Red Haired Widow And Former Naval Flier Off On Flight Over Atlantic

Mrs. Beryl Hart and Lieut. William McLaren leave New York for Paris early today with plane loaded with mail and foodstuffs; Will attempt to prove that ocean flying can be put on paying basis; "Trade-wind" to stop in Bermuda and Azores

New York, Jan. 3.—(AP)—A red-haired widow and the man who taught her to fly pointed the plane "Trade-wind" for Paris in pitch darkness early today, setting their sights for Bermuda and the Azores with a pay load.

Mrs. Beryl Hart, one of the few women to hold an unlimited transport license and Lieut. William McLaren, former navy flier took off from the Glenn H. Curtiss airport at Queens at 5:50 A. M., circled the field several times in the glare of searchlights and finally soared away toward the tip of Long Island.

Lieutenant McLaren was at the controls on the takeoff but Mrs. Hart was expected to replace him soon after the start and do the bulk of the piloting. Both were dressed in spottless aural togs, and Mrs. Hart wore a five leaf clover, a rabbit's foot and an Indian penny as emblems of good luck.

The pilots planned to cut southward over the Atlantic and land at Hamilton, Bermuda at 1:30 (EST) this afternoon, a distance of 650 miles. Resting three hours while the plane was tuned up and refueled, they hoped to resume the flight about sunset and make Horta, Azores in 21 hours, traveling 2,042 miles. They figured the last leg to Paris 1,520 miles, would take them 17-12 hours, setting them down on the River Seine within the city limits, in less than 50 hours.

They carried with them a chart of the Seine, drawn by Dieudonne Coste after he and Maurice Bionte had landed here on their Paris-New York flight. In case the river traffic is too heavy, they will come down on a small lake just outside the city.

With a desire to prove that ocean flying can be put on a paying commercial basis, the pilots loaded the "Trade-wind" with 250 pounds of mail and foodstuffs, the first cargo load to be started across the Atlantic.

Their ship is a sleek and white Bellanca monoplane, similar in construction to the Columbia which, twice, conquered the Atlantic. It is powered with a 300 horsepower Wright whirlwind motor and is equipped with pontoons for water landings. Its tanks have a capacity of 400 gallons of gasoline but only 250 gallons were aboard at the start. They carried no radio.

Weather bureau officials predict a favorable weather for them on the first lap, with a 15 mile tailwind to speed them along. Ordinarily, weather over the Atlantic is not ideal for flying at this time of year.

Mrs. Hart is 27 years old and the widow of A. J. Hart, a New York advertising man. He was killed in an automobile accident in Cleveland 17 days after they were married and she was badly injured. She owns the plane in which they are riding and has more than 350 hours in the air to her credit with the Department of Commerce.

Lieutenant McLaren is 34 and married. He is a graduate of the United States Naval Academy holds a commission in the Naval Reserve and has been an instructor at the Newark Airport.

HOOVER SENDS SYMPATHY IN JOFFRE DEATH

World Figures Express Sorrow At the Passing of the Hero of the Marne

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—President Hoover cabled to President Doumergue of France today his personal and the official condolences of the American people on the death of Marshal Joffre.

The message said: "I am distressed by the news of the death of Marshal Joffre who is so affectionately remembered by the American people. Both in their name and personally I wish to express to your excellency the deep sorrow which is felt in this country at the passing of this great patriot."

Secretary Stimson instructed the embassy in Paris to convey a message of sympathy on behalf of the American government and the secretary himself to the French minister of foreign affairs.

"I join in your sorrow and that of the French people," it read, "at the death of Marshal Joffre who was so well known and loved in this country. Please accept this expression of condolence and deepest sympathy in your great loss on behalf of this government and myself."

General John J. Pershing—"In the death of Marshal Joffre the world loses one of its outstanding military figures and France a devoted patriot."

Secretary of War Hurley—"It is with deepest regret that I have learned of the death of that distinguished son of France, Marshal Joffre. His life exemplified devotion to duty, to honor, to country, and to humanity."

General Douglas MacArthur, chief of staff—"Our army mourns with its former comrades the passing of that most gallant and illustrious son of France, Marshal Joffre."

NYE TO SEEK MORE LIGHT IN NORRIS FIGHT

Senate Campaign Funds Committee to Hear Lucas and Nutt, C. O. P. Heads

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—More light on both the source of funds and the origin of literature used in a Republican campaign against re-election of Senator Norris of Nebraska, will be sought next Tuesday by the Senate Campaign funds committee.

Robert H. Lucas, executive director of the Republican National Committee, who paid for the literature, was greeted as he reached the city by train last night with a subpoena to appear at the Tuesday hearing.

