Brown Refuses To Give Post Office Lease Probe Facts On Hoover Report

Postmaster General Termed "Impertinent and Arrogant" By Senator Blaine When He Declines to Furnish Senate Committee With Information On His Report to President Hoover Last Summer

Washington, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Postmaster General Brown refused today to furnish the Senate post office lease investigating committee information which formed the basis of a report by him to President Hoover last summer.

He was being questioned in connection with the department's leasing policies.

Chairman Blaine said he wanted to question Brown on his "attitude on the production of certain records" in the department. The report last summer recommended purchase of a number of postal quarters now leased.

The postmaster general said he wanted to aid the committee's inquiry in any way he could but to furnish the department's records would be "incompatible with public interest."

The information in question was gathered by postoffice inspectors. The session early developed verbal clashes between Chairman Blaine and Brown.

Blaine called Brown "impertinent and arrogant" and the postmaster general said this was no occasion for the committee chairman to lecture him.

The committee has \$10,000 to make an appraisal of 50 of the buildings leased by the government. Blaine said it could save a great deal of time and money if the department would make available the information it had collected in connection with the report, and asked its submission.

"We regard it as incompatible with the public interest," said Brown.

"Is incompatibility your only reason?" asked the chairman.

"Yes."

"Why would it be incompatible?" Brown explained many of the leases would soon expire and it would be necessary to purchase the buildings or renew the leases.

"It would embarrass our negotiations," he said. "If we disclose what we believe the property was worth we would not be in as good position as if we did not disclose it."

Blaine then sent throughout the various kinds of information collected by the inspectors, asking Brown in each case if that information was confidential. The postmaster general declined to submit, in each case.

The Senator contended the answers were not responsive to the questions.

"I'll give you my answers," Brown said. "Ask me any questions you want, but I'll make the answers."

"I don't know whether you will or not," Chairman Blaine replied. "There is no need for you to make a defense."

HOUSE TO VOTE ON LAME DUCK

Resolution to Eliminate Special Sessions of Congress Will Be Considered

Washington, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The House rules committee today decided to allow the House to vote at this session on the Gifford resolution to eliminate the lame duck sessions of Congress.

Several times the Senate has approved the Norris resolution to change the meeting time of Congress, eliminating short sessions such as the one in which Congress was now engaged. The House has never voted on the proposal, however, which is sponsored there by Representative Gifford, Republican of Massachusetts.

The Gifford resolution would provide for an amendment to the constitution to permit a newly elected Congress to take office within two months after the November elections. It also would permit a newly elected President and Vice-President to take office on January 24.

Receive Bids On \$1,600,000 Road Building Program

Raleigh, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The Federal government's unemployment relief program had been bid today with the receiving by the State Highway Commission of bids on road and bridge projects totalling approximately \$1,600,000.

The bids, embracing 13 projects for the construction of 94.03 miles of highway and a bridge over the Cape Fear River at Lillington, were opened yesterday at the office of the commissioner.

The letting, one of the largest in recent years, was made possible, highway officials explained, through the allotment of North Carolina of approximately \$2,000,000 for National emergency unemployment relief funds.

The money is being used in the place of state funds to match regular annual Federal aid allotments, road authorities said.

FOUNTAIN TO HELP DEFEAT ROAD ISSUE

Kirkpatrick Says Lieut.-Gov. Will Try to Defeat Governor's Plan in Senate

Charlotte, Feb. 11.—(AP)—T. L. Kirkpatrick, president of the U. S. Good Roads Association and leader of the fight against Gov. Gardner's highway program, said today he had been assured by Lieutenant Governor R. K. Fountain that "everything proper will be done in the Senate" to defeat the governor's highway commission reorganization proposal.

Colonel Kirkpatrick said he was assured of this in a telephone conversation with the lieutenant-governor.

"Lieutenant Governor Fountain authorized me to inform the people of Mecklenburg county that he is opposing the governor's road measure and will stand by the fight to the finish and defeat the measure if possible," Colonel Kirkpatrick continued.

Shown a news dispatch from Charlotte quoting Col. T. L. Kirkpatrick, and opponent of the administration road program of Gov. O. Max Gardner as saying Lieut. Gov. R. K. Fountain had told him "everything proper will be done in the Senate" to defeat the governor's program, the Lieutenant Governor dictated the following statement to the Associated Press.

Lieutenant Governor Fountain was asked relative to certain statements attributed to Col. T. L. Kirkpatrick.

"He stated that he did not hear Colonel Kirkpatrick's speech over the radio and was not advised as to any statements he had made."

