Senate Goes On Record As Favoring Payment of Veterans of World War

Passes Measure to Memorialize Congress for Immediate Payment of Veterans' Certificates; Table Proposal to Have Wage and Salary Commission to Report All Names of Married Women on State Payroll; Receives Bill for Eight Months School Term

Raleigh, Jan. 22. — (AP) — The State Senate today recorded itself as favoring immediate payment by Congress of world war veterans' certificates and the House received a measure to provide for an eight months' school term for the entire state.

No opposition to the resolution to ask Congress to pay the veterans developed but Senator Grier of Iredell opposed its consideration under suspension of the rules when this was moved by its author Senator Johnson of Duplin.

The measure, however, was taken up and passed immediately.

The House session was continued by speeches made in opposition to a joint resolution by Representative Helms of Union, which would have required the State and Wage Commission to submit a list of all married women on the state payroll.

Several Representatives spoke against the measure before it was put on the table, defending the right of married women to work and expressing opposition to the state interfering in the affairs of families.

Representative Butler of Sampson, Republican, got out of bed today in order to introduce a bill to provide for an eight months school term throughout the state. The legislator has been sick with flu for several days but desired his measure to reach the education committee before its final hearing this afternoon on a measure to provide for full state operation of the six months school term.

The measure of the Sampson Republican would require the state to pay taxes other than ad valorem \$20,000,000 annually for the next biennium to be distributed among the counties for school aid and valuation to support the schools.

Senators 25 cents be excessive or inadequate the State Board of Assessments would be authorized to change the uniform county levy.

The constitutional six months school term would be extended to embrace 160 days of school. County boards of education would be allowed, however, if low average attendance the last 40 days did not justify continuance of the session to suspend the schools.

The bill would not affect schools now operating more than 160 days by cutting down their terms.

Under the bill no salary increases "on the basis of experience" would be allowed for teachers during the next biennium and salaries of all teachers now drawing the maximum salary under their certificates would be reduced in the amount of the last increment received under state schedule.

The Senate received a measure by Mr. Dorris of Wayne to abolish the State Highway Patrol. And one by Mr. Baggett of Harnett to change the compulsory school attendance statutes.

TO MAINTAIN TROOPS IN THE STRIKE AREA

Governor Pollard Sends Soldiers to Danville to Relieve Those On Duty

Richmond, Va., Jan. 22. — (AP) — Governor John Garland Pollard said today that 250 new national guard troops will be sent into the Danville strike area Saturday to relieve the troops stationed there since November 26.

Governor Pollard said he decided to maintain troops in the strike area upon advice of Acting Adjutant General Samuel G. Waller. Under provisions of the military code the National Guard units now on duty in the Schofield area at Danville must be relieved by Monday, at which time the maximum of 90 days active service expires.

General Waller yesterday conferred with Pittsylvania county and Danville city authorities relative to the necessity of sending fresh troops for law enforcement duty in connection with the strike among union employees of the Dan River and Riverside Cotton Mills. Sheriff C. R. Murphy, of Pittsylvania county, today telegraphed Governor Pollard urging him to send new troops.

A provisional regiment will be mobilized as relief troops under command of Colonel Almonzo E. Wood, of Lynchburg.

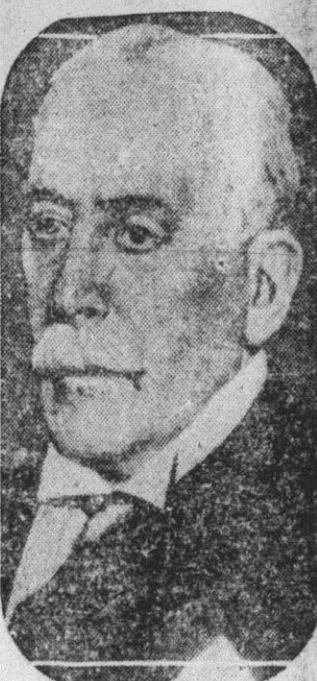
National Guard protection was asked in November after crowd demonstrations in Schofield resulted in the complete halting of traffic near the Dan-River mill and the stoning of a boarding house. Schofield has been the scene of numerous dynamite attacks against homes of non-union workers since the strike was called in September. A church and the dwelling of Magistrate B. S. Pitts, of Schofield, were included among the buildings damaged by bombs.

THREE SENT TO THE PEN FOR ROBBERY

Ayden Negro Convicted of Manslaughter in Connection With Death of Man

Three negro men were on their way to Raleigh today to begin service at the penitentiary following their participation in the robbery of a store in this city several weeks ago.

John Ray, Joe Speight and William Atkinson, were convicted of robbing Tucker's store, on Broad street in Criminal court here yesterday afternoon and Judge W. A. Devin, of Oxford, sentenced them to 18 months each in the pen.

After battering their way into the store, the negroes obtained a radio and several articles of merchandise, the major part of which was recovered by sheriff's office several days later.

The men were considered by officers as among the leaders in a series of robberies which have the last several months, and they were accompanied to the pen by a half dozen others convicted of the same crime during the early part of the week.

Herbert Moye, negro, who resides several miles from Ayden, was convicted of a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Fletcher Whitaker several months ago.

The men were said to have engaged in an argument with the result that Moye was alleged to have broken Whitaker's neck with a car round.

Although the jury returned a verdict in the case yesterday, Judge Devin reserved sentence until later in the week.

