WARNS SOUTH TO CUT NEXT COTTON CROP

Carl Williams Stresses Importance of Diversification and Credit

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 12.—(AP)—Carl Williams, member of the Federal Farm Board, today admonished the south to feed itself and help farmers acquire credit as a means of reducing cotton acreage.

He came to Memphis to attend a conference of the Southern Association of Commissioners of Agriculture, called to study means for reducing cotton production and increasing its consumption.

Before the conference convened he issued a statement, saying "the problem of cotton acreage reduction will solve itself if the south will feed itself."

He said bankers and merchants should demand of their farmer-customers and debtors assurance that sufficient feed and food for their stock and themselves be grown.

Whether cotton production can be reduced sufficiently to meet the present depression and expected carry-over of 8,500,000 bales "is up to the south itself," he added.

"Production must be forced to lag while industry throughout the world is catching up. The problem of increasing consumption depends on restoration of the buying power of the people."

"People are not buying now and they haven't the money to buy whether they are in England or Arkansas."

Williams cited the Georgia and Texas Bankers Associations' programs of insisting upon growth on farms of feed and food for home needs and said that in this lies at least part of the answer to problems facing the south.

Generally, he said, a 12,000,000-bale total production instead of the usual 14,500,000 or more is the maximum which can be grown "without disastrous results" this year.

He said a 10,000,000 bale crop would be still more desirable because of over-production in the past.

Congress was urged "to do everything humanly possible to expedite the passage of all relief measures now pending," in a resolution submitted to the commissioners.

Williams said he believed the Red Cross and not the federal government should be entrusted with the relief of human suffering. Senator Caraway, of Arkansas, has asked a \$15,000,000 appropriation for human food for poverty-stricken

farmers, while another measure has suggested a \$10,000,000 appropriation to the Red Cross.

Lenoir Optician Victim of Paralysis

Lenoir, N. C., Jan. 12.—(AP)—Dr. Alfred W. Dula, widely known eye specialist and Lenoir civic leader, died this morning of paralysis. He had been ill more than a week. Gravelly so since he suffered a second stroke Friday.

Funeral service will be conducted at the First Methodist church here tomorrow morning. The widow and five children survive.

Skyland Clerk Kidnapped And Robbed Sunday

Asheville, Jan. 12.—(AP)—L. A. Hays Hensley, clerk, at the store of C. O. Cass, at Skyland, was held up and kidnapped a few minutes after midnight yesterday morning. Three masked men entered the store, pointed guns at Hensley and ordered him to give them the money in the cash register. This amounted to \$2.

The men directed Hensley to accompany them to their car and they put him inside and drove to Royal Pines and one the Sweeten

Creek road where they stopped, took a watch and \$2 from Hensley's pockets and released him. As he was leaving the store, Hensley threw his pocketbook with several bills to one side of the road. Later he recovered his pocketbook and the money it contained.

Hensley was unable to identify his captors.

Another attempt was made to enter the store one night last week.

The case comes from North Carolina where he Great Atlantic and other chain stores challenged validity of a 1929 law which imposed a tax of \$50 on each store operated in the state by chain companies.

Fascist Regime Fights Unrest; Idleness Grows

Rome, (AP)—The Fascist regime like many another national admin-
istration, is feeling the reactions of
the business depression with ac-
companying unemployment and
political unrest.

There have been a number of
recent instances of Communist and
anti-Fascist activity. Attempts of
the government to improve econo-
mic conditions by scaling down
costs have not stifled all the under-
cover mummings.

Unemployment, government fig-
ures show, is on the increase. Many
key industries are operating on
part time; others have announced
winter shutdowns.

To combat this situation, Musso-
lini's government started a rigorous
campaign for wage and price re-
ductions. It set the example by
reducing the salaries of government
employees an average of twelve and
a half per cent.

The pay cuts have spread through-
out all phases of Italian industry. But
rents and prices of manufactured
articles have followed the down-
ward trend somewhat slowly. The
average reduction in them has been
about ten per cent.

Business interests are reaching
out for markets in other countries
and are getting every possible aid
from the government. The out-
standing accomplishment in this
respect was the commercial accord
with Russia by which the Soviets
agreed to buy \$10,000,000 worth of
Italian goods within the year end-
ing June 30, 1931.

While it was not so nominated in
the bond, there has been a natural
reciprocal purchase of coal, oil,
timber and ores from Russia and
industrialists see in this trade a
source of low cost raw material that
will help Italy to get increasingly
larger slices of foreign markets.

