VOTE TO DELAY QUESTION OF WORLD COURT

Senate Foreign Relations Committee Defers Action Until December of Next Year

Washington, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The Senate Foreign Relations committee today voted to defer consideration of the World Court, until next December. The vote was ten to nine.

Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, made the motion to postpone consideration. Republicans, including friend and foe of the court joined him almost solidly. Democrats voted unitedly against the postponement.

Chairman Borah of the committee, an opponent of the court, and Senator Gillett, of Massachusetts, an advocate, were the only Republicans to vote against deferment.

By this move, the Republicans forestalled any chance of the court issue becoming involved in this short session. They feared its discussion might lead to an extra session. It was agreed there was no opportunity to vote on the court at this session which ends March 4.

The committee decided to hear Elihu Root, former secretary of state, who helped to draft the revised statutes of the world court which were modified in an effort to bring about an agreement among the other powers and the United States on the Senate's reservation. The vote in the committee follows:

Hearing in Strike Disorder Deferred

Danville, Va., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Preliminary hearing to men persons charged with an attack December 8, on C. W. McKellar, non-union worker in the Dan River Mills, was postponed until Monday, when called in court here today. McKellar, although recovered sufficiently to leave a hospital, was not able to appear in Magistrate's Court.

McKellar in a sworn statement said he was beaten by a group after being challenged enroute to work in the mills, whose union employees have been on strike for two and a half months.

A third group charged with unlawfully assembling in connection with mass picketing Monday of last week were summoned for trial in Police Court today. Two other groups have been tried. 13 persons being convicted and nine dismissed.

Henry Ford Escapes Injury In Automobile Wreck In Ohio City

Youngstown, Ohio, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Henry Ford, Detroit automobile manufacturer, escaped injury in an automobile collision which damaged the steering gear of the car in which he was riding through Youngstown last night.

Mr. Ford and his chauffeur and secretary proceeded on their trip from Washington to Detroit in a new car after a delay of an hour and a half.

The collision occurred on the main street at the public square here, between Ford's car and an automobile driven by W. N. Bare of Youngstown, who asserted today that Mr. Ford's car "crashed" a red traffic light while Bare was crossing with the green light.

In spite of the damaged steering apparatus, Mr. Ford's car was driven to a motor agency under its own power. There the motor magnate waited in the sales room while a new car was prepared for him, and the party's baggage transferred.

No report of the accident was made to police, and the occurrence became publicly known only this morning.

Bare was not injured, and his car was only slightly damaged. Damage to the Ford car was limited to a crumpled fender and the steering gear.

OVER HUNDRED LIVES CLAIMED BY CARS IN N. C.

Death Toll for Month of November the Greatest in History of State

Raleigh, Dec. 17.—(AP)—One hundred and two persons, the greatest number recorded in a single month since records have been kept, were killed by automobiles in North Carolina in November.

The monthly summary of automobile fatalities, announced today by Sprague Silver, director of the Motor Vehicle Bureau, listed 330 accidents, of which 92 resulted in fatalities which claimed 102 lives and 404 persons were injured.

The total for 1930 was brought to 690, exactly the total recorded for 12 months in 1929, last year in December 63 persons were killed. The total of 690 was a new high record for fatalities and 1930 must pass that total.

There were 35 pedestrians killed and 46 injured in automobile accidents. In collisions between automobiles there were 24 fatalities and 233 injured. One person was killed and eight injured on collisions of automobiles with horse drawn vehicles and seven were killed and 16 injured in collision of autos and

Five children playing in the street, were killed, and eight injured. Eight persons walking beside the highway were killed. Intoxicated drivers accounted for nine deaths and 24 injured.

CONFEDERATE VETERAN DEAD AT ROCKY MOUNT

Rocky Mount, Dec. 17.—(AP)—J. Syd Davis, 89, Confederate Veteran and chief of the Rocky Mount police force for 25 years, died here today after a brief illness. Mr. Davis had been a policeman for 47 years.

Snow From Five to Sixteen Inches Deep Reported in the Two Carolinas; Ice Drifts Extend From Virginia As Far South As Georgia

North and South Carolina's children awoke joyously today to find "white" them outdoors their first Christmas present—deep, white silence, still swirling snow and prospect of no school.

Fluffy drifts—five, ten, sixteen inches deep—muffled all but the coast. Sleet battered cities by the sea and short distances inland. Temperatures tumbled—18, 20, 24, 26 degrees above. Venerable weather records tottered.

Eight days before Christmas there has come to the two states Christmas weather.