"That, as to radio program, his personal views were that the man who rides should pay. That the gasoline tax should be increased and the two cents should go back to the counties to be used as a tax reduction fund for meeting interest on bonds and to keep-up the highways."

WOULD DROP DEEVER CASE

House Committee Recommends Dropping the Charges Against Ga. Judge

Washington, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The House judiciary committee voted today to recommend to the House that the charges against Federal Judge Boscom S. Deever of the Middle District of Georgia, be dropped.

The full committee approved a report by a special sub-committee which found the federal district judge not guilty of "high crimes or misdemeanors" necessitating impeachment proceedings by the House.

The sub-committee agreed unanimously in its report, which said the investigation was instituted on the charges of William LaVarre, newspaper publisher, asserting that Judge Deever showed prejudice in a suit against LaVarre by Harold Hall, his former partner.

THREE HUNDRED MINERS EUTOBED IN CHINA

Peking, China, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Chinese reports from Manchuria here today said that 3,000 miners were entombed Sunday night in the Fushun mines by an underground explosion. A considerable loss of life was feared.

Rescue work was started immediately but only a few persons could be taken from the shaft. Relatives of the entombed men gathered at the pit head, in their grief making a pitiful scene.

EDISON SAYS BUSINESS NOW ON THE MEND

Electrical Wizard Makes Statement During Birthday Celebration

Port Myers, Fla., Feb. 11.—(AP)—Thomas A. Edison said in his 84th birthday interview today that he believed business conditions had begun a three year return to normal.

The aged inventor said also that the employment situation was "several sizes too big for him."

The questions were two of 29 submitted to Mr. Edison, twenty-eight of which he answered.

"How long do you think it will take the country to regain the level of economic and business activity that prevailed before the depression?" he was asked.

Mr. Edison studied the question for a minute, and then wrote: "Three years gradual rise is now started."

The interview occurred before he joined the state and city celebration of his birthday to dedicate the new \$500,000 Edison bridge across the Calochehatchee river.

His answers to the questions submitted him were as follows:

Q. Are we living at too fast a pace?
A. No.

Q. Do we crave too many luxuries?
A. No.

Q. "Whom do you regard as the five outstanding men in the world today?"
A. No.

Q. What achievement in your great career gave you the biggest thrill and most satisfaction?
A. Phonograph.

Q. What is the chief ingredient for the success of a man's career?
A. Ambition and the will to work.

Q. Do you think prohibition is succeeding or failing?
A. Succeeding.

Q. Do you regard Mr. Hoover's administration to date as a failure or success and why?
A. A success.

Measure Presented in Senate Today Would Tax All Electrical Energy in State At Rate of Two Mills Per Kilowatt and the Money Would Be Used for School Purposes; Convention Bill Debated

Raleigh, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The lower House of the General Assembly today the spotlight of attention today as the Jeffress-Young constitutional convention bill was debated and a bill by Representative Ewing of Cumberland to raise \$6,000,000 by a tax on electrical power was introduced.

In the Senate the public calendar was today with the result that the Burrus bill to require labelling of poisonous alcohol was passed, the Blount measure to allow a party in a trial to impeach his own witness was approved on second reading, and the Hamilton measure to repeal the "book-debt" statute was killed.

Committee held busy sessions this morning. The Powell bill relating to employment of married women was discussed but action was deferred until later. The roads committee heard John Spunt Hill, highway commissioner, oppose state control of county convict camps and the sub-committee on tax bills agreed on a tentative bill to replace the present statute.

The House adopted a resolution in memory of Representative J. H. Dillard of Cherokee county, who died last night.

The Ewing bill would tax all electric energy two mills per kilowatt hour and the money would be used for school purposes.

A fourth road bill was sent in when Representative Crutcher offered a measure including all of the provisions of the roads sub-committee minority bill with the addition of a provision repealing gasoline tax refunds. Representative McRae of Mecklenburg introduced a bill to allow an alternate juror.

The fight for the constitutional convention bill progressed tranquilly in the House until Representative F. A. Pitt sent up an amendment to make the basis for the election of representatives in 1931 instead of the 1931 House apportionment.

Representatives of the Piedmont counties bitterly denounced the amendment as "unfair" to the most populous sections of the state and after bitter debate for more than an hour the House adjourned to meet again at 8 o'clock tonight to continue debate.

The Senate debated the Gattis bill to allow the Supreme Court to set up rules of court procedure but adjourned until noon tomorrow without taking a vote.

The House this morning received a bill embodying the Brummitt plan to tax foreign corporations on the basis of the market value of their capital stock.

