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NORRIS WILL PUSH REFORM IN U.S.

Veteran Senator to Agitate Abolition of Electoral College in Next Congress

Washington, Dec. 27.—(AP)—A new election reform campaign—one he expected to extend beyond his life span—was taken up by Senator Norris of Nebraska today, even as he turned his back upon a third party movement and a possible presidential candidacy.

The veteran independent Republican announced he would start with the next Congress to agitate for abolition of the electoral college. This would require amending the constitution. His objective, he said, was to make it possible for an independent to run for President without party organization.

He made his plan known in refusing the suggestion of Dr. John Dewey, head of the League for Independent Political Action, that he leave Republican ranks to lead a third party movement. To form one more faction under present electoral provisions with any hope of success, said Norris, would be futile.

"I'm not a candidate for President," he told newspapermen last evening. "I'll not be a candidate for President. I'll probably be dead before this reform can be brought about."

His utterance did not end third party talk for 1932, however. Such names as Borah of Idaho, and Pinchot of Pennsylvania, continue to be mentioned as presidential candidates for such a movement.

Responding to a question, however, Norris said if the Democratic party should nominate a real progressive in 1932 many of the western Republican independents would support him, just as the Nebraska voted in 1928 for Alfred E. Smith. He did not commit himself as to 1932, but indicated strongly he might repeat his bolt.

Norris in the past few days has been denounced as a "demagogue" and his election from the Republican party has been demanded.

"I do not believe that a man who has at heart the good of the country," he said, "can look upon a party as something that is sacred. Our enthusiasm for a party often gets the best of our judgment."

"With due respect to all leaders, I can say the Republican party does not now belong to Mr. Hoover or Mr. Lucas."

"It is an open secret that the power interests are trying to nominate a Democrat who will be satisfactory to them. Known emissaries of the power trust are busy now trying to line up the Democratic party for Owen D. Young."

The trouble is, that under our present system the people have to vote for one man or the other. Often it is a case of voting for the lesser of two evils.

"The people don't really select our Presidents. What we need is a system by which the rank and file can get control of a party any time they have a mind to."

Norris termed the electoral college whose abolition he will seek a mere "fifth wheel to a wagon."

Billy the Scout Dies At Hollywood

Hollywood, Cal., Dec. 27.—(AP)—William H. "Billy the Scout," Taylor, 103-year-old veteran of the Indian wars and the Confederate army, and for 25 years one of the film colony's most colorful members, died yesterday.

Taylor was born in 1927 in that part of Mexico which later became Texas and lived through one of the country's most stirring periods of development.

In 1856 he joined the army and fought wandering Indian tribes on the prairies. With the outbreak of the Civil war he enlisted in the 73rd Confederate Virginia regiment. At the close of the war he again joined the United States army. He served under General Nelson A. Miles in the campaign against Sitting Bull and was a scout for General Custer. He spent 20 years fighting the Indians.

Taylor retired and came to California 3 years ago. He first entered motion pictures in 1910, playing in western two reels. Until his 92nd birthday he gained a living as a white haired Indian fighter in the films.

During his last illness, which attendants described as "simply old age" Taylor was cared for by his friends of the motion picture colony. He said he never married and knew of no relatives.

Joseph Nutt Declares That Statement Regarding Campaign Fund Deposit in Washington National Bank Absolutely 'Unwarranted'

Washington, Dec. 27.—(AP)—The breach between the independent Republican senators and the regular party leadership today grew wider. J. R. Nutt, treasurer of the Republican national committee, demanded that Chairman Nye of the Senate campaign funds committee, make a public apology for asserting a national committee account in a Washington bank was "a slush fund."

Nye is an independent. This development followed closely upon the controversy between Senator Norris of Nebraska, an independent Republican, and Robert H. Lucas, executive director of the national committee, and the latter's effort to read Norris out of the party.

Testifying before the Nye committee, Lucas said the bank account in question had been used to secure a personal note out of the proceeds of which he paid for campaign literature directed against the reelection of Norris.

Nutt said the account, which was at the Commercial National Bank, had mounted to \$50,000 and \$32,000 had been disbursed. All by check. He gave an accounting of to whom the money went.

The facts, he added, were on file at the capitol and could have been obtained by Senator Nye.

