DR. HAYES IS PLEASED WITH ORANGE JAIL

Modern Conveniences Contribute to Happiness of Hillsboro Physician

Hillsboro, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Orange county's star prisoner is well pleased with jail conditions here.

Dr. R. B. Hayes, 54-year-old physician who started a 10-day sentence yesterday for contempt of the State Industrial Commission, said today he found the bed in his three-room suite as comfortable as his own home.

Steam heat, running water, use of a telephone and attentive officials all contribute to his happiness in prison.

The one thing the physician misses is his regular bird hunts.

"When you stop to think about it, however," he said, "that's not so very bad because I've been missing the birds altogether this season."

Telegrams, letters and gifts have flooded the two-story prison brick building where the doctor is living behind the bars.

The manager of the local bottling company sent him a case of soft drinks and when the ice plant heard it sent a large cake of ice to keep them cold.

The town's drugstore, where Dr. Hayes' prescriptions are filled, sent word a box of candy was on the way and Mrs. Lizzie H. Garrard, local poetess, is only one of many who have promised daily flowers.

"Sheriff Sloan wasn't here when I came to jail," Dr. Hayes said, "but as soon as he returned to town he came right over to see if I were comfortable. Mr. Frank Cole, the jailer and Mrs. Cole are as nice to me as they can be and everyone is helping me enjoy my stay here."

Physicians over the state, in telegrams to Dr. Hayes, have commended him for going to jail for a "principle" and have lauded him as a martyr to his profession.

Arkansas Resents Mencken's Satire

Little Rock, Ark., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Arkansas resents the satirical shafts of Henry L. Mencken, editor of the American Mercury, but admits he has a way with words.

Mencken was condemned in a resolution adopted by the House of Representatives today for a recent article on Arkansas in the Baltimore Sun.

The same resolution, however, paid tribute to his literary ability.

The article in question entitled "Famine," appeared in the Sun on January 19. In it, Mencken said, among other things, that the Red Cross might feed Arkansians this year but they would be no better off next year.

The resolution asserted Mencken "has tried for years to make Arkansas the butt of coarse ribaldry and diatribes."

It requested the Sun to give equal prominence to a reply to Mencken by Dallas T. Herndon, Arkansas state historian.

One member wanted to add an amendment to the resolution, calling Mencken "an unmitigated liar," but was held out of order.

Former Governor Charles H. Brough was invited to speak during the discussion and he criticized Mencken but also called him "the most brilliant satirical writer in America."

Dr. Hardy Johnson Dies at Reidsville

Friends here and throughout the county will regret to learn of the passing of Dr. Hardy Johnson, of Reidsville, on Thursday. The funeral was held there this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Dr. Johnson is a native of this county, having made his home in Grifton for a number of years. He has been a resident of Reidsville for the past 20 years. He was a sister of Mrs. C. D. Reountree of this city.

Forest Fires Under Control

Asheville, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The forest fire situation, which had become critical in western North Carolina this week, today was reported to be under control.

As a result of dry weather and high winds, virtually every county in the western section of the state has suffered heavy damage from forest fires. Those suffering most were Macon, Swain, Jackson, Clay, Polk, and McDowell counties. There were fires, also, in Haywood, Henderson, and Buncombe counties, however, and some of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park area also was hit by the flames.

W. M. PEEL VICTIM OF AUTOMOBILE

Bruce Merchant Fatally Injured When Hit By Car At Bruce Last Night

W. M. Peel, 67, was fatally injured when he, by an automobile driven by O. G. Forlines at Bruce last night about 8 o'clock. Forlines was ordered held for grand jury action at the next term of Pitt County Superior court under bond of \$1,500 following an investigation this morning by Coroner E. S. Williams.

Peel was rushed to the Pitt Community hospital in this city but succumbed to his injuries about 10 o'clock. He suffered a broken arm, leg and had several ribs crushed.

The accident occurred as Peel, accompanied by Bennie Little, walked along the road. Details of the tragedy were not brought out during the investigation this morning.

The body of Mr. Peel will be taken to the home of J. H. Moore at Bruce late this afternoon where it will remain until Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock when the final rites will be held. Burial will be made in the Falkland cemetery.

He is survived by a brother, E. L. Peel, of Pikeville. Mr. Peel had operated a store at Bruce for the last twenty years and was well-known throughout the community.

Asheville Bankers To Get Hearings On Next Wednesday

Asheville, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Four officials of closed Asheville banks were under heavy bonds today for appearance Wednesday at a preliminary hearing before U. S. Commissioner Vannoy L. Guder on charges of violating or conspiracy to violate the national banking laws.

J. Charles Bradford, cashier of the defunct Central Bank and Trust Company, surrendered yesterday to a U. S. Deputy Marshal at the offices of Commissioner Guder. He arranged a \$10,000 bond.

The other three, arrested Wednesday, are under bonds as follows: Wallace B. Davis, president of the Central Bank and Trust Company—\$15,000.

L. L. Jenkins, president of the American National Bank—\$15,000.

Russell L. C. Davis, active vice-president of the Central Bank and Trust Company—\$10,000.

The charges against the men grew out of allegedly illegal transfer of American National bank funds to the Central Bank and Trust Company before the institutions closed last November.

Jenkins also is charged with abstracting funds of his bank for "his own use and benefit."

