COMB HILLS FOR SLAYERS OF MARINES

Detachment of Soldiers Search for Bandits Who Ambushed Eight Marines

Managua, Nicaragua, Jan. 2.—(AP)—United States Marine detachments combed the hills near Achuara, northern Nicaragua, today seeking the band of insurgents who Wednesday killed eight of a patrol of ten Marines in an ambush between Ocoel and Apahil. The bodies were mutilated.

The patrol was repairing a newly erected telephone line. The Nicaraguans who were believed to be commanded by Miguel Ortiz, a lieutenant of General Agustine Sandino. Two remaining members of the patrol were seriously injured.

An account of the ambush given by United States Marine headquarters here today said that at 10:30 A. M. Wednesday a Marine patrol which was repairing a telephone line was suddenly fired upon from all sides, and that one Marine working at the top of a pole was killed in the first volley.

The others immediately put up a defense, which lasted for two and one-half hours. Sergeant Arthur M. Palmer, of Port Lyons, Colo., commanding the patrol, ordered Private Mack Hutcherson to attempt to reach Ocoel and bring help, but in trying to get through the ring of attackers he was wounded and incapacitated.

The insurgent fire was frequent but accurate, the Marines being gradually picked off. Private Jackson was the last man standing; he was wounded and crawled into a nearby field to hide from the Nicaraguans. The eight dead when found later were badly mutilated apparently by machetes.

A Nicaraguan farmer living near heard the firing and rode to Ocoel and gave the alarm at about noon. Joseph J. Tavern with 25 men immediately rushed to the scene. He found only the "Killed" and the wounded who were moved immediately to Ocoel and from there, by airplane Thursday, to Managua.

Retaliatory measures were immediately put into effect. The Marine aviation squadron was unusually active all New Year's Day, bombing patrols making extended but unsuccessful efforts to locate the insurgents who are believed to have fled over the frontier into Honduras.

Another detachment of 50 Marines, dispatched from Ocoel Wednesday afternoon, engaged in a search of the area around Achuara for the insurgents.

The ambush represents one of the most serious encounters in which the force of United States Marines in Nicaragua has been engaged.

Nine Persons Die In Grade Crossing Accident in Illinois

Chicago, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Nine of ten persons out for a New Year's day automobile ride were killed in a grade crossing tragedy in suburban Harvey last night. Their car was struck by the International Limited, fast east-bound Grand Trunk passenger train, and was carried for more than 200 feet down the right-of-way.

A three months old baby girl, Lorraine Margaret Olson, was the only survivor. She was found by rescuers in a snow-filled ditch, crying but without a scratch on her body. Investigators expressed belief she had been tossed out of the automobile by her mother before the locomotive struck.

Lorraine's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Olson of Elmhurst, Ill., and their children, Calvin, 6; Muriel, 5, and Wilborg, 4, were killed.

The other victims were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Nowak of Chicago and their children Lorraine, 5, and Adam, 8.

The engineer said he did not see the automobile approach. It landed upside down in a ditch. The theory was advanced that Olson, believed to have been driving, did not see the train because of the crowded condition of his small car.

The accident caused an hour's delay in the train's journey to Montreal.

YOUTH FREED BY KIDNAPPER AT ST. LOUIS

Details of Release of Adolphus Busch By Armed Negro Remained Undivulged

St. Louis, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Charles Y. Abernathy, 28-year-old, negro, and son of Pearl Abernathy, negro real estate dealer here, was the kidnapper of Adolphus Busch Orthwein, 13-year-old grandson of August A. Busch, president of Anheuser-Busch, Inc., Harry Troll, attorney for the family, disclosed today.

St. Louis, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Details of how the release of 13-year-old Adolphus Busch Orthwein was effected late yesterday, 20 hours after he had been kidnapped by young armed negro, remained undivulged today.

The boy, grandson of August A. Busch, president of Anheuser-Busch, Inc., and a great-grandson of Adolphus Busch, late multimillionaire brewer, was found on a road in St. Louis county after the Orthwein family had received a telephone call saying he was safe.

Harry Troll, attorney for the boy's father, Percy J. Orthwein, executive of an advertising agency, said "Not a cent changed hands," but added the Busch family would stand by an agreement made by Orthwein shortly after the abduction to reward generously any informant who furnished information leading to the return of Adolphus, "and that absolutely no questions would be asked."

The transaction to get back the child, Troll said, "came through a connection made 30 years ago," but he refused to say what the connection was.

"At about noon New Year's day Mr. Orthwein received a telephone call from a man who told him the child was safe," Troll, who acted as spokesman for the family, stated. "Mr. Orthwein, and I left the Orthwein house in an automobile and then picked up a negro man and a woman, whom I shall not identify further, and went to the office of Sheriff Lill. At 2 o'clock Orthwein left and an hour later picked up young Adolphus on a country road. He was not harmed in any way."

Adolphus was kidnapped on New Year's Eve from the edge of his father's estate in exclusive Huntleigh Village, St. Louis county. The negro stopped the Orthwein sedan, robbed Roy Yowell, chauffeur, of \$5, and then drove away in the car with the boy.

Troll said it was his opinion and the opinion of members of the family that kidnapping was not the motive, and that the abduction was "incidental to the holdup."

DAVID D. LONG SUCCUMBS TO HEART ATTACK

Funeral to Be Held From Home of His Daughter Saturday Afternoon at 5 P. M.

