Vanguard Of Members Of General Assembly Reaches Capital City

Contests for Chairmanship of Important Committees Grips Attention of Early Arrivals; Senators Lee Gravely of Rocky Mount and Frank Dunlap of Wadesboro Expected to Head Senate Finance and Appropriations Committees

Raleigh, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Contests for the chairmanship of the committees of the Senate and House, which will dominate important legislation during the 1931 General Assembly, occupied the attention of the vanguard of the members of the legislature who arrived here today.

It may be a week before the committees are announced, however, Lieut.-Gov. R. T. Fountain, who according to custom will name the Senate committees, said last night in Rocky Mount that he would not name the Senate committees for a week, and the new Speaker of the House, whoever he is, is not expected to name his committees until the end of the week.

Senators Lee Gravely, of Rocky Mount, and Frank Dunlap of Wadesboro, are expected to head the Senate finance and appropriations committees. Both prefer the finance committee assignment, and it is still doubtful which one of his friends Fountain will choose.

The problem is complicated by the fact that Fountain is a candidate for Governor in 1932, and that there are a limited number of experienced men among whom he can choose for the major committee assignments.

Senators B. S. Womble of Winston-Salem, head of finance; L. P. Tapp if Kinston, head of appropriations; Tom Johnson of Lumberton, head of rules; and Carlisle Higgins of Allegheny, head of elections, are among the 1929 leaders who will not be back. Senator Will Clark of Edgecombe, head of the powerful committee on counties, cities and town in 1929, the committee which considers all local legislation will be in the Senate again, however, and he is slated for re-appointment.

In the House, the committee chairmanships cannot be considered until the contest for Speaker is out of the way. Willis Smith, of Raleigh, apparently has the lead, but O. B. Moss, of Springle Hope, and Fred Sutton of Kinston, have not conceded defeat. H. G. Connor of Wilson, is mentioned both as a dark horse candidate for Speaker and as chairman of the House finance committee. A. D. MacLean of Washington, is expected to be re-appointed as head of the education committee, and Dr. Moss is likely to be re-appointed as head of judiciary committee No. 1 if he is defeated for Speaker.

Meanwhile the open contests for clerkships have attracted the attention of legislators. Alex Lassiter, veteran clerk of the House since 1915, is fighting for his job against Thad Eure of Hertford, who apparently is in the lead.

Eure, a young member of the 1929 House was narrowly defeated in the primary. In sessions in the recent past, Lassiter has been without opposition, as he was regarded as invincible politically.

Democratic caucuses in which the contests for Speaker and principal clerk in the House, and the contest between Senators M. K. Blount of Pitt, and Rivers D. Johnston of Duplin, for President Protem of the Senate will be settled, will be on Tuesday night. Nominations for other minor offices will also be made.

The legislative session will begin on Wednesday, Jan. 7, with the first business being the election of the officers nominated by the Democratic caucus. Their election is assured, since the Republican membership in this legislature is the smallest that party has had in many years.

LIVE-AT-HOME DRIVE TO OPEN HERE JAN. 14TH

Team of Extension Workers to Visit the County in Interest of Program

North Carolina's second great "Live-at-Home" campaign will be brought to Pitt county on January 14 when a team of extension workers will hold a meeting with farmers, bakers and merchants at the county seat for the purpose of urging the people of the county to be self-supporting and to outline to them the necessity in these times of stress of growing not only a year-round ration for the farm family, but also for livestock.

The speakers in Pitt county will be B. T. Ferguson and Miss Helen E. Estabrook.

"Farm to Make a Living in 1931" is the slogan of the 1931 campaign, which is being conducted on a larger scale than ever before attempted by Dean I. O. Schaub, head of the extension service at N. C. State College. Dean Schaub is being assisted by C. A. Sheffield, assistant director and numerous special lists in all lines of farming and livestock enterprises.

As a result of last year's "Live-at-Home" campaign \$19,000,000 was actually added to the value of the food and feed crops in the State. This year Governor Garner has called upon the farm counties of the state to increase the value of food and feed crops by \$40,000,000, as a long step toward averting economic disaster.

