MORE SNOW IS PREDICTED FOR CAROLINA

Western Part of the State Again Threatened By Blanket of White

Charlotte, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Just getting back to normalcy after the heaviest snow in recent years Western North Carolina today heard from the U. S. Weather Bureau that there was a chance it would get more snow tonight.

The official forecast said "rain or snow" for the section tonight. "Slush, slush, slush" went the boots of tens of thousands of Carolinians today as they waded about in the aftermath of the worst snow storm in years.

It is almost as bad for automobiles, trucks, and other vehicles, making their way about on muddy and slippery streets and highways.

Thirty inches of snow was melting in Reidsville and near territory. From four to 25 inches was thawing out in other localities, rising temperatures, slated to be followed by rains over the weekend, hastened the thawing process.

Three thousand unemployed, it is estimated, were giving temporary jobs in North Carolina yesterday clearing away the snow, but today the moderating temperature was taking their work away from them.

Bus and railway service, thrown off of schedule in many instances by the heavy snow fall of Tuesday night and Wednesday, had been restored to normal yesterday. Regular street railway and airplane schedules were resumed today.

Runcombe Teachers To Get \$50 Checks For the Holidays

Asheville, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Asheville and Runcombe county school teachers are going to get \$50 checks for Christmas.

More than \$7,000,000 of city and county funds are tied up in closed banks, and it was feared for a while the teachers would have to forego entirely the 12 December salaries until later.

Officials yesterday, however, uncovered approximately \$40,000 or applying to education department payrolls. This was about one third the amount due teachers and other educational workers, and the authorities decided to present each of the teachers and education employees a check for \$50 today.

The problem of providing the remainder of the salaries and of raising funds with which to operate the schools after the holidays still remained. The officials will have a brief respite from their worries, however, with the closing of the schools today for the holidays.

Most of the county teachers have expressed a willingness to work without pay until means can be found for paying them.

State Ranks Sixth In Value of Crops

Raleigh, Dec. 19.—(AP)—North Carolina ranked sixth in the United States in total value of its crops in 1929, an advance over two states from the rank of eighth last year, the State Department of Agriculture announced today.

Crops in North Carolina this year are valued at \$240,000,000, compared with \$239,015,000 last year.

Not a state in the Union gained in crop values this year.

North Carolina passed Minnesota and Kansas during the year in rank according to the total value of crops by states.

The national decrease in crop values this year was about \$2,400,000,000, the department said, while North Carolina's crop value decreased only about \$52,000,000. Kansas had a decrease of \$162,000,000. Texas \$170,000,000 and a number of other states like losses.

Woman Prefers Jail to Augusta

Asheville, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Katharine McCallis, young Asheville woman, had rather be in jail than in Augusta, Ga., she told Police Judge Zeb V. Nettles in Municipal court today.

She pleaded guilty to a drunk and disorderly charge on the judge asked where she came.

"Augusta, Ga.," she told the court.

"I'll either let you go back there," Judge Nettles said, "or let you go to jail for 30 days. Which do you prefer?"

"I'd rather go to jail than to Augusta," she replied.

After pleas by attorneys, Judge Nettles changed his sentence to a fine of \$10 and the costs and suspended the jail sentence.

RENEW APPEAL FOR INCREASE IN DONATIONS

Merchants Association Urges Liberal Giving to Christmas Fund for Poor

Unless contributions pick up considerably during the next few days Santa Claus will have very little to offer the scores of poor people to be served by the Christmas fund of the Greenville Merchants Association.

Although the campaign has been in progress about three weeks, C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the association, reported this morning that contributions today amounted to \$25 in merchandise and \$11 in cash.

Last year this date contributions to the fund reached into hundreds of dollars, and the association was able to carry happiness into hundreds of homes where fangs of the wolf had been felt over a period of several weeks.

The association is being assisted in the campaign by the Welfare Department and workers today reported scores of people in pressing need of food, clothing and fuel. It takes money to buy these things and campaign workers today renewed their appeal to the public to give to the limit of their resources before the Christmas season arrives.

