DEMOTE FOUR COLLEGES IN MISSISSIPPI

Major Institutions Dropped By College Association Because of Politics

Jackson, Miss., Dec. 30.—(AP)—Mississippi's four major state educational institutions had been placed today on ineligible lists by five associations because of "political domination" by Governor T. G. Bilbo.

Bilbo took the lead last summer at meetings of the State Board of Trustees in a re-framing of the administration fabric of the colleges and now has been made the target of college standardization organizations.

The governor laid the blame for the situation on "a few men and agencies that have tried to mislead the accrediting associations and cause our state institutions to lose their standing because in so doing they feel that the administration will be embarrassed and Bilbo will be hurt."

A resolution adopted yesterday by the American Association of College and University Professors in Cleveland declared four Mississippi colleges ineligible. The resolution charged 179 dismissals and demotions had been made in Mississippi colleges "apparently for political reasons, without due consideration to the welfare of the students affected, and so far as we are informed, with no notice to those dismissed or demoted."

The governor replied that "leaving out the clerks and other employees, there were only forty-five professors and instructors from all of the major educational institutions of the state removed from the service."

The schools dropped were University of Mississippi, Mississippi A. and M. College, Mississippi State College for Women and State Teachers College.

On the same day the Association of American Law Schools dismissed the law school of University of Mississippi from its membership because of the replacement of Judge Thomas C. Kimbrough as dean and a resolution was adopted commending the work of the ousted dean.

In both instances the action taken was effective without delay.

Under a similar ruling the Mississippi colleges were suspended several weeks ago by the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the Southern States in their meeting at Atlanta, effective September 1, 1931.

The Medical College at the University was placed on probation by the American Association of Medical Schools and the student chapters of the American Society of Civil Engineers were withdrawn.

In the educational-political disturbance two major college heads were affected. Chancellor Alfred Hume, of the University, was discharged. And, was succeeded by Bilbo's choice, J. N. Powers. President B. M. Walker left Mississippi A. and M. and Hugh Critz became president there.

Under the professors action at Cleveland, it was explained, members may not retain their association membership and teach at the "ineligible" institutions. Credits for students while not involved are jeopardized by the action of the Southern Association.

Students Jailed After Storming N. York Theatre

New York, Dec. 30.—(AP)—After a march up Broadway, 200 sophomore students of city college stormed the Rivoli theatre at 49th street early today and 47 of them landed in jail.

Climaxing the angry speaker, the collegians thronged into the lobby of the Rivoli and rushed the program. Into the auditorium they swarmed, battling among themselves and patrons for seats and throwing the audience into turmoil. Chemical bombs and ammonia were hurled.

Answering a riot call, police blocked the doorways and ordered the lights turned on. While most of the students fled at the first sign of intervention, enough were captured to fill two patrol wagons packed up to the main entrance.

Meanwhile, reports spread that a duplication of the Paramount theatre robbery had occurred and a great crowd gathered in front of the theatre. This was augmented by the departures of affronted patrons.

The prisoners were charged with disorderly conduct and rather than rouse their parents at such an untimely hour to raise bail, they remained in custody.

Boys Robs Woman Of Pocketbook Containing Approximately \$4,250

A bandit held up Mrs. G. H. Ballard at the corner of Washington and Thirteenth streets last Friday night about 9 o'clock and obtained a pocketbook containing \$4,250, according to information given out yesterday afternoon. Despite the woman's screams for help, the man made his escape and until today had evaded all efforts of police to bring about his apprehension.

The report of the hold-up was kept quiet over the week-end in the hope that the bandit would fall into a trap laid by members of the police department, but when this failed details were given due publicity.

Mrs. Ballard, head of a rental collection agency here, was walking in the direction of her home when the bandit was said to have seized her, pushed her over her mouth to prevent her from screaming, snatched the pocketbook and then fled down the street.

Mrs. Ballard, it was stated, screamed at the top of her voice as soon as she was released, but the man was out of sight before she was able to attract the attention of residents. She was unable to say whether the robber was white or colored, so suddenly did he appear and then vanish into the shadows of the night.

