Payment Of Taxes Said To Be Only Way To Save Schools From Closing

With Commissioners Unable To Finance Extended Term Of Pitt County Schools, Public Is Impressed With Fact That Fate Of The Schools Rests Entirely In Their Hands; Immediate Payment Taxes Only Plan By Which Serious Situation Can Be Averted.

If you would avert the closing of Pitt County schools, pay your taxes.

This, in the opinion of county officials and educators, is the only plan by which the schools will be able to continue the present session following announcement of the County Commissioners that they would be unable to advance money to defray expenses of the extended eight-month term.

The situation is one of the most critical that has confronted the county in history and the lackadaisical attitude of the public in the payment of taxes is held entirely responsible for the dilemma. Should the special school district be able to raise sufficient money between now and the closing of the six-months' term three weeks hence, they will be able to go into the extended session, otherwise they have no alternative other than to close their schools and wait for that time when tax collections are sufficient to take care of their needs.

The Board of Commissioners, meeting in executive session here Thursday, notified the Pitt County Board of Education that it would be unable to advance from current funds additional uncollected special school taxes the necessary cost to operate the extended term for the fiscal year 1930-1931.

Although the resolution was immediately transmitted to the department of education, no action will be taken until the first of the month, and even then nothing is expected to be accomplished in behalf of improving the condition. The Department of Education has no borrowing power, and is dependent entirely upon the Board of Commissioners to provide for the operation of the schools.

This puts the question of whether the schools are to continue operation up to the public entirely, and if the payment of taxes does not show renewed life within the next two weeks it is a foregone conclusion that there will be nothing to do but close the schools.

It was stated yesterday that over twenty of the largest schools of the county are affected by the order of the commissioners. Greenville is the only town that will escape unscathed, it being operated under special charter independently of the county system.

The county, like every other section of the country, has been hard hit by the depression of the last two years, and this condition has been accentuated the last year by the inability to collect taxes. A considerable amount of property is tied up in tax suits, and hundreds of delinquents profess their inability to make payment.

The fate of the schools, therefore, is left entirely in the hands of the public, and if they are to continue operation people must awaken to the realization of the importance of paying their taxes and then pay them before the hours of learning are forced to close their doors.

Smith To Address Solons March 2

Raleigh, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Former Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York will "attempt" to address the North Carolina General Assembly March 2, instead of March 5, as was announced in both Houses yesterday.

The special legislative committee which visited the New York at Pinthurst yesterday, notified the Assembly that Mr. Smith would come to Raleigh before going to Washington to attend a meeting of the Democratic National committee on March 5.

In some way this date got confused and it was announced in both Houses of the Legislature that Mr. Smith would speak March 5, whereas he told the committee he would try to come here to speak Monday night, March 2.

POLICE RAID EARL CARROLL SKETCH BOOK

Members Of Cast Arrested And Held On Charge Of Indecent Performance.

Chicago, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Earl Carroll's "Sketch Book" revue, was halted by police last night in a spectacular raid at the Grand Opera House in which 28 chorus girls, two principals in the cast and the manager of the play were arrested, on charges of participation in "an indecent theatrical performance." The house was packed at the time.

Armed with warrants issued by Judge Justin F. McCarthy on request of John Alcock, acting commissioner of police, nine uniformed officers marched in through the main entrance, strode down both aisles, mounted the stage from right and left and ordered the curtain down.

One of the raiding policemen that a chorus girl kicked him as he passed through the wings. The girls, many of who were in professional dishabille, were loaded into four patrol wagons, and were taken to a police station. With them rode James J. Carroll, brother of Earl Carroll, and two stars, William Demarest and Don Howard. James Carroll is manager of the show.

All were subsequently released on bond for arraignment before Judge McCarthy today.

"The eccentric millionaire" was the name of the scene being shown when the police swooped down. The audience was thrown into confusion for a time but shortly afterward received from John J. Garrity, manager of the theatre that the show was "all over for the night." Approximately \$4,000 taken in had already been banked, but the management got an emergency fund from other loop show houses and returned the money to the customers.

Earl Carroll was not in Chicago. His brother, and members of the company, denied there was anything indecent in the performance. "I can't quite understand this business," Carroll said. "We've never had trouble—not even the slightest complaint—about the show before. It's the same that played 50 weeks in New York City, and all the other key cities on its way to Chicago."

"The sketch book" will continue, Carroll said, "unless some unforeseen event takes place."

The raid was the first made on a legitimate theater in Chicago in years and there were hints that it might be the beginning of a crusade to "clean up the stage."

SENATE PUTS APPROVAL ON RELIEF BILL

Body Accepts \$20,000,000 Drought Compromise After Five Day Battle.

Washington, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The Senate today accepted the \$20,000,000 drought loan compromise on relief legislation.

Supported by both Democratic and Republican leaders, the substitute for the \$25,000,000 Red Cross relief fund was given approval after six days of debate in which Republican Independents and some Democrats severely condemned it. It must now be approved by the House, where administration leaders already have promised it support.

President Hoover's approval is conceded. The compromise appropriates \$20,000,000 as a loan fund for "agricultural rehabilitation." Secretary Hyde, who will administer the fund has informed the Senate there could be no prohibition against the use of the money by the farmers for the purchase of food and clothing.

