Prohibition Department Receives Large Increase For Enforcement Drive

Immigration Department Also Gets Larger Slice in \$135,739,668 Supply Bill for the State, Justice, Labor and Commerce Departments Reported to the House This Morning; \$2,369,500 Allowed for 500 Additional Prohibition Agents

Washington, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Large increases for enforcement of prohibition and immigration laws were included in the \$135,739,668 supply bill for the state, justice, labor and commerce departments reported today to the House.

An increase of \$2,369,500 allowed by the House appropriations committee for 500 additional agents in the prohibition bureau, resulted in the filing of a minority report by Representative Tinkham, Republican, Massachusetts.

In all the prohibition bureau was allotted \$11,369,000 for the next fiscal year. The total carried for the justice department was \$51,239,000, an increase of \$5,849,000. The labor department figure was \$13,830,000, with an increase of more than one million for deportation of aliens and other immigration bureau uses. The commerce department total was cut slightly below the current year to \$53,949,000, with a reduction of more than \$2,000,000 for the bureau of fisheries, aeronautics and other divisions. The state department allotment was \$16,661,000, a cut of less than a million from the current year.

The total for the four departments was \$2,411,000 below budget estimates, but \$5,831,000 above total expenditures for the present fiscal year.

Tinkham's minority report asserted:

"The 500 additional enforcement officers provided for in the bill will add a new measure to the corruption, lawlessness and perjury now generally connected with the enforcement of prohibition, and must increase the present resentment of and contempt for law and government and the disrespect of the administration of justice in the United States."

The transcripts of closed hearings before the committee disclosed that Attorney General Mitchell declined to answer questions on prohibition policy propounded by Tinkham.

"I have never openly entered into any controversial field about prohibition," Mitchell testified. "If I could avoid it, I think it would impair my usefulness as head of my department if I got into a discussion of these controversial matters. I do not think I ought to do it. I will ask the committee to excuse me."

But Director Woodcock of the prohibition bureau, testified under questioning:

"We do think we can stop the open traffic in intoxicating liquor, so, I would have to say that we would reach a degree of enforcement when we have prevented the traffic in intoxicating liquor, when you would see no open saloons or speakeasies, when you see no liquor being manufactured, when you see no liquor being transported commercially. We think that is enforcement and that is our ultimate objective."

In his minority report, Tinkham noted that "neither the attorney general nor the director of prohibition would estimate what the ultimate cost of enforcement might be."

"I do, I have no qualms at all about that, sir. I think the telephone and telegraph franchises are given for the transaction of lawful business and the promotion of lawful commerce. I do not think that the unlawful have any right to see them with impunity. At least I do not think that I can run this bureau on any other basis than the Supreme court had described as lawful."

Questioned as to whether "special policemen" were used the prohibition director said about 101 "special" employees were employed temporarily to furnish information.

BEGIN PROBE OF LYNCHING IN MARYLAND

No Definite Action Taken As Authorities View Scene of Crime at Maryville

Maryville, Mo., Jan. 13.—(AP)—Ashes of a little country school house and the body of a 27-year-old negro charged with slaying his teacher mingled on frosty soil near here today as authorities considered the unlicensed execution of a mob.

No definite action was announced against men who yesterday invoked lynch law in the case of Ray Gunn, negro trapper and ex-convict accused of attacking and killing Miss Velma Colter, 15-year-old teacher, last December 16. Gunn, seized from a sheriff's party marching him to court for a preliminary hearing, was burned to death chained to the roof of the school in which Miss Colter was victim and slain. He walked, unresisting, to the scene of his funeral pyre. The mob was not hindered.

A crowd estimated at 2,500 men and women, some with children, surrounded the school as the negro burned.

Sheriff Harvey England and his deputies did not pursue the mob until Battery C, 128 Field Artillery Missouri National Guard, mobilized yesterday by order of Adj. Gen. A. V. Adams, was not called into action.

Virgil Rathbone, prosecuting attorney, gave no indication of prosecution of the leaders. He termed the lynching "a regrettable affair—a very, very sorry matter." The sheriff said he hadn't planned anything.

Governor Henry S. Caulfield, in Jefferson City, declined to comment pending receipt of a report from the adjutant general.

"My men," General Adams said here, "could do nothing until county authorities asked for help." No call, he said, was received for the troops, uniformed and armed a block from the courthouse.

Barney Dougan, chief of police, said he was approached in advance and asked to direct traffic. He declined.

"I was not there in the crowd," he said "but there were so many people I couldn't do anything."

Defending his failure to call out the guard, the sheriff said he did not know it was mobilized and if it had been called out the mood of the mob much bloodshed would have resulted.

The lynching was the sixth in Missouri in the last decade. All victims were negroes.

HOOVER ASKS TEN MILLIONS FOR DROUGHT

Calls On People To Contribute To Amount for Relief of Sufferers

Washington, Jan. 13.—(AP)—President Hoover today called on the people to contribute a "minimum of \$10,000,000" for the relief of drought sufferers.

It was in a formal proclamation. "I am sure that the American people will respond to the Red Cross appeal both promptly and generously," he said.