Sues For Divorce

VETS MAY GET LOANS DURING NEXT MONDAY

Administrator Hines Says \$20,000,000 Will Be Available in January

Washington, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Veterans Administrator Hines today estimated \$425,000,000 could be borrowed by veterans on their adjusted compensation certificates in 1931 and said the bureau was prepared to lend \$20,000,000 to 300,000 veterans in January.

If a prepared statement issued, he said, to clear up misunderstandings, Hines said the "availability of these funds will be helpful to veterans finding it necessary to make loans at this time."

Outstanding certificates, he added, total \$3,395,000 with an aggregate maturity value of \$420,000,000. Of these, 1,600,000 certificates will have a total value of \$725,000,000 on January 1, he reported, of which about \$300,000,000 has already been borrowed.

The certificates most of which were dated January 1, 1925, will be worth in cash 22-1/2 per cent of the maturity value on January 1, 1931 for loans, he said.

Estimating this averaged \$225 on each certificate he said the bureau has been lending at the rate of \$5,000,000 per month on the certificates.

AUTOMATIC PAYMENT OF BANK CREDITORS

Winston-Salem, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Judge John H. Connor of the 11th district, today signed an order in the matter of the State Corporation Commission against the Merchants Bank and Trust Company.

The order authorizes the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company, receiver for the Merchants Bank, to pay creditors, whose claims have been filed and deposited whose claims aggregate \$16,000, a dividend of approximately seven per cent.

Senate Must Complete Over Dozen Measures To Avoid Special Session

Eleven Appropriation Bills Included In Legislation To Be Acted Upon By The Legislators in the Scant Eight Weeks Remaining After the Holidays

Washington, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Administration leaders in the Senate faced today the problem of getting some fifteen pieces of legislation through the mill to prevent an extra session.

A scant eight weeks remain to Congress after it gets back to by mid next Monday, and if the dread bogey of an early meeting of the new Congress is to be laid, eleven appropriation bills must be passed.

Four or more other measures either are viewed as essential or have been advanced as the price of any co-operation, or even absence of resistance, from those senators who are not convinced an extra session would do harm.

The worry of the leadership lay, however, in the direction of speech. Senate talk must be shut off with ease. Senator Watson, the Republican leader put his group's problem thus:

"It is the consensus of most members of Congress and of the entire business world so far as is ascertainable that an extra session is to be avoided except in case of extreme emergency. This emergency will not exist I believe, if members will forego speeches on extraneous matters and confine debate to the problems confronting us."

For one, Senator Borah of Idaho, a leader of the Republican Independents did not agree with him.

"This talk about Congress disturbing business or that a session of Congress would be an unneeded evil is an effort to assign a patriotic excuse for going home or going to Europe," he said. I suggest they turn their salaries over to the hungry until they get back.

"There is plenty of legislation that ought to be had. We all know perfectly well there is important legislation, not to hurt business but to help business."

The word "calamity" has been applied to the prospect of an extra session by Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania. Democratic leaders in general have said they believe a session of the new Congress should not be forced by delays at the present time.

Before the Christmas recess the Senate passed virtually nothing but the emergency relief program. Not a single one of the supply bills got through although the House passed three. To complete the relief program the \$15,000,000 appropriation for the drought loans must be passed, but little trouble is expected there.

Salem Printer Takes Own Life

Winston-Salem, Dec. 30.—(AP)—On the two sides of an envelope, Clyde Shore, 26, printer, scribbled messages to his wife and mother, turned on the jets of the gas stove in his kitchen and died.

Mrs. Shore, returning home with her two children after spending the night with relatives, found all doors locked and summoned police. Shore, dead, was seated inside.

Mrs. Shore could ascribe no motive for his act.

ROTES TOLD ABOUT CHILD LIFE IN INDIA

Albert Osborne Principal Speaker At Regular Meeting of Club Here

Albert B. Osborne, former boys' work secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at Hamlet, N. C., addressed members of the Greenville Rotary Club assembled in regular weekly session at the Rotary home last night. He spoke on the subject "Village Life in India," and brought out many interesting facts in this connection.