C. B. Fancher, superintendent of the county convict camp went on trial today charged with embezzlement, attempt to bribe a witness, and cruelty to prisoners.

The road boss was indicted by the grand jury at the last term of court, after consideration of evidence tending to show that he had made unlawful disposition of goods assigned by the county to the convict camp, and then attempted to bribe a witness to get him to leave the country and not testify in the case. The cruelty charges were said to have developed after alleged inhuman treatment of two prisoners.

Thwart Kidnap Plot At Detroit

Detroit, Jan. 22. — (AP) — A \$100,000 kidnap plot against one of the young children of Horace S. Maynard, wealthy Detroit business man, was thwarted by Detectives last night with the arrest of two men who went to the Maynard home, the officers said, to abduct the child.

Later two other men and a woman were arrested, and the four men were said by Dunham R. Maynard, assistant prosecuting attorney, to have made a kidnapping plot.

Those under arrest are: George B. Spears, 45, formerly a public accountant in the General Motors building where Maynard has his office; Kenneth Harrington, 29, former Detroit policeman; Bernard Aducci, 31; Anthony Orlando, 31, and Orlando's wife, Lena. All of them except Spears have been receiving aid from the Department of Public Welfare. None has a record as a professional criminal.

LUMBER HEAD DEFIES PARK COMMISSION

Champion Fibre Company to Resume Lumber Operation In National Park

Asheville, Jan. 22. — (AP) — Declaring in a letter to Col. David C. Chapman, chairman of the Tennessee Great Smoky Mountain National Park Commission, that "it would seem that the establishment of the park by you is a hopeless proposition," Reuben B. Robertson, president of the Champion Fibre Company, served positive notice today that his company was going to resume its lumbering operations in the park area which were suspended three years ago.

Mr. Robertson's letter reviews the history of the Great Smoky Mountain National Park project in detail, the most recent development in which was the verdict of a jury of view in Sevierville, Tenn., placing a valuation of \$2,375,000 on 37,700 acres of spruce lands owned by the fibre company in the heart of the Tennessee park area. The Tennessee Park Commission contended that the true valuation of this property was about \$550,000.

Since the announcement of the Sevierville verdict, Col. Chapman has publicly criticized the decision and declared the Tennessee Park Commission intended to carry the fight to higher courts in an attempt to get the valuation placed down to a neighborhood of its own estimate.

Mr. Robertson explained that his company suspended its vast operations three years ago "for the purpose of preserving the property for the benefit of the park. We did this under the impression that you were engaged in a bona fide effort to establish a national park at the earliest possible moment, and would treat fairly and expeditiously with us."

Col. Chapman's attitude on the Sevierville verdict can mean but one thing, Mr. Robertson said.

ALMA RUBENS LOSES FIGHT FOR HER LIFE

Former Movie Actress Dies At Los Angeles After Battle Against Dope Addiction

Los Angeles, Jan. 22. — (AP) — Death has ended the valiant fight of Alma Rubens to conquer narcotic addiction and make a comeback in motion pictures.

Miss Rubens, two years ago a screen star of the first magnitude lived a story more tragic than any film makers could ever try to shadow the black-haired actress.

Two weeks ago Miss Rubens was arrested in San Diego on federal charges of smuggling and possession of narcotics. She was taken ill with a cold, which developed into pneumonia, shortly after being released from jail under \$5,000 bond to await hearings and trial.

Peside her death bed in the home of Dr. Charles J. Pfeiffer, her physician, stood her mother, Mrs. Theresa Rubens, and her sister, Mrs. Hazel Large, of Madera, Cal. The doctor was the only other persons present when the end came.

When nearly 12 years ago, Miss Rubens played the feminine lead in Douglas Fairbanks' "The Half-Breed," she was described as Hollywood's newest Cinderella. Her starring roles in such pictures as "Hallelujah," "The Valley of the Kings," "Gilded Butterflies," "Siberia," and "Unseeing Eyes," during the next decade established her as one of filmdom's foremost.

Then in January, 1923, Miss Rubens was revealed as a parrot addict. She dropped out of pictures and soon was confined for treatment in a state hospital. She was paroled in a few months, only to be caught again for addiction and sent to another state asylum, from which she was released as cured in December of the same year.

After her first seizure in the hospital Miss Rubens began a comeback. She played in her first picture, "Show Boat."

She appeared in a one-act play at the Writers' Club in Hollywood. A running outburst was tendered her at the close of the play, which proved to be her last public appearance, and she was hailed as "more beautiful and effective than ever."

Chairman of National Committee Says President's Objection to Wickersham Committee's Substitute for 18th Amendment Was Presented to Keep Prohibition Out of Politics; Refused to Say Whether Chief Executive Favored Revision or Had Any Other Idea of Modification in Mind

Washington, Jan. 22. — (AP) — Emphasis was made today by Senator Fess, Republican, Ohio, to the point that President Hoover in objecting to the Wickersham commission's substitute 18th Amendment had not closed the door to revision proposals.

Partly lead is looked significantly at this statement of Senator Fess who is chairman of the Republican National Committee and adviser of Mr. Hoover's. He was at the White House yesterday.

The Ohioan, one of the staunch supporters of national prohibition himself, would not say that Mr. Hoover favored any other revision or had any other idea for modification in mind.

"I just simply say," explained Fess, "that Mr. Hoover did not close the door to any revision when he rejected this substitute amendment because it would throw prohibition forever into politics."

