SENATE G. O. P. STRIKE BACK FOR PRESIDENT

Two Members Brand Charges Launched Against Hoover By Democrats

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Senate Republicans were quick today to strike back at an attack upon President Hoover by Senator McKellar, Democrat, (Tennessee), who complained that Mr. Hoover had never given an itemized accounting of the \$100,000,000 flood relief fund he administered in 1919 in Europe as American food administrator.

After McKellar had reiterated his complaint in asking that the provision of the \$116,000,000 employment appropriation giving the president power to allocate the funds be stricken out, Senators Vandenberg of Michigan and Glenn of Illinois, jumped into action.

"The only implication in this assertion," said Glenn, "is that Mr. Hoover is a dishonest man and an embezzler of public funds."

"I resent the implication and I deny the insinuations."

"I would do the same if the President of the United States were a Democrat. I believe every true American resents it."

Vandenberg said sharply "nothing is more futile than an effort at this late date to tarnish the record of Mr. Hoover as food administrator."

McKellar had called attention that the law appropriating the \$100,000,000 flood relief fund for Europe in 1919 required an itemized accounting. He said: "Mr. Hoover had not made any, and therefore he would vote against giving him a free hand in the allocation of the emergency construction fund."

The Tennessee charge that the President "began a career of utter disregard of the properties of government" when he entered the "White House, was characterized by Glenn as "unjust and made through malice and spite."

Replying to McKellar's terming as "a damn charge" the President's recent statement that some members were "playing politics with human misery" in proposing unemployment relief remedies outside the administration program, Glenn said:

"A number of us here were touched by those words, but aren't they true?"

"While we are here in short session and pressed for time we hear, and especially from the Senator from Tennessee, bitter personal and partisan attacks on the president."

"If ever there was a time when party lines should be disregarded, it is now."

Bad Weather Delays Italian Air Armada

Cartagena, Spain, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Bad weather probably will delay the start of the Italian air armada, bound from Italy to Rio de Janeiro, from Kunitra, Morocco, its next stop, until tomorrow.

The six seaplanes which yesterday were separated from the principal flight in a storm and had to come down in the Balearic Isles are expected to arrive here today to join the eight planes which successfully completed the hop from Orbetello, Italy.

Unemployed Not In For Shoveling Snow At Durham

Durham, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The City of Durham learned today just how many unemployed are idle of their own volition.

Having declared every applicant would be given work shoveling away fourteen inches of snow that covered the streets and sidewalks, officials sat back and waited.

At the scheduled hour, just two appeared. They hoisted several shovels full and quit. Two hundred, however, had been recruited at 10 o'clock. Work would have been provided 1,000, authorities said.

INDIAN TAX EXEMPTION NOT UPHOLD

Judge Webb Declares Land Occupied By Indians Not Exempt From Taxes

Shelby, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Federal Judge E. Yates Webb today ruled unconstitutional the Congressional Act of 1924 exempting Indian lands from taxation.

Judge Webb's ruling was made in dissolving a restraining order secured by the U. S. Government to prevent Swain County, from taxing 32,000 acres of such lands.

In dissolving the order, he directed that Swain county take no further action until there had been sufficient time for the Federal Government to carry the case to the Circuit Court of Appeals and to the Supreme Court.

Judge Webb's ruling would only effect lands owned by Indians in the 13 original states of the Union and then only such lands as the states had never ceded to the United States government.

He based his opinion upon the earliest history of America and the right of the white man to hold lands "because of discovery and conquest."

Judge Webb said the lands came into the possession of England by the powers given John Cabot for entering and possessing. The same charter powers, he said, were later given Sir Humphrey Gilbert and Sir Walter Raleigh.

In the colonies thereby with Great Britain after the Revolutionary war, he pointed out, the lands were relinquished to the territorial rights of the United States, the rights of the soil passing definitely to the states.

PEOPLE SHOW CONFIDENCE IN LOCAL BANK

Business Normal Following Flurry Of Excitement Here Last Week

Confidence of the people of the community in the stability of the Greenville Banking and Trust Company, Greenville's only commercial banking institution, since the closing of the National Bank has been evidenced during the week following the closing of the other bank.

Despite the fact that heavy withdrawals had been anticipated on the day following the closing of the other bank, the Trust Company officials are very much gratified that the withdrawals were far less than had been anticipated.

On the same day many new accounts totaling more than a \$100,000 deposits were opened at the Greenville Banking and Trust Company. Since that time the bank has been receiving new accounts daily, both from this city, from Ayden and other sections of the county, as well as from several ration-wide business concerns.