Although the Salvation Army and other organizations have raised right much clothing and fuel, this will not be sufficient to meet the demands of the poor by any means. In fact, all organizations engaged in relief work have redoubled their effort to improve the situation and will send out renewed pleas for aid.

Members of the Merchants Association declared it would be impossible for them to take care of the situation without more liberality on the part of the citizenship.

They have sent out an insistent plea for donations of clothing, food, fuel and cash in the hope that old Saint Nick may be able to provide abundantly for those hard hit by the unemployment situation.

The situation among the tenant farmers in some communities was described as pathetic. Conditions in the city of Greenville proper were not as severe as last season, but there are numbers of families in dire distress and the holidays will be gloomy indeed unless they are aided through the generous donations of the public.

Five Youths Killed When Auto Wrecks

Lewisburg, Pa., Dec. 19.—(AP)—Five youths were killed early today when their automobile crashed into the abutment of a concrete bridge across the Susquehanna river, which connects Lewisburg with the Susquehanna.

The dead: Wheeler Watson, believed a son of Federal Judge Albert L. Watson of Scranton; Hiram Gair and his brother, Wilbur, Watson; Robert Wilson, Watson; and William Robinson, salesman, of Canton, Ohio. A sixth man, Paul Aunkst, Watson, suffered possible internal injuries.

The accident occurred as Watson's touring car was crowded off the road by another automobile traveling in the same direction. After striking the abutment the car careened across the road, struck the other side of the tunnel and turned over several times.

The impact was so great that the automobile's motor was driven back into the body of the automobile.

Senator Watson Predicts Speedy Passage For The Emergency Relief Bill

Hopeful Congress Will Complete Work On Three Measures During The Late Afternoon; House Hold out Against Senate Amendments.

Washington, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Quick enactment of the emergency relief program was predicted today by Senator Watson the Republican leader, as Congress took up the compromise \$45,000,000 drought bill and moved to break the deadlock on the \$116,000,000 public works fund.

Watson was hopeful that three bills involving a total of \$311,000,000 would get through the legislative grid even before midnight.

The \$150,000,000 appropriation for the Farm Board was reported to the Senate at the outset today, already approved by the House. Senate consideration was deferred temporarily.

The House was standing out against three controversial Senate amendments to the \$116,000,000 emergency appropriation. Conference on the measure reported a disagreement early today.

Awaiting a formal vote by the House on this dispute, Senate leaders sought to iron out the breach in their ranks over these amendments in the interests of speeding the bill to the White House.

The House first took up the conference agreement allowing \$45,000,000 for drought loans.

The House today authorized an additional appropriation of \$150,000,000 for the Farm Board was reported to the Senate today but Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, objected to immediate consideration.

The House today accepted the conference report on the \$116,000,000 employment relief bill, but rejected three Senate amendments.

Washington, Dec. 19.—(AP)—The \$45,000,000 drought relief conference report was adopted today by the House.

The measure carries no provision for loans for food, but provides for advances to farmers in the drought area for seed, feed, and fertilizer.

It does provide, however, for loans incident to production of crops.

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PLANES JOIN SEARCH FOR BANK BANDITS

Four Robbers Surrounded In Alabama Swamp After Shooting Bloodhounds

Safford, Ala., Dec. 19.—(AP)—Two airplanes joined the search this morning for four bank bandits believed hiding in Bogus Chitto swamp, three miles from here.

The planes took off at dawn and began circling at low altitude the swampy stretch of swamp lands where the bandits and forces of more than 300, composed of Alabama National Guardsmen, sheriff's deputies and possemen pressed into service from the surrounding communities, were reinforced with a new pack of bloodhounds.

The planes, belonging to the 10th Observation Squadron of the Alabama National Guard, are equipped with machine guns and smoke bombs. The latter were to be dropped to guide the forces surrounding the swamp in the event the bandits should be spotted from the air.