Trolley cars in Raleigh, Greensboro, Charlotte, found drifts too deep. Motorists cursed frozen or stranded, automobiles, steam from cracked radiators was gray against the snow. Highway traffic was hindered, or halted. Schools in many cities turned delicious kiddies out to play.

Rail traffic, however, was reported largely uninterrupted. Mails were moving, if belatedly. Telephone and telegraph wires stood the storm well.

Lenoir and Salisbury, in North Carolina, had 16 inches of snow at 9 o'clock, with great flakes still falling down. Spartanburg's 13 inches led South Carolina, and marked the heaviest snowfall there in 19 years.

In the Tar Heel state Hickory reported 14 inches. Greensboro and Charlotte ten inches. Asheville eight with ten and twelve in towns near there; Durham six, Henderson and Raleigh five. Rocky Mount two and Wilson one. Well nigh everywhere the fall continued.

Lower South Carolina had little snow. Beaufort reporting freezing rain and a heavy blow, an Orangeburg deep sleet. Sumpter had two inches combined snow and sleet, the heaviest in five years. Greenwood heavy sleet and an inch of snow atop it, and Columbia two inches of sleet. Anderson's snow was nine inches deep.

Farther east in the North State, too, there was sleet. Frozen rain muffled Wilmington's streets with snow forecast. New Bern had sleet and subsequent rain. Further inland Fayetteville and Goldsboro reported heavy sleet.

Goldsboro's 18 degrees was bottom for North Carolina. Spartanburg's 20 for South Carolina. The rest of the Tar Heel story—19 at Salisbury, 19.5 at Charlotte, 20 at Raleigh, 22 at Wilson, 25 at Rocky Mount, 32 at Greensboro and Durham. Some figures represent the low for the last 24 hours, others the reading early this morning.

If the weather man's threats are no idle things, snow records of fifty years standing may be broken. The forecast was for still more snow this afternoon, tonight and tomorrow, possibly mixed with rain, possibly changing to rain nearer the coast.

Charlotte weather officials said the heaviest December snow in 55 years there was 11.4 inches. The heaviest for all months in that period was 14 inches. Snow lay ten inches deep at Charlotte today, and

WINTER SENDS BLASTS OF ICE TO COMMUNITY

City In Grip of Sleet and Rain Storm Accompanied By 22 Degree Temperature

Greenville and vicinity were covered with a blanket of ice today as King Winter began one of the most vicious assaults of the season. Streets of the city were covered with a layer of sleet at least an inch thick and traffic was conducted under the most hazardous conditions.

Sleet started falling shortly after midnight and when the citizenship awoke this morning the entire landscape was a blanket of white. Although the sleet was mixed with rain during the morning hours this did not prevent it from sticking almost as fast as it hit the ground. The ice began melting somewhat at the noon hour and the streets were filled with slush that increased the danger to traffic.

Snow from three to sixteen inches deep was reported in the western section of the state, and in some of the cities trolley car service had to be abandoned. Some damage was also reported to communication service.

B. T. Clark, director of the local weather bureau, at 11 o'clock this morning gave the temperature at 22 degrees, three degrees lower than yesterday when the community suffered much discomfort from biting winds coming out of the north.

The government weather report held out no relief for the Carolinas either tonight or tomorrow. The forecast was for continued snow and sleet in the western and central portions and rain and sleet in the east.

Although no accidents had been reported in and around Greenville this morning traffic was being carried on under considerable handicap. (Continued on page four)

House Committee Reduces Drought Relief Loan To Thirty Million Dollars

Vote of 16 to 1 Taken in Face of Strenuous Opposition by Democrats and One Republican; Strike Out Language Loan Provision

Washington, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The House agriculture committee today voted to reduce from \$60,000,000 to \$30,000,000 the Senate drought relief bill.

The vote to report the bill was 16 to 1 after the Democrats joined by Representative Garber, Republican Virginia, had been defeated on an effort to retain the Senate figure.

The committee also struck out language authorizing loans to farmers for human food.

Washington, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Secretary Hyde today declared \$25,000,000 would be sufficient to take care of the needs of drought stricken farmers.

Representative Jones, Democrat, Texas, asked whether the department would use all of the \$60,000,000 as proposed in the Senate resolution, if it were enacted. The Texan pointed out that the resolution was merely an authorization and that the department would not be required to expend it for loans unless the demands were sufficient to require it.

Secretary Hyde replied "there is no need to provide more money than necessary; it is unnecessary to throw the budget out of balance in this manner."

In the past few years, he added, it had been an annual occurrence for farmers to appeal to the Federal government for loans. The department has kept the loans to seed, feed and fertilizer purposes.