The demands on the disaster funds of the Red Cross President Hoover said, have been far greater in the last four weeks than during the previous four months. This brought about the necessity for a material increase in resources.

In some parts of the stricken areas, the Chief Executive said, small communities have been hurt both by the drought and general business depression.

The Red Cross has been called upon to take care of sufferers in these communities as well as in purely rural sections.

The additional \$10,000,000, combined with what is left of the \$5,000,000 set aside by the Red Cross some time ago, appears to President Hoover to be sufficient to meet the demands.

Unless the \$10,000,000 is raised, Mr. Hoover said, many persons in the country will lack necessities of life.

FIVE MEMBERS OF CRIME GANG ARE ARRESTED

Three Men and Women Wanted for Series Holdups and Murder Taken

Asheville, Jan. 13.—(AP)—A giant Croatian Indian, two negro men and two negro women, reported members of a gang of desperadoes that terrorized three states for weeks by murders and holdups, were arrested in Bluefield, W. Va., early today upon the instruction of the Asheville police department which has led an investigation of the one-gang crime wave.

Arrest of the Indian and the negroes followed a search launched by the Asheville police who early Sunday morning arrested George Bird, negro, in a southside avenue rooming house, as a member of a party which during the night had held up the Beaucatcher tourist camp, an Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company truck, and which had attempted to hold up a Charlotte passenger bus.

In the possession of one of the negroes taken in Bluefield, officers said, a pocketbook containing two diamonds was found. The pocketbook, it was declared, had been the property of Frank Austin, of the West Asheville Pharmacy, which was held up and robbed two weeks ago by a band of masked bandits.

The Asheville police received the tip that Bird had been left behind by the gang from negroes of the Southside Avenue section who had been inveigled into a gambling game by the bandits and then held up and robbed. Officers went to the Southside Avenue rooming house and found Bird in a bed with a rifle beside him. They overpowered him when he tried to shoot. He confessed to the series of crimes when he was taken to police headquarters and grilled.

Officer Frank Hagan and Harry Noland were immediately sent to Bristol, Va., where the negroes were said by Bird to have been headed. The officers, upon arriving in Bristol yesterday afternoon, found that the party had made inquiry as to the way to get to Bluefield. They wired Captain Fred Jents, of the detective department here that they would continue their chase, and asked him to wire Bluefield officers. The arrest was made by the West Virginians as the band drove into Bluefield at 4 o'clock this morning.

Officers Noland and Hagan arrived a short time later and with the aid of Bluefield officers were bringing the negroes and Indian back to Asheville this afternoon.

Al Smith Demands That Republicans Apologize For False Statement Cartoon

Letter Which Smith Wrote Senator Wagner Made Public Today At Hearing of Campaign Funds Committee; Smith Asserts That Statement Purported to Have Been Made By Him Was Never Issued

Washington, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Alfred E. Smith, Democratic Presidential candidate in 1928, has written Senator Wagner, Democrat, New York, saying the Republican national committee owed him an apology for "permitting" Robert H. Lucas to distribute 800,000 copies of a "cartoon" carrying a "false" statement.

Lucas, executive director of the national committee, has testified before the Senate campaign funds committee that he personally paid for the cartoons and had them distributed in Nebraska, against Senator Norris, Republican independent, and in other states against Democratic senatorial candidates.

Former Governor Smith's letter was read before the Nye committee today on suggestion of Senator Wagner, a member of the committee.

"I have been following the testimony before the Nye committee concerning the cartoon entitled 'Al Smith-Raskob-idea of Happiness,'" Smith wrote, "the text of it has been left before me. I find that the whole cartoon hinges on the following statement: 'To my mind the Democratic party will soon be in control and will make this a happy as well as a prosperous nation. The Democratic party is always looking for the common good and opposing oppressive laws and sumptuary legislation.'"

"This statement which purports to come from me as of August 21 was never issued by me. At that time in August, the Joel Parker Association of Newark, N. J., was holding an annual reunion and dinner."

"I refused the invitation to attend but on August 19, some over-enthusiastic admirer of mine sent a telegram to the association and signed my name to it. My first knowledge of it was when I saw the newspaper headlines quoting it."

Mr. Smith's letter continued: "I made careful investigation among my own staff and found it had not emanated from my own office nor anyone connected with it. We traced the matter and it was admitted by all concerned that the telegram had been a hoax and we made careful denial in all newspapers by statement issued on August 21, 1930. Of course, a denial never catches up with an original statement. It did not in this instance or else it was deliberately disregarded."

"Since, on the face of the testimony, this cartoon was distributed in these various states to the extent of 800,000 copies, I think that an apology and reparation is due me from the Republican national committee which permitted its director to do this and that I am entitled to have 800,000 copies of a statement showing that I was falsely quoted, distributed just as widely as the original cartoon was and to give publicity to the next hearing of the Nye committee and to give publicity to it in any other form which occurs to you as most likely to correct the injustice that has been done."