It adds to the \$45,000,000 already appropriated for loans for purchase of seed, livestock, feed and fertilizer.

Judgment Continued Until May Court In Case Of Five Bankers

Charlotte, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Prayer for judgment in the case of five former bank officials, convicted at Rutherfordton this week of State Bank Law violation, will be continued until the May term of court, E. C. Cansler, of Charlotte, defense attorney, said last night he had been informed by Judge H. Hoyle Sink.

The five men—J. L. Taylor, president of the defunct Rutherford County Bank and Trust company; W. B. Walker, cashier, and K. S. Tanner, S. E. Elmore and T. P. Cots, directors—were found guilty Thursday of receiving deposits while the bank was insolvent.

Judge Sink, who heard the case, at the time the jury returned its verdict said he would defer sentence until today, or later.

Mr. Cansler said Judge Sink had advised him over long distance telephone from Raleigh he had decided to continue prayer for judgment until May.

The five men are at liberty under bond.

ONE KILLED IN ARIZONA CLOUDBURST

Five Others Missing As Rushing Waters Carry Havoc To Southern Part State

Yuma, Ariz., Feb. 14.—(AP)—A cloudburst sent a wall of water down a canyon and through the village of Wellton, 38 miles east of here, last night, and otherwise wrought havoc in Southern Arizona. At least one person drowned and five were missing as a result of the storm.

Rain had fallen for an hour in Wellton when the roar of rushing water was heard. Within a few minutes a wall of water six feet high and 250 yards wide tumbled out of a flat bottomed canyon running from the rocky hills into the city.

The water swirled through the streets, washing away a dozen cottages, demolishing two business buildings, ripping up a mile and a half of railroad track and highway, and tearing out power and telephone lines.

Automobiles caught in the first rush were carried away and wrecked. The one known victim was drowned when his car was washed into a ditch. He was identified only as a man named Temple or Templeton, bound from Ontario, Canada, to El Centro, California.

A less severe storm sent a cat- aract into Mohawk and washed out the railroad and highway there. Four Southern Pacific trains were halted by washouts. Scores of automobiles were held between washouts near Wellington. Two hundred volunteers left here upon receiving reports of the storm and attempted to fight their way through to the affected district.

Pitt Highway Commission Silent Regarding Request That Road Boss Be Fired

Complaint Made By County Commissioners Against C. B. Fancher To Be Aired At Next Meeting Of The Highway Commission.

Members of the Pitt County Highway Commission had nothing to say today regarding what action they would take in the request of the Board of Commissioners that they dispense with the services of C. B. Fancher, county civil boss. Formally notified of the action of the Board of Commissioners yesterday, Haywood Dail, chairman of the Highway Commission, said the matter would probably be given consideration at the meeting of the commission the first of the month. He declined to express an opinion in the matter, as did other members of the highway body.

The demand that Fancher be dismissed from service was made by the County Board of Commissioners in executive session Thursday.

The resolution containing the demand declared "that in view of the wide publicity due to the recent indictment and trial of one C. B. Fancher, and in further view of certain admission made by the said C. B. Fancher while on the witness stand, it is the opinion of the Board of County Commissioners that his usefulness to the county had been seriously impaired and that his continued presence as foreman of the county convict camp will embarrass all departments of government, and in view of these facts the Board of Commissioners respectfully ask that the Highway Commission replace the said Fancher with a suitable person."

Fancher, foreman of the convict camp for a number of years, was sometime ago indicted by the grand jury on charges of embezzlement, attempted bribery and cruelty to prisoners. He was tried for embezzlement at the last sitting of Criminal court, but mistrial was ordered by Judge W. A. Devin of Oxford after the jury failed to reach a decision in the case.

The road boss was charged with selling county supplies distributed for use at the convict camp and applying the funds to his own personal use. In the bribery case he was alleged to have attempted to pay off a witness in the embezzlement case with a view of getting him to leave the county. The indictment for cruelty was alleged to have been the outgrowth of rough handling of prisoners.

Fancher, the ousted denied all of the allegations, contending that "they were the aftermath of disagreement with some political faction attempting to destroy his identity and remove him from his post of duty."

The charges will in all probability be aired at the next sitting of Criminal court during the month of April.

Berenguer Government Falls Bringing To Head Unusual Crisis In Spain

King Alfonso Cancels Parliamentary Elections And Turns His Attention To The Selection Of A New Cabinet.

Madrid, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The government of Primito, General Damasco Berenguer, fell today, bringing to a head a crisis which appeared to be the most dangerous of any faced by King Alfonso during his long reign.

The King, accepting the resignation of General Berenguer and his cabinet, cancelled parliamentary elections which were scheduled for March 1 and 15, and immediately began conferences with political leaders with a view to formation of a new cabinet.

While the cabinet had been under fire for several weeks, indeed from its very inception in January, 1930, the situation which brought its fall developed only last night when the Count of Romanones and other important Liberal Monarchist leaders withdrew their support to the cabinet's election program.

Dr. Domonques, a former premier and the Marquis de Alhucemas, issued a statement in which they said they would participate in the forthcoming elections because they believed that abstention would set a bad precedent, but that upon convening of the cortices, or Parliament, they would ask its dissolution and convocation of a convention to write a new Spanish constitution.