In order to take care of the needs of the increased number of customers, the bank has increased its force by three members and is remaining open longer than the usual three o'clock closing hour to be of service to their customers.

From now until Christmas the bank will likewise be open from 7:30 until 9 o'clock each evening to receive deposits from the business houses which are remaining open for the Christmas shoppers.

In an interview this morning, Mr. W. H. Woodard, vice-president of the bank, stated that it was most gratifying that a large percent of the money withdrawn from the bank during the brief period of fear that followed the closing of the National Bank has already been redeposited, and that almost daily more of this money is being received by the bank. He also said that business had settled down and that each department was operating in a normal manner.

According to its last statement, the bank was in the most liquid condition in its history with more than \$1,300,000 immediately available in cash.

Asheville Begins Study Of Payroll

Asheville, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Asheville's new board of commissioners today began a study of the city's payroll with a view of lopping off non-essentials.

Mayor Harry W. Plummer, commissioner of public works, Harry L. Parker, and commissioner of public safety, Andrew Gennett, had a series of conferences with department executives of city hall relative to cutting down expenses through the elimination of employees and departments that are not absolutely essential to the operation of the city government.

Some weeks will be spent in this study, along with the studies of other city's problems. The city's operating budget has come under the scrutiny of the commissioners also.

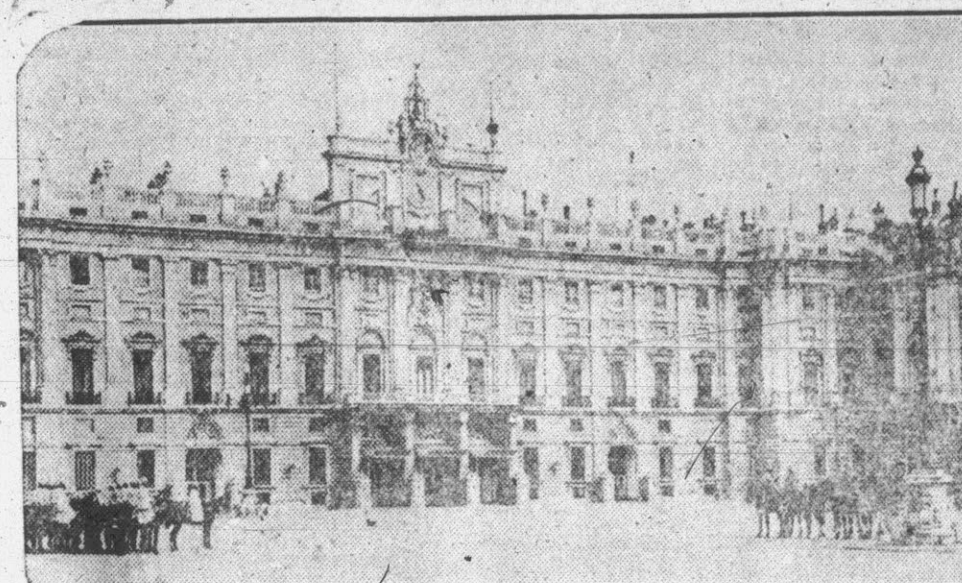
Now the city has a weekly payroll of \$2,100 to meet in paying off workers in the street, sanitary and similar departments.

In addition it has a monthly payroll of about \$31,500 which includes the salaries of administrative executives, employees at city hall, and the police and fire departments.

Under the existing conditions, the commissioners pointed out, today, there probably will be found to be both employees and executives whose services are not absolutely essential to the operation of the city's business.

CITY STORES PREPARED FOR HOLIDAY RUSH

Business Houses Begin Remaining Open At Night Friday Evening

Greenville stores and business houses will begin remaining open at night for the convenience of holiday shoppers Friday night, December 19, according to information given out this morning by C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the Greenville Merchants Association.

While some of the stores began staying open at night the first part of the week, the general opening will not become effective until tomorrow night when virtually every store and business house in the city will remain open until 9:30 o'clock to take care of the demands of their patrons.

The stores have been preparing for the holidays for a period of several weeks and nocturnal visitors to the business district will find everything aglow, fully decorated in keeping with the spirit of Yuletide. Display windows are decorated probably more extensively than any year in the history of the city, and added to this are the red and green lights along the streets and on store fronts.

The stores are stocked liberally with one of the choicest selections of Christmas gifts in years, and prices are described as the lowest since pre-war days. Bargains predominate in every field of Christmas gifts, and the offerings for men, women and children will stand the critical inspection of the most discriminating and exacting purchaser.