Chairman Nye also has summoned Joseph E. Nutt, treasurer of the National Committee. He is to be asked the original source of a special \$50,000 bank account of the Republican organization. This fund was pleaded as security for a \$4,000 loan to Lucas, about \$800 of which he said was spent for anti-Norris publicity.

Through examination of records of the Independent Publishing company of this city the committee will seek to establish whether any link existed between the Ku Klux Klan and the anti-Norris efforts.

Officers of the company, which publishes the pro-Klan fellowship journal, have testified before the Nye committee that part of the campaign literature purchased from them by Lucas for an anti-Norris drive was the same used against Alfred E. Smith, Democratic presidential candidate, in 1928.

Both Lucas and Nutt, however, have denied any connection with efforts to inject the "religious issue" in the Nebraska senatorial contest.

ANOTHER BOMB IS EXPLODED IN MILL VILLAGE

Blast Damages Home of W. C. Nasworthy, Non-Union Worker, At Danville

Danville, Va., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Police investigators today found the bombing of the home of W. C. Nasworthy, non-union textile worker, as much a mystery as the series of explosions which have terrified residents of the village of Schoolfield on several occasions in the past few weeks.

Nasworthy, a former union man who returned to work in the Dan River Mills this week, was at home with his wife and small child. They were not hurt but the blast tore the door from its hinges and shattered the windows in the front of the house.

Troops that have been patrolling Schoolfield for more than a month to preserve order in the area, where union textile workers are on strike, were drawn to the far end of the well-lighted street by a series of shots just before the explosion.

While police continued their investigation today they received a report that J. E. Woodall, in moving from Reidsville, N. C., to Danville, had a furniture truck turned back at the state line last night. He said the negro driver returned to Reidsville and that he was forced to hire another driver for the truck. Woodall said he was employed by a tobacco company.

Greensboro, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Giving the poultry business in North Carolina a new boost today was the announced purpose of the newly formed North State Hatchery Association.

A representative group of poultry breeders in the state met here yesterday and launched the new organization.

They elected K. F. Howard, of Dunn, president; George Davis, of Asheville, vice president, and Dr. R. S. Dearstine, of the poultry department of N. C. State College, secretary-treasurer.

ASSESSORS TO GET BUSY HERE JANUARY 15

Supervisor P. L. Stone Announces List of Men to Have Charge of Revaluation

Revaluation of property in Pitt county will begin about January 15, or as soon as members of the board of assessors can arrange plans for the work, it was announced this morning by P. L. Stone, supervisor of taxes of Pitt county.

In announcing the list of men to have charge of activities in the various townships of the county, Mr. Stone stated that a general session of the assessors will be held at the court house probably next Saturday. The date was not definitely fixed because it had not been fully determined whether all members of the board would be able to serve.

Mr. Stone recently attended at Raleigh a general meeting of tax supervisors from all counties in the state, at which time a general plan for the revaluation program was outlined. Suggestions at this conference will be followed out in Pitt as well as in the other counties of the state.

Mr. Stone said he would probably be able to confirm all appointments in time for the conference next Saturday, and hoped to begin work as soon as possible after that time.

Three men were appointed for each township and each is sufficiently well acquainted with conditions to go about the revaluation program in a comprehensive way.

Army's Old Clothes Given to the Poor

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The army's old cast off clothing is to go to the poor and destitute.

Regulations requiring that discarded clothing be destroyed unless sold were set aside today by Secretary Hurley, in orders prepared for immediate dispatch to corps area commanders.

The articles are to be distributed through charitable organizations with the stipulation that they be dyed and that none of them be sold.

JOFFRE MADE THREE VISITS TO AMERICA

Came Twice Almost Unnoticed, But Once As Personification of Glory and Glamour

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Joseph Joffre, Marshal of France, visited America three times, twice almost unnoticed, but once as the personification of the glory and glamour that surrounded war-torn France in 1917.

In 1883 Joffre, a relatively obscure French army officer, landed in San Francisco on his way home from a colony outpost. As if by a presentiment, reports swarmed around him then. But as the marshal explained it was because the ship he was on rammed another in San Francisco bay. The news gatherings were after an eye-witness story. Joffre did not speak English and they left him quickly. He never forgot the incident, and often mentioned it.

"They called me 'colonel,'" he laughed. The mention of his name when he came back again was like a waving flag. It was in April, 1917. War had just been declared. The country was flushed, eager and optimistic but its leaders were beginning to grow grave at the task before them and the allies were uneasy. The seas were littered with the timbers of ships sunk by German submarines.