The election program, which King Alfonso had put into effect February 7, bringing within the immediate future a return to parliamentary rule after seven years of dictatorship and virtual dictatorship, had already been under fire from extremist elements, who had voted not to participate in the balloting. The loss of support of the strong Liberal group headed by Dr. Romanones therefore left the governments with little backing.

The premier's resignation was not presented at the palace as ordinarily would have been the case. General Berenguer has been suffering recently with an infected foot which prevented his going far from his quarters, and King Alfonso, apprised of the developments, called there shortly before 11 A. M. for a conference. The resignations were proffered then and accepted.

Immediately thereafter the entire cabinet convened with the King present to discuss the situation and his majesty began conference to find as quickly as possible a new leader.

In view of growing republican agitation, the depressed state of the Spanish currency, and increased internecine dissension, the crisis was viewed here as most grave, and one in which the throne itself is threatened.

OPPOSITION TO VET BILL DEVELOPING

Chairmen of House And Senate Committees Join Mellon In Compromise Fight

Washington, Feb. 14.—(AP)—A formal report recommending enactment of the compromise proposal for additional loans to veterans was submitted to the House today by its Ways and Means Committee.

The report estimated the cost range from \$375,000,000 upwards. It said "there was unanimity on the part of the committee that some kind of legislation bearing upon this question should be enacted by this Congress."

Washington, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The chairman of House and Senate committees which deal with revenue raising legislation joined Secretary Mellon today in opposition to the veterans loan compromise.

Chairman Smoot of the Senate finance committee agreed with Chairman Hawley of the House ways and means committee that the government would have to raise taxes or float a bond issue to meet the most of the bill.

Hawley said he favored aid to veterans he added, however, it seemed the benefit to veterans under the Bacharach compromise—estimated to cost from \$700,000,000 to \$1,700,000,000, would do more harm to the country than it would good to ex-service men.

Smoot warned the government already faced a deficit at the end of the fiscal year "much more" than he predicted several months ago when he placed it at \$350,000,000.

Supporters of the veterans loan compromise appeared, however, to be holding firm in the face of the opposition.

Minority Leader Garner said he felt certain Congress would not be materially influenced by the secretary's statements.

Hawley said that under the pending proposal to authorize an \$8,000,000,000 increase in the second Liberty Loan Bond issue for re-funding purposes, some of the money might be used for financing the veterans' loans. He explained, however, that it would result in an increase in the public debt.

Unless the revenues were increased somehow, Hawley continued, it might be necessary for the treasury to replace some of its short term certificates with long term paper.

"I have always said," the Oregon member said, "that I never would vote for an increase in taxes in peace time. But there is the drought, the world-wide disinclination to buy, and the unemployment situation that has lowered our revenues. Now comes this unexpected demand on the treasury for the veterans' loans. If the revenues from existing taxes cannot meet the expenditures of the national treasury then an increase in taxes will become necessary."

Seeks Regular Sessions Of Legislature Monday And Saturday Hereafter

Senator Hendren Presents Resolution Asking That Solons Put Two More Days To Consideration Of Regular Calendar; Brief Session Held By Both Houses During Morning; Several Local Bills Passed.

Raleigh, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Customary brief Saturday sessions were held by both divisions of the General Assembly today with only local bills being considered but a resolution was given the Senate by Mr. Hendren of Forsyth calling for regular sessions Monday and Saturday hereafter.

Since the Assembly started its 1931 meeting, sessions on Monday have been at night and on Saturday early in the day for consideration of only local bills. Work is piling up on the legislators and Mr. Hendren's motion would provide that the regular calendar be considered Saturday and Monday. The resolution will be on the calendar Monday night.

Both Houses cleared a few local bills from their calendars this morning during the short session.

More than half of the constitutional 60-day legislative session has passed and not a single major issue presented them has been finally settled by the lawmakers.

The House, taking notice of its heavy calendar, will assemble at noon Monday for its first daytime Monday meeting but the Senate will not meet until 8 o'clock Monday night, as it has done all session. Speaker Smith suggested to the House today that a date be set after which no new bills may be introduced but no action was taken.

The important bills on roads, schools, finance and appropriations are liable to come from committee at any time during the next two weeks.

Until those major issues reach the floor for final consideration it is problematical how long the Assembly will remain in session but the general impression is spreading in Raleigh that a 75-day session will probably be held. Under the statute the legislators get paid \$600 for the session, being allowed to draw their pay at the rate of \$10 per day, which means that if they are drawing their pay from the state regularly now it will cease to come to them the first week in March.

During the past week the House passed the Jefferson-Yount constitutional convention bill but in Senate committee the measure ran into opposition from labor and was amended to change the machinery for election of delegates to the convention and allow the voters to approve the constitution drafted if a convention is held.

The barber's bill, changing the present law to make it apply to all towns with 500 population and giving the shop inspection duties to the state board of health supervision, was passed by the Senate with slight amendment and will probably be enacted into law next week. The amendments merely made the law apply to all barber shops in some counties, regardless of the population of the communities in which they are located.

