CONGRESS GETS READY TO QUIT ON WEDNESDAY

Breaks All Records With the Calendar Cleared of Major Legislation

Washington, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Congressional leaders claimed to have broken all records today with the calendar cleared of major business four days before adjournment.

The vital legislation of the short session all enacted the weary legislators turned to finishing the odds and ends, with time to spare before the adjournment hour at noon next Wednesday.

A veto by President Hoover of the measure providing for Government operation of the Muscle Shoals power plant is awaited on Capitol Hill, but leaders do not see enough votes in sight to enact this over the Presidential disapproval.

The drive for passage of the appropriation measure carrying \$4,000,000 for next year's operation of the government ended suddenly yesterday with approval of a conference report adjusting differences on the Naval supply bill.

So anxious were the congressional chieftains to obtain passage of these bills to avoid an extra session this spring that they surpassed all previous legislative performance.

The second deficiency bill providing about \$100,000,000 to meet emergency legislation expenditures still is in conference but its passage early next week is expected.

Also, the constitutional amendment fixing a new meeting time for Congress is shared in a conference deadlock between the Senate and House. Leaders were doubtful today of ironing out this dispute which involves about the House provision limiting the second session of Congress to four months.

Legislation for new veterans hospitals and for continuing the maternity aid law also was in conference.

The protocol for American adherence to the World Court still hangs unacted upon but the Senate foreign relations committee has laid it aside until next December.

Mrs. W. H. Woodard, a daughter of Mrs. Ives, went with her.

Mrs. Albritton was the widow of the late Elder B. B. Albritton, a beloved minister of the Free Will Baptist church. Elder Albritton was a native of the Pacolus section of Pitt county and has many relatives there now.

Mr. Albritton was 87 years old and had been a devoted member of the Free Will Baptist church since early childhood. Funeral services will be conducted at Mt. Zion church near Bayboro Sunday morning.

Masquerades 14 Years As Cowboy

Backlog, Okla., Feb. 28.—(AP)—"Jack" Carlton, bronzed cowhand employed several years on ranches in the vicinity of Midland, Tex., was revealed today as a woman.

Mrs. J. L. Jones, head of Tonkawa, Okla., charities, said hunger had accomplished what years of hazards on the range could not in forcing the "Cowboy" to admit her identity. Grace Carlton, part-white daughter of a Cherokee Indian woman.

Dressed in man's garments, Grace Carlton, "just wandered up this way" after losing a job in Texas. She said she was unable to find work and appealed to the Associated charities for food. Questioning, Mrs. Jones said, ended a masquerade of fourteen years standing.

E. J. Post, superintendent of the Ponca City five tribes agency notified, said he would investigate today and determine whether the woman was a ward of the government.

Senate Passes Road Bill; Other Major Statewide Measures Receive Action

Counsel For Senate

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Major legislation held the center of the spotlight in the General Assembly today and three important statewide bills were given approval.

The Connor road bill passed its final reading in the Senate and was sent to the House for concurrence.

The Gravelly central purchasing agency measure finished its course in the Senate and was sent to the House.

The Umstead-Whedbee-Hendren local government finance act was approved on second reading in the House. The vote was so overwhelmingly favorable that its final passage seems a mere formality.

All of the measures passed were supported by Governor Gardner.

The road bill, subject of more discussion and debate than any act given the Assembly this session, is termed one of the most revolutionary pieces of legislation ever proposed in the state.

The present State Highway commission be reorganized and that instead of the state taking care of something like 6,000 miles of highway it will maintain all county roads, 45,000 miles according to estimates of the State Tax commission.

The Gravelly bill places all purchasing of supplies and printing for state departments and institutions under one agency.

Under the finance act a new commission to replace the present sinking fund and county government advisory groups is created to virtually control all political subdivisions of the state.

DEFENSE GOOD COUNSEL FOR FRAZER SAYS

Says Prosecution Can Establish Neither Place of Shooting Nor a Motive

Elizabeth, N. J., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Victor Greenburg, counsel for William Frazer of Runway, charged with killing his sweetheart, Mrs. Phoebe Quick Stader, says he believes the man has a perfect defense.

The attorney said he did not think it possible for the prosecution to establish the place of the shooting nor a motive.