"I personally regard loans by the Federal government for food on such thin security a dangerous step toward the Dole system in this country," Hyde said. "It is our view this principle of Federal loans should not be expanded."

Cases outside the need of loans for crop necessities, he told Representative Pulmer, Democrat, South Carolina, "are proper cases for the Red Cross."

Jones asked about the statement of Chairman McNary, of the Senate Agriculture committee, that the department originally favored a \$60,000,000 loan.

Ruling Of Federal Judge Holding Dry Law Invalid Will Have Little Effect

The Decision of Judge William Clark In New Jersey Fails to Draw Either Cheers or Groans at Washington; Drys Declare Former Decision of The Supreme Court Makes Ruling Unsound

Washington, Dec. 17.—(AP)—An "immediate appeal" to the Supreme Court from the decision rendered by Judge William Clark in New Jersey yesterday declaring the 18th amendment invalid, will be taken.

The decision was reached at the Justice Department today after conference between Attorney General Mitchell, Assistant Attorney General Young, in charge of prohibition, Philip Forman, United States attorney at Newark; Howard T. Jores, assistant prohibition director, and other officials.

The Justice Department announced that "at the proper time, the Supreme Court will be requested to set the case down for early argument."

Newark, N. J., Dec. 17.—(AP)—United States Commissioners Joseph Holland and A. L. Friedman were instructed by two Federal District Court Judges today to continue hearings of violations of the 18th amendment, disregarding in procedure a decision of Federal Judge William Clark Holding the amendment invalid.

Judges Guy L. Fike and William Runyon conferred on the Clark decision and decided neither to concur nor dissent until a case is brought before them for opinion.

Judge Fike said, "It is only fair that both sides be represented in a case at hand. I cannot express my self until a case is brought before me making a decision necessary. At that time I will adjust the matter and render my decision. The matter of concurrence with a colleague is open to question."

Washington, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Neither cheers nor groans echoed in Washington at news that a federal judge had ruled the eighteenth amendment invalid. Such opinion was expressed here today held the decision would not cut much ice.

The drys predicted the Supreme Court, if and when the ruling comes up for review, will reverse it. They cited numerous precedents. The Justice Department held it could not, until after Supreme Court action, affect the status of prohibition. Anti-prohibitionists in Washington had ruled the eighteenth amendment invalid. Senator Delivers Message to Senate Investigating Committee As He Formally Takes Seat As Member of the Senate; Committee to Return Decision During Afternoon; J. W. Bailey Opposed to Confirmation

Washington, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Senator Morrison, Democrat, of North Carolina, notified Chairman Cawens of the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee today he has no objections to the confirmation of Frank R. McNinch of North Carolina, as a member of the power commission.

The committee will meet this afternoon to vote on McNinch's nomination. The vote had been postponed for two days awaiting Morrison's arrival. Senator-elect Bailey, Democrat, North Carolina, has opposed the appointment.

The other nominees to the commission have been approved by the committee.

Washington, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Cameron Morrison, former governor of North Carolina, was sworn in today as Senator to succeed the late Senator Overman.

Morrison's credentials were sent to the chair by Senator Simmons, who was Overman's colleague for more than 27 years.

After the paper from Governor Gardner was read, Senator Simmons escorted Morrison to the dais and he was administered the oath by President Pro Tempore Moses.

Morrison is the first new Senator from North Carolina in 28 years. Members of the House delegation from that state witnessed the ceremony.

Joshua Bailey, elected in the place of Senator Simmons, was in the gallery. He takes office next session.

The new Senator was greeted by Democrats and Republicans on his way back to his seat, the one on the aisle next to the last row which has been used by Senator Simmons for years. Simmons moved over one seat.

Senators Copeland and Bratton, Democrats, and Nye and Smoot, Republicans, shook the new Senator's hand.

Upon taking his seat Morrison waved a greeting to members of his family in the members' gallery.

Two Men Hurt When Hit By Car

Asheville, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Two Carolina Power and Light company motormen were seriously hurt early today when they were knocked down by an automobile as they walked across West Asheville bridge.

The two were: H. E. Cook, 315 Haywood Road, and W. A. Elliott, 54 Tremont Street. Both were taken to Astor Park Hospital.

Mr. Cook suffered the fracture of a small bone in his leg and Mr. Elliott a bruised back. It was believed Mr. Cook would be discharged from the hospital today and that Mr. Elliott would remain there for a week.

The driver of the automobile was T. L. Summey, employee of the Purdy Bakery. Br. Suffey said the two men were walking along the center of the roadway over the bridge and that he could not stop in time to avoid striking them. The motormen were on their way to work. The accident happened at 5:30 o'clock in the morning.