BANK OFFICERS GO ON TRIAL

Three Asheville Bankers Face the Charges of Conspiracy Today

Asheville, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Indebtedness of Wallace B. Davis and L. L. Jenkins to the American National Bank, amounting to many thousands of dollars, was brought out in the hearing of four bankers on conspiracy charges before United States Commissioner Connor L. Gaudier here this morning.

The hearing started at 10 o'clock of the first witness, J. B. Cunningham, liquidating agent for American National Bank.

The courtroom was packed. Scores of spectators stood around the walls. Thomas J. Harkins, U. S. District Attorney, represented the government in examination of the only witness heard during the morning.

The defendants are: Wallace B. Davis, president of Central Bank & Trust Company; Russell C. Davis, active vice-president of the Central Bank & Trust Company; L. L. Jenkins, president of the American National Bank; and J. Charles Bradford, cashier of the Central Bank & Trust Company.

Mr. Bradford, who attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat at his home here Monday morning, was not present. He is in a local hospital.

W. B. Davis was represented by A. Hall Johnston and R. R. Williams. Attorneys for the others were as follows: L. L. Jenkins, J. E. Swain; for Russell C. Davis, John B. Anderson; for J. Charles Bradford, G. L. Lye Jones.

The amount of indebtedness of W. B. Davis and Mr. Jenkins to the American National Bank, including that of firms in which they held stock, was revealed as follows when Mr. Cunningham took the stand:

W. B. Davis—Blue Ridge Company, \$25,000; Continental Mortgage Company, \$17,000; W. B. Davis personally, \$21,000; Federal Mortgage Company, \$15,000; Southern Land & Lumber Company, \$21,000; Universal Mortgage Company, \$25,000.

L. L. Jenkins—personally, \$25,000; Haywood Realty Company, \$25,000; Ludden & Bates Music Company, \$15,000.

Passages from the federal bank report of October 8 revealed that the examiners had ordered these amounts collected.

The hearing proceeded slowly as Mr. Cunningham was asked to identify checks, books, telegrams, letters, and copies of letters taken from the records of the American National Bank. Each of these was gone over carefully as the liquidating agent was examined by Mr. Harkins.

The four defendants face charges of conspiracy and violation of the national banking laws by misapplying funds of the American National Bank. In addition, Mr. Jenkins is charged with abstracting \$15,000 from the American National Bank.

HOUSE STILL ON VETS BILL

Consideration Narrowed Down to Two Proposals at Washington City

Washington, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The House today means committee today narrowed consideration of veterans' relief legislation to two proposals—one to increase loans and the other to pay one-fourth of the face value of the certificates.

The committee is expected to approve one of the proposals tomorrow. The loan plan is along the lines suggested by Rep. Bachrach, Republican of New Jersey, and would cost about \$500,000,000. The one-fourth payment plan is sponsored by Rep. Fish, Republican of New York.

Veterans' Administrator Hines has estimated the Fish proposal to cost approximately \$850,000,000. The committee continued deliberation after voting down three veterans' proposals.

Chairman Hawley announced the plan for immediate redemption in full of the certificates was eliminated by a 13 to 5 vote. This was the Brookhart-Patman proposal, involving an estimated outlay of \$3,400,000,000.

The committee then voted down, 10 to 13, Hawley said, the Garner plan for adjusted service pay plus 25 per cent, with four per cent compound interest added.

General Hines estimated this would cost \$2,100,000,000 if all veterans took it.

The committee voted down, 10 to 13, a modification of the Garner plan.

Hawley said details of the loan plan were being worked out, to be presented tomorrow. Representatives of the Treasury and General Hines, he said, would be present to "give us advice on the two proposals."

Swannanoa Bank Re-opens Today; Others Pending

Asheville, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The Swannanoa Bank and Trust Company re-opened this morning under a reorganization plan whereby depositors have agreed not to make withdrawals within 18 months.

The new bank has agreed not to loan out deposits until the securities of the old bank are liquidated.

More than \$10,000 was deposited in the bank before noon and officials said they were highly pleased with prospects. The bank closed December 16.

Plans for re-opening the Bank of West Asheville and the Bank of Leicester gained momentum today following meetings of depositors last night. Additional signatures to an agreement not to withdraw funds for a stated time were obtained. It will probably be another week before these banks can make definite announcements as to re-opening, officials said.

Salem Physician Commits Suicide

Winston-Salem, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Dr. Edward Hollingsworth, well-known Mount Airy physician, was found dead in his office early today with a pistol by his side.

Coroner's jury returned a suicide verdict.