Frazer, brought back from Raleigh, N. C., where he was arrested after leaving the woman's body in a wooded area near Bowling Green, Va., appeared in a daze, in a droll, detached manner, he reiterated his story that Mrs. Stader was shot accidentally when he reached for his rifle in the car in which they rode.

They were returning from a two-day party together in New York state and had been drinking, he said.

Prosecutor Abe J. Davis of Union county, planned to take Frazer over the roads traversed on the fatal ride in an effort to establish exactly where the shooting occurred but Frazer's counsel objected and it was postponed.

As to location, Frazer changed his story three times. At first he said the shot was fired "somewhere south of Suffolk, N. Y." Then, between Elizabeth and Newark and finally near Ramsey, in Bergen county, near the New York state line.

David said the January term Grand Jury would not be recalled to consider the case and he would seek a first degree murder indictment when the May Grand Jury meets the seventh.

Frazer's wife has arranged a conference with her attorney to discuss provision for the couple's two children.

Gastonia Bank To Re-open Soon

Gastonia, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The First National Bank of Gastonia, which was closed December 16, 1930, will reopen before March 15, officials announced here today.

Cash stock subscriptions amounting to \$500,000 have been raised, the announcement said, and confirmation of reopening plans are expected soon from the comptroller of the currency in Washington.

The bank was closed when depositors withdrew approximately \$800,000, following the bank failure in the Asheville area.

One Killed and Several Injured In Train Wreck

LaCrosse, Wis., Feb. 28.—(AP)—The fireman of a Milwaukee road passenger train was killed and several passengers were reported injured today when a Milwaukee road train collided with a Northwestern road train near Camp Douglas.

Milwaukee road officials said the seven passengers were only slightly hurt.

The accident occurred about four a. m. as the crack Olympian of the Milwaukee road was nearing the end of its run from Seattle, Washington. The other train was No. 515, bound from Chicago to Minneapolis.

Milwaukee road officials said the engine, tender and four baggage, mail, and passenger coaches were derailed. The engine and express car of No. 515 also went in the ditch.

Milwaukee road officials were at a loss to account for the accident's cause, since the crossing is controlled by an automatic block signal. An investigation was opened immediately.

Banks in Western Carolina to Open

Asheville, Feb. 28.—(AP)—One Western North Carolina bank will reopen on Monday, and four other institutions, closed late last year, are completing arrangements to reopen within the next few weeks.

The bank reopening Monday is the Bank of Murphy, oldest in western North Carolina. W. W. Hyde, assistant cashier, said today that officials had received permission of the State Banking Department to resume business and that all was in readiness to open the doors.

When the institution was closed it had \$250,000 on deposit. Depositors numbered approximately 1,500.

The other banks planning to reopen soon include: The Farmers and Traders Bank, Weaverville; Bank of Leicester, Leicester; Bank of Franklin, Franklin; and Citizens Bank, Waynesville.

Baptists Stage Successful Drive To Wipe Out Debt

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—(AP)—More than \$60,000 has been raised by the Baptist State Convention during February to be applied to interest due on bonds of Meredith college.

March 1, Dr. Charles E. Maddry, general secretary of the convention, said today.

The church launched a campaign February 8 to raise \$80,000 to apply to the indebtedness and interest of the college and though the campaign was supposed to close February 22, Dr. Maddry said today the money was still being received.

He predicted the fund would go beyond \$70,000.

"The drive has been a great success," Dr. Maddry said. "We have never had a more noble response to a call of need."

BRITAIN AND ITALY AGREE BE UNDOING NAVAL ISSUE OF AL CAPONE

Two Countries in Accord in Principle for Settlement of Naval Problems

Rome, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Great Britain and Italy today reached an accord in principle for the settlement of all naval problems left pending by the London Conference of last year.

The accord will be submitted to the French foreign minister, Aristide Briand, in Paris tomorrow, and if he accepts it a five-power treaty carrying limitation of all categories of naval tonnage will emerge.

Inasmuch as Foreign Minister Arthur Henderson, of Great Britain, had already reached an agreement in principle with the French before initiating the conversations here, Mr. Briand's acceptance of the British-Italian accord was expected almost as a matter of course.

