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BUTLER WILL FACE CHARGE ON TUESDAY

Specific Charges Against Marine Officer Awaited Today By His Counsel

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The court martial of Major General Smedley D. Butler of the Marines will begin at 10:00 A. M., Monday, February 16, at the Philadelphia navy yard.

Secretary Adams made the announcement today after a visit to the White House. He also had conferred with Judge Advocate General Sellers of the Navy.

Upon leaving the president's office he said that he called to talk about "Naval affairs."

Asked if he had discussed the Butler court martial his reply was that it was "against principles to talk about such things."

The naval secretary walked up from the Navy Department to the White House executive offices, entering and leaving the offices by a side door.

At the Navy Department, Secretary Adams said charges and specifications against Butler yet were being prepared by Sellers, they will be made public he said, providing no opposition to such publicity is made by General Butler.

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The time, the place and the specific charges against Major General Smedley D. Butler still were awaited today by the marine officer and his counsel.

It generally was believed in navy circles that the charges against Butler would be "conduct prejudicial to the good order and discipline of the service." Philadelphia, Washington and Quantico, Va., were the three prospective sites for the trial with Philadelphia favored.

The prospect that Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., might be a witness for the government, at Phoenix, Ariz., Vanderbilt said he might have "a good many things to say" regarding the case at the proper time.

In some quarters Vanderbilt is credited with having supplied the material for General Butler's Philadelphia speech, in which he is reported to have told a story that Premier Mussolini was a hit-and-run driver. The charges against him grew from the incident.

Phoenix, Ariz., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., may have "a good many things to say" concerning the incident involving Major-General Smedley D. Butler of the marine corps and Premier Mussolini of Italy, if circumstances "change sufficiently."

Vanderbilt, credited in some quarters with having supplied the material for General Butler's recent charge that the Italian premier was guilty of a hit-and-run motor offense, made this known late last night.

His announcement came during discussion of a statement by the Italian foreign office that Vanderbilt, a former newspaper publisher, once had been granted a "brief audience" with Mussolini.

The foreign office statement was in the nature of an amendment to one issued by it last week to the effect that Mussolini had never met young Vanderbilt.

"They seem to be backing down a bit, don't they?" the young former publisher said.

Told that a visit he had had with the Italian premier was characterized in the latest foreign office statement as a "brief audience" he laughed.

"That audience, resulting in a published interview in 1925, he said, 'was 4,000 words long. Any one can exercise his own judgment as to whether 4,000 words is 'brief.'"

Asked if he ever would have anything definite to say regarding General Butler's story of the hit-and-run incident, which will bring the general before a court martial soon, Vanderbilt said:

"I have nothing to say now, but if circumstances change sufficiently, I may have a good many things to say."

CANNON IN HOSPITAL AT CAPITAL CITY

Bishop Will Leave Sick Bed Tomorrow to Defend Himself Before Church Board

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., was in a hospital here today on the eve of hearings to be conducted by his church into charges against him, but his family said he would leave the hospital tomorrow to defend himself.

The Southern Methodist dry leader recently returned from Texas, where he recuperated from an illness which had confined him to bed for two months. His recovery, members of his family said, was not complete.

The present trip to the hospital was to rest from the long journey from Texas. Tomorrow twelve elders of the church will sit as an investigating body to hear charges filed against the bishop by four ministers. If the charges are found to have weight, Cannon will be suspended from active duty until 1934 when the general conference of the church will bring him to trial.

The nature of the charges, filed last September by Dr. F. J. Prentiss, of Baltimore, Dr. I. P. Martin, of Abington, Va., and Drs. Costen J. Harrell and J. T. Mastin, of Richmond, has never been disclosed.

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Rep. Dennison Must Face Trial In Liquor Case

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The District of Columbia Court of Appeals today held that Representative Dennison, of Illinois, must stand trial on an indictment charging him with possession of a trunk containing intoxicating liquors.

The trunk was found in Dennison's office at the House office building in January, 1929.

The decision of Justice Osgood reversed the action of the District of Columbia Supreme Court, which had sustained a demurrer to the indictment on the ground that it failed sufficiently to acquaint Dennison with the charges.

Counsel for the Illinois congressman had attacked the jurisdiction of the Court of Appeals, claiming the appeal should have been taken by the United States to the United States Supreme Court.

SOLONS FACE HUGE TASKS AT CAPITAL

Members of General Assembly to Tackle School and Road Problems This Week

Raleigh, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Looking ahead to 38 more legislative days before the constitutional 60-day session—with pay—run out, North Carolina legislators returning to Raleigh today saw much work facing them with little actually accomplished.