The law enforcement commission said in its conclusion:

"If the commission agree that if the amendment is revised it should be made to read substantially as follows:

"Section 1. The congress shall have power to regulate or to prohibit the manufacture, traffic in or transportation of intoxicating liquors within the importation thereof into and the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes."

Section 2. The president shall have power to regulate or to prohibit the manufacture, traffic in or transportation of intoxicating liquors within the importation thereof into and the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes."

"I believe the president has an open mind," explained the Ohioan. "He wants to do what is right."

"I don't want to say that he is keeping the door open for I do not want to put him in the position of considering any revision or modification of prohibition."

"All I do say and can say is that Mr. Hoover in his message has simply rejected this particular plan of the commission for the obvious reason that it would place prohibition into politics forever."

"It would make prohibition the everlasting paramount issue."

Last night J. J. Shouse, chairman of the executive committee of the Democratic National Committee issued a statement criticizing both the commission report and the president's failure to endorse the complete document.

"The one concrete thought contributed by the commission," he said, "is a proposed revision of the Eighteenth Amendment if the continued effort of enforcement under the existing statutes should prove unsuccessful."

"That seems conservative enough, but President Hoover makes the comment that he sees serious objection to it and therefore must not be understood as recommending it."

"The conclusion is inescapable that the president appointed this commission not to seek a remedy for the existing evils of prohibition enforcement, but with the not wholly inhuman reservation that if it found according to his own ideas it would be all right, but that wherever it departed from these ideas he would renege the report." Sober words of two dry organizations, the Board of Temperance of the Methodist Episcopal church, and the W. C. T. U., said the president's message "moved all doubt but that Mr. Hoover was aligned on the dry side."

Bandits Holdup Train And Rob Passengers Of \$6,000 Near Bellefontaine, Ohio

Tampa, Fla., Man Five Men Die After Shot and Seriously Hurt As He Yells to Spread Alarm Among Other Passengers Aboard Big Four Pullman; Bandits, Armed and Masked, Treat Women Courteously As They Ransack Train Car and Escape

Bellefontaine, O., Jan. 22. — (AP) — Six bandits, masked and armed, held up a Big Four train enroute from Detroit to Cincinnati early today, shot one passenger and escaped with money and jewelry estimated at \$6,000.

Edwin K. Nelson, Jr., of Tampa, Fla., was shot under the left arm when he prestid in shouting in an effort to obtain help. He was taken to the Mary Rutan Hospital here in a serious condition.

The bandits boarded the train either at Toledo or some point between there and Bellefontaine, rail road officials said. As the train neared here, they entered the second sleeping car from the rear, ransacking the passengers and at the point of guns heeded them into the drawing room with the exception of Nelson. Brakeman Morrison, who happened through the car at that time, was forced to join the passengers.

While one of the robbers stood guard, the others went through the car, taking the passengers' valuables. There were seven passengers.

Nelson, startled, shouted when he was robbed. He was told to keep still, but half awake, he shouted again and was shot.

As the train slowed down for the station here, the bandits leaped and ran. They were last seen running toward a filling station, where it was thought they might have and automobile awaiting.

The train was held up here an hour and then proceeded.

Mrs. E. G. Bathart, Detroit, the sole woman passenger, said she lost \$3,000 in diamonds and cash.

Five of the victims did not file individual reports of the losses or have their names here, but they estimated their total loss at \$6,000.

After an hour's delay, the train went on to Cincinnati, where the robbed car was to be routed on to Florida.

The robbery occupied about an hour while the train proceeded from Carey, about 45 miles north of here, to Bellefontaine. They disturbed no other car. Railroad detectives thought the robbers probably climbed aboard while a halt was made at Carey for coal.

Mrs. Bathart said the first she knew of the robbery was when she saw the train stopped.

Ontario Roused By U. S. Dry Report

Windsor, Ont., Jan. 22.—(By The Canadian Press)—The report presented to Congress by the Law Enforcement Commission stressing the claim that the Canadian anti-export law has failed to reduce the flow of liquor to the United States is to have an echo at the next session of the House of Commons.

Colonel Sidney C. Robinson, M. P. for Essex West, and sponsor of

a motion now on the order paper at Ottawa, calling for abandonment of the export ban and a return to legalized exporting, said today he would comment "in emphatic words" on the Wickersham commission's admission.

Colonel Robinson recalled that when United States officials paved the way for negotiations with Canada, which resulted in the MacKenzie King government introducing legislation which ended legal export of liquor, the claim was made that this step would aid greatly in enforcing prohibition

across the line. "Canada's gesture of neighborly good will," the colonel declared, "has brought nothing but slaps in the face ever since."

He referred to the current commuting difficulty through which a considerable number of border folk working in Detroit have been cut off from their jobs.

Since legal exporting has stopped, he declared, Canada has lost \$15,000,000 in revenue.

"While Canada was giving up this vast sum, the equivalent of three-quarters of the fund voted by the

emergency session of Parliament for unemployment relief throughout the Dominion, the United States shot its tariff against Canadian goods sky high, and launched a campaign to oust Canadians from jobs in the United States, Colonel Robinson remarked."

Woman Killed As Anaesthetic Gases Explode in Lungs

Los Angeles, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The death of Mrs. Maude Branton, 43,

on the operating table of a hospital here was described today by Dr. B. A. Wilkes, superintendent of the hospital, as having been caused by an explosion of anaesthetic gases in her lungs.