Mr. Osborne, who spent many years in India, recently located in Greenville. He is the executive of the Tidewater Council of Friendly Indians and will organize several tribes of that organization in this community.

J. H. Waldrop presided over the session and the usual supper was enjoyed. J. H. Ross, superintendent of city schools, was in charge of the program and introduced the speaker.

Mr. Osborne discussed particularly the child life of India and told numbers of stories giving his hearers an intimate glimpse of conditions as they actually exist.

Referring to the marriage laws of the country, he pointed out that girls were sold as brides while in infancy, and that it was a custom for a man to sell off all his daughters before he died.

He said a man came to him in an effort to sell the 13-months-old child of a man who was dying. He asserted instances of this kind were very common in this land where civilization had advanced very slowly despite the progress in other fields.

ASK JONAS TO HELP CLEAN UP 9TH DISTRICT

Republican Asked to Aid in Clearing Up Alleged Election Irregularities

Charlotte, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Congressman Charles A. Jonas, Republican, defeated in November by A. L. Bulwinkle, Democrat, has been asked by a member of the Senate campaigns funds investigating committee to aid in clearing up alleged election irregularities in his district, the ninth, he told the Charlotte News today.

"A member of his committee headed by Senator Nye," the representative was quoted as having said, "went so far as to tell me that in this opinion the voting and election conditions in North Carolina had these of Pennsylvania 'sided aside'."

Mr. Jonas' statement, the News said, comes in the wake of letters received here from Senator Nye inquiring into the voting of absentee ballots in Mecklenburg county last November.

Asked if the developments "mean a contest," Mr. Jonas said:

"I am not entertaining any thoughts of a contest, but I do feel that citizens of this district would not stand by and see a Congressman take a seat if investigations revealed he had gained that seat with the assistance of election frauds."

"So far as I know the November election in Lincoln and Mecklenburg counties was fair. At least I have no concrete information to the contrary."

The Congressman added, however, that the elections were "informal."

"Both parties in this state should get together and help to clean up our deplorable election conditions. I for one am going to lend every possible assistance in spite of the fact that a defeated candidate is always accused of 'squealing' if he takes part in such activities."

"The Democrats of North Carolina can carry the state without resorting to such practices as they have. They could have carried it in November without doing the things they did. However, if they don't call a halt, quit their unfair play and follow the election laws the thing is going to turn against them sooner or later and it will be possible to carry the state against them."

Mr. Jonas cited several cases where he said absentee ballots were counted in open violation of the law.

The representative is leaving his home at Lincolnton today for Macon, Ga., where he will sit as a member of a sub-committee of the House Judiciary committee to hear evidence against Federal Judge Bascom Deaver, charged with "arbitrary and dictatorial conduct on the bench."

Three Drowned As Car Plunges Into Deep Water in S. C.

Charleston, S. C., Dec. 30.—(AP)—Three persons, and perhaps four, all believed to have been residents of Jacksonville, Fla., were drowned today when their automobile left the coastal highway 13 miles north of Charleston and plunged into deep water.

By means of articles in a suit case the dead were identified tentatively as Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Johnson, of 425 Florida Ave., Jacksonville, Fla., and a boy named Allen, apparently about 12 years old. Finding of infant's wearing apparel in the automobile led to the belief there may have been a baby in the car. Its body had not been found at noon, however.

The bodies are being held at Charleston pending receipt of advices from Jacksonville.

Will Seek to Move King Murder Case to Another County

York, S. C., Dec. 30.—(AP)—Thomas F. McDow, chief of counsel for Rafe F. King, convicted and sentenced to die for wife murder, indicated today the former Shelby, man will not face his second trial at Chester this month, as had been expected.

When the case is called Monday morning in Chester Court of General Sessions, McDow said he would ask that it be removed to another county, probably York, where it originated. He said he would serve formal notice to that effect this afternoon.

In case the request for change of venue is not granted, McDow said he had an agreement with Solicitor Harry Hines that the case would not be called in Chester this month.