"In view of these facts, which were readily ascertainable by Senator Nye at the time he made his statement, that this was a slush fund," Nutt said, "I think the senator owes it to himself, to the Senate of the United States which he represents, and to the Republican national committee and its officers to make a public apology for his unwarranted charge."

"Every dollar spent out of this fund was spent in congressional races, and not one dollar of it was used to oppose any senator," he said.

"The checks were drawn by Robert H. Lucas, executive director of the Republican national committee, after full consultation with Congressman Will R. Wood, chairman of the congressional campaign committee, and they were sent into districts which were designated by Mr. Wood and other party leaders who were consulted from time to time."

SAYS UNIFIED BUYING WOULD SAVE BIG SUM

Governor Gardner Advocates Central Purchasing Agent for State Bodies

Raleigh, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Creation of a central purchasing agency for North Carolina's 99 departments and institutions is a part of Gov. O. Max Gardner's governmental reorganization plan to be presented to the 1931 General Assembly.

Such a purchasing or contracting agency would save the state \$400,000 annually, or approximately 10 per cent of the total amount of purchases, in the opinion of Governor Gardner.

The governor outlined plans for the buying agency here last night in a radio address—the first of a series he plans to deliver on recommendations he will make to the General Assembly.

Saying decreased tax receipts had made necessary a change in the state's "antiquated" system of buying, Governor Gardner asserted he would be willing to "offer to make a bond to save the taxpayers of this state \$400,000 the first year of operation" of the proposed new system.

"I am calling to this one item of contracting and purchasing," he said, "as evidence of the underlying principles involved in the plan for the reorganization of the state government to be presented to the General Assembly."

Governor Gardner called upon citizens of the state to express their views on his proposed changes to their representatives and senators before they came to Raleigh.

"I do not presume to believe," he said, "that my recommendations for change will be accepted without opposition. If I am wrong, I expect to lose. If I am right, I know I will win."

"If you believe as your governor and servant I am carrying out your views and entitled to your support, if you believe in the things I advocate, I am sure your representatives and senators will be glad to hear your views before they come to Raleigh. If you do not believe in the things for which I stand, by the same token I hope you will not hesitate to express yourself."

Governor Silent On Request For Asheville Probe

Raleigh, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Gov. O. Max Gardner today had not acted upon a telegram sent him last night by Mrs. Ed White, president of the League of Women Citizens of Asheville, asking that a special selector be assigned to Buncombe county.

Last night Mrs. White, acting upon authority given her at a meeting of the league yesterday, which is composed of several hundred of the leading women of Asheville, wired the governor asking the special selector to investigate and prosecute violations by city and county officials and by officials of closed banks.

NICKEL KING DIES IN LONDON

Lord Melchett, Leading Industrial Financier, Passes Away Early Today

London, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Lord Melchett, the former Sir Alfred Mond, one of Britain's leading industrial financiers, died here this afternoon.

He had been ill with pleurisy for several weeks and recently a relapse caused grave fears that he could not recover. He had been under the constant care of his physicians at his London home for some time. He was 62 years old.

Lord Melchett, before his elevation to the peerage in 1928 was Sir Alfred Mond, world "nickel king" and head of the largest chemical manufacturing organization in the British empire.

Moreover, he was an important figure in English politics and an international leader in Jewry, although his family were communists of the Church of England. But like the great Benjamin Disraeli, who became Lord Beaconsfield under Queen Victoria, Lord Melchett was proud of his Jewish ancestry, and gave liberally of his time and money to the cause of the "Jewish National Home" in Palestine.

Under the world's premiership of David Lloyd George, Sir Alfred Mond was first commissioner of works and later minister of health. For years he was a close political confidant and adviser of the dynamic Welshman but the alliance was dissolved early in 1926 when Mond forsook the Liberal party and became an adherent of the Conservatives, because he disagreed with his leader's land nationalization scheme.

Charge Lobbying Racket Against Agitators For Cash Payment to Veterans

Chairman Johnson Declares Commercialized Solicitation of Citizens' Signatures On Petitions to Congress Being Extensively Practiced

Washington, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Existence of a "lobbying racket," worked throughout the country by agitators for cash payment of veterans' compensation certificates, was charged today by Chairman Johnson of the House veterans committee.