The dogs were brought in the planes from Mississippi to replace those brought here yesterday from Kilby prison, the state penitentiary at Montgomery, and shot down by the bandits when they were traced to their places of hiding.

The bandits, one white man and three negroes, heavily armed, were reported by the officials of the Alabama National Bank at Marion Junction, Ala., to have obtained \$40,000 in a robbery which was executed so rapidly yesterday that the customer had escaped before a customer, who saw them enter the bank, could summon aid.

After the bandits sped through Orville, Ala., in an automobile, a deputy sheriff and others picked up the trail and were successful in forcing the fugitives to abandon the motor car in a ditch and set it afire.

The officers exchanged shots with the bandits as they fled across an open field, but the desperadoes brought a machine gun and high power rifle into play, beating off the pursuers.

Several hundred possemen, including several National Guardsmen, followed. Later a detachment of 25 National Guardsmen arrived from Silema.

Two track dogs from the state prison penetrated the thick underbrush, but due to their speed and the difficulty of traveling on horseback the bandits were able to shoot down the animals and retreat before the possemen approached last night.

Belvoir School Building Destroyed By Fire During Christmas Celebration

Yuletide Exercises Converted Into Scene of Terror Last Evening But Celebrants Rush From Building Without Injury; Loss Estimated At \$40,000.

The consolidated school building in Belvoir township was completely destroyed by fire early last night, entailing loss estimated at approximately \$40,000, according to information reaching this city today.

The fire was discovered while an entertainment celebrating the Christmas season was at its height, and several hundred people rushed out into the cold night and looked on helplessly as the beautiful structure burned to the ground. The school was to have closed for the holidays today.

The fire was discovered in the laboratory about 8:30 o'clock and within 45 minutes the building, one of the most handsome consolidated structures in the county, lay in a smoldering mass of ruins. The origin of the fire had not been determined today.

The New Year's Day game with Washington State, will mark the end of eight years of coaching at Alabama for Wallace Wade, who three years brought his team through undefeated. It also was Wade's fourth journey to Pasadena, three as a coach and once as a player with Brown in 1916.

The Tide went through a stiff signal, punting and passing drill yesterday and shortly before boarding the Crimson Tide Special to roll westward today, was ordered to make a few laps around the training track.

DUKE MAKES TROUBLE FOR CONFERENCE

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 19.—(AP)—Southern conference members are fleeing Duke University a very rough and tough youngster.

Admitted to the major Dixie athletic group two years ago, the Blue Devils of Durham, have rapidly forced to the front in all branches of sport, taking the time-honored post of veteran members.

The post football campaign found Duke finishing well up in the first division, fourth among 23 entrants. It was the best gridiron season ever enjoyed by the Devils, playing their last campaign under Jimmy DeHart. DeHart gives way to Wallace Wade in January and Wade's record at Alabama would indicate that Duke will continue to hold its own in a football way.

Incidentally, the Devils won the Big Five championship of North Carolina for the first time and also downed Navy and Villa-Nova in inter-sectional combat.

For two seasons, the Durham cagers have run riot through conference basketball ranks, finishing in second place both years. In its first court competition, Duke rushed through the veteran teams to lose by a narrow margin in the finals to another Old North State foe, North Carolina State. The scene was repeated in 1930 as Alabama nosed out the youngsters.

Jack Coombs, old time Philadelphia Athletics hurler, coached the baseball squad through a successful year last season. The conference does not award a baseball championship or ranking, but Duke played better than 750 ball.

As for swimming, the Devils showed enough speed in the water to place fourth in the conference tournament. Golf, track, boxing, wrestling and the other minor sports found the Durham athletics well represented.

What about the decoration of that home, Mr. and Mrs. Resident? The time has come to put your decorations in place if you are going to assist in the movement to make Greenville one of the best decorated cities in this part of the country.

Next week is Christmas week, and it is hoped by those in charge of decorations that everybody will do everything possible to get his decorations in place before Christmas Eve.