Greenville merchants this season as always are endeavoring to live up to the city's slogan, "The principal shopping center of Eastern Carolina," and through unsurpassed service and excellence of merchandise hope to be able to doubly impress the public with the significance of the slogan.

Decorations in the business district are probably more numerous than last season. Hundreds of red and green lights blink their messages of cheer and good-will to the shoppers thronging the business district at night. The crowning feature of the decorations is the giant Christmas tree at Five Points which greatly accentuates the spirit of Christmas in that section of the city. The tree is visible for a distance of several blocks, and shows what the Merchants Association is doing toward making Greenville one of the best-dressed cities of this part of the state during holiday season.

Persons unable to visit the business district during the day are urged to take advantage of the night hours being observed by the stores and to make a complete inspection of the elaborate offerings of Old Saint Nick.

House Passes Wood Farm Board Measure

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The House today passed the Wood bill to provide an additional \$150,000,000 for the Federal Farm Board.

The measure now goes to the Senate. It passed without opposition.

Chairman Wood of the appropriators committee had explained that the board advised the committee fully on its plans to use the money.

Representative Cochran, Democrat, Missouri, at first objected to bringing up the measure under unanimous consent, but upon Wood's explanation withdrew his objection.

Spain Reported Back To Normalcy After Attempt To Overturn Government

Revolution Reported Complete Failure By Associated Press Correspondent After Two Hundred Mile Trip Through The Affected Areas Of The Nation

Hendaye, Franco-Spanish Frontier, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Spain, for days in the throes of revolt and general strike, today appeared back to normalcy. First hand information, gathered on a 200 mile automobile trip by an Associated Press correspondent, Melvin K. Whitehead, of the Paris bureau, through the areas affected most, shows the revolution to have failed of its object.

Loyal crown troops are in charge of all districts. Occasionally a shot rings out here and there and troops disperse street gatherings but tranquility reigns. Defeat is admitted by those who were to have been the "major domos" of the uprising, defeat because of the eagerness of a commandant at Jaca who, disobeying orders, jumped the zero hour thereby giving warning to crown adherents. Thus was the revolution nipped in the bud. Today a strike is in progress throughout several districts but it is a passive strike.

The Associated Press correspondent made his automobile tour of the section which saw not a little bloodshed and whose people still harbor the will to revolt. It revealed that those who took part in the concerted effort to overthrow the monarchy are now taking stock of their apparent failure and asking themselves why they failed.

Union labor throughout the section visited carried through its share of the insurrection with a generous response to the order for a general strike.

But today the town of San Sebastian was calm although still under the spell of the strikers. At Bilbao, where the strike was 99 per cent effective, trolley service was functioning again but the cars carried crews of civil guardsmen. The streets of both towns and of their industrial suburbs were filled with milling crowds of idle workmen who seemed a constant threat to the soldiers.

Mounted troopers with rifles slung in holsters occasionally dispersed street corner groups, but there has been no serious fighting at Bilbao since Tuesday and none at San Sebastian, since the bloody encounter of last Monday morning.

From time to time, as this "tour" moved through the strike-ridden area, a rifle shot cracked out, and each time there came the rumor that another man had died. But usually the shots were traced to soldiers who had fired into the air to scatter crowds.

Bilbao is a hotbed of revolution and the home grounds of the Republicans. Here, if anywhere, a new insurrection might rise, but today the townsmen, with army rifles under their noses, were not talking much above a whisper, and they were not even whispering about revolution.

The Socialist and Republican leaders have taken to their heels and their followers don't even know where they have gone. Some, of course, are in jail. Others got across the frontier somehow and are living here in Hendaye until the trouble blows over.

In the little villages which cling to the sides of the Pyrenees just the other side of the frontier in Spain, the peasants didn't even know there had been a revolution. The word itself meant nothing to them and they led their little lives as usual.

THREE JAILED IN RIOT CASE ARE PAROLED

Governor Gardner Announces Freedom For Men In Marion Labor Troubles

Raleigh, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Lawrence Hogan, Del Lewis and Wbs Fowler, serving terms on the McDowell County roads for inciting to riot during labor troubles at Marion last year, were paroled today by Gov. O. Max Gardner.

Hogan, Lewis and Fowler were convicted along with Alfred Hoffman, union organizer, of "inciting to riot" in connection with the troubles at Marion.

Hoffman was sentenced to pay a fine of \$1,000 and serve 30 days which he has done, and Hogan, Lewis and Fowler were given six months each on the county roads. Service of all sentences was automatically delayed by an appeal to the Supreme Court which denied the men a new trial. At this time the three men still had about 20 days to serve on their sentences, the parole statement of the governor said.