The House held no brief for easier divorce as it killed the Brooks bill and tabled the Gwaltney measure at its Friday session.

The bill to provide special Superior court judges for the next biennium received final approval when the House passed it.

Steps to curb alleged misuse of their power by justices of the peace got well underway when the House approved the Brooks bill to make their duties more definite.

The Senate passed a bill to raise the educational standards of nurses. The Assembly during the week received the Brookings report on county consolidation and each house got a revenue bill to levy a tax of two mills per kilowatt hour on all electrical energy produced in the state.

The Senate passed a new school attendance bill during the week and killed the measures relating to a change in the primary date, to allow a party to a trial to impeach his own witness, and to give the Supreme court power to set up rules of procedure. The bill to give weight to the recommendation of mercy by juries in capital cases also met death during the week.

Former Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York was invited to speak to the legislature while in the state (Continued on page six)

Aerial Trolleys Give Outlet to Mountain-Bound Colombia City

By CHARLES E. HARNER
Bogota, Colombia—(AP)—With its small, wealthy cities isolated by mountain and jungle barriers, Colombia has turned to the air to solve transportation problems.

Airplanes alone have not been good enough. An aerial tramway system has been operated with success for several years.

Manizales for example, is 7,000 feet above sea level and is the center of some of the finest coffee lands in the world. But the city is shut off by the jagged Andes and can safely be reached by plane only from the southwest, where there is a pass.

Her outlet in other directions is by aerial trolleys. Two of these, government owned, jump across space to the north and northwest for 12 and 13 miles each.

The third takes coffee and passengers eastward down to the Magdalena river.

This is one of the longest aerial trolley lines in the world. It extends for 43 miles and cost its British owners about \$2,000,000.

All three of these trolley outlets send their tiny cars swinging from 13 to 200 feet above ground. Sometimes they go over areas so precipitous that coffee growers gravely tell newcomers that they can plant seed there only by shooting it out of guns.

Another lengthy "airway" runs 28 miles from Gamara on the Magdalena to Ocaña where there are American oil interests. The swinging cars on this line cross swampy jungles where road-building is next to impossible and prohibitive in cost.

The cars, whether carrying coffee, gold ore, livestock or passengers, make about four and a half miles an hour. That is plenty fast for the sections which they traverse for in an hour they cover as much ground as a man on foot could make in a day, up the heights or through the jungle.

The Surveyor's principal instrument. The fathometer employs sound waves to read depths virtually instantaneously, without stopping the ship. The device sends a sound out for an oscillator on the bottom of the ship, and a microphone picks up the echo as the sound comes back reflected from the bottom.

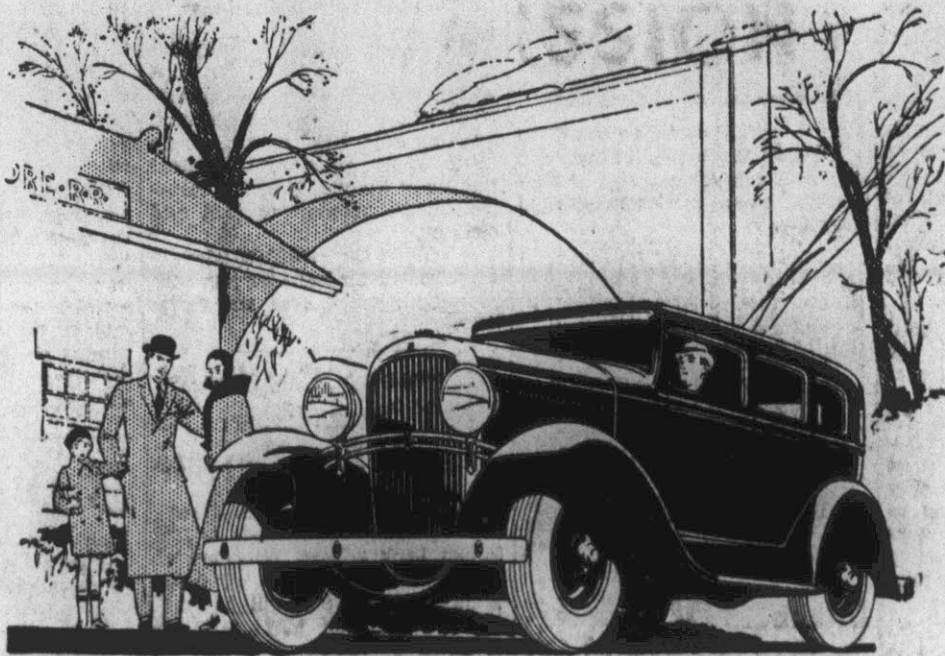
Knowing the speed of sound in water, the depth can be calculated by the elapsed time for the echo to return. The Pioneer makes a depth reading every 200 feet in water about 20 feet deep.

The radio device marks the position of the bottom where the depths are read. It is called the

R. A. R. which is short for radio acoustic range finding. A small bomb is exploded behind the Surveyor. Sensitive hydrophones in the water near shore pick up this sound, and transmit it by land lines to shore stations.

Automatically the shore station sends a radio signal back to the vessel. Although these stations are 20 to 50 miles apart, and the Surveyor often out of sight of land, the underwater sound wave and return radio signal enable her officers to stick a pin in her position as accurately as if the two stations were measuring rods reaching from the shore.