Police said they would hold Summey on a charge of reckless driving though it appeared to them the accident was unavoidable.

Goldsboro, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Early Tuesday morning J. H. Booth, grocer, left his home to go to his store.

He has not been seen since. Relatives fear he has met with foul play.

SCHMELING MUST FIGHT J. SHARKEY

New York, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The New York State Athletic Commission has re-shuffled the heavy-weight deck without affecting the relative position of the cards.

The recognized champion, Max Schmeling of Germany, has been notified that he must accept within fifteen days a challenge from Jack Sharkey, Boston sailor man.

Schmeling was advised of the commission's action in a cablegram sent by Chairman James A. Farley, which said:

"There is on file in this office a challenge directed at you by Jack Sharkey. Your six month period in which to defend the title expired Dec. 12. You are directed to advise within fifteen days from date of acceptance of the above challenge."

Sharkey thus once more is picked as the logical contender and will get another chance to redeem himself for some of the miserable exhibitions he has put up in important matches. Schmeling won the title last June when Sharkey fouled him.

Schmeling's acceptance of the challenge was considered virtually certain but should he refuse it, he will be suspended.

The commission ignored the some what general view that W. L. (Young) Stribling of Macon, Ga., is this country's best heavyweight at the moment. The boys apparently took the position that since Sharkey had beaten Stribling once there was no real reason why he should be forced to battle him again. Ignored also were the rising crop of younger heavyweights among whom is Max Baer, Pacific coast slugger, who makes his New York debut against Ernie Schaef of Boston in Madison Square Garden Friday night.

Coincidentally with the commission's action, it was revealed that the Garden had no intention of arranging a match between Stribling and Primo Carnieri in Miami, Fla., this winter, with the survivor battling Sharkey here in April. Under this reported arrangement, the winner of the April bout would have met Schmeling for the title in June.

SPORTS SLANTS

No All-America football team ever lined up for action, in person, except on one occasion when a quorum was present at the banquet board, yet I am prepared to report that the nearest thing to such an all-star collection performed some three decades ago under the colors of the Homestead Library Athletic club, Pittsburgh.

I am greatly indebted to Mr. Perry Hale, Yale 1900, and Walter Cabp's selection that year as All-America fullback, for information on the post-graduate gridiron activities of college football stars in the days when athletic club teams were popularized, frequently furnishing opposition for the college elevens as well as exercises for themselves for themselves.

"The question of whether or not a team formed of All-American football players has been put to me several times in that there seems to be a belief that somewhere around 1900 such a team actually played a game," writes Mr. Hale from Portland, Conn.

"Possibly the reason for this is that teams were formed at that time in part out of the mythical All-America team. As I recall it the Duquesne Athletic club and the Homestead Library Athletic club, both of Pittsburgh, used to engage prominent men for a game which was played in Pittsburgh on Thanksgiving Day of each year.

The scheme was to give that section of the country an exhibition of high-class football as well as to carry out the rivalry which existed between the two clubs.

In 1901 the Homestead Library club secured a team, which was made up in part by All-American players. The Duquesne Athletic Club had no team that year. It was hinted at the time that the Homestead club made a scoop by picking up the best players, which probably was all nonsense.

"As I recall it, however, the names of the players on the Homestead team were: Peter Overfield, Pennsylvania, center; Hawley and Pennis Pierce, Carlisle Indians, guards; Arthur Fox, Princeton, and Artie Miller, Carlisle, ends; Richardson, Brown, quarterback; Fuls and Gammons, Brown, halfbacks; Fred Crelia, Dartmouth, fullback. I was at one of the tackles, having finished at Yale.

"We played two games with the Philadelphia Athletics, who included Bull, All-American center of 1895, and Blondie Wallace, Pennsylvania's All-American tackle in their lineup. That year we defeated Lafayette, 66 to 0 in two ten-minute halves which might give you an idea of our strength. Moss from either Nebraska or Texas played end with us."

BOBBY JONES IS PRESENTED SPORTS AWARD

New York, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Bobby Jones' last and greatest campaign has won for him the Sullivan Memorial award as this country's outstanding amateur athlete during 1930.

Jones, who accomplished the unprecedented feat of winning all four major golfing championships in a single year, won out by an overwhelming margin over a field of nine other candidates for the award given for the first time in memory of James E. Sullivan, pioneer worker in the A. A. U.

The award, a solid medal, goes to the athlete who by his performance and by his example and influence as an amateur and a man, has done most during the year to advance the cause of sportsmanship.