The members of the assembly get paid \$600 for sixty days of work and no more. Twenty-two days have passed and not a single major problem has been finally disposed of.

The most important state-wide legislation passed has been the McLean law setting up the policy that the state shall support the six months constitutional term without an ad valorem tax and the Neal bill temporarily postponing revaluation.

Policy in regard to the schools, however, is one thing and enactment of a law or laws to obtain money for the six months term without a state ad valorem tax is another. Hardly had the McLean bill been enacted into law when Senator Whedbee set forward a school machinery bill requiring a 20-cent state ad valorem levy.

The school question, the road battle and the revenue proposals will be in the spotlight this week, it is expected. The education committee must start their school machinery bills, the road committee will probably receive the administration road bills and act on several. It has and the finance committee will start public hearings on contested sections of the revenue bill.

Tonight Governor Gardner will give the assembly a special message on the revenue bill. The House is expected to debate the barbers' bill and the Senate has routine business before it.

COMPROMISE ON VETS BONUS TALKED TODAY

Representative Patman Tells of Opinions of Some of the Other Senators

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Representative Patman told today of compromise offers having been talked of by some administration followers as a settlement of the issue over cash redemption of veterans' bonus certificates.

The Texas Democrat, one of the original sponsors of the cash redemption plan, named Senator Vandenberg. He said the Michigan Republican had expressed a belief after a White House conference that an increase by fifty per cent of the loan value of the certificates and a reduction in the interest would meet administration approval.

"While most of the compromise advocates have discussed it quietly," Patman said, "I have definite information that they would be only too willing to accept such a compromise."

"It would please Secretary Mellon and the administration, I know. The proposal has been discussed with nearly all of us who are advocating a one hundred per cent cash bonus."

Senator Vandenberg has proposed a measure allowing loans up to 50 per cent face value of the certificates. This ultimately would involve a total outlay of \$170,000,000, if all veterans took advantage. (Continued on page three)

DO-X Prepares To Continue Flight

Permanent Receivers Are Appointed For Mortgage Company Of Hickory

Ordering Receivership of Organization, Judge Meekins Declares It to Be Hopelessly Insolvent and Grossly Mismanaged Under the Present Management

Raleigh, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Permanent receivers for the Home Mortgage Company of Hickory, formerly of Durham, were appointed in a decree filed in Federal court here today by Judge J. M. Meekins.

In a lengthy opinion on the case Judge Meekins declared the Home Mortgage Company to be "hopelessly insolvent and under its former and present management was and is grossly mismanaged."

T. L. Bland of Raleigh and W. G. Bramham of Durham, who have been serving as temporary receivers, were named permanent receivers in the decree. They must post a bond of \$30,000 each.

Action for a receivership of the mortgage company was instituted October 17, 1930, by Mrs. Margaret Ramsey of Norfolk, Va., holder of \$3,500 in bonds of the company.

The case was bitterly fought through a dozen hearings before Judge Meekins and several hearings before Charles B. Calvert, special referee, and the respondents appealed to higher Federal courts several times.

James H. Pou of Raleigh, one of the counsel for the respondents, said this morning that he had not read the order of Judge Meekins and did not have authority to say the decree would be appealed but admitted that he thought it would.

In his opinion Judge Meekins pointed out that the Home Mortgage company was one of six corporations in the "Cobb group" in Durham which were in receivership and which had been found to be "hopelessly insolvent."

He recorded that the press of the state, sometime prior to institution of receivership proceedings had announced that the State Corporation commission had deprived the Home Mortgage company of its license to sell stock or investment certificates in North Carolina.

Referring to claims that the company was "a \$14,000,000 corporation," Judge Meekins said "it is not a \$14,000,000 corporation. It may have been such a corporation. It is now an insolvent corporation and reprehensibly if not nefariously managed."

Referring to an affidavit of J. E. Owens, executive vice president of the company, Judge Meekins held that the admitted policy of borrowing securities from "outsiders" for discount or use as collateral was "reckless mismanagement when kept secret or withheld from all and each of the parties in interest."

Such practice by a "so-called \$14,000,000 corporation," Judge Meekins said, makes one believe "it is reasonably certain such a corporation is insolvent."

"The court," Judge Meekins wrote, "in careful examination of the method used in conducting the business of the mortgage company, and the disregard of the explicit terms of the trust agreement under which it operates, amounting to (Continued on page three)

FALL BRIBERY CASE BEFORE HIGH COURT

Arguments for Reversing Conviction of Oil Magnate Started At Washington

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Arguments for reversing the conviction of Albert B. Fall for accepting a bribe began today in the District of Columbia Court of Appeals.