Kannapolis Man Killed By Car

Lendis, N. C., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Ernest Lisk, 52, of Kannapolis, was instantly killed today when struck by an automobile driven by James Fulkers, 16, on Mooresville highway one mile from here.

Lisk, riding on a truck with D. I. Brighman, of Kannapolis, stepped to pick up a knife seen lying on the road. Fulkers' car struck him as he leaned over. The youth was on his way to high school here.

Lisk is survived by his wife and four children. An inquest into his death will be held tonight.

Senate Listless Today As House Wades Through Another Heavy Calendar

Lower Body Tables the Lawrence Bill to Prevent the Superior Court Judges From Changing Sentences After Defendants Served Appeal Notice; Senate Health Committee Approves Barber's Bill

Raleigh, Feb. 6.—(AP)—With the Senate holding a listless session, the House waded through another heavy calendar today and tabled the Lawrence bill to prevent superior court judges from changing sentences after defendants served appeal notice.

The House received a favorable majority sub-committee report on a highway bill which embodies the administration program for reorganization of the State Highway Commission and state maintenance of county roads. A minority bill was also sent up.

The Senate health committee this morning approved the barbers' bill and the finance group endorsed a measure to allow postponement of foreclosure of tax certificates. The House got a favorable committee report on the constitutional convention bill.

The House passed the Brooks bill to raise the deposits for insurance companies to do business from \$5,000 to \$25,000.

Both Houses heard Lieutenant Governor Sheppard of South Carolina in brief addresses.

The two bodies will meet at 10 o'clock tomorrow to consider local business.

The Lawrence bill had passed the Senate but when it was opposed by Representative Ervin of Burke on the grounds that judges were already interfering with too much it was tabled upon motion of Representative Johnson of Halifax.

Lieutenant Governor Sheppard of South Carolina, addressed the House. The South Carolinian spoke of the work being done in the General Assembly of his state, which is now in session, and expressed the opinion that an "exchange of legislators" (Continued on page six)

Fountain Favors Present System For Highways

Raleigh, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Lieut. Gov. R. T. Fountain favors the present system of highway maintenance by counties "insofar as practical," he says.

Addressing a meeting of county commissioners and county road officials here yesterday, Fountain said, however, he supported a higher gasoline tax with two cents of it going back to the courts for road maintenance.

The meeting was called to organize opposition to Gov. O. Max Gardner's highway program. 42 counties were represented.

Governor Gardner's program was denounced by Col. T. L. Kirkpatrick.

Drift of Population During Last Ten Years Brings About Changes in Thirty-Three States in National House of Representatives

The siren call of grinding wheels, the pot of gold at the gusher's mouth, the glamour of Kleig lights and bright sunshine inviting hard-set men with graying hair have set state legislative jigsaws awaiting this winter to cut out a new Congressional map of the United States.

Mostly it is a few of the lustier youngsters of Uncle Sam's family, grown garrulous in the last ten years on the Kap of changing times which make it necessary to alter the representation of 33 states in the National House of Representatives.

The 1930 census taker, as he went his rounds for the first time since 1920, found that things had been happening. Southern California, once a desert, had become a thickly populated part of the United States. Florida's palms had called some of the people who used to be found upon the middle plains.

Detroit, New York, and Chicago, where machinery groans and dollars ring, had won many another lad from the milking stool.

By and large the legislators don't like their job of deciding how to distribute the gains or losses in representation from their state's. In most states it's a pitched battle, and one to be delayed.

Throughout most of the wide belt of states between the two coasts re-districting is felt to mean dwindling sectional prestige.

Missouri loses three members; Georgia, Iowa, Kentucky and Pennsylvania lose two each; Alabama, Indiana, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, (Continued on page six)

BUSINESS ON THE MEND IN THIS STATE

General Improvement Expected to Be Noticeable During the Spring

Asheville, Feb. 6.—(AP)—News dispatches received today from various sections of western North Carolina gave serenity to opinion of business men that business was regaining its status of a year ago.

The improvement seemed to be general throughout this section of the state and was expected to be reflected in conditions to follow in Asheville. The outlook for spring, despite problems yet to be solved, is considerable brighter than what was anticipated two months ago.

CANNON PROBE COMES TO END AT CAPITAL

Taking of Evidence Against Bishop Ended By Church Board Late Last Night

Washington, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Taking of evidence against Bishop James Cannon, Jr., was ended before a church board of inquiry late last night, as word came from within the hearing that among the testimony was an assertion that information of which part of the charges against the prelate are based, came from Mrs. Helen McCallum, now Bishop Cannon's second wife.

Today the temperance leader of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, came to the beginning of his own defense. Its nature could not be learned.

Austin O'Malley, a reporter for the New York Journal was among the witnesses who appeared before the board of twelve elders near the close of direct testimony taking.

Bishop Cannon recently filed a \$500,000 suit for damages against William Randolph Hearst, publisher of the Journal, based on the publication of letters, alleged to have been written by the bishop, and statements concerning him, which he claimed were libelous.

Frank Morgan, a Richmond, Virginia detective was the last witness called by Dr. F. J. Prettyman, of Baltimore, Dr. I. P. Martin of Abingdon, Virginia, and Drs. Cos-At-Jing Harrell and J. T. Mastin of Richmond, the four elders of the church who filed the charges.

Morgan testified concerning documents previously presented, the evidence in which he had obtained during months of investigating the conduct of Bishop Cannon.

