ASKS HOUSE FOR REPEAL OF DRY LAW

Rep. Lehlbach, Of New Jersey, Makes Appeal For Congressional Action.

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Basing his demand upon the Wickersham prohibition report, Representative Lehlbach, Republican of New Jersey, today asked Congressional action looking to the repeal of the 18th amendment.

In a speech in the House he urged the chamber to take up his resolution submitting a repealer to the people through convention.

He said two facts stood out in the Wickersham report despite interpretations "as varied as are the views entertained on the subject of prohibition."

"The commission is practically unanimous," he said, "that the 18th amendment is not observed and not enforced."

"A majority of the commission unequivocally state their belief that the 18th amendment can never be adequately enforced."

"If the labors of the commission are not to be wholly scrapped, these two propositions are the foundation upon which a new dispensation must be built."

"Now that the tumult and shouting has measurably died down the people properly turn to Congress and ask what it intends to do about it."

Inasmuch as there is no reasonable doubt that a great majority of the people share the conclusions reached by the Wickersham commission, it is the plain duty of Congress to act at once."

Laval Receives Two Confidence Votes In Paris

Paris, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Pierre Laval, son of a country butcher and one of the youngest men ever to reach the head of the French government was established in office today by two votes of confidence, which surpassed the hope of even his fondest friends.

His supporters saw in the two majorities, 54 on the first vote, and 51 on a ballot rejecting an opposition amendment of the original question of confidence, indicating that this government, the seventh in the life of the present parliament would hold on until a new president is elected in June to succeed M. Doumergue.

The first vote came on a question of acceptance or rejection of the declaration of policy, and was carried by the government 312 to 258.

An amendment offered by the radical socialists would have involved some extension of free education. M. Laval, believing the matter one of education rather than political policy, asked its rejection.

The Chamber responded with a vote favoring the government of 309 to 253.

Defense Begins Action Today In Alienation Suit

Winston-Salem, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The defense had its inning today in the trial of Mrs. Alexandra B. Harkins' \$150,000 alienation of affections suit against the well-to-do parents of her husband, James Harkins.

The 28-year-old plaintiff, born in America, but reared in Ireland, completed her direct testimony yesterday, after three days in the witness chair.

She charged that Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Harkins, her father in law and mother in law, by attacking her Irish ancestry and by other means, alienated her husband from her and caused a separation last year.

Defense attorneys at conclusion of her testimony moved for nonsuit. This was denied, and Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Harkins and other defense witnesses were sworn in.

Mrs. Harkins took the stand and was still testifying at adjournment of court for the day.

News of her son's marriage to the young Irish girl in New York in 1923 came as a great shock to her, Mrs. Harkins testified. She said she did not hear of the marriage until nearly a year after it occurred.

"When I heard of it," she said, "I fell down in a chair and when I arose, I felt like an old woman."

Asheville Taxpayer Pays Over \$40,000

Asheville, Jan. 31.—(AP)—One taxpayer has made it possible for the City of Asheville to meet its January payroll.

Financially embarrassed since the closing of several banks here a few months ago, the city was without funds until the E. W. Grove estate paid \$40,000 in taxes today.

CANNON WILL FACES INQUIRY NEXT TUESDAY

Bishop To Go On Trial Before Twelve Fellow Clergymen At Washington.

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, south, will face twelve fellow clergymen here next Tuesday to answer the charges filed against him by four traveling elders of the church.

The hearings, before which the bishop will appear, are in the nature of an investigation. If two-thirds of the twelve clergymen find that the charges have weight, Cannon will be suspended and brought to trial before the general conference of the church in 1934.

Accusations against the temperance leader were filed on September 20 by Dr. Forest J. Pettymann, of Baltimore; Dr. L. P. Martin, of Abingdon, Va.; and Mrs. Costen J. Harrell and J. T. Mastin, both of Richmond. Their nature has never been disclosed.

Bishop W. N. Ainsworth of Birmingham, who was chairman of the college of bishops when the charges were filed last year, will appoint the twelve men who are to hear the charges. He has not announced their names, but it is understood they will come from widely scattered sections of the south.

Facing charges, and answering them, will not be a new experience for southern Methodism's most widely known bishop. He faced them on stock market and political activities at the general conference of the church in Dallas last summer, and beat them.