Counsel for the former interior secretary contended he had lacked any jurisdiction over the Elks Hills, California, naval oil reserve, the leasing of which led to his being judged guilty a year ago of taking \$100,000 to influence him to award to a company of Edward L. Doheny the lease.

He was fined \$100,000 and sentenced to one year in prison. Justice William Hitz announced at the time that if he was on the bench when the case returned for sentence, he would suspend the jail term.

Frank Hogan, Fall's chief counsel, argued the former cabinet officer could not be charged with bribery because the law required that a bribery charge could be lodged only when a government officer accepted it to influence his official acts.

He contended that Congress under a general leasing law had placed entire jurisdiction of naval oil lands under the navy secretary and that Congress was the only authority which could designate the duties of any government officer.

He said that the executive order by President Harding in 1921, that placed jurisdiction over the naval oil reserves jointly under Fall and the navy secretary was inoperative and could not make leasing of the oil lands part of Fall's official duty.

Bandit With Many Aliases Is Nabbed At High Point

High Point, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Jack Eustace, 23-year-old Charleston, Ill., bandit, who boasts many aliases than Joseph had colors in his coat, languished behind prison bars here today awaiting trial for sticking up a pool room.

Eustace, who says he is at times known as Harold Smith and at other times as Jack Hudson, was brought here from Columbia.

He freely admits he was one of a band of five which staged a \$25,000 jewel robbery at Urbana, Ill., November 9, 1929, but denies that he is wanted in St. Louis for bank robbery, as police here were informed.

Illinois officials also say the man is wanted for a bank robbery at Homer, Ill., but Eustace says he doesn't even know where that town is.

ONLY FEW MEN TAKEN BACK BY TEXTILE MILLS

Further Disagreement Arises Among Strikers and Operators at Danville

Danville, Va., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Crowds of former strikers swarmed about the employment offices of the Dan River and Riverside textile mills today in another unsuccessful effort to obtain work.

Mill officials announced, as on other days last week, that there were practically no vacancies, and only a few of the more than 3,000 jobless workers were re-employed.

Those failing to obtain work went to union hall to register their names for the records of the local union. Disagreement in statements as to the conditions under which the strike was added last week had come today as an aftermath of the four months old industrial controversy. Union leaders contend that an agreement was reached between strikers and the mill management through arrangements made by H. W. Morgan of Washington, president of a Virginia coal company, on behalf of labor, and Dr. Carroll Flippin, of Charlottesville, brother-in-law of H. R. Fitzgerald, mill president.

Mr. Fitzgerald, however, in a telephone conversation from New York to the Danville Register, denied that any agreement was ever entered into with the union members.

Quite a Flier

LANDLADY ON THE STAND IN MAXON TRIAL

Tells of Killing of Lodger During Disorders in New York Boarding House

New York, Feb. 2.—(AP)—A buxom and elderly landlady was the prosecution's first witness today as James Matthew Maxon, Jr., 22-year-old son of the Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Tennessee, went on trial for second degree murder.

The Chattanooga youth is charged with beating to death David Paynter, 73-year-old fellow lodger in a West End avenue rooming house, on the night of April 17, 1930.

Mrs. Rose Hickey, proprietress of the rooming house, said she was asleep in her room on the night of the killing and was awakened by a pounding on her bed. Switching on a light she found Maxon there and then he twisted her wrists and she screamed for Paynter and James McGarry fellow lodgers with Maxon at the house.

They came running in and McGarry said "what are you trying to do? Kill that woman? Get out of here!" Maxon and McGarry went upstairs. I dressed and followed them.

Maxon she said met her at the top of the stairs, chased her down into the kitchen, "I'll kill you!" and pushed her back into the front hall.

There, she said, another lodger named Ekleson found them and called a policeman.

Maxon was incensed, she declared, and flung her body out the front door and Ekleson after her. The two of them landing so hard the impact broke the porch railing. Maxon is smaller than either Mrs. Hickey or Ekleson.

Ekleson jumped up from the porch, Mrs. Hickey testified, and ran down the street with Maxon behind him. Falling in the chase, the youth returned as she was picking herself up and pursued her into the house and into the kitchen again.

In the kitchen doorway, she said, she stood as Maxon swung a chair, knocking the light out. She ran again to the front hall as the doorbell rang, and Maxon followed her, she said, and shouted he'd kill her if she opened the door.

Ekleson was there with a policeman. They returned, Mrs. Hickey went on to the kitchen where they lit the gas and found Paynter lying unconscious on the floor near the stove. The kitchen was "wrecked," she said.

Her testimony was interrupted frequently while the jurors were shown pictures of the house and its rooms to illustrate her story.

