CLARK TEST CASE AIRED AT CAPITAL

Ruling Holding the Eighteenth Amendment Invalid In the Supreme Court

Washington, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The Clark decision holding the eighteenth amendment invalid was put to test today in the Supreme Court. Chief Justice Hughes withdrew from hearing the government's appeal, announcing he submitted a brief to the court when prohibition was before it in 1920 and thus considered himself disqualified.

The decision of Federal Judge William Clark of New Jersey, was based on a contention that the amendment to be valid should have been ratified by state conventions rather than by state legislatures.

Solicitor General Thacher presented the government's oral argument.

He said it seemed clear that article five of the constitution had conferred ample authority upon Congress for its determination to refer the amendment to state legislatures.

He added the article was a mandate upon Congress and left it free to use its own judgment in determining whether the prohibition amendment should be referred to state legislatures or conventions.

The solicitor general insisted that Congress was at liberty to determine in all cases whether a proposed constitutional amendment should be submitted to state legislatures or state conventions for ratification.

The decision of the Supreme Court in the national prohibition cases determined the question raised by Judge Clark's decision, he continued.

In closing, he said: "This attack against the eighteenth amendment falls utterly and completely to the ground because based upon a fundamental misconception of the character of the government which had been created by the constitution."

Voluntarily Henry Cohen began the argument for those seeking to sustain Judge Clark's decision.

He said such an important case had not been presented to the court in years.

Originally there was no power in the government to prohibit or regulate the sale of liquor, he said, except by an amendment conferring this power. The eighteenth amendment, he added, was a purported grant of such new power. He said he would attempt to show it was the intent of the framers of the constitution to have such amendments as the eighteenth ratified by conventions and not state legislatures.

Minors Capitulate to Draft Demands

New York, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Baseball's battle over the universal draft is ended and the spoils of war belong to the major leagues.

The minor leagues' defenses, slowly crumbling for several weeks, collapsed yesterday when the last Class AA stronghold, the International League, voted to accept the majors' demands.

The International League, where resistance to the most violent anti-draft sentiment was manifested, was forced to yield to a superior force. Its four allies, the Class AA American Association and the Pacific Coast League, the Class A Western League and the Class B Three-Year League previously had capitulated to the majors and left the International to fight the good fight alone.

A majority of the league's club owners decided that the battle was too unequal and what had threatened to develop into a bitter and costly baseball war had resolved into nothing more than a harmless verbal duel won by the majors without bloodshed.

Ending of warfare will bring about a renewal of business relations between the majors and the five leagues hitherto classified as non-draft minors.

Chief points in the sweeping triumph gained by the majors were two-fold: First, they now can draft any player from the minors at a set price provided he has had four years of experience in minor league baseball; second, they can send out on option to minor league clubs 15 players instead of eight as had previously been the rule.

The draft dispute began last summer when the majors demanded that the five non-draft leagues accept the draft before Dec. 1.

Coldsboro, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Endorsement of a proposal to make immediate cash payment of compensation certificates to World War veterans was the first act of the newly organized Coldsboro post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Cole H. Bain was installed as commander of the post at exercises last night.

CANNON NOW FACES DOUBLE INVESTIGATION

Church and Campaign Funds Committee to Probe His Political Activities

Washington, Jan. 21.—(AP)—From two widely separated quarters investigation descended today upon Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Decision has been reached within his church to have a board of elders meet within the next three weeks here in Washington to determine whether the bishop should be held for trial before the general conference. He will be called before the elders.

Meanwhile, taking advantage of the passage of the Glass resolution which empowered the Nye campaign funds investigating committee to investigate activities surrounding the 1928 elections upon complaint, Representative Tinkham Republican of Massachusetts, prepared to furnish grounds for a study of the bishop's anti-Smith activities in Virginia and nearby southern states.

The Massachusetts anti-prohibitionist had repeatedly made charges against Cannon, surrounding the latter's refusal to account to Congress for \$65,300 contributed for the anti-Smith campaign.

The Methodist proceedings against Cannon are the outgrowth of charges filed against him last year by four ministers. The accusations never were made public but were understood to include both political activities and stock market operations of the bishop and possibly other matters.

Cannon, who has been ill, is now in Marlin, Texas, recuperating. The charges within the church were made while he was in Brazil on a tour of missions assigned to his charge. Soon after his return he entered a hospital here to take treatment for arthritis. Recently he was able to leave his bed and went south.

He had questioned the legality of the manner in which the accusations were brought against him but was overruled. To bring him before the next church conference, which is to be held in 1934—a majority of the elders constituting the preliminary trial board must find the evidence sufficiently grave.

Continue Cases for Non-Payment Taxes

Bayboro, Jan. 21.—(AP)—You'll have to hand it to Sheriff C. W. Gibbs, of Pamlico county. He knows how to pull the county out of a tight place.

He proved this when several of 1930 men hailed in court for non-payment of their poll tax told the court they had no money to pay the \$2 tax or a \$50 fine for failure thereof. The alternative was 90 days in jail.