The South Dakota Republican said "commercialized solicitation of citizens' signatures on petitions to congress," was being extensively practiced.

"Here is a plain case of racketeering," he added, "it is proscribing like several previously exposed schemes, on American sympathy for former soldiers."

Johnson cited about 1,000 petitions bearing about 50 names each. "The organization that got these out required a cash tribute of 10 cents from every person who signed," he said. "Starting on the west coast, it worked south and east, through Texas to this capital. It advertised employment in newspapers and offered each person responding the opportunity to cooperate in its scheme."

"Applicants accepting, pay \$75 for 150 petitions, or 50 cents each, with the understanding that they circulate the petitions charging 10 cents for every signature secured for the 50 blank spaces. The five dollars realized on each petition is pocketed by the circulators, or divided with subordinates who in turn may employ under any financial arrangement they can make."

Representative Patman, Democrat, Texas, who received this group of petitions, and forwarded them to the committee, said he regarded them as lobbying, but also as a "fact that a citizen is willing to pay to sign, indicates genuine interest in the legislation."

Prominent Kinston Undertaker Dies As Result Pneumonia

Eugene Wood, 50, prominent Kinston undertaker, died at his home in Kinston early this morning after an attack of pneumonia which he contracted while on a fishing trip several days ago. Funeral services will be conducted from his late home tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock and burial will be made in the Kinston cemetery.

Mr. Wood was one of the best-known business men of Kinston. He had been engaged in the undertaking business since 1906 and was also active in the development of the community.

He is survived by his wife and six children.

The deceased was the brother of Mrs. W. S. Dail, of Greenville. Mrs. Dail went to Kinston yesterday to be at the bedside.

Frank McNinch Sworn In At Charlotte As Member Of The Power Commission

Oath Administered By Judge J. J. Parker, of United States District Court; 150 Persons Witness the Ceremony; McNinch Expresses His Appreciation

Charlotte, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Frank R. McNinch, Charlotte lawyer, this afternoon was sworn in as member of the Federal Power Commission, to which body he was appointed by President Hoover early this month.

The oath was administered by Judge John J. Parker, of the United States District Court of Appeals, whose appointment to the Supreme court the Senate refused last summer to confirm. Confirmation of McNinch in the Senate came only after North Carolina Democrats had assailed his activity in the state's anti-Smith movement two years ago.

Judge W. F. Harding, of the North Carolina Superior bench, presided at the brief ceremony, which took place in the Mecklenburg county court house at 12:10 p. m. Rev. James F. Hardie, pastor of the Second Presbyterian church here, offered prayer.

McNinch speaking after his induction into the office, expressed his gratitude to those who supported him for the office and declared his hope that he would not disappoint them.

Approximately 150 persons, who gathered to witness the formalities, converted the occasion into an informal reception after the oath had been given, crowding around McNinch to offer congratulations.

In a statement issued on the eve of his swearing in, the Charlotte attorney said right into one of the first problems of the new power commission—the reported dismissal of three employees of the former cabinet power commission.

News dispatches from Washington said the three men had been dismissed by Chairman Smith and two other members of the commission before the remaining members had been sworn in. As a result of the reported dismissals, reconsideration by the Senate of the confirmation of the three members of the commission involved in the action was threatened.

Mr. McNinch in his statement expressed a hope and belief that when the full commission assembled in Washington January 2 or 5 all the employees of the old commission will be retained at their posts for at least 30 days.

He said he had talked with Chairman Smith over the telephone about "the alleged dismissal" of the three employees—Charles A. Russell, Frank E. Bonner and William V. King.

STICKS WITH REPUBLICANS

Sen. Brookhart Will Not Assist Democrats In Organizing Next Senate

Washington, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Democratic leaders have not adopted a program said Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, today, which will induce him to vote with them in organizing the next Senate.

Brookhart had offered to vote with the Democrats if they would cooperate to put an end to what he called "Mellonism." The offer made after the elections, attracted considerable interest because of the close line-up in the next Senate. He, and other Republican or Farmer-Laborite, could give control of the Senate to the Democrats.

Brookhart said today the Democratic party apparently has "the same sort of leadership as the Republican party." He added he did not propose to "jump out of the frying pan into the fire."

"So far they have announced no program," he said. "The Democratic seems to be wanting to avoid responsibility and the country will not trust any party that wants to do that."