William B. Moore, prosecutor detailed in a short opening address the injuries which led to Paynter's death. He said the old man had seven ribs fractured on his right side, three or four on his left side, his nose broken and the upper part of his jaw cracked.

Senator Smoot Returns to Capitol From Sick Bed in An Effort to Obtain Immediate Conference Between Senate and House; Spokesmen for Democrats and Republicans Stand Firmly; Smoot Has Nothing to Propose to Avoid Extra Session

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—With an extra session of Congress looming ahead, Congressional leaders expect late in the day or tomorrow seeking a break in the deadlock between the administration and the Democrats on the \$25,000,000 relief fund.

The veteran Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah, returned to the capitol today from a sick bed to obtain an immediate conference between the Senate and House. He is chairman of the Senate Conference on the Interior Department Appropriation bill in which the Senate coalition of Democrats and Republican Independents incorporated the dispute relief fund.

As Smoot started to the House to confer with the leaders there, the spokesman of the Democrats and the administration were standing their ground in the controversy. "I have nothing to propose," Smoot admitted.

Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, with the backing of a party caucus, has served notice that some measure of Federal relief must be incorporated in the interior bill or it can not pass.

Representative Tilson, of Conn., administration leader in the House, has served an equally firm notice that the House will not compromise.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, a leader of the Republican Independents who voted with the Senate Democrats for the \$25,000,000 proposal, has advocated a compromise at \$15,000,000.

However, with both the Democrats and the administration standing pat, Borah's \$15,000,000 proposition has gained little headway.

The compromise plan most discussed would make \$10,000,000 or \$15,000,000 available to a government agency to be spent upon the direction of President Hoover only in event of extreme emergency.

Meanwhile, an attempt of conferees to agree on the \$120,000,000 deficiency bill failed today with \$3,000,000 proposal of Senate Democrats for medical supplies in the drought area one of the items in dispute in the House.

Chairman Jones, of the appropriations committee, called another meeting for late in the day. He indicated if no agreement was then forthcoming he would return to the Senate to report a disagreement.

Woman Faces Trial for Killing Husband; Man Also Connected

Rutherfordton, Feb. 2.—(AP)—A hearing for Mrs. John Lynch and John Paul Seavey, held in connection with the slaying of the woman's husband January 25, is expected to be held this afternoon.

The hearing, if held, will take the form of habeas corpus proceedings before Judge Hoyle Sink in Superior court.

This was requested by the county recorder, who said that failure of a coroner's jury to reach a verdict and other hindrances of the case made holding the customary preliminary hearing difficult.

Lynch was slain on his own doorstep. His wife said he went to the door after someone outside had yelled threats against his life. "You don't treat your family better," and was struck by four of the ten bullets she said were fired.

The next day officers, after investigation of reports connecting Seavey with the widow, arrested him. Her arrest followed two days later and the pair has been held incommunicado since.

Ford Abandons Plan to Exploit Rubber Resources of Brazil

Rio De Janeiro, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Brazil's dream of conquest of the mighty Amazon jungles through the effective exploitation of its rubber resources by the American auto king, Henry Ford, appeared today to have collapsed.

Advices from Para, on the Amazon, said that Mr. Ford, after spending millions of dollars, had found himself unable to combat native antagonism to efficiency methods popular in Detroit and is giving up his huge rubber experiment on the Tapajos river.

Employees on the farms recently have been reduced from 3,000 to 200. Some Americans working on the project have resigned while others assigned to an Australian post now are in Para awaiting transportation.

Among the American methods introduced to which the natives objected, it is understood, are punching a time clock, and standing in line with trays for food at the mess hall. Such efficiency methods are unheard of in the tropics and greatly aroused the Brazilians.

Eviction of former tenants as clearing proceeded also led to antagonisms and late last year it was necessary to send police by airplanes from Para to quell a riot of natives who marched on the farm headquarters with pitchforks, guns and farm implements. Recently there was said to have been a mess hall riot with the laborers breaking a quantity of dishes against each other.

American circles here understand, Mr. Ford believed he had a federal concession for his rubber farm, whereas it was only a state concession backed only by transitory state authorities. The Ford interests spent \$90,000 a month for supplies and \$7,000 for labor.

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—State department officials said today they had no information or intimation of any plan by Henry Ford to give up his rubber concession in Brazil.

Message Reports Finding Wreckage of the Tradewind

Washington, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Possibility that wreckage of the ill-fated airplane Tradewind had been sighted floating in the Atlantic near the Azores was seen today in a message received at the Navy Department from the steamship Youngstown.

The message said the Youngstown had passed grey-colored wreckage resembling a section of an airplane wing about 275 miles northwest of Horta, on the island of Fayal, Azores.