But the jail would hold more than a half a dozen or so prisoners. Besides cash in the county's coffers was running low.

"If anybody in this crowd," said Sheriff Gibbs, "expects a month's free lodgings and board at the expense of Pamlico county, he is doomed to disappointment."

Approximately Three Hundred Thousand Men to Be Employed in Building Roads Long Enough to Circle the Globe; Six States Unable to Furnish Estimate of Program. Although They Will Spend Huge Sums Also

New roads long enough to circle the globe will criss-cross America beneath the straining muscle of some 300,000 workmen this year at a cost not far short of a billion dollars.

Reports compiled today show that upwards of 9,000 miles of the approximate 25,000 mile total will be hard surface. This is exclusive of 11 states in which highway commissions could make no mileage estimates.

The actual cost estimates not including 6 states in which road programs still are under legislative consideration and taking no account of independent county highway construction, is \$816,048,923, of which the federal government will contribute \$293,500,000.

The estimate of workmen to benefit in the program is perforce conservative since a total of nine states have no definite figures on this particular item.

The six states unable at this time to forecast any figures are Arizona, Vermont, Tennessee, Massachusetts, Ohio and New Mexico. Tennessee expects to match its federal allocation of \$4,400,000, however, and the governor of Massachusetts has proposed a bond issue of \$10,000,000.

ROOT URGES ADHERENCE WORLD COURT

Women Crowd Foreign Relations Room As Venerable Statesman Speaks

Washington, Jan. 21.—(AP)—A group of women crowded the Senate foreign relations committee room today as the venerable American statesman, Elihu Root, urged American adherence to the World Court.

Mr. Root, who will be 86 years old next month, said there were two obstacles in the way of acceptance by other powers of the Senate reservation upon American adherence in 1926. This reservation provided that the court should not render an advisory opinion on any question in which the United States had, or claimed to have, an interest without first obtaining the consent of this government.

"First," he said, "in the asking of advisory opinions of the court, the assembly and the council of the League of Nations would be obliged to proceed in ignorance of the attitude of the United States. It would throw doubt and delay around all proceedings."

"Second, there was ignorance on the part of the other powers of the council as to the meaning of the term intended in the reservation. There was ignorance as to the scope the United States would give to the term 'interests.' It might mean legal interest, it might mean political interest and so forth."

Mr. Root, a former secretary of state, recited instance of the application of such provisions in other treaties. He recalled the treaty of 1832 with Russia which he said was terminated.

"No difficulties arise any more over termination," he said. "So the Senate's reservation and its acceptance very much relieved the difficulty in making the agreement."

Root then took up the negotiations for meeting the Senate's objectionable reservation regarding advisory opinions. He met two years ago with other international jurists to solve the problem.

Reading the solution then worked out, as provided in the protocol now before the Senate, Root said: "It does not in the slightest degree modify the Senate's reservation."

Root said the United States was protected at all times by another Senate reservation already accepted by the other powers "which makes the agreement terminable at will."

General Assembly Asked To Memorialize Congress To Pay World War Vets

Bills Also Introduced Today Designed to Cut Teachers' Salaries Ten Percent and to Have the State Take Over All County Roads; Pitt County Senator Introduces Bill to Require Licensing of Drivers

Raleigh, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The legislature of North Carolina was asked today by Senator Johnson of Duplin county to record itself as favoring immediate payment of adjusted service certificates of world war veterans. Bills designed to cut teachers' salaries 10 per cent and to have the state take over all county roads were also presented.

The Duplin Senator introduced a joint resolution in the upper House of the General Assembly requesting Congress to enact legislation necessary to allow payment, setting forth that "unemployment and distress can be reduced and our nation made prosperous immediately without changing our tax laws."

Family Barely Escapes Death As Home Burns

Wilson, Jan. 21.—(AP)—peacefully sleeping while fire gradually enveloped their home, seven people barely escaped with their lives here early today.

W. R. Dickens, his wife and five children awoke just in time to flee as the roof fell in. They escaped with only their night clothes, a high wind having spread the flames during their sleep to such an extent that recovery of other belongings was impossible.

Janitor Injured When Hit By Car

Raleigh, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Allan Hayward, janitor at State College since the foundation of the school, was probably fatally injured this morning when struck by an automobile said to have been driven by H. S. Harper of Littleton.

Hayward was immediately carried to St. Agnes hospital where he was attended by Dr. A. C. Campbell, college physician.

Dr. Campbell said Hayward's skull had been fractured near the base and that he was in a critical condition.

Hayward has been one of the interesting figures on the college campus for many years. Retired from active janitorial work some three years ago on account of his age, he has had charge of the campus mail and acted as messenger between the administration building and the other schools. He has always been held high in the estimation of both teachers and students, having a reputation for honesty, integrity and gentlemanly behavior under all circumstances.

Tumult Over Report On Eighteenth Amendment Continues To Increase

Hundred Million Dollars Increase In Government Building Plan Approved

House Committee Passes On Bill Sponsored By Chairman Elliott to Increase Public Building Funds Outside District of Columbia to \$415,000,000; Kelly Bill Also Given An O. K.