The woman's lungs were ruptured by the accident, which medical authorities said was virtually without precedent. Mrs. Branton, wife of a clergyman, was taken to the hospital for an abdominal operation. She had been ill several weeks.

The accident occurred while Dr. C. E. Warner was administering a

cone of nitrous oxide. Oxygen and ether already had been applied and the patient was semi-conscious.

Dr. Wilkes said Dr. Warner told him the cone saturated with nitrous oxide became ignited, apparently from an electric spark of static origin. The patient, he said, inhaled some of the flaming gas and the internal explosion followed.

Coroner Frank Nance said an inquest would be held today. Medical experts said a case similar in some respects was reported at Chicago two years ago.

Largest Tire In World to Be Shown in Greenville Soon

The largest tire in the world is on its way to Greenville and will be on exhibition in our city on Saturday, according to E. G. Flanagan, manager of the Flanagan Buggy Company, located at the corner of 4th and Cotanch streets.

That intense interest will be aroused is a foregone conclusion, as this gigantic tire, an outstanding curiosity, has been an awe-inspiring spectacle wherever it has been shown.

"This massive tire, which has traveled thousands of miles, visiting various sections of the United States and Canada, has been an object of wonderment. It measures twelve feet in height and four feet in width, and the total weight of the tire and yoke is 3,900 pounds, just a fraction under two tons," said Mr. Flanagan.

"This tire was built by the Good-year Tire & Rubber Company of Akron, Ohio, in line with that company's policy of pioneering and research, through which have come many of the most important developments in the tire industry. The longer folks look at it the more interested they become."

"A well-known airplane manufacturer, while focusing his attention on the unique exhibit, remarked that the day was not far distant when planes of huge type would demand tires the size of the one to be exhibited in our city."

"This great tire was not built in a day, or a week, or a month. Three months' time was required to construct the rubber giant, which is, except for size, an exact replica of the regular Goodyear All-Weather tread Super-tread Cord tire, the measurements being in exact ratio of the regular size tire."

"Ah? Yes, plenty of it is necessary for this mammoth casing. Forty-five minutes' time is required for inflation to a pressure of three pounds."

"The tire is attached to a specially constructed bus by two shafts extending from the chassis."

Criminal Lawyer Begins Probe of Affairs of Bank

New York, Jan. 22.—(AP)—He came from Austria when he was seven, educated himself and became New York's highest-priced criminal lawyer.

Now, with nearly 40 years of success in criminal defense behind him, Max D. Steuer has stepped for the first time into the role of prosecutor.

In the dual capacity of special deputy attorney general and deputy district attorney he launched yesterday an investigation of the affairs of the bank of United States which closed December 11 with deposits of \$161,000,000.

Attorneys have long told anecdotes about Steuer's artistry in cross-examination, an artistry that brought him in 1925 an average income of \$1,000 a day.

When Charles Evans Hughes was Governor Mr. Steuer defended State Senator Gardner, accused of taking a bribe to block an anti-racing bill.

When Steuer cross-examined Senator Otto G. Folger, the accused witness, he asked not a single question pertaining to the trial. Instead he asked Folger if he had taken the regents examination before studying for the bar. Folger had, and admitted making a grade of 89 in French and 95 in Latin.

Steuer then proceeded to show, by examination, that Folger knew not a word of French and had no idea as to the nature of Latin.

Gardner was speedily acquitted.

When he defended against manslaughter charges the owners of a building in which 157 girls burned to death, Steuer listened through the damaging testimony of 109 witnesses and chose to cross-examine the 110th, a girl named Rose.

Rose told a vivid story of how she saw girls rush from doors only to find them locked. The jury wept. On cross-examination Steuer asked her to repeat the story. She did, word for word. He reminded her she left a word out. She agreed to supply it. He asked her to repeat the story a third time. She did, word for word again, so that it was obvious she had been carefully drilled. The building owners were acquitted.

ABOUT TOWN

"Billy" Brown and his band of youthful cagers mounted another step in the race for honors of the Northeastern Athletic Association by winning from Kinston High the first of the week.

This was just another of the interesting games in which the local team has participated in this season, and proved conclusively that Greenville is making its strongest bid of years for honors of the conference season.

There is one fly in the ointment, however, that has kept the games from being as significant as they should be to members of the club, and that is the lack of attendance.

With both young men and girls playing the best brand of ball they probably ever played before, gate receipts have been smaller probably than any season in years. This fact is regrettable, in that it causes the youngsters to entertain the idea that the people are not as interested in their activities as they should be.

There are several other games on schedule before the season comes to a close and promoters of this brand of sport have expressed the hope that the public would turn out in large numbers to the remainder of their games and in that way show their appreciation of what the boys and girls are trying to do to give the city winning class of basketball.

One of the state-wide bills which went to the Legislature for consideration yesterday was that introduced by Senator M. K. Blount of Pitt county, requiring the licensing of automobile drivers in this state.

This measure has been under consideration by highway officers for some time, and that it will attract the immediate attention of the lawmakers is not to be questioned.

The object of the bill is not only to open up a new source of revenue but to make the highways safer. Thousands of people physically unfit for driving service appear at the wheel every day of the week in this state, and they not only jeopardize their own lives but the lives of hundreds of others they come in contact with along the highways and streets.

Other states have had a similar law for years. They have derived great benefit from its enforcement through the reduction of inefficiency at the steering wheel.