Some members of the A. A. U. memorial committee felt that Jones by abandoning amateur competition and signing a movie contract, automatically had eliminated himself from the contest. But a large majority pointed out that the contestants were to be judged on what they were and what they had accomplished during the year. Furthermore it was the general opinion that the Atlanta's action in signing the movie contract, had been "entirely above board and marked by that frankness and openness which always has been one of his characteristics" and had made him, "stand out more than ever as a thorough sportsman."

Pointing out to his magnificent golf accomplishments the selection of this sportsmanship or amateur status.

"By his excellence of performance, retiring nature, disdain for acclaim, helpfulness to and generous spirit toward his opponent and fine example under many trying situations, he has endeared himself to all lovers of amateur sport."

Jones received 1625 votes, more than twice as many as the runner-up, Clarence Demar, famous marathon runner from Melrose, Mass., who was given 800. Ballots cast for the other eight candidates follow:

Charge College With Special "Offer" To Two Football Stars

Springfield, O., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Charges that Wittenberg College representatives had offered special inducements to obtain the enrollment of two Cleveland High School football stars received the attention of school officials today.

The accusations were made by John Sutter, captain of the Lakeview High School team a year ago, and Robert Bader, former all-scholastic end at Cleveland Cathedral Latin, both of whom were dismissed with 14 other members of the Wittenberg freshman squad two weeks ago.

At that time the college announced the ousted youths had been promised aid by "outside interest." But Sutter ran Bader said last night that the offers came from officials of the school. Sutter exhibited a letter from D. L. Keyser, director of admissions, which stated that "you may depend on any promises made to you by our representatives."

Keyser said that in writing the letter he was "merely giving formal assurance to Sutter that whatever promises had been made to him by a representative of the college would be carried out." He did not know what promises might have been made.

The dismissal of the 16 freshmen players followed Wittenberg's recent readmission to the Buckeye Athletic Association after having voluntarily remained outside the conference for a year because it had been charged with proselytizing.

Four Schools Put Two Men Each On Mythical Outfit

South Bend, Ind., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Drake, Northwestern, the Army and Southern Methodist University, each placed two players on the all-opponent football team as selected by Notre Dame coaches, scouts and players for 1930.

ITALIAN AIR FLEET OFF TO RIO JANEIRO

Twelve Planes Head for Spain in First Lap of Flight to South America

Orbetello, Italy, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Twelve Italian seaplanes headed for the Gulf of Genoa today, en route to Rio de Janeiro, on a projected trans-Atlantic flight to Rio de Janeiro.

Piloting the first of the planes was General Italo Balbo, Italian air minister and leader of the expedition, which in many ways represents the most ambitious trans-oceanic flight adventure ever attempted. Fifty-three other men comprised the officers and crew of the Fascist air armada.

From Cartagena the airmen plan to fly down the Mediterranean and West African coast to a point near Dakar, Senegal, whence the expedition will take off on a 1,900 mile flight across the Atlantic to Natal, Brazil, from Natal they will strike out for Rio de Janeiro. It is planned eventually to sell the planes to the Brazilian government and to return home by ship.

Departure of the expedition followed a brief ceremony, witnessed by about 250 persons, in which the airmen stood at attention and sang the "Hymn of the Aviators." Then, taking off their hats, they raised their arms in the Fascist salute and at General Balbo's order "to your post," repaired to the seaplanes.

As General Balbo climbed into his seaplane he stood and shouted to his comrades: "And won a cheer for our Duke." The men responded with the Fascist cry: "Eva, Eva Alala." The mothers drowning out the last of the shout.

Prior to departure General Balbo discovered that chicken sandwich had been included in the lunches fixed for the aviators. He ordered them removed, stating: "Chickens don't fly. They would mean bad luck to us."

Buncombe Teachers Face the Yuletide Without Their Pay

Asheville, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Christmas may be a dull holiday for Buncombe county school teachers unless county officers devise some means today or raising money to pay the teachers their December salaries.

The county has been virtually "without funds" since the recent closing of the Central Bank and Trust Company with approximately \$7,000,000 of public funds on deposit.

The salaries of the teachers for the month fall due Friday, as the schools close for the holidays.

A meeting of the county board of education and county commissioner was called for today to consider the situation. Plans for continuing the schools after Christmas, pending an added problem.

Practically the same situation confronts the city school management. A meeting of the city school board has been tentatively called by Mayor Harry Plummer to study the difficulties.

A C. Reynolds county superintendent of education, was hopeful in his outlook for the county schools. He said most of the teachers had agreed to continue teaching without pay until some plan could be devised for meeting the payroll.