Washington, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The administration's \$100,000,000 proposal to increase its public buildings program outside of the District of Columbia to \$415,000,000 was approved today by the House buildings committee.

The committee also approved the Kelly bill to authorize \$45,000,000 for the purchase or construction of buildings for post office stations, branches and garages in connection with existing federal buildings.

The \$100,000,000 bill, sponsored by Chairman Elliott, is to assist the Treasury and post office departments in carrying out the public buildings program within five years instead of ten as originally planned. It will permit the construction of scores of buildings in various cities having annual postal revenues in excess of \$20,000.

The executive office, including President Hoover's salary of \$75,000 was awarded \$532,500, a decrease of \$28,000 attributable largely to the absence of an appropriation for the Wickersham commission. (Continued on page six)

HUNGER RIOT LEADERS PUT BEHIND BARS

Oklahoma City Takes Steps to Relieve Hunger Following Storming of Grocery

Oklahoma City, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Leaders of a mob which stormed a grocery here yesterday shouting for food, were in jail as the city and state took steps today to relieve suffering among the unemployed.

With them was Francis Owens, described by police as instigator of the attack on the store, who was arrested following a demonstration by 100 men last night.

Lewis Morris, county attorney, said charges of inciting to riot would be filed against seven. The grocery was looted after leaders reported the result of a conference with city officials was "the same old bunk."

"These men and women are hungry," they told H. A. Shaw, store manager. "It's too late to bargain with us now."

About 300 persons, including white men and women and negroes raided the store and seized food. Windows were smashed. Police dispersed them with tear gas and arrested 26 men. No one was injured severely.

Governor William H. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray, conferred with Sheriff Stanley Rogers and Ed Fry, city manager, following the raid. He promised state aid.

Masons Pay Tribute To Former Leader

Raleigh, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Masons of North Carolina, gathered here in the annual communication of the Grand Lodge, today paid tribute to the memory of the first Grand Master of the state and this afternoon was to be devoted to memorial services for Masons who died during the past year.

The Grand Lodge marched in a body today from their hall to the state capital and placed a wreath on the bust of Samuel Johnston, in the rotunda of the state house.

Johnston, who was Grand Master in 1787, was also first governor of the state.

SEVERAL DRAW TERMS TO PEN IN COURT HERE

Fountain Negro Given Ten Years On Second Degree Murder Charge

Pleading guilty to a charge of second degree murder, Alex Edwards, colored, of the Fountain community, was sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary by Judge W. A. Deyn of Oxford, in yesterday's session of the criminal term of Pitt County Superior court.

Edwards was held in connection with the murder of Charlie Newton, colored, which occurred on a road near Fountain last December. The affair was said to have resulted from an argument.

Gilbert Dupree, Greenville negro, who has played an important part in a series of thefts in this community the last several months, was sent up to Raleigh to spend ten years in the penitentiary. Dupree was charged with breaking in the Greenville Laundry, and the theft of automobiles.

Three Ayden young men, charged with the robbery of two stores in that town about a month or so ago, were sentenced to one year each in the penitentiary. They were Cal Cox, Harvey Griffin and Jack Cullifer. Sandy Williams, colored, held for complicity in the same case was adjudged not guilty.

The youths were alleged to have entered Bynum's Grocery Store and obtained cigarettes and furs. Part of the stolen goods was recovered by county officers.

Robert Joyner and Nettie Sugg drew one year each in the penitentiary following conviction on a charge of larceny. They were arrested for stealing clothing.

John Harder and Joe Harder, charged with larceny, was sentenced to the county roads for 4 months each.

Tony Watson, colored, was sent out to the county roads to spend six months on a charge of larceny. Willie Wilson, charged with the larceny of a bicycle at Grimesland, was given from two to five years in the pen.

Huge Paintings for Los Angeles Near Completion Now

London—(AP)—Mural paintings, believed the largest produced in several centuries, have reached their final stage in the studio here of Dean Cornwell, American artist.

But he still has a year's work ahead of him, although he and his assistants have been at the task since 1927.

The huge pictures are destined to be hung in the Los Angeles public library.

They depict the colorful history of southern California from the time of discovery, through the era of Spanish missions, the days of "forty-niners" and finally the beginning of the modern city.

The 250 figures in the series, each twice its natural height and all drawn to scale, have been finished. The task now is to transfer these to the big canvases that are to adorn the walls of the library. The commission must be finished by February, 1932.

"I must have sketched at least a thousand poses before I found the right ones to make the entire set move smoothly," said Cornwell. "All details had to be coordinated so the finished work would be decorative, instead of merely illustrative."

The set consists of twelve panels. The four large ones, each 40 feet square, show figures twice their natural height, the first depicting the era of discovery in the 16th century.

The second shows the mission age and the third the active colonization period, with the clipper ship, the covered wagon and finally the locomotive bringing settlers who push the Spanish element out of the far corner of the picture.

The fourth of the big panels portrays the beginnings of Los Angeles.