Senator Blount has had the bill under advisement for months, and believes it will do more to advance the cause of highway safety than any step that has been taken in years.

Now that the Pitt County Post of the American Legion has decided to put on a membership drive, it should be the duty of every member of the organization to support the movement as much as possible.

The stronger the organization should be able to accomplish during the new year. There are numbers of former service men in this and every other county in the state who are not members of the Legion, and they should join in and in that way lend their support to the great work which the boys are trying to accomplish.

The Legion is eternally hammering at legislation tending to improve the condition of the men who went across the ocean and endured all of the blackness of perdition that civilization might be saved, and it is nothing but right that it should have the support of the boys in whose cause it is being launched.

For instance, consider the proposal now before Congress for the payment of service certificates. The Legion is doing everything in its power to "convince" Congress that the ex-service men are in need of their money. It may not succeed, but it will not be because honest effort has not been put into the task.

The community building features of the Sheppard Memorial Library which was thrown open to the pub-

lic last fall, are filling a long felt need among the various organizations of the city.

The rooms set aside for entertainment purposes and public and private gatherings have been constantly in use since the building was completed and will be used more extensively when the public begins to realize their true value.

This building is one of the most serviceable in this section of the state, and places the city in the forefront from the standpoint of the public library and community building.

It is the gift of a former citizen Harper D. Sheppard, as a memorial to his father, a one-time official of the county, and will provide for the needs of the city for years even in the face of unprecedented growth.

The individuality of a town is determined by the nature of its citizenship.

If this fact should be considered by the man who is eternally grumbling about his home town, he might be less apt to air his views and personal feelings so readily.

No town or city in the world is without its disadvantages or handicaps, but they should not be held up for censure by the citizenship.

The thing to do is not to growl and complain, but get busy and eliminate the objectionable things—those features which cause the place to fall to measure up to personal approval.

If every man would work for the uplift of his home town it would not be long before that place would be the cynosure of all eyes, with people in all parts of the country trying to emulate some of its examples in breaking away from the mediocre and forging to the front in a commercial and industrial way.

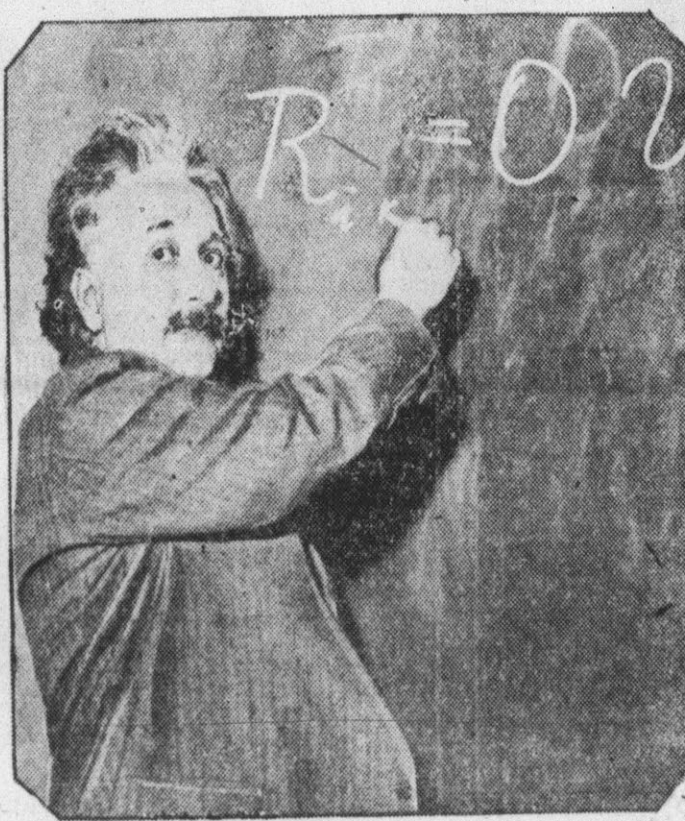

BLAMES FANS FOR EMPHASIS ON FOOTBALL

By BILL KING

Cambridge Mass., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Although dozens of specialists have re-diagnosed football's ailments and again traced them back to the epidemic of over-emphasis, it has remained for a player, Barry Wood, Harvard captain-elect to attempt to isolate the germ of this penicillin gridiron disease.

He believes that the stands of the massive college stadium are the incubator of this germ and that the spectators are more susceptible to it than the players or coaches.

"Most of Harvard's over-emphasis," Wood said, "can be found in the stadium and not down on the playing field. Graduates and other supporters of the Harvard team are even more disturbed about the outcome of a game than the players themselves, most of whom play for the fun of the game."

Wood, a level-headed and clear-thinking youth who, as a forward passer ranks with the famed Benny Friedman, has no illusions about football. Though it is just a game, a source of pleasure to him, he has made an extensive study of it. As a quarterback he knows the coach's viewpoint as well as that of the player. He is convinced that neither is seriously affected by so-called over-emphasis.

Wood blames the spectators for most of the game's illsome features for the look-on, he charges, is responsible for the unwholesome fact that college football players compete under a greater mental strain than do members of other sports teams.

"The pressure on a player," he explained, "is greater in football than in any other sport because a gridiron mistake is generally much more costly than an error in baseball or a slip in hockey. Too often the player who muffs a forward or fumbles is harshly judged by the crowd and forced to bear a heavy share of the blame for a defeat."

