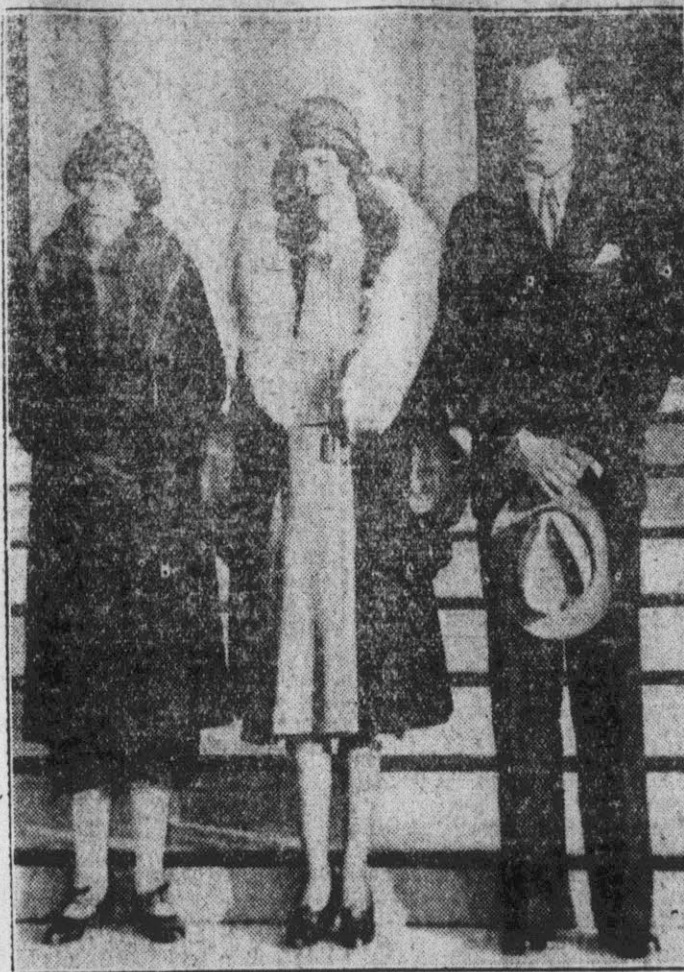

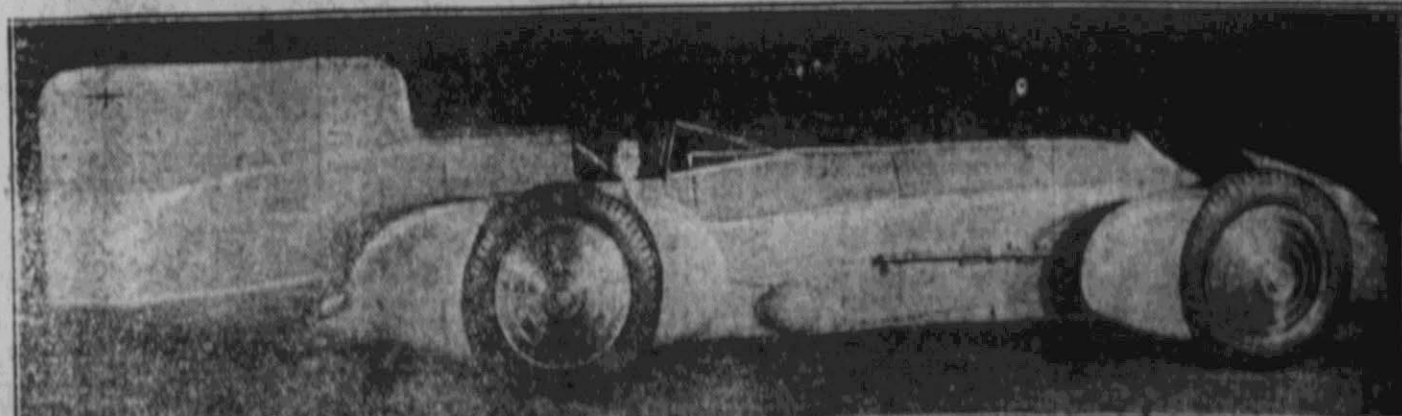

ABOUT TOWN

"Give them plenty of latitude in
which to solve their own prob-
lems."

This was the advice which Mark
Sullivan, noted newspaper writer,
gave members of the North Carolina
Legislature yesterday.