Five teams of extension workers are taking part in the campaign and they started their tours of duty from the far eastern counties on January 6, covering five counties each day. It is the most ambitious campaign of its kind that has ever been attempted in North Carolina. Each extension team is composed of at least two speakers and those attending the meetings are being given an elaborate picture of the 1931 situation, said to be a critical farm period in the history of the state, and what is to be done if the serious problems are to be successfully met.

The speakers at the meetings are armed with facts on needed production, shortage where it exists, and a wealth of other information for presentation to the people of the counties. All this data has been carefully worked out in detail as it applies to the individual counties, says Dean Schaub, and guesswork has been eliminated in arriving at conclusions. Not only

GIRL PILOTS STILL IN AIR IN CALIFORNIA

Bobbie Trout and Edna Copper Attempt to Set New World's Endurance Record

Los Angeles, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Bobbie Trout and Edna May Cooper, girl pilots, circled their small monoplane through lowering clouds today, undaunted in their effort to set a new endurance flight record.

The girls took off at 2:30 P. M. (EST) yesterday in an effort to break the 42-hour, 16 minutes woman's endurance record now held by Miss Trout and Elinor Smith and hoped to threaten the men's record of 645 hours, 28 minutes, 30 seconds held by Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien, of St. Louis.

"They went aloft with a light load and made three refueling contacts before dark. During the second contact a rope used to lower the girls' dinner basket from the refueling plane blew back and fouled the controls of the all of the "Lady Rolph" the endurance ship.

Displaying iron nerve, Miss Trout at the controls of the "Lady Rolph" and Hudd Husey, at the controls of the refueling ship, flew close together in order to keep the rope slack, while Miss Cooper, a former film actress, made a daring trip along the cat-walk and untangled the rope.

Throughout the night at intervals of an hour the lights of the "Lady Rolph" blinked twice, signals that all was well aboard.

The girls were forced down on New Year's Day in their first take off for the endurance flight. The refueling plane would not function, and their gasoline supply ran out.

THREE AYDEN BOYS JAILED FOR ROBBERY

Charged With Entering Three Stores At Ayden During Saturday Night

Three young white men of the Ayden community were held in the county jail here today charged with the robbery of three stores at Ayden Saturday night.

The youths, Jack Cullifer, Harvey Griffin and Calvin Cox, were arrested by sheriff's officers Sunday morning, and were immediately brought to Greenville and placed in jail. They will face hearing at the criminal term of Pitt County Superior court the week of January 19.

The stores robbed were Munford's market, Bryon's Grocery and Roy Turnage. Furs valued at \$40 were obtained at Munford's market. One hundred dollars worth of cigarettes was missed at Bryon's store, and furs valued at \$120 were taken from Turnage's store.

Officers stated this morning that most of the stolen property had been recovered, with exception of the furs taken from Munford's market.

Red Cross to Aid Hungry In Arkansas

England, Ark., Jan. 5.—(AP)—A rising tide of hunger, which Saturday moved 300 or more drought-ridden farmers to sanitarium threats against merchants, promised to be stemmed effectively today as the Red Cross prepared to feed all who asked aid.

Red Cross authorities estimated their immediate allowance would not last longer than tonight, but a statement of future policy was expected today from the relief organization following a hurried conference and visit here of Albert Evans, Red Cross relief director for Arkansas, and Henry M. Barker, special representative of the national organization.

A plea for orderly requisitioning of supplies has been issued by local relief authorities. Albert Walls, county Red Cross chairman, yesterday assured needy farmers "no body was going to starve."

These assurances from relief quarters were believed to have a steadying influence upon farmers in this section, many of them destitute through a combination of economic conditions, drought and virtual failure of the money crop, cotton.

Unfavorable Weather Delays Take Off Of Ocean Fliers Until Wednesday

Mrs. Beryl Hart and Lieut. W. S. MacLaren Mark Time At Norfolk, Awaiting Lifting of Thick Weather Before Continuing Flight to Paris

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Beryl Hart and Lieut. W. S. MacLaren, said at noon today that weather permitting they will hop off at six a. m. tomorrow on their pioneering trans-Atlantic freight flight to Paris.

The damaged sextant that resulted in their failure to find Bermuda, the first stop of their projected flight Saturday had been replaced, and naval mechanics at the Hampton Roads naval air station were overhauling the motor preparatory to the take-off tomorrow.