Wood's idea of the football millennium is a game that provides pleasure for the victorious and vanquished alike and satisfies every spectator.

Besides being one of the most versatile athletes Harvard has had in a generation, Wood is also a Phi Beta Kappa. He is a deep student of all sports.

Another source of over-emphasis, he believes, is the college that disregards the fact that football belongs to the player. Wood cited the so-called progressive institutions that are always eager to experiment every new football idea and have, in the past, forced a large and unwilling majority to follow their example. On this minority, Wood placed the blame for the great stress that has been laid on spring and pre-season practice. He considers this training unpleasant and unnecessary.

Hunter Joins Ranks of Golf Professionals

New York, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The influence of Bill Tilden has led Francis T. Hunter, New Rochelle, N. Y., publisher to join the ranks of professional players.

Hunter announced his decision to turn pro yesterday. He said he desired to follow the path of his friend and doubles partner.

Hunter will join in the exhibition being arranged by Jack Curley for Tilden's professional debut in Madison Square Garden, February 18, but will not participate in the tour Tilden and Karel Kozeluh will make later. His business as a newspaper publisher keeps him close to the east.

Largely due to Tilden's aid and influence, Hunter, a stocky heavy-limbed player, rose to second place in the nation, ranking in 1927 from twelfth the year before and held the place in 1928 and 1929. He took part in few tournaments in 1930.

In 1928, Hunter fought his way into the finals of the national tennis championship, losing to Henri Cochet of France in a hard fought match. The next year he was runner up to Tilden, his partner in winning the 1928 doubles title and the Davis cup doubles match. Hunter twice has held the national indoor title.

DIXIE SEES SEVEN NEW COACHES

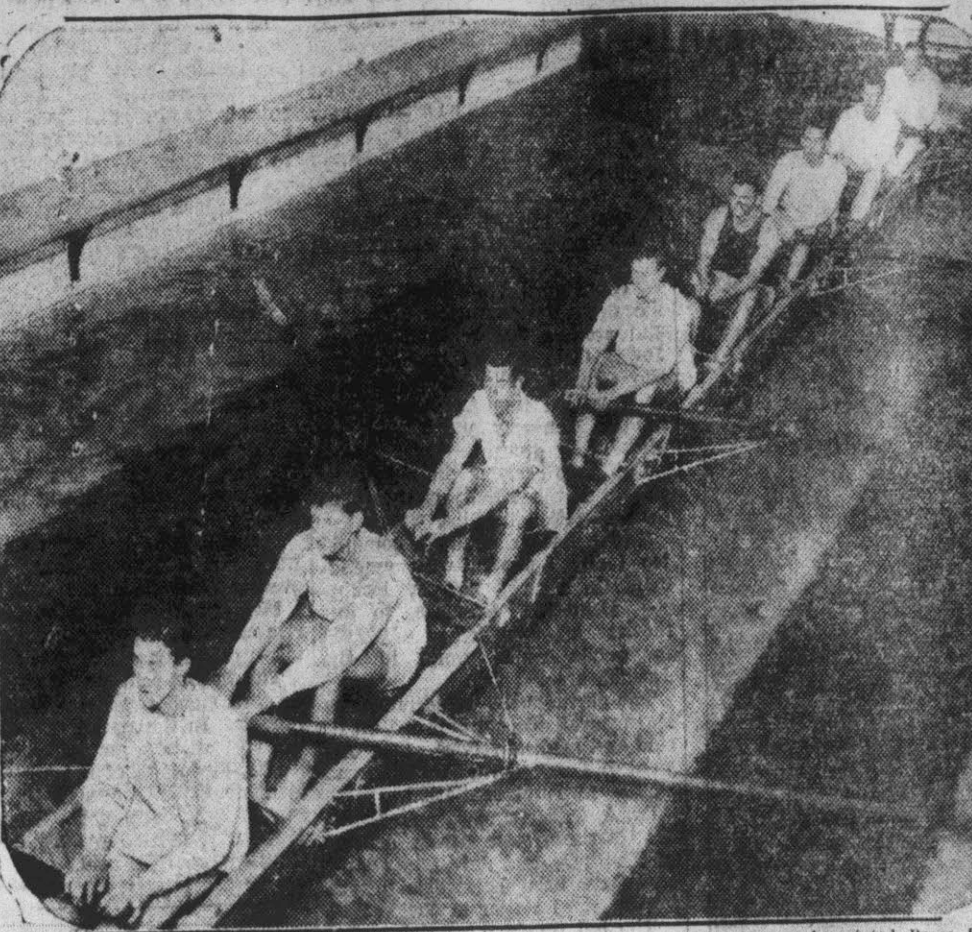
Atlanta, Ga., —(AP)—Seven southern conference basketball teams have new coaches this season.

Chapel Hill, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Bigger and better competition in the second annual Southern Conference indoor games was the slogan of the University of North Carolina athletic officials today as they went about plans for the south-wide event here March 7.

Preliminary invitation to enter the meet have been mailed to more than 150 institutions located from Missouri to Washington, D. C. R. A. Fetzer, athletic director, announced.

The list included Southern Conference members, 43 non-conference colleges and universities, 35 prep schools, and 50 high schools.

A program of 12 events will be arranged for the conference teams, with other competition provided for the other entrants, Fetzer said.

The Athletic director emphasized that the non-conference freshmen, prep-school, and scholastic events would be open to any southern institution. He invited officials of any school interested to communicate with him.