He faced the Senate Lobby committee later and put his hat on and walked out when a committee member asked him a question he didn't care to answer concerning expenditures made by him in the 1928 campaign. He was never recalled before that committee.

Sixty-Four New Lawyers Passed By Supreme Court

Raleigh, Jan. 31.—(AP)—North Carolina today had 64 new lawyers, most of them prepared to practice the profession for the first time.

The 64 were passed by the State Supreme court yesterday, 60 of that number having taken the written test. Twenty-four others tried the written examination but failed to pass it.

Four of the 64 were granted licenses by county. These included Justin Miller, Dean of the Duke University law school, and R. W. Black, Durham city manager.

Three women took the written test, and one, Mrs. Lucille Christian McIntruff, of Asheville, passed it.

Two negroes attempted the written examination but did not pass.

Giant Seaplane Lands In Harbor at Las Palmas at 3:10 This Afternoon Seven Hours After Taking Off at Lisbon; Plane To Continue Flight To Cape Verde Islands Tomorrow.

Las Palmas, Canary Islands, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The German seaplane DO-X landed in the harbor here at 3:10 p. m. (10:10 a. m. EST).

The big ship settled down in the harbor with a great roar of motors which brought everybody within hearing distance to the waterfront. She had completed this first lap of her projected flight across the South Atlantic in almost exactly seven hours.

Fog between Lisbon and the Madeira Island made a change in her original plans and Commander Friedrich Christiansen, instead of dropping a mail bag at Funchal as he had intended, eliminated the Madeira detour and came straight here.

A radio message sent an hour before the arrival said that the trip was proceeding on schedule without untoward incident.

From Las Palmas the plane tomorrow will fly to Porto Praia, in the Cape Verde Islands. After a 36-hour halt, the ship will attempt the most difficult part of its journey, to Fernando do Noronha, Brazil, 1,230 miles distant. A short stop will be made and the craft will proceed to the mainland at Natal and down the coast to Rio de Janeiro. From Rio de Janeiro the plane will continue to New York.

The ship is commanded by Captain Friedrich Christiansen. Clarence Schildhauer, American is second pilot and navigator for the trip. Before departure both said they had the utmost confidence in the outcome of the flight, and Captain Schildhauer commented:

"Our ship was not built to fly day and night. It was designed to accomplish ten hours' consecutive flight. Therefore we shall be in the air only in the daytime, coming down to sea each evening."

The great airplane, the largest heavier-than-air craft in the world, made a beautiful getaway at Lisbon this morning. After all her passengers had boarded her Captain Christiansen stepped on the gas. There was a tremendous roar and the ship taxied out into the river harbor.

There it ran to and fro a few minutes in order to get the proper direction of the wind. The take-off was effected in one minute and 30 seconds. A Portuguese military plane escorted her as she started. Both were soon lost to sight in the haze.

The ship carried 180,000 letters and post cards in addition to its store of supplies which included tinned meats, a small quantity of beverages and enough American chewing gum to last until the end of the voyage.

"Sea Eagle," the mascot canary which started with the DO-X on her first trans-Atlantic attempt last fall, died a week ago and Commander Christiansen substituted (Continued on Page Three)

Tarkington Able To See Following Years of Darkness

Baltimore, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Able to recognize friends and distinguish the color of the landscape, after months of darkness, Booth Tarkington today packed his grips to leave John Hopkins hospital, happy in the knowledge his 14-year fight to overcome cataracts has been successful. His improvement, however will be gradual.

He made plans to go to Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, to rest before returning to Wilmer Institute to be fitted to three pairs of glasses. "I will have to have a holster made to carry them in," he said. He will continue his writing.

"I never did work up much emotion over my own work and when a story was completed I quickly forgot all about it, but I did shed a few tears over 'Sidney Carton,' 'Less Miserable,' and '93'." The Indiana novelist admitted.

The creator of the "Gentlemen from Indiana" and "Mirrored Heaven," says "I think the young writer of today has less favorable chance to get his work published than the beginner ten years ago because of the greater number of people writing today."

Biography and detective stories are his hobby just now and he keeps his wife and secretary busy reading them to him. "My percentage in solving detective stories is good, but it is hard as the writer nowadays doesn't give a fellow a chance. They hold out some of the facts and in the last chapter can pin the crime on anyone."