On leaving the hearing the detective said that he had been given "a warm time."

"I had questions fired at me from every angle," he said, "but I had the answers."

Members of the board as well as Bishop Cannon questioned the investigator, who was on the witness stand for more than an hour.

Robert Thomas a Richmond lawyer, Dr. Eustace Crawford, an associate of Bishop Cannon on the Church Board of Temperance, and Burt Ferrar, a handwriting expert, were other witnesses.

Bishop U. V. Darlington, of Huntington, West Virginia, one of the bishops observing the proceedings, left at midnight for New York to sail for Europe.

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Aldermen To Extend City Limits To Include Bama; Set Boundaries Today

Action Taken to Increase Tax Source and at Same Time Aid in Relief of the Unemployment Situation in This City; Other Matters Considered

The city is going to take over the criminal-infested district known as the "Bama," and attempt to convert it into a law-abiding, respectable community, the Board of Aldermen decided at their regular monthly meeting at the city hall last night.

The Legislature will be petitioned to permit the incorporation of the district, and the boundary lines will be definitely fixed at a special session of the aldermen this afternoon. All members of the board will visit the "Bama" and assist in laying off the boundary.

The taking over of this district, in the opinion of members of the board, is akin to killing two birds with a single stone. In other words, it is planned to open up a greater source of taxation for the city and at the same time aid in relief of the unemployment situation. The relief of the unemployed will come through certain improvements which the city will make in the "Bama" when plans for incorporation have been completely worked out.

The decision to take over the district came in a roundabout way but almost with breath-taking suddenness. Mayor Lanier was in the midst of a plea that the city begin some kind of an improvement program to furnish work for fifty or more men without jobs, when Alderman Boyd proposed the incorporation of the "Bama" as a means of opening up new sources of taxation and at the same time furnishing a means for solution of the unemployment situation.

He said there was a considerable amount of property in the "Bama" district which should be paying taxes, and told the aldermen that they could spend \$2,000 in improvements which would bring good returns to the city in the future.

Mr. Williams, property holder in the "Bama," asked the aldermen to lose no time in carrying out the plan, as the section was in need of the protection which the city could give it if incorporated. He said improvements to the main streets of the area and adequate lights was all that they would ask. He also called attention to the fact that the community was something of a rendezvous for criminals and said he had heard numbers of the men talking about crimes in other communities in which they were probably implicated.

The members of the board were unable to decide upon boundaries last night but believed they would be able to do so at the special session this afternoon at which time several other matters will be given consideration.

The board also declared war on persons who have been mutilating trees in different parts of the city. The street superintendent was instructed to keep his eyes open for tree wreckers, the mayor was asked to confer with the telephone company and request that they cooperate in preserving the tree life of the city.

LAWYER GIVES TESTIMONY AT POWER PROBE

C. A. Beasley Tells of Publicity Efforts in Muscle Shoals Case Today

Washington, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Publicity efforts of power companies in connection with their bid for Muscle Shoals were dealt with today at a Federal Trade commission hearing by exhibits introduced in the record and the testimony of C. A. Beasley, power company attorney.

In response to a question by Commission Counsel Healy, Beasley said there was a meeting in Washington shortly after the Alabama Power Company and associated power companies made their bid for Muscle Shoals to discuss details of the proposals. Representatives of a number of public utility information bureaus were present including Guy P. Newbern, director of the Tennessee Public Service Information Bureau.

"Isn't it true," Healy asked, "that at this meeting in Washington you made plans for an extensive educational campaign to induce the public to favor the bid of the power companies?"

Beasley replied he gave the directors of the information bureaus details of proposals and that they could act as they saw fit after they returned home.

"Didn't you say you wanted the story to break in the Memphis Commercial Appeal, because of its extensive circulation?" Healy asked.

"Yes," Beasley replied.

Healy asked Beasley, a former attorney for the Alabama Power Company, if he went to Nashville in September, 1926, and spent two days there in conference with Newbern and newspaper representatives. Beasley replied he visited Nashville in September, 1926.

"Is it true," Healy asked, "that you talked with a newspaper representative and convinced him that the bid of the power company for Muscle Shoals was better than that of the American Cynamid Company?"

Beasley replied, "and attempted to convince him that the power companies' bid was better than that of the Cynamid company but I don't know whether I convinced him or not."

The Stahlman family in Nashville at that time published the Nashville Banner.

YOUNG MAXON ADJUDGED NOT GUILTY IN N. Y.

Son of Bishop Acquitted of Manslaughter Charge Last Night At Metropolis

New York, Feb. 6.—(AP)—James Maxon, Jr., son of the bishop coadjutor of the Episcopal Diocese of Tennessee, was freed today of a charge that he killed a 73-year-old fellow rooming house lodger during a drunken brawl.

The prosecution sought to show in General Sessions Court that the 22-year-old boy hit David Paynter over the head with a chair last Good Friday morning, causing the aged man's death. A jury of 12 middle-aged men brought in a verdict of acquittal last night.

A cheer broke over the courtroom as the foreman of the jury reported "not guilty." Maxon clasped his father, Bishop James Matthew Maxon, about the shoulders and kissed him. He shook hands with each of the jurors and with Assistant District Attorney William B. Moore who wished him good luck.