Senate Adopts Proposal To Ask U. S. Congress For Tobacco Tax Rebate

Committee Appointments In Both Houses of State Legislature Made Today

Senator Gravely, of Nash County Named Chairman of Senate Appropriations Committee; R. L. Harris, of Person County, Heads Same Committee in the House; Senator Dunlap and Rep. U. L. Spence of Moore Named Chairmen of Powerful Finance Committees

Raleigh, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Committee appointments in both houses of the General Assembly were read today and immediately all bills which had been introduced and referred to unannounced groups were turned over to the various chairmen.

The Senate and House each held short sessions and adjourned to meet again at 11 o'clock tomorrow. Lieutenant Governor Richard T. Fountin announced his Senate committees with senator Gravely of Nash, as head of the appropriations group and Senator Dunlap of Anson, chairman of the committee on finance.

Representative R. L. Harris, of Person, was named by Speaker Smith to head the important appropriations committee, and Rep. U. L. Spence of Moore, will head the finance group. Rep. Robert M. Hanes, of Forsyth, was named chairman of the insurance body.

Rep. Henry G. Connor of Wilson, will lead the committee on roads and Rep. Gregg Cherry, of Gaston, will direct the committee on banks and banking.

Representatives John G. Crudup of Vance, and Edwin Gill, of Scotland, were named chairmen of committees on congressional and senatorial districts, respectively.

Representatives O. B. Moss, of Nash, and Fred I. Sutton, of Lenoir, who opposed Mr. Smith for the speakership, drew the chairmanships of the judiciary committees Nos. 1 and 2.

The education committee will be headed by Rep. A. D. MacLean of Beaufort, and Rep. Will Neal of McDowell, heads the committee on counties, cities and towns.

PETE BYNUM GETS \$4,200 IN COURT HERE

Suit Against Insurance Company Compromised; Byrd Case Also Compromised

Pete Bynum, former Greenville high school student, will receive \$4,200 for injuries which he received in an automobile wreck several months ago as result of compromise proceedings between defendant and plaintiffs in the civil session of Pitt County Superior court here yesterday.

Bynum received an injury of the spine that necessitated his confinement in the local hospital for several months when an automobile belonging to Wesley Harvey overturned. Young Harvey's brother was also injured but other members of the party escaped uninjured.

Harvey carried liability insurance and Branch Banking & Trust Company, guardians of young Bynum, sometime ago filed suit for damages.

Two other cases of interest locally were disposed of through compromise action. They were Motorcycle Officer Byrd against C. B. Mayo and Miss Elizabeth Mayo, and the City of Greenville against an insurance company. Although the nature of the compromise was not made public, it was stated this morning that the terms were satisfactory to all parties involved.

Byrd received severe injuries of the back when an automobile driven by Miss Elizabeth Mayo collided with his motorcycle at the corner of Fourth and Cotach street over a year ago. The young woman was said to have been in fault, and suit was started against Mr. Mayo. The defendant was adequately insured against accident and the settlement, it was understood, was made by the insurance company.

The motorcycle on which Byrd was riding at the time of the accident was completely wrecked, and the city filed notice of suit against the insurance company. The settlement in this case was also described as satisfactory.

Although several other cases were disposed of in the opening session of court yesterday, these three actions were by far the most important and consequently commanded more interest. Among the minor actions, considered were three divorces.

Divorces absolute were granted in the following cases:

Judge W. A. Devin, of Oxford, is presiding over the court. The calendar contains between fifty and sixty cases and promises to be pretty well cleared by the end of the one-week session, judging by the splendid start made yesterday. A one-week session of criminal court will begin next Monday morning.

Joint Resolution Seeking At Least 20 Per- cent of Taxes Col- lected On Tobacco Commodities In This State Passed After Much Debate; Would Use Sum for Relief of Land Tax for Schools; Num- bers of Bills Intro- duced in Both House and Senate Today

Raleigh, Jan. 13.—(AP)—A joint resolution requesting Congress to relate to North Carolina at least 20 per cent of the taxes collected on tobacco commodities in this state for the purpose of relieving the land tax for schools in the state was introduced in the Senate today by Senator Clarkson of Mecklenburg.

The resolution points out that the federal government collected \$256,729,539.33 from tobacco and cigarette taxes in this state in 1930.

Mr. Clarkson's resolution also provides that Congress be asked to pass a law providing "that whenever any state of the Union levies a tax for revenue on any commodity or article upon which the United States government levies a like or similar tax the United States government will remit to the person, firm or corporation paying said tax an amount equal to the tax levied by the state for said purpose upon said commodity or article provided the state tax does not exceed 20 per cent of the tax levied by the United States government."

Senator Ward of Beaufort discussed the method by which the resolution should be presented to Congress, of which body he is a former member. Under the terms of the resolution Governor Gardner would appoint a committee of five to memorialize Congress as to the "exorbitant tax" on tobacco and devising some means of getting some of the revenue for this state.

The rebate, if granted, should go to the tobacco grower, Mr. Ward declared.

Senator Hicks of Granville spoke briefly in favor of the resolution. Senator Polger of Surry and other senators offered minor amendments changing certain phrases and words in the resolution of Senator Clarkson.

Senator Dunlap of Anson moved the resolution be sent to the committee but withdrew his motion.