Both France and England rushed missions here to acquaint the government with the facts and to ask for action, quick action. Rene Viviani, French minister of Justice, and Marshal Joffre headed the French delegation.

The boat carrying them crept into Hampton Roads on April 24. It was met in the night 100 miles at sea by American destroyers. Not a light was showing and the vessels, saw only greenish phosphorescence as prow cut through the water.

The Frenchmen came up the Potomac in the Presidential yacht, the Mayflower. It was a fine spring day and Joffre, his mind on the war, signed and said the country reminded him of his own country—the south of France.

His stay in Washington was a round of conferences and greetings. Both he and Viviani urged that troops be sent to France as quickly as possible. The marshal told of the socks and sweaters knitted for the oldiers by French wives and mothers. Needles began flying all over the United States. Many of the men who talked with him of the war have already gone.

Wilson, Lansing, Henry Cabot Lodge, Champ Clark, Thomas R. Marshall—the list is a long one.

He still did not speak English but he was genial, affable and dignified. Lieut. Colonel Jean Fabry, the "Blue Devil of France," was with him everywhere he went. They were a picturesque pair. People understood why the soldiers of France called him "Papa Joffre."

The delegation slipped away on May 15 and was not heard from again until safely through the submarine mines.

Marshal Joffre returned in April, 1922, bringing his wife with him. War, generals, marshals and heroes were an old story then. His visit was a quiet one as he wished it to be. He dined with the President and with Pershing.

Hero Of The Marne Dead After Stubborn Battle Against Brief Illness

Provisional Government Of Panama Attempts To Allay Fear Of Violence

Military Junta Makes Several Arrests of Old Regime While Awaiting the Return of Dr. Don Eicardo Alfaro, President-Designate, Who Has Cabled His Acceptance From Washington

Loses Last Battle



Marshal Joffre, hero of the Marne, and one of the outstanding leaders of the World War, died at Paris this morning following fortnight's illness.

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Secretary Stimson indicated today the State Department would refrain from any immediate decision on recognition of the new administration in Panama.

The secretary said that while the question of the ability of the new regime to fulfill international obligations entered into the problem, other considerations involving the special interests of the United States must be considered.

These special interests involve the waiver of the Panama Canal and certain rights accorded the United States by treaty.

These questions will be considered before deciding on recognition. There were no indications as to how the State Department looked upon the designation of Minister Alfaro as provisional president. He had been in conference at the department.

Panama City, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Panama, its government overturned in a brief revolution which brought death to ten persons, today greeted the return of its new president-designate, Dr. Don Ricardo J. Alfaro, cabled from Washington his acceptance of the post.

Meanwhile a provisional government, headed by Dr. Harmodio Arias, a leader of the isthmian republic's young bloods, acted to restore order throughout the country, arresting the leading figures of the old regime and seeking in pronouncements to allay public fears of further violence.

Florencio Harmodio Arosemena, who yesterday resigned the presidency he had held since 1928, was confined to his quarters with other government officials including Archibald Boyd, governor of the Province of Panama. It was believed that he will be released shortly unless it is decided to hold him for trial on charges of malfeasance.

The revolt flared at about 2:30 a. m. yesterday and before noon the old government had been completely overthrown and the foundation laid for establishment of a new one. Of the ten dead, eight were members of the police or national constabulary and two were civilians. Fifteen persons were wounded.

One of the most seriously wounded was an American, Hartwell P. Aren, newspaperman of Aniston, Ala., who was shot in the neck and abdomen near the presidential palace, and lay behind its walls for an hour before being discovered and taken to the Gorgas hospital. Despite his cheerless, his physicians believe he will die.

In the first stages of the revolt some surprise was expressed that American troops quartered in the Canal Zone were brought into maintain order, but with quickly returning normalcy the policy of the United States Minister, Roy T. Davis, not to call upon the troops until absolutely necessary was seen generally as amply justified. Mr. Davis, in short sleeves and with open collar, was in constant touch with the situation but would say nothing except that he and fellow members of the diplomatic corps were "observing events."

Before resigning Dr. Arosemena, whose surrender had been coerced at the point of a riot machine gun, replaced Daniel Ballen as secretary of government and justice by Dr. Arias. Upon his resignation the Supreme court took charge of the situation according to law and at 5 p. m. swore in Dr. Arias as provisional president.

The invitation to Dr. Alfaro was extended on the grounds that "the three vice-presidents of the Alfaro regime were illegally elected and that therefore Alfaro, first vice-president in the preceding administration, was the logical successor to the president resigned. Cablegrams received early today from Washington announced Dr. Alfaro's acceptance of the call.