He is survived by his widow and a son Zeb Hollingsworth of Roanoke, Va. He was a leader in the Presbyterian church's work in Mount Airy, a Mason, Odd Fellow, and member of the Junior Order.

CHARLOTTE DECLARED MOST RELIGIOUS CITY

Rev. Charles Gable Speaks at Catholic Church Last Night

In the explanation of the First Commandment, at the Catholic church last evening, Rev. Chas. Gable spoke as follows:

Man is by nature religious. This is attested by the eloquent monuments of antiquity; by the present day activities, and the building of many beautiful churches in this an age thoroughly irreligious. But in the kaleidoscope of all the cults the student of religion is confronted with the question: Can they all be right? The answer must be in the negative. If man's relation with his fellowman must be defined by God; then it is necessary that God should define man's obligations towards Himself. And a man-made religion however sublime can never suffice; moreover it is obvious that God could not be the author of contradictory creeds.

To find the pattern and model of the Divine Plan, we must study the religion of the first people of God, the Jews. While Judaism was the shadow of the great reality, yet of necessity it must contain the fundamental principles because it was a true religion. And those same principles must be found in a true religion of today.

The speaker then traced how God taught the children of Israel by actual experience the practice of the various virtues that enter into the economy of religion. The first was faith in its primitive meaning, that is "the taking of someone's word on the authority of another."

As God would from henceforth speak through a representative, it was necessary that the message of the representative be received with the same reverence as if God spoke Himself.

This lesson was vividly and forcibly impressed upon the minds of the Israelites after the destruction of Chorea and his adherents. Throughout their wanderings in the wilderness, every incident in some way taught the Jews the necessity of placing all their confidence, and this was hope. That intimate knowledge of God developed in the Jewish consciousness a love of God that has not been lost even today. If we find that in the law of fear, what must we expect to find in the law of love.

The mark of intelligence is speech. However sublime a man's thoughts may be, they are useless as far as the world is concerned unless man give them utterance; and this is done through speech. Since God demands worship of the mind, the will and the heart, it is only natural that He would expect it in the expression of speech; and this is prayer. The Jewish days were marked by intervals of prayer.

Of all the things misunderstood in the Old Law, it was the offering of bloody sacrifices; and yet properly understood it is as natural as the rest. They are but sensible expressions of man's instinct to acknowledge the supreme dominion of God over all things, even life. But even more instinctive, they are the visible expression of manifesting his love through some gift.

The sacrifices of the temple are no more—but there is a prophecy in Malachi 1:10-11 that tells of a new sacrifice, no, in one place, but everywhere; not among the descendants of Abraham but among the Gentiles. That sacrifice is not a bloody but a clean one; and that prophecy is fulfilled in the sacrifice offered every day from the rising

Seed Crushing Shows Increase

Washington, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Cottonseed crushed in the six-month period, Aug. 1 to Jan. 31 was announced by the Census Bureau today to have total 3,725,113 tons, compared with 3,579,957 tons for the same period a year ago and cottonseed on hand at mills January 31 was 629,231 tons, compared with 767,874 tons a year ago.

Cottonseed products manufactured in the period and on hand January 31 were:

Crude oil produced, 1,125,462,839 pounds, compared with 1,016,472,749 and on hand, 127,739,441 pounds, compared with 126,604,977.

Refined oil produced, 916,389,780 pounds compared with 891,239,085 and on hand 461,775,889 pounds, compared with 465,433,221.

Cake and meal produced, 1,685,778 tons, compared with 1,590,901 and on hand 243,665 tons, compared with 266,462.

Hulls produced, 1,032,086 tons, compared with 984,558 and on hand 153,862 tons compared with 103,945.

Linters produced, 647,039 running bales, compared with 737,719, and on hand, 346,855 running bales compared with 163,999.