Brookhart said the much talked of cooperation between the Republican and Democratic parties "is simply bi-partisan Wall Street rule."

"It is the same we have had all along," he said. "Nearly all laws which are oppressing the people today were passed by this bi-partisan cooperation."

"Party regularity is the same proposition in both parties. It places party above country and I think is a treason to the country. Party policy should always be subordinated to national policy."

FARMVILLE MAN INJURED IN COLLISION

Leslie Turnage Suffers Concussion of Brain In Highway Accident

Leslie Turnage, prominent business man of Farmville, was confined in the Pitt Community hospital here today suffering from injuries which he sustained in an automobile collision on the Greenville-Farmville highway yesterday. Although suffering from concussion of the brain, his condition was described as favorable this morning, having shown considerable improvement overnight.

County officers were seeking today a man believed to be named W. E. Tyson, of Aberdeen, and an unknown woman, in connection with the wreck. Tyson and the woman abandoned their car, which was said to have contained three cases of whiskey, immediately after the wreck, and officers up to the noon hour today had not been able to obtain any information as to their whereabouts.

The wreck occurred in the front of the home of Mr. Turnage's father near Lang's Cross Roads, where the injured man had been spending the day. He was preparing to drive his car onto the highway when the whiskey-laden automobile driven by Tyson was alleged to have swung too far to the right, striking and almost completely demolishing the car driven by Mr. Turnage.

Tyson extricated himself from the wrecked car and fled down the highway. The woman, who remained at the scene of the wreck for a short time, was picked up by a passing taxi. Tyson, officers stated, was believed to have been picked up by the same car further down the road. Both stopped in Farmville and had their wounds dressed and later were said to have gone in the direction of Wilson.

Officers obtained the man's name by conferring with the theft department of the Motor Vehicle Department.

Mr. Turnage was rushed to Greenville immediately after the wreck, and although his condition was at first believed to be precarious, examination revealed that his injuries were not as serious as expected.

Two Bombs Damage Chicago Buildings

Chicago, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Two bombs exploded almost simultaneously on the North Side last night, one of them being the fourth directed against "big business" within recent weeks.

One bomb blew in the steel door of an apron factory owned by Carson Pirie Scott and Company and damaged brick masonry, broke windows and shattered plastering in an apartment across an alley. Three persons in the apartment were slightly injured. Police and firemen formed lines to hold back the gathering crowds. The explosion was heard in Evanston, more than ten miles away.

Another bomb damaged a Chinese restaurant. Ten occupants were not injured but four of them, in a card game, were knocked off their chairs. The proprietor said he had no trouble or warnings.

NOTED FRENCH GENERAL NEAR DEATH'S DOOR

Little Hope Held Out for the Recovery of Marshal Joffre At Paris

Paris, Dec. 27.—(AP)—With one leg amputated because of gangrene developing in the advanced stages of arthritis, Marshal Joffre, victor of the Marne, lay tonight between life and death and his doctors appeared to hold little hope for his recovery.

There was an air of mystery about the old hero's illness, for his physicians declined to say where the patient was. They disclosed, however, that the amputation was performed last Saturday and that Mme. Joffre had persistently refused to permit announcement of her husband's condition.

The operation took place last Saturday at the private hospital of St. Jean De Dieu, where the marshal was taken when his condition became alarming.

Paris, Dec. 27.—(AP)—An official announcement today said that Marshal Joffre, hero of the Marne, is seriously ill as a consequence of inflammation of the arteries in the legs.

The doctors issued the following bulletin:

"Marshal Joffre for several months has suffered an inflammation of the arteries in the legs. This condition suddenly became aggravated and necessitated an urgent intervention which was carried out by Professor Leriche who has attended the marshal for sometime. He was aided by Professor Labbe and Dr. Boulin."

"After a momentary improvement which permitted everybody to become hopeful the condition of the marshal has now become disquieting. In fulfillment of his expressed wish complete silence has been maintained up to now concerning the illness."

Previous rumors circulating about the parliamentary lobbies that he was seriously ill had been denied by his family, but it was noted that a projected Canadian winter trip to southern France did not materialize.

Newspapers take the view that there is little chance for the marshal's recovery, but all hold out the wish that hope there is uniting in the wish that hope will not be in vain.