Mr. Henderson himself was so hopeful that he said a complete solution of the differences between France and Italy would be reached in Paris "if the talks there are satisfactory as they have been here."

He left for Paris, with A. V. Alexander, first lord of the admiralty, and British admiralty experts, two hours after the negotiations had been finished, and hopes tomorrow afternoon to obtain full agreement with the French. When that is accomplished the text of the new accord will be submitted to the governments of the United States, Japan and the British Dominions signatory to the tripartite treaty of London for their final approval and the elaboration of a five-power limitation document.

If today's accord is accepted by the French and written into the blank spaces of the London treaty, it will settle at least until 1936, long standing differences between France and Italy over the relative size of their fleets.

Details of the arrangements were not made public today but in Italian circles it was said that the political aspects, as well as the naval, were of high importance to Italy.

The London Naval treaty, signed last April, prescribes limitation and reduction of naval armament for the United States, Great Britain and Japan, and agreement on some phases of the naval disarmament problem among those three nations, France and Italy.

Italy declined to join a five-power pact unless France recognized the principle of Italian parity with her navy.

Charge Former Bank Head With Embezzlement

Louisville, Ky., Feb. 28.—(AP)—James B. Brown, president of the National Bank of Kentucky, and former president of Bank Kentucky Company, both in receivership, today was under indictment in two counts.

Indicted with Brown on charges of wilful misapplication of bank funds by the Federal grand jury yesterday was Charles F. Jones, vice president of the National Bank of Kentucky. Brown, Jones and W. T. Zurschmiede, secretary of the Bank Kentucky Company, were indicted by the county grand jury on charges of embezzlement.

The Federal indictment accused Brown and Jones of misapplying \$46,777.50 of the bank's funds in a purchase of stock. The county writ alleges Brown, Jones, and Zurschmiede embezzled \$2,000,000 of Bank Kentucky funds by executing Brown's note for that amount to a brokerage firm, the note later being endorsed to the Bank Kentucky Company.

East Carolina Exposition To Be Held In This City, Week Of April 27 to May 1

Annual Show Promises to Be Best Ever Staged and Will Include An Elaborate Program

The 1931 Eastern Carolina Exposition will be held in Greenville the week of April 27 to May 1, according to announcement made here today. Sometime ago the executive committee of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce offered the exposition to Greenville for this spring and at a meeting last night of a committee composed of representatives of various civic organizations of this city, the offer was formally accepted. For a number of years this exposition has been a gala occasion for eastern North Carolina and it is significant that the exposition should be returned to this city on the fifth anniversary of the fifth anniversary of the last one held here.

An exposition steering committee composed of fifteen citizens of this city and three to five citizens from each of the thirty towns and cities in the territory is now being formed and work on arrangements and program for the coming event will get under way at once. While nothing definite in the way of a program has been done yet, it was announced that it would be devoted to the entertainment and education of the people of our section. It was indicated that the program would include former Governor Alfred E. Smith, and Will Rogers or equally prominent personages and entertainers.

A committee composed of G. V. Smith, N. G. Bartlett and Representatives E. G. Flanagan and J. W. Holmes will extend the invitation to Governor Smith at Raleigh next Monday. Other features of the exposition will be the usual senior and junior queens' contest, popular dance orchestras and other entertainers of prominence.

MUCH INTEREST IS MANIFEST IN MOVE FOR BANK

Large Number Depositors Already Signed Agreement Necessary to Open Bank

Further reports from the committee working on the plan for the organization of a new bank here to take over the National Bank indicate that the work is progressing rapidly and a large number of depositors are showing their eagerness to co-operate by signing the agreement. Under the plan outlined depositors will be guaranteed seventy-five per cent of the amount of their deposits paid in four equal annual installments with further provision that should the collections from the assets of the National Bank total more than the seventy-five per cent the balance will also be paid the depositors until the full hundred per cent of deposits with interest has been paid.

The plan has met with favor on the part of the depositors and apparently it is just a matter of getting in touch with all of them to put the proposition across.

In order to save time various stations in the town and county have been designated where depositors can call and have the proposition explained to them and can sign the necessary blanks. In giving the list of these stations in yesterday's paper we failed to state in addition to the stations named at Winville, Ayden, Bethel, Grimesland and Fountain, communities would also be designated within the next few days.