Both MacLaren and Mrs. Hart watched work on their ship after nearly 12 hours of sleep. They awoke to find that a sextant had been procured from Annapolis, with financial arrangements made through friends of MacLaren in New York.

"We are going to take off in the morning," Mrs. Hart said with her eyes sparkling as she spoke of the trip. "And we are going to get there, and fly back."

She said the motor had been running beautifully and that she had no fear that the gasoline capacity of the huge tanks of their white monoplane "Tradedwind" would be insufficient for their longest hop from Bermuda to the Azores. She estimated that the trip from Hampton Roads to Bermuda would require about six hours.

"We'll be there for lunch, with favorable weather," she said.

The loss of a sextant, broken soon after the start of the flight from New York Saturday, was blamed by the fliers for their failure to locate Bermuda, forcing a return here after 16 hours of flying.

They set a course of dead reckoning after losing their sextant and picked up three steamers in their path, but a heavy mist far out at sea forced them to fly at a low altitude near Bermuda and prevented them from finding the island. They turned back and landed here at 9:25 Saturday night with their gasoline supply running low.

Navy fliers gave them aid and Lieutenant E. C. Ewen flew to Annapolis for a new sextant lens. A news organization the fliers had expected to make the deposit failed to do so last night, however, and reluctantly, they retired.

Thoroughly overhauled and an oil leak repaired by navy mechanics the "Tradedwind" was tuned for the flight today, and should the deposit money be forthcoming was ready for an immediate takeoff.

Ruys Work of Art

CREW SAVED FROM SINKING BOAT IN N. Y.

Army Dredge Goes to Bottom of Harbor After Being Rammed By Large Liner

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Fifty-seven officers and men were rescued from the sinking army dredge Raritan, which settled to the bottom of New York harbor thirty minutes after it was rammed today by the liner, City of Montgomery.

The ship, inward bound from Savannah with passengers, ran down the dredge in a heavy haze that lay over the harbor. The mail boat President and a police launch, which were nearby, rescued all but two of the crew after they took off from the damaged craft in lifeboats. The City of Montgomery docked with her bow damaged.

The last two, who hung to the mainmast as the dredge settled into the water, were rescued by two sailors from the President, who rowed to them in a small boat.

The Raritan, built in 1908 at a cost of \$191,000, was 290 feet long and had a displacement of 3,911 tons. She was a sister ship of the Navesink, which sank two years ago off Staten Island with a loss of more than twenty lives.

Samuel F. Watts of Southport, N. C., third mate of the Raritan, was on the bridge at the time of the collision.

"We were bound out with a load, proceeding slowly in the haze," he said, "when I saw the City of Montgomery bearing down on us. I blew a sharp blast calling her to change her course, but in a minute I saw the crash could not be averted."

"I did the best I could to get out of the liner's way by throwing the wheel hard to port, and ordering full reverse for the starboard engines, but the liner struck us square amidships, on the port side."

Before that happened he had warned the crew of the dredge of the danger, and they manned the boats immediately after the collision.

MISS WATERS PASSES AWAY

Greenville Young Woman Succumbs to a Brief Attack of Pneumonia

Miss Alvah "Bobbie" Waters, 26, died this afternoon at 12:30 o'clock following a week's illness from pneumonia.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home of her mother, Mrs. A. N. Waters, near Pactolus tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. Richard Bagby, pastor of the Washington Christian church, will officiate. Burial will be made in the family burying ground near Pactolus.

She is survived by her mother, a brother, M. G. Waters, of Washington, and four sisters, Mrs. J. R. Vinters, Elizabeth City; Mrs. R. T. Chauncey, Pactolus; Mrs. H. G. Wilson, Robertsonville; and Miss Blanch Waters, of Lumberton.

Prior to her illness, Miss Waters was connected with the bookkeeping department of Sugg Motor Company. Previous to her connection with this firm she was in the employ of the Pitt County Health Department for six or seven years. She was a member of the Eighth Street Church of Christ.

Miss Waters was well known in this and other parts of the county and was held in high esteem by a wide circle of friends.

Gastonia Banker Laid to Rest Today

Gastonia, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Funeral services for J. Lee Robinson, 58, president of the closed First National Bank of Gastonia, will be held today.