The resolution will fall on deaf ears and prove of no benefit, was the prediction of Senator Baggett of Harnett, who called the Senate's attention to the fact that the body last week appropriated \$50,000 for an inland waterways canal at the command of Congress.

"Let's give our attention to something concrete," Senator Baggett argued, "and not go on a futile chase." He contended that to ask the government to rebate about \$40,000,000 to the state would be useless.

The resolution was finally passed. Senator Johnson of Duplin offered a resolution censoring certain newspaper articles appearing in the press of the state under Raleigh date lines stating that the rules committee placed a check on the lieutenant-governor with respect to distribution of political patronage.

The report complained of, dated January 9, read in part, Mr. Johnson said. "In the Senate the rules committee is understood to have put the screws on the lieutenant-governor in political patronage."

Senator Polger of Surry joined Mr. Johnson in support of the resolution and it was passed.

The Senate received a bill by Senator Lindsay of Brunswick to require the state to take over full support and operation of schools for the constitution's six months term. It was referred to the education committee.

All measures when the House were local except three. One was a resolution by Representative White of Robeson to require all state department heads to furnish expense accounts for all employees for the last six months and the others provided for observance of the birthdays of Lee and Jackson and to amend the law creating the board of examiners for funeral directors and embalmers.

Senator Ward of Beaufort withdrew a joint resolution which was sent for special order today to request the finance committee of the General Assembly to draw the appropriations bill so as to reflect a 50 per cent reduction in taxes on real estate. Mr. Ward explained that when he sent his measure in he did not know the governor would (Continued On Page Six)

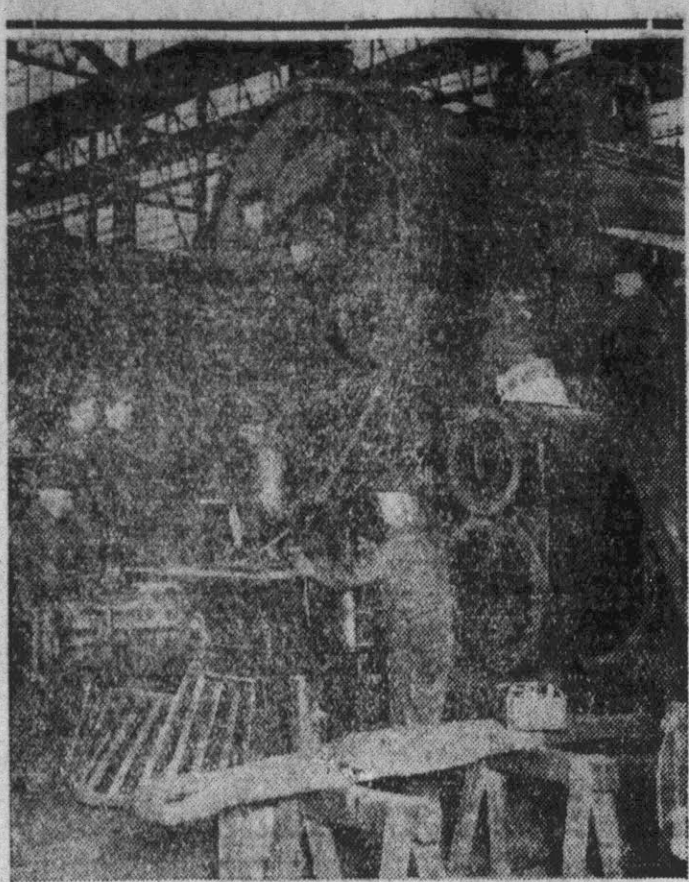
Another meeting will be held at the court house tomorrow night, and speakers will stress the tobacco situation and "how to make more profit even under present conditions."

He said hundreds of people were dependent upon the earnings of the colored women as well as the men, and urged that people in need of observance or other employees get in touch with his office at once and in that way help alleviate the suffering people.

This new location will be used as a relief office and is so arranged that the Salvation Army will be able to take care of its transient cases there, thereby saving in another item. They are doing their utmost to carry on with their good work despite their great lack of funds by cutting expenses and saving here and there.

Dry Agents Raid New York Saloon; Arrest Hostess

New York Jan. 13.—(AP)—Captured in red pajamas on the roof of her saloon of 42nd St. and Benhamline, Miss Belle Livingstone faced with the law today for the fourth time in recent months.

At the crack of midnight, two federal prohibition agents from Chicago, dressed in evening clothes and wearing pink carnations, arose from the table at which they sat with two fashionably gowned women and announced the place was in the hands of the government.

It is just off Park avenue in the midtown section.

Their words had hardly faded away when eight more agents, similarly attired, burst through the main entrance and the raid was on. More than a hundred guests from the circle of the literati were ordered to leave, eight employees were arrested, and a certain amount of liquid was seized.

While this was going on, Miss Livingstone, warned of the raid by a secret alarm in her fourth floor apartment, hastily threw a cap over her night attire and climbed through a trap door to the roof, apparently with the idea of escaping down the stairway of an adjoining building. One of the raiders overtook her and escorted her to the saloon via the street.

Changing to what she called her "prison clothes," Miss Livingstone, and her employees were taken to a police station. The former actress, clutching a pink carnation in her hand, greeted the police lieutenant with:

"Good morning, this is getting to be old-fashioned now."