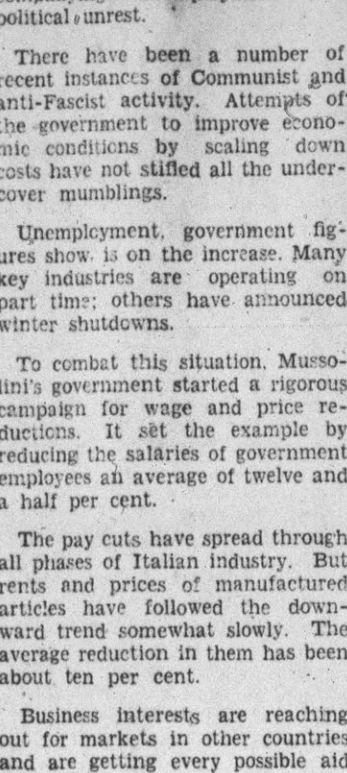

NOTHING IN THE WAY OF HEAVY BOUT

New York, Jan. 12.—(AP)—If astute observers have interpreted the signs correctly, all obstacles in the path of a heavyweight title match between Max Schmeling and Young Stribling have been cleared away and their managers are ready to sign on the dotted line.

Some of the more optimistic of the experts voiced the opinion today that the bout would be "made" within 24 hours, but the more conservative were inclined to believe that several minor odds and ends would have to be disposed of first.

Certainly there were definite indications that "Pa" Stribling, father-manager of the Macon, Ga. heavyweight, and promoters for the Hearst fund were close to an agreement. Schmeling already is under contract to the milk fund.

According to the best available advice, the bout, if all goes well, will be held next June in Jersey City. The biggest hitch in the milk fund's negotiations with the elder Stribling has been the demand that Stribling, providing he whips Der Maxie in June, agrees to meet Jack Sharkey in September in defense of his title.

"Pa" has taken the position that the game could not stand two heavy weight title fights in one outdoor season. A compromise may be effected on the basis of an agreement by Stribling to meet Sharkey for the milk fund at some future date, possibly in the summer of 1932. This effort of promoters to include Sharkey in the heavyweight scheme has been viewed as an attempt to placate the New York State Athletic Commission which has nominated the Boston sailor as the outstanding contender and relieved Schmeling of his crown because he refused to sign immediately for a return match with Sharkey.

COTTON MARKET

New York, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today 2 to 3 points lower in response to relatively easy cables and rather unfavorable construction of the standard cloth statistics for December and the British Board of Trade reports on exports of cotton, cloths and yarns for the past month.

March contracts sold off to 10.19 and July to 10.63, making net declines of about 5 to 9 points on the active months, but the offerings were comparatively light and the market was holding fairly steady at the end of the first half hour on a little trade buying or covering.

Trade interests were credited with buying near months and selling the latter deliveries again this morning. The standard cloth statistics showed an increase of two per cent in stocks on hand at the end of the month while unfilled orders showed a decrease of 13.3 per cent.

According to the New York Cotton-Exchange service, domestic consumption for December amounted to 415,000 bales compared with 452,000 in December a year ago. British Board of Trade returns showed exports of cotton cloths for December amounting to 130,000,000 yards compared with 274,000,000 for the same month in 1929.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 12.—(AP)—An obviously tired stock market sought refuge in a decline today, although the volume of trading was considerably lighter than the turnover on recent advances.

Heaviness of the rails, which had been piloting the new year rally, together with the failure of U. S. Steel to respond to its favorable unfilled tonnage report, were signals for renewed activity by the shorts, who also looked ahead to the unfavorable quarter earnings reports which soon will be appearing in bulk.

After an early sag, the market improved somewhat toward noon but speculative sentiment refused to be stimulated by this rally and the downward trend was resumed, gathering a little momentum as it proceeded. The largest losses were in carrier and specialty shares, although all groups were affected.

Atchafon, Reading and New York Central sank 4 points, while Erie, Delaware & Hudson, Baltimore & Ohio, Southern, and Frisco dropped about 3. This was also the extent of the decline in Westinghouse, Alton Chemical, Republic Steel, and Eastman Kodak.

U. S. Steel, after making up an early loss of a point, slipped off again and joined a sizeable group including American Can, Case, Auburn Auto, R. H. Macy, Gulf States Steel, Union Pacific and Rock Island, that showed recessions of 2 to 3-4.

There were temporary rallies in a few specialties, notably Gillette and Continental Baking preferred, but the small gains were reduced. Shell Union Oil preferred soared 7 points.

Professional traders who returned to the short side argued that the optimism attending upon the turn of the year had shown signs of waning and that the market might be said to have discounted much of the seasonal improvement in business that has appeared so far. It was also pointed out that there had been no important corrective reac-

N. C. GAINS IN MANUFACTURE COTTON GOODS

State Produced 18.1 Per Cent of All the Goods Made In U. S. During 1927

Raleigh, Jan. 12.—(AP)—North Carolina produced 18.1 percent of all the cotton goods manufactured in the United States in 1927, the last year for which complete data are available, according to figures assembled by statistician Bryan W. Sipe of the department of conservation and development.

