CAMPBELL IS ROTE SPEAKER

U. S. Army Officer Speaks On Subject of National Defense Act

He spoke on the subject of the "National Defense Act" and brought out many facts of interest relative to the movement for more complete national defense.

Seek Court Order to Disclose Hiding Place of Treasure

St. Joseph, Mich., Jan. 20.—(AP)—The law was invoked yesterday in a treasure hunt which has for its prize between \$600,000 and \$700,000—hidden riches of the late "King" Benjamin Purnell of the House of David Colony.

H. T. Dewhirst, who was counsel for the colony during the life of "King" Ben and now is the leader, filed suit in Berrien County Circuit court for a writ which would compel Mrs. Ada Ross Schneider, for 25 years auditor and secretary of the colony, to disclose the hiding place of the money.

Mrs. Schneider's attorney, George H. Bookwalter, said she had told him the secret wealth is in

\$1,000 bills, locked in vaults whose location was revealed only to her and to a few other women in the colony. Existence of the money, the attorney said his client had told him, was not known even to Dewhirst although he has been head of the colony since "King" Benjamin's death, three years ago.

Mrs. Schneider has left the colony and is preparing to bring suit to recover for her services. Attorney Bookwalter said the colony had offered to settle with her for \$5,000. Now, however, Judge Dewhirst asks a complete accounting and directions for finding the hidden hoard of \$1,000 bills.

There were allusions to the secret wealth a year and a half ago while Judge Dewhirst and "K" Benjamin's widow, "Queen" Mary Purnell, were contesting for leadership of the colony. Their difficulties were not aired in court, however, and "Queen" Mary abdicated without any public discussion of colony finances.

Attorney Bookwalter said Mrs. Schneider had assured him the money still is safe, unless colony members have discovered its hiding place by chance.

Young Woman Kills Father's Slayer in DeWitt, Arkansas

DeWitt, Ark., Jan. 20.—(AP)—A judgment of death, rendered in a crowded courtroom by the pistol of a 17-year-old Mrs. Helen Spence Eaton, has ended the trial of the accused slayer of her father before a jury could return a verdict.

With dramatic suddenness, the daughter from the White river country rose from her seat yesterday and fired four bullets into the body of Jack Worls, 30, just as the jury prepared to file from the room to deliberate charges of murder against him.

Her action ended a River episode that cost the life of her father, A.

ABOUT TOWN

No matter what your opinion may
be, enforce the law!

This was the gist of Judge Devin's
charge to the new six months' grand
jury which began action with the
opening of the criminal term of
Superior court in this city yester-
day.

The laws of the nation may be
rather multitudinous, the presiding
judge declared, but every one of
them is necessary if the rights of
the people are to be protected.

He pointed out that the need of
the laws was more conspicuous in
the cities than the rural district,
but they serve their purpose in both
localities and should be fully re-
garded by the men empowered to
enforce them.

He told the jurors to consider
every angle of the various cases to
come before them during the next
six months, and not to be govern-
ed by the opinion of others. The
law is the law under all circum-
stances despite what other people
think, and must be enforced if it
is to serve its purpose to humanity.

It was a direct, forceful appeal
and conducive to much thought on
the part of the recalcitrant citizen
when permits himself to be swayed
more by sentiment than the facts
in a case.

With an epidemic of measles,
chicken pox and a mild form of
influenza sweeping over the city,
parents should do everything possi-
ble to safeguard their own children
and the children of others as well.

If your child has a slight infec-
tion, it is your duty to call in a
doctor and determine what is the
matter. By permitting that child
to attend school or go out and
mingle in public is imperiling the
safety of other people.

The Board of Health quarantines
for both measles and chicken pox
and imposes a fine upon people who
do not comply with the regulation.

Either of the infections is serious,
but they cause much inconvenience
and loss of time and it is nothing
but fair and right that the public
should do everything possible to
check the epidemic as much as pos-
sible.

Greenville extends a cordial wel-
come to Rev. W. A. Ryan, former
pastor of the Seventh Street
Church of Christ, Richmond, Va.,
who recently accepted the pastorate
of the local Christian church.

The new minister was not only
pastor of the largest congregation
of the denomination in the city of
Richmond but is acknowledged as
one of the leading divines of the
Disciple faith in the south.