David D. Long died suddenly last night about two o'clock at the home of his daughter, Mrs. K. W. Cobb, of Pitt street. Death followed a severe attack of the heart and came as a profound shock to the entire community. Mr. Long was 78 years of age.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home of his daughter tomorrow afternoon at 5 o'clock. Rev. E. L. Hillman, pastor of Jarvis Memorial Methodist church, will officiate. Burial will be made in Greenwood cemetery.

Mr. Long, a native of Whiteville, Ark., spent the major part of his life in Arkansas. The last several years he had divided his time among his daughters. He had been in Greenville about a year, and made numerous friends who were profoundly shocked this morning to learn of his sudden demise.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. E. R. Fessler, Detroit; Mrs. Louise Lauken, New York; Mrs. K. W. Cobb, Greenville.

Over 6,000 Guests Visit White House

Washington, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Machine-like, they counted the guests at the White House yesterday and determined that the number of persons who shook hands with the President and Mrs. Hoover was exactly 6,429.

But there was nothing mechanical about the reception itself, nor the smilingly uttered: "Happy New Year!" which accompanied each of the 12,858 handshakes. In fact the day gave the Hoover family one more opportunity to add their own ideas to the store of tradition built up around the White House functions.

For one thing the thousands were not kept in line to do a quick step out of the president's mansion as soon as they had received their handshake. All were allowed to stay as long as they wished in the great east room, occupying chairs and sofas or standing about to gaze at the portraits of long-since gone presidents and first ladies.

The line halted frequently while Mrs. Hoover chatted with those who brought children. In every way the occasion was made as personal as possible.

GIRL'S DEATH BAFFLES COPS AT CAPITAL

Police Attempt to Determine Who Killed Pretty Beulah Limerick

Washington, Jan. 2.—Why pretty Beulah Limerick was shot to death and by whom, still baffled Washington police today, two days after an undertaker accidentally discovered a hidden bullet hole at the back of her head.

The authorities had turned loose a score of persons questioned since the girl was found dead Wednesday, but they held her brother, Vernon Limerick, Richard Reed, who lived at their house, and Edward Paddy, who had been her escort at a dance Tuesday night.

A "jealous suitor" perhaps killed her, police thought, and they scanned the long list of her intimate friends for clues. They studied too a diary the 19-year-old girl had kept. It contained, they said, many frank references to a number of her boy friends.

The story of the three men, as police told it, was that Paddy brought the girl home from the dance about 11:30 Wednesday morning. Vernon Limerick came down from his third floor room and talked with them awhile. Reed was asleep then but rose about quarter to five, went down as was his custom to light a fire in Beulah's room.

She lay on her side. The covers over her head, he said, and he did not disturb her. Soon he left for his work at a filling station.

Vernon took up the story. His alarm clock went off at 8:30. He called to his sister and receiving no answer went down to her room. She was flat on her back, the covers drawn back to her waist. He could not see her, went to his mother's apartment some distance off at 10.

About 10 o'clock he called a hospital. An intern came and pronounced her dead from hemorrhage. A routine death certificate was issued. Late that evening the undertaker discovered the bullet hole. Police found four revolvers in the home or premises frequented by the Limericks but none would fit the bullet found in her head.

State Legislature Will Begin Grind In Next Five Days

Raleigh, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Less than a week from today—five days, to be exact—the Legislature mill of North Carolina will begin its grinding for the year of 1931.

On January 7, the State's Legislature will assemble here for their biennial meeting. The session bids fair to be as important and eventful as any held in recent years.

Proposals for sweeping governmental and administrative reform, some sponsored by Gov. O. Max Gardner and others embodied in the report of various commissions and other agencies will confront the General Assembly.

Economy and tax relief stand out as two big potential issues for consideration.

The governor, approving creation of a central purchasing agency; adoption of a modified "short ballot" plan; centralizing and co-ordinating of the control of the state's three main institutions of higher learning, and perhaps other important changes, are carefully preparing his message to the Legislature.

Standing out among the reports to come before the General Assembly is that of the Brookings Institute suggesting drastic governmental changes. Recommendations for changes in the administration of county and township highway funds, made in a joint report of the highway commission, the tax commission, the tax commission and the U. S. Bureau of public roads, also are in the offing.

Among other reports to come up are those of the tax commission, the educational commission, the prison commission, the different state departments and other agencies.

TO ENFORCE LICENSE TAG LAW MONDAY

Raleigh, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Officers throughout North Carolina will be instructed to enforce the license provisions of the state against motorists starting Monday.

The law does not permit any extension of time, Mr. Silver said, and every police officer in the state will be asked to co-operate in enforcing the purchase of new tags by Monday.

The Motor Vehicle Bureau received notice today from a North Carolina motorist that he had been stopped in South Carolina and arrested because he did not have 1931 license plates.

AMY JOHNSON OFF ON FLIGHT TO PEIPING

British Airwoman Begins Hazardous Trip Across Snow-Covered Mountains

London, Jan. 2.—(AP)—General astonishment has been aroused in Great Britain by departure of Miss Amy Johnson, 23-year-old aviatrix, on a long lone flight across snow-covered Northern Eurasia to Peiping, China.