JOFFRE STILL CLINGS TO LIFE

French General Making Brave Fight Against the Grim Reaper

Paris, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Marshal Joffre still lived today. While medical science looked on amazed, his stout heart beat on, although faintly, and postponed the eventual victory of death.

At 8:15 A. M., physicians attending the aged soldier at the Saint Jean De Dieu Hospital issued a bulletin which said:

"The patient spent a calm night and did not again sink into coma. He was able to take some nourishment and to say a few words. Nevertheless his lungs are filling up and respiration remains irregular. The situation continues very grave."

Late yesterday the Marshal lapsed into coma and his physicians believed that what before had been a matter of hours had become a matter of minutes.

Shortly before midnight they noticed a tinge of pink suffuse his waxy features. His labored breathing became more regular and his white head turned on his pillow.

The physicians, Leriche, Boulin and Fontaine, and his brother, Ferdinand, bent over him. "How do you feel, Marshal?" asked Dr. Leriche. Faintly came the answer, "not so bad."

With infinite precaution they supported him and managed to administer the nourishment which for hours they had not dared to attempt. He fell back into a daze and Drs. Leriche and Boulin left to get some rest. Dr. Fontaine and M. Ferdinand remained at his bedside.

Men and Women High In Life of Nation Express a Desire for the Return of Prosperity to Various Forms of Industry Throughout Country

High hopes greet 1931. The wish for prosperity takes precedent among leaders of American thought and activity and the aspirations of specialists dovetail into the program.

The question: What is your greatest hope for 1931?

The answers: Newton D. Baker, former secretary of war—That we Americans may be able to find some way to adjust ourselves to the industrial civilization of which we are a part, which would prevent the tragedy of recurring depressions.

Captain Frank Hawks, speed flier—I'd like to see all air transport and mail schedules speeded up to at least 150 miles an hour cruising speed.

Will H. Hayes, president of the motion picture producers and distributors—that the motion picture screen in 1931, through its mission entertainment and education to the millions, may speed renewed confidence in the great future of our country and the prosperity which must reward genuine achievement.

Gene Turney, retired heavyweight champion—That solutions will be found for the economic and political problems confronting the world from the shores of the Adriatic through the Balkins to Germany, France and England; and that the Supreme Court will act wisely on the decision of Federal Judge Clark in New Jersey. Immediate removal of the eighteenth amendment, I believe, would bring about an immediate revival of trade.

Jane Adams of Hull House, Chicago—Two projects I hope will materialize in 1931: In the realm of international affairs I hope the year will bring a more successful disarmament conference than has yet been held; and I hope the present depression will result in a satisfactory system of unemployment insurance.

H. L. Menckner, editor and critic—That it will see a definite break in the politico-ecclesiastical tyranny that has oppressed and disgraced the United States since the war, and that the American people will demand once more the strict observance of the bill of rights.

Ben B. Lindsey, former Denver juvenile court judge—I hope for the success of the campaign to abolish the divorce courts and substitute them for a commission of experts, two from the medical and one from the legal profession, to hear all domestic disorders and after an effort of reconciliation has failed, to grant an honest divorce by mutual consent.

George Palmer Putnam, publisher—That the public will buy and read more books and that the publishers will produce fewer and better books.

Dr. S. Parks Cadman, preacher—My hope for the world is not found upon unaided humanity. Man occupies a friendly universe. Hence the stream of tendency runs toward intellectual enlightenment. So far as man is concerned the unseen forces of the cosmos, dismiss the ape and predict the angel.

Huey P. Long, Senator-elect from Louisiana—That a way may be found to Main street here. I believe, we will have a ready solution for economic depression.

Dr. Julius Klein, assistant secretary of commerce—That American business men will continue their (Continued on page 3)

Gigantic Consolidation Of Eastern Railroads Is Announced By President

Scheme Provides for the Operation of Four Independent Systems As Result of Proposal By President Hoover; Believe Will Aid Unemployment

Washington, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Agreement of eastern railroads on a consolidation into four independent systems was announced today by President Hoover.

The President has asked the railroad chiefs to map out the consolidation.

Only one minor point remains to be worked out in the gigantic consolidation scheme. That has been left to arbitration.