The Tradewind with Mrs. Beryl Hart and Lt. Wm. S. MacLaren, left Bermuda January 10 headed for the Azores and never arrived.

Hillsboro Doctor to Begin Sentence In Jail This Week

Raleigh, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Dr. R. B. Hayes of Hillsboro, facing a ten-day sentence for contempt of Matt H. Allen, chairman of the State Industrial Commission, will probably be visited by the sheriff of Orange county tomorrow or Wednesday and notified that he must serve his sentence.

Edward Seawell, clerk of the State Supreme Court, said this morning that papers certifying to the clerk of Orange court that the high tribunal had upheld the lower court conviction of Dr. Hayes would be sent to Hillsboro today or tomorrow.

The doctor is ready, he has said, to serve his sentence.

Dr. Hayes was ruled in contempt of Mr. Allen when he refused to answer questions at an industrial commission hearing until he was assured he would be paid as an expert witness.

American Gunboat Defeats Bandits On Yangtze River

Hankow, Feb. 2.—(AP)—American three-inch guns proved superior to ancient muzzle-loading cannons as the United States gunboat Panay defeated Chinese bandits in a brief but intense battle on the Yangtze river 275 miles above this port yesterday.

Neither the Panay nor an American cargo boat, the warship was conveying downstream suffered a casualty, although both ran a veritable hail of solid shot, shells and scrap iron fired from Red batteries on both banks of the river.

The Panay raked the shores with withering effect, and quickly silenced the bandits' cannon. Roving bands of so-called Communists have harassed shipping on the upper Yangtze for several months. American, British, Japanese and Chinese shipping has suffered.

The bands were blamed for the predicament of the American freighter Chita, aground in the river below Shashi. The gunboat Oahu hovered near the Chita to prevent Reds from pirating the helpless vessel.

Authorities declared the Chita grounded when she lost her bearings because bandits had removed buoys marking the river channel. American gunboats have been attacked several times, but thus far have always emerged the victors.

Shortly before the attack on the Panay Communists attacked the important city of Yochow, at the head of Tungting lake, but were driven off by the city garrison.

Three suspected Communists were executed at Hankow.

Deny Marriage Contracted As Result of Debt

Kansas City, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Frank Henzel, 61 year old farm laborer and his 19 year old bride today vigorously defended their marriage against the assertions of his relatives that the union had been contracted in payment of a debt.

Arrested on the assertion her husband was missing, the bride, Celia, was held for questioning at the request of Henzel's relatives in Beatrice, Neb., who charged she had been given in marriage when Henzel agreed to dismiss suit for \$10,000 debt against the girl's mother.

She is Mrs. Charity Brennan, wife of a Carthage, Mo., farmer. The girl denied she had married Henzel for his money and said she loved him.

Henzel found late last night in a Denver bus station, substantiated the assertions of his relatives, but asserted the bride "did no wrong." He said Celia had agreed to marry him if he would dismiss the suit.

"She kept her word and married me and I kept mine and dismissed the suit," he said. He added that he was coming to Kansas City to obtain his wife's release and then would go to Beatrice for a conference with his relatives. The couple was married here last Wednesday, the bridegroom leaving soon afterward for Colorado to purchase a farm.

The relatives who asked the girl's detention were George Henzel, a brother of the bridegroom; Frank Novotny, a brother-in-law and his daughter, Miss Virginia Novotny. They declared Henzel once possessed \$100,000 but that he had lost much of it and had gone to Missouri to work on Brennan's farm.

The suit filed against Mrs. Brennan alleged Henzel had advanced his employer some money to obtain the release of a son from prison and to pay the debt on their farm. Police said the son, Wayne who also was held, had served a term for bank robbery.

A chair was seized by one of the combatants. It hit a light and knocked the light out. When it was all over, Mr. Littleton said, the defense would prove Paynter was found on the floor, and it was Maxon who picked him up and washed the blood from his face.

organized.

Trying to reconcile Republicans

two game roosters in a pen expect-
ing them not to fight.

The month of February is going
to witness Greenville merchants
making another bid for the trade
of this section.

Plans of the Merchants associa-
tion call for "Dollar Day" Febru-
ary 12th, and this means that
thousands of bargains will be of-
fered the people of eastern Caro-
lina.

The trading public realizes the
importance of this "Dollar Day"
and in the life of the community
and that the business district will
be packed with people all day long
and not be doubted.

Buyers have already gone to
northern markets to lay in exten-
sive stocks for this great trade
event, and the most discriminating
and exacting buyers will be able
to find what they want in Green-
ville on that date.