Leaving Hendon airfield yesterday afternoon, she stopped at Lympie, momentarily and proceeded to Liege, Belgium, for the night. She expects to continue to Berlin, then to Moscow, where equipping her plane with skis she will fly across barren Siberia and Mongolia to Peiping.

In addition to general fear for her safety in view of the extreme hazards of such a journey her friends were represented today as feeling considerable anxiety on account of her health.

The Daily Express said she was in ill health and had become a neptic from the strain of her flight to Australia. The paper quoted an airman friend, George Campkin, as saying that she had never recovered from the Australian ordeal, and is overwrought, irritable, depressed and restless, and does not realize what a winter flight over the sub-Arctic snowfields involves.

Part of the flight were the basis of conflicting reports in some of the London newspapers. Wednesday Miss Johnson was charged in a London Police court with having left an automobile unattended in the street but she obtained a dismissal of the charges by revealing a mysterious employment in government service.

While the Daily Mail said that Amy's parents had been kept in ignorance of her intentions, it made the flight, the Daily Express quoted the mother as saying: "We approve the flight because we must. After what she has gone through this adventure will be a relief and soothing influence for her. She has shown restlessness at home for months."

Sister-in-Law of Otto Wood Asked to Return Home

High Point, Jan. 2.—(AP)—"O. H. Wood killed. Come home. We want you."

In these terse sentences, Mrs. Cella Byrd Wood learned that Otto Wood, her brother-in-law, was dead and read an appeal from her aged parents that she cease her wandering and return to her home in High Point.

Otto, convicted murderer, prison-breaker and outlaw, was believed to have spent most of the last six months of his life with Mrs. Wood, widow of his brother, Robert.

Doubtless receiving reports of Wood's last desperate stand at Salisbury where a bullet of the law ended his hectic career Tuesday, Mrs. Wood wired Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Byrd, her father and mother, in High Point. Sent yesterday from Elliston Springs, Va., her message read:

"Wire collect if O. H. Wood killed."

Mr. and Mrs. Byrd replied quickly. Pansy, 11-year-old daughter of Mrs. Wood, ill at the home of her grand-parents, joined in the plea of the elderly couple that her mother return to them. A younger daughter, Lucille, 6, is supposed to be with her mother.

Mrs. Wood left High Point the day before Otto on July 12 made his fourth break from state prison in Raleigh. She is believed to have aided in the escape and to have remained most of the time since then with Wood.

Relatives reported that she and Otto came to High Point in September and "kidnapped" Lucille from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Byrd. Pansy said she refused to go with her mother and the outlaw.

Since that time rumors and reports have it that Mrs. Wood and Otto have been in Oklahoma, New Mexico, Texas, California and Virginia.

SALISBURY POLICEMAN TO GET MEDALS FOR KILLING OTTO WOOD

Salisbury, Jan. 2.—(AP)—For killing Otto Wood, North Carolina's most wanted desperado, two Salisbury police officers are to be given gold medals to wear on their chests.

In recognition of "courageous and efficient service" in shooting the outlaw to death, the city council today voted medals to Police Chief R. L. Rankin and Assistant Chief J. W. Kesler.

Rankin and Kesler shot Wood to death Wednesday in a gun battle in Salisbury's business district.

Negro Fined for Playing Golf In Georgia Cemetery

Macon, Ga., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Diminutive golf is perhaps not as ubiquitous now as it once was, but George Anderson, Jr., negro, was brought before police court for playing it in the Rose Hill cemetery.

Policeman Pat Lord testified he saw Anderson teeing off from a grave with a flower cup as No. 1 hole. Tombstones served as hazards, several negroes were playing, Lord said, but the others ran and were not caught.

Intinerant Printer Wants to Go Where There's Plenty Rum

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 2.—(AP)—If Carlos O'Brien receives the fortune he is reported to have inherited, he has just one wish.

He wants to leave the United States and to go to a country where liquor can be purchased legally.

The itinerant printer, said in news dispatches to have a large estate waiting for him in Ireland, came to the Columbia Record building today to find out what all the talk was about.

Surrounded by reporters, printers, advertising solicitors and a lawyer, O'Brien scouted the idea he was to inherit a large sum.

"None of my family had much money," he said jerkily as he puffed industriously on the last half inch of a cigarette.

Referring to the reporters as "you bums of the intelligentsia," he said:

"Oh, I know what you want. You want an Alger Story."

He said he didn't care to talk much for publication, promised to come back and be interviewed later and then borrowed twenty-five cents from one of the reporters.

He did say he had three sisters, who had three, four and 11 children, respectively, an had a brother who is in Australia.

"I'll be back," he said as he slouched out of the Record composing room, "and I'll really give you a story."

Marshal Joffre Not Expected to Awake From Lengthy Coma

Paris, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Marshal Joffre, deep in a coma from which his physicians did not expect him to awake, remained alive today, one of them indicated, through injections of serum.

Dr. Boulin, meeting newspapermen outside the Hospital St. Jean de Dieu, said:

"The final coma which will take the Marshal can be foreseen from a half hour to three quarters of an hour in advance by acceleration of the pulse, which has been 140 since yesterday."

Heavy doses of a serum are being given which should permit the Marshal to pass today and perhaps tonight.

AMERICAN IS INJURED AT PANAMA CITY

Newspaperman Hit by Stray Bullet During Fighting Around Presidential Palace

Panama City, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Hartwell F. Ayers, American newspaper man, was critically wounded today as he tried to approach the presidential palace during the revolt which overthrew the Arsemena government.