Mr. Robinson died early yesterday, four hours after he had been found slumped over a gas range in his home. Several of the jets were open.

Relatives said Mr. Robinson had been suffering from a nervous breakdown since the closing of his bank December 16. His first public appearance since that date was Saturday when he subscribed \$25,000 to the stock of a new corporation which planned to re-open the institution.

FRANCE PAYS LAST TRIBUTE TO WAR HERO

Thousands Filed Past Bier of Marshal Joffre At the Ecole Militaire

Paris, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Men who fought with Marshal Joffre at the Marne and others who live the lives they do because that battle was fought and won, today filed past the bier of the savior of France.

There was weeping as the thousands, crushed close together outside the Ecole Militaire until nine o'clock, lined up to take their final glance at the body of Marshal Joffre, laid out on a camp bed in the chapel of the old military academy.

Hands folded and holding a crucifix, sword resting on his knee, over his feet, an wearing a single decoration, the French military medal, the body of the marshal was laid out with all the simplicity which has marked his career from the days of the victory at Tannenberg to death Saturday in the Hospital St. Jean Dedic.

The body was clad in the loose black coat and obsolete red pants of a colonial general of division, which was the rank Joffre held at the battle of the Marne. On 19 pillows placed about the simple camp bed were his other 42 decorations and honors. At each corner of the bed stood an officer; at the head was another, while at each corner of the catafalque there was a mortar, emblematic of "trench warfare."

The crowd which lined past the body today seemed most unrestrained; hands were clenched, tears were shed unashamed and gaunt grizzled men uttered sobs as pitiful as those of children. Among them were men with patches on their eyes, some on crutches, some on wooden legs, others without arms and many more showed the traces of other wartime wounds.

The line will continue to pass before the bier until perhaps 10 P. M. tonight, and will be resumed tomorrow. Wednesday at dawn the body will be taken out for a dual religious and state funeral which will differ in only a few details from that of Marshal Foch, who preceded him nearly two years to the grave. From the Ecole Militaire the body will go to Notre Dame for the requiem of the dead.

Mintz, who recently drew \$6,000, his life savings, out of a bank, had been robbed of the whole amount. Mintz put the money in a small safe at his home. While he and his family were out thieves entered the home and carried the safe away. It was found the next day shattered open and all of the money gone.

Statesmen Burdened With New Topics for Debate and Controversies Which Have Arisen During the Christmas Holidays; Program Largely Cut and Dried Affair of Essential Legislation, But With Many Members Having Different Ideas Concerning Their Passage

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Burdened with new topics for debate and with controversies which have arisen during the Christmas holidays, Congress gathered today for the final half of the short session.

The program laid out by the leaders was largely a cut and dried affair of essential legislation but many members have different ideas.

Serious efforts were in prospect for passage of relief bills not included in the administration's plan. The question of payments on World War veterans bonus certificates was in for strong agitation in both branches. Numerous other controversial projects found supporters.

Critical debate on the proposed plan of unifying eastern railroads into four systems and a move to reconsider the nominations of some members of the power commission were imminent in the Senate.

Yet the administration steersmen spoke hopefully of passing before March 4—the mandatory adjournment date—all seven of the departmental appropriation bills, deficiency appropriations and such other measures as they have included in their program.

They believed the world court issue would be removed definitely from among their worries, anticipating a formal announcement from President Hoover that he would not call a special session of the Senate alone to consider ratification.

The leaders planned for quick passage of an appropriation bill to make available the \$45,000,000 authorized before Christmas for loans to drought stricken farmers. Behind it they wished to move in rapid order the routine appropriations.

A deficiency appropriation of \$92,393,000, including \$55,750,000 to meet emergencies in the administration of veterans' affairs, and \$34,000,000 to Federal highway aid, was recommended today to the House by its appropriation committee.

The sum of \$38,250,000 was needed, the committee reported, for aid to veterans authorized under the pension and disability Act of last July, while \$19,500,000 is required to meet the increased pensions granted civil and Spanish American war veterans under the liberalized Act of last June.

General Frank T. Hines, administrator of veterans' affairs, advised the committee that further sums probably would be needed before the end of this Congress, as a result of new legislation granting disability compensation and hospitalization to men not injured in the war.