INDIAN WOMAN IS ACQUITTED

Lila Jimerson Twice Tried for Murder of Mrs. Clotilde Marchand, Is Released

Buffalo, N. Y., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Lila Jimerson, Cayuga Indian woman, twice tried for the murder of Mrs. Clotilde Marchand last March was acquitted today by a Supreme court jury.

The jury brought in its verdict at 10:47 a. m., after having been locked up overnight. The case was given the jury at 4:50 p. m., yesterday.

The trial began February 16 and two and one half days were spent in obtaining the jury.

The state contended the woman once known as "Red Lila" of the Cayuga Indians, had instigated the murder of Mrs. Clotilde Marchand, artist and husband of the murdered woman.

The defense introduced testimony to prove that Lila had no knowledge of the crime either before or after its commission and that others had motives, at least equally strong for desiring the death of Mrs. Marchand.

Gov. Smith Will Go To Raleigh to Make Speech

Centerville, Md., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Former Governor Alfred E. Smith, of New York, plans to leave Mosley Hall, the home here of John J. Raskob, Sunday night for Raleigh, N. C., where he will address the North Carolina Legislature Monday.

The 1928 Democratic presidential candidate is spending the week-end with Mr. Raskob, chairman of the Democratic national committee.

He has been invited also to address the Georgia and South Carolina General Assemblies. He announced, however, he would be unable to accept the South Carolina invitation.

Negro Arrested For Murder of Wallace Man

Goldboro, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Sheriff D. S. Williamson of Duplin county has gone to White Plains, N. Y., to bring back Pete Teashee, negro, charged with the murder of James H. Boney of Wallace, in April 1929.

Teashee, accused of shooting Boney with the latter's own gun while another negro held him, was recognized in White Plains by a former Duplin county man.

The negro is to be taken to the state prison at Raleigh to be held until Duplin Superior court convenes in July.

Former Employees of New York World To Publish Paper

New York, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Former employees of the New York World, which was purchased yesterday by the Scripps-Howard interests and consolidated with the New York Telegram, wish to lease or purchase the plant and equipment of the World and publish their own newspaper, their spokesman said today.

VETS TAKING ADVANTAGE OF LOAN MEASURE

Thousands of Ex-soldiers Obtained New Loans On Certificates Today

The mobilization rush of '18 has its peacetime counterpart today in a rush of veterans all over the land to borrow 50 per cent of their adjusted service certificates as authorized by Congress yesterday.

More than 20,000 stormed the doors of the 54 regional offices of the United States Veterans Bureau during the first hour of business today, and the file increased hourly.

The New York regional office was forced to call police reserves to flush teleggrams to Civil Service disabilities to report at once for duty.

Charlotte, Feb. 28.—(AP)—North Carolina veterans of the world war will benefit by approximately \$20,000,000 under the new veterans relief bill ratified by Congress yesterday.

J. S. Pittman, manager of the regional veterans bureau here, estimated today that 61,000 compensation certificates are held in this state with an approximate loan value of \$61,000,000, an average of \$1,000 each.

The loan value, under the new law, is in the neighborhood of \$30,000,000 and Pittman estimates it will be called upon to lend about 75 per cent of the total, or between \$23,000,000 and \$24,000,000.

This will be reduced to \$20,000,000 by subtraction of approximately \$4,000,000 already borrowed by veterans under the old compensation law.

Washington, Feb. 28.—(AP)—By mail and at the paying windows of the Veterans Bureau thousands of ex-soldiers today obtained new loans against their service certificates.

The law, making available half the face value of each certificate at 4-1/2 per cent interest, went into effect yesterday as the Senate joined the House in overwhelming the veto of President Hoover.

Immediately the Veterans Bureau put its forces at work paying out money. One check to a veteran was in the mail five minutes after the Senate completed its 76 to 17 vote overriding the veto. Within an hour 400 were out and the total reached the thousand mark by nightfall. This from the Washington office. The 54 regional offices were notified to go into action and \$17,750,000 of funds on hand was dispatched them to meet the checks.

President Hoover announced everything would be done to facilitate carrying out the law now in effect, notwithstanding the objections to it. He requested Administrator Hines to give veterans in need priority.