"Throughout the world," particularly in America and England," said one paper this morning, "a friendly prayer will rise for the illustrious chief who in 1914 commanded the battle which saved the races from servitude."

Marshal Joffre, whose full name is Joseph Jacques Cessaire Joffre, will be 79 years old January 12 next. In the course of his extended military career he has led campaigns in every continent of the eastern hemisphere save Australia.

He was born in 1852 at Rivesaltes, Eastern Pyrenees, of Spanish lineage and was one of eleven children. The Franco-German war interrupted his studies as a youth and he took part in the defense of Paris in 1870.

After loss of his first wife he applied for a transfer to Indo-China and aided in the occupation of Formosa in 1885, remaining three years at Hanoi as chief of engineers. In 1892 he was sent to Senegal and in 1893 led a column on Timbuctoo entering the town on February 12, 1894, after marching nearly 600 miles.

He became a general and brigade in 1900 and a general of division in 1905, and was called to the superior war council in 1910, becoming chief of staff and vice-president of the council in 1911. He took up the post of commander in chief of the French army on August 5, 1914, two days after Germany declared war on France and thereafter for two years the history of his life was the history of the war in the west itself.

His greatest victory, perhaps, was won September 6, 1914, when he threw the Germans back on the Aisne in the memorable battle of the Marne.

In the spring of 1917 he visited the United States, and was hailed everywhere with great affection as "Papa" Joffre, and "the hero of the Marne."

for that matter.

class exists they cannot expect
to see any peace even when
playing the part of Santa Claus or
anything else tending to elevate
humanity.

Finland Pushes New Road North To Arctic Ocean

Petsamo Fjord, Finland, (AP)—
Tourists soon may come here by
auto—almost 350 miles north of
the northernmost tip of Iceland.

When a 150-mile road is com-
pleted from here to Kyra, connect-
ing there with a network of high-
ways, Finland will claim to be the
first civilized country to extend
roads continuously to the Arctic.

The road leads to a harbor which
is free of ice at all times, giving
Finland a gateway for shipping.
Starting well above the Arctic circle,
the highway traverses uncul-
tivated tracts of Lapland, spanning
terrain that varies from steep hills
to flat marshes.

The project was begun in 1916,
when Russia controlled the province
of Uleaborg, which the road for-
spans, to obtain a free waterway
passage and avoid the German
blockade of the Baltic.

Trade Revival Looming Ahead, Snowden Says

London, (AP)—Philip Snowden,
chancellor of the exchequer—the
man who controls the pursestrings
of the British empire—is an optimist
in a world of economic de-
pression.

With a Prime Minister, Ramsay
McDonald, Snowden wields the
most influential power in the British
government and, as 1931 ap-
proaches, the chancellor has given
The Associated Press his views on
the world situation.

"The abnormal volume of unem-
ployment which has prevailed the
last year is due, as President Hoover
said in a message to congress,
to world causes over which one
country alone has little or no con-
trol," Snowden said.

Nevertheless he has a feeling of
optimism regarding the future of
world trade in general and British
trade in particular.

He is confident the time will
come when not only the magnitude
of Great Britain's trade but of
the world of today is unable to
conceive it.

The chancellor asserted there is
plenty of purchasing power and
credit to be employed when things
are favorable.

"Pessimism has been overdone,"
said Snowden, who deprecates this
spirit which is abroad in England.
Snowden, who himself has tri-
umphed over great adversities in
his career, said it was not the spirit
of pessimism which triumphed in
the past in difficulties as great as
those the country faces today.

A hundred years ago things were
as bad or worse but times changed
and the next 100 years marked the
greatest prosperity in the history
of Great Britain. And Snowden
said, times will change again.

contents. Maria wasn't agile

11 REPUBLICS TO SEE CHANGE IN LEADERSHIP

Revolutions Play Big Part In Breaking Up Old Governments and Starting New

By LESTER POSVAR
New York (AP)—Latin America
has had a big presidential year.
Eleven of the 20 republics sprang
from the Rio Grande, the Carib-
bean Sea and the Strait of
Magellan placed their destinies in
the hands of new men. Three coun-
tries changed presidents twice.
Six of the new presidents came
into power through revolutions, to
which the world-wide economic de-
pression was ascribed as one of the
principal causes. The countries
where military upheavals accom-
panied changes in government—
Argentina, Brazil, Bolivia, Peru,
Guatemala and the Dominican Re-
public—start the new year with
army officers as their chief executives.