And it was advice worthy of the
consideration of every member of
the assembly. Mr. Sullivan is prob-
ably one of the best posted men
in the country, and is fully capable
of imparting words of wisdom to
men who have in their power the
destiny of a great commonwealth.

He meant that it would be much
better to give the people an op-
portunity to work out their salva-
tion than to provide lots of useless
legislation for that purpose.

He, as thousands of others, has
learned that laws sometime ham-
per instead of improve, and that it
would be wise to consider the eco-
nomic situation somewhat longer
before trying to provide ways and
means for its end. North Caro-
lina, he narrated, is in no worse
condition than any other section
of the country. Depression is gen-
eral throughout the world, but
given a chance, it will soon im-
prove.

In spite of the fact that weather
prevented large attendance at the
live-at-home and tobacco meet-
ings held in this county earlier in
the week, their influence is ex-
pected to play a vital part in the
economic life of the community, in
the opinion of a prominent business
man and agriculturist who attend-
ed the first meeting at the court
house here.

He said the average farmer had
long ago realized that he would be
forced to turn to other methods
of farming if he is to be success-
ful, and that the coming years
would see him turn from the cash
crop idea to the production of more
essentials which he consumes at
home.

Low prices for the main crops
have produced unprecedented con-
ditions in this and other produc-
tive communities, and there is little
chance of an improvement with the
world market overstocked to a
greater extent than it has been in
years.

With this situation prevailing, it
is at once evident that something
must be done. Some will continue
to plant the money crops on as
great a scale as formerly, but
others, taking advantage of their
experience, will mix in many of
the things which their stock and
families consume and be able to
live comfortably whether the money
crops sell at high prices or not.

The time to strike has come, and
the man that does not give the
change the consideration which it
so surely deserves can not hope to
come out at the end of the harvest
season in as good condition as the
man that diversifies.

Pitt County Chapter of the
American Red Cross has received an
urgent appeal from the national
chairman asking the people of
this community to contribute \$5-
000 to the drought area. Ten mil-
lion dollars will be raised for this
purpose and President Hoover has
already called upon the nation to
give as liberally as it can.

Despite the fact that this com-
munity has suffered from a drought
of money the last several months,
it will do its best to aid the cam-
paign and undoubtedly will send
in a good contribution.

The Red Cross has done mighty
fine work in all parts of the world
in time of disaster, and it is at-
tempting to render a distinct ser-
vice to those countless thousands
who have suffered untold hard-
ships from the drought.

The same thing would be done
for this community if there was
any need for it, and it is nothing
but right that Pitt County should
forget some of its own troubles and
do what it can to relieve the dark
misery of their fellow men in other
parts of the country.

The first shipment of poultry of
the current season will be made

from Pitt county the week of the
21st.

A carload of chickens will be
loaded at Greenville, Ayden and
Bethel, and shipped to northern
markets for sale. The deal will be
hardly through the Pitt County
Department of Agriculture and
should bring the growers a neat
sum.

Several thousands of dollars was
brought into the county last year
through the poultry industry, and
it is hoped the sum will be greatly
increased this year because of the
farmers need of it.

The extra revenue derived from
the sales of poultry and hogs plays
an important part in the life of the
community, and the growers should
make an effort to offset the loss
on other crops through this kind
of industry.

One of these days they should
find prices good for all of their
crops, and the will then be able to
get their heads above the depres-
sion flood that has gripped the
country in past months.

Greenville won its fame as the

and we greatly appreciate your ef-
forts. Through such publicity we
have found employment for scores
of people, but still have a list of
several hundred who want employ-
ment. Among this group there are
many families without food or fuel,
and children are suffering the pangs
of hunger and are being kept in
beds to protect them from the cold.
Investigations by the Welfare De-
partment and representatives of our
office have revealed numbers of
such cases.

We cannot meet these conditions
alone, and bring relief to a situa-
tion such as this, but with proper
cooperation of the citizenship and
of the city officials a great change
can be brought about. Many of our
people have labor that needs to be
done, yet for some reason they are
debarred from it even when labor and
material is cheaper than it has
been for scores of years. Our mayor
and board of aldermen admit that
there is much permanent street im-
provement that needs being done,
yet as far as we are able to learn
no definite steps have been taken
in this direction. If the city funds
are not available the money can
be borrowed at a lower rate of in-
terest than for many years, and
laborers and material can be pro-
cured for much less than during
preceding years. This project alone
would provide work for several hun-
dred people, and I believe such ac-
tion on the part of our city govern-
ment would meet with the approval
of the citizenship.