Several score of athletes took part in the invitation of the meet here last season. Washington and Lee won the conference honors. North Carolina the freshman competition, and the Augusta Military Academy topped the list in the scholastic events.

The contests drew a crowd of 5,000 spectators.

TEXAS SCHOOL HEAR FINDS NO HARM IN SALARIES FOR FOOTBALL PLAYERS

Wichita Falls, Tex. —(AP)—J. A. Hood, superintendent-elect of the schools in Wichita county, is a football fan first and a teacher afterward, and declares he can see no fault in paying a college star a modest salary for his services.

"One thing that I have never been able to understand is what difference there is in a boy waiting table or running a typewriter to pay his school expenses or his playing a great season of football."

"Which has more discipline for the mind and body? Paying football or waiting table? Who has been harmed when a boy pays his expenses through college by playing football? I do not know of any harm. Most cases where they are paid anything is where a boy could not get to school otherwise."

"I have been in the schools of Texas 20 years, and I do not know of a single instance where harm has resulted to anybody when a boy used his football ability to help attend school."

"I am for red-blooded sports in this country, not volley ball or some effeminate game where they wear lace on their collars."

SPORTS SLANTS

It seems like old times to have the heavyweights bellowing at each other in terms of defiance, even though the maulers involved, Sharkey and Dempsey, are less likely to come to any real blows than the young business men who figure otherwise in the 1931 heavyweight program.

The recent outburst from the two Jacks is reminiscent, nevertheless, of palmer days, when there was loud talk but also more stimulating warfare among the pugilists of rougher, tougher schools.

It has a long background. Sharkey was the most ocellous of fighters, in and out of the ring, four years ago. Some may see a loop hole in this but those who know Tunney best also know that he burned his bridges behind him when he retired to a life of quiet and varied activity.

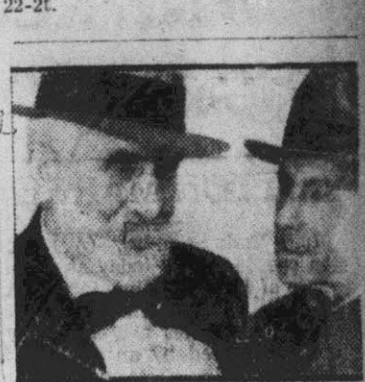

COTTON MARKET

New York, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 12 to 16 points in response to relatively firm Liverpool cables, while the market may also have been influenced by an advance in Egyptian cotton at Alexandria.

There was considerable southern selling and realizing but offerings were absorbed by further trade buying and covering while some of the houses with Liverpool and continental connections seem to have buying orders for execution during the early trading. March sold up to 10.46 and July to 10.92 on the initial demand and while there were setbacks of 3 or 4 points, the market held very steady at the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables reported local and continental buying with covering and trade calling in that market and said home trade in cotton goods was improving, although there had been no change in the labor situation. Egyptian cotton futures in the Alexandria market were reported 28 to 33 points higher for Ashmunt and 75 to 77 points higher for Sakellaris.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The financial markets today reflected the growing feeling in Wall Street that the worst of the business depression is over, but the equity share market still manifested a marked disinclination to count its eggs before they are hatched.

Despite the placing of new offerings on the market aggregating about \$75,000,000, listed bonds continued to work higher. Stocks were dull, but moved quietly forward. Bear selling of Radio around midday caused only momentary hesitation. U. S. Steel and American Telephone slipped off about a point but quickly recovered.

Rail shares were again in the forefront of the advance. Chesapeake Corp. and Lackawanna sold up 3 points, and shares advancing a point or two included Chesapeake and Ohio, B. & O. N. Y. Central, Erie, Cotton Belt and Missouri Pacific. Several food public utility, merchandising, amusement and miscellaneous manufacturing issues sold up a point or two, including American Can, North American, Westinghouse Electric, Borden, National Biscuit, Penick & Ford, General Theatres, Fox, DuPont, Air Reduction, American Tobacco, B. Sears, Woolworth, Eastman and Proctor & Gamble. Allied Chemical advanced more than 3.

The market virtually ignored the suspension of a small out of town commission, which, together with the steady undertone maintained yesterday in the face of the unfavorable steel earnings estimate, made bears cautious.

The extremely low money rates appear to be diverting funds into investment stocks, as well as bonds, and this is indicated as a factor in the firmness of the standard dividend rails.