For presidential changes during
1930 Guatemala set the record.
That nation had three presidents
in one week, finally leaving the
government in the hands of Gen-
eral Manuel Maria Orellana on De-
cember 16 after a sanguinary revo-
lution.

Names of presidents were writ-
ten on the pages of history in
Latin-America during 1930 as fol-
lows:

Argentina—Hipolito Yrigoyen
overthrown by revolution Septem-
ber 6. General Jose Francisco Uriburu
became provisional president
September 8.

Bolivia—Hernando Siles resigned
May 29. General Carlos Blanco
Galindo assumed presidency of mili-
tary junta which seized govern-
ment June 29.

Brazil—Julio Prestes was elected
president February 28, expecting to
be inaugurated November 15, but
sailed into exile November 25.
President Washington Luis was
captured by revolutionists October
24 and held prisoner until Novem-
ber, when he sailed into exile. Ge-
tulio Vargas took oath as provision-
al president, November 3.

Colombia—Enrique Olaya Herrera
succeeded Miguel Abadía Méndez
on August 7.

Dominican Republic—Horacio
Vasquez overthrown by revolution
February 24. Rafael Estrella Urena
became provisional president. Gen-
eral Rafael L. Hrujillo began regu-
lar presidential term August 16.

Guatemala—General Lázaro Chacón
vacated presidency December 12,
being succeeded by Baudilio
Palma. General Manuel Maria
Orellana overthrew Palma on De-
cember 16.

Haiti—Louis Borno vacated office
May 15 for Provisional President
Eugene Roy. Stenio Vincent be-
came regularly elected president on
November 22.

Mexico—Pascual Ortiz Rubio,
inaugurated February 5, succeeding
Emilio Portes Gil, provisional president.

Peru—Augusto B. Leguia over-
thrown by revolution August 25.
Col. Luis M. Sanchez Cerro took
oath as provisional president August
28.

Uruguay—Gabriel Terra elected
November 20, succeeding President
Juan Compsteguy on March 1,
1931.

That thereupon, in order to keep routine matters going, all civil service employees were asked to continue at their posts, but that no action, one way or the other, was taken as to Russell, Banner and King. I am sure that chairman and Commissioners Draper and Garsaud intended no disrespect whatever to Mr. Williamson or to me."

Railroads Will Lower Rates To Meet Competition

(Chicago, Dec. 27.—AP)—Plans to inaugurate a passenger rate of two cents a mile on four divisions as an experiment to see if the lowered fare will successfully combat motor bus competition, were made public today by H. E. Pierpont, vice-president in charge of traffic for the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific railroad.

The new rate, he said, would be put into effect January 1 on divisions in Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa. The present rate is three and six-tenths cents a mile.

None of the divisions is on a main line. Pierpont said, however, that if the experiment succeeded it was probable that it would be extended eventually to include the main lines.

It is primarily a service to gain the local traffic which the motor bus has caused railroads everywhere to lose, Pierpont said.

The announcement followed another from the St. Louis-San Francisco railway that a two-cent rate would be established on certain sections of its line, and a report from the Western Passenger Association that other roads were also contemplating a similar move.

MONTE CARLO IN AN UPSTIR

Prince Louis Suspends Guarantees In Effort to End State of Dissatisfaction

Monte Carlo, Dec. 27.—(AP)—All Monte Carlo was astir today at the greatest coup d'etat staged yesterday by Prince Louis who suspended both state and municipal councils and took away guarantees provided in the constitution of 1911.

Thus far the hubbub created by the prince's action has been principally talk, but the principality's government has every one of its army of more than 100 mobilized to meet a possible emergency and put down any further rioting such as that of last Monday when Prince Louis returned here from Paris.

If the words of the opponents of Prince Louis and his summary treatment of the acute political and economic situation should develop into deeds within the next few days there is wide expectation that France will move troops into the principality and take over its administration, at least temporarily.

One rumor today is that Prince Louis, exasperated by the dissatisfaction with his regime, will take a six months vacation, either leaving the principality to stew in its own juice or asking France to come to his aid.