Then he dashed to a telephone booth where he told the news to his mother in Chattanooga. Later he said he planned to go home with his father in a day or two and possibly continue newspaper work, a career for which he was studying at Columbia University at the time of Paynter's death.

New York (AP)—Sixteen bars of dynamic brass, vibrant percussion and singing strings—and the curtain goes up on the newest of American grand operas. Deems Taylor's three-act "Peter Ibbetson."

"Why should there be an overture?" inquired the 45-year-old composer, known not only for the music he writes but also for the things he has said about music other people write.

"An overture would merely slow down the piece. There are nearly three hours of music as it is, and all of it is employed to carry the action of the play rapidly along."

Taylor's modesty is apparent not only in the treatment of his music, but in his approach to the question of opera.

"In other days," he said, "there were no radios, no phonographs, no symphony concerts, no song recitals, no movies. Those who sought entertainment in music found it in opera. Opera therefore had to provide symphony, recital and spectacle."

"Now it is not necessary. Those who wish to hear the best voices may do so by attending recitals. Those who wish spectacle may find it in the cinema. Those who favor symphonic music may hear it in the concert hall and on the radio."

"The changing situation has created a changed field for opera. It has made more and more necessary the application of opera of sound 'theater.' There must be an interesting, compelling story, and above all the music must be a constant asset instead of a retarding element, as so often is the case in grand opera."

"Peter Ibbetson" was written by Taylor on commission from the Metropolitan opera house following the success in 1927 of his first opera, "The King of Menhaden."

The leads in his new opera are taken by Lawrence Tibbett, Edward Johnson and Lucienne Bori.

Washington (AP)—The oil world is boiling in its own barrels. And the trouble is too much oil. Where the supply originates provides the controversial facet of a long simmering problem of importance to about 25,000,000 persons. Cheap foreign oil is responsible for the ill of the petroleum producers, the independent operators cry. Stop that flow, they say, and the industry will get back on its feet quickly. That's why they want tariff.

Colonial Areas To Be Saved As National Shrine

Washington (AP)—Historic center of Virginia, bearing the battle scars of the birth of a nation, will be preserved by the government. Rich in the lore of colonial and revolutionary valor, three of Virginia's shrines have been proclaimed a national monument by President Hoover to guard their worth.

The Colonial National Monument, a the area is to be known. It will be the few miles between Jamestown Island, the first settlement, and the Yorktown battlefield, where Cornwallis surrendered. Williamsburg, the old capital of colonial Virginia where John D. Rockefeller has spent hundreds of thousands in restoring the pre-revolutionary buildings, is the center of the memorial.

A wide smooth highway will link the Island with Williamsburg, and Williamsburg with Yorktown. Across the York river from Yorktown is Gloucester Point, made part of the monument.

The southern half of Jamestown Island is the beginning of the monument. The heart of Williamsburg, in which are grouped the old buildings, and the eastern half of Yorktown, with the surrounding battlefield area, form the rest.

Director Horace M. Albright of the National Park service, in charge of the project, says he expects to expedite all work through cooperation with Virginia state groups. Virginia plans to signalize the memorial proclamation in its Yorktown sesquicentennial celebration next October. The park service is joining in plans for this event.

Cost estimator for the project vary. Upward of \$500,000 is expected to be spent by the government, while Virginians may spend an equal if not larger amount before the monument passes directly under control of the government.

COLOMBIA TAXES BOOST PRICES OF GAS AND BEER

Bogota, Colombia (AP)—The prices of beer and gasoline have jumped skyward under the new emergency revenues law approved by President Olaya. The law is to operate for five years.

A beer drinker now pays eight cents tax every time he has another quart. Sixty per cent of this income goes to his home department or state, while 40 per cent goes to the federal government. The government expects to get \$1,252,000 from beer this year, but after 1931 all the beer tax will go to the department.

And in Bogota, capital of an oil-producing nation, motorists are paying 50 cents a gallon for gas. Seven

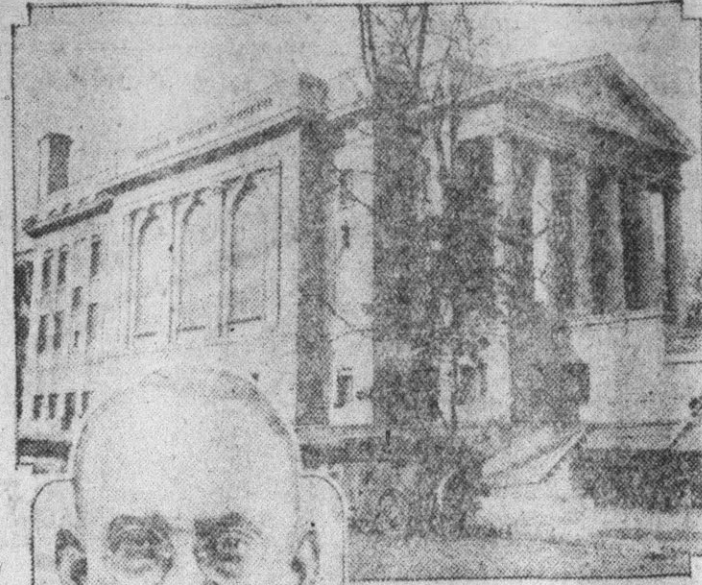

SAYS CO-EDS ARE TOO LAX IN COSTUMES

Minister Draws Fire From Girls of Southwestern College in Tennessee

Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 6.—(AP)—When where and what type of pajamas should adorn the co-ed figure was the subject of a controversy today between the Rev. R. Girard Lowe, young Presbyterian minister, and the girls of Southwestern Denominational College here.