The complimentary panels, eight in number, treat of the development of native arts and industries under the tutelage of the mission padres. Weaving, pottery making and olive culture are given treatment in three.

Cornwell was born in Louisville, Ky., 35 years ago. He started his art work on Chicago newspapers and married Mildred Kirkham of Evanston while both worked on the Chicago Tribune. Later he went in for magazine illustrating in New York.

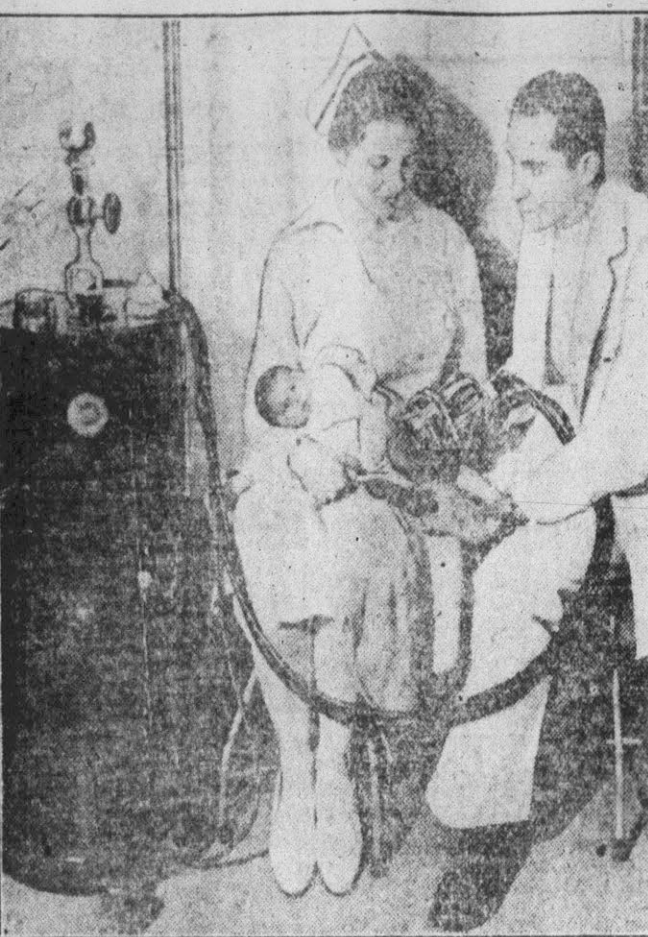
JOHNS TURN FISHERMEN. FIND 4000 'EXTRA JOBS'

LEGION POST WILL OBSERVE ROUNDUP WEEK

Intensive Membership Campaign Will Be Launched Here Next Week

Members of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion are determined to bring about a pronounced increase in membership during the present year.

Meeting in regular monthly session at the Rotary club last night, the Legionnaires decided to inaugurate an intensive membership campaign next week. This will be in keeping with a similar campaign to be launched through the State Department and it is hoped to add many new members throughout the state.

Commander J. C. Elliott read a letter from the State Department asking support of the local organization in "Round-up Week" campaign, and then called on every member of the post to do his part toward success of the undertaking.

A meeting of the executive committee was called for Friday of this week at which time plans for the campaign here will be completely worked out and committees appointed to carry on the work.

The Legionnaires, in addition to discussing the membership drive, also enjoyed their usual supper and discussed several other matters affecting the life of the post.

Mayor J. C. Lanier and D. C. Moore, Jr., members of a committee appointed at the last meeting to arrange for a boxing bout, reported they had taken up the matter with different parties but had not yet been able to perfect definite plans for the fight.

Commander Elliott read a letter from the national organization requesting that the post make a survey of Pitt county, with a view of determining how many Legionnaires are unemployed. After considerable discussion, the matter was turned over to the commander with power to act.

A. B. Corey, member of a committee appointed at a previous session to draft resolutions lending the post's endorsement to the bill now in Congress providing for the full and immediate payment of all adjusted service certificates, read the resolutions and a copy was ordered sent to Congress and given due publicity.

The resolutions follow: "Whereas, the Pitt County Post No. 39, the American Legion of North Carolina, in regular meeting assembled, on Tuesday evening, the 16th day of December, 1930, feeling and realizing the need that the National Government compensate the ex-service men of the World War in a manner more befitting their service rendered.

"And Whereas, there has been introduced and is now pending in Congress a bill to enable and effect the full and immediate payment to all holders of Adjusted Service Certificates, of the total amount due thereon at the due date of said Adjusted Service Certificates.

"And Whereas, this Post is of the unanimous opinion that the full and immediate payment of said Adjusted Service Certificates is a fair and equitable way in which to extend to the ex-service men of the World War, during this period of unemployment and deflation of finances, and would effect more general relief throughout the nation than any other plan that might be proposed.

Now, Therefore, be it resolved, that the Pitt County Post No. 39, the American Legion, Department of North Carolina, does hereby endorse the bill.

Floating Ox-Carts Carry Explorers Into South America

Buenos Aires—(AP)—Application of the "amphibian" principle to ox-carts will mark the fourth expedition of Captain Luigi Longobardi to the central wildernesses of South America.