I cannot think that our people
have yet realized the seriousness of
the situation as conditions now ex-
ist among the unemployed of our
city and county. If they did the
humane part of their being would
compel them to become interested
to the extent that many of those
out of work would be given employ-
ment of some kind.

ALL AMERICAN STAR TELLS OF FIRST THRILL

By PAUL MICHELSON
(Associated Press Sports Writer)
South Bend, Ind., Jan. 16.—(AP)—Frank Carideo marshalled two of the mightiest teams in football history, won unanimous selection as all-American quarterback two years straight, hears million fans cheer his exploits and yet—

His greatest thrill of all came on the first play he ever made for old Notre Dame—a play that didn't even muster a cheer. The play was his first tackle.

"My thrill of thrills in football came on an afternoon in October, 1928," said the one-man symphony in leather with a reminiscent gleam in his sharp eyes. "We were being pushed all over the field by little Loyola College of New Orleans and Coach Rockne, perhaps in desperation, sent me into the game with a floc of subs. No sooner had I staggered stage struck into the game when a Loyola back wriggled through and charged at me—the last obstacle between him and a touchdown. I lunged him for what seemed to me to be an hour—he must have thought I was a mad man—and got my big thrill when the referee cried me away. I'll never forget it."

A quarterback who calls a play and then backs down from it at the insistence of his dubious mates never will be a success, Carideo believes.

"One you decide on a play, carry it through," he explained. "Every quarterback sometime will experience a mild rebellion among his teammates. During the game with the Navy last fall I had mine. The ball was in midfield in our possession. It was fourth down and three feet to go. I decided to try for a first down instead of punting safely. Several of the fellows told me I was crazy to risk it. But I stuck by my guns, we made the first down by unexpected thrust and marched down for the first and psychological touchdown. Never again was my judgment, as quick as it must be in a fast game, disputed by the team. In the Carnegie Tech game when we had the ball on the sideline, second down and nine to go, I called for a drive right along the line instead of the customary sweep to the other side or the conventional step-out and the boys played so perfectly that I slid along the line for a first down—one pla that beat the Tartans."

Carideo attributes his whole football career—a career that will be extended as a teacher next fall when he drills Purdue's backfield to "Accidents." He accidentally got into football at Mount Vernon, New York High School when 15 years old; he accidentally started his quarterback career at Dean Academy, Franklin, Mass., when the coach used him because the other quarterbacks forgot signals and Frank always corrected them, and he was transformed to quarterback from halfback at Notre Dame by Rockne for just about the same reason.

"But no accident will ever cause Notre Dame to forget him," joined in Knute Rockne. "He was one of the smartest players Notre Dame ever had and I think he will go far in the coaching world—with no accidents."

Expect Wade To Reach Duke Today

Durham, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Wallace Wade, fresh from his triumphs at Alabama, will park his automobile in Durham late this afternoon and become head man, athletically speaking, at Duke University.

Dixie's "miracle man" of the gridiron, accompanied by Mrs. Wade and their two small children, spend last night in Tryon with Mrs. Wade's relatives. The family will motor here today.

A rising crop of Sophomores, drilled in Wade tactics by two former Alabama players, will be among those welcoming the new coach here. In addition to the youngsters of the squad, a large portion of the outfit that won the state championship for Duke this year will be ready for spring practice.

Just when practice will begin, who will be assistant coaches and other matters of detail will be announced by Wade after a conference with Blue Devil athletic officials.

The Chapel Hill school was one of the first in Dixie to recognize boxing and place it high in the list of intercollegiate sports.

Last year Florida's leather pushers punched their way to a title at the conference meet at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. Virginia Military Institute was second and North Carolina trailed behind, but close enough to be a threat all the way.

Over at Raleigh, North Carolina State College offered its first boxing team this year and it tied South Carolina in the opening meet.

South Carolina has an ambitious squad of punchers. They have scheduled two hard opponents—North Carolina and Duke—in successive nights.

Tulane has broken even in its two college meets this year, beating Southwestern Louisiana Institute, but losing to Louisiana State in its only conference engagement.

Reports from Clemson College are that the vacant head football coach position is attracting applications from gridiron mentors throughout the nation. More than 50 have asked for the job.