He is known to be firmly convinced that the only remedy for Monaco's ills is for a bigger and better tourist season with more wealthy American and British spenders and that with recurrent political disorder there is little chance of this.

A combination of the world-wide economic crisis and intensified competition of Nice, Cannes, Juan Les Pins and other up to the minute resorts whose attractions make dim and faded the splendors of Monte Carlo, the casino season lousier none too favorably. Without visitors, Monaco would starve and the prince feels that she cannot afford the adverse publicity which further disturbances would bring.

Chicago, Dec. 27.—(AP)—A big shiny red eight-cylinder automobile was standing in front of the city hall yesterday at 1:06 p. m. when George B. Warner, an elevated railway guard off duty, happened along.

George had nothing in particular to do, so he hopped in and stepped on the gas. Out of the loop he roared at a speed estimated by police at 60 miles an hour. Brakes on other cars in the crowded district shrieked to give him room.

Then he bore down a little more on the gas and shot the car to Grant Park at sixty-five. George then took to the Lake Shore, increasing his speed as he went along, finally getting up to 86 miles an hour, police said, missing pedestrians by inches. All the while he kept the horn going.

By 6:30 p. m., practically the whole Chicago police force was looking for him but he was always miles ahead of where he was last reported. Finally, on his fourth stop for gas, the police closed in on him.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Dec. 27.—(AP)—The stock market braced itself today, after slipping close to the year's low mark.

Substantial liquidation came into the market during the first hour, suggesting a combination of both tax and bear selling, but the list stiffened in the last half hour, and recovered slightly from the day's minimum levels. The market still displayed a somewhat heavy tone at the close. Total sales for the two hour session aggregated 1,350,000 shares.

Net losses at the finish were largely fractional, and a few shares closed higher. General Electric was off 3-4 after sagging a point to a new low. Westinghouse Electric declined 1-3-4 to a new bottom and closed off 1-2. International Telephone was off a point, near the day's low, which was a new minimum. Other shares closing about a point lower included North American, Loews, Pennsylvania and Standard of New Jersey. New York Central was down 1-1-2 and Johns-Manville 1-3-4. U. S. Steel lost 3-4. After sagging for a time, American Telephone closed up a fraction. Eastman converted an early loss of 2 into a gain of nearly one. Atchafalaya, American Tobacco, B. Corn Products, International Harvester, and United Fruit gained a point or so.

Local transactions were a conspicuous strong point, reflecting further rumors of an early announcement of a consolidation agreement. Such an announcement is now expected next week. Interborough gained 3 points net, after selling up 5, and Brooklyn-Manhattan closed four higher.

The list was still under the influence of post-holiday apathy, for the leading European markets closed Christmas for the remainder of the week, and many active traders in this market were staying away from town until Monday.

A bright spot in the day's news was the estimate of next week's steel mill operations in the Youngstown area, indicating substantial resumption of activity in some plants. Operations will be stepped up to 37 per cent of capacity, from

JACK DEMPSEY IS DABBLING IN FIGHTS AGAIN

New York, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey has stepped back into the limelight of heavyweight boxing—but not as a fighter. The former champion, although criticizing the current crop of heavyweights because "the ones that ought to fight each other don't" again refused to say yes or no in reply to questions concerning a return to the ring when he came back to New York after a long absence.

Dempsey is concerned principally with two businesses now, promoting fights and acting as "guest referee." and his present visit has to do with the former task. Soon after his arrival, he was closeted with William F. Carey for a conference that was understood to concern a possible hook-up for a heavyweight battle at Miami but no announcement was forthcoming.

Looking heavier than ever and with a lot of excess flesh around his brows, Dempsey dodged the customary question as to whether he would fight again with "you never can tell."

He spoke vaguely on his experiences and profits as a "flying referee." His engagements are so numerous that he has to use airplanes to get from one to another. And they are so remunerative that he would have to give up 30 engagements and about \$100,000 in fees if he should agree to help the Madison Square Garden management promote a Miami bout in February. The business also has other advantages in addition to the customary stipend of \$2,500 or more.