The parole statement stated that the men had made excellent records and also noted that N. A. Townsend, executive counsel at the time of the trouble at Marion, recommended clemency. Mr. Townsend spent some time in Marion as the personal representative of the governor during the turmoil there.

The governor today also deprived three men under death sentence and paroled five prisoners, besides the McDowell County men.

Formal announcement was made of the postponement of the elections of George Davis and Lacy Sterling, New Hanover county negroes sentenced for murder and scheduled to die December 26. The men lost an appeal to the Supreme Court last week and this set the execution date one day after Christmas.

Governor Gardner immediately announced the men would be reprieved and to grant them a respite until January 9, which will automatically set their date of execution as January 10.

Believes Supreme Court To Uphold 18th Amendment

Chicago, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The National Woman's Christian Temperance Union today issued a statement expressing the belief that "The Supreme Court of the United States will uphold the 18th amendment as having been legally adopted and ratified."

Commenting on the recent decision of Federal Judge William Clark of Newark, N. J., that the amendment is "invalid," the statement, sent to all state and local W. C. T. U. organizations, said that the W. C. T. U. hailed "with joy the opportunity for the Supreme Court of the United States to uphold this great reform once more."

"If we are wrong," the statement added, "We will start all over again to put the liquor traffic out of business. In the meantime we ask the wets once more what they are going to do. If prohibition is held unconstitutional what is their plan by which they promise Utopia through the establishment of the legalized liquor business?"

"We have been told at each step we have taken from pledge signing, education, state regulation, local regulation, local option, state prohibition and national prohibition, that we were wrong. Our justify your claims of crusading and challenge to them is:

"What do you propose to do to reform?"

The statement also said that the W. C. T. U. knew Judge Clark's ruling was pending and "our feeling was that Judge Clark would make just the sort of decision he made."

Six Hold-up Men Slain In Week At Chicago, Ill.

Chicago, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A racket of robbery in Chicago apparently is becoming more dangerous. Six holdupmen have been slain within a week.

Two were killed by their intended victims, Henry Escalona, 20, by the shots of Richard Siebold, a former policeman, now owner of a butcher shop, and Arthur Howard, 32, when his gun was discharged during a scuffle with Martin Fran, a patron of a soft drink parlor.

A third robber, Joseph Shore, 35, was killed by six shots from the gun of Patrolman Michael Neery, guarding a hot store. Escalona and Shore were identified as former dance orchestra leaders.

New York, Dec. 18. —(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 7 points to a decline of 1 point, nearly all positions being higher on overnight buying orders bought in by yesterday's firmness.

Liverpool, did not fully meet the New York advance of yesterday afternoon, and there was a little Southern selling at the opening here which, combined with realizing caused reactions of 3 to 4 points. The cotton was absorbed by a continuation of the demand, however, and the market, at the end of the first half hour was 5 to 11 points net higher, with new December selling at 9.83 and May at 10.47.

Offerings were comparatively light after the early selling and run its course and the better opening in the stock market no doubt helped the tone of cotton.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Dec. 18. —(AP)—With its courage restored by the sharp boost given by the flurry of shorts, the stock market scrambled further today out of the deep gully in which the selling movement had finally deposited it.

The tables were completely turned on the bears, and violent upswings in a few volatile issues suggested that they were taking considerable punishment. Trading quieted down somewhat, and the sharp advance of yesterday naturally brought out liquidation in spots, but further gains of 1 to 4 points were numerous, and several issues surged up 5 points and more.

The market's upturn was automatic, and apparently disconnected with any new developments in industry or trade, although the most recent reports have been mildly encouraging.

The day's business reports included the weekly report of building contracts let in the states east of the Rockies, which indicated a daily average of \$9,274,200 in the first 11 business days of the month, compared with \$11,024,000 last month, and \$12,654,000 in December of last year.

Money continued to ease. Call money renewed at 2 percent and were available outside at 1 1/2. There was little demand, suggesting that much of the buying of stocks represented short covering.

Senator Greene's wife and daughter, Mrs. Harris Alexander, were at his side when he died.

Senator Greene had been partially paralyzed since 1924 when he was struck by a stray bullet fired in a gun fight between bootleggers and prohibition agents in Washington. For days his life was despaired of. It was at this time that he showed his loyalty to his duty and his unfailing support to Calvin Coolidge, when he insisted on being carried into the Senate chamber to vote in support of President Coolidge's veto of the bonus bill. His right arm was paralyzed and one leg affected by the wound.