Bill Reaches Solons For Constitution Convention During The Year Of 1933

Representatives Jeffress And Young Introduce Measure In House During The Morning; Convention Would Draft New Constitution For The State Of North Carolina.

Raleigh, Jan. 31.—(AP)—One of Governor Gardner's major recommendations to the General Assembly by reached the floor of the House today when Representative Jeffress of Guilford, and Young of Durham introduced the administration bill to call a constitutional convention in 1933.

The convention would draw up a new constitution, not to conflict with the constitution of the United States, and when adopted would be certified to the governor, who would proclaim it to be the constitution of North Carolina.

The measure sets up machinery to place before the voters whether the convention shall be held and for the election of 120 delegates, with each county being represented by the number of members of the House of Representatives it has January 1, 1933.

Election of the delegates and the referendum on the convention would be held simultaneously on November 8, 1932. Provision is made for primaries to nominate candidates for the election.

If approved by the voters, the delegates elected would meet in Raleigh "on Wednesday after the first Monday in May, 1933."

"It shall be the duty of the said convention to consider, debate and adopt a constitution for the State of North Carolina, no provision of which shall be in conflict with the constitution of the United States, which constitution, when so adopted, shall be by the presiding officer of the convention certified to the governor, who shall, within 20 days thereafter, issue his proclamation declaring the same to be the constitution of the state, the bill says."

The present North Carolina constitution was adopted shortly after the civil war and Governor Gardner believes the state needs a new one suitable to the present standard of the state. He strongly recommended that a convention be called in his biennial message to the General Assembly.

The bill provides for the pay for the delegates at the rate of \$10 a day not to exceed 60 days. No delegate would be allowed to hold any other public office.

Solons Conduct Short Session During Morning And Quit Until Monday

Believe Hoover-Democrat Deadlock Will Result In Extra Session Of Congress

Senator Watson Declares Chances For Compromise On \$25,000,000 Relief Measure Are Slight In View Of The Decisive Rejection Of The Amendment By The House Yesterday.

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—While Republican House leaders talked of drastic measures if necessary to avert a special session, the administration leaders in the Senate today regarded the deadlock between President Hoover and the Democrats on relief as inevitably leading to the extra session which the minority is prepared to force to gain its objective.

While negotiators were seeking some ground for a compromise, Senator Watson the Republican leader, said he believed chances for compromise on the \$25,000,000 Red Cross relief fund were slight in view of the decisive rejection of this amendment yesterday by the House.

Chairman Wood of the House Rules committee, said off the floor if all supply bills had failed of passage by February 15, he would propose to continue existing appropriations during the fiscal year. Success for this move would obviate a special session necessity.

The hope for enactment of such an all-inclusive resolution in place of deadlocked appropriation measures was regarded forlornly in the Senate Republican ranks, however.

The Senate Democrats can block any closure rule shutting off debate, if they so wish. They can easily prevent enactment of the vital appropriation measures providing funds for next year's operations of the government with unlimited debate in effect.

Senator Watson said he believed if an extra session is called, President Hoover will wait until June 1 to call it. This one month before the close of this fiscal year when the present funds for operation of the government become exhausted.

"We would be in session from June 1 until the national convention a year hence," Watson said. "Mr. Hoover will veto these measures. The Democrats apparently are going to force the extra session."

Nevertheless, those who were looking for a solution saw in the statement yesterday of Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, an opening for a compromise of the emergency relief fund.

Whether the House which voted overwhelmingly against the fund will accept a compromise is the question.

Dry Officers Have Close Call During Roadside Assault

Greensboro, Jan. 31.—(AP)—A roadside assault, in which three volleys of buckshot were fired into their car by two men, was described here today by three federal prohibition officers of this district.

None of the bullets fired in the attack, which occurred near here last night, hit the officers, but flying windshield glass, shattered by one of the volleys, struck J. L. Osteen, deputy prohibition administrator, and D. T. Shelton, Jr., inflicting ugly face and neck wounds.

The officers said they believed their assailants were Bill Payne and John McIver, notorious criminals, sought in this section.

The shots were fired, they related, from a small roadster they attempted to overhaul and search for liquor. The men in the machine escaped, after firing on the officers.