The bright lights and tinsel scattered liberally over the Christmas trees will play their part in driving out the gloom of every day life. They are necessary to the success of Christmas and without the proper atmosphere is lacking.

Don't delay the matter any longer, but get busy and erect the tree while you think about it.

If you have been keeping tab on the stories of needy cases carried in the columns of this paper from day to day you should be convinced that the Salvation Army, the Merchants Association and the Welfare Department are confronted with a big, big problem in providing for the needs of the poor during the present season. Only yesterday one of the coldest days of the year, the Salvation Army reported the discovery of a widow and four children without food, clothing or fuel. The army workers furnished food as quickly as possible and later sent them fuel and clothing. Scores of such cases have been discovered by workers of the charity organizations and they should be provided for during this season when the whole land is filled with gladness and joy because of the coming of Old Saint Nicholas. If you have not contributed to this fund, why not do so at once and get the satisfaction that comes with good deeds in behalf of humanity. Think of the joy that would be made possible through the contribution of even one dollar. Open up your pocketbook and

do your bit for suffering humanity. Confidence has been completely restored in Greenville banking institutions following the flurry of excitement attending the closing of the National Bank here last week, and bankers report that business is gradually getting back to normal. That this announcement will be received with gratification throughout the community cannot be doubted. Confidence is the keynote to the success of the financial condition of any community and especially during periods of depression such as that which has been experienced by the entire nation the last several months. In the opinion of the state bank examiner the closing of the majority of banks in the State of North Carolina was caused through the spreading of false reports about their condition. He stated that the majority of institutions were solvent and, closed merely as a precautionary measure for the protection of their depositors. Realizing the seriousness of the false rumors emanating in different communities, city officials everywhere are delving away to determine the source of the reports in an attempt to bring to justice the parties responsible for their dissemination. That this action will have a tendency to eliminate free talk and false statements cannot be doubted. It should have been taken long ago. It probably would have prevented the closing of the majority of the banks.

ELIZABETH CITY BANK FAILS TO OPEN DOORS
Elizabeth City Dec. 19.—(AP)—The Savings Bank and Trust Company here failed to open for business today. P. H. Williams is president of the bank. Officials said that the bank was solvent, in the statement given out following their decision not to open, and gave frozen assets and a gradual withdrawal of funds as the reason for closing. The bank, which is an institution capitalized at \$100,000, has liabilities of \$109,425. Loans amount to \$925,630 and borrowed money amounts to \$193,750, the state officials said.

LENOIR NATIONAL BANK FAILS TO OPEN TODAY
Lenoir, N. C., Dec. 19.—(AP)—The First National Bank of Lenoir did not open for business today. In a statement signed by the directors and officers, the action was said to have followed heavy withdrawals "and lack of confidence by customers due to the closing of other banks in Western North Carolina." The bank is capitalized at \$75,000, has a surplus of \$10,000 and undivided profits of \$18,000 on September 24. Date of the last bank call, it listed deposits of \$534,035.61. Officers said the deposits at the close of business yesterday were \$376,540.76. W. J. Lenoir is president of the bank and Ed F. Allen is cashier.

Eruption Volcano Claims 15 Lives
Batavia, Java, Dec. 19.—(AP)—In a tempestuous awakening which has taken the natives of central Java completely by surprise, the volcano Merapi, dormant for 80 yesterday killed 15 persons and inflicted a huge property damage. Those killed were at work in a field near the volcano's base when an avalanche of white hot lava, 70 feet high and 200 yards wide, slid down the mountainside and overwhelmed them before they could escape. Neighboring valleys and farms were covered with the mass of lava, stones and ashes, and a surrounding wide area was devastated by the intense heat. Loud rumblings accompanied the eruption and were last reported increasing although the rain of ashes had subsided somewhat. The volcano last night presented a terrifying sight. Clouds of black smoke enveloped its summit and flashes of fire shot from the cone. The volcano observation post has spread a warning to residents in a wide area about the base to leave their homes and find places of safety. The volcano has been in a state of agitation for two weeks but no one anticipated a serious eruption. It was in violent eruption once before, September 14-17, 1849.