He will have the best wishes of
members of all denominations in
his new field of endeavor, and that
he will receive the untiring aid and
co-operation of the public generally
cannot be doubted.

The city's slogan, "Our Greenville,
Yours if You Come" is called to
the attention of the newcomer and
his family, and it is hoped they will
realize its true significance and
take full advantage of it.

Lighted cigarette butts tossed
carelessly among inflammable ma-
terials has resulted in a number of
minor fires in the city of Green-
ville the last several days, and this
again brings to attention of the
public the danger incurred in the
handling of fire even when at the
end of a tiny cigarette.

The buildings in the tobacco dis-
trict were endangered by instances
of this kind over the week - end
but fortunately watchmen happen-
ed to catch the blazes in their in-
cipient stages and were able to
prevent probable heavy loss of
property.

It is difficult to understand why
people will jeopardize both life and
property by carelessness of this
kind. Why it is not just as easy
to extinguish a cigarette as it is to
throw it aside lighted is hard to
imagine, but people have done it,
and they will continue to do it un-
til they suffer some staggering in-
dividual loss that will make them
remember the danger of fire ever
after.

Greenville is making an effort to
cut down the annual toll of the
fire demon this year, and if the
public will co-operate as they should
this should not be such a difficult
task. We have a fire department

that is constantly on the alert to
prevent fires from getting out of
control, and its service would not
be needed nearly as much if the
people would be just a little more
careful and not increase the haz-
ards.

Think of the danger of the fire
on that cigarette, before you toss
it aside, and do your part toward
reducing the fire loss in Greenville
this year.

Men in close touch with the farm
situation in this part of the coun-
try have expressed opinion that the
tobacco crop next year would be
about normal despite the glutted
condition of the world market.

Farmers should consider this
statement, and despite the size of
their crop of bright leaf, confine
some of their attention to the pro-
duction of the things which they
consume at home.

With the barns and smokehouses
stocked to capacity, it will not make
so much difference how the money
crops sell, but without them the
situation existing today will not be
improved.

Leading tobaccoists in a position
to know make no bones about the
over-stocked market and have
augmented pleas of leading agri-
culturalists that the crop be re-
duced and food crops planted in its
place.

Clipping enclosed which please
publish is taken from the conserva-
tive Biblical Recorder organ of the
Missionary Baptist Denomination
in North Carolina. This article
needs no comment. It speaks for
itself. Most of the news coming out
in the papers tell about our being
at or near the foot of the ladder
in the matter of education. I don't
remember seeing any list of the
states in matters of education that
did no place North Carolina in the
40's. We are always told how much
better nearly all the other states
are educating their children than
is North Carolina. Now if all this
money has been spent under the
direction of Mr. Allen and his as-
sociates and if North Carolina is
still way down the ladder in edu-
cation somewhere in the 40's, then
it seems that we must content our-
selves to remain in the 40's unless
perhaps we can find men to spend
our millions more wisely than Mr.
Allen has done.

"LOCAL PUBLIC DEBTS.—The
local debts of the State are put
down as \$375,604.601. Of which
amount \$355,291,917 is for school
buildings and for a literary fund,
whatever that may mean. One has
but to travel along any highway to
see the magnificent school buildings,
costing anywhere from \$250,000 to
\$500,000. It is often the case that
hard beside these magnificent struc-
tures there stands a wooden build-
ing which would have answered the
purpose for years to come. The State
has gone through an era of extra-
vagance during the last ten
years that we have never known
before, and now we are reaping the
fruits thereof. Taxes are unbear-
ably high. This is especially true
as to taxes on real estate. Notes
have been given by the State for
its bonded indebtedness which run
for forty years, and if then they are
not taken up the interest will be
\$261,564.062."

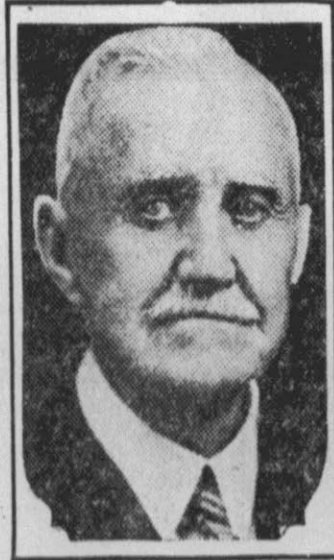

DODD ADVISES BACKS ABOUT THE BIG SHOT

(Associated Press Sports Writer)
Knoxville, Tenn., Jan. 20.—(AP)—Bobby Dodd's tip to quarterback back: "Don't waste your scoring plays."