The minister told the trustees on Tuesday that witnesses could be produced to prove co-eds had danced publicly in pajamas, "shorts that came just below the hips" and veils.

The co-eds defended themselves in detail, asserting the garments in question were beach pajamas and that no boys were present at their display.

Mr. Lowe said he wanted it understood he had said "some of them wore veils over the shorts."

Mrs. M. H. Townsend, dean of women, collected 126 written denials, issued a statement reprimanding the pastor and called the girls to meet today to draft a preliminary demand that he apologize publicly.

The statement said: "I do not know and not a single girl can inform me as to what is meant by the phrase, 'wore veils.' We gather that the phrase means something disparaging."

Pajamas: "That report probably arose from the fact that one of the sororities gave a beach party, at which only girls were present and that on that occasion they wore the special kind of pajamas worn publicly by American women at seaside resorts and not, as was suggested, sleeping pajamas."

Shorts: "He speaks of my students as wearing shorts at a 'shipwreck' party. The shipwreck party was given under the auspices of the Ovid Scott Bible Class."

In General: "Doubtless, Mr. Lowe, as a Christian and a gentleman in view of such a denial, will be glad to withdraw his statement. He will, I trust, feel sincere pleasure in the fact that he has been misinformed as to the social depravity of Southwestern."

Mr. Lowe: "I have nothing to say. Will I apologize? That all depends. They haven't asked me to prove my charges. All I've seen has been in the papers."

ABOUT TOWN

In an effort to improve their condition the farmers of this great agricultural region should not forget the importance of giving proper consideration to what they are going to plant during the present year.

It is all right to follow the cash as provided enough food crops are grown to enable the farmer to let his tenants to live despite the low prices he receives for his crops.

To plant cash crops exclusively would be nothing more than plain suicide, leaving absolutely nothing to fall back upon in prices that are low as usual.

The live at home movement is receiving much attention in all parts of the country at this time, but there will be some who will try to make a killing by planting normal range in cash crops without providing for eventualities.

Such farmers will find themselves adding "hard times" as long as they live. With the world market expected beyond hope of relief any soon, it would be nothing but to expect high prices for some of the main crops.

There seems to be only one course to the progressive farmer — a man that desires to farm to live — and that is to see that his house and land are well stocked with crops for himself and family during the next harvest season.

If he has no having to fear the future because he will be able to live if the prices knock the bottom out of the market.

Conditions among the poor people of the community are worse than they have been since the Civil War," asserts B. B. Sugg, chairman of the finance committee of the Emergency Relief committee of this city.

To relieve this situation, Mr. Sugg says that the public give to the aid of their resources. The committee, he declared, is doing everything in its power to improve conditions, but its efforts will prove futile without the undivided support of that great mass of men and women able to render financial assistance.

A commissary has been established to take care of the demands of the poor. It has done much to bring relief to the last two weeks, but it is rapidly being depleted and cannot be replenished without the aid of the people able to give.

Persons who are unable to contribute cash, are urged to give clothing, food or fuel. Either will help keep the well away from the doors of the unfortunate men and women unable to obtain employment, and how suffering has been intense despite the aid which the commissary has been able to render.

Don't wait for members of the committee to call on you, but give while you think of it and contribute your part to the relief of suffering mankind.

With unemployment described as the most acute in the history of the nation, the public has been called upon to provide employment if possible. Home owners could help improve the condition by cleaning up their premises, and making improvements which they have been contemplating over a period of several months.

This is the psychological time for work of any kind. Labor is plentiful and wages low and a job may be completed at less expense and more quickly than any other period in years.

The creation of employment of any kind would do its part toward relieving the suffering because they are unable to obtain jobs. Think over the situation, Mr. Homeowner, and see if you can do something to help the laborer provide food and clothing for himself until conditions improve.

CHINESE DISCOVER IT'S EASY TO SAVE WITH \$8 MONTHLY

Shanghai (AP) — Some Chinese workers can maintain savings accounts and support a family on an income of \$8 a month.

This has been revealed in a survey conducted by the Bureau of Industrial and Commercial Information of the Chinese government.

The figures came out after inquiry had been made of 85 postmen and 100 printers, two of the best-paid occupations in the country.

Half the postmen averaged pay of less than \$12 a month; the other half made about \$14. The printers averaged around \$8 a month, and it was among some of them that the savings accounts were found.

The postmen's families averaged five members each. Yet they appeared fairly content, were living in standard Chinese houses and had enough to eat.

In contrast is the condition of thousands upon thousands of unskilled workers, ricksha runners, wharf coolies, wheelbarrow men, farm hands and a hundred other types.

They live in huts that are cold and damp in winter and roasting hot in summer. But the coolies who can jingle a few silver pieces at the end of the day are satisfied, since they need not worry about the next 24 hours, at least.

NEW AUTO TUNNEL WILL OPEN WIDER YOSEMITE VISTAS

Yosemite Park, Cal.—(AP)—Motorists soon will enter Yosemite valley through a tunnel driven through the granite heart of a mountainous cliff.