"The \$4,000,000 item for Federal highway aid, was to meet expenditures of states under the fund increased last year from \$75,000,000 to \$125,000,000 annually and to assist in the disposal of the \$80,000,000 recently made available for state use on highway construction."

An allotment of \$895,760 was made to the Justice Department, of which \$543,275 is for the prohibition bureau.

Testifying before the committee on the present measure, General Hines warned that care must be taken by Congress in legislating for the World War Veterans.

"We have 4,500,000 men to deal with," he said, "and any benefit granted, no matter how small, is bound to run into terrific amounts of money, when you take it in the aggregate."

cured from the fund, farmers would be required to state they would be unable to farm during 1931 unless money was advanced by the federal government.

As to allotting the fund to the different states, Warburton said an elastic apportionment was made.

"If we find there is an actual need beyond the estimate," he continued, "we hold a reserve to supplement that, or we cut down what has been allotted somewhere else."

Tentative plans of the department call for offices to administer the fund at St. Louis, Grand Forks, North Dakota, and possibly in the southern Mississippi Valley in addition to the office here.

Local advisory committees, consisting of a prominent banker and two leading farmers are to aid the agricultural agents in making the loans, the maximum to one person amounting to about \$2,000 with the average about \$350. All of the loans are to be secured.

The charts also graphically reveal short ages in what crops more acreage is necessary and give in actual figures the amounts which farmers are forced to spend outside on foodstuffs and feeds and also the surpluses on their value in dollars and cents. These charts show in no uncertain terms what the counties must do if they are to feed themselves and keep thousands of dollars from going outside their own domains.

ASK COURT TO DEFER ACTION ON DRY ISSUE

Counsel Seeks to Postpone Consideration of Judge Clark's Decision At This Time

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The Supreme Court was asked today to postpone until April 15 the hearing of the government's appeal from the New Jersey decision holding the eighteenth amendment invalid.

Counsel supporting the opinion handed down by Federal Judge Clark said other engagements would prevent their appearing before that date.

Frederick M. P. Pearce, as their spokesman, criticized the brief filed by Solicitor General Thacher as incomplete. He said the government seemed to take for granted that the Supreme Court "is foreclosed from considering the points raised by us and favorably passed upon by the court below."

Pearce submitted a memorandum saying his side of the case would show that the question presented by the appeal, that of ratification of constitutional amendments by state conventions rather than by state legislatures, had never been passed upon by the Supreme Court.

He contended no previous decision of the highest court prevents it from giving the question the consideration its importance demands.

Pearce insisted the Clark decision was in no way interfering with enforcement of the law. There was, he declared, no good reason for the haste with which the government was attempting to bring its appeal

to hearing before the Supreme Court.

He said prohibition amendment, "was not proposed by Congress in the usual form to the legislatures or even generally, but was, in turn, proposed to the states for their adoption; the only instance of such a proposal."

cases and the second to criminal.