Farmers Face Tighter Money For New Crops

Washington.—(AP)—Farmers will find it increasingly hard to get money with which to produce their crops in 1931, but correspondingly easy to get funds for marketing what they do grow.

That is what the annual agricultural outlook conference says.

Aside from the physical limitations of production credit, there is a well-defined attitude, particularly in the south, against lending money for increased farm activity in major crops.

In some instances money at all will be lent unless the farmer agrees to plant gardens and feed for livestock, and otherwise follow the agricultural program of his locality.

Most production credit in the United States still comes from the country bank and the merchant, and the ability of country banks to make advances has been considerably impaired. Most of them entered 1931 with a smaller volume of deposits than they had a year earlier.

There were also less adequate secondary reserves consisting of commercial paper, bankers' balances and investments.

Banks in many areas have been unable fully to liquidate their borrowings from correspondents and Federal Reserve banks. Failures in many sections, particularly in the southern states, have accentuated the shortage of available funds.

Advice from agricultural credit corporations and federal intermediate credit banks indicate that an increased volume of credit from these sources will be utilized. This increase will result in part from the formation of new credit corporations, and in part from enlarged operations of existing corporations.

The ability of country merchants to extend credit to their customers will be adversely affected in many sections by an abnormally large carry-over of last year's accounts, and by difficulties in obtaining new loans from the local banks.

The outlook for farm mortgage credit does not hold much promise of improvement during 1931. The decline in land values and the poor income returns of 1930 are making it difficult for borrowers to obtain renewals upon favorable terms.

A few insurance companies have withdrawn from the farm mortgage field. Most of the joint stock land owners are temporarily inactive, or have greatly restricted their operations.

The supply of credit for marketing the 1931 crops, however, seems likely to be ample. This type of credit is supplied from central money markets, where an abundance of credit is available and interest rates at the lowest level in any recent year.

AUSTRALIAN BETTING TAX BRINGS STRIKE AT TRACKS

Sydney, Australia.—(AP)—Race track followers have gone on strike in protest against a new betting tax. The New South Wales government imposed a tax of 10 cents on every dollar won by betters. Attendance dropped by 10,000 at the first race meeting after the tax went into effect.

The pari-mutuel machines took in \$60,000 less than usual. And the bookmakers reported a 75 percent reduction in the money passing through their hands.

The tax, which was expected to bring the government \$200,000 weekly, will not yield more than \$25,000 weekly if the "strike" continues.

Detroit.—(AP)—Secrecy breeds rumor, and rumor breeds public curiosity about the automobile industry.

Perhaps in no other line of manufacturing are such efforts made to safeguard the identity of new products before introduction to the public—and public curiosity is aroused accordingly.

This has been evidenced during the weeks preceding the introduction of a number of various new models in the past, and now rumor is at work again.

Reports have it that Henry Ford is experimenting with another new line of cars which would supplement his present line in a higher price field, and which would have more cylinders and be constructed with the so-called "V" type of engine.

The same rumors have it that the model has undergone tests during a tour of the middle west. As is his custom, the Ford Motor company remains silent.

The same secrecy is extended to the automobile companies in their plans for new models which call for many miles of driving over all manner of roads and streets.

Camouflaged bodies, absence of name plates and other methods of disguise are used.

Even among the companies' own employees, precautions are taken to safeguard the work under progress in the laboratories and experimental departments.

Employees in some plants tell of operations being suspended and benches and work tables covered when employees from other divisions enter. Laboratories and experimental departments are never open to visitors.

Officials in experimental departments are known sometimes to drive experimental models about town, but neighbors have noticed that often the hood of the engine is locked down.

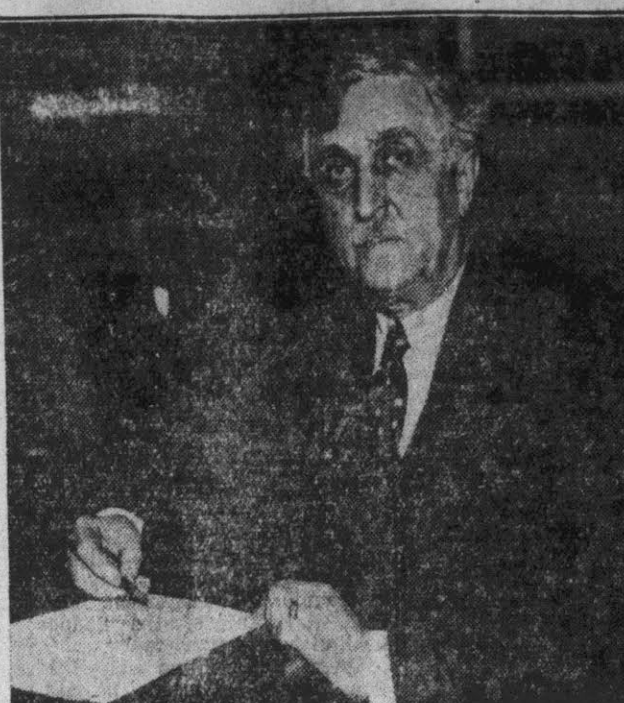
Search for Picture of Mars Brings Forth Triple-Speed Film

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ABOUT TOWN

A patriotic impulse should cause the people of Pitt county to get busy and attempt to settle their taxes. Unless this is done it is going to be necessary for the county school system to close down.