The 4,320-foot bore will be the largest vehicular tunnel in the west, forming part of a 30-mile all-weather highway linking the Yosemite valley with the Mariposa grove of giant redwoods.

Inspiration Point, where in the past motorists have caught their first glimpse of the valley's grandeur, will be replaced by a broad parapet at the tunnel's portal on Turtle Back dome, providing a panorama of Bridal Veil Falls and other scenic beauties.

The tunnel also will have a path for hikers who can tramp through the mass of granite instead of climbing over its rough top.

Construction of the bore is to be completed by 1932 at an estimated cost of more than \$625,000. Work on the highway is already under way.

INSECTS TASTE SWEETS BY ULTRA-SENSITIVE LEGS

Minneapolis—(AP)—Here is another of the "advantages" which insects have over men:

The honey-bee can taste sweets with the tips of its antennae. Moreover he can taste them with his forward pair of legs, says Dwight Elmer Minnich of the University of Minnesota in a report to the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

But the real wonder in testing sweets with his legs is the monarch butterfly, Alameda Anderson, also of Minnesota, finds that his legs are sometimes 1,600 times more sensitive than the human tongue in reorganizing sugar.

CAMPBELL SETS NEW SPEED MARK

Daytona Beach, Fla., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Captain Malcolm Campbell, who yesterday established a new world's automobile speed record of 245 miles an hour, announced today he would make no further trials in his Bluebird racing car before returning to England. He may leave for home some time next week.

Campbell said last night he was not satisfied with his newly established record and intimated he might try to raise the mark above 245 miles an hour before returning to England. Today, however, he said he had abandoned such plans. He still plans to drive his midge, four-cylinder racing car possibly today or tomorrow, with hopes of setting a new speed record for automobiles with displacement of less than 45 cubic inches.

He made two trials in the tiny machine yesterday but fell six miles and hour short of the present record of 87 miles per hour.

Whether or not Campbell will take the small car upon the beach today depends upon conditions of the course at low tide which occurs at 4:30 p. m.

Daytona Beach, Fla., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Captain Malcolm Campbell has become the first man ever to travel at the rate of four miles a minute in an automobile, but he is not satisfied.

Coolly determined, despite warnings that conditions were not the best for super speed, Campbell drove his Bluebird II machine over the beach sands here yesterday to a astounding new world's record of 245.733 miles per hour.

From this dizzying height of speed, the dauntless 46-year-old Englishman surveyed his achievement and wanted to better it. Scarcely had the roar of the motors died away in his ears he looked for new worlds to conquer.

If the weather and beach conditions permit he said he was ready to go out and try to lower his own mark before he returns to England. His plans for today were indefinite but if he felt good and the other factors were favorable he said he might try for a five kilometer record.

Campbell is the only man now living who has attained a speed on land of more than 200 miles per hour. The rest, Ray Keesh, Sir H. O. D. Segrave, Lee Bible, and Frank Lockhart, have met death behind the wheel. Segrave while trying for a water speed mark in England.

It was Segrave's record of 231 miles per hour that Campbell wrested yesterday; Segrave had claimed it from Keesh. Bible and Lockhart died on Daytona sands while Keesh lost his life racing at Altona.

TWO CAROLINA TEAMS BEAT VIRGINIANS

Charlotte, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The North Carolina Tar Heels and the Duke Blue Devils today had proven their strength against two outstanding basketball teams of the Old Dominion.

The Chapel Hill five bewildered the V. P. I. Gobblers with a dazzling scoring exhibition and rang up a 39 to 24 victory last night at Blacksburg. This evening the count in games between the teams this season, the Gobbler five having licked the Tar Heels, 31 to 23, in an earlier match.

Duke's quint triumphed, 43 to 31, over the Virginia Cavaliers at Charlottesville, breaking the winning streak of the Virginia crew.

Wake Forest, however, did not fare so well against northern foes, losing by the lop-sided score of 50 to 25 to Temple in Philadelphia.

Without a victory so far on their northern foray, the Deacons will try their luck tonight against Rider at Trenton, N. J. The Tar Heels will tackle V. M. I. at Lexington.

Lady Luck seems to have turned her face against the scrappy teams of Davidson. Wildcat wrestlers crumpled before Washington and Lee grapplers at Lexington last night, and when the contest was over the General were the winners by a 31 to 3 score.

On top of this, the Presbyterian cagers were toppled, 29 to 20, under an attack by the Charlotte Y team at Davidson. This reverse was the second the Davidson five has suffered this season.

So was Ruth, for he jumped up hastily to blow out the match I started to use to light the third cigar in the room.

"The next pitch was a ball without argument. The four, says Ruth, was smack down the middle again."

"Ball four," yelled Owens, where upon Ruth rushed in from the box, took a swing at Owens and promptly was ejected from the game after a few wild moments. He was fined and suspended ten days.

Buying increased at these prices, however, and the market was fairly steady at the end of the first half hour with prices showing rallies of 3 or 4 points from the lowest. The early selling was accompanied by reports of rather freer spot offerings in central and western belt sections, and there was also talk of an easier technical position following recent advances.

Liverpool cables reported hedging, local and Bombay liquidation and said there was a poor demand for cotton cloths from both India and China.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Bears were quickly discouraged with the stock market's lack of responsiveness, and share prices recovered today as they bought back the stock sold short.