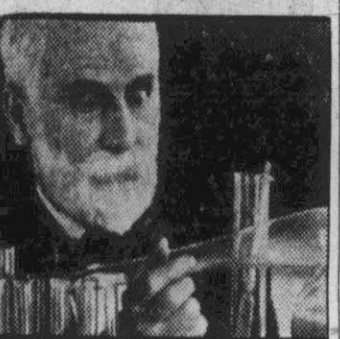
The civil calendar contains ap-

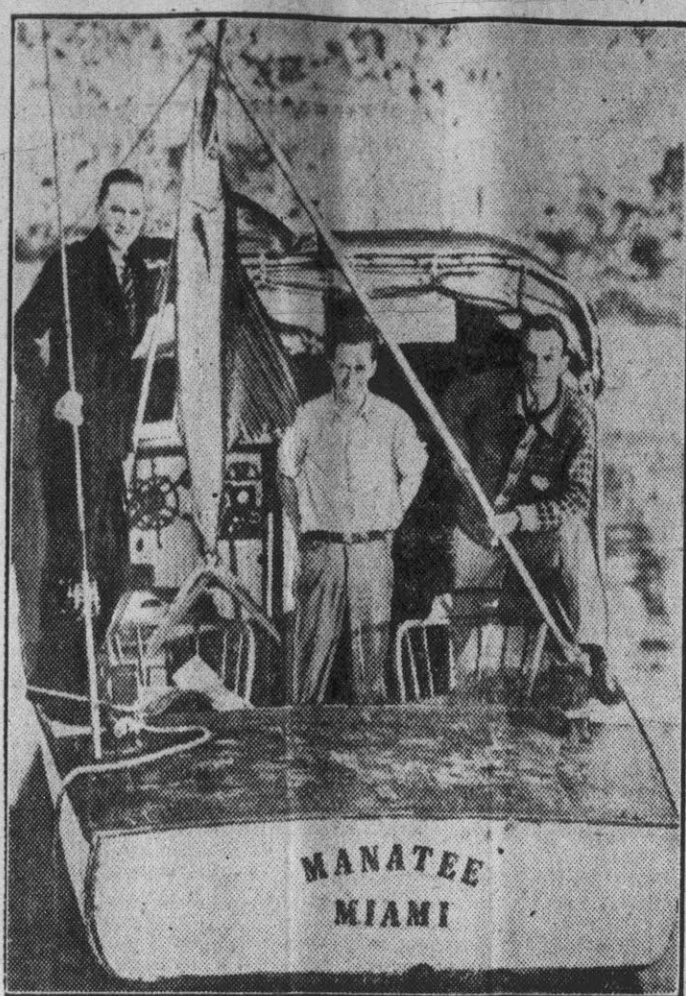

ing and has been condensed into the very attractive form which casual bystanders are prone to regard as a writing name.

Just as I heard one bystander, years ago when a certain eminent playwright and producer was a golf reporter, say:

"You've got a swell writing name, Pat McNutt—now what's your real name?"

Billy broke out before he was quite 13 years old, at the Milwaukee Country club, by winning a caddies' championship, and he has played golf steadily and creditably ever since. At 18 he won the amateur event in connection with the Wisconsin P. G. A. championship, the next year won the championship of the Wisconsin municipal golfers' association.

In 1925, Billy qualified in the western amateur at Detroit, and failed by only two strokes of qualification in the national amateur at Oakmont—that was the year they only qualified sixteen, and Francis Ouimet and a lot of great golfers were left out.

He qualified in the western again the next year lost in a play-off the following year, and in 1929 again qualified at Kansas City. In all three western championships and in the national, Sixty has lost in the first round, which made it more convenient for him to do his further reporting of the event, though he certainly is to be absolved of any intent on those grounds.

Among the records Billy Sixty has set, some of which still are upright, may be mentioned his 69 at the Grant Park course, South Milwaukee; later reduced to 68; his 69 on the Michawauke course and his 67 at the Tripoli and he holds the amateur record of 70 for the Brown-Deer course, Milwaukee and at Ozaukee in 1924 turned in an even 30 for the first nine, par 35.

I have encountered Billy in both a golfing and a writing capacity at many tournaments.

He is a corking good golf reporter and feature writer. Naturally enough, he understands the game rather well; and I always have felt it would lend an air of authenticity to golf writing if the writer could stick around "Old Man Par" occasionally.

This writer never could do that. Billy can. I think he's the only bona fide working pressman in America who can.

Bobby's Stance Before the "Mike" May Be Shaky

Atlanta.—(AP)—Bobby Jones is afraid of the microphone. The quadruple champion of the golfing world will not go before the "mike" with the same calm self-assurance that has marked his strenuous conquest of the greens. Beginning January 14, Bobby will begin a 26-week series of 15-minute radio talks over a nationwide network.

He will tell the invisible audience of his experiences during the past 14 years, and hopes that "we'll all have a lot of fun out of it."

But to his closest friends he agrees with Ruth Bryan Owen that "if you want to know what a job is, try having yourself shut up in a sound-proof room with a miniature electric fan, and try to tell it funny stories."

The golfer's talks are not, of course, to be funny, except as he recalls some incident in his career that has become humorous with the passing of years. His talks are to be given in his own casual, conversational style.