"You never have to get sewed up afterward," Jack explained. "It's nice to stay in a ring without being punched around. Of course with it, too. You have to be taken there is a lot of bother connected around and be introduced everywhere and you stay up half the night being entertained. It's tough on me because you know I always liked to hit the hay early."

Dempsey had a few additions to make to the suggested program of a February bout between Jack Sharkey and Young Stribling to clear up the muddled heavyweight championship situation. He proposed adding Primo Carnera in a three-way elimination series, the winner to meet Max Schmeling for the title, and added that he would like to make a bid of his own to hold the series in Chicago.

WASHINGTON COACH SURE OF VICTORY

By PAUL ZIMMERMAN. Associated Press Sports Writer Pasadena, Cal., Dec. 27.—(AP)—Coach Orin "Babe" Hollingbery today burned every bridge of alibi behind himself and the Washington State team which meets Alabama in the New Year's Day classic here.

Not that the Cougars ever expected they would need to resort to explanations, for nothing except victory is contemplated. Their mentor has gone out of his way to destroy all possible avenue of retreat, should defeat come.

"I am not losing any sleep," he said this morning "over the physical or mental condition of my players. Their confidence has not been shaken by prevailing odds reported in favor of Alabama."

Weather conditions, he said, will make no difference. "My team is becoming thoroughly acclimated. This weather is the same we had to cope with when practice opened last fall."

Constant warming up of pass receivers and senders in previous sessions creates the belief Washington State may shower a barrage over the Crimson Tide January 1.

Coach Wallace Wade also contemplates a morning workout, in order to allow his team to take a peek at Notre Dame's stars of 1929 and 1930 in action at a charity game.

The Tide also worked on passes yesterday. Then the southern gentlemen snapped through a dummy scrimmage which caused their coach to feel that at last they had shaken off the effects of their cross country jaunt. He has been giving his kickers overtime duty both on punting and place kicking, with John "Hurricane" Cain holding the tip honors.

Alabama probably will not work out Sunday, but will put on the finishing touches Monday and Tuesday between sight seeing excursions.

While the ticket sale picked up sharply after Christmas, it is doubtful if the 85,000 seats for the game will be completely sold out.

SPORTS SLANTS

Southern California has run up a far scoring record, averaging something like 34 points per game for the last six years of play under the coaching of Howard Jones. For the same period, Dartmouth, Georgetown, Washington, Stanford, Colgate, New York University, Army, Tennessee and Lafayette, in that order, are the nearest to the Trojan record.

Notre Dame is not in the "first ten" when it comes to scoring, but the Ramblers are up around the head of the class in showing winning results. Tennessee has a brilliant record in this respect. In fact the Volunteers have lost only four games in the past six years and any college with a better record is invited to step up and post it.

The University of Utah, perennial champion of the Rocky Mountain Conference, has dropped only five decisions in six years. Over the same period, Notre Dame and Pittsburgh have lost eight each, Southern California nine, Alabama ten.

The Notre Dame record takes on additional lustre when scanned for an even dozen years. The Fighting Irish, Four Horsemen, Rough Riders and what-have-you played exactly 116 games under Rockne's direction since 1919. Of these they have won 102, lost 11, tied 3 for a winning percentage of .879.

Six of the Notre Dame defeats were clustered in two off-years, two in 1925 and four in 1928. In no other season since the war has any Irish brigade lost more than a single contest.

Nebraska has the distinction of being the only college to attach three defeats to the South Bend Cyclone within this 12-year period. Army and Carnegie each has beaten Notre Dame twice, Wisconsin, Georgia Tech, Iowa, Southern California once each.

The tie games were with Army, Penn State and Minnesota.

Despite the big scores the Rough Riders rolled up this year, the 1930

Notre Dame machine was not the highest-powered, measured by production of points, although it deserves this distinction because of its gallop through the toughest schedule Rockne ever arranged for his pupils.

The 1921 team, which lost only to Iowa in an 11-game schedule, piled up 375 points itself and yielded only 41 to the opposition. The next best record was made by the Four Horsemen, who scored 285 and allowed 54 points in their last year, 1924, after showing totals of 375 for and 37 against in 1923. Fourth on the list is the 1930 team, with 265 points scored and 74 yielded.

The biggest total against any single opponent was the 77-0 tally against Beloit in 1928, but the 60 points scored against Pennsylvania this year represents the high mark against major opposition.