Professional bullish activity was resumed in some of the specialties, and advances of a point or two were numerous. The bond market made further upward progress, but the fact that new offerings this week were only \$21,325,000, or about one-tenth the volume of the previous week, reflected the paralyzing influence of the recent unsettledness created by the soldier bonus controversy.

Such stocks as U. S. Steel, and American Telephone, Westinghouse, Liggett and Myers, B. American Tobacco, B. Borden, Diamond Match International Match, Coca Cola, Montgomery Ward, American Machine and Foundry, and Eastman advanced 1 to 2 points. Auburn shot up 8 points, and Worthington gained 3 American Smelting eased a point.

The list appeared to be governed largely by internal conditions. The further reduction in brokers' loans, while amounting to only \$18,000,000, was regarded as a good omen, indicating no letup in the strengthening of fundamental conditions of the market. This makes the 18th decline in 19 weeks in which period the sum of \$1,506,000, has been lopped off the total, leaving only \$1,716,000,000 in this category of loans. In view of the huge increase in the volume of listed securities since 1924, the current level of loans indicates ambition of deflation much more thorough than then existed.

Reports that one of the larger French banks was planning participation in a loan to Germany was regarded in Wall Street as highly constructive, for France has for some time been planning the development of an international capital market in Paris, as a means of utilizing her excessive store of gold and alleviating the ill effect of this concentration of monetary

He championed the proposal of General Assemblies appointing delegations to visit legislatures of other states and observe their work.

The barbers' bill would place all barber shops in towns with more than 500 population under supervision of the barbers' licensing board. At present it applies only to towns with over 2,000 population.

As originally introduced the measure would place sanitary inspectional duties on the board of barbers' examiners instead of as present on the State Board of Health but in the House the bill was amended to restore health board supervision with inspection by barbers' board examiners who must report violations to city or county health officers for prosecution.

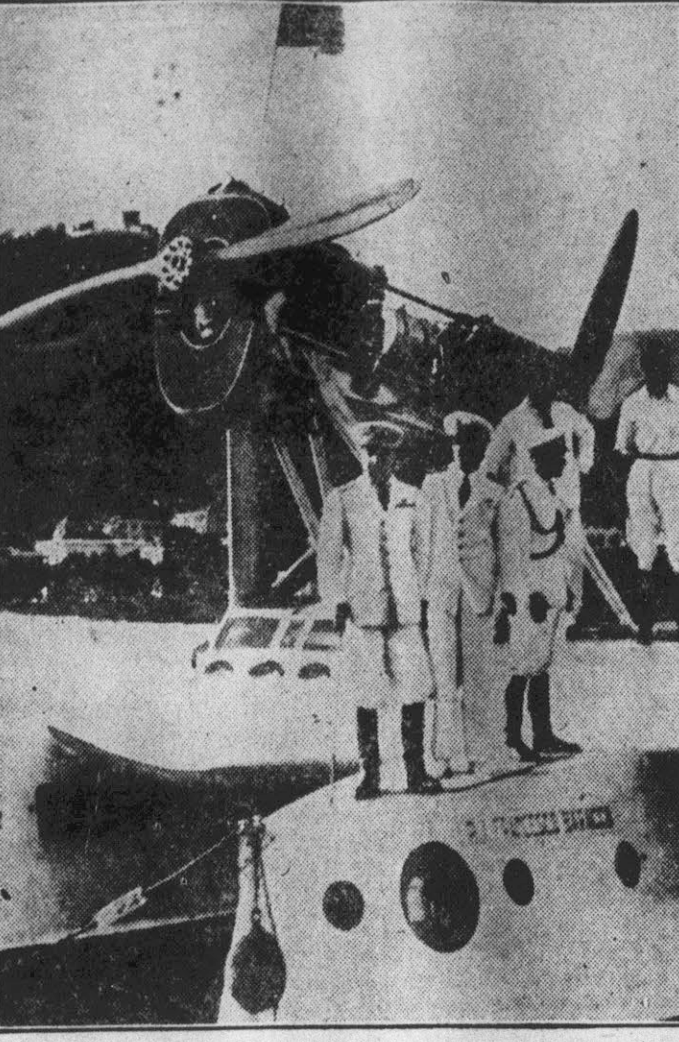
Regardless of the size of the community, every barber shop in Bladen, Catawba and Robeson counties would come under the act.

Senator Gravely of Nash, taking notice of charges made in the House earlier this week by his colleague, Representative Woodward, that the barbers charged that the State Board of Health had failed to enforce the provisions of the 1929 law, said he thought the matter should be investigated.

A delegation of ten barbers opposed the part of the bill giving inspectional supervision to the barbers' examining board instead of to the State Board of Health, as it is now.