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 31.—(AP)—The State Democratic executive committee today asked Senator J. Thomas Heflin to specify in detail the "matters and things" on which he based his charges of fraud and irregularities in the general election of last November.

Coast Guard Exonerated

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The report of the coast guard board which inquired into the capture of the Canadian rum runner Josephine K. today exonerated the crew of the patrol boat of wrong doing and said the rum runner was "clearly within 12 miles of the coast of the United States."

Memphis Dog Catcher Bitten By Rabid Dog

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 31.—(AP)—It was decreed a long time ago that when a dog bites an ordinary man that isn't news, but when a dog bites a dog catcher it's different. Especially when the dog catcher is W. C. Heckle who has been rounding up stray canines for 20 years without a mishap.

Yesterday Heckle was called to a school campus. As he started to get out of his car with the insignia and implements of his profession the object of his quest clamped his ankle. Heckle quickly shot the dog and subsequent examination showed it had rabies, so he is under the pasteur treatment today.

Triple Executions Reported in Colorado And Ohio During Last Night.

Caron City, Colo., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Three bank robbers who shot it out with officers in a 2-state fight last March have atoned in death for the murder of a Colorado deputy sheriff.

Gambling for the last few minutes of life, they were hanged at the state penitentiary here last night.

The flip of a coin decided John Walker, 45, an outlaw 20 years who led his band in the robbery of a Mantz, Kas., bank of \$4,000, and the subsequent slaying of Carol A. Hickman, Eals, Colo. deputy, should be the last to die.

Claude Ray, 23, was the first. Andrew Halliday, 22, followed Ray to the death chamber.

They chose their order of execution by coin tossing with the sanction of Warden Francis E. Crawford, who said they were calm in the last moments.

"There were no untoward incidents," the warden said. "None of the men made a last minute statement."

Under a ruling of the prison administration, no details of the executions were announced. Newspapers were barred.

Columbus, O., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Three men, partners in crime, went slightly to their deaths in the electric chair at the Ohio penitentiary last night in the second triple execution in the state's history.

The men were Fred J. Massa, 27, Earl Sites, 27 and Kenneth McCarty, all of Mansfield, O. In 32 minutes they paid the death penalty for the fatal shooting of Ralph Wilcox, Gallion filling station operator, in an attempted holdup last June 27.

Boy Scouts made a house-to-house canvass today to provide clothing for the unemployed people of the city and community. The canvass was a part of the campaign organized for relief of the poor sometime ago, and is expected to result in the raising of enough clothes to provide for a majority of the needy people.

The clothing will be distributed through the commissary, along with food and fuel, and if contributions are liberal enough the committee will be able to discharge its task in a most commendable way.

Although much suffering exists among both white and colored people, the situation is not different from that existing in other parts of the country. Each community is striving to care for its own problems, excluding the drought areas, and if they have their way not a single person will go hungry and cold for any considerable length of time.

CHERNIAVSKY TRIO IN CONCERT AT COLLEGE

Brilliant playing, marvelous technique and charming stage presence made those who heard the concert by the Chernaivsky Trio at East Carolina Teachers College last night consider it a great musical event. The program opened and closed with trio numbers, with a solo group for each of the three instruments intervening, but the printed program by no means represented the entire program, for the artists were recalled after every group, sometimes time and again, and were generous with their encores.

The artists expressed their keen appreciation of their audience, saying it was a delight to play for enthusiastic, responsive people, who seemed to appreciate their playing. It was evidently difficult for the audience to decide on a favorite, for as each one came out he, for the time, was the chief one. Jan, the pianist, as the one on the stage all the time, either as one of the trio doing his part in the ensemble, as soloist, or accompanist, had his full share of interest but when Michel leaned over his beloved cello and brought out its rich tones making it talk or dance, or do whatever he willed with it, the girls seemed to forget all but his part. Then when Leo tucked his violin under his chin and made it sing, or seemed to bring forth the strains of other instruments, they came under his spell and recalled him three times. But, after all judging by the way the audience behaved when all three played together in the final group, refusing to move until two other numbers had been ended one would judge the favorite was perhaps the ensemble group, the three playing together as one. By that time it seemed as if each was known separately so there was greater appreciation of all together than when they played their first ensemble number.