The most significant feature of
"Dollar Day" is not the bulk of
goods offered on every hand, but
the bargain prices prevailing at
every store. In recent years values
which sold as high as \$10 at other
seasons of the year went for the
sum of \$1.

Merchants are planning to make
this "Dollar Day" even greater
than previous ones and those who
come here may rest assured of
receiving many times the value of
their money.

The farmers are tired of so much
advice about what to plant this
year. observed a prominent agricul-
turalist here recently, but they had
better take note of the live at home
campaign and plant more of the
things which they consume at
home.

Money crops will be planted as
usual, but the man that wants to
find himself on the safe side of
the fence would do well to mix
his crops so that he will be able
to live despite the price situation
for the cash crops.

That prices cannot be depended
upon has been plainly demon-
strated in past years, and right at
this time the majority of growers in
this section are suffering from the
deflated values.

The live at home plan is the
safe and sure way, and the grower
that follows it should certainly
find himself in better shape to
meet his obligations than he has
this year.

Will the Greenville tobacco mar-
ket be able to eclipse the record of
71,137,240 pounds of tobacco es-
tablished in 1928?

This is the question going the
rounds today, and it will be an-
swered when the market rings
down the curtains on the season
next Friday.

With sales standing above the
70,000,000 pound mark, the market
has only about 700,000 pounds to
go to reach the old record. It is
a long way to go at this season of
the year with sales extremely light,
but if tobaccoists have their way
about it they are going to shatter
the old record and close the season
with that to talk about until an-

other season rolls around with ad-
ditional opportunities.
Had sales been normal during the
month of September shortly after
the market opened, the sales would
have exceeded the 80,000,000 pound
goal set at the beginning of the
season.

However, if the record is not
reached, we do not have anything
to grumble about. Seventy million
pounds of tobacco is plenty good,
and shows that the boys have not
been idle.

It is gratifying to note that the
report relative to the resignation of
Rev. W. A. Lillycrop, rector of St.
Paul's church is without founda-
tion, and that he will continue his
services with the local congrega-
tion.

He is one of the most earnest
workers of the ministry in this part
of the state and has been able to
accomplish much in behalf of the
spread of the Gospel during his
stay here.

Although offered inducing posi-
tions in other fields, he believes he
will be able to render greater ser-
vice here, and will continue to aid
in the growth of his congregation
and the religious life of the city
and community.

Two Youths Held In Hit-Run Case

Rocky Mount, Feb. 2.—(AP)—
While two girl college students bat-
tled for their lives in a hospital
here today, police at Nashville held
two youths without bond in connec-
tion with a hit-and-run automobile
wreck yesterday near Spring Hope,
20 miles from here.

Miss Mildred Virginia Mansfield,
18, the most seriously injured, was
in a critical condition with a frac-
tured skull. Her companion, Miss
Ruth Alden Jacob, has severe face
lacerations and body injuries. Both
girls are from Elizabeth City and
students at North Carolina College
for Women, Greensboro.

Police are holding Fernon O'Neal,
21, of Wake Forest, and Randall
Perry, 21, of Louisville, who were
arrested here after they had fled
from the scene of the crash and
abandoned their automobile in an
attempt to escape.

The youths, witnesses said, drove
a stripped-down car from under a
filling station and crashed into the
sedan in which the girls were riding
with Floyd Waley, 21, and George
Byerly, 21, also of Elizabeth City.
Waley and Byerly were not injured.
The stripped-down car continued on
its way.

Rocky Mount officers chased
O'Neal and Perry into a blackberry
patch after the youths had left their
car by the side of the road near
here when the officers approached.
No formal charges were lodged