The Tennessee all-Southern field general thinks success depends largely upon the quarterback's ability to know when to use the "big shot."

"Victory hinges around the quarterback's knack of calling the right play at the right time," said Bobby, "and the best time for a touchdown play is just after your opponents have blundered."

"They're in a fuddle, up in the air, thinking of their mistakes and sort of angry. Then's the spot for your trump card. Give it to 'em while it's hot."

"A blocked punt, fumble, intercepted pass or any break like that against a team is going to leave them stunned for a while. Just a brief period, but long enough to score—if you're ready."

Bobby gave an example from the Tennessee-Vanderbilt game last fall. "I kicked out of bounds on the three yard line. Schwartz, generally a fine kicker, got off a poor punt from behind his own goal. It was our ball on the 25 and the Commodors were up in the clouds."

"We struck. I called for a pass right off the bat and Hackman lunged it across for a touchdown which put us in the lead and the old ball game was won. If we'd waited until scoring pass it probably wouldn't have worked. They would have been set for it."

Bobby thinks his team's greatest game was against Alabama in 1928. "McEver ran the opening kick off 96 yards for a touchdown. We kicked to Bama and on the first play Suther cut loose for a long scoring run. In the second period we got a safety and I passed to Hackman for another touchdown. Bama made one also but the score was 15-13. There was no scoring in the last half."

Dan McGugin, veteran Vanderbilt coach, says Dodd is one of the greatest passers in the game. Asked how he managed to complete so many, Bobby replied in one word: "Concentration."

"I give all concentration to the job at hand—of passing or punting. I pay no attention to those charging in to tackle me. You can't pass accurately if you worry about some one hitting you."

"Many good passers and punters can't work well under pressure because they have a tendency to become taut at the critical moment of delivery. It's just like a golfer tightening up his swing in an important shot."

Bobby said he learned to kick and pass accurately by playing a type of football in high school in which no running was allowed, and kicking were the only methods of advancing the ball.

Thinks Grove Will Continue to Trouble Big League Batters

Philadelphia, Jan. 20.—(AP)—If Old "Doc" Ebling, the bone and muscle mender for the Philadelphia Athletics, knows his athletes, Robert Moss' Grove will continue to be a terror to opposing batters for years to come. He thinks the lanky left-hander is improving all the time.

"Doc" was busy packing liniments, salves, bandages and electrical apparatus for shipment to the A's spring training camp. "We won't need much of this stuff for lefty," he said. "Why the only first aid given Grove last year was a bit of adhesive tape now and then to cover the cracks at the end of his forefinger. He should go right along pitching and winning for at least fifteen years. Maybe longer. I wouldn't be surprised if he sets up a record for length of service on the mound."

"I don't remember a time that Grove had a sore arm. Watch him work and you will understand why he escaped muscles cramps that bother other curves. He is loose-jointed; gets his entire body into his serves. No jerkiness, no rigidity in his movements, but a full sweep o' arm and body that gives that speed to his fireball. He's a free-swinging, and his arm will last."

"A pitcher like Shores throws with his arm exclusively. That's why he had a sore wing frequently. Earnshaw hasn't the free delivery that marks Grove's pitching. But even so, Big George is loose enough to escape serious arm soreness. Barring accidents Grove ought to be better this season than last, and he may not reach his peak for four or five years."

DEMPSEY IN TRAINING AT METROPOLIS

New York, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Possibly it means something—very probably it doesn't—but old John Dempsey is helping himself to daily workouts at the gymnasium of Artie McGovern, muscle moulder to the princes of the sports realm.

He stalked into the foundry of McGovern yesterday for the first time in months, accompanied by the ever-reliable Gus Wilson, French trainer and companion he acquired by knocking Georges Carpentier loose from his entourage that overcast July afternoon in Boyle's Thirty Acres, back in 1921.