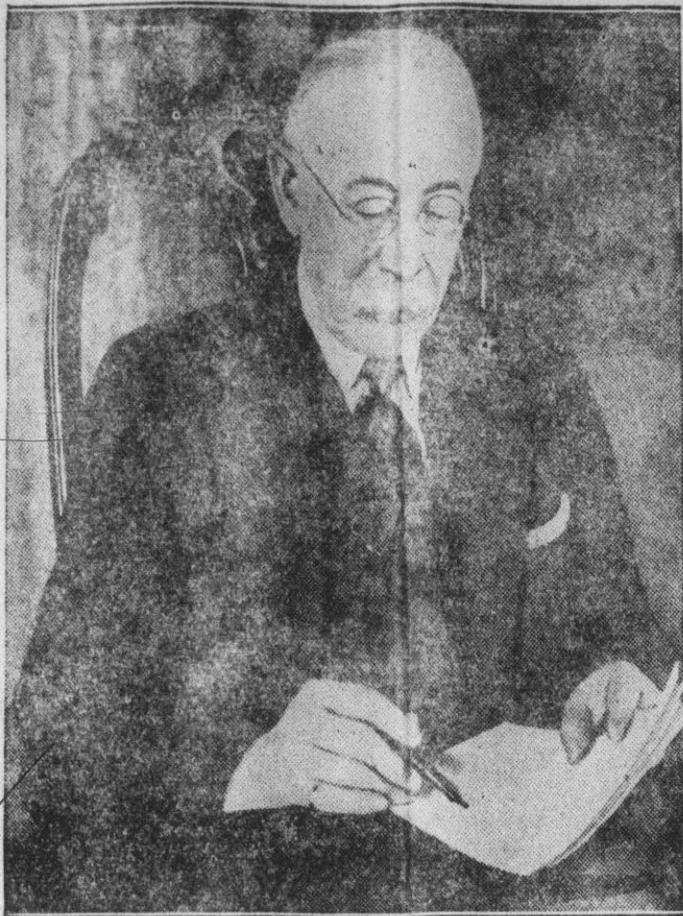

Sousa Setting 'Annabel Lee' to Tuneful Melody

Baltimore, Jan. 22.—(AP)—John Philip Sousa, the march king, has fallen under the magic of Edgar Allan Poe's poetry and is setting "Annabel Lee" to music—working from a hospital chair. Poe is buried in Baltimore.

Fifty years of active musical life and 350 compositions lie behind Sousa, and yet when the effects of an old injury sent him to Johns Hopkins hospital for treatment, he could not break off working.

"When you hear of Sousa retiring, you will hear of Sousa dead," he once said when there was a rumor that he was to retire. And sitting in his hospital room, carrying his 76 years lightly, he smilingly announced that this sentiment was unaltered.

"When I learned I would not have to be operated on, I felt I must write," he said. "The thought of Edgar Allan Poe came to me because I was in Baltimore and I thought of his musical poem 'Annabel Lee.' I decided to set it to music."

"This won't be finished in many weeks, however. There is a good deal of careful revision necessary before I shall feel that I have done justice to this beautiful poem."

"I think it is the most musical and beautiful of all Poe's works. So when I learned I must remain in the hospital for some time, I read the poem again and felt I must write a song to those words."

(Continued From Page One) the drought areas from graineries and storage houses in Nebraska, Iowa, Colorado, Idaho, and the Rio Grande Valley in Texas have been moved into Arkansas, Mississippi, Kentucky, and other states affected by drought.

Railroads carrying the shipments cancelled the freight charges as their donation to relief work.

The Senate agriculture committee today approved with amendments a bill by Senator Robinson, Democrat, Arkansas, to authorize appropriation of \$3,000,000 for public health work in the drought area.

The amendments would make the money available outright for medicine and medical service. The original bill restricted its use to studies in rural sanitation.

Dr. A. T. McCormack and Dr. C. W. Garrison, state health officers of Kentucky and Arkansas testified on the need for medical attention in rural section in their states.

The bill provides for the expenditure of the appropriation under the direction of the United States Public Health Service.

Surgeon General H. S. Cumming, testified Federal assistance was necessary.

BANDITS HOLD UP TRAIN AND ROB PASSENGERS OF \$6,000

(Continued from page one) found a gun jammed against her and heard one of the robbers demand:

"Let's see how much you have." Beyond cautioning the passengers who were badly frightened after the shooting, to be silent, the robbers said little. The masks the dim lights and the fright of the passengers all combined to prevent officials from obtaining good descriptions of the gunmen.

The sheriff's force, police and railroad detectives began a thorough search of the city, but found no trace of their quarry after they were seen running from the train in the darkness. Nearby towns were notified to be on the alert.

Big Four surgeons who attended Nelson at the May Ruter Hospital here said that his condition was so critical recovery is doubtful.

The bullet went clear through his body and was found on the mattress of his pullman bunk. The wound in the right lung caused profuse bleeding which added to the danger of his condition, the surgeons said.

Victims of the robbery had excited stories to tell.

Mrs. L. D. Bearing, Chattanooga, Tenn., said that the first intimation that anything unusual was happening was when she heard loud talking followed by the shot that wounded Nelson.

She thought then that two men were fighting, until a man poked his head into her berth and told her to get out in the aisle, saying "what have you got on you?" She immediately slipped a diamond ring into her stocking and was headed into the parlor car with the five other passengers where the rob-

bers took a \$2,500 ring from her.

Mrs. E. G. Zacherias, Atlanta, Ga., said that she heard the robbers asking other passengers for their valuables before they came to her berth. She was terribly frightened, she said, and decided to give them everything she had to prevent violence. When one robber stuck his head between the curtains she handed him her purse which contained \$60 in cash and a \$500 watch.

Aleck McPherson, Cedar Springs, Ont., who was in his berth with his wife, was awakened by the shooting and stuck his head through the curtains. A robber hit him on the head with the butt of a revolver and told him to get in. He had \$300 which Mrs. McPherson secreted thus outwitting the thieves.

McPherson said the passengers were calm. "The women didn't even scream," he added.

Mrs. Dearing and Mrs. Zacherias cared for Nelson until he was taken off the train.

The women said they were treated with much consideration by the robbers. In the parlor car, one of the robbers, who seemed to be the leader, made two of the others get blankets to wrap around the passengers who were cold. None of them were treated roughly or discourteously, they said.