The opening selection was from Brahms and their closing encore was the Hungarian Dance by Brahms. The first one was C Minor groups 101, with four movements. Allegro energico Presto no assai. Andante grazioso, and allegro molto. Instead of one selection as printed on the program, two were substituted. A Death Dance from Rimsky-Korsakoff and a Russian Dance by Vvorjak, with the first encore Kreisler's "Old Rehearsal."

Another change on the program was Jan's piano group from Beethoven's Moonlight sonata to a Chopin selection and a Scherzo, the encore making the third selection. Michel's cello group was as follows: Serenade melancolique by Tchaikowsky; Minuet by Haydn; and the Dance of the Elves by Popper, followed by two encores.

Leo gave two violin selections, Hebrew Melody by Achron, and Rondo Capriccio by Saint-Saens, followed by three encores.

DO-X LANDS IN CANARIES COMPLETING FIRST LEG OF FLIGHT TO SOUTH AMERICA

another, bought from a bird store yesterday.

At the last moment Lieut. Cardoso Oliveira of the Portuguese air force was eliminated as a passenger in favor of several extra drums of fuel, but he waved from the pier as the plane skimmed across the harbor and flew away.

"Where will you fetch up?" some shouted to the commander just before the take-off.

"New York," he shouted, "but we're in no hurry; we'll take our time."

The DO-X started from Altenrhein, Switzerland, November 5, 1930, on her trip to South America.

At Lisbon, less than a month later, her left wing was destroyed by a sudden blaze in auxiliary tanks, supposed to have started from a short circuit.

New materials and equipment were rushed from Germany, the wing was rebuilt and the huge sea plane thoroughly tested in preparation for today's delayed start.

Some misadventures marked the flight from Altenrhein to Lisbon by way of Amsterdam, Calshot, England, and Bordeaux, France.

Flying from Calshot, to Bordeaux, the big boat was forced down by darkness near Rochelle, France, and there was considerable anxiety for her safety. Progress was slower than had been expected and her radio was silent much of the trip.

Later there were reports that her American engines were not functioning properly and would need a thorough overhauling before the start from Lisbon on the overseas hops to Rio de Janeiro by way of Canary and Cape Verde Islands, and the Island of Fernando Do Noronha off the Brazilian coast.

The DO-X, designed by Dr. Claude Dornier, is 130 feet long and has a wing spread of 160 feet. She is powered by twelve Curtiss Conqueror engines, developing about 600 horsepower each at maximum load. Since overhauling she is expected to attain a maximum speed of 150 miles an hour and a cruising speed of 120 miles.

Carrying no passengers, instead of the 100 for which she was designed, and with extra gasoline tanks in the body and wings, the DO-X has a cruising radius of better than 1,000 miles.

The hull has the appearance of a trim yacht, and is expected by the designer to be able to ride out heavy seas. One of the purposes of the trans-Atlantic trip was to test the plane's ability to descend to the sea and take off again under ocean weather conditions.

Hines Opposed To Cashing Veterans War Certificates

Washington, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Veterans Administrator Hines today joined the active opposition to cashing veterans' compensation certificates, assenting any "ad-quate" plan would be too costly.

Hines was called to counsel the House Ways and Means committee, considering about 50 proposals to pay cash on the certificates.

He urged finding employment for more than 200,000 jobless veterans instead of cashing their service certificates.

It is this group of between 200,000 and 300,000 men he said, who need help, adding:

"We should make an effort to get them employment." The veterans bureau is now trying to do that. I feel we should not jeopardize their certificates—the only security they have."

In cooperation with the labor department jobs have been found for 13,000.

New York, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today at an advance of 2 to 3 points with the active months selling 2 to 4 points net higher during the few minutes on buying which seemed to be promoted by the fairly steady showing of Liverpool.

March sold up to 10.44 and July to 10.94 but the advance met some week-end realizing, while these also appeared to be a little southern selling and further March liquidation. This was sufficient to send March off to 10.31 or 9 points net lower but the price quickly rallied to 10.33 while July was around 10.89, with the general list ruling about 2 to 3 points net lower at the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables reported some further continental buying and trade calling supplied by hedging in that market and said there were fair sales of cotton cloths for export to Egypt and South America. Cotton on shipboard awaiting clearance at the end of the week was estimated at 114,000 bales as against 123,000 last year.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The stock market ended the first month of the year today with a rather shallow convalescent complexion, in contrast to the flush of enthusiasm with which January began.