In 1909 North Carolina's share was only 9.3 percent; in 1914 it was 11 percent; in 1919 it was 14.9 percent and in 1923 it was 15.4 percent. Thus during the last two decades North Carolina has shown a consistent gain as a cotton goods center.

During this period her percent of gain was 94.6 percent. During this same period Georgia's share of the cotton goods business has increased from 6.2 percent to 10.5 percent, making a total gain of 70.9 percent.

Alabama's share of this business has increased from 3 to 4.5 percent; making a total gain of 50 percent; while South Carolina's share has grown from 9.6 percent to 13.8 percent, making a total gain of 43.7 percent.

It will be noted that South Carolina led all other Southern states in 1909, but by 1914 she has taken second place, which she still maintains. However, she made the smallest percent of gain of any of the four leading southern cotton manufacturing states, Mr. Sipe pointed out.

The gain in cotton manufacturing in the south, as reflected in the above figures, has been made at the expense of New England and the one Middle Atlantic state of Pennsylvania. During the past two decades under review Pennsylvania has experienced a loss of 36.7 percent in her share of the cotton goods manufacturing; Rhode Island, a loss of 34 percent; Connecticut a loss of 40 percent; New Hampshire of 19.6 percent; Maine a loss of 41.4 percent and Pennsylvania a loss of 13.5 percent of her 1909 share of the cotton goods manufacturing business.

Because of her many advantages over some of her Southern rivals, North Carolinians continued to be sought after as the location for textile plants of various sorts, Mr. Sipe said.

Although no expression was received here today from J. W. Holmes, of Farmville, third member of the General Assembly from this county, it was understood that he was in hearty accord with the program looking to reduction of expenses and tax relief. The statements of Senator Blount and Representative Flanagan follow:

Senator Blount's statement: The General Assembly opened on January 7th and during the first week the Senate and House were organized and are now getting down to real work. It appears that Governor Gardner, from his message to the joint session of the House and Senate, intends to economize in every way possible in an effort to reduce taxes. He will have the support of all the members from the East in his efforts in this direction and I firmly believe that everything possible will be done to relieve land taxes. Of course, there are some who will have to share this burden and it will be necessary not only to cut down expenses but to raise additional revenue from other sources in order to bring about a reasonable tax reduction on land. I fully realize the necessity of bringing about every possible readjustment and economy in our governmental affairs to the end that taxes may be reduced, and it is going to be my one aim and purpose to support such measures that will bring about this result. I also know that the other representatives from this county and the entire eastern part of the State are determined to do likewise. The Lieut. Governor and the speaker of the House of Representatives will announce tomorrow, Tuesday, the various committees and chairmanships, and, of course, when this is done real work in the Legislature will begin. No one feels the responsibility more than I do and I welcome at all times suggestions from the citizens of my county."

Representative Flanagan's observations: "I am very much pleased with the personnel of both the House and Senate. I think both parties are determined to do something for the people in the way of reduction of taxes, and that strict economy will be exercised in all branches of government."

The governor made a great impression on the General Assembly and a large majority in favor of the most of his recommendations. I feel sure the governor has given the economic problem of the State much study and has the best interest of the people at heart.

The first few days of the General Assembly were given over entirely to the organization of both House and Senate and a few bills of minor importance were introduced.

The body will get down to work this week when all of the standing committees are appointed. In my opinion the legislature as a whole is determined to do all it can for the people.

The House has been organized on the most economical basis possible and will be run on less expense than any other time in years."

(Continued from page one) thought that the intellectual relations between our two nations should be closer. Having the same culture and sensibilities, we should unite our efforts to advance our scientific achievements and our artistic genius."

He preferred, he said not to go into the problems of disarmament at this time but with a gentle insistence he said he considered it only wise that France should maintain a fleet large enough to protect her vast and widely separated colonial responsibilities.

"I reject," he said, "at the decision of President Hoover and the American Congress to take part in the great colonial exposition at Paris this year, but what has most deeply moved the people of France is America's preservation of Mount Vernon, the home of General Washington, whose memory is revered in France as in the United States."

"So many memories bind our two nations that I am confident that in the future we will continue to labor together in friendly, mutual trust striving to consolidate the peace of the world."

Tepec, Nayarit, Mexico, Jan. 12.—(AP)—In the breasts of hundreds of Mexican felons imprisoned on Las Tres Marias Island prison colony today was a desperate fear of a natural cataclysm which will sink their island home into the sea and drown them all.