Ayers is a native of Anniston, Ala., and at one time was Panama correspondent for the New York Sun.

Stray bullets struck him in the neck and abdomen. In the midst of the excitement apparently he did not receive prompt attention and it was some time later before he was removed to the Gorgas hospital. An operation was performed but the doctors said they could not hold out much hope for him.

Anniston, Ala., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Hartwell Ayers, American newspaper man, reported wounded in the revolt against the government of Panama, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Walter Ayers, of Atlanta, Ga., and a brother of Col. Harry M. Ayers, publisher of the Anniston Star.

Ayers was born in China where his parents were engaged in missionary work and spent several years in the Orient before returning to the United States. His father is now a member of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist church with headquarters in Atlanta.

Before going to Panama, Ayers was connected with the editorial staff of the Star here and later the Atlanta office of the Associated Press. He attended Wake Forest College in North Carolina.

He was graduated there in three years with a degree of B. S. For one year after his graduation he was principal of the Roxboro, N. C., high school. He then joined the editorial staff of the Anniston Star. He was 29 years old.

Says Abernethy Not Expelled From N. C. State College

Raleigh, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Milton Abernethy of Hickory, student of N. C. State College during the first semester when a newspaper article he wrote on cheating at the college caused him to face two student trials, "withdrew from school on his own account," Dr. E. C. Brooks president, said today.

Abernethy according to a story in the Winston-Salem Journal today, claims to have been expelled from State.

Dr. Brooks said today "he was not expelled," when asked if Abernethy was forced to leave the college. Asked if failure on his courses or any other pressure caused the withdrawal, the student said he withdrew of his own volition.

During the sporadic rifle fire two fire alarms were turned in, aiding considerably to the general confusion. The revolt was comparatively quiet, however, except in the immediate vicinity of police headquarters and the palace and most of the city's inhabitants knew nothing of what had happened until they arose at their usual hour.

Washington, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Minister Alfaro of Panama was advised from his country today that the government of President Arsemena had been overthrown.

The communication said the forces responsible were headed by Dr. Amcrico Arias.

Capital of Republic Passes Into Hands of Military Junta Headed By Harmodis Arias; Several Government Officers Placed Under Arrest, Including Archibald Boyd, Governor of the Province of Panama; Armed Civilians Patrol Streets Under Direction of Revolutionists

Panama City, Jan. 2.—(AP)—President Arsemena was a prisoner in his own palace today while a revolutionary junta which overthrew his government in a sudden rebellion this morning was in charge of the city.

The revolutionists captured the police headquarters and established their own patrol of civilian guards while another attack was directed against the palace which surrendered after a brief skirmish.

At least ten persons were killed and a score or so wounded in the fighting about the palace and the police station. Hartwell F. Ayers, an American newspaper correspondent, was critically wounded and physicians at Gorgas hospital held out little hope for him.

While political leaders and representatives of Spain, Italy, Cuba or Costa Rica conferred with Roy T. Davis, the United States minister, reports came from Cuba that the governor of that province had dispatched 500 Cuban police to support the Arsemena government but that the Panama Railway refused to carry the armed body.

Panama City, Jan. 2.—Sudden revolt breaking without warning today overthrew the government of President Arsemena and the capital of the republic passed into the hands of a revolutionary junta headed by Harmodis Arias.

Several other government officers were placed under arrest, including Archibald Boyd, governor of the province of Panama, and Ricardo Arango, head of the police.

The whereabouts of Vice-President Thomas Gabriel Duques was not known but it was believed that he had escaped to safety. The second vice-president, Carlos Lopez, also was believed to have escaped to the Canal Zone.

After the first attack had succeeded, armed civilians associated with the revolutionists patrolled the city under the direction of General Manuel Quintana, who had installed himself at the police station.

Shops remained closed, there was no bus service and throughout the city automobiles carrying armed men dashed about posting guards on police duty.

There were persistent reports that President Arsemena had abdicated but none of these were confirmed. From Colon came reports that Governor Galindo with a detachment of police and armed civilians had attempted to come into Panama City but that the Canal Zone governor had declined to permit the passage of an armed body across his territory.

Telephones and telegraph lines were not functioning and there was no way of knowing how the movement had been received by inhabitants in the interior. The junta ordered all newspapers suspended until further notice but there was no suggestion of censorship on outgoing dispatches.

First reports were that ten had been killed and about twenty others wounded in the fighting this morning. The plaza about the presidential palace was blood spattered but it was impossible to obtain accurate information regarding the number of casualties.

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President Arsemena was reported confined in the presidential palace.

The communication said there had been some fighting but that the "entire people" supported the movement. Order and tranquility were reported to be reigning after the revolt.

Explosion Wrecks Baltimore Building, One Man Killed

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Fire in three hours last night destroyed the \$200,000—four-story plant of the Baltimore Post, a Scripps-Howard newspaper, taking one life and injuring six. Today the paper was being published at the Baltimore Sun while officials from New York attended a conference here to determine whether the plant would be rebuilt.