The greatest opposition to the new regime developed in Colon, at the opposite side of the Isthmus, where the governor, Inocencio Galdames, (Continued on page six)

Members of Family At Bedside of Marshal Joffre As End Came Peacefully This Morning At 8:23, One Day From His 79th Birthday; Body to Lie In State At the Ecole Militaire in Accordance With Desire of Marshal; Burial to Take Place At Invalides Next Week; Body Will Probably Be Placed in Cemetery At Louveciennes

Paris, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Death came today to Marshal Joffre, last of the chief French military leaders of the great war, after a fortnight's illness in which it was necessary to amputate his left leg. The marshal would have been 79 years old tomorrow.

The end was peaceful. Three members of his family, Mme. Joffre, his son-in-law, M. Lafle, and his brother, Ferdinand, General Issaly, his chief of staff, Colonel Desmases of his staff, his doctors and a few others were present. He died without coming out from the coma which closed over him at noon on Thursday, his life gradually ebbing since.

The announcement was made at 8:30 a. m. A member of his military household, Captain Saint-Cyrin, pale with emotion, emerged from the hospital and in a husky voice telling newsmen: "The marshal is dead, gentlemen." He displayed a bulletin signed by the physicians, Professor Leriche and Drs. Boulin and Fontaine, which set the end at 8:23 a. m.

Shortly afterward Professor Leriche, Strasbourg specialist who came to Paris to treat the ailment which finally cut the marshal's life short, appeared and informing the newsmen of the circumstances of death, added that the marshal had been in a state of coma practically all this week except for rare intervals of five or ten minutes lucidity.

At 7 a. m., today Dr. Fontaine, feeling the pulse of the marshal, became convinced that death could be a question of only a very short period of time. Urgent telephone messages were sent to the family and friends and members of the general staff who gathered about the bed.

Mme. Joffre knelt beside her husband and the chaplain after administering absolution at 8 a. m. went quietly and knelt in a corner of the room, still murmuring his prayers for the dying. Dr. Fontaine continued to hold the wrist of the marshal.

Slowly he counted the pulsations and then amid a solemn hush broken only by the priest's frequent intonements, the marshal's great heart stopped.

The face took on its customary serenity, lying white and placid upon the pillow. Deep lines marked it, ample evidence of the effects of the great battle the marshal had fought for life.

At 11 a. m. the body reposed on the simple camp bed of a soldier. It was clothed in white dolman with the golden buttoned uniform worn in the colonies, where much of the dead man's pre-war military fame was won, the hands were crossed, two candles were burning on a small table beside the bed and two nuns knelt nearby praying.

The body will be embalmed this afternoon and then will lie in state at the Ecole Militaire, in accordance with a desire of the marshal. The funeral will be held next week, perhaps Wednesday.

Colonel Desmases, the marshal's aide-de-camp, announced that he would be given the same kind of funeral as Marshal Foch, who died in 1929, with a service at the Cathedral of Notre Dame and a cortege through the streets of Paris.

Burial will take place at the Invalides adjoining the tombs of other great marshals of France which surround that of Napoleon.

Pending interment, the body will probably temporarily be placed in the cemetery at Louveciennes where the marshal and his wife spent so many happy springs and summers together.

MORE ACTION IN ABERNETHY CASE PENDING

Dr. Brooks to Confer With Father of Dismissed Student During Today

Raleigh, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The next step in the Milton Abernethy case at N. C. State college was awaited with interest here today.

Dr. E. C. Brooks, president of the school, in a formal statement, issued after he had said Abernethy was not expelled and left college of his own volition, revealed that the young Hickory student had been informed he could not re-enter college until he had cleared up certain charges against him.

As a result of the formal statement, in which the president said Abernethy had agreed while on trial for writing an article on cheating at the college to withdraw from the school if he were not expelled, Dean Carl C. Taylor, of the graduate school, issued a flat denial that any such promise was made.

Dean Taylor acted as counsel for Abernethy.

"That is not true," Dr. Taylor said when informed of Dr. Brooks' statement. "I was present at the trial all of the time Abernethy was there and no such promise was made."

Louis Wilson, member of student council and appointed by that body to prosecute Abernethy at his trials, stated that Abernethy's only statement was made voluntarily and after the verdict of acquittal at the second trial. At that time Wilson said, Abernethy "thanked the council for the verdict, said he would not write anything more about the college, that he realized

Two Marines Injured In Insurgent Clash

Managua, Nicaragua, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Two United States Marines were seriously wounded today in a skirmish with insurgents in the interior. The men were brought here by airplane.