The North Carolina conference has definitely committed itself to the plan of the trustees of the college through action taken by its ministers and laymen in meetings held in each of the nine districts of the conference during the last ten days. It has been pointed out that to raise the proposed amount will call for only a small contribution from each pastoral charge. There seems to be an almost universal belief that this amount can be raised by faithful cooperation of friends of the college throughout the conference without undue strain upon any one.

The proposed plan for the raising of this fund includes the following: First, that the cause of Louisburg college shall be presented in all of the churches of the North Carolina conference either on December 21, or December 28, and voluntary offerings be taken at that time for

the college. Second, that each Methodist pastor designate such other church workers as he may see fit to assist him in soliciting private contributions. It is suggested that the pastors make a list of former students of Louisburg college to be especially helpful in this work.

Third, that all funds collected in each pastoral charge shall be forwarded to the presiding elders of the respective districts, not later than January 5, 1931, and that in turn the presiding elders will forward all funds received to Rev. F. S. Love, at Raleigh, who has been designated as treasurer of this fund, not later than January 10, 1931.

Posse Searches for Murderer of School Teacher

Marysville, Mo., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Aroused by the mysterious murder of 19-year-old Velma Colter in the county school house where she was a teacher, a posse of citizens using bloodhounds sought her unknown assailant today.

The nude body of the girl, beaten about the head, was discovered at dusk by T. H. Thompson at whose home she resided. He said he went to the school house when the girl failed to arrive home at the accustomed time.

The young teacher's bloodstained clothing were heaped beside her body. Dr. C. D. Humber, coroner said she had been attacked. The coroner said he had discovered fingerprints which he was investigating.

Sheriff Harve Englan was informed by school children that Miss Colter had remained alone in the building to read examination papers after dismissal of school at 4 o'clock. He said that Will New, a farmer living adjacent to the school grounds reported noticing a stranger loitering on the grounds. Later the farmer said, he saw Miss Colter enter the school.

RULING OF JUDGE HOLDING DRY LAW INVALID WILL HAVE LITTLE EFFECT

The highest bench has held repeatedly that various attacks on constitutional prohibition had no merit. It has refused to entertain several other attempts to break down the amendment. Those who know well the workings of the court hold the view that in matters of this sort it is inclined to a liberal construction of the constitution's provisions. The justices thus would be interpreting the amendment as an expression of the people's will which should prevail over the narrower technicalities.

The only direct effect anticipated from Judge Clark's ruling was a possibility that in his jurisdiction authorities might refuse to act against the violators. This was entertained by one government official here while others were emphatic in asserting it could have no control over the actions of other district judges given in New Jersey, and that it would not prevent arrests in that state under the national prohibition act.

A suggestion was advanced by one dry leader, Oliver W. Stewart, president of the Flying Squadron Foundation, that if the eighteenth amendment were held invalid, the thirteenth—it abolished slavery—must also fall. It too, was ratified by the legislatures and not by conventions.

Newark, N. J., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Prohibition enforcement continued to function in New Jersey today despite the ruling of Federal Judge William Clark that the method of adoption made the 18th amendment invalid.

The first liquor raid after announcement of the decision was made under direction of George S. Hobart, prosecutor of Bergen county, who as a member of the legislature sponsored the Hobart act, the state enforcement measure. He led a squad of police in a raid on the Riverside Boat and Yacht Club early today. Thirty men and women were arrested.

Judge Clark held that ratification of the 18th amendment by the state legislatures was not the method prescribed by article five for adoption of amendments which transfer powers from the states to the federal government. He held that the amendment to be valid should have been ratified in constitutional conventions in the several states.

Prohibition enforcement authorities in New Jersey said they would proceed as if no such decision had been rendered.

"My decision," commented Judge Clark, "will not affect the operation of the prohibition laws in any way. The Hobart act, the New Jersey enforcement law, is also still in force."

Philip Forman, the United States attorney, who prosecuted the case of William Sprague, clerk of Wantage township, and a farmer, on a charge of transporting beer, in which the indictment was quashed by Judge Clark's decision, was studying the opinion today with a view of taking an appeal.

He said the appeal might be taken either to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals or direct to the Supreme Court.

"Meanwhile," he said, "as I understand it, no other judge in the United States, nor the judges of this district are bound by the opinion and therefore, enforcement of the Volstead act in New Jersey will continue until the remaining three judges of this bench all decide in agreement with Judge Clark, or until a decision of the higher courts is reached in his opinion."