All the prisoners were released on \$1,000 bond.

Miss Livingstone is at liberty under bail on two charges of violating the prohibition law as a result of three previous raids.

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ABOUT TOWN

Governor Gardner has started
out like he means business in his
effort to bring about a reduction of
governmental expenses for the next
biennium.

In his budget message transmit-
ted to the legislature last night
he presented figures showing a de-
crease of over four millions of dol-
lars for the period.

The message contained no rec-
ommendations for permanent im-
provements, which plainly is one
of the most drastic attempts yet tak-
en to bring about a decided cut in
the operation of the various de-
partments of government.

In addition, the governor also in-
cluded the ten per cent decrease
of salary recommended in his an-
nual message to the General As-
sembly, showing plainly that he
means to bring about an improve-
ment in state affairs, if cutting ex-
penses will do it.

It has been a long time since
the people of North Carolina have
seen a budget curtailed in such a
definite way, and if it is lived up
to there is no reason why the state
should not find its way back to
normalcy in the course of a few
years.

The governor, as many other
officials, realizes that there is only
one way to meet the insistent de-
mand for curtailment of expenses
coming from all sections of the
state, and that is by whacking down
costs where such is possible.

That this movement with others
already under consideration will
have a tendency to lower the state
tax rate is at once evident, and
the hue and cry for lifting the
tax burden should be noticeably
decreased by the ending of the
present legislative session.

In accepting the presidency of
the Greenville Kiwanis club the lat-
ter part of last week, J. J. Sum-
merell stressed the need of co-
operation among members of the
club and the public generally.

He declared that the spirit of
faith, backed by a disposition to
pull together, would play a vital
part in turning the dark clouds
of economic depression to sun-
shine.

He said the future held forth

ble.

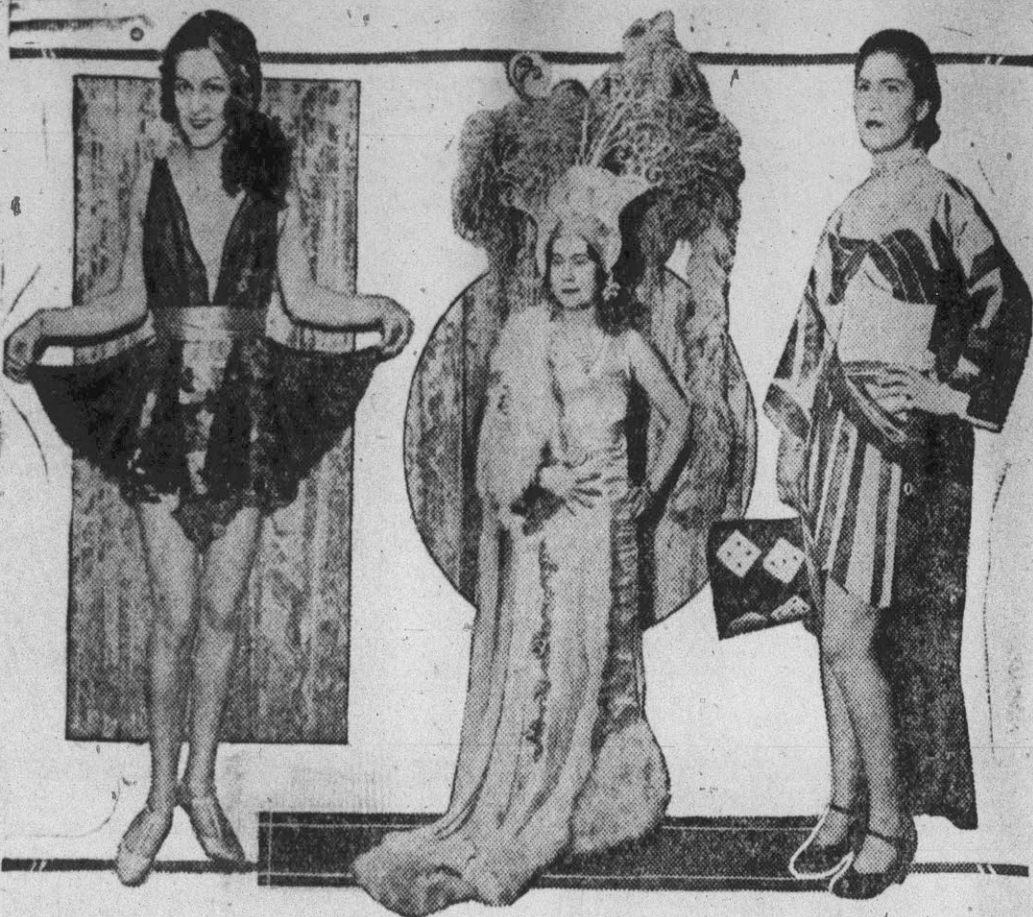
Although the bulk of the crop

went in the hole than paid out.

wind up the season with something
in their favor in the banks despite
the prices for the main crops.

source of much favorable com-
ment.