The railroads are the Pennsylvania, New York Central, Baltimore and Ohio, and the Nickel Plate systems.

The Washash-Seaboard system, provided for under the Interstate Commerce Commission's plan issued last December, would be abandoned.

President Hoover understands the plan provides for the protection of employees and of local communities and fulfills the intent of Congress as expressed in the transportation act of 1920.

The consolidation program must be submitted to the Interstate Commerce Commission for approval.

The President said he believed the plan will contribute to opportunities for employment in the present depression and also increase the stability of the railroads themselves.

He also expressed the belief that eventually the consolidation would result in lower rates to the public.

The Interstate Commerce Commission a year ago laid out a plan looking to the development of five great trunk lines but objections to the fifth trunk line caused disagreement among railroad leaders.

The new plan provides for the Virginia Railway from the South and the New York Central from the north, as boundary roads in the movement.

The Interstate Commerce Commission, the President said, has no power to force consolidations but under the transportation act of 1920 has the power to approve such a move.

Several Tribes of "Friendly Indian" To Be Formed Here

A number of tribes of Friendly Indians will be organized in Greenville and Pitt County, beginning the first of the year, by Albert B. Osborne, former boy's secretary of the Y. M. C. A., at Hamlet, N. C.

The Friendly Indian, Christian citizenship program, built around Indian lore, is designed to meet the need for an adequate program for boys and girls between the age of nine and fourteen years. The boys and girls take Indian names and attend one council meeting a week, sitting in a circle Indian fashion. Indian head-band, membership and score-card is given to each member. As the evidence of approval of their four-fold development based on Luke 2:52, "And Jesus grew in wisdom (mental), and in stature (physical), and in favor with God (religious) and man (social), they are awarded different feathers, badges and decorations.

Badges are awarded for the following: School work, reading, handicraft, health habits, games, physical tests, Sunday School and church attendance, Bible tests, daily prayer, faithful in home work, tribal prayer, helping others, nature study, thrift.

This organization is one of the four Christian citizenship programs sponsored by the National Council of the Young Men's Christian Association and is rapidly spreading throughout the South.

Mr. Osborne, who will be the executive of the Tidewater Council of Friendly Indians, and will locate in Greenville, has just completed a most successful year in Hamlet. Four hundred and ninety boys and girls joined the organization, formed a foundation for juvenile work that has been the most constructive in the history of the Association. The Y. M. C. A. and the town of Hamlet were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Osborne in behalf of the boys and girls. He has given his time unstintingly since the first of the year, states Mr. J. H. Bowen, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. and secretary of the Kiwanis Club of Hamlet, N. C.

Mr. Osborne is a Methodist and was superintendent of senior and intermediate department of the Methodist Sunday School at Hamlet.

Coach 'Soup' Porter Given Leave Absence By High School Here

Having been granted leave of absence for the remainder of the school term, C. W. "Soup" Porter left this afternoon for Springfield, Mass., where he will study for his Master's Degree at the International Y. M. C. A. College.

During his absence his position as athletic director of the high school will be filled by Billy Brown, son of the late Dr. Zeno Brown, and a graduate of the University of North Carolina. Mr. Brown starred both in basketball and baseball during his four years at the University, and was also rated high in other fields of activity. In addition to his duties as coach, Mr. Porter was also instructor in the department of history.

College Students On Moral Par With Rest of the Nation

Washinton, Dec. 30.—(AP)—College students apparently are no better and no worse than the country's population at large.

A study of moral conditions in the 69 land grant universities and colleges, included in a survey of the institutions by the Federal office of education, has led it to that conclusion.

Considerable space in the recently completed 1,800 page, two-volume report was given to problems of handling fraternities and sororities and students' conduct at social affairs, showing that the heads of a good many institutions experienced trouble with student drinking and behavior at dances.

Drinking was listed as one of the chief trouble makers at 26 of the institutions. Six colleges reported trouble from extreme types of dancing. Eleven reported a great deal of trouble because of attendance at cafes and roadhouses after dances, and some declared "withdrawal from halls to cars and rides after dances, the stag line and attendance at public dances" brought complaints.

