

SALVATION ARMY DRIVE IS FAILURE

J. E. Winslow Makes Appeal for More Workers in Budget Campaign Here

When the Daily Reflector reporter interviewed Mr. J. E. Winslow about the progress of the Salvation Army drive for maintenance funds for the year 1931, he was told that the drive will be complete failure unless we can get more volunteer workers to call on the prospective givers or unless we can get the public Salvation Army mind. Mr. Winslow stated that it is human nature for people to wait for someone to collect them instead of mailing their checks or judges direct to the local chairman, Mr. J. J. White. Mr. Winslow said no doubt many people thought that from the amount we were asking and from the number of people in our city that it would be an easy matter to raise the amount necessary to use in relief of the destitute families in our midst.

Mr. Winslow stated that nine hundred and eighty-seven letters were sent to persons who were carefully selected by the committee whom they thought were in a position to render aid to those less fortunate than themselves. He stated that this letter contained a slip of four pledge cards of different amounts to be selected by the contributor, with a postage guarantee envelope for the return of the same, so he said all that was necessary was for a person to exercise a little optimism for the year 1931 and pledge any amount, to be paid any time during the coming year. Mr. Winslow stated that only seven checks and pledges were returned out of nine hundred and eighty-seven mailed requests. He also stated that Mr. Whitford supplemented this mail appeal by a letter from himself to two hundred picked prospects and received three replies.

Mr. Winslow stated that in order to give every employee an opportunity to assist, letters with a subscription blank attached have been delivered to the employers of the city. Mr. Winslow said Western Union Telegraph Company let their messenger boys deliver these letters in order to save time and postage. He hopes that the employees will have the opportunity to help even in a small way. It is the opinion of the members of the Advisory Board that a fair degree of success could have been had if volunteer workers could have been secured to canvass the prospective givers, explaining to them the great need in our midst. Mr. Winslow said that only nine men and women have actually solicited and not more than one-fourth of the prospects have been canvassed. The members of the Advisory Board are very grateful to those who have worked and to those who have voluntarily responded. Mr. Winslow stated that the purpose of this article was to acquaint the public with the exact situation and to urge the people of Greenville to mail him their pledge or check. The officers of the Salvation Army are fairly swamped with calls for help. Some of the cases reported are of the most pitiful sort. Salvation Army workers are trained workers in this sort of work and they can really detect those who are unworthy from those who are in great need.

The Salvation Army workers will do their utmost to relieve the needy in our community during the coming winter, with such funds as have been raised, but their hands are tied without the financial support of the public, for they have no money of their own and are forced to depend on others.

A complete list of contributors will be published the early part of next week as a public acknowledgment of the contribution.

The total amount raised to date, both in pledges, checks and cash is \$567.75. This amount is for twelve months work.

Finnish Steamship Sinks Following Collision With Big Liner In The Cattegat

Forty-Five Persons Believed to Have Perished As Obregon Collides With Arcturus During Fog; Thirty-Six Saved From Icy Waters

Copenhagen, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Forty-five persons aboard the Finnish liner Obregon, including 17 passengers, are believed to have perished in the icy waters of the Cattegat off Lase Island last night when the Obregon collided with the Finnish liner Arcturus and sank.
The Arcturus, standing by after the collision, saved 36 persons, four passengers and 32 crew members, many of whom are seriously injured. The fog was so thick at the time that it was impossible to see two yards ahead. The Arcturus had a bad hole in her hull and is proceeding to port.
The tragedy was heightened by the fact that the captain of the Obregon, Captain E. H. Helt, was seriously injured. The captain of the Arcturus, Captain O. Helt, was also injured. The two seamen were brothers, Eris Helt commanding the Obregon and Ossi Helt the Arcturus.
The captain of the Arcturus radioed that he had 36 people from the Obregon safely aboard, but he requested a doctor and medical supplies be sent out to meet him since many were seriously injured. The fog remained so thick about the scene of the collision this morning that those aboard rescue ships were unable to see far enough ahead to locate lifeboats or survivors who might possibly be floating around.
Five Danish seaplanes were ready for a flight to Lase Island to aid in searching for survivors as soon as the fog lifted.
The steamer Svenskund, which brought Arcturus' remains out of the Arctic, today broke through the fog seeking additional survivors.