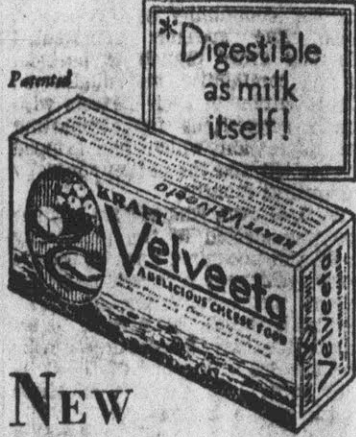

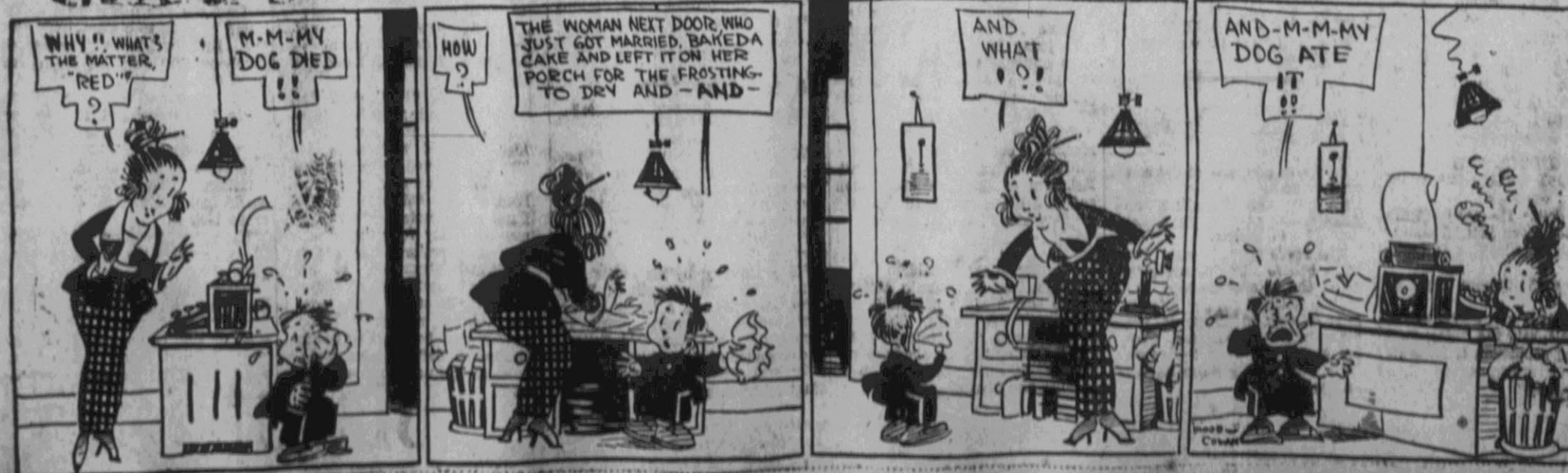

The commissary for the relief of those affected by the unemployment situation is providing for approximately four hundred people weekly, a member of the relief committee said today, and it is going to be necessary for the public to continue to contribute beneficently if the committee is able to meet future demands of the poor.

The public has been called upon to contribute liberally of both money and clothing in order that the relief committee may not be handicapped in its efforts to provide clothing and food for the sufferers during the cold winter months.

It is impossible to describe the destitution existing among many of the families in and around Greenville, a member of the committee said. To say that the jobless people are suffering is expressing the matter mildly. They are undergoing great hardship and this will be intensified if subscribers do not continue generally during the next several weeks.

Persons who have not contributed to the cause are urged to do so immediately either in cash or clothing. The committee renewed its appeal for more generous giving yesterday, and will continue to ask for aid until they are satisfied that the funds is sufficient to take care of the situation.

Merchants of Greenville have faith in the possibilities of this locality and are willing to exert their every effort in overcoming the period of depression which has gripped the country the last several months.

This was the sentiment of the annual meeting of the Merchants Association last night. The organization is composed of some of the oldest and most far-sighted business men of the community, and they are willing to bank their last cent on the future of the locality.

Members of the association plan to continue their campaign to make Greenville one of the most prosperous sections of the country as well as the "Principal Shopping Center of Eastern North Carolina," a reputation gained through long years of toil on the part of the mercantile interests.

They know that the cloud of pessimism which has darkened the business life of the nation is being rapidly dissipated by the revival of industry in different parts of the state, and believe that this territory has reached the bend in the road leading to prosperity and happiness.

Plans looking to increased business will be pushed by the association all through the year and in the final analysis they hope to be able to show that this year will be filled with as many achievements as any other year since the ending of the war.

The fire demon visited Greenville early Tuesday morning and left in his wake the wreckage of two business establishments, a grim reminder of what he can do when out of control.

It is the first time that the city has suffered such heavy loss in several years, and should bring the people to the realization that every precaution must be taken to prevent a recurrence.

ments of the association, and urged continued support that it might render even a more distinct service to the community.

C. B. Rowlett read his annual report in which he summed up some of the accomplishments of the organization, declaring that it had played a big part in putting Greenville and Pitt county on the map. He said that through well-directed publicity campaigns they had presented the outside world with a graphic and comprehensive portrayal of the possibilities of the locality, and thought they had been instrumental in accomplishing much good.