"Action of alumni and guests from other colleges and high schools was given fairly frequently as a problem, causing concern to college officials," said the report.

"Discourtesy to chaperons seemed to be a fairly common complaint. The report on the requirement of chaperons at dances makes a brave showing and probably there is some useful purpose served by having older people at student functions. However, when one remembers the ease with which couples leave the dance hall, the handiness of the automobile and its powers of quick transportation and seclusion, one cannot but wonder whether the chaperone is a figure-head."

The survey, begun in 1927 with a Congressional appropriation of \$117,000, was designed partly to pool information among the institutions. It covers fees charged, courses offered and use made by graduates of their training and also gives considerable space to faculty and athletic questions.

The Land Grant Colleges have an enrollment of 100,000 men and 50,000 women, or 16 percent of the college population.

Raleigh, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The State's judiciary processes come under expert eyes today.

Former Judge N. A. Townsend was to speak on his recent work as executive counsel to the governor. Various committee reports were to be heard.

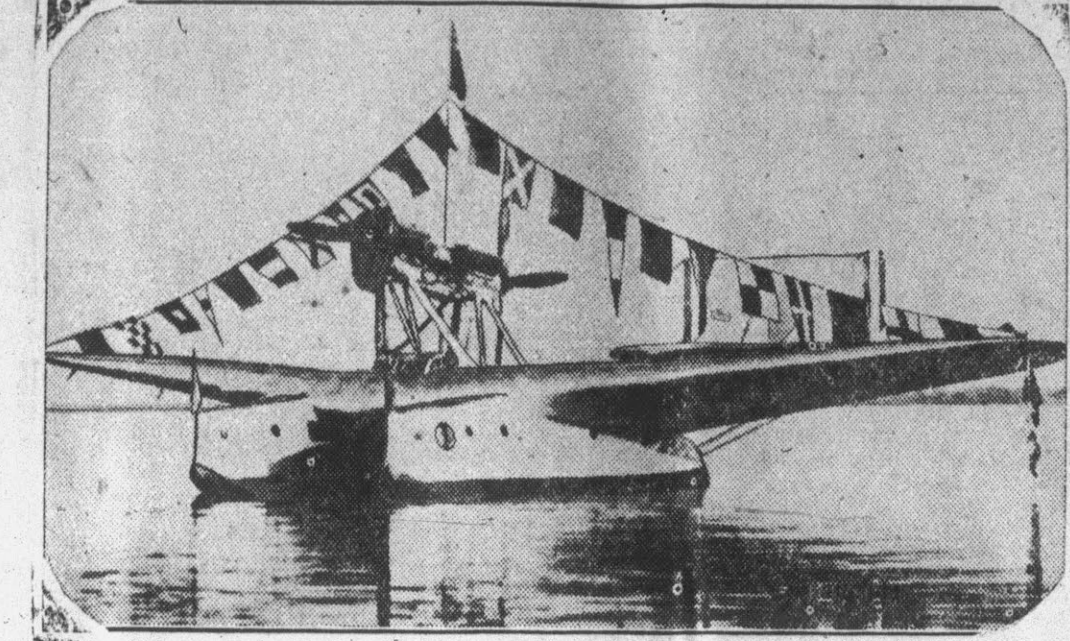

COTTON MARKET

New York, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 1 to 4 points in response to easier Liverpool cables and moderate offerings which appeared to come partly from the south.

New January sold off to 9.75 and May to 10.25 under the initial pressure, but spot houses were buyers of near months while there was a scattering demand for later deliveries attributed largely to covering and prices steadied after initial offerings had been absorbed. At the end of the first-half hour new January was selling around 9.77 and May 10.28, active months generally being within a point or two either way of yesterday's closing quotations.

Liverpool cables said that some continental buying there had been supplied by hedging and Bombay selling. According to the New York Cotton Exchange Service, world's consumption of American lint cotton for November was about 942,000 bales, making 3,646,000 consumed for the first four months of this season, compared with 4,219,000 for the same period last season.