He will describe the highlights of his golfing and from time to time

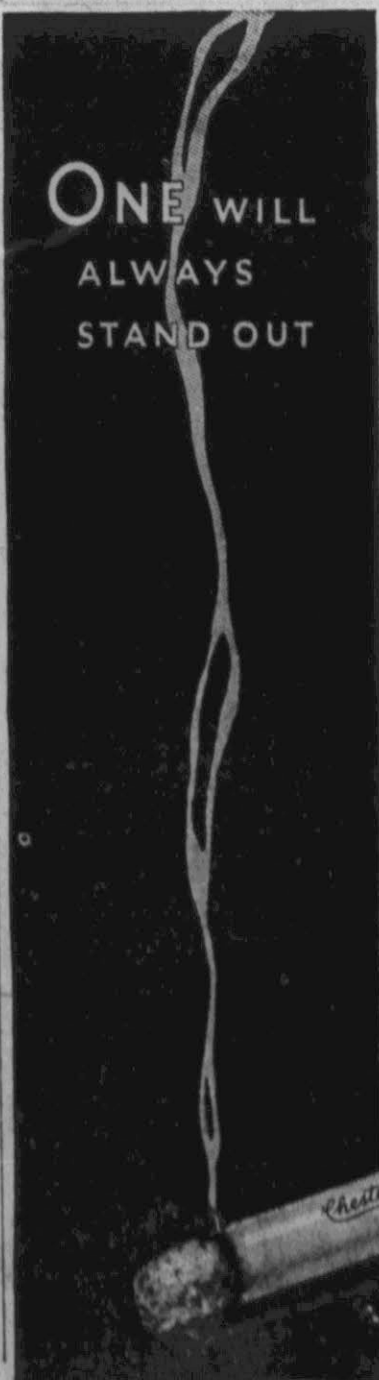

COTTON MARKET

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 1 to 7 points on further covering and some trade buying in the face of rather disappointing Liverpool cables.

The advance met some Southern selling as well as realizing and was followed by moderate setbacks with March contracts selling off from 10.26 to 10.25 and July from 10.82 to 10.73 as soon as the initial demand had been supplied. There appeared to be considerable cotton wanted around the 10.1-4 cent level for March contracts, however, and the market was holding fairly steady at the end of the first half hour.

Cable advices reporting that 14,000 employees of nine cotton textile mills at Bugley, Lancashire had gone on strike this morning over the eight-hour per weaver system being tried by employers, appeared to have little effect on the early market here. Liverpool attributed the relatively easy ruling of the market there to hedging and said that sales of cloths and yarns were below production with buyers cautious.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Good cheer still prevailed in the financial markets at the start of the week.

Last week's 10-point advance, as measured by the average 90 issues, was wide enough to bring considerable profit taking into the spare market and to tempt bears to try for a technical reaction, but news from Washington or partial modification of the packers consent decree bolstered the list after the first hour. Early losses of 1 to 4 points were mostly recovered by early afternoon, and several shares showed net advances of 1 to 6. Further improvement in bonds also helped stocks.

In the packing stocks, Beechnut, Wilson preferred and Armour of Delaware, and Illinois preferred shares sold up 2 to more than 3. Several preferred issues elsewhere were included in the incline to rally. Issues selling up 2 to 3 included Johns-Manville, Lambert, Byers, American Locomotive, preferred, postal preferred, Second National Investors preferred and Missouri, Kansas Texas preferred, U. S. Steel regained most of a 1-1/2 point loss, and after declining 2 to 4 points, American Telephone, Case, Eastman and Allied Chemical recovered substantially. Firms developed in the motion pictures, Auburn shot up 6.

Call money renewed at 1-1/2 per cent, to which level it had fallen on Friday. This is the lowest renewal rate since Sept. 29. It was offered in the outside market again at one per cent.

"Sanction of the Alabama athletic authorities, the dispatch said, is expected for an adjustment of a situation caused by the employment of Thomas as of January 1 while Wade's contract did not expire until September 1.

Wade has contracted to take charge of football at Duke University, Durham, N. C., September 1. He may go to Durham soon for a conference, but is reported considering enjoining upon a long deferred vacation before assuming his position there.

Thomas, former University of Georgia backfield coach, accompanied Alabama to the Rose Bowl on invitation of Alabama's president.

Jess Neely and Shorty Propst, Alabama assistant coaches, are reported under consideration for replacement there, and no announcement has been made of Wade's aides, at Duke.