The speakers were B. B. Sugg, Rev. W. S. Harden, W. H. Woolard, J. E. Winslow, Mayor J. C. Lanier, K. W. Cobb, Julian White, S. T. White, L. A. Stroud, J. L. Kilgo, John Clark, D. J. Whichard, J. T. Clifton, Rev. W. A. Ryan, Herbert Waldrop, Eli Bloom.

Mayor Lanier paid a glowing tribute to the sagacity of Greenville business men who have been able to carry out despite the unprecedented problems brought about through depression. He said he thought the signs pointed to better times and that business even now was on an up-grade.

Discussing the popular demand for tax reduction, Mayor Lanier asserted that the Legislature would meet the demand during the present session. He predicted that the cut would relieve city and county taxpayers of from 75c to \$1.00 of their present assessment. He expressed opposition to proposed sal-

aries cuts and the six-months school term, declaring that both would contribute to the demoralization of the life of the state. "Educate the people," he said, "and do away with poverty." He urged his hearers to stand by the schools as the prosperity of the nation would be largely determined by their success.

Mr. Sugg declared that the community at this time found itself in one of the most awkward positions since the Civil war as result of the poverty caused by unemployment. He said the commissary established sometime ago for the relief of the situation was feeding hundreds of destitute people weekly and in that way carrying them over until the spring opens up with increased employment. He said the teachers of the city schools were taking money from their own pockets to provide sustenance for under-nourished children who appeared on their classes from day to day.

He described the situation as deplorable, but said he felt confident that the resourceful men and women of this community would be able to solve the problem in the near future.

Referring to the development on the Greenville tobacco market and the part which the Merchants Association had taken in its growth, the speaker predicted that the market would eventually become the foremost in the world.

He said Greenville was in need of a Chamber of Commerce, with departments for every line of business, in order that the world might be more completely informed concerning the opportunities of the great agricultural region.

The other speakers saw the need of greater optimism, especially Rev. W. S. Harden, pastor of the Presbyterian church, who urged his hearers to smile and drive out some of the gloom which had been created by depression. Good times, all agreed, will be determined by the general attitude of the public mind, and smiles, cherry words, and a determination to make the best of the opportunities of the city and county, would eventually result in pronounced success and prosperity.

American Jockey Goes Forward In The Steeplechase

New York, Feb. 11.—(AP)—G. H. (Pete) Bostwick, 106 pounds, of riding energy, is a colorful personage the United States has contributed to the English turf.

This 21-year-old cousin of the famous Tommy Hitchcock has millions that mean only money to buy more and faster horses. He quit college because he saw "no use sitting in school when one can sit on a horse and get somewhere." His greatest punishment is to be denied the privilege of riding a horse of a friend in a race. He shuns publicity until he has "done something."

The steeplechase season still is young in old England but already this mite of a jockey, as steeplechase riders are, has scored four times aboard jumpers from his own stable and once astride Victor Emmanuel's Eagle 2nd, an outstanding American favorite to win the grand national at Aintree March 27.

Pete may be surprising staid turfdom of England but not so here in America. His friends are even predicting that when the leader of the grand national thunders past the judge's stand, young Bostwick will be aboard flash his broad grin, because he had "done something."

He is slated to ride Bungle in the steeplechase classic.

Expert horsemen say Pete is the greatest amateur jockey the United States has known since the days of Harry Stone. Of Pete, it has been said, "heaven on earth is a stable of horses."

Only five feet, two inches tall and usually weighing about 100 pounds, he has remarkable arms and shoulders—prime requisites of a real jockey. He has what horsemen call a perfect seat astride a thoroughbred and ideal hands.

Although young in years, Pete is a veteran of the saddle. He has been riding since he was seven years old, appearing in numerous horse shows almost before he could get his two legs across his mount.

Old Jack Quinn Given Berth On Brooklyn Robins

Hot Springs, Ark., Feb. 11.—(AP)—Two days ago "Old Jack" Pincus Quinn, who dates his professional baseball pitching back to 1903, asserted he was not old—even in a game where much depends on such things as stamina.

And today he had a berth on the hurling staff of the Brooklyn Robins to prove there were others who believe as he does.

The oldest active player in the major leagues was nonchalant as he talked of the contract offered him yesterday by the Robins. He expected some club to grab him up after being released during the winter by Connie Mack. And he came here to get in condition for the training camp grind, just as he has for several years.

"Yeah, I'll give 'em a fling for another year," the old master said, and "I believe I've got enough stuff left to show 'em that I'm not through."

Quinn declined to reveal the terms of his new contract, but said it was "very acceptable." He said he would sign it as soon as it was sent to him.