GRAIN MARKET

STOCK MARKET

New York, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The stock market received a vigorous boost today, after threatening ever since Christmas to end the year at its worst.

This lift came in the announcement that the Eastern Trunkline Railway heads had finally agreed upon a consolidation plan, while it had been rumored for a fortnight that an agreement, urged by Washington, was near. Wall street had been skeptical after a decade of futile negotiations.

The carrier shares made one of the most vigorous advances of recent years, a long list of shares advancing about 2 to 8 points. The market had shown a firm tone through most of the morning, but the list received a decided fill-up from the announcement from Washington at mid-day.

Industrials and utilities joined the advance. Such issues as U. S. Steel, American Telephone, Union Carbide and Westinghouse Electric gained 2 to 3, while American Can and Allied Chemical mounted more than 5.

It was notable that the rail shares as a group moved forward the consolidation plan providing the necessary impetus for a general upturn, including stocks of carriers not directly affected. Wall street has felt, however, that solution of the eastern trunkline problem would lead to realignments throughout the country. Although railway earnings this year have declined precipitously not operating revenue for class 1 carriers showing an aggregate drop of more than 25 per

WELCH WINS BROWN DERBY FOR NEW YEAR

New York, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Gus Welch of the University of Virginia, Carlisle-quarterback of the days of "Pop" Warner and Jim Thorpe, was enroute back to Richmond today with the famous "Brown Derby."

Gus won the derby in honest verbal combat with the other wits of the American football coaches at their annual banquet which ended in the early morning hours with the competitive story-telling for the honor of the Iron Hat.

The winning story was this: Carlisle was playing Cornell and it was a tough game. Thorpe scored a touchdown against the red team and the Indians went to defensive play. There was one big guard, 220 pounds, who was laying down on the job. All Gus's urging couldn't get him into wake up and stop the Cornell plays. Finally it was Cornell's ball on Carlisle's ten yard line, goal to go.

"I was thinkin' hard," Gus said, "wavin' an unlighted cigar, 'and I had an idea. I was playin' safety but I called Jim back and went up to the line. Then I went over to the referee and I told him 'if you see me slug somebody it won't be a Cornell man, it will be one of these Indians.'"

"The play came through this big guard. I ran up and there was a big pileup with this guard at the bottom and his face showing on one side. I reached down and with my hand flat-like this—I slapped him."

"The pile heaved and up he came a nice rosy mark on his cheek. He rushed over and said to the referee: 'Did you see that, Cornell slugged me.'"

"The referee laughed and said 'That's all right, I'll get them the next time.'"

"On the next play this big bird went through and nailed them for a three yard loss. On the next play he got a Cornell back for the two yard loss. On the next play he nailed him three yards behind the line."

He and Thorpe worked on this guard for three years with those tactics, Gus said, and won a lot of games. In a game with Pennsylvania, Thorpe even bit the guard in the side to make him play.

"After a game with Brown and we were both quitting," Gus continued, "I was talking to this end and I told him what we had done. He looked at me for a minute and then said:

"'Why I've said a lot of mean things to these referees. I must write them all a letter and apologize.'"

"Here's the brown derby," said Major Frank Cavanaugh, who was presiding.

As the principal speaker of the annual banquet last night, James J. Davis, United States Senator from Pennsylvania, urged the coaches to avoid the dangers of over-commercialism in which football has been subjected. He suggested specifically that coaches refrain from directing their men to cheat on the benches, letting the captain take charge of the play.

Dr. McGowan of Vanderbilt, chairman of the banquet, sounded a warning against subsidizing and recruiting, chief topic of the Carnegie report of 1929.

Charlotte, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The fashionable thing in 1931 North Carolina football captains is the halfback.

Nine of the state's eleven major teams—the "Big Five" and the "Little Six"—have chosen new leaders. Four selected wing backs. Four liked more to the scrimmage line. One, Duke, picked her fullback.

North Carolina as yet has elected no one to don Standwick Nash's shoes. Davidson, too, has not assigned next year's leadership. It is authoritatively reported the Wild cats may adopt the system of naming helmets to serve on one game.