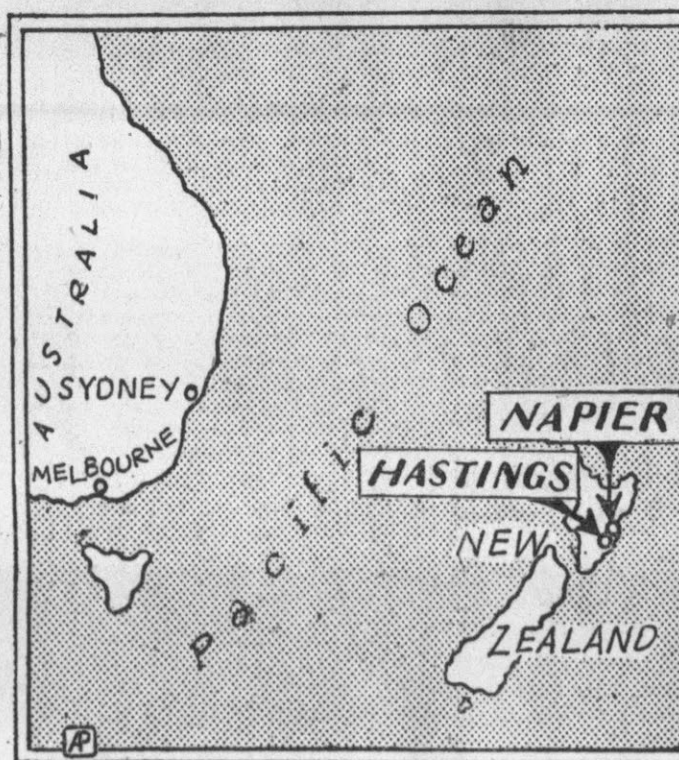

TWELVE JAP SOLONS HURT DURING FIGHT

Two Members of Diet Injured In Melee in House of Representatives

By JAMES P. HOWE
Tokyo, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The flash of a dagger in an ante-room of the Japanese House of Representatives today precipitated a fight in which about a dozen persons, two of them members of the Diet, were injured. Pent-up political feelings between the opposition and the government were unleashed in the ensuing melee. Police said several persons received cuts on their heads and hands. Still others were cut and bruised by crashing glass and flying chairs.

A meeting of the budget committee, at which the trouble started, broke up in disorder. For two days opposition tactics had blocked budget discussions and on several occasions there had been near riots.

The man who flourished the dagger was a member of the Seiyukai (opposition) party but not a member of the Diet. Police detained him. About fifty persons participated in the melee.

Baron Shidehara, foreign minister and acting head of the government, was in another part of the House when the fight started. He left the building immediately under heavy guard.

For two days the opposition's tactics had blocked budget discussions.

Opponents of the administration had charged Shidehara with an "indiscreet" utterance during interpellations regarding Japan's security as the outcome of the London naval treaty.

Shidehara had replied to the interpellations by saying the treaty had been ratified by the Emperor and that this was proof it did not endanger national security.

Feeling against the government began to crystallize last June when Admiral Kanji Kato, chief of staff of the navy, resigned as a protest against acceptance of the London treaty.

The administration sustained another shock last November when Premier Hamaguchi was shot and critically wounded by a young man described by the police as fanatically apologetic. The premier's assailant, Tono Sagoya, was a member of a "Love of Country" association and his act also was ascribed to resentment over Japan's acceptance of the naval treaty.

OIL COMPANY HONORS BOYS

Two Young Men Are Awarded for Heroic Conduct During Oil Tank Fire

On the afternoon of September 18, 1930, lightning struck one of the Standard Oil Company's gasoline tanks during an electrical storm, and ignited the vapors, the flames rapidly mounted in height, and would not doubt have proven very disastrous had it not been for two local boys, Dewey Jacobs and Fred Willis. They were up town when they heard about it. They at once picked up two fire extinguishers from the Standard Oil Company service station, commandeered an automobile and rushed to the scene, quickly mounted a high barbed wire fence, climbed to the top of a twenty-six foot tank containing blazing gasoline, and tremendously hot, and after a hard battle extinguished the flames, at the risk of their lives. Doing this without a thought of safety, but with the thought of saving property and lives which no doubt would have been inevitable. For the actions of these heroes, the Standard Oil Company last night remembered them for their heroic conduct. Through the courtesy of Prof. S. L. Homewood of the Farm Life School in Vanceboro, and his special invitation for the presentation ceremony to take place at his monthly meeting of the P. T. A. a large crowd assembled, approximately two hundred, to witness the attention given their local heroes.

Carl Goerch, of the Washington Progress, gave a very interesting and humorous account of the incident and highly praised the action of the two boys. He was followed by Dr. M. O. Fletcher of the Washington Collegiate Institute, who gave the serious side of the boys' actions, and paid tribute to them commendably.

Mr. H. V. Daniel, branch manager of the Standard Oil Company, Norfolk, Va., splendidly lauded the boys' heroic efforts in accomplishing what they did for his company and paid tribute to the town for possessing such brave manhood in time of need. He presented to them two fine Hamilton 21-jewel watches with their names inscribed inside and the time of the incident as well as their monogram on the back.

Los Angeles Off On Last Lap of the Canal Zone Trip

U. S. Dirigible Los Angeles, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The naval dirigible Los Angeles took off from its mooring at Guantanamo naval base at 8:20 a. m. today on the final lap of the flight from Lakehurst to the Canal Zone.

The huge airship, which will take part in a sham battle for the Pacific side of the Canal, arrived here yesterday after a 24-hour flight from its home base at Lakehurst. Twelve flying boats maneuvered below the dirigible as she left Guantanamo bay.

As the Los Angeles headed south only four engines were running at half speed for a fuel economy test. Nevertheless the airship was making 66 knots with a strong favorable northeast wind aiding its progress toward Morant Point, Jamaica.

Naval officers aboard the dirigible expected to sight Panama at sunset.

During its stop at the Guantanamo naval base the Los Angeles was refueled and fresh food supplies, including oranges and other fruits, were taken aboard.