The fire started shortly after 6 o'clock with an explosion in the photographic department adjoining the editorial room on the second floor. Eighteen men were in the composing room on the floor above, preparing to send the last edition to the press room in the basement. Joseph R. Douglass, a linotype operator on the third floor rushed to a window and made a desperate leap for a ladder that was being raised by one of the first fire companies to arrive. He missed and plunged to the street, fracturing his skull. He died an hour later in a hospital.

The other members of the composing room staff escaped down a fire escape in the rear of the building, some leaping from windows after reaching the second floor.

Confusion followed and it was several hours before the editors of the paper had completed a check that showed all persons accounted for. More than an hour it was believed five workmen were still trapped in the building.

Officials of the fire department today were seeking the cause of the explosion.

Gay Paper of 1775 Soon to Cover Walls Mt. Vernon Room

Washington—(AP)—Perhaps the impatience of Martha Washington which prompted her to put some gay wall paper on unfinished walls at Mt. Vernon was responsible for a search which has extended to many parts of the world.

Probably no woman matching goods with a scrap of cloth ever had any more difficulty than Col. Harrison H. Dodge, superintendent of Mt. Vernon, in matching that paper.

But at last he has found it in an old house in Maine, and now the room will be papered once more just as it was when Washington occupied it. The paper is sepia brown, bearing pictures in vivid buff, blue and crimson of mountains, sunsets, churches, lakes and swans.

Colonel Dodge discovered the original old paper recently while making repairs to Washington's bedroom in preparation for the George Washington bicentennial in 1932.

Underneath the smooth white plaster walls he discovered scraps of paper which had been pasted on the unfinished plaster in 1775.

Colonel Dodge believes that the mistress of Mt. Vernon may have done the papering when she became impatient to occupy new unfinished bedrooms which were part of an addition her husband started to build when he was called away to war.

At any rate she had the room papered without waiting for the white finishing plaster.

Bushrod Washington became the owner of Mt. Vernon in 1802, and he immediately selected for his own use the bedroom which had been occupied by his uncle. He had the paper removed and the walls covered with white plaster.

After much effort Colonel Dodge uncovered enough of the paper to piece together and photograph. The photograph was sent far and wide in an attempt to identify the paper.

Finally a duplicate of it was located in an old house near Portland, Maine. The pattern was faithfully reproduced for repapering the bedroom walls.

ITALY FINDS NEW RAPHAEL TAKES STEPS TO KEEP IT

Albenga, Italy.—(AP)—A Raphael Madonna, it is believed, has been found here in an obscure gallery containing only ten paintings. Experts have certified its authenticity, and it will probably be taken to the larger gallery at Genoa.

The painting shows the "Madonna of Divine Love" with the child Jesus standing on her knees and laughing at little St. John the Baptist. Nearby is St. Elizabeth kneeling and near her, St. Joseph. Pinehurst, Jan. 2.—(AP)—George T. Dunlap, Jr., of New York, Princeton golfer and intercollegiate champion, today wrote down another Pinehurst mid-south championship on his list of golfing triumphs.

The collegiate star won his fifth mid-south title in six years yesterday in a 19-hole match with Forbes K. Wilson, of York Harbor, Me., a Yale linksman.

In doing so, Dunlap repeated his performance of two years ago when he downed Wilson to capture the mid-south crown for the fourth consecutive year. Last year, he was defeated by William C. Fownes, Jr., of Pittsburgh, who did not defend the title this season.

The intercollegiate champion found the Yale golfer a stubborn opponent in his latest conquest. Halving eleven holes, both had an 18-hole score of 75, going out in 33 strokes each and making the home-ward nine in 37s.

Trailing Dunlap by a single stroke most of the way, Wilson squared the count at the turn and again on the 16th hole. They battled on even terms to the 19th hole where Dunlap ended the match.

Filipino Seeks Unity In New Freedom Move

Manila.—(AP)—Manuel Roxas, speaker of the islands' house of representatives, has launched a new organization devoted to Philippine independence.

His manifesto suggests revolution but stops just short of coming out for it, instead of emphasizing the immediate need for a nationalistic feeling that would unite the entire archipelago into a single, driving political source.

Hitherto the independence campaigns have been confined, largely to the Tagalog politicians. The new organization aims to bring all elements into the movement from the hill tribes in the mountains.

Mohammedans of the south to the Tagalog. The organization is the Bagong Katipunan, also known as "the New Katipunan," and therein lies its note of menace.

"Katipunan" is the Tagalog word for "association," and the only other "katipunan" mentioned here was one which played a big role in the 1896 uprising against Spain.

But most Americans in Manila decried this aspect of the situation. They say that Roxas has adopted the name as a catchword and that at heart he is the last person in the islands to desire a real revolution.

They regard it all as a move of Roxas to bolster his political standing and to provide funds for campaign junkets by offering membership at so much a head.

It is a recognized fact that the tao, or Filipino peasant, has always been enthusiastic for independence so long as it cost him nothing. It remains for Roxas to demonstrate that he can be converted into a patriot who will say it with deeds.

Roxas' own version of the lineup is different. He came back from the United States last summer convinced that independence could be won if it could be shown that not merely the politicians, but the entire Filipino people, wanted it.

He is trying to prove that this desire exists.

Sponsored by a man so high in politics as Roxas, the scheme has started auspiciously and only a little criticism has been heard.