Hines took to the radio last night to call upon veterans throughout the country to let those most in need submit their applications first. He urged them also not to borrow unless necessary, pointing out the loans cut into the certificate value as paid-up endowment policies.

A veteran borrowing \$500 now on a \$1,000 certificate, he said, would only 74.03 coming to him at the 1945 maturity.

The new statute involves a potential outlay of about \$17,000,000. If only the needy, as their number is estimated on the basis of a survey in the larger cities, were to borrow, President Hoover said the drain on the Treasury might be limited to 10 per cent of the total, or \$170,000,000.

Under the system effected at President Hoover's request, veterans showing certification of their need from veterans organizations and the various relief organizations dealing with unemployment, will get first attention.

New York, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today 4 to 6 points lower in response to relatively easy Liverpool cables reports of a decline in Egyptian cotton, week-end realizing or liquidation and some southern selling.

Offerings were comparatively light, however, and appeared to be readily taken by covering and further trade buying which was said to include some buying of May for Japanese account. May contracts after selling off to 11.23 at the start, rallied to 11.29 while October sold up from 11.74 to 11.80, with the market holding about net unchanged at the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables reported continued buying and trade calling in that market supplied by Bombay selling and some selling on the weakness in Egyptian. Egyptian achemounie in the Alexandria futures market were 53 to 70 points lower while there was a decline of 95 to 110 points in Sakellaris. The amount of cotton on shipboard awaiting clearance at U. S. ports at the close of business yesterday was estimated at 132,000 bales against 135,000 last year.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The rail shares, which pulled the stock market up from the low levels of last December, dragged it down today, but strong support appeared in the final dealings, and much of the loss was recovered.

Drops of 1 to 5 points in the carrier issues were accompanied by numerous declines of 1 to 4 in other sections of the list, particularly the utilities, but the principal industrial were well supported, and a few closed with small gains.

The rails had made little upward progress in the utility and industrial divisions, and with the bulk of the January net operating income reports now in, and in the main discouraging, the close of the month found this group susceptible to bear selling. The list as a whole closed irregularly lower, with a somewhat heavy tone, and transfers for the two-hour session aggregated 1,700,000 shares.

New York Central was a heavy feature, with its report for January showing net of only \$1,872,100, against \$5,009,582 in the like month of 1930. The stock dropped more than 5 points, but closed off only a little more than 3 net. Net operating income for the first 67 roads reporting for January shows a shrinkage of 37.3-10 per cent from the like period of last year.

New Haven dropped 3, but recovered all but a fraction. Baltimore and Ohio, regained half of an extreme loss of 3. Rails closing a point or more lower included Erie, Pennsylvania, Chesapeake and Ohio, and Chicago and Northwest, while Norfolk and Western dropped 5.

Other shares closing about a point or more down included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, Standard of California, Westinghouse, Sears, and Pullman. Auburn lost 2.

The local reactions were strong features, both Interboro and Brook-

lyn-Manhattan gaining 3 points. General Railway Signal gained 2, and Paramount, American Smelting and Anaconda closed up about a point. General Electric, Radio and American Telephone were up fractionally at the finish.

The week-end business and trade reviews reported only moderate or slight gains during the past few days, and with business reaching the season of its usual peak activity, stock traders were inclined to tread cautiously until the trends of March become more clearly defined.

Tennessee, the first team to whip Alabama during the regular campaign just ended, yesterday put an abrupt end to the crimson's hope for a second successive cage championship. The Vols won 26 to 20, after a late drive led by Bobby Dodd had enabled them to overtake an early Bama lead.

Georgia, the pre-tournament favorite, was ready for the second day's play, but only after a terrible scare from Washington and Lee. Georgia 32 to 31, but it needed a great last period finish, plus an overtime attack to nose out the Generals.

All of yesterday's games were marked by close contests. North Carolina barely beat Vanderbilt 23 to 21; Duke had a hard time with Clemson 31 to 27; Auburn needed its full offensive to repulse Virginia 33 to 25 and Kentucky beat N. C. State 33 to 24 largely by its accuracy from the foul line as the Raleigh Red Terrors scored more field goals.

Louisiana State furnished one of the surprises by chasing Maryland to the tape before bowing 37 to 33, while Florida also caused a mild upset by downing Georgia Tech 53 to 48.