He had asked that the deepest secrecy surround his visits and the surprise was mutual when he collided with a reporter, a fellow warrior against the threat of encroaching flesh, in the box-like booths that adjoin the gymnasium.

"Hy Kid," he yelled. "Let's get going."

He wouldn't admit that his presence there meant anything as far as the fight game was concerned. He needed exercise, he said, pointing out that he wasn't alone in that respect. Fight plans? He had none.

McGovern stretched the former king of them all on a mat and put him through a tough grind of leg and body exercises. Dempsey took it in great style. He punched the bag, shadow-boxed, wrestled. He jumped on the scales and the needle rested at 203 pounds, eight pounds above what would be his best fighting weight today.

The bundled him into an electric hot box with the breathless reported anchored in the next stall and turned on the heat. Perspiration rolled all over the place. It brought out some fight talk. "Stribling and Sharkey will draw \$700,000 in Chicago—no more—no more fighters in the world can draw more today—times are too tough—Sharkey and I this summer? \$2,000,000—don't be silly—that kind of money died with Tex Rickard."

But later on he went to dinner. He sketched his financial situation on the table cloth. He has a trust fund of \$700,000 wisely invested and returning him a fine income. He receives a neat yearly revenue from real estate interests. He demonstrated on the table linen that if he lives to the ripe old age of 70 he still will have \$100 a day to spend for the rest of his life. His attitude indicated that he would leap at the chance a score or more financial killing but he doesn't believe that the promoters of today can work up the interest there used to be in the heavyweight battles of the century.

SPORTS SLANTS
Consider the case of the College of Puget Sound, at Tacoma, Washington. Columns have been spilled on subject of commercialism and over-emphasis in football, the menace of the gate receipts, the million-dollar athletic budget and the ballyhoo.

At the College of Puget Sound, the student manager reports that football showed a net LOSS of \$2,000, whereas debating and dramatics, among other undergraduate activities, produced profits, last year.

Had football broken even, it might be said that affairs had reached the ideal state of proportion in the collegiate organization. Educators might, in fact, hail this as a great example. However, at the College of Puget Sound there is no enthusiasm whatever.

Nelson R. Hong, in the Tacoma News Tribune, writes: "Logger graders played to little more than empty seats in Tacoma. Lack of color is the reason football fans did not turn out in large numbers. With this disastrous financial season behind it, the College of Puget Sound should be more anxious than ever to do something to put football on a self-supporting basis, if not a paying basis."

"By employing a coach of personality and color, the College of Puget Sound can take the most effective step to rout Oyd Man Financial Difficulty."

As the boys in Enid, Okla., and elsewhere have hastened to point out to us, Eddie Morgan, the Cleveland clouter, seems more occupied with making a success of the first base job than with any ambitions to be another Cobb or Speaker in the outfield.

In fact Eddie played only 19 games in the outfield last year, as compared with 129 at first base, where he displaced the veteran Portuguese, Lew Fonseca, and turned in a very neat job.

The British attitude in sport may be recommended to America, as it was by the Carnegie Foundation's report, yet it seems that John Bull

at times also has a few difficulties to worry about. For example, the following circumstances described in a Glasgow dispatch to the London Evening Standard:

He represented Scotland on two occasions against England. Miller played for nine seasons with Hamilton Academicals."

North Wilkesboro. —(AP)—No longer will Sheriff W. B. Somers of Wilkes county have to borrow a bloodhound from Ashe county when he desires to trail a prisoner. The Ashe County hound made such a fine record, the county commissioners have authorized the purchase of a dog of the same breed.

Tar Heels Will Face Hard Time Next Season
Chapel Hill, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The Tar Heels next fall will face the "toughest" football schedule in the history of the university, says Head Coach Chuck Collins—and they are going to get ready for it.

A stiff six-weeks period of winter practice will begin tomorrow, and, in the words of the head coach, it's going to mean something in shaping the 1931 gridiron fortunes of the Tar Heel crew.

"Winter practice is more important than fall practice," said Collins last night at the annual gridiron dinner when he announced plans for the January-February drill.

"And," he added with emphasis, "those who miss winter practice will have little chance making next fall's team, for with the hard schedule we face experience is going to count more than ever."

Next fall's competition, the mentor avowed, will be the toughest any university team has met.