Quinn, 47, then signed to help his former pupil.

LACK OF RUNS KNOCKED IN HURTS TERRY'S "HOLD OUT"

New York.—(AP)—Officials of the New York Giants have found one flaw in the .401 batting average that Bill Terry, first baseman, has thrown up to them in a demand for a salary of \$25,000 for the coming season.

Though Terry led both leagues in hitting last season, and was the first member of the Giants to cap-

ture the batting championship since 1915, it is reported, hints have been made that his prodigious feat had something of an ornamental flavor.

Terry, batting clean-up in the last 154 games, drove 123 runs across the plate. On the other hand, "Hack" Wilson, Chicago Cub outfielder, who hit 45 points less drove in 190. And "Chuck" Klein, clean-up slugger for the Phillies, used his 386 batting average to drive home 174 runs.

Ehmke May Try To Come Back

Philadelphia, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Howard Ehmke, veteran right-hander of the Athletics until last year, may upset the popular theory that "they never come back."

Ehmke announced his retirement last May, but as a free agent is eligible to sign with any club desiring his services.

The hero of the opening world series game between the Athletics and Chicago in 1929 declared today that his arm felt "pretty good" and that he would go to the Athletics' Florida camp under his own auspices, which means that he will pay the freight.

"I'm heading for Fort Myers about March 1," he said. "Down there I'll try out the arm. If it is anything like what I expect, I'll be tossing them up for Connie Mack. I believe the complete rest I gave the arm has fixed it."

Ehmke had 17 years of professional baseball and at the top of his career was a master pitcher. A few years ago he developed kinks in his pitching arm which made his appearance in the box infrequent.

"I have an agreement with Mack that if I return to the game it will be with the A's," Ehmke said. "My arm feels strong and say, I can make that new ball sing a song. Those raised seams will make it easy for any pitcher."