On Thursday eight marines were killed and four wounded in a skirmish with insurgents believed to have been commanded by a lieutenant of the insurgent General, Augustine Sandino. Since then marines patrols have been searching for the band which made that attack from ambush.

NEW FIRE WHISTLE HAS CHANCE TO DEMONSTRATE TONAL QUALITIES TWICE

Greenville's new fire whistle, installed on January 1, had two separate and distinct chances to demonstrate its tonal qualities yesterday and it did so in a way that left no doubt as to its ability to arouse a slumbering citizenship.

The first alarm was sent in from Clark street during the morning and resulted in \$100 damage to the home of a colored woman named Louise Dill. The flames were said to have originated from a defective flue and had made considerable progress when the fire department arrived.

The second alarm went in from the "Bama" section early this morning.

Although the fire department responded, it was unable to render any assistance because of the fact that the property was outside the water limit. An unoccupied negro house burned down at a loss of approximately \$500.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS TO CONSIDER SALARY CUTS AT MEET HERE MONDAY

Members of the Pitt County Board of Commissioners will gather here in the first meeting of the new year next Monday morning. Although numbers of important matters are to receive consideration during the day, probably the most significant to county employees is the reduction of salaries. The question received some attention at previous deliberations of the body, but action was deferred until the first meeting of the present year. The board will also be called upon to choose a superintendent of the county home.

Although three or four adjourned sessions have been held by the new board since the induction of its members at the regular meeting in December, the beginning of the county's new fiscal year, this is the first time they have been in a general session since that time and much work is expected to be disposed of.

YOUNG BLOOD WILL APPEAR IN NATIONAL

New York, Jan. 3.—(AP)—In good times or poor, our game of baseball continues to move along on an even keel. Since its inception, nearly a century ago, it has suffered little from radical changes, or from what other great sports call over-emphasis.

An outstanding feature of the old year was that, with a great pace, and favored with steady summer weather, the National league, in point of attendance, had its banner season. Other features were that our so-called veteran players jumped into action by winning all the batting, fielding and pitching honors, and that Hack Wilson was the home run crown, held for four consecutive seasons by Ruth.

The Cardinals made a game fight in the world series, and although their defeat ran our string to four straight, it must be remembered that in the last ten of these big interleague matches, the record stands but six to four against the old league.

For 1931, many, promising young players will add skill and hope to our contenders. They will play under an amended and clarified code of playing rules. There will be 80 rules for them to study instead of the former 85. Home runs will be universally judged when they leave the actual playing field, and not where the ball "disappears from the umpire's view." Two bases only will be allowed when a fair-hit ball bounds over a fence or into a stand. The term "momentarily held" will be missing, thus doing away with hair-line decisions of fly-ball catches. The manager of the team is given equal rights on the field with the captain; there is a new batting-out-of-turn rule; better definition of the pitching and interference rules, and new and clarified scoring rules.

Despite a temporary setback, we hope for more cordial and helpful relations between majors and minors. We have been criticized and pursued a selfish end and in asking for the restoration of the universal system of player promotion. At present, if a major club were to draft one player from each of the five lower classifications, the cost would be \$14,000. Under the new plan offered to all minor leagues, the acquisition of these players would cost \$22,000, an increase of over 50 percent. Surely a liberal trend, in these times when every reasonable endeavor must be adopted by baseball to cut down sky-high operation expenses.

Warren and German Fight to a Draw

New York, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Add Warren, North Carolina heavyweight champion, nursing a few light bruises and cuts, looked back today over a hard ten-round no decision bout with Ernest Guhring, giant German slugger.

The Carolinian and Guhring fought to a draw here last night in a rough and ready preliminary to the Renault-Charles battle.

Hammering away with a heavy right, Add had the edge on the towering Teuton in the early rounds but could not quite topple his opponent. Guhring made a comeback near the end of the bout but lacked the stamina to put Warren to sleep.

Guhring weighed 202, Warren 188.

GREENVILLE HIGH DEFEATS SNOW HILL IN FIRST GAME OF CAGE SEASON HERE

In the opening game of the season the boys team of the Greenville High School last night defeated the Snow Hill High School 28 to 9 in the local gymnasium. A fair size crowd was present to see Coach Brown's team display its wares. The spectators left convinced that Greenville High School is going to have an excellent basketball team this year. Coach Brown has about 20 players on the squad and during the last quarter of the game last night the second and fourth teams were given the opportunity to play.