The Board of Commissioners have notified the Superintendent of Education that it is going to be impossible for them to furnish money for the extended term of school, making it necessary for the school districts to get busy and encourage payment of taxes or abandon all hope of their eight-month session.

This is one of the most critical situations that has confronted the county in years, and one that vitally affects virtually every home in the county. It is a case of paying taxes or sacrificing the two months extra session enjoyed by over twenty of the largest schools of the county.

Greenville fortunately is not involved in the crisis, due to the fact that it is a chartered district and operated independently of the county school system.

It is to be hoped the people will take complete cognizance of the situation and do everything in their power to avert a patriotic impulse on the part of the taxpayers and inspire them to go to unusual lengths to pay up.

The plan of the City of Greenville to annex that strip of land in the southwestern section of the city known as the "Bama" was defeated indignantly after members of the Board of Aldermen went to considerable trouble to fix the boundaries for incorporation.

The reason of the defeat was the amount of opposition brought to bear on the movement by property holders of the district, who declared that present conditions did not warrant such a change, and that they had all the burden in the way to taxes they were able to carry.

Alderman Boyd, author of the resolution to take over the district, made an eloquent appeal in behalf of the proposal, but sentiment was so strong that the aldermen wavered and fell before the strangle of the opponents.

The plan was suggested with a view of furnishing employment for fifty or more jobless men in this community, and now that it has failed the board must turn its attention to other sources of development if it still entertains a desire to aid unemployment.

Greenville is one of the best towns in this part of the state—boost it. Nothing in the world helps a town or city develop more than timely boosting, and if the people of the city would begin seeing the rosy side of things like they used to it would not be long before the city would be out of the morass of despond and back to the high ground of prosperity.

The city has many things to be proud of and it should be a pleasure of the public to talk about them and in that way let other people know about the strides the town has taken in becoming the principal shopping center of Eastern Carolina.

Times are hard and jobs difficult to get—nobody will dispute the fact—but where is the advantage of sitting down whining over conditions when better times are just around the corner. A word of cheer and timely smiles will do their part toward the establishment of old time optimism—a requisite very much in need in every locality even when things are humming.

Get a smile on your face and begin boosting and your reward will come in a totally unexpected manner.

Tomorrow is Sunday and hundreds of people will attend Sunday School and church in Greenville. Will you be among the number? If not, why? Every church in the city has extended a cordial invitation to people in all walks of life, and especially to

business men from other sections who happen to be spending the day in the city.

The Sunday Schools are forever on the alert to bring in new members, and they are a vital force in the religious and social life of the community. Young men could do no better than affiliate themselves with some of these classes. They come in contact with the very cream of the citizenship—men and women who are using their every influence for the development of a high standard of morality in the community.

It matters not what you may have planned for tomorrow morning, take an hour off and attend some Sunday School. You will feel better by having done so, and the members of the classes will feel better by having had you with them. Don't wait for some crisis in your life to push you into the church. SEA STUDIES HELP REVEAL STORY OF LIFE ON EARTH

La Jolla, Calif.—(AP)—Solution of some of the apparently insignificant problems of the sea may lead to magnificent achievement, says Prof. W. E. Allen of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

"From food, clothing and jewels to agricultural fertilizers," he says, "there is a long list of biological products of the sea, any and all of which may be better controlled and handled for human uses if more is known about the lives of their producers and the conditions affecting their production."

"There is the claim to aid in interpreting the history of the earth, the history of life on the earth, and the history of mankind, through comparison of present forms and conditions of life with those of the past."

Reach Agreement On Everything But The Old Pigskin

New York, Feb. 14.—(AP)—After nearly five years of agreeing to disagree, the athletic authorities of Harvard and Princeton have agreed to agree—that is, in everything except football.

Announcement that the school will resume athletic relations was published today. It carried the joint signatures of Dr. Charles W. Kennedy, chairman of the board of athletic control at Princeton, and William J. Bingham, head of the Harvard committee on athletics. They met secretly in New York Thursday for a conference.

The two heads agreed that there had been "a complete change of undergraduate sentiment" in the past four years and that dual competition could be resumed in all sports other than football.

Contests are to be arranged as rapidly as scheduled engagements permit. Hope was expressed that there would be meetings this spring in baseball, tennis and lacrosse. Golf and rowing engagements already had been scheduled.

The difference in football policies still exists and there is no prospect that gridiron relations will be resumed in the near future.

Athletic relations with Harvard were severed by Princeton November 10, 1926. Bad feeling which grew out of a 1925 Princeton victory reached its highest pitch at the time of the football game November 6.

Princeton resented the Harvard athletic policy which recognized only the Yale game as a football fixture. Contests with other colleges, which presumably included Princeton, were to be scheduled "only at suitable intervals."

FARMERS' SONS SURPASS SIRE'S IN RAISING CORN

Houston, Tex.—(AP)—Sons of Cherokee county Texas farmers, had better fortune with corn production in 1930 than did the farmers themselves.