Turns to Certified Seed

College Station, Tex.—(AP)—Steve Jenkins, Galveston Island watermelon raiser and truck farmer, was influenced by his county agent to plant a sack of certified potato seed in 1923. The next year, he voluntarily planted four sacks; this year, 15 sacks. He has ordered one carload for 1931.

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NOVELIST, 68, IS VIGOROUS

Tried to Commit Suicide at One Time, But Now He Is Enjoying Life

By ANNE BERDING

Sorrento, Italy.—(AP)—Maxim Gorky, Russia's most famous living writer, is rounding out his 68th year here on the Bay of Naples by working from nine to 11 hours a day.

A bullet in his body from an attempted suicide in 1908, and his lungs worn by consumption, he is more vigorous than he was 20 or 30 years ago.

This correspondent found him seated behind his desk in the library of his villa. He was wearing a blue flannel shirt buttoned at the collar without a tie—and a tight brown pull-over sweater.

His hair, now iron-gray, was close-cropped in Prussian fashion. His face wore a look of perpetual worry, with heavy lines between his eyes. His sandy mustache drooped far below his mouth.

He was writing the fourth volume of "Bystander," which he wants to make the monumental work of his life.

Speaking nothing but Russian, he talked through his son Alexis, who spoke Italian.

Gorky told how he rises at 7:30 every morning, begins work at eight and finishes at one, reads from two to four and works from four to five. He resumes work at 5:30, and works until eight. Then he often works from 9:30 until midnight or one.

Such is the man whose health is considered so delicate that he cannot live in Russia's rigorous climate and is one of the few Soviet citizens permitted to reside abroad.

Half his time is devoted to his novels, the other half to the writing and supervising of Soviet propaganda. He is an ardent Bolshevik.

"It is time," he said, "for the United States to recognize the Soviet republic."

"Both countries have a great deal to gain from an exchange of their experience and products. Russia has need of American industrial and commercial organizers. America has need of a Russian product."

"This is my special message to America I wish you would convey."

Twenty-four years ago he visited the United States. Society, which at first idolized him, treated him as an outcast when it was learned that he was with whom he was traveling was not his wife. A year later he married her.

"I have no wish to return to the United States," he said with a half-smile.

Mme. Gorky lives in Moscow, but visits her husband twice a year.

He said Russian literature after the revolution is showing considerable promise.

"Russian modern literature," he said, "is distinguished from European and American because it is positive instead of negative—tries to construct instead of to destroy."

"It is a literature of work, of the unification of Russia, of the awakening literary consciousness, now that Russia's 57 languages are fitting and illiteracy is waning."

"Russia drama, however, is worse than before the revolution. Only good comedies are being produced."

Gorky replied negatively to the question whether the decline of religion in Russia would affect her literature.

"The outside world," he said, "has a wrong idea about religious persecutions in Russia. Churches are ordered turned into halls or theatres only when they are no longer used by sufficient number of worshippers. Priests are arrested only when they intrigue against the government. The people have religious freedom."

The famous Russian concluded by saying Russia did not want, and would not seek war, that she wanted peace to work out her future.

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"Wonder Ship" Leads British Navy To United States

London.—(AP)—British tars will pay their first formal call on Uncle Sam's ships this January.

Flying his flag in His Majesty's ship Nelson, Admiral Sir Michael Hodge, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet, will sail from England January 8 for a cruise of the West Indies.

With him goes a squadron representing the best type of warship in the British navy.

It will be the first voyage of this kind for the fleet and has been specially arranged to give the British navy a chance to visit the United States fleet in American waters.

In 1903 the late Prince Louis of Battenberg took a British squadron to New York but when Admiral Hodge accepted the invitation to visit the United States fleet at Cienfuegos he was the first to ever do so.

Sir Michael is to stay with the American fleet at Colon from February 23 to 25.

The visit is being made to demonstrate the friendly feeling between the two powers and to strengthen bonds of comradeship created when the two navies fought side by side during the war.

Admiral Hodge was chief of staff in the Grand Fleet during the war and thus came into daily contact with the American battle squadron in the North sea.

By way of doing full honor to the occasion the British Admiralty is sending the "wonder ship" of its fleet to Colon.

H. M. S. Nelson in appearance and in design is unlike anything else naval architects have produced. As the Nelson was not begun until 1925 and finished in 1927, her designer was able to put into her all improvements that war experience had taught.

Wherever in American waters the Nelson may show up it will be easy to identify her by her grotesque silhouette.

Picture a 600-foot long steel hull, 106 feet broad, shaped like a gigantic flatiron with a battery of great guns on its upper side and behind them a sort of steel skyscraper and you have the Nelson.

Considerably over \$39,500,000 was spent on the ship.

All sorts of new departures were made in her design. One of the most revolutionary was in the emplacement of her big guns.

The main armament of the Nelson consists of nine 16-inch guns of a specially designed long range type.

Each of the 16-inch guns throws a ton weight shell and can hit a target at 25 miles. To enable the guns to fire ahead, on the beam or toward the rear most of her upper deck has been left quite clear of obstructions. She cannot train her 16-inch guns directly astern.

For fighting in this direction she has a battery of twelve 6-inch guns mounted in pairs in six turrets. As protection against attack by aircraft she is furnished with six 4.7-four-pounder, eight 2-pounder and many machine guns.