Judge Clark at 38 is the youngest member of the federal bench. He was appointed in May, 1925, by President Coolidge, resigning from the bench of the New Jersey Court of Appeals to accept the federal post. His appointment was backed by the late Wayne B. Wheeler, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League.

He was born in Newark and is a graduate of Harvard. He served as a captain in the world war and was cited for gallantry in action. In his five years as a federal judge three of his decisions have been reversed out of 33 cases carried to higher courts.

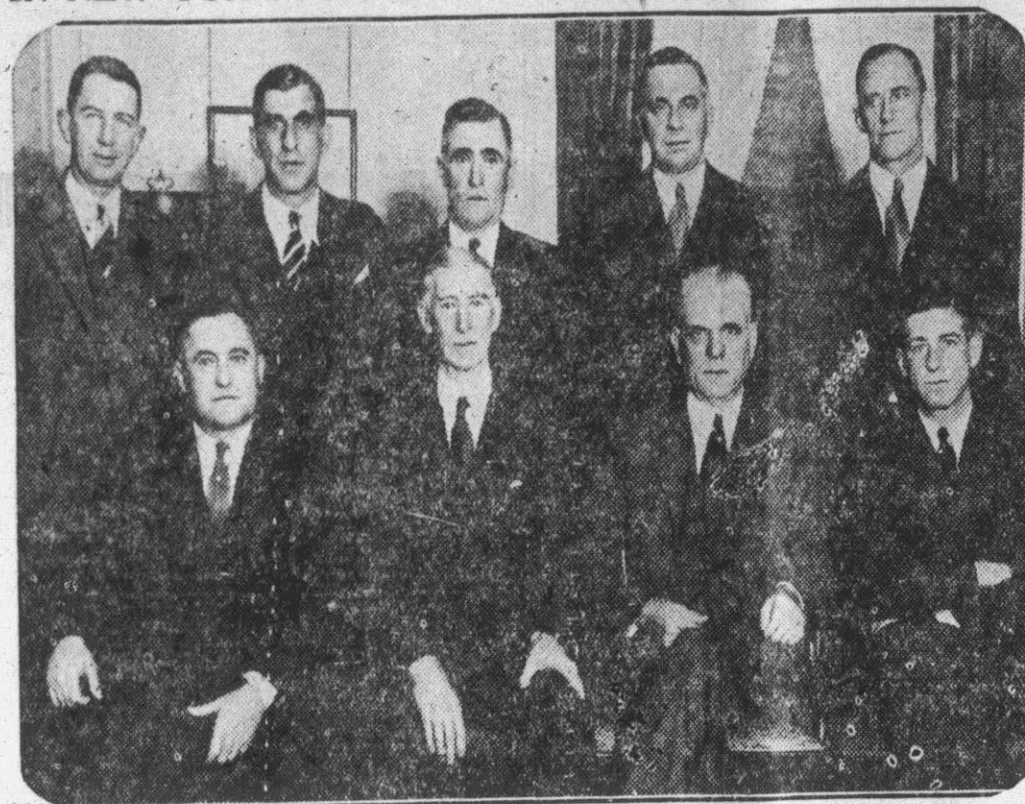

Atlanta, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Christmas weather moved in on the south today, a week ahead of time.

The greater part of Dixie was blanketed in snow and sleet, ranging from a bare trace to knee-deep layers that prevented children in Rutherfordton and Forest City, N. C., from attending school.

There was no record low temperature accompanying the snow fall, but frost to the coast in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and extreme northwest Florida was predicted for tonight.

The minimum here was 24 degrees and two persons were treated at a hospital for frozen feet.

The Atlanta weather bureau said it was probable the precipitation in other portions of the south, as in Atlanta, was as much sleet as snow, making harder going for motor traffic than snow.

Snow last night extended as far south as northern portions of Alabama and Mississippi where light flurries were recorded.

Except in extreme southern portions, most of the area had slowly rising temperatures in prospect either tonight or tomorrow.

Border states and the mountainous regions of east Tennessee, western Virginia and North Carolina were under the deepest mantle.

Eleven inches of snow at Danville, Va., which fell between 4 and 10 a. m., and did not stop then, was the heaviest since 1928. Charlotte, N. C., and 15 inches. Johnson City, Tenn., had seven inches that suspended street car service and interrupted other traffic. Reports from the mountains near Johnson City indicated a foot of snow.

Knoxville, Tenn., had two inches and Nashville had two and a half. In Tennessee, the snow extended westward to Memphis where a one-inch blanket was on the ground.

Snow started falling early today in Richmond, Va., with western Virginia already well covered. Roanoke was using the unemployed to clear the streets.