SCHMELING IS OFFERED HALF MILLION BOUT

New York, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A situation similar to the one which sent the first Dempsey-Tunney heavyweight championship fight to Philadelphia arose today as new complications were tossed in upon the edict of the New York State Athletic Commission that Max Schmeling must agree within 15 days to defend his title against Jack Sharkey.

Following hard on the ultimatum which apparently eliminated Young Stribling from consideration, came an offer which brought the Georgia right back into the heavyweight picture. Nate Lewis, matchmaker of the Chicago Stadium, offered Max Schmeling \$500,000 to defend his crown against Stribling in Chicago next spring.

With promoters in general fighting shy of the proposed Sharkey-Schmeling bout just as they avoided the Dempsey-Wills battle demanded by New York's boxing solons five years ago, it seemed likely that the next heavyweight championship scrap would go west, again eliminating New York from consideration unless numerous compromises could be effected.

Lewis' offer was backed by telegraphic confirmation from Sidney N. Strotz, president of the Chicago Stadium Corporation and its success seemed more probable than any other plan proposed so far.

Lewis plans to stage the fight in Soldier Field, Chicago, in June. He believes the gate receipts at a top price of \$12 would run over a million dollars. It was in Soldier Field, where the seating capacity is over 100,000, that Dempsey and Tunney drew a \$3,000,000 gate for their second bout.

Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's manager and recipient of the offer had a good many problems to consider before he could reply to the first half-million bid since the days of Tex Rickard. Schmeling is bound by contract to the Hearst milk fund committee here in June and this must be taken into consideration. If the commission edict stands, this battle must be against Sharkey but neither the commission nor the Madison Square Garden Corporation appears interested in such a fight unless there is a preliminary tournament to stir up public interest.

SPORTS SLANTS

The University of Texas may have been thinking a little about its 1931 trip to Cambridge in going about the business of winning the Southwest conference championship this fall.

The Longhorns invade the "Old East" for the first time to play Harvard next October 24, and it will be highly appropriate for them to bear the title-holding banner into this intersectional fray.

Clyde Littlefield's team was a sensation of the Southwest this year. While Southern Methodist went gunning for intersectional honors and collected them by trimming Navy and Indiana, besides extending Notre Dame, Texas attended to its conference knitting and likewise turned in a very tidy job, showing what the powers of concentration can accomplish.

The Longhorns broke Texas Christian's winning streak and handed a prime pasting to Southern Methodist, something that Notre Dame was unable to do.

The Harvard-Texas encounter will mark another long stride toward focusing more national attention upon the athletic skill developed in the Lone Star state. The two institutions already have a strong academic bond inasmuch as the president of Texas, Harvey G. Bennett, the athletic head, Dr. H. J. Effenberger, and some two score members of the Longhorn faculty hold Harvard degrees.

Aside from the substitution of Texas for Michigan as the intersectional rival of note for next year Harvard's 1931 football slate is featured by the Crimson's visit to West Point for the annual game with Army's gridiron forces.

Not since the playing days of Charley Daly has Harvard invaded the citadel on the Hudson, nor has Army, for that matter, met any of its principal eastern rivals at home since football became big business for the military academy.

It is a tribute to the sporting spirit of more ancient days to note that the Army-Harvard agreement calls for one game in every four to be played at West Point, instead of at Harvard Stadium, where 35,000 more spectators can be accommodated at \$4 per spectator.

Michie Stadium, named in honor of the "father" of West Point football, is a neat, artistic and commodious affair as stadia go but it is not calculated to handle crowds of "major league" proportions.

Since it was built a few years ago Army's biggest home game, from the standpoint of general interest and attendance, was the 1929 engagement with the University of Nebraska.