The summary of W. L. Knapp, county farm agent, revealed that the boys, members of farm clubs, harvested an average of 61 bushels an acre, as against 59 bushels for the adult growers.

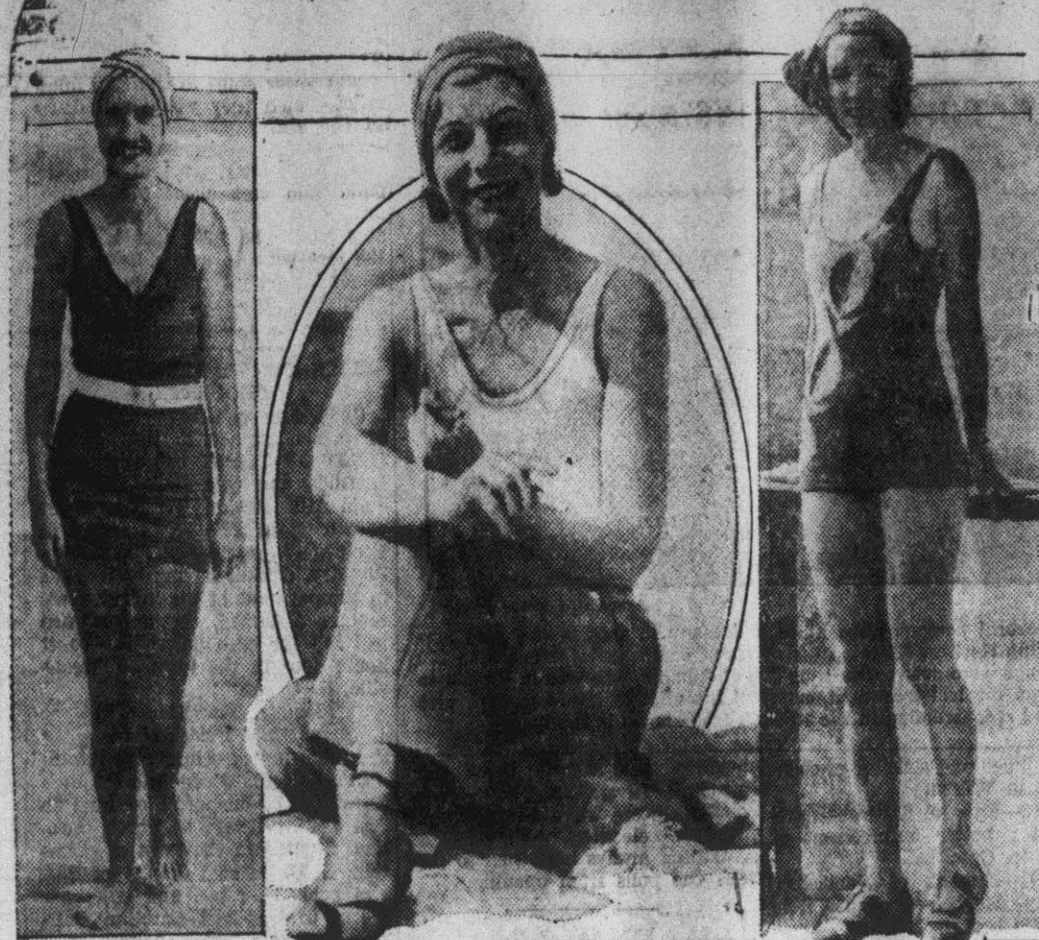

N. C. State's boxing team meets Citadel tonight at Charleston, and the Blue Devil grapplers mix with Davidson.

"Unless an accounting is made by Rockne," Hutton said, "I intend to take the matter up with the board of directors of the Elks Building Association and recommend the filing of a civil suit in Superior court Monday."

Rockne retaliated by saying all of the sum was used in bringing the team to Los Angeles for the game, and that in addition several hundred dollars of his own money went into the business of making the game a success.

Hutton charged that less than \$1,000 of the \$9,000 gate in the contest went to the fraternal organization's charity fund.

Hutton asserted that in addition to the \$9,000 advanced to Rockne \$1,500 was paid "Hunk" Anderson, coach in charge, when the Rockne men arrived, while still another \$500 was necessary to bring Joe Savaldi from Chicago to perform.

Rockne said "everything was carried out as promised to Mr. Hutton. Every penny of the expense money was used to bring the players to Los Angeles. Furthermore I had to use some of my own money, but it was for charity, and I'm glad I spent it."

STOCK MARKET

New York, Feb. 14.—(AP)—A park or two of bullish enthusiasm in a dull week-end stock market today was sufficient to drag the list out of a moderate depression in the late dealings.

Closing prices disclosed about an even mixture of gains and losses, with narrow changes in leading issues. The market showed a fairly steady tone at the finish. Temporary losses of 1 to 2 points in leading issues had been fairly general earlier. Transactions for the two-hour session were only about 1,000,000 shares.

Loew's was a bull favorite in the late trading, rising more than three points to a new high for the movement in active trading. Union Pacific and Caterpillar Tractor gained about as much, and issues showing advances of around a point included Fox Continental Can, Missouri Pacific, Baltimore and Ohio, and Gold Dust. A loss of nearly two points in American Telephone was regained, and that issue closed up at a fraction.

