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DEMOCRATS ALL SMILES AFTER CLASH

Leave Committee Meeting at Washington With Harmony Predominating

Washington, March 6.—(AP)—For better or for worse, the issue of prohibition was etched today in the forefront of Democratic party affairs.

On the crest of a furious storm which shook the meeting of the Democratic national committee, Chairman Raskob yesterday threw down the prohibition gauntlet, calling upon the party to espouse a plan of state liquor control. He named it the "home rule" plan.

A roar of denunciation followed applause. Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the 1928 vice-presidential candidate, at the top of his stentorian voice repudiated the whole Raskob platform. Cordell Hull, of Tennessee, ex-representative, now senator and once chairman of the national committee, took Raskob to task for bringing up the one issue on which the party would divide. Senator Cameron Morrison of North Carolina, joined in, calling for the party of "Joe Robinson and Jack Garner."

Alfred E. Smith, standard bearer two years ago, chided his Arkansas running mate for "jumping all over Raskob."

"If the chairman," he said, "is going to be dragged around the lot because he expressed his opinion, we'd better stop talking and abandon free speech."

Representative Mary T. Norton, of New Jersey, who nominated Robinson at Houston and is an active seeker of modification, took her turn at "jumping all over" the senator, accusing him of changing his position since Houston.

Back and forth was flung the charge that the two sides were giving aid and comfort to the Republicans.

Smith's speech, demanded from the floor, was somewhat of a quieting influence.

"I am sorry to think that my old time traveling companion and political sparring partner," he said, "is going off here today without an understanding of what was said by our chairman."

"No one has said anything about repeal. In fact, something was said against repeal. As far as the principles enunciated by Mr. Raskob are concerned, I want to say I never heard of them until today and I'm not sure that I'm for them all."

Finally, James M. Cox, "1920's Presidential nominee, wound up with an appeal for a united front and for consideration of differences between north and south on prohibition.

In the end, with Raskob still insisting he would ask the next session of the committee—in December January—to go on record on his smiles, the meeting broke up in smiles, with harmony the objective of all groups. But the lobby talk afterward ranged from expressions that disaster had been averted only narrowly, to assertions that the air had been cleared to the general good.

The session's final act was approval of a financial program to raise a total of \$6,000,000 for liquidation of the present \$600,000 debt. Renunciation of the party headquarters since 1922 and financing the Presidential campaign of that year. "It is to be raised by a commercial fund raising concern."

Concord, March 6.—(AP)—Two small girls, daughters of A. W. Brumley, a postoffice employee, were dragged from their beds by an unidentified negro early today. Their screams frightened the negro away before they were harmed. The negro entered their bed room through a window and unscrewed the bulb in a central light before seizing the girls. The elder girl, 14, switched on a bed lamp and cried out and the negro ran. Police put bloodhounds on the negro's trail, but they lost it. Half a dozen negroes were being held for questioning this morning. The Brumley home is near the center of the city.

Offer Reward of \$50 for Arrest and Conviction of False Alarmists; Set Up Machinery for Municipal Election On May 4; Other Matters Disposed of

Eternal warfare has been declared against false fire alarms in the City of Greenville.

The battle was started last night at the regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen when a motion was adopted to offer a reward of \$50 for the arrest and conviction of parties responsible for the sending in of false alarms.

The action was precipitated when the attention of the board was called to the four false alarms reported last month and the additional expense incurred by the fire department in responding to alarms, whether false or not.

Mayor Lanier told the board that the sending in of a false alarm was classified as a misdemeanor and was punishable by a fine of \$500, two years imprisonment or both.

He said the law would be strictly enforced and urged everybody to be on the alert to bring about the apprehension of the alarmists.

Aside from this matter, the aldermen set up machinery for the municipal election to be held on May 4 and completed a considerable amount of other business affecting the life of the city government.

Harvey Ward was appointed registrar for the election and was authorized to recopy the registration book which had been pretty well marked up during the past elections. He was allowed the sum of \$75.00 for the work.

City Clerk Reid Gaskins was authorized to publish a notice calling attention of the public to the election. A mayor and five members of the board are to be elected.