The farm at this time is well cov-
ered with crops capable of produc-
tion at this time of the year, and
planters interested in increasing
their revenue would do well to visit
the farm and adopt some of the
plans used by the demonstrators.

The farm was established by Gov-
ernor Gardner with a view of show-
ing the people how they may live
at home all the year around. It is
the crowning feature of the live-at-
home movement enunciated by the
chief executive over a year ago and
should bear sober, solid fruit in
years to come, if the farming ele-
ment takes advantage of the op-
portunities offered them through
the cultivation of these extra crops.

The governor realized that Pitt
county, the premier bright leaf pro-
ducing county of the world, with
soil adapted to the cultivation of
almost any kind of crop, was the
ideal place for such a farm, and it
was through his vision that the
farmers of this blessed region are
being shown how farming may be
done in a modern, and at the same
time, profitable way.

Any section would be glad to
claim the honor of a demonstra-
tion farm of this kind and Pitt
county growers should show their
appreciation by visiting the broad
acres as often as they can and by
putting into actual practice the
progressive methods used in the
demonstration work.

inland waterways project from the
Cap Fear to the South Carolina
line are expected to be received
within the next two or three weeks.
U. S. Army engineers here an-
nounced that enactment last night
by the State Legislature of the
Campbell bill to provide \$50,000 to
obtain right of way for the water-
way cleared the way for going for-
ward with the work. They said
they could be ready to ask for bids
on dredging in about two weeks.

More than a half million dollars
already has been placed in the na-
tional treasury at the disposal of
the engineers for the project.

FOUR MILLION REDUCTION IN STATE BUDGET

Economy Stressed in Message Delivered By Governor Gard- ner to Legislature

Raleigh, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Budget
recommendations for 1931-33 for
North Carolina, transmitted to the
General Assembly last night by
Gov. O. Max Gardner, call for a
total appropriation of \$76,902,607
for the operation of the state gov-
ernment for the next two years.

The budget report of the advisory
budget commission for the first
time contained both general fund
and highway fund recommenda-
tions.

General fund appropriations rec-
ommended aggregated \$34,587,201, a
cut of about \$4,000,000 under the
1929-31 appropriations and a cut of
\$3200,000 under actual expenditure
for the biennium.

The general fund recommenda-
tions include appropriations based
on the recommended 10 per cent
salary cut of Governor Gardner,
which is concurred in by the bud-
get commission.

The budget also recommends that
an equalizing fund of \$6,500,000 be
continued. The present biennium
had an equalizing fund of that
amount but it was divided into two
funds, equalizing \$5,250,000 and tax
reduction, \$1,250,000.

For the first time the general
budget includes the highway fund
recommendations. An aggregate of
\$42,375,406 is provided for the bi-
ennium, including \$9,600,000 for road
construction. The highway depart-
ment spend \$51,727,997 the current
biennium, according to the esti-
mates, including \$17,163,001 for con-
struction.

The total budget general and
highway funds for the 1931-33 bi-
ennium would be \$76,902,607 for
the operation of the state government
and its divisions and institutions.

Few increases in appropriations
were recommended, compared to the
much paring done.

The advisory budget commission
recommends more for the state
board of charities and public wel-
fare for the biennium than was re-
quested and also recommends an
increase in the mother's aid fund
for the next biennium but not to
the extent asked.

For general administration of the
board recommendations are \$40-
800 for each year compared with
requests of \$47,045 and \$46,820. For
mother's aid recommendations are
\$53,600 each year, compared to re-
quests for \$60,000 and \$65,000 and
actual estimated expenditures for
the current biennium of \$40,454 and

\$47,250.
The budget estimates that reve-
nue for the biennium 1931-33 will
aggregate \$35,847,450 or \$1,266,249
more than the recommended ap-
propriations.

The commission found that addi-
tional revenues of about \$3,000,000
per year must be provided during
the 1931-33 biennium if a balanced
budget is to be maintained and a
deficit at the end of the biennium
avoided. The sources of revenue
will provide this \$3,000,000 plus \$1-
266,249 to make a total of \$35,847-
450, the report estimates.

Notwithstanding expenditures hav-
ing been reduced about \$3,500,000
as against appropriations for the
current biennium the governor
pointed out that it is now estimat-
ed the biennium will end with a
debit balance of \$1,224,151 which
must be absorbed in the 1931-33
budget.

The governor and the budget
commission recommended that no
bond issues be authorized and that
no permanent improvement approp-
riations be made at this session.
The request for permanent im-
provements for the biennium ag-
gregated \$4,358,719.

"The needs of the institutions in
some cases," the governor said, "are
pressing, but not so pressing that
under present conditions they may
not wait until 1933, and when it is
hoped we will have reached a bet-
terment improvement appropriations
and those of prior years may be
re-appropriated and to this end a
bill will be presented for introduc-
tion in due course."

Under the reappropriation bill
the \$400,000 recommended for use
in constructing a new central prison
at Cary farm will be asked by the
governor. This amount was appro-
priated in 1927 to buy new prison
farm lands but has never been used.