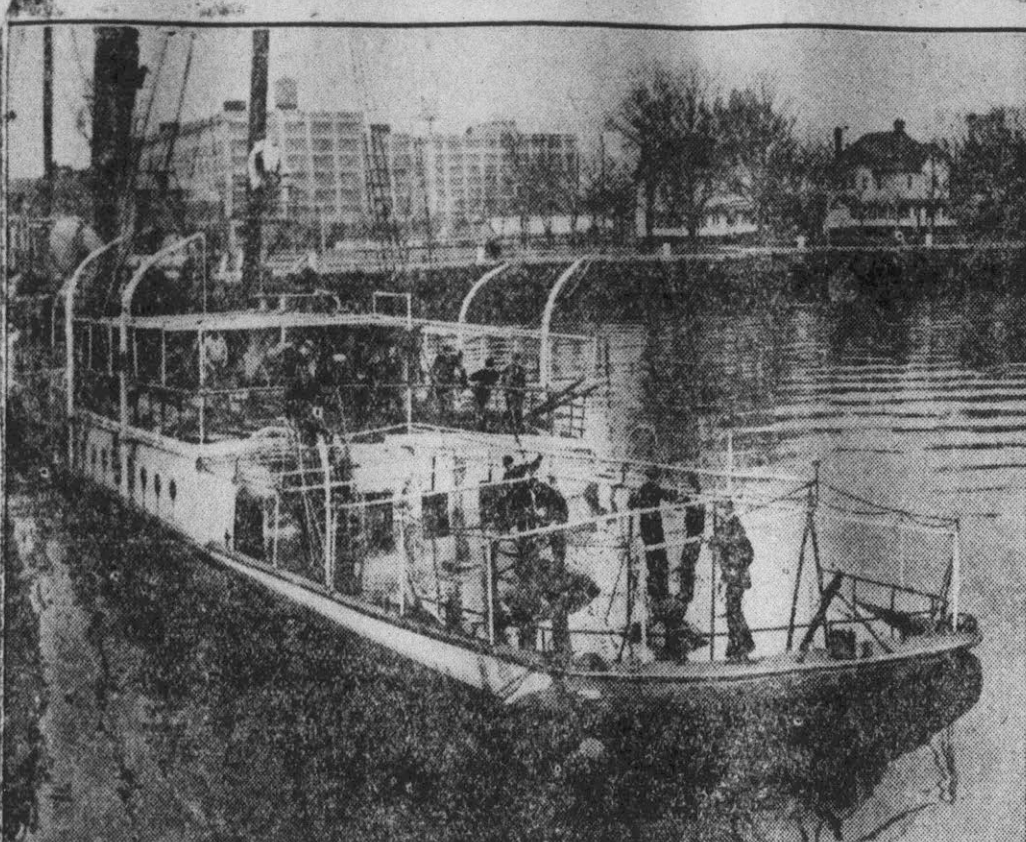

EIGHT MAJOR PLAYERS ARE HOLDING OUT

San Francisco, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Major league baseball players wintering on the Pacific coast are placing their signatures on 1931 contracts with a minimum of grumbling.

Only eight out of forty, an Associated Press survey shows, are in the "raise the pay" class. Of these, four are rookies.

As expected, Babe Herman, burly Brooklyn outfielder, is after more money. The big slugger is a perennial holdout.

The recruits who think their palms should be crossed with more silver are Johnny Vergez, third baseman, going from Oakland to the New York Giants; his teammate, Ernie Lombardi, catcher, purchased by Brooklyn; Myrl Hoag, left fielder, now the property of the New York Yankees; and Bob Johnson, outfielder, who belongs to the Philadelphia Athletics.

Walter Berger, heavy hitting outfielder of the Boston Nationals, thinks his services are worth \$12,500 for the coming season. Lyn Lory, New York shortstop, and Larry French, southpaw pitcher of Pittsburgh, also are in favor of the "salary uplift" movement.

Consider the customers on the other side of the fence, however. Harry Rosenberg, young Jewish outfielder purchased last mid-season from the San Francisco Missions by the New York Giants for \$40,000, hit exactly .000 in nine games as a pinch-hitter. His 1931 contract carried a raise of \$250 a month. He sent the signed contract back by airmail.

Frank "Lefty" O'Doul, ex-Phillies outfielder who goes to Brooklyn this year, received a bonus and a raise. A peek at the new contract made him so happy he went out and played four rounds of golf in one day.

Ray Douthett, St. Louis outfielder, signed a new three year contract at the end of last season. Joe Cronin, Washington shortstop, voted the most valuable player in the American League last season, received for a raise and bonus. Roy Johnson of Detroit, and Smead Jolley of the Chicago White Sox, outfielders, and Ralph Kress, St. Louis American third sacker, agreed to accept "salary enlargements."

Brooklyn Dodgers—Gordan Slade, shortstop, Johnny Fredericks, outfielder; no complaints.

Boston Nationals—Bruce Cunningham, pitcher, Earl Sheeley, first baseman, satisfied.

Philadelphia Nationals—Dick Bartell, shortstop, and Russell Arlett, outfielder, haven't received contracts but expect no trouble.

New York Yankees—Jimmy Reese, second baseman, Vernon Gomez, pitcher, Tony Lazzeri, third baseman, satisfied.

Philadelphia Athletics—Frank Palmisano, catcher, will sign. Cleveland—Earl Averill, outfielder, Fay Thomas, pitcher, no trouble expected.

Boston Americans—Hal Rhyne, shortstop, Jack Rothrock, infielder, satisfied.

St. Louis Americans—Earl McNeely, satisfied.

Chicago White Sox—Johnny Kerr, second baseman, satisfied.