The game opened with defensive tactics and cautious playing on the part of both teams. For a long while the score was 3 to 2. In fact, the first quarter ended with the score of 5 to 2 in favor of the locals. However, in the second quarter the Greens opened up with a fine piece of passing

and shooting, and the first half ended with a score of 18 to 2 in favor of the local lads. In the second half Snow Hill was a bit stronger, scoring 7 points against 2 in the first half while Greenville only scored 11 points against 18 in the first half. Captain Bud Bullock at his position as guard did everything, he held his opponents' scoreless, was always following the ball, and also found time to sink three field goals as well as 2 fouls. Deal at forward made 4 field goals and 1 foul throw giving him a total of 9 points. His passing was good and he was all over the floor. Nobles at the center post got the tip off nearly every time and played a fine defensive game. King at forward and Madrin at guard played a good brand of ball also. The defensive work of Madrin is particularly worthy of commendation.

Cullen Cain refers to him as the "Man from Homocassa." The ball players call him Old Daz. His relatives call him Arthur. All things considered, he is the greatest right-hander in baseball today.

Dazzy Vance has gone down to Homocassa, Florida, to get in shape for another baseball campaign. "Down where a fellow just naturally staves cutters," he says by way of ballooning the locality, "and get young again."

"Old Daz" will celebrate his thirty eighth birthday next March, but he completed one of his greatest seasons with Brooklyn in 1930 and he will again be the highest paid pitcher in the National league when the barrier is sprung in April.

Vance was the most effective twirler in either big league last season, although his record of 17 victories against 15 defeats was not so impressive as that of Robert Moses Grove, the American league leader, or of some others among the topnotchers. Most of Dazzy's defeats, however, were of the hard-luck variety.

Real effectiveness on the mound is measured, not by what team do to the opposition, but what the pitcher yields personally in the item that counts most—namely runs.

Vance yielded an average of only 2.16 runs per nine inning game. Grove's mark was 3.00 runs as the American league leader and Vance's

nearest National league rival, Carl Hubbell of the Giants, showed an allowance of 3.87 runs. This leaves a big gap between Dazzy and the rest of the field.

Vance, in 35 games, struck out 173 and issued 55 passes; Grove struck out 214 and walked 60 batters in an even 50 appearances.

The figures make a very good argument for Vance when it comes to any discussion of his contract terms for 1931.

Carl Walters, sports editor of the Meridian Star, writes: "In your Sport Slants I notice where you mention writers whose All-American picks came close to being identical with A. P. consensus."

"My All-American pick included seven of the A. P. selections: Sington, Baker, Ticknor, Carideo, Schwartz, Pinkert and Macaluso."

"My All-Southern selections, published two weeks prior to the release of the Associated Press All-Southern, was identical with the A. P. squad with one exception. I had Forquer of Kentucky at a guard post instead of Leathers of Georgia. In all other ten positions the two squads were the same."

The Pacific Coast league batting averages for 1930, recently compiled for winter's fun, furnished a number of good reasons for the major league scramble for player talent.

Earl Sheely of San Francisco, who topped the regulars with 403 in 183 games, was drafted by the Braves, who also have gained title to the runner-up, Wes Schulmerich of Los Angeles, whose mark was 380

BALL LEADERS SEE EXPANSION NEXT SEASON

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Southern baseball fans soon will know the boundaries of the 1931 baseball map of Dixie.

Officials of the three larger leagues—the Southern, Southeastern and South Atlantic—hope to have their clubs in line by early February.

Both the Southeastern and South Atlantic are considering expansion from six to eight-club circuits. The Southeastern has moved up its date for "final intention declarations" to February 1, while the South Atlantic expects to know definitely its personnel by that time.

The South Atlantic probably will have its same roster of last year—Augusta, Macon, Charlotte, Asheville, Greenville and Columbia—although the circuit is considering two new entrants, Spartanburg, Charleston and Florence, S. C., applied for membership at the league's November meeting. However President J. Marvin Wolfe at Augusta has announced his resignation and said he is seeking to sell the club.

The Piedmont league was raised from Class C to Class B, while the cotton states league was advanced from Class D to Class C. The Eastern League is to expand into Virginia, claiming Richmond and Norfolk as members.

Souther, beset by financial difficulties at Little Rock and Mobile and facing the prospect of a six-club loop, has given backers in these cities until January 8 to finish their maneuvers.

Inability to renew a contract for their playing field brought on the trouble at Little Rock. R. J. Allen, the majority owner, may shift the franchise to some other city—Knoxville hopes to get it.

PAT MILLER TO RETURN TO WAKE FOREST

Raleigh, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Frank S. "Pat" Miller, who last season showed the fans how a Demon Deacon eleven can play football, will be back on the job next season as head coach at Wake Forest.