Collins explained that in the winter sessions, the gridsters would have an opportunity to brush up on their game from a to z. Four or more teams will be organized, he said, and intra-mural games will be played on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Says Helen Will Be Champion of Net In Few Years

St. Augustine, Fla., Jan. 20.—(AP)—Helen Hick's 20th birthday is a month away but Johnny Farrell says he believes she will be National Woman's Golf champion within a few years.

Farrell, who never before had the opportunity of playing with the Long Island golfer, followed her game during three rounds here recently.

"Helen Hicks has everything now to win the National championship," Farrell said. "She has a wonderfully fine swing, embodying perfect relaxation, an excellent knowledge of the game and above all a splendid temperament for the game and for a champion."

Farrell advised Miss Hicks against a tendency to analyze her shots in detail. "This is not helpful to anybody's game. It was proved so in the case of Gère Sarzen in 1923. It was proved in the case of Horton Smith and I know for my own part that as soon as I began figuring out how and why I hit the ball, I thought too much about the component parts of the swing and did not concentrate on hitting the ball."

"Bobby Jones is an exception because of his wonderful power of concentration but Bobby has not had to do much in the way of instruction and it will be interesting to see what he does or how his game will be affected after he had made pictures."

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The retreat of a discouraged bear element gave the share market a firm tone in today's trading.

The lethargy of the market, however, still held the general price movement to a narrow area and advances were not well maintained. Professional traders found little in the Wickersham report to interpret either bullishly or bearishly, although it had been awaited expectantly. Opposition to the legalizing of light wines and beer may have been a factor in a moderate rise in the beverage stocks.

Gains of a point or two were numerous during the early trading and a few issues made wider gains but the tide eased off a little from the top during the early afternoon. Extreme gains of 2 points or more were recorded before the movement was checked by American Telephone, American Can, New York Central, Union Carbide, Air Reduction, Lambert, Washish, Chicago and Northwestern, Continental Baking, A. Johns Mansville, Consolidated Gas and Case, Allied Chemical, sold up nearly 6.

Shares advancing a point or more included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, McKeesport, Atchison, Chesapeake and Ohio, Woolworth, Grand Silver, Standard of N. J., Borden, North American, Coca Cola and Canada Dry. Missouri Kansas Fluorine, rather widely, in response to the announcement of no action on the dividend, followed by the disclosure that it would be considered later.

The action of the share market was discouraging to traders favoring either side, and the speculative community seemed to be reconciling to a period of quiet, narrow markets, such as have marked the bottom of many major bear markets in the past.

Money continued to cheapen and the bond market continued to maintain a good tone, with trading a little more active. Call money held at 11-12 per cent officially but time loans and commercial

Old Government Still Captured In Wake County

Raleigh, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Fifty years ago or more the spirits of fermented grain twisted through the worm of a big copper still in this section.

Less than 50 days ago, local officers claim, the same process was repeated in the same copper still. But it won't happen again.

The officers yesterday descended upon the home of J. W. Walden, negro, near here, seized the old "government" booze plant and smashed it to pieces. They found it rigged up on the second floor of Walden's home.

Walden, protesting that he always made "good, clean corn liquor" was jailed.

Many years ago, long before North Carolina went dry, the officers were told, the old 110-gallon still, made of copper a quarter of an inch thick, belonged to L. J. Johnson, who lived in this section.

Legislation allowing more latitude for Federal searchers and seizures was opposed.

If the dry amendment is to be revised at all, the commissioners agreed it should be made to read substantially as follows:

"The Congress shall have power to regulate or to prohibit the manufacture, traffic in or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into and the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes."

As it now stands, the amendment reads:

"The manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited. The Congress and the

several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."

The commission renewed its recommendation made just a year ago for modification of the national prohibition Act and for legislation for making procedure for padlock injunction cases more effective.

"Co-operation of the states is an essential element in enforcement," it held, and "the support of public opinion in the several states is necessary in order to insure such co-operation."

Continued improvement in organization and efforts for enforcement since the Act for the bureau of prohibition was enacted in 1927 was reported.

Judge Anderson's opinion was by far the most exhaustive of the eleven

individual papers, covering 42 of the 288 printed pages of the combined report. His plea for government-controlled liquor sales would be based on the amendment suggested to replace the present Act. If such a revision should be entered into.