Closing his message of transmi-
tal, the governor told the General
Assembly "we should get the most
possible in welfare services out of
our efforts and resources, and in
common with industry, agriculture,
business and individuals the prop-
osals contemplate spending on a
less lavish scale than in the past.
Retrenchment is necessary in com-
mon in all social activities and gov-
ernment; should not be the excep-
tion."

LABOR UNION OPPOSED TO PROPOSED SALRY CUT

Winston-Salem, Jan. 13.—(AP)—
Winston-Salem's Central Labor
Union today was on record as op-
posing Governor Gardner's recom-
mendation for a reduction in the salaries
of State employees.

Opposition to the recommenda-
tion was voted after E. R. Law-
rence, president of the State Fed-
eration of Labor, had charged in an
address that if the governor's
plan was carried out, it would be
used as a precedent for "wholesale
cuts in wages and salaries."

This, he said, would reduce the
ability of taxpayers to pay and
would "hurt the state more than
the salaries now being paid."

Bridge From Venice to Mainland to Bring Autos to the Island

Venice, Italy, Jan. 13.—(AP)—
new bridge to link Venice and the
mainland will bring automobiles
into this island city for the first

time in its history.

By late in 1931 or 1932 Venetians
will behold the rare sight of cars
and trucks entering the city—and
many natives never have seen an
automobile.

The bridge, now well under con-
struction, is built in three
sections. The one at the main-
land connects with highways from

all over Italy.

The one at Venice proper flows
out into an enormous parking place
sufficient for several thousand auto
mobiles.

The auto park is the limit of
the automobile's penetration into
Venice. The motorcar probably will
never be able to go as far as St.

Mark's Square, center of the city,
because of the narrow winding
streets—mere footpaths—and the
canals to be traversed.

The new bridge will cost about
\$3,650,000.
Five thousand workmen are now
occupied in the construction, and
unemployment has practically
ceased.

CAMPBELL TO TRY FOR NEW MARK IN MIAMI

New York, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Captain Malcolm Campbell, British sportsman, apparently is fully convinced that the financial controversy between authorities of Daytona Beach and representatives of American Automobile Association, will not prevent his proposed attempt to set a new world's automobile speed record on the Florida sands next month.

Campbell announced in London that he would sail for the United States tomorrow. With him he will bring his new 1,400 horsepower Bluebird racer with which he hopes to shatter the present record of 231 miles an hour set by the late Sir Henry Segrave in 1929.

"The row has nothing to do with me," Campbell said. "I have had no word from the A. A. A. to stay away which I should have had if the trials had been definitely abandoned."

The controversy revolves about the adequacy of the sum of \$4,000 Daytona Beach has offered to cover the actual costs of staging the trials.

In Washington, Ted Allen, secretary of the contest board of the A. A. A., had this to say:

"Trials were to last two or three days but the chances are, judging by past experience, that the trials will drag along. It is an unfortunate situation if Daytona Beach can not raise more money, but enough saving may be effected if help on the municipal payroll, such as the city electrician, carpenters and others, be used that the \$4,000 be stretched to cover other necessary expenses."

"If the money is not raised, or other settlement made, I will have to inform Capt. Campbell's manager that sanction cannot be given. The only hope then is that he may make some arrangements with commercial companies here and should er additional expenses himself."

TWO S. C. CAGE TEAMS FALL IN THIS STATE

Charlotte, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Two South Carolina basketball teams, one of them the much-heralded Purple Hurricane from Furman university, were pondering today over stinging defeats they received last night at the hands of Old North State fives.

The Hurricane, undefeated this season and defeated only once last season, blew into Chapel Hill full of the hope of victory. When it left, its record had been marred by a 23 to 16 defeat, administered by the Tar Heels.

At Durham, only a few miles away, the University of South Carolina quit tackled the Duke Blue Devils and met a like fate. The surprising thing in this clash was not so much the outcome as it was the margin of victory. The Blue Devils lambasted the Gamecocks 44 to 16 and secured telling revenge for the licking they took in football from the South Carolinians last season.

Tonight the Gamecocks will try their luck with the Tar Heels, while Furman moves over to Wake Forest for a match with the North Carolina Baptists. The Gamecock-Tar Heel game will usher in the Southern Conference season for North Carolina.

Tomorrow night, the Furman five is slated for a contest at Raleigh with N. C. State. The Red Terrors last night, took a 40 to 38 drubbing from Auburn at Auburn, their third straight defeat on an Alabama-Georgia invasion. They will meet the University of Georgia at Athens tonight before returning home for the match with Furman.

Davidson will entertain Erskine tomorrow night at Davidson.

Harper seemed about the only one convinced Rynne had the stuff to make a first class head coach. He had developed the young Norwegian as a star player and had him as an assistant coach for four years.

Harper was ready to step out after having put the Notre Dame "system" on a thorough-going basis. He suggested Rynne, then only 28 years old, for the job but the university heads objected strongly. In effect they said to Harper:

"We've built up a fine system now. Why run the risk of having it spoiled by a young, inexperienced and impetuous fellow? We need a seasoned veteran to continue the work."

Other names were suggested but Harper discovered flaws and pointed them out. He always came back with a recommendation for Rynne: Why, they nally asked, was he so persistent about it?