The Italian explorer stopped here en route to Lima, Peru, whence his party will head eastward through the Upper Amazon region. Then the group will turn south to penetrate the Grand Chaco territory of Paraguay and Argentina.

Oil is one of the principal magnets for this years trek. The captain says it oozes out of the ground in western Brazil and that natives smear it over their bodies to discourage mosquitoes from attacking them.

The observation was made in 1925 but not much could be done about the discovery then, because 18 of the 20 members of the expedition were drowned. The leader and one companion finally reached Santos, Brazil, after two years in the wilderness.

This year the party's equipment will include apparatus for petroleum exploration and testing. It also will embrace antidotes for snake bites and remedies for typhoid.

From this point the party will turn southward to the Chaco, a vast, undefined forest wilderness, portions of which lie in Bolivia, Paraguay, Brazil and Argentina.

Captain Longobardi visited this region first in 1923. He went out again in 1925 and 1928. On his third expedition he was held captive for a time by Indians of the interior.

SENATE REAPPORTIONS DROUGHT RELIEF FUND

Washington, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The Senate today adopted a resolution reappropriating for drought loans in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina money repaid by those states on loans in 1929 and 1930.

The bill, which was passed without debate, would reappropriate for further loans about \$2,500,000 paid back by farmers in those states since 1929. It is designed to provide for feed and seed loans to farmers who would not benefit from the \$45,000,000 drought relief fund already provided.

MACDONALD GOVERNMENT DEFEATED ON EDUCATION

London, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The MacDonald government was defeated in the House of Commons today on an amendment to the education bill, but Prime Minister MacDonald said no vital principle was involved. Thus the government will not be obliged to resign.

1,500 ENGLISH "VISION" SETS NOW IN OPERATION WITH REGULAR SCHEDULE

London, Jan. 20.—(AP)—T.V. vision in England, now transmitted on regular schedule via broadcast wave lengths, numbers approximately 1,500 fans in its audience. Five morning and two evening programs a week are devoted to visual programs by the Baird Television Studios through the British Broadcasting corporation.

Programs have included brief plays, magiciana, dancers, singers and even lectures on how to use and build television sets.

The image the receivers reproduce is a little larger than postcard size—about 4 by 6 inches. There is, however, no limit to size and television has been a part of a regular theatre program here, although not on a screen the size of a movie screen.

Sound and image are broadcast on separate waves sound on 261 meters, vision on 365.

The company is making no particular effort to get both on the same band, but now are concentrating on a portable transmitter which will permit visual broadcasts from any point.

This is a leading toward visual broadcasts of news events—such as the opening of Parliament by King George.

Equipment now used is much like that in America, with certain technical variations.

Last Year Was Good to Masons In N. Carolina

Raleigh, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The report that last year was "a good year for Masonry in North Carolina" was today the Grand Lodge of the state today at its 144th annual communication.

Several indications of progress and development were pointed out by Grand Master E. W. Timberlake, Jr., of Wake Forest, in his address to the Grand Lodge last night at the opening session of the communication. Among them, the Grand Master said, was establishment of three new lodges—one at Fort Bragg, another at Gastonia and the third at Monroe.

Mr. Timberlake set aside 2 p. m. today as memorial hour for the Grand Lodge to honor Masons who died during the last year.

Turning to financial matters, the Grand Master suggested that the Grand Lodge rescind a former recommendation that the state increase its appropriation for the Oxford Orphanage from \$30,000 to \$120,000. He did this, he explained, in sympathy with the state's economy program.

Mr. Timberlake urged the Grand Lodge to continue its support to the Oxford Orphanage and to the Masonic and Easter Star Home.

try gradually doubled.

Farmers realized several thou-
sands of dollars through co-opera-
tive shipments last season and it
is needless to say that this money
came in good during the planting
season when funds are usually al-
ways short and in great demand.

Farmers should turn their atten-
tion to these extra sources of re-
venue during the future for it is only
through such a course that they
will be able to pay out and get
back on the high road to prosperity.

They cannot afford to place too
much emphasis upon the money
crops as it has been demonstrated
beyond doubt that this is no longer
safe.

Through the growing of chickens,
hogs, and food crops, the farmers
of this great agricultural region
should be able to live comfortably
despite money crop prices.

Business is on the upturn, and
the head of the steel industry in
this country is responsible for the
ascription.

He declared there was a notice-
able improvement in the business
world the last several weeks, and
ventured the prediction that this
would continue until conditions get
back to normal.

Scores of other men prominent in
the financial and business life of
the nation have made similar pre-
dictions during the last several
weeks, and these should cause the
public to look forward to the fu-
ture far more hopefully than dur-
ing the past.

With more money in the banks
of the nation than ever before,
there is absolutely no reason for so
much depression, and as soon as
the "jack" is cut loose industry in
this country is going to hum like
it never did before.

The farmer has been the object
of more advice than representatives
of any other line of industry dur-
ing the last several years, and he
is still being offered it in unlimited
amounts.