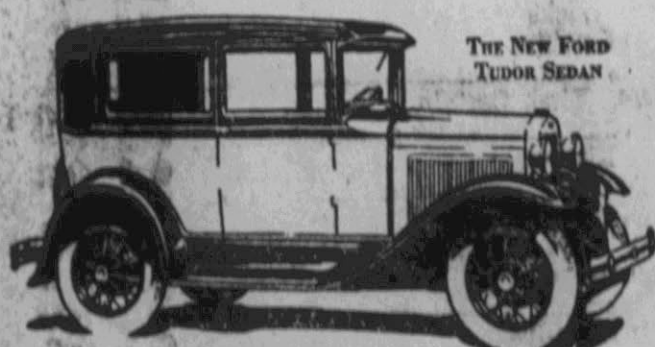

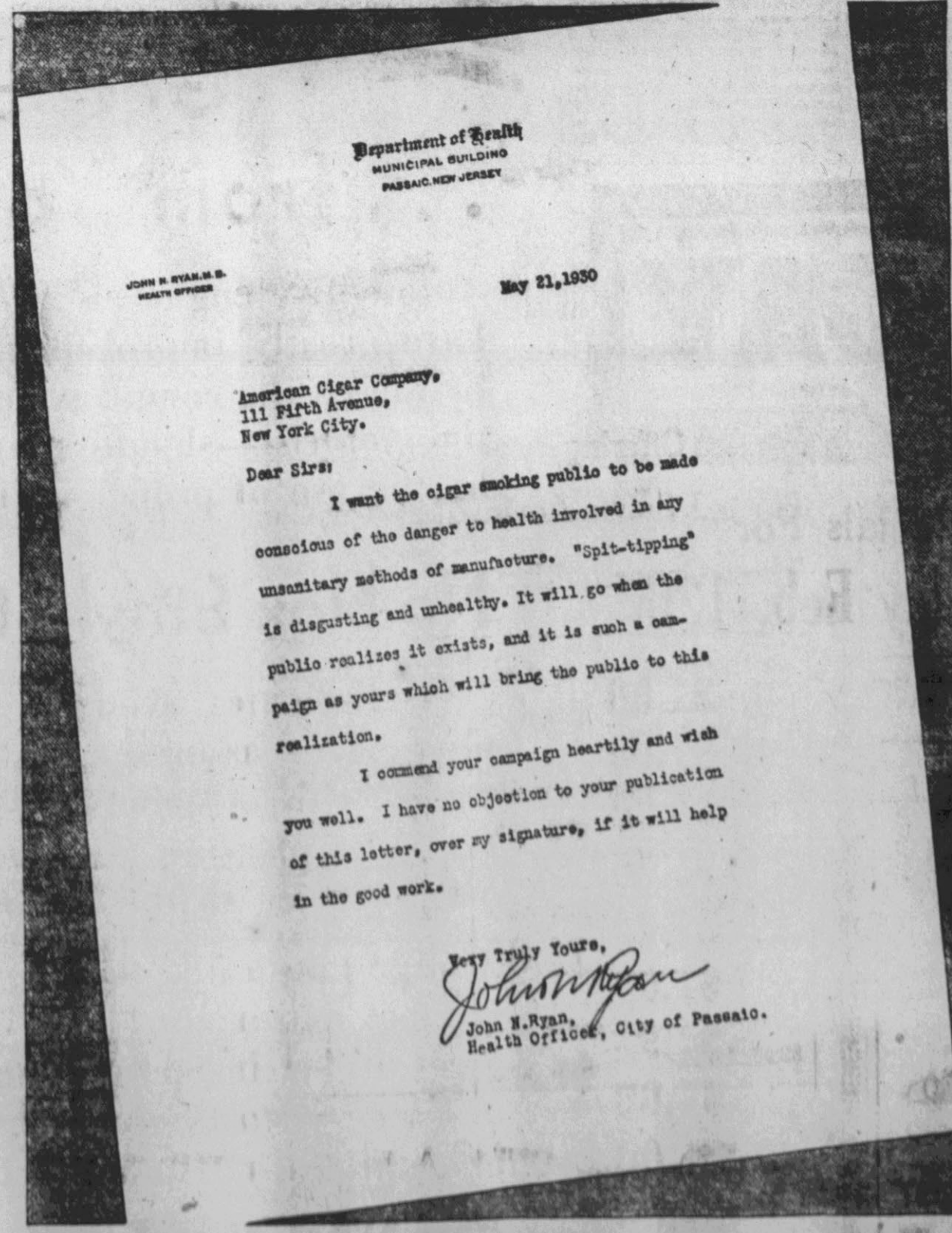

STOCK MARKET

New York, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Wall Street revealed in an old-fashioned bull market for the fourth successive trading session today.

The mid-week business statistics were largely negative in their implications, but the fact that they showed basic industries still able to offer strong resistance to depression was enough to maintain the carnival spirit among speculators. That spirit did not require much in the way of positive developments, since interpreted primarily a revision from the morbid frame of mind inherited from the drastic adjustments of the final months of 1930.

The share market encountered a wave of profit taking in the first half hour, and again in the early afternoon, but trading turned dull on declines, and swelled to new record volume for the new year as the market advanced. Copper and non-ferrous metals were strong in response to firmer metal prices. Chile Copper, a closely held issue, surged up 6 points, and American Smelting, Phelps Dodge and General gained 2. Among the volatile specialties, Case and Columbia Carbon sold up about 9 points. Auburn dropped 10 1/2, recovered, and was then given a rest. Utilities and pivotal industries were strong. Shares making extreme gains of 2 to 4 points, included American Can, American Telephone and Foreign Power, U. S. Steel, Westinghouse Electric, Johns Manville, and Consolidated Gas. General Motors moved narrowly, but Chrysler got up a point. The steel trade reviews showed that ingot output had been increased from 48 to 50 percent of capacity, as takings by motor manufacturers had increased. The weekly freight car loadings showed a slight gain.

Credit continued abundant, with outside call money still at one percent, indicating that the upward movement in shares had not required much in the way of borrowings, perhaps because much of it has been short covering.

Valentines Are Not More Sickly Than Used to Be

Cleveland, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Today's beautiful valentines of lovebirds, swans and fair young maidens are no more sentimental than their predecessors of a century ago, in the opinion of Frank Baer, who has the world's finest collection of such art.

Girls in "pig-tails" a few years ago, blushed to receive laboriously hand-made Valentines that told them:

"Roses are red, violets blue; 'Sugar is sweet and so are you.' Today, the wording of Valentine notes is just as sentimental but possibly more sophisticated. A century ago, the sentiment was the same but the expressions were more grandiose. One century-old Valentine in Baer's collection, which he has gathered at his Cleveland home, shows a warrior on horseback, flourishing a sword with two arrow-perched hearts above it, and bears these lines:

"Adieu until we meet again
"My valiant, brave hussar.
"As warm in your attachment as
"You're val-i-ant in war."
Baer, who is transportation director of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, has gathered Valentines from many foreign lands. The oldest in his collection is from Germany, and he believes it is the oldest Valentine in the world. It was made in 1710, a lacy design in vellum, and bears the tender message: "Liebes voglein"—(dear little bird). Baer has been collecting Valentines since 1895 and has more than 2,000.