MAN DIES OF BROKEN HEART IN INDIAN CAVE

Mysterious Case of James Brandon, An American, Comes Light At His Death

Poono, India, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Death from a broken heart, "super-induced" by a belief that God had deprived him of the divine power of healing, was the extraordinary verdict rendered by a coroner today in the strange and mysterious case of James Brandon.
Described as a former resident of Nashville, Tennessee, Brandon, who in later life devoted himself to asceticism, occultism and mystic healing, was found dead a week ago in the squalid cave in which he lived, close by an old Hindu temple.

Evidence brought out at the inquest today showed that Brandon, who came to India fifteen years ago, amassed a fortune by treating the sick, lame, halt and blind with herbs, mystic potions and magic prayers.
On his deathbed, it was testified, he complained he had lost his occult power and a few weeks ago because his "God-given spectacles" had been stolen.
"Through the spectacles I was able to see God," witnesses at the inquest testified, "and through the spectacles God allowed me to see the causes of my patient's diseases and showed me how to cure them. Now, without them, I am helpless even to heal my own malady or to save myself from death."

It was revealed that a short time ago some Poono youths as a practical joke lured Brandon's Banyan tree hut, stealing all his property including the spectacles.
Although Brandon later offered a reward of 5,000 rupees (about \$1,800) for the return of the eye glasses they never turned up. Since their loss he had declared he was unsuccessful in his cures gradually losing his patients and also his own faith in his ability to heal.
That there was a woman in the religious recluse's life was shown by evidence that he sent regular monthly remittances of as high as \$5,000 rupees to a Mrs. Harpur whose first name and address police have been unable to learn. Beyond this mere detail Brandon's life is shrouded in a deep veil which the authorities thus far have been unable to penetrate.

That his life might remain in complete obscurity and mystery, Brandon upon his death bed ordered that his body should be burned on a funeral pile of sacred sandalwood, and his ashes given to his Brahmin friends. His Hindu associates carried out his wishes, and Brandon thus carried away with him the secrets of his existence.
The American recluse is declared by his Hindu friends to have many miraculous cures to his credit.
Police are now trying to find a calmant among Brandon's relatives for the substantial bank account which he left in a local bank.

LUCAS ADMITS AIDING FIGHT ON SEN. NORRIS

Republican Describes \$4,237 Donation to the Nebraska Campaign Fund

Washington, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Robert H. Lucas, executive director of the Republican National committee, acknowledged before the Senate campaign funds committee today that he ordered literature circulated in Nebraska in the last campaign against Senator Norris.
Lucas said the literature cost \$4,237, and was provided at the request of regular Republicans of Nebraska who were apprehensive lest Norris—a Republican Independent—would be elected.
He said the money was a "personal contribution" and he wanted to see Norris defeated because he considered him (Norris) a Democrat, in view of his opposition to Coolidge and Hoover.

Lucas placed the printing order with Charles I. Stengle, editor of the National Farm News, printed locally. It consisted of cartoons on the "wet and dry question," pamphlets of editorials on Norris, and a reproduction of a letter to Nebraska Democrats by the "Democratic Victory Scouts" asking them to vote for Norris, which had a postscript asking votes for Gilbert N. Hitchcock, Norris' Democratic opponent.
Lucas said the literature went into six or eight states, but only the letter and pamphlet went into Nebraska.
He denied he had endeavored to inject the religious issue into the campaign. Norris supported Alfred E. Smith in 1928.

State Prison Committee Recommends Erection Of Central Prison At Cary

A System of Parole With Proper Machinery for Its Administration Also Recommended in Voluminous Report On Conditions of State Penal Institution

Raleigh, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Recommendations that a new central prison be built on Cary prison farm near here, that a system of parole with proper machinery for its administration be installed and the adequate facilities be provided for employment of prisoners, are embodied in the report of the special prison commission sub-committee named by Gov. O. Max Gardner.
The sub-committee, appointed by Governor Gardner to study the voluminous report prepared by Professor Howard W. Odum, of the University of North Carolina, notes in its report that it has made a "careful study of all available information upon the prison situation in North Carolina."