After a bad year in 1929, Miller tendered his resignation last fall, effective at the end of the season. His team began clicking in old-time Demon Deacon form in 1930, however, and the old grads began to urge that he remain.

Last fall, following meetings of the college athletic council and the executive committee of the Board of Trustees, it was announced the former Fordham star had signed an agreement to tutor Deacon gridsters another year.

Next year will be Miller's third at Wake Forest. His eleventh year lost only to North Carolina in state competition and wound up the season in a blaze of glory by holding Duke Blue Devils to a 13 to 13 tie. Miller hails from Atlantic City, N. J.

While Wake Forest was ironing out the uncertainty regarding its coach situation, the situation remained practically unchanged at N. C. State. "Moon" Mullins, 1930 Notre Dame luminary, was prominently talked as a prospect to succeed John Van Liew as Wolfpack mentor.

Pageantry To Induct Rolph as Governor State of California

Sacramento, Cal.—(AP)—Three days of ceremonial "whoopee" have been set aside for the inauguration of California's new governor, James Rolph, Jr.

He will assume the state's executive chair January 6.

To California the event brings a state-wide outpouring of festive exuberance seldom paralleled in a governor's inauguration.

Bands and orchestras from all parts of the state will participate. Prairie schooners, stage coaches and a parade of forty-niners will be joined in pageantry.

The third day will be given over to a military review, the inaugural ceremonies themselves, and an inaugural ball in which the joyousness of gold rush days will be revived.

Rolph is the third "native son" in more than 50 years to move into the executive mansion. He was swept into office with a plurality of more than 634,000 votes.

Politically a wet, he carried the "arid" south, although he was deemed endorsement by prohibition organizations throughout the state.

A native-born San Franciscan, he carried Los Angeles, and in dozens of precincts and in one county he received almost every vote. From Los Angeles alone there will be a delegation of more than 500 persons at his inaugural.

Hollywood will send a score or more movie and talkies stars to furnish entertainment, and more than 20 towns and cities will send delegations of more than 100 official representatives each.

As mayor of San Francisco for nearly 20 years, the new governor and his ever-present buttonnere and boots became the welcome to California of distinguished visitors. He acquired a nickname of "Sunny Jim" and a personal acquaintance almost worldwide in scope.

New York, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today, one point higher on old January contracts, but generally 3 to 8 points lower in response to the relatively easy showing of Liverpool.

Covering was less active after the rather heavy buying of yesterday afternoon, but the early offerings were readily absorbed by a continuation of this demand which seemed to be combined with some trade buying. It was sufficient to send prices about 4 to 6 points net higher with March selling up to 10.22 and May to 10.48. The demand then slackened somewhat and prices slipped back within 2 points of yesterday's closing quotations under realizing.

Reports that efforts to settle the Lancashire mill controversy over the right to wear a propeller had failed and that a walk-out was feared on Monday may have been responsible for some of the early selling. Liverpool cables said there had been continental buying and trade calling supplied by realizing in that market.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The stock market finished the week still under the influence of new year's cheer today.

Shares prices were helped by the prompt submission of the four-party eastern railway consolidation plan to the Interstate Commerce Commission, by the improved tone in commodities, and by the pick-up in activity reported at automobile and steel plants.

Pivotal shares gained only modestly, few gains exceeding a point or two, but some of the volatile issues rushed up sharply, and trading was fairly active, the turnover for the short session aggregating 1,500,000 shares, last minute selling such as frequently appears at the end of the week was lacking, and final prices were the days best.

In rails Erie gained more than 2 and Baltimore and Ohio 2. Both will be aided materially by unification of their systems, as proposed. Pittsburgh and West Virginia, which is to be controlled by the four systems jointly, shot up 14 points. The market in that issue, however, is thin. Lackawanna, which is allocated to the New York Central, gained 2 points. Several western and southern rails were also strong. St. Louis Southwestern shot up nearly 6 points, and Illinois Central, Great Northern and Atlantic Coast Line gained 2 or more.

Such issues as U. S. Steel, Republic Steel common, Union Carbide, Texas Corp., Standard of New York and New Jersey, International Telephone, National Biscuit, gained a point or more.

The vigor of the advance was ascribed in part to its technical nature. There has probably been some long standing short positions in which profit taking was deferred until the turn of the year, for tax reasons.

The week-end trade and business reviews were generally of a

cheerful nature, of a character to help stocks. With freight car loadings, building contracts, electric power production, steel production and bank clearings showing somewhat less than the expected seasonal slump, resistance to depression seemed to be developing, although the fact that the year end was approached from an abnormally low level may have been a factor in limiting the usual decline.