The market was distinctly heavy, with numerous losses of a point or two in prominent issues, and wider declines in some of the more mercurial shares. Short covering gave the list a little boost in the last few minutes. The closing price level, as measured by the averages, was in the main only a point or two above the levels reached in the new year's rally of Jan. 2.

Further declines in the bond market weighed heavily on shares, and the violent fluctuations in a few of the volatile issues yesterday was regarded in some quarters as indicating an impaired technical position. Nevertheless, offerings were not heavy, and most of the pivotal issues gave ground grudgingly.

Auburn and Worthington continued to fluctuate erratically. The former dropped nearly 4, then regained almost half its loss. Worthington dropped nearly 4, then reduced its loss to less than a point. Chemicals were rather heavy. Shares of about 2 points included Westinghouse, Atchison, Eastman, Johns Manville, and Underwood Elliott, while U. S. Steel, American Can, American Power and Light, Bethlehem, Stone & Webster, Radio and Union Pacific lost about one point. General Railway Signal was a firm spot up 2. Sales for the two hour session were about 200,000 shares.

Commodities again eased off this week. Copper exporters today dropped their price 1-4 of a cent, confirming the action of custom smelters in cutting the domestic price from 10 to 9 3-4 cents a pound yesterday.

Foreign exchanges were about steady. Sterling cables were a shade lower at \$4.85 5-8. Argentine exchange held steady, and about \$5.090.00 in gold was received from Buenos Aires. Brazilian gold was heavy.

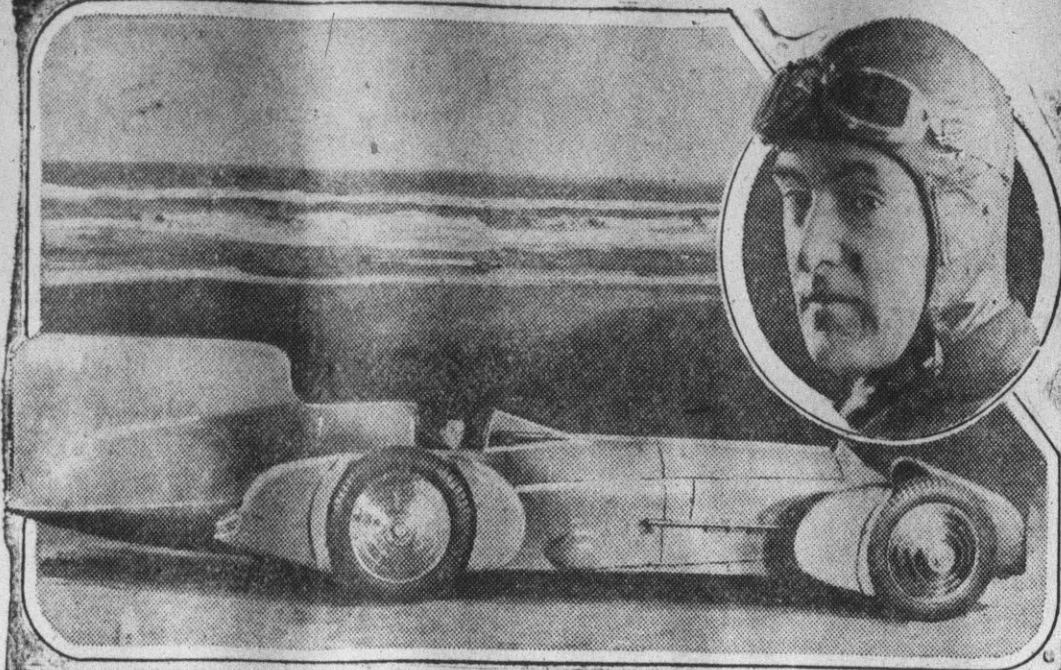

Daytona, Beach, Fla., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Captain Malcolm Campbell II, British contender for the world's land speed record, attained an unofficial speed of nearly 200 miles an hour today on the first practice run in his Bluebird II, car, since coming here from England.