The committee terms the report of Professor Odum, which has not yet been made public, "the most thorough and complete study ever made of the North Carolina prison problem and is perhaps one of the outstanding works of its character in the country."
The committee report is itself lengthy, covering 18 pages, but its substance is summed up in seven recommendations.
The committee's recommendations, it is pointed out, are not necessarily those of Governor Gardner but are submitted to him and to the General Assembly for their consideration preparing legislation at the approaching session of the board.

The seven recommendations of the committee deal in detail with the erection of a new central prison at Cary farm to replace the present plant there, as well as with the other details noted as needed in what will be a general reorganization of the entire penal system of the state if the General Assembly adopts the committee's suggestions.
Foremost the committee puts the need of "enactment of laws providing for a system of parole with proper machinery for its administration and with an adequate follow-up system to see that paroled prisoners observe the conditions of paroles."

The committee recommended that all prisoners physically fit be placed in profitable employment. Work on highways, work in producing road materials, work of convicts in "more intelligent farm operations," installation of granaries, cold storage plants and canneries on prison farms to use labor and production of more foodstuffs and feedstuffs on prison farms instead of raising cotton and tobacco were listed as ways of profitably using prison labor.

In connection with the recommendation that a new central prison be built the committee noted that the present prison farms should be more intensively cultivated. If this will not provide labor for all idle men, and additional farm should be purchased in the east, and later, as the needs develop, one should be added in the west.
The committee asked the General Assembly to make available to the prison the \$400,000 bond issue authorized by the 1927 General Assembly but yet unexpended in order that the program outlined may be followed.

Measure to Make \$116,000,000 Available to Public Works in the United States Upon Signature of President Hoover; Will Furnish Employment for Thousands of Laborers in All Sections of the Country

Washington, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The Senate today passed the emergency \$116,000,000 public works bill.
This completes Congressional action on the appropriation, which becomes available immediately upon signature of the bill by the president.

The administration intends to put the funds into operation at once on a vast public improvements program extended throughout the nation. Sponsors of the bill said it would give employment to thousands.

The measure got through the Senate finally today after Senators LaFollett, Republican, Wisconsin, and Walsh, Democrat, Mass., assailed it as a "drop in the bucket" and demanded additional appropriations to be expended for direct relief.

Passage of the bill was made possible when the Senate receded from three amendments in dispute with the House. It abandoned the amendments without record votes when it became an issue of making the money available before the Christmas recess.
Of the sum, \$80,000,000 would be spent in road construction. Island waterways improvements and public buildings construction will get the remainder.

President Hoover is given authority under the bill to allocate the money as he deems necessary, if any emergency arises. It is contemplated that most of the money will be spent before the first of the new fiscal year—next July 1.

Congress has now passed two emergency relief measures—the bill authorizing \$45,000,000 for drought relief having won final approval last night. Both measures were on their way to the White House today.

Hill Horne Heads Knights Templar In North Carolina

W. Hill Horne, well-known druggist of this city, has become acting Right Eminent Grand Commander of the Knights Templar of North Carolina, it became known today, and will be duly elected to the office at the next general session of the organization.

Mr. Horne, who was deputy grand commander upon the death of S. M. Cary, of Halifax, who passed away last week after long service to the organization.

Mr. Horne is one of the best known members of Knights Templar in this part of the state. He played a prominent part in the founding of the Greenville Commandery, and also has figured conspicuously in the work of the state organization over a period of several years.

At the completion of the unexpected term of the late Mr. Cary, Mr. Horne will begin his regular term as head of the state body.

Negro Arrested For Murder Of Virginia Farmer

Norfolk, Va., Dec. 20.—(AP)—Ollie Dorson, negro, of Norfolk, was arrested early today and charged with the murder of James T. Howe, hunter, trapper, student and semi-recluse, who was shot and killed in his home in Princess Ann county Thursday night.
According to Norfolk detectives who made the arrest, Dorson admitted being at the Howe home when the shooting took place but insisted the killing was done by another negro who was with him. He said Howe was shot after the latter had fired through a window in their direction.
Dorson still was being questioned early today. Officers said they found in his possession Howe's coat, pistol, a pair of gloves and a box containing coins said to have been owned by Howe.