Snow started falling at Lynchburg, Va., early this morning and was still coming down as the day wore on. The temperature there was 22 degrees. Richmond reported a minimum temperature of 21 degrees within the last 24 hours and the mercury was not expected to go above 30 today.

Snow and sleet in Georgia extended as far south as Macon and Augusta, but the fall ceased in Augusta soon after the early morning reading was taken by the

Gardner Confronted With Unemployment

Raleigh, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Two tasks today confronted Gov. O. Max Gardner's council of unemployment and relief.

First, to discover the extent and causes of unemployment in different sections of the state.

Second, to determine the best means of relieving conditions.

R. W. Honinger, executive secretary of the council, said yesterday from five to seven persons probably would be sent out within the next two weeks to thoroughly canvass unemployment conditions in the state.

"These people," he said, "will bring back surveys of conditions in order that we may work out plans of cooperation in those forms of unemployment that are outside of the jurisdiction of the local unit."

The local situation, Mr. Honinger said, will have to be served very largely through the efforts of local units rather than through state or federal assistance.

Dr. H. A. Taylor, Dr. Laughinghouse's deputy health officer, is serving as acting health officer until arrangements can be completed for a permanent officer.

Dr. Jacocks, chosen for the position, is a native of Windsor, Bertie county. He has been with the International Health Board in the Far East for approximately 15 years.

Greensboro, Dec. 17.—(AP)—John Marshall, Greensboro negro, was held in the city jail today on a charge of murder as a result of a gun battle here in which W. M. Brown, Southern Railway detective, was fatally wounded, and a negro killed.

Coca Cola dropped 6, then recovered in part. Case, which resisted the morning selling, surged up more than 8 points.

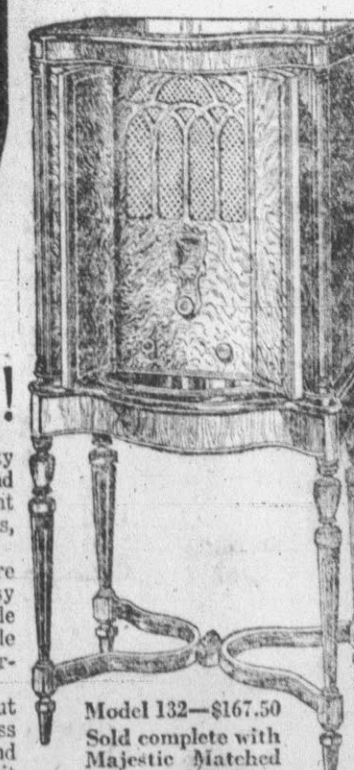

TELLS COURT WIFE CEASED TO LOVE HIM

**Maj. Charles Shepard
Continues Testimony
In Kansas City Mur-
der Trial**

Kansas City, Kas., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Major Charles A. Shepard testified on cross-examination today at his trial for the alleged poison murder of his wife that Mrs. Shepard had ceased to love him and that his purported statement to the contrary made to federal agents at Denver last spring was an "inaccuracy."

The prosecution, which charges Shepard poisoned Mrs. Zenana Shepard at Fort Riley, Kas., a year and a half ago so he might be free to marry Miss Grace Brandon, a young stenographer of San Antonio, Tex., continued its efforts to show discrepancies between the statement and his testimony.

Shepard testified that he realized at the time there were inaccuracies in the statement taken at Denver where he was arrested, but reiterated that he considered the matter "none of the officers' business."

"You say your wife didn't love you?" District Attorney Sordus M. Brewster asked soon after Shepard resumed the witness stand this morning.

"She told me so," Shepard replied.

Brewster then called attention to the statement made in Denver, in which Shepard was asked whether his wife loved him and he was quoted as replying, "absolutely."

"This," Major Shepard responded, "was another of several inaccuracies."

The army medical officer left the stand after about an hour of questioning.

Shepard was asked to explain why he did not use a stomach pump on Mrs. Shepard when she was stricken with the fatal illness.

"Mrs. Shepard was a confirmed alcoholic for years. I did not consider poisoning at the time," he replied.

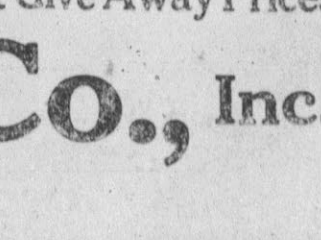
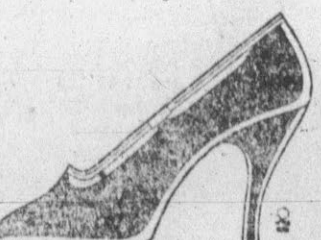