SPORTS SLANTS

The recent Miami open golf championship, with a large field containing some famous names, supported adequately the theory that the new ball is destined, for the present, at least, to exercise a gentle and restraining, if not refining, influence on the tournament game in the matter of scoring.

Joe Turnesa, the languid Italian with the beautiful swing, won in a driving finish from Johnny Farrell, Henry Clucie and Eddie Williams. Turnesa's score of 73-73-74-74—294 being two strokes over par of the Miami Springs municipal course, and one stroke better than the trio on his heels.

Farrell, finishing after dark in the last round, took three putts from 40 feet where two would have tied him with Turnesa.

A number of theories were supported, in addition to the hunch that par-busting from now on would not be indulged in so extensively.

Turnesa's amazingly consistent play, no two rounds more than a stroke apart and two of them being par for the course, emphasizes the tradition that Joe has been for years one of the most accurate hitters of a golf ball in the world, and one of the greatest stylists.

They all tell us the new ball, larger and lighter, needs more accurate stroking than the 1.62. Joe's symmetrical victory at Miami would seem to prove this.

You can vouch recall it, but George Duncan Brittain's famous theorist in golf, said in 1927, at the United States Open championship in which the British Ryder Cup team competed, that Joe Turnesa was the finest stylist in America—and he can make no exceptions. He told that to me in the locker room of the Oakmont club.

There is a lot of debate, some of it acrimonious as to the putting properties of the new ball.

One contestant at Miami certainly found them O. K. in one round, at least. Eddie Williams, who led the field at the end of the second round, brought in a card of 36-34—70 which contained just 27 putts—the Cleveland professional used only one putt on half the greens. This was the lowest card of the tourney.

John Brown of Portland, Me., amateur, acquired one of the first holes-in-one with the larger ball, getting an ace on the 125-yard seventh hole in the second round.

Johnny Farrell's sly vacation at Lake Placid seemed to have benefited him notably and his play

was strong and steady throughout the competition. As suggested, the darkness which cost him three putts at the final green kept him out of a tie with Turnesa.

Johnny's nerves also must be in pretty good shape. Going up to his ball after a long drive from the fourteenth tee in the second round, Johnny found a small but authentic rattlesnake coiled in front of the ball.

Johnny nearly stepped on the reptile, according to spectators' accounts, and one man insisted that the rattled "snapped" at Johnny. Be that as it may, another spectator, claiming familiarity with the habits and methods of rattlesnakes, borrowed Johnny's trusty niblick and decapitated the snake neatly. Perhaps it is easier to keep your eye on a snake's head than off a golf ball.

Max Baer To Meet Heeny In N. Y. City

New York, Jan. 16.—(AP)—An ambitious youngster looking forward to a chance to fight for the heavyweight championship and a fading veteran who has had that chance and failed clash in the feature ten-round bout of Madison Square Garden's boxing card tonight. Young Max Baer, heavy punching Californian, makes his second New York appearance against Tom Heeny, veteran New Zealander.

Ernie Schaaf of Boston, De-dropped a decision in ten rounds in Baer's first Garden bout he split his defeat, Baer made a big hit with the crowd with his aggressive tactics and the power behind his punches.

Heeny's career reached its climax in the summer of 1928 when the rugged blacksmith stepped into the ring against Gene Tunney, the heavyweight champion Tunney scientifically cut Old Tom to pieces, stopping him in the 11th round and since then the New Zealander's ring successes have been few and far between.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 16.—(AP)—The stock market paused for breath today, after its abrupt decline of the previous session, and recovered a little in spots, as bears grew nervous and drew in their short lines.

The market grew extremely dull on the advance, however, and neither speculative factious nor manipulative much courage. Trading was desultory, and light, and price movements in the main were narrow. Fresh heaviness of wheat had a dampening effect upon stocks.

Such stocks as U. S. Steel, American Telephone, American Water Works, Public Service of N. J., Westinghouse, Dupont and Air Reduction sold up a point or so, but advances were not well maintained. Allied Chemical rose nearly 4 points, the lot much of its gain Bethlehem Steel was under pressure, and slipped close to its 1920 low, as brokerage gossip had it that its fourth quarter net left little if anything for the common stock. Some of the merchandising shares were under pressure, notably Sears Roebuck. The Armour stocks eased, possibly reflecting the sudden death of the company's president.