Arrest 17 Negroes
Sanford, N. C.—(AP)—With the arrest of 17 negroes, officers believe they have rounded up the band responsible for many thefts in Lee, Moore and Chatham counties during recent weeks.

should.

Greenville high school is to be
congratulated on its victory over

young women from Beaufort county
in the last three or four years, and
the victory will be received with
pleasure by those interested in
athletics of the public school sys-
tem.

The young women have been go-
ing through some strenuous practice
the last several weeks and their
pro prowess was tested previously to
the Washington game when they
won over a team composed of high
school teachers.

Basketball is one of the most
popular indoor sports at this sea-
son of the year, and it is gratify-
ing that it is creating so much en-
thusiasm in the local school.

Scientist Believed To Have Lost Life In Volcano Erupt'n

Batavia, Java, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Professor Werner Borchardt, a scientist connected with the Hamburg Tropical Institute, was believed today to have lost his life in a small eruption of the volcano Merapi, in Sumatra.

Ten days ago Borchardt and two native assistants against advice of local officials started for the volcano. He intended to lower himself into the crater and observe emanations of heat from the lava.

One of his natives fled early in the expedition, fearing an eruption. The other remained with the professor until an eruption did occur, when they both ran to a small valley where the natives said upon returning here, he saw Borchardt disappear over a cliff while he himself hurried on. The native himself was injured in his escape.

Troops sent to search for the missing scientist returned without finding any trace of him. Borchardt was about 30 years old and had been loaned by the Hamburg Institute to the Medan, Sumatra, institute for a year to do research work on the influence of temperature on the blood and kindred subjects.

Ninety natives are believed to have been killed in an eruption of the Javan volcano, Merapi, which continues in an active stage after 80 years quiet. The volcano presents a terrifying scene with huge columns of smoke issuing from the crater, and occasional darts of flame from crevice on its sides. Villages and forests in the neighborhoods are burning, while severe thunderstorms are continuing over a wide area.

Washington, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Cotton of the 1930 crop ginned prior to Dec. 13 was announced today by the census bureau to have aggregated 33,259,622 running bales, including 478,421 round bales, counted as half bales, and 17,411 bales of American-Egyptian, but including to that date last year 13,456,733 bales including 519,564 round bales and 20,071 bales of American-Egyptian had been ginned.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Dominated largely by government figures showing that decrease of domestic winter wheat acreage has been smaller than expected, wheat values suffered sudden breaks today. Adding to the weakness of July wheat prices was an Argentine official report estimating the 1930 wheat yield of Argentina as 271,000,000 bushels as against 138,000,000 bushels last year. STOCK MARKET

New York, Dec. 19.—(AP)—A belated rally in the utility shares gave the stock market a steady climb as profit taking checked the advance in other sections of the list, particularly the rails.

The market made substantial advance during the first hour, but tapered toward the close, and assorted gains and losses, mostly narrow, prevailed at the close. The utilities, largely neglected in yesterday's advance, brought forward as reserves by operators for the advance of yesterday, and mostly closed heavy. Total sales aggregated 1,025,000 shares.

American Telephone, American and Foreign Power, electric power and Light, North American, American Water Works, Cerro de Pasco and International Business Machines gained about a point, and Johns Manville, Hudson, and Worthington closed up about 2.

The report of next week's schedule of steel mill operations in the Youngstown area indicated that aggregate output would be sharply curtailed, owing largely to the holiday. While some plants slowing up for year-end inventories, most manufacturers are getting increasing business from the automobile trade. Newell steel is increasing its output from 50 to 60 per cent of capacity.

The weekly mercantile reports showed little change in the trend of holiday trade, in which a marked preference for cheaper lines of merchandise is the most conspicuous characteristic. Although the volume of goods moved in some centers compares favorably with a year ago, reports indicate conditions are somewhat spotty.

The cry "underdog" that has become a monotonous drumming of late goaded him to a reply. Here it is along with other comments about the Cougars' outlook for their coming clash with Alabama's Crimson Tide in the Rose Bowl New Year's day.

From dispatches that come from the south and practically every other region except the northwest, it appears that Washington State still is rated as a decided underdog for the Rose Bowl game. The odds are swinging rapidly toward Alabama—for what reason I do not know.