ELECTRIC BULB'S LIFE AVERAGES 1,000 HOURS

Washington.—(AP)—Light experts at the bureau of standards have found that the average useful life of an electric bulb is 1,000 hours—the equivalent of 42 days of continuous lighting at rated efficiency.

Bulbs frequently give considerably longer service, however, because the load on the bulb is reduced during these periods, usually at night, when the voltage is heavily drawn upon.

The fire loss was cut half in two during the year 1930 and members of the departments have turned their faces to the future looking for records to conquer.
The total loss of all fires in the city during the entire year did not reach the fifty thousand dollar mark, and the most of that was covered by insurance.
That Greenville people realize the value of insurance was indicated in a report of the fire chief which showed that over one hundred thousand dollars was paid out for insurance during 1930, over double the amount recovered as result of fires.
The Greenville firemen have been able to establish something of a record for the last several years, and if they are given the hearty support of the public they should be able to accomplish more in years to come.
It is something to cut down fire from year to year in the face of increased population, increase of buildings, and the carelessness of people who do not realize the value of insurance.
The firemen have truly set a record, and they have the wishes of the citizenship in the program for 1931.
There was very little changing in the business life of the city with the advent of the new year, but each change reflected development in the mercantile field.
Two of the larger stores of the city announced plans for improvement of their quarters which will place them in the front ranks of eastern business enterprises.
That the new year will witness other improvements of business is not to be doubted. Business men realize that if they keep step with the growth of the city it is necessary for them to do so, and hence the necessity for improvement of stores and continuous increase of stocks.
Depression has dealt this section of the country a paralyzing blow in the last few months, but the people are beginning to recover and affluence bids fair to see them in the old time prosperity.
Ambition can be realized by persistent effort at all times and untiring effort to render the best type of service.
No false fire alarms went in the different sections of the city during the celebration of the New Year. Members of the fire department rushed out into the night in search of the blazes, none were to be found.
The alarms were sent in by celebrities who failed to realize the fact that the firemen jeopardize their lives every time they leave the station in the high powered trucks. The life of pedestrians is also endangered by the speeding trucks, hence the necessity of eliminating false alarms as much as possible.
Chief George Gardner has issued warnings that people concerned of turning in false alarms will be prosecuted, and it would be no fault for the guilty parties to take heed.
False alarms not only cause firemen to take their lives in hand of responding, but also cost the city an average of \$25. Looking at it from this angle, it is a very expensive business and deserves the attention of everybody concerned.
The State Highway Commission take over the Falkland road on Jan. 1, and the following months will witness considerable improvement to one of the most important arteries in this section.

Steel Industry Hopes for a Rise in 1931 Market
New York.—(AP)—American steel producers are counting on early replenishment of depleted inventories to start their industry on its climb out of the slump into which it fell during 1930.
The demand for steel products by all the important consumers, especially the railroads, automobile manufacturers and building construction companies, failed to fulfill the optimistic hope entertained by the industry last spring.
Buyers took only their minimum requirements and this hand-to-mouth policy, attributed to the lack of confidence that characterized most businesses, was accompanied by progressively lower operating ratios from the year’s peak levels attained in February.
With a return of confidence and the stabilization of prices, leaders of the industry look for a slow but steady gain in demand in the early months of 1931.
They base their expectations not only on the assumption that the time element in the depression will be favoring an upturn, but also on experience.
There have been years in the last decade when the seasonal autumn upturn failed to reach normal size as was the case in 1930, but never in that period has the spring failed to bring a rise.
The improvement in 1930 came earlier than usual, for it usually does not appear until around April. But the attainment of an 85 per cent operating rate in February proved to be something of a boom-crang. It clouded the true state of

Dr. Alfaro described Dr. Amoroso as an attorney who hitherto had devoted to prominent efforts to peaceful pursuits.
Word of the troubles had not been received at either the State or War or Navy departments at the time that Dr. Alfaro had made public his telegram.
Dr. Alfaro’s communication said: “National revolutionary movement, government overthrown. Entire people support movement. Peace and order now reigning.”
Dispatches from the legation by mail to the State department had indicated a certain amount of unrest in Panama on account of economic depression there. The dispatches did not indicate, however, that anything so serious as a revolt powerful enough to overthrow the government was threatening.
President Florencio Harmodio Arosemena was elected in August, 1928, to a four year term under the constitution adopted in 1904. The republic has no army or navy and the maintenance of order rests upon the police force, an official body organized and still directed by American officers.
Under the treaty with the United States, the latter government protects the Panama republic from foreign aggression and intervenes in case of serious domestic strife, on the call of the president.
Political unrest which was widespread in Latin-America last year extended to Panama last fall when dissension arose among members of the cabinet of five ministers. Four of the ministers resigned in protest against the activities of Jephia B. Duncan, secretary of public instruction. The cabinet crisis was solved shortly afterward when Duncan was replaced, but the spirit of unrest was not entirely eliminated.
When Arosemena rode into office on a Liberal landslide he carried with him control of the national assembly. The election was without disturbance although during the campaign there had been considerable opposition from the conservative Labor and the young Independent parties. The former was strongest in Colon and the young Independent vote was largely confined to Panama City.