Radio lost a point, presumably in response to the upholding of the Circuit Court of Appeals of the decision of the Federal District Court of Delaware against the patent pooling arrangement. Westinghouse, Johns Manville, American Water Works, Corn Products and Air Reduction lost about as much. U. S. Steel was off a fraction.

A few odd lot transactions in Utah Copper carried that issue up 24 points. McCrory Stores A and B stocks were two other thinly traded issues making wide gains. They closed about 10 higher.

Week-end reports from the steel industry indicated little change in operating schedules next week. In the Youngstown area, operations will be maintained at 50 per cent of capacity, as reduction of 5 per cent by Youngstown Sheet & Tube will be offset by gains elsewhere.

The New York market has shown a slightly firmer tendency of late, which was translated into 1.4 of one per cent increase today in bankers' acceptance rates.

"Gull Wing" to Aid Vision; Blind Angles To Be Reduced

Washington.—(AP)—Military aviation is learning lessons of design from the sea gull.

Replacing the conventional straight wing in several experimental combat ships being tested by the army air corps, and a new metal monoplane being developed, is a wing with a depressed center section.

Called the gull type, because of its similarity in lines to a bird in flight, it was designed to increase a pilot's vision by eliminating in part the "blind angles" caused by expanses of wing in line of sight.

One of the ships with the depressed center section is a Berliner-Joyce pursuit biplane being tested by the air corps at Wright field, Dayton, O. A new one under development is being built on the west coast by the Douglas Aircraft company.

The Douglas will be a metal monoplane, designed as an all-purpose military ship having a high ceiling, high visibility, and a theoretical speed of 180 miles an hour.

It is believed the first ship that will have a single gull wing. Carrying a pilot and observer the plane will be suitable for observation and attack missions.

The Berliner-Joyce company, which also supplied a new type of upper wing of a conventional biplane to the navy for experiments, has recalled the ship to modify the wings to the gull type for reasons of vision.

"There is no doubt that the plane, no matter in what position, forms a very bad blind angle in combat and invariably at a time when you are closing in on your adversary," said Temple Joyce, war pilot and vice-president of the company.

"To make a wing eliminating the blind angle, however, and still maintain efficiency and strength, without too great increase of weight, has been a difficult engineering problem.

"A relatively light structure has been found possible by the use of high tension, heat treated steels. There still remain a decrease in lift and increase in drag, but good engineering—through wind tunnel research—will almost balance them.

"The gull wing, if properly engineered, will be slightly less efficient than a conventional wing arrangement, factors that may be of such small quality, though, as to be counterbalanced by the increase of vision."

Ominous Quiet Worries Spain As Vote Nears

adrid.—(AP)—Spain is in the strange position of facing its first parliamentary elections in nearly ten years with virtually all her political "outs" boycotting the proceedings.

Voting for members of the lower house has been set for March 1, with the deputies assembling March 15 and the selection of Senators also set for the later date.

But speech-making, announcements of candidates and similar campaign accompaniments have been notable chiefly for their absence.

The Socialists are committed to a program of "justifiable force," and they, with the other chief groups in opposition to the government, have refused to participate in the voting.

So have the "strong monarchists," who have no faith in parliamentary government. This leaves the constitutional monarchists and communists as the only groups likely to offer candidates.

Probably the most peculiar part of the situation is that the general public remains skeptical as to whether there actually will be an election, after all, old people believe that the new revolutionary outbreaks, general strikes or other disturbances will yet force the government to call off the voting.

The argument, always accompanied by a shrug, goes about like this:

"Yes, for seven years we have been hearing that an election was just around the corner. But it never came. We will believe we are going to have this one when we vote, not before."

Route Plotted for Nicaragua Canal By Army Engineer

Washington.—(AP)—Uncle Sam is polishing his shovels to dig another big ditch from ocean to ocean, for the Panama canal soon may be outgrown.

Army engineers already have surveyed the route for another canal, this time through Nicaragua. By summer they will have finished drilling to find the best rock foundations for the huge locks and dam that must be built.

Panama canal ship traffic has reached 30,000,000 tons a year since the canal was opened in 1914, which is about three-quarters of its capacity. If traffic increases as expected the present canal will have to be enlarged or a new one built.

The Nicaragua route, farther north, would save from one to two days for most ships using such a canal, it is estimated. In case of war the fleet would have an additional short cut from ocean to ocean should one canal be destroyed.

The United States paid Nicaragua \$3,000,000 in 1916 for exclusive right to build a canal there.

Army engineers, under Lieut-Col. Dan I. Sultan, have waded waist-deep through swamps, cut their way through jungles so thick they could not see more than ten feet ahead, and braved torrential rains, tropical heat and poisonous insects and snakes to run the survey lines.

From Brito, on the Pacific side, the canal route follows the Rio Grande river, valley 16 miles, climbs 150 feet with three locks to the top of the Continental Divide, and then follows the Las Lajas river to Lake Nicaragua, 110 feet above the sea.

Ocean vessels then would navigate 70 miles across the lake. A dam 50 miles down the San Juan river valley on the other side of the lake would extend the lake