"But this underdog situation meets with our satisfaction, and it will be interesting to go into the game on the short end. We do not want our friends and backers to become alarmed over our being the underdogs. Rather than affecting the team adversely, it has been, a stimulus to every Cougar's fighting instinct, and to the team's desire to prove that Washington State is a real representative of the Pacific Northwest and the entire coast."

Colleg Football Teams Break All Scoring Records

New York, Dec. 20.—(AP)—In a season marked by brilliant offensive play, the college football teams of the nation broke all scoring records for the last nine years during the campaign now drawing to a close.

Reaping a bumper crop of touchdowns, the country's average team, as determined by the Associated Press from the records of 152 representatives, scored an average of 139 points in the course of the season. The previous high mark was 130.9 set last year.

Prior to the 1929 season, the national football rules committee, in outlawing the run-back of a fumble recovered by the defensive side, expressed the opinion the change would encourage freer handling of the ball and produce more varied and effective offensive tactics.

With 1929 and 1930 leading all the other seasons for which records have been kept, the figures indicate the fumble rule has had the desired effect.

The average team participated in 8.68 games and scored 139 points to its opponents' 92. The average number of points per game was 16, the highest record since 1922.

SCHMELING IS IN REAL TROUBLE

New York, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Joe Jacobs is Max Schmeling's manager under a five-year contract but he has to read the papers these days to find out what the New York State Athletic Commission wants the German Heavyweight to do. And thereby hangs a tale that may cost "Her Maxie" his heavyweight crown.

On Tuesday the commission cabled Schmeling, who is in Germany, that he must agree in 15 days to defend his title against Jack Sharkey. Maxie has replied that Jacobs is his manager and fully qualified to go before the commission and talk it all over with the boxing solons.

And that's where the rub comes in. The commission and Jacobs are not on speaking terms and have not been for some months. The commission does not recognize Jacobs as a manager because of his suspension in the controversy over Arthur Buelow's managerial claims on Schmeling. Jacobs has filed no managerial contract on Schmeling with the commission which considers the German heavyweight a free agent.

Just what the next move will be no one was willing to predict but it was considered probable that if Schmeling fails to accept Sharkey's challenge in the specified time he will lose the heavyweight title so far as New York State is concerned.

Raleigh Citizen Ordained Priest

Rome, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Patrick Gallagher, of Raleigh, N. C., was one of 27 American students of the American College here who were ordained priests of the Roman Catholic church in the Church of St. John Lateran this morning.

The ordination had significance for them, since St. John Lateran is the mother church of Christianity and Pope Pius was ordained just 51 years ago today in the same church.

The impressive ordination ceremony culminated five years of study here on their part. They will celebrate their first masses Sunday.

Heiress Sued for \$500,000 in N. Y.

The action was disclosed when Miss Muriel Johnston, night club entertainer, petitioned the State Supreme court for a preliminary examination of Miss Ryan to support her charges that the heiress stole the affections of Robert Johnston, her partner in matrimony and music. Decision was reserved.

Over a period of four years, the complaint avers, Miss Ryan sought to lure Johnston from his wife by pursuing him on two continents and showering him with gifts of books, perfume, liquor and money. She succeeded, it is charged, and he now has a "luxurious apartment" on the fringe of Greenwich village.

Miss Ryan met the Johnston couple in 1926 while they were playing on the French Riviera, the complaint recites, and followed them to London where they appeared at the Night Life club of which the Prince of Wales is a member. The heiress "ingratiated" herself with Johnston, it is claimed, by writing and telephoning and never missing an appearance.

When the Johnstons returned to New York in 1929 Miss Ryan was right at their heels, Mrs. Johnston declares. She took up residence near their hotel and when they moved she moved also, it is said. The plaintiff also alleges that Miss Ryan and Johnston made two excursions to Boston and registered at a New York hotel.

Miss Ryan has filed a federal denial of the allegations and Johnston also has repudiated them. Mrs. Johnston has instituted suit for divorce requested by her estranged husband, she claims, so that he might marry the heiress.

SPANISH CABINET MAY RESIGN SOON

Madrid, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Martial law appeared to be only theoretical in Spain today, for the soldiers who have patrolled the streets of the principal cities for the past week have been withdrawn from active duty and are concentrated in their barracks.