So freely have suggestions been
offered the grower that he has not
been able to determine the value
of it before somebody comes along
with something new to recommend.

Lots of suggestions are being pre-
sented at this time. In fact, prob-
ably more than ever before, and
while some of them are of little
value others are deserving of seri-
ous consideration.

We refer most particularly to the
live-at-home plan, the same pro-
gram outlined by Governor Gar-
ner over a year ago.

The program has already been
adopted by some of the planters, but
the majority have held steadfastly
to the "money crop" idea in the
hope that conditions would im-
prove.

That there is little chance for

any improvement in conditions of
the world market is indisputable,
and the only thing for the success-
ful grower to do is to plant food
and feed crops in addition to the
money crops and be prepared for
an emergency.

The old saying about "putting all
the eggs in one basket" is true and
is a dangerous undertaking, and
when the farmers of this district
get away from the habit they should
be much better off.

With an additional revenue bill
introduced in the Legislature, it ap-
pears that the boys are going to
have to burn a little midnight oil
if they separate the grain from the
chaff.

There are enough provisions in
the bills to keep the lawmakers in
session six months, and the public
will watch with interest as the
measures are given consideration.

The principal purpose of the bills
is to provide for the state taking
over six months schools and reliev-
ing land of the school tax. That
the lifting of the land tax burden
will meet the approval of the land-
owners cannot be doubted, but
those affected by the tax have al-
ready started hollering and the will
continue to yell bloody murder un-
til something definite has been ac-
complished.

SAYS MENTAL STANCE MEANS GRID VICTORY

By DILLON GRAHAM
Knoxville, Tenn., Jan. 21.—(AP)—Bobby Dodd, for two years Dixie's outstanding quarterback, says mental stance paves the way for football victories.

"All this talk about smartness and psychology is good stuff, but it's the old frame of mind and poise that counts most," he says.

For three seasons Dodd has been the generalissimo of Tennessee's great football teams and almost unanimous choice for all southern quarterback in 1929 and 1930.

"Psychology will beat you in the long run," he confided. "You can win with it sometimes, but in a tight place some other guy is going to 'out-psychologize' you. I don't pay to be too smart. You're riding for a fall when you get that way."

"The boy whose heart pumps ice water," that's the way one writer pictured Dodd, one of the coolest performers under fire in Dixie.

Bobby doesn't believe in following set rules in mapping out his attack, explaining, "I try to start out just like a boxer feeling out his opponent. I feel around with several plays, keeping close note on how certain plays go of fall to go. Then, when I'm in a scoring spot I've got a pretty good idea which of our pet touchdown plays will work."

Dodd doesn't side with those exponents of quarterback play who suggest watching the faces of the opponents to find their reaction to plays and to decide on the next play.

"That may work sometime, but if your opponents aren't mighty dumb, they can cross you up. You've got to figure that they're expecting and give them something different."

"My advice to quarterbacks—and you know I'm going to start teaching them at Georgia Tech next fall—is to study possible situations revolving around your plays ahead of time and then have several solutions available for use when the time comes. Don't wait for the circumstances and then try to depend on your quick thinking to get you out of trouble."

Dodd believes psychology is of greatest use in studying the men on one's own team.

"You've got to know your players to have success," he said. "Some of them are great under pressure and others fail when the going gets tough."

Bobby just naturally fell into the quarterback job, for two who knew anything about the game and had a sound, because he weighed only 83 pounds while in first year high school and that was too light for any other position.

"When I moved to Kingsport, Tenn., I was the only kid around who had ever played football before," he explained. "And then I owned the football. So I just gathered the boys around and started calling signals."

SPORTS SLANTS

The plot has thickened since the football slants began to debate the origin of the famous "ball-hid-dan-under-the-jersey" trick, widely attributed to the inventive mind of the Old Fox, Glenn Scobey Warner.

Following documentary evidence we recently received, showing Warner tried this play while coaching Cornell in a game against Penn State in 1897, facts have been forwarded to me by William T. Christian, sports editor of the Richmond News Leader, disclosing that Auburn used the maneuver successfully against Vanderbilt in 1895.

"Strange as it seems, helped stimulate the debate, for Christian writes as follows: 'Strange as it seems, the man who disputes Warner's claim to the creation of the play was depicted in John Hix's column. The day after Ripley noted Warner, Reynolds Tichenor, 116-pound quarterback who made the All-Southern three years in succession, while playing with Auburn, was shown in Hix's cartoon.'

"Fuzzy Woodruff's history of Southern Football, Vol. 1, quotes Tichenor, now an Atlanta lawyer, as follows:

"The play was simply this. When the ball was snapped it went to a halfback. The play, was closely massed and well screened. The halfback then thrust the ball under the back of my jersey. Then he would crash into the line. After the play I simply trotted away to a touchdown."

"The play, after being practiced, was used by Auburn against Vanderbilt and Tichenor scored a touchdown. Vanderbilt won, however, 9-6, the first time in the history of southern football that a field goal decided a game."

