Headache Schedule Running Behind At Illinois Hospital

Chicago, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The headache schedule is running behind time at the University of Illinois research hospital.

Theodore Roberts and James Callahan, who agreed to deliver two good migraine headaches every 30 days in exchange for \$50 a month each and their board and room have had lots of pains, but for the most part they have been of the home-grown variety and due to the 12th mail they have received.

Roberts has had but one migraine headache since he submitted himself to the hospital, where doctors hope to find the cause and a cure, while Callahan hasn't produced one since he joined the payroll January 13. He is almost two headaches in arrears.

Meanwhile mail comes, "in from all over the United States, England and South America. Many of the headache fans suggest various remedies. Others have volunteered to supplement Roberts and Callahan, should the hospital want to change patients.

The hospital authorities, however, are not looking for any more sufferers and are confident that Roberts and Callahan will be able to deliver the goods in time.

City Dwellers Seek Farms In the West

Washington, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Thousands of city dwellers are seeking to find out if there's a place for them in the big open spaces of the west.

At a rate of 400 to 600 a day their letters are piling up at the general land office. They want to know how to go about filing claims for homesteads on public lands. Long-time employees of the land office recalled today that in each of the depressions of the past 30 years, applicants for government lands doubled and trebled. They are following the precedent now in even greater proportion but the news they get is less encouraging.

For little if any of the public domain remaining is suitable for farming and the land office in giving applicants instructions on establishing claims adds that warning.

Most of the letters come from the thickly populated urban centers of the east and central United States. Thousands of the land seekers belong to the "white collar" class of workers who despite agriculture's troubles fondly believe it would be easier to grow the food they are finding it difficult to buy. Many letters, however, come from farmers in the east who want to move, and a good proportion is written by sons of farmers who strayed from the furrows in their youth to search for metropolitan fame.

During the fiscal year ended last June 5,434,550 homestead entries were recorded. The year before they were just more than four and a half million. Records for the last six months are not complete but officials estimated today the total of entries and applications would run well into the millions.

Aviator Commits Suicide

Baltimore, Md., Feb. 5.—(AP)—John F. Dandy, 40, a lieutenant in the British Royal Flying corps during the world war, shot and killed himself on a street here, early today, after seeing a moving picture which dramatized the part aviators played in the war, police reported.

His mother, Mrs. Mary Dandy, with whom he lived, said her son had been despondent recently because of ill health.

FARMERS CAN'T PAY RENT: SOWN LANDS ABANDONED

Cairo, Egypt.—(AP)—In some districts of Egypt peasants have left land already sown because they can't raise the rent.

In Menoufia province alone, 4,000 seizures have been made for farm rent, and extremely low prices have been current at auctions. A camel normally worth \$150 sold for \$45, a cow valued at \$200 brought \$25 and an ass only \$1.

ABOUT TOWN

People who failed to lend their
support to the movement to plant
more trees in Greenville would do
well to give it some consideration
at this time, and in that way help
improve their premises as well as
the general appearance of the en-
tire city.

While the campaign met with
some success last year, members
of the committee said several days
ago that it was not as successful as
it should have been and ought to
receive more attention this year.

This is the time of the year when
people begin to turn their thoughts
to putting things in the ground
for the harvest season, and it
would be to say to add a few
small trees, which in the course
of a few years would add much to
the beautification in the section
where they are planted.

The public is urged to further
the planting campaign in every
way possible and in that way con-
tribute their part toward making
Greenville one of the best look-
ing towns in this part of the
country.

The legislature has enacted into
law a measure defining slot ma-
chines and punchboards and
providing a penalty for those
charged with violating the law in
this respect.

Every section of the state has
been troubled by this form of
gambling for years, but, for some
unknown reason law enforcement
officials never were able to de-
termine exactly what constituted
gambling when the slot machines
were involved.

Of course numbers of arrests have
been made from time to time when
gambling was as plain as the nose
on the face, but prosecutions have
been at a minimum because of the
lack of definition of the types of
machines violating the law.

It is to be presumed that from
now on the slot machine and
punchboard owners will begin in-
vestigating the matter more thor-
oughly, and determine whether or
not they are on the side of the
law before going into the business
too heavily.

In case they do not, there are
the police with positive instruc-
tions as to what to do, and that
they will bring many an offender
into court can not be questioned.

Admittedly, Greenville is not the
largest city in this part of the
country by any means, but it is
generally conceded as one of the
best business towns in the state.

Traveling salesmen coming here
from time to time during the year
will vouch for the assertion. They
find conditions here as good as any
other part of the country, and in
many instances, much better.

Not so long ago salesmen also
vouched for the fact that they
found payment of accounts in this
city much better than surrounding
communities. Whether this condi-
tion has changed to any great ex-
tent during the period of depression
cannot be said, but it is an assured
fact that they will be on a par
with other communities.

Greenville people should be
proud of this distinction. It should
inspire them to strive to hold the
honor, and to accomplish even a
better reputation in the years to
come.