Expectations that the turn of the year would bring improvement in steel mill operations seem to be bearing fruit. After reaching its lowest level during the Christmas week, ingot production in the Youngstown area are expected to increase next week for the second successive week. Schedules indicate aggregate production in that area will move up from 37 to 39 percent of capacity.

The better tone in the commodity markets was also encouraging. The cotton market, in particular, maintained the firmer tone recently apparent. In the dry goods markets, it is reported that fairly satisfactory holiday sales have resulted in bringing orders for replenishment, and that in distribution channels low inventories are restricting production are imparting a firm undertone to fabric prices.

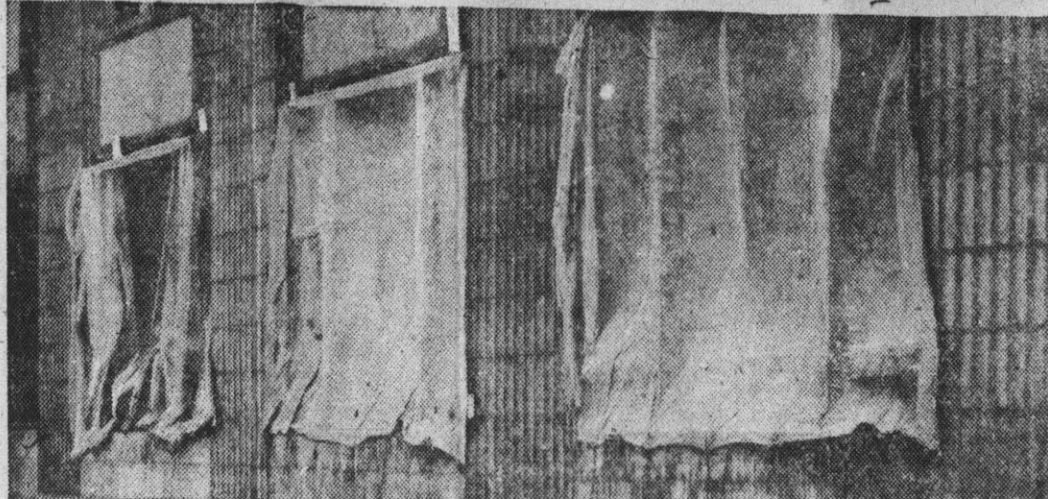

ed to the newspapermen the word "mort"—death—passed through the crowd. Men bared their heads, and women made the sign of the cross.

The news spread rapidly through Paris, bells tolled and official circles made preparations or honors in death, dute the man who in 1914 turned the invaders back from the very gates of Paris in the epic battle of the Marne.

His death removed from the world stage all save three of the great military leaders of the world war, Field Marshal Von Hindenburg and General Eric Ludendorff of Germany and General John J. Pershing of the United States. Of the French leaders of note only Marshal Petain, defender of Verdun, still lives, but, unlike Poch or Joffre he never was in supreme command of the French armies. One by one, Haig, Cadorna, Foch and others have passed from the scene.

Premier Steeg was the first to arrive at the hospital after announcement of the marshal's death. He was followed by Colonel Faur, former Joffre aide, and Jean Chippier, prefect of police. Ambassadors Edge, accompanied by Norman D. Armour, first secretary of the embassy, called shortly before the arrival of President Doumergue, General Gouraud and Marshal Pétain.

Colonel Desmazes announced soon after death that the body would be embalmed this afternoon preparatory to lying in state at the Chapel of the Ecole Militaire, the French military academy.

Marshal Joffre's final illness dated back many weeks, when complaining of a pain in his left leg his doctors found him a victim of arteritis. In his case the disease, which bring an inflammation of the arteries, settled in his legs and eventually a gangrenous condition developed which necessitated amputation.

On December 19 he was taken secretly in his own cabriolet to the hospital Saint Jean De Dieu and that night, under the influence of local anas'harsia only, he submitted to amputation of mid-thigh of his left leg. He would not take ether, informing the physicians, Professor Leriche, Dr. Boulin, and Dr. Fontaine, that he wished to see what they were doing to him.

His illness did not become known until the following week, when his doctors let it be known they had no hope for him and did not expect him to live more than a day or so at the most. Despite their pessimism the old soldier survived, much of the time in coma and semi-consciousness, his heart refusing to give in to illness which would have taken most men many times over.

He was kept alive during the last few days of injections of heavy doses of a serum which his physicians prepared.