"All that, according to Woodruff, the newspapers of the time, Tichenor and H. H. Smith, a Richmond business man, who played halfback, happened in the fall of 1895, at least two years before Warner claims to have used the play. And Warner was then coaching at Georgia, where he no doubt heard of it."

"Believe it or not, strange as it seems, Ripley had Warner calling the hidden ball trick play; John Hix had a drawing of Tichenor, who also claims to be its originator; and Mr. Smith, Tichenor's team-mate, set me straight in the whole matter, all inside a week, although it happened more than 30 years ago."

All the hue and cry about college sport over-emphasis is very annoying to a number of the old timers, among them Elmer Oliphant, regarded by many discerning coaches, including Biff Jones and Knute Rockne, as one of the four or five greatest backfield men the game has produced.

Oliphant, now an insurance salesman in New York, insists that it is "all the bunk"; that he got nothing but benefit, physically and mentally, out of his assorted activities which included football, basketball, track, fencing, boxing and wrestling.

"Clie" was the first man to win his letter in four major sports at Purdue, an achievement he equaled at West Point in the period of 1911-13.

Gar Wood Here Seeking Another Boat Victory

Miami Beach, Fla., Jan. 21.—A boat speed of 150 miles an hour is not far away says Gar Wood of Detroit, who is here seeking a world's record with his Miss America IX.

"It's only a question of power," he remarked as he worked along the ways in preparation for his attempt on the record March 17 and 18.

"We'll have a raw world record the next time we go out after it," he predicted confidently. "If we can't get it with the engines we already have, there are engines available that will give it to us."

Wood's former world record was broken last year by the late Sir Henry O. D. Seagrave, who registered an average of 98.76 miles per hour in two trips across a measured mile course in England. Seagrave was fatally injured in his speed trials.

After Wood developed a boat that would make 90 miles an hour, he said, he found that not much more power was needed for an additional five mile spur of speed.

"The boat is riding on air as that speed, anyway," he explained. Driving a speedboat at more than 100 miles an hour is no harder than driving it at half that speed, he said.

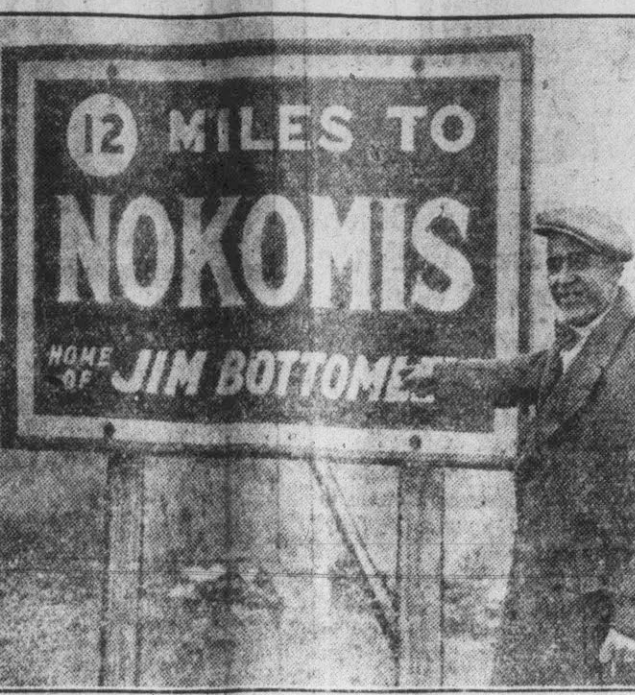
"There's nothing to it. Just open the throttle, hold the wheel and let her go," he instructed.

P. H. Jeter, head of the publicity department of State, announced Smith had signed a one-year contract with the agreement that he would be offered a longer term next year, depending on the record the Wolfpack made on the gridiron this fall. His salary was not announced.

Smith came here from Hartford for a conference with Dr. E. C. Brooks, president of the school, and signed the contract this morning.

Smith served last year as line coach at Georgetown under Head Coach Tom Mills.

Following his playing days at Notre Dame, which ended in 1927, Smith, known on the college gridiron as "Slipper," served as Knute Rockne's aid. Later he went to Trinity college at Hartford.

In 1927, the year he captained the Notre Dame team, Smith was selected as guard on practically all All-American teams, including the Associated Press selection.

Jeter announced the athletic committee had agreed to allow Smith to select his assistant, who will be a backfield coach, thoroughly versed in the Notre Dame system.

Speaking of Illinois football prospects, he said: "I hope they're better than they were last year, but there's the chance they might not be so good. We haven't many freshmen coming up for the varsity. Last year I had nine."

The squads at Illinois aren't much larger now than when Zuppke's stubborn thicket of two colored hair and stern blue eyes first appeared in an official capacity on the Illinois field 18 years ago.

"We get about fifty men for the squad each year," he said. "But it isn't the men that make a football team a winner. It's what the men have to have in them."

"But about painting," he continued, "I'm on my way home now to start a new bunch of landscapes and studies of green and birch

woods. I'm way behind in that kind of work."

Zuppke plans to add extensively to his more than 150 oil paintings, most of which have been sold.