HAWAII DEVELOPS NEW COMPOUND TO TREAT LEPROSY

Honolulu.—(AP)—A new kind of chemical compound from chaulmoogra oil, which may revolutionize existing systems of leprosy treatment, has been produced at the University of Hawaii.
Previous chaulmoogra oil derivatives have not been soluble in water and they were oily in their characteristics.
Dr. Richard Wrenshall, professor of chemistry, has been in charge of the experiments and results of the experiments on dogs has been transmitted to Gov. Lawrence Judd.
The nearest approach to a specific for leprosy thus far discovered has been chaulmoogra oil, the report says, and with it it is possible for the new derivative to enter the blood rapidly.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 2.—(AP)—The financial markets began the new year soberly but hopefully today.

The stock market developed quite some strength after a selling flurry during the early trading, and bonds reflected investment buying. The early selling was presumably in part profit taking on the upturn in the last two sessions of 1930. Profit taking deferred until today will not be taxed until 1932.

Rail, oil and motor shares pointed upward after midday. An unsettling development in the early trading was a flop back in some of the utilities which were hurried upward late Wednesday. Shares selling up a point or two included Atchafalaya, New York Central, New Haven, Illinois Central, General Motors, Studebaker, Nash and the Standard of New York and New Jersey. Mining losses of a point or two in U. S. Steel, American Telephone, American Can, Bethlehem Steel, and Air Reduction were replaced by advances of like extent. American Water Works and American Power and Light lost 5 points in the first hour, or most of Wednesday's advances. Allied Chemical tumbled 5 to a low since 1929, then recovered.

The rally was facilitated by an unexpectedly quick breaking of the year end credit firmness. Call money renewed at 3 percent, but dropped later to 1 1/2, the lowest since September. Reduction of the discount rate of the Bank of France from 2 1/2 to 2 percent, placing it on a par with the New York rate, was viewed constructively. With the Paris rate a full one percent lower than London, the drain on London's gold stock will be lightened.

The rail shares were helped by the knowledge that heads of the eastern trunk lines had promptly resumed conferences to work out the details of the four-party unification plan.

The motor shares responded to announcements of new models and new prices although prices were lower in most cases.

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AGRICULTURE TO UNDERGO MANY CHANGES

Reduction in Acreage of All Farm Products Expected During 1931

Washington.—(AP)—Regardless of the outcome of its many complexities, 1930 is regarded by many farm leaders as perhaps the most revolutionary period in national agricultural history.

It has seen a marketing system as old as the country itself shaken to the foundation and the government committed to a farm relief policy.

It has seen an effort to substitute, with the taxpayer's money and the administration's brains, a system of farmer-owned and controlled market agencies which are expected to give the producer the profits commonly absorbed by the grain trader, the cotton merchant, the commission man and the middleman.

Political, economic and social conflict has been the result. The old system made fortunes for thousands, and millions of dollars in assets and liabilities are tied up in it. Whether it survives or perishes, a very definite element of the citizenship is going to be vitally affected.

Repercussions are still to be heard in 1931. The independent cotton dealer, aroused to his peril has sent to Washington leaders of the trade who are to map out a campaign against the system which, he says, threatens to destroy him.

The grain trade, supported in a large measure by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, was the first of the old market system to strike at the new, but no material advantage was claimed.

On one side is the contention that the government has no right to destroy the business of a considerable class of its citizenship and tax it to help to fight; on the other, that this class never served any economic purpose and it well might be sacrificed to the greater good of the greater number.

One side says the farmer never can market his own crops profitably. The other says he can through cooperative control and orderly supply. Economists of the nation are split on the question.

In the meantime, the farm board, through its administrative arm, has loaned cooperative marketing associations \$101,811,521.57 and has \$25,847,951.56 more committed.

It has set up seven great national farm agencies, six of them marketing organizations. Five already are operating in grain, cotton, wool and mohair, and pecans.

There are 12,000 farm cooperatives representing approximately 2,000,000 of the nation's 6,000,000 farmers. The farm board says that half of the 2,000,000, producing more than 40 different crops, have been aided directly through federal loans to cooperatives.

Second in consequence, 1930 saw a prodigious attempt, by the government to manipulate the law of supply and demand and to create and maintain an artificial prosperity in surplus crop markets.

Grown to a giant before the country had been able to see above its slice tips, the grain stabilization corporation—backed by \$96,000,000 of federal funds—bought and removed from the market an estimated 120,000,000 bushels of wheat.

By the new crop season it is expected to have almost the whole of the United States carryover in the hollow of its hand.

The operation has carried the domestic price above the world price and automatically closed the door to export trade. Wheat is selling higher in the United States than in any other exporting country in the world.

For exporters to operate it is said domestic prices must be 12 to 15 cents under the world price where as they have been running 2 to 3 cents above.

The cotton stabilization corpora-

McNeely has been given \$15,000,000 to help maintain prices by removing pressure from the market.

There has been serious world over-production in wheat and, to some extent, in cotton. There has been some leaning toward the theory that neither the wheat nor the cotton will find an outlet and in that instance exert as much pressure on the market as if they actually were in it.

A third revolutionary feature of the year has been a concerted stand by the White House, the Department of Agriculture and the Farm Board for surplus acreage reduction.

Crop expansion has been the highlight of the American agricultural program for decades and efforts of the department of agriculture always have turned to an increase in yields.

The new order contemplates the adjustment of American production to American demand in view of constantly increasing world production and the narrowing of export outlets.

bantam car smaller than ever and in two 16-cylinder models and a 12-cylinder car which have had previous debuts.