News of a character to influence the security markets was almost completely lacking, and traders in the main were content to stay on the sidelines. It was generally acknowledged in brokerage circles that yesterday's decline was accompanied by bear selling, but it was sharp enough to inspire caution.

It was notable that the annual weekly index of commodity prices showed a negligible change from their previous week. For five weeks it has fluctuated within a range of less than half a point, the narrowest movement in a year.

This lends support to the hope that stability is being or has been achieved.

The foreign exchange market gave further evidence that the efforts to relieve the strain on sterling exchange on Paris were meeting with success, and news of further news toward that end was regarded as constructive. The financial community was inter-

Endorse Jonas For The Post of District Attorney

Charlotte, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Representative Charles A. Jonas, of Lincoln, Republican, had the unqualified endorsement today of at least two prominent state Republican leaders for the post of U. S. District Attorney, which Thomas J. Harkins, of Asheville, has announced he will give up.

Mr. Harkins' resignation was announced yesterday in Washington by Representative George M. Prichard, of Asheville, who said he would support Mr. Jonas to succeed Mr. Harkins.

Mr. Prichard is a member of the Republican state executive committee and also Republican National committeeman from North Carolina.

Denying that his resignation had any political significance, Mr. Harkins at Asheville said he also would support Mr. Jonas for the Western North Carolina post. An increased private law practice prompted his resignation, Mr. Harkins said. He asked that he be relieved of the duties of the office by March 1 or as soon as a successor is named.

At Greensboro, James S. Duncan, Republican state chairman, announced he would have to communicate with other members of the state committee regarding recommendation of a successor to Mr. Harkins.

Previously, Mr. Duncan had said: "If Mr. Harkins should resign as district attorney for the western district, I would be pleased to see Congressman Jonas appointed to the post."

The Congressional term for Mr. Jonas, who was defeated by his Democratic opponent in the last general election, will expire March 4.

Millionaire Killed In Fall From Window

Chicago, Jan. 16.—(AP)—The career of F. Edson White, multi-millionaire who worked his way up from the ranks to the presidency of Armour and Company, packers, was ended last night in a seven-story fall from a window of a bedroom in his northside home.

His neck was broken and many bones fractured. His death, Deputy Coroner P. J. Dwyer and P. L. Reed, treasurer of Armour and Company, said, was an accident.

Reed, who was expected to testify today at a coroner's inquest, expressed belief that a fall White suffered last Wednesday night when he arose to address company employees at a dinner, was responsible for the accident. He believed the previous accident caused White to become dizzy and lose his balance last night.

Reed said White's financial affairs were in excellent shape and that there was no reason why he should take his life. His statement that the death was an accident was concurred in by the deputy coroner. White's body was found on a pile of ground six feet wide, and extending the length of the building, and Dwyer concluded its closeness to the structure indicated clearly death was accidental. Otherwise, he said, the body would have been found at a greater distance from the building.

White was chosen president of Armour and Company in 1923 after a humble beginning as a car checker from which he was promoted district manager, later director and vice-president, and finally president. She succeeded J. Ogden Armour when the latter retired.

Hungry Convict Gives Up

Payetteville, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Because he was hungry and unable to find work, Robert E. Hill, who escaped from state's prison September 17, surrendered to Cumberland County officers today. He was convicted in Johnson county for larceny of an automobile.

Canceled Checks Used in Case of Screen Actress

Los Angeles, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Hundreds of canceled checks, by which the state contends it will prove Daisy De Boe embezzled \$16,000 from her erstwhile employer, Clara Bow, screen star, were in evidence in the trial of the former secretary today.

George Armstrong, auditor, sat in the witness stand most of yesterday describing the checks in detail while the crowds that had flocked to the courtroom for a glimpse of the red-haired actress dwindled to a handful.

The checks, Armstrong explained, were a record of the special Clara Bow account, to which Miss De Boe had access for two years as Clara's secretary, and Miss De Boe's account. He said checks amounting to approximately \$48,000 had disappeared.

Marjorie Fairchild, district attorney's investigator, who first questioned Miss De Boe and obtained jewelry, love letters and telegrams from her safety deposit box, described some of the things she found.

There was a diamond studded vanity case, she testified, which Miss De Boe said she took from the actress' home because "Clara let her dogs play with it." Miss Fairchild testified the defendant admitted taking the things "because it was so easy to get them from a careless child like Clara."