Father Hubbard became a mountain-climbing enthusiast while studying at the University of Innsbruck in the Swiss Alps.

WADE PLEASED WITH OUTLOOK IN THIS STATE

COTTON MARKET

New York, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 5 to 16 points on a continuation of yesterday's buying which again included trade and commission house demand as well as covering by shorts.

The relatively steady showing of Liverpool with advances in Egyptian cotton probably stimulated the demand to some extent while there were reports that the trade was showing an increased disposition to fix prices. Southern selling and realizing checked the advance around 10.37 for March and 10.61 for May, however, and prices showed reactions of 4 or 5 points from the best at the end of the first half hour, although the undertone remained steady.

Liverpool cables attributed the advance there to covering, continental buying, and a shortage of contracts. According to these advances reports reaching the Manchester cloth market from India and China are discouraging, but the demand for yarns made from Egyptian cotton is sustained.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The rail shares again moved forward in today's stock market, but with insufficient steam to drag the rest of the list along with them.

Cherting to the financial community was one of the best buying movements of the year in the bond market, in response to this week's further ease in money rates. The midweek business statistics were somewhat disappointing, however, and bearish official estimates of the fourth quarter steel earnings to be published next week were an oppressive influence in the equity share market.

There were numerous advances at a point or two during the morning, but by early afternoon such issues as U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, American Telephone, American Bond and Eastman showed losses of about a point. National Biscuit lost 2. The morning advance embraced more than two dozen rails, and several of the utilities, tobacco and specialties. Issues moving up a point or two included American Telephone, Chesapeake and Ohio, Erie, Southern Pacific, Northern Pacific, New York Central, Baltimore and Ohio, Chicago and North Western, New Haven, Prisco Rock Island, Louisville and Nashville, Public Service of N. J., Electric Power and Light, American Tobacco and Lipton and Myers B. Stocks, Lehman Brothers, American Express, National Biscuits and air reduction, Auburn and Norfolk and Western advanced 4.

The weekly test reviews agreed that the sensational improvement in the steel industry was tapering off at substantial levels. Iron Age placed iron output at 46 percent in 2, while American metal market said there had been little change.

Disappointing to speculative sentiment was a financial news ticker estimate that U. S. Steel's fourth quarter earnings may have been as low as 30 or 40 cents a share. A few annual earnings state-

GENERAL ASSEMBLY ASKED TO MEMORIALIZE CONGRESS TO PAY WORLD WAR VETS

Both houses received a number of state-wide measures at short sessions before they adjourned to meet at noon tomorrow.

In the House, Representative Parker of Wayne threw in a bill to provide for maintenance of all county roads by the state, including in its provisions a reorganization of the State Highway Commission and an increase of one cent in the gasoline tax.

Representative Thomas of Anson sent up a measure to cut teachers' salaries and Representative McDevitt of Madison introduced a bill to require the reading of 10 verses of the Bible without comment at the opening of the public schools of the state each day.

The Senate got a batch of state-wide measures and three petitions, including a resolution to provide for investigation of the expenditures by state departments of hotel accommodations, etc.

Among the greatest number of bills thrown into the legislative mill thus far, the Senate also received a joint resolution by Senator Baggett of Harnett to require an investigation of the expenditures of the Highway Commission, the Department of Revenue, the Corporation Commission and other state departments.

Under the resolution a joint committee would be named to investigate hotel and other expenses reported by the departments.

Sensors Blount of Pitt and Lawrence of Hertford, sent up a measure to require licensing of drivers of motor vehicles and several other bills relating to automobile license tags and automobiles were introduced.

Under a measure introduced by Senator Johnson of Duplin, persons charged with capital crimes in this state could be given a sentence of life imprisonment instead of execution if found guilty by a jury with recommendation to mercy of the court.

A bill to make the hunting season on coons open October 15 instead of November 15 and to open the squirrel season on September 1 was introduced by Representative Johnson of Halifax.

At the request of the author, Helms of Union, the House tabled a bill to extend jurisdiction of the police of Benton Heights.

Senator McEwan of Cleveland, sent up a measure which comes before the legislature at nearly every session, to change the date of the primary election from the first Saturday in June to the Tuesday after the first Monday in June.

The House passed the following bill today:

Story of the individual opinions based several members assumed he commission was flatly recommending that such a revision be made.

Anderson had written: "I concur in the recommendation of the report that the 18th amendment be modified as therein stated."

His later interpretative statement was made in explanation of the apparent inconsistency. Another member, William I. Grubb of Birmingham, Alabama, had written: "I join in the findings of fact and all the ultimate conclusions of the general report of the commission except that recommending the amendment be revised immediately, without awaiting a further trial, but in all of his general observations."

He declined last night to amplify, and all other members who could be reached likewise refused to do anything to their written opinions. Several had similar references to the recommendation of a substitute amendment.

pensation commission an increase of \$520,000; \$2,718,000, an increase of \$685,000 for the board of vocational education and 20,000 for the federal oil conservation board.

The Federal Radio commission drew \$465,000 an increase of only \$15,000, while the new power commission was given \$260,000.