The list of next year's captains shows the nine elected hail from five states. Five are far heels, while New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Mississippi are also represented.

Only one eleven—North Carolina State—went below the rising senior class for captaincy material. The fullback honored Charles Cobb sophomore tackle.

The 1931 commanders, their position and home town follow: Duke—Pierce O. Brewer, fullback, Winston-Salem.

Wake Forest—Leon Brogden, end, Kinston.

High Point—Harry Johnson, fullback, Uniontown, Pa.

Lenoir-Rhyne—Rufus Rhyne, guard, near Gastonia.

Appalachian—Rescoe Harris, halfback, Thomasville.

Gulford—John Love, end, Armstrong.

Tomorrow the first sessions of the National Collegiate Athletic Association will be held. The association is concerned largely with the administrative end of an intercollegiate athletic but football generally monopolizes the attention of its members.

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BOBBY JONES FEATURED IN GOLF IN 1930

New York, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Golf in 1930 can be summarized in three words: Robert Tyre Jones.

When the major competitions of the year were over, this supreme golfer had won the four outstanding national competitions, a record that has never before been approached in the history of the game. The announcement of his withdrawal from further competition was not a great surprise to those who have watched his progress through the years. Like Alexander, he had no more words to conquer.

The retirement, though, of this supreme master leaves golf in 1931 in a most interesting condition and we look forward to the competitive season with keen interest. The removal of the one man who might be called the dominating figure in the game means that all the other competitors are going to outdo themselves in the coming year.

The first of the major events in 1931 will be the British amateur championship, to be held at Westward Ho beginning May 18. There will probably be but few entries from this country. This will be followed by the British open championship to be held at Carnoustie, Scotland, early in June.

In the latter part of June, the Ryder cup matches will be played at the Scioto Country club, Columbus, O., by teams of professional golfers representing the United States and Great Britain.

In July the United States open championship will be played over the course of the Inverness club at Toledo, O. This event will be preceded in June by sectional qualifying rounds for the contestants in this championship and we expect to have about 1,400 entries this year.

In September the National amateur championship will be played at the Beverly Country club, Chicago. With Jones absent, this will be a keen competition and will certainly bring out all of the amateur stars of this country.

Then comes the National Women's championship, to be held at the Buffalo Country club, where Glenna Collett will have an opportunity to exceed her world's record for this competition.

It is impossible to list all the high-grade competitions throughout the year such as the P. G. A. championship, the National Public Links and the various state, sectional and district competitions. In 1930 many of these competitions suffered from bad weather conditions and the severe drought, with these conditions absent in 1931, all the tournaments should be better.

HACK WILSON SHOWS GOOD IN AVERAGES

New York, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Hack Wilson of the Chicago Cubs, leading slugger of the National League last season, gets attention in the official percentages and other miscellaneous records of the National League year, issued today.

Wilson, going to bat 585 times, his for 423 bases and completed a slugging average of .723. His nearest rivals were Chuck Klein of Philadelphia and Babe Herman of Brooklyn, who had slugging marks of .697 respectively.

Wilson batted in 193 runs to eclipse the former league record of 159 he set the year before. He drew 105 bases on balls and struck out 84 times to top the league in both respects.

Another league record fell when 17 players had 100 or more runs batted in. The old mark was 16. Wilson accomplished the feat for the fifth successive year while Sunny Jim Bottomley of St. Louis, after going it for six years straight, fell three short of the 100 mark.

In the club marks, Chicago made the best slugging percentage, .481, and had the most bases on balls, 588, and the most strikeouts, 635. St. Louis batted in 942 runs to establish another new league record. The former mark of 933 was made by the Cubs the year before.

The St. Louis Cardinals led in this respect by winning 5 contests and losing only 24 at Sportsman's Park.

Syn participated in the greatest number of shutouts games during the year, 22, and got 13 of them to top that list as well. Cincinnati was held scoreless ten times.

Johnson was third high scorer for State and Clark's floorwork was one of the bright spots of the game. Sam Gurnea, big Indian, McLeod and Longhead, all new men in varsity ranks, had a chance in the opening contest.