The government remained alert for any emergency, however, and Premier Berenguer, who has been ill, was back on the job again denying persistent rumors that the entire cabinet was on the point of resigning.

Competent observers were inclined to believe the ministry would remain in office for the present through there appeared to be more than a possibility the cabinet would resign within a few months.

State Continues to Reduce Debt

Raleigh, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Gov. O. Max Gardner is letting nothing interfere with his program of steadily cutting down the State of North Carolina's bonded indebtedness.

On January 1, Governor Gardner announced last night, \$4,899,844 will be paid in New York on bond obligations of the state. This payment, he explained, will still leave a substantial amount of state funds deposited, and amply protected by securities, in state banks.

"The fiscal condition of the state is sound in every respect," Governor Gardner said. "It is taking care of its obligations as they mature, and will, of course, continue to do so out of current revenues."

Of the \$4,899,844 payment in New York on New Year's Day, \$1,650,000 will represent a reduction in the state's bonded debt, it was explained. The balance of \$3,249,844 will represent semi-annual interest on the state's debt.

In the year and a half he has been in office, Governor Gardner explained, a total of \$9,482,640 has been devoted directly to the reduction of the state debt. During that time, he said, the state has added only \$1,970,000 to its authorized public debt, making a net reduction of \$7,512,640 in the total authorized indebtedness of the state.

"It is my policy, and I shall so recommend to the coming general assembly," the state's chief executive said, "that no addition be made to the state debt for any purpose."

The total bonded indebtedness of the state now in the neighborhood of \$160,000,000.

Willington Made Viceroy of India

London, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The governor general of Canada, Viscount Willington, 64, a tall distinguished looking man, will become viceroy of India when the present viceroy, Lord Irwin, retires in March, 1931.

The appointment, announced today, came as a distinct surprise to most of Britain. The public recently had heard more of Samsay MacDonald as a prospective appointee than Lord Willington.

Lord Willington was governor of Bombay from 1913 to 1919 and of Madras from 1919 to 1924, earning a name for a conciliatory attitude. He has been governor general of Canada since 1926.

He will find a task which probably will tax his capabilities. A large section of the Indian population is in open passive rebellion against the British rule and hardly a day for the last year has failed to bring forth stories of disorders and suppression of Nationalist demonstrations.

He probably will be called upon to place in effect whatever new constitution may be evolved by the round table conference now in session at London. The constitution is certain to meet considerable opposition.

Lord Willington is a member of the Liberal party and a descendant of his mother's side from the John Hampden of English history who 300 years ago helped in winning a greater degree of English liberty through his refusal to pay taxes levied by parliament. One phase of the opposition in India to British rule is refusal of Nationalists to pay certain British levied taxes.

TWO GOLDSBORO BANKS FAIL TO OPEN TODAY

Goldboro, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Two Goldboro banks, both under the same management, failed to open today. Notices said the institutions had been closed in the interest of depositors.

The National Bank of Goldboro listed deposits to \$282,150.30 and resources of \$623,663.74 in its last statement on September 24. The bank was capitalized at \$100,000 and had a surplus of \$21,715.46. The Goldboro Savings and Trust Company, an affiliated institution, had deposits of \$228,413.53 and resources of \$286,491.72 on the same date. The bank was capitalized at \$41,000 and had a surplus of \$19,078.19.

G. A. Norwood is president of both banks. Thomas H. Norwood and John Norwood, his sons, are cashiers of the National Bank of Goldboro and the Goldboro Savings and Trust Company respectively.

HARD TO BE QUIET AT CHICAGO ILLINOIS

Chicago, Dec. 20.—(AP)—It was quiet as policeman Thomas O'Hern sat at his dinner table last night, enjoying life after a hard day on the beat.

Then there was a crash. It was terrible. The little bungalow shook. Dishes were hurled to the floor. "It's a bomb," shouted his wife. Seizing his pistol, the officer hurried toward the front porch, but it was gone. In its place was the wreckage of a motor car. "Don't shoot," said a timid voice as John F. Royley extracted himself from the debris and explained that it all happened because another car got in his way.