AUTO RACER GETS READY FOR TRIALS

Daytona Beach, Fla., Jan. 31.—(AP)—A split second may be the narrow margin by which Captain Malcolm Campbell succeeds or fails in his proposed assault on the world's automobile speed record.

That is, unless the British race car driver decides to "shoot the works and put on a really astonishing show." In his trials to be made here when beach conditions permit.

One more second clipped off the present land speed record would give him the astonishing speed of at least 250 miles an hour. A second slower than the existing mark would put him in the class of the "also rans."

When the late Sir Henry Segrave established the present record of 231 miles an hour here in 1929, his average time over the measured mile course was 15.56 seconds, made from a four mile flying start. That was 1.78 seconds faster than the clocking of the late Ray Keech, who held the previous record at 207.55.

In other words the clipping of 1.78 second off the old mark meant the boosting of the record 23.71 miles an hour. That gives an indication of the value of a mere instant at such breath taking speed.

As the record is advanced the hundredth part of a second gains rapidly in value. If, during his proposed trials here, Campbell can shave one second off the time for the present mark of 231 he will be assured of a new record of 247.25 miles and hour, an increase of 16.93. However, if his time is a second slower than Segrave's his speed would be only 217.39 or 13.97 miles an hour below the existing record. Fifteen seconds flat is equivalent to 240 miles an hour, 14.40 seconds 250 miles an hour.

Establish New Ski Jump Mark

Big Pine Recreation Camp, Cal. Jan. 31.—(AP)—Swooping down a 700-foot run-way, Alf Engen, Salt Lake City and Lars Hauger, Lake Tahoe, Cal., dedicated a new ski jump, the longest and highest in the world, with world record jumps of 231 feet.

The old record, made by Henry Hall of Detroit, at Quebec in 1925, was 229 feet. That distance had been exceeded by Engen unofficially several times. Once the rational champion was credited with an unofficial jump of 217 feet.

Berg Pounds Out Another Victory Over Perlick

New York, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Herman Perlick, one-half of a (win pugilistic firm from Kalamazoo, Mich., soon should be convinced that he can not whip Jack (Kid) Berg, the Whitechapel whirlwind of the lightweight.

Herman, whose twin brother, Henry, also is a lightweight of some pretensions, stepped into the ring with Berg for the third time last night and for the third time Berg pounded out a decision victory.

For the first time in months the faithful at Madison Square Garden had a chance to grow really excited about a boxing match. And the 8,800 spectators, a better than average gathering in these lean days at the Garden, hissed, hooted, laughed, boo-ed and finally cheered to their hearts' content and genuinely enjoyed themselves.

SPORTS SLANTS

There is no disagreement on the theory that Jack Dempsey, if he makes any fist come back at all, must try it this year, but there are at least two outstanding obstacles to the return of Old John.

The first is his own lack of an incentive, unless the big money lure is too substantial to resist.

The second is the lack of a promoter of the type of Tex Rickard, willing to take a gamble and shoot the works.

There are some other factors, such as the very important one as to whether Dempsey again can get into real fighting condition. For that matter, he rather thinks he could do so, but he admits that the vital urge to attempt another ring battle is largely missing.

"When I was fighting for the championship, there was a real incentive. I took a great deal of pride in my ability to stick to the top and even after I lost the title to Tunney, I was convinced I could regain it in the next year.

"That's all over now. I don't like the idea of fighting just for the sake of giving or taking socks. Big money is attractive and no doubt I could collect a chunk for a go at either Sharkey or Carnera. But I'm fixed O. K. so far as the dough is concerned. I've got a \$700,000 trust fund that will keep the wolf from the door.

"I can do pretty well without putting the gloves on. Then maybe in a few years I can settle down to some steady business."

In spite of the business depression that has hit the Madison Square Garden box-office a number of heavy wallops, the situation is ripe for an outdoor "natural"

such as a return Dempsey-Sharkey match this year. Sharkey also is "out in the cold," despite the fact that the Three Dukes of the New York Boxing commission consider him the No. 1 heavyweight.

The Madison Square Garden millionaires might recoup with Dempsey but they have been embroiled in their own troubles; increasingly so since the death of Tex Rickard. Until these are solved or unless there is a big shake-up, the chances are slim that an attempt will be made to regain control of the heavyweight situation, once so firmly dominated by Rickard.