Willie Kamm, Chicago White Sox third baseman, whose sale in 1924 by the San Francisco Seals for \$125,000 was the first "important money" deal recorded in the Pacific Coast League, has not received his contract. STOCK MARKET

This compared favorably with the final period of 1930, which showed a drop of 22 1-2 per cent, but failed to bear out estimates that sales would be cut off only about 10 per cent from the like period of a year ago. Montgomery Ward's January sales volume was off only 9 3-10 per cent against a drop of 19 9-10 in December.

The veterans' bonus project continued to bring warnings from high banking sources.

The money market remained glutted, with rates stationary, although the month end settlements may take up a little of slack during the next few days.

Brevard, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Headed by B. E. Greer of Greenville, S. C., a new company has been organized to take over and re-open the Sapphires cotton mills here, which would have an payroll of about \$1,400 per week.

Prince of Wales Leaves Havana. Havana, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The Prince of Wales and his brother George slipped quietly in and out of Havana harbor yesterday without landing.

They did not even appear on deck during the morning hours, when their ship, the Oropesa, was anchored in the harbor but as it left they came from their cabins and waved good-bye to about 2,000 persons, many of them British colonists, who lined Moro Castle ramparts.

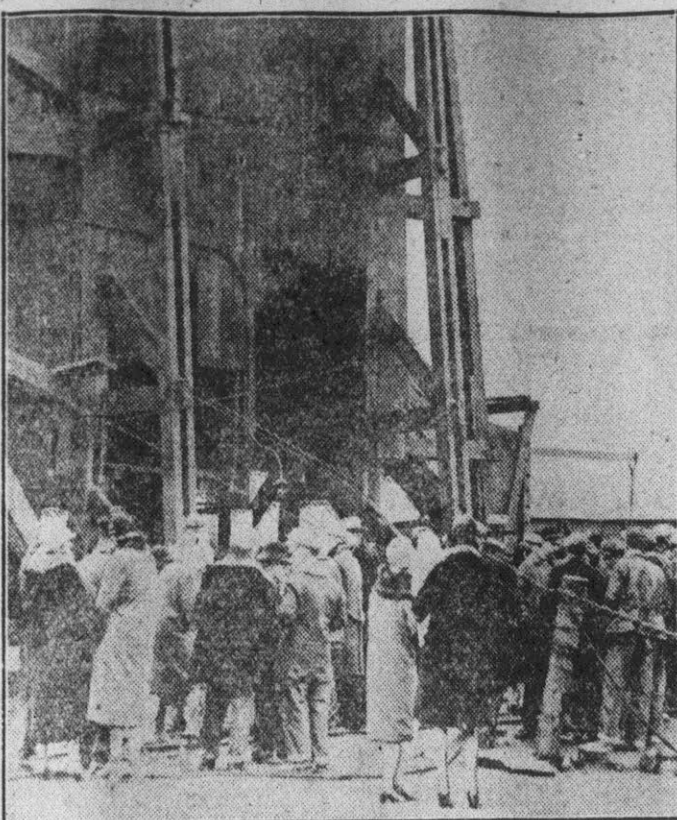

AFTER BLAST, TRAPPED MINERS



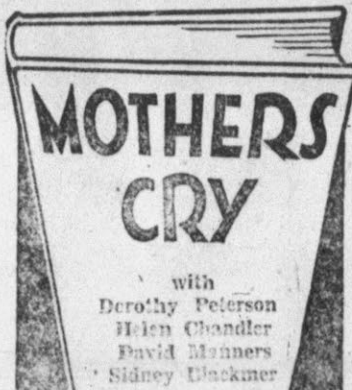

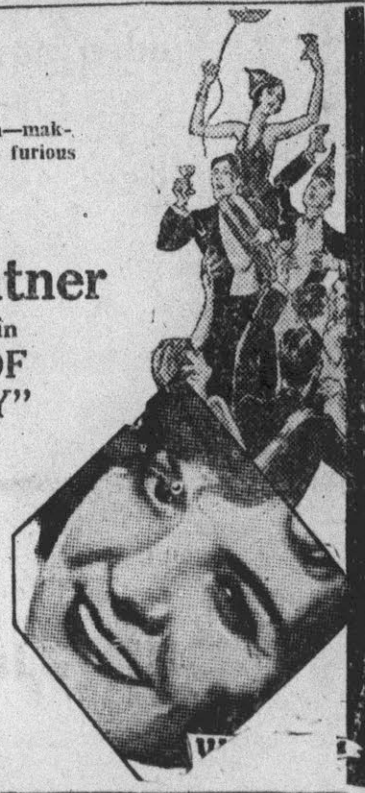