"I've got to be. I promised Rynne the job four ears ago," Harper replied.

And so, like any other hero of fact or fiction the boy from Voss, Norway, got the job and made good.

Frequently, the anvil chorus is out for any figure in sports so successful as Rynne but not so in his case. Coaching friends and rivals, men who have worked with him or played under him, unite in a chorus of enthusiasm for "Rock." One prominent southern coach, who did not go to Notre Dame, said to me:

"Rock's a wizard. It isn't that he has any secrets of play. He teaches his boys how to do the ordinary, fundamental things better than most of the others. He makes the pupil second count. I've never known him to miss a chance to do some other fellow a good turn, or neglect an opportunity to help the game. No wonder we are all 'for' him."

Joe Nutter, in the Providence Bulletin, point out that William Wallace Wade, Alabama's sensational successful head football coach, is one of the very few products of Brown University to take up coaching and by far the most famous.

Wade was a ineffective, though not a great lifeman when he wore the Bruin colors, in 1914-16. His coaching success was swift in his native south, first as a high school coach at Tullahoma, Tenn., then as an assistant to Dan McGugin at Vanderbilt and finally at Alabama starting in 1923. He leaves the Tuscaloosa Terrors, after their greatest season, to take charge at Duke, newest member of the Southern conference.

Cold Wave Claims Heavy Toll of Life In Northern China

Shanghai, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Winter, in this part of the world, the harbinger of death and intense suffering, today gripped virtually all of North China, Manchuria, Siberia, Korea and Japan.

Paralyzed communications, crippled railroads had taken an undetermined toll of human life and property.

China, from the Yangtze river northward lay under a mantle of ice and snow, while frigid blasts from the north added to the depth of the white blanket with a mixture of snow and sand from the barren steppes of Mongolia.

It was feared thousands had perished from the intense cold in northern China alone dispatches describing the finding of scores of frozen bodies in the streets of large cities.

The fate of western China, much of which was isolated owing to disrupted communications, was uncertain.

Many cities of north central and northeastern China reported below zero weather and at Harbin, Manchuria, the thermometer registered 35 degrees Fahrenheit, below zero.

The local weather office described the cold wave as the most severe in China since 1893. Forecasts indicated moderating temperatures in the vicinity of Shanghai today.

A 60-mile-an-hour gale derailed a train and blew one coach over a cliff on the Goshogara line in northern Japan. No casualties were reported.

COTTON MARKET

New York, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at a decline of 5 to 11 points under near, but later deliveries inspired by relatively easy Liverpool cables.

March contracts eased off to 10.06 and July to 10.51 under the initial offerings, but the contracts were taken by covering and trade buying. The circulation of new January notices estimated at about 11,400 bales led to some liquidation in that position which was taken by spot interests who seemed willing to buy January and sell March at about 10.06. STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 13.—(AP)—The stock market drifted lower in apathetic trading today, in continuation of the trend at the start of the week.

The expectation of publication of some too cheerful earnings statements for the final quarter of 1930 during the next few weeks, together with talk of further reductions in crude oil prices, discouraged traders from endeavoring to extend the recovery. On the other hand, stock was not pressed anxiously for sale, and the list appeared momentarily oversold in early afternoon.

Utilities, steel, oils and rails were notably heavy. American Telephone, Eastman, Vanadium, Byers, Coca Cola, American Tobacco, and Erie 1st preferred declined 2 to 3 points. Republic Steel preferred, which has recently had a vigorous upturn, slipped off 3. Lackawanna dropped 8. Shares selling off a point or so included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, North American, American Water Works, and some of the others, including Standards of New York and New Jersey, and Texas Corp.

With the publication of another annual report by the head of a leading Wall street bank—Charles E. Mitchell of the National City—it was notable that the first three such reports were in substantial agreement that the business depression had reached its approximate bottom. It was also notable that Mr. Mitchell, along with Albert H. Wiggin of the Chase National, and Paul M. Warburg of the Manhattan Co., names no date at which business recovery may be expected, and indicates that the process will be slow.

E. H. Creetch, Nye committee author, testified before the committee today that some special editions of the Ku Klux Klan paper, "Fellowship Forum," had been sent into Montana, Kentucky, Alabama, and West Virginia. Some of these editions carried the wet cartoon.

He investigated the records of the Independent Publishing Company, which prints the Forum, and found over \$3,000 worth of the special editions of the paper had been ordered by former Senator Robinson, Republican, of Kentucky. Creetch said Robinson informed the company friends of his wish to pay the bill.

The editions, he added, dealt with religion and prohibition.

He said Senator Heflin, who ran as an independent in Alabama in the last election, ordered all but one of the editions sent to Alabama and paid for them himself.

Those sent to Montana were described as intended in behalf of Judge Albert J. Galen, Republican, who was defeated by Senator Walsh, Democrat.

Creetch said Charles I. Stengle, of the publishing company, had told him he had advised Lucas early in December that he (Lucas) would have to "give some name to stand responsibility" for the anti-Norris literature because the transaction was to be investigated.

Stengle said Lucas "pulled down a book" and selected the name of "John M. Peters" from a list of names, which might have been "county or precinct committeemen."
