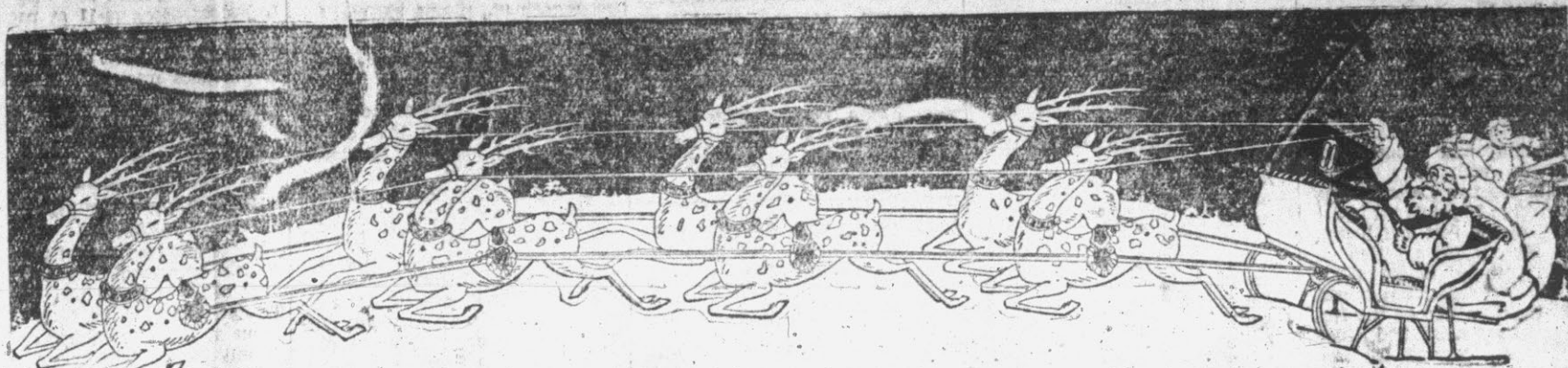
labor representatives in an effort to find a solution of the problem.

New York, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 9 to 17 points in response to relatively firm Liverpool cables and advance in Egyptian cotton at Alexandria.

There was a considerable trade demand as well as covering which absorbed further liquidation and southern selling and business was fairly active with price holding around 9.42 for new December and May about 12 to 15 points net higher at the end of the first half hour.

Prices for Egyptian cotton at Alexandria were 18 to 44 points higher, while Liverpool was considerably better than due on the New York close of yesterday, and house with continental connections were credited with buying some cotton here during the early trading.

Liverpool cable said the further liquidation in that market, had been taken by continental and Bombay buying and covering, but that buyers of cotton yarns and cloths were holding aloof. The spot quotations for Indian cotton in Liverpool were five points higher.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The stock market again felt the oppressive weight of heavy commodity prices today, after showing an inclination to advance in the first hour.

Strength of pivotal industrials was soon spent, as oil and miscellaneous issues again dragged the list down, and by early afternoon many prominent issues were off 2 to 5 points to new bottom prices. Trading was in only moderate volume, diminishing substantially from the turnover of the previous session.

Standard Oil of N. J. was conspicuously heavy, breaking about 3 points to a new low since 1928, close to 46. Its 1929 low, recorded in February, was 48. Texas Corp. lost nearly as much, recording a new minimum for their recent shares. U. S. Steel sold up 2 points only to drop back to new low ground. Canada Dry broke 4 points on reduction of the annual dividend rate from \$5 to \$3, and Coca-Cola lost 7. Shares declining 2 to 3 to new lows included American Telephone, American Water Works, American Smelting, New Haven, Atchafalaya, New York Central, Eastman, International Harvester, Columbia Carbon, Postal Preferred, American Tobacco B, and Missouri Pacific preferred.

The continued selling of the petroleum issues seemed to reflect nothing more tangible than growing dissatisfaction with the low and unprofitable prices prevailing in the industry, and apparent inability of the industry to do anything about it at this season of low gasoline consumption. In addition, copper prices fell back further. Copper Exporter, Inc. reduced its price 1-2 cent to the basis of 191-2 cents a pound domestic.