L. W. Tucker was re-elected a member of the Water and Light Commission for a term of four years.

E. B. Thomas was again awarded the contract for tax listing at a price of \$240.

The question of preserving the trees of the city came up for discussion again last night, and Mayor Lanier informed the aldermen that he had conferred with the manager of the local telephone company and had received assurance that the company would co-operate with the city in its effort to prevent the mutilation of trees. It was said that employees of the company would be instructed to co-operate in every way and not to damage the trees any more than possible.

WOULD DEFEAT RASKOB PLAN

Sheppard Asks Democrats to Prevent Prohibition Getting In Platform

Washington, March 6.—(AP)—An appeal for all Democrats, wet or dry, to unite in a movement to defeat the suggestion of Chairman Raskob for a party platform propping state control of liquor was issued today by Senator Sheppard of Texas, a dry leader.

Sheppard issued his appeal in a formal statement after Senator Caraway, Democrat, Arkansas, asserted that Raskob had "lined up" on economic issues "with the extreme stand part portion of the Republican party."

The Texan characterizing the program which Raskob named "the home rule plan" as "wet," urged the Democratic party to devote itself to "the overthrow of rapacity monopoly and greed."

"The dissension which occurred at the recent meeting of the Democratic National committee when Raskob proposed his wet plank is but a feeble forerunner of what will happen if he succeeds in securing the recommendations he desires," Sheppard said.

"Raskob has announced his intention to call at some later date for a vote by the National Democratic committee on his recommendation for a wet plank in the next National Democratic platform."

"I appeal to all Democrats, wet or dry, to unite in a movement to defeat this suggestion in order that our party may devote its undivided energies to the overthrow of rapacity, monopoly and greed in this republic. Such an overthrow is the supreme mission of the Democratic party."

YOUTH DENIES SLAYING HIS SWEETHEART

Virgil Kirkland Defends Himself In Murder Case At Valparaiso

Valparaiso, Ind., March 6.—(AP)—Virgil Kirkland, 20 year old Gary youth, took the stand today to defend himself against charges that he attacked and slew Arlene Draves, his 18 year old high school sweetheart.

With flushed face and shining eyes Kirkland answered the preliminary questions put to him by Barratt O'Hara of defense counsel. Facing him across the courtroom were brothers and sisters of Arlene and his own mother. Within a few arms lengths was Charles Draves father of Arlene.

Kirkland for the first time during the trial faced those who loved him and those who say only his life will atone for his loss.

Tears came to Kirkland's eyes at the first mention of Arlene Draves' name, when O'Hara said:

"Were you acquainted with Arlene Draves," adding quickly as the boy put his hands to his eyes: "Brace up, Virgil, and tell the judge and jury where you met Arlene."

The meeting was at a Gary dance hall, Arlene was leaning against a radiator when Kirkland entered.

"She appealed to me and I asked her for a dance. I asked her for a date but she said her folks insisted that she not date anybody until she was older."

Arlene was 15 then and the accused youth 17.

Several times O'Hara had to encourage his witness, who could scarcely keep back the tears.

"Brace up, boy, brace up," added O'Hara after asking him to tell of the first time "Arlene kissed you."

Kirkland broke down completely and O'Hara asked for a recess when the defendant was asked if he loved Arlene.

"Courts, I did," the boy sobbed. Prosecutor John Underwood objected to the detailed revelation and the judge cautioned the examiner to hold his questions to relevant matter.

"Why, Mr. Underwood, this young love is the most important thing in this case," asserted Mr. O'Hara.

Kirkland, crying and sobbing at times, told hesitatingly on an alleged voluntary relationship with Arlene Draves at the fatal "whoop" party.

Kirkland contended the girl was conscious when she went with him and two other young men to the hot dog stand. The prosecution claimed she was unconscious and in that state was attacked by the three youths.

He said the girl fell out of a porch chair while he was avowing his love. This injury was accidental, the defense holds; the state that Kirkland knocked her down.

Gov. Roosevelt Increases Interest In Gordon Murder

New York, March 6.—(AP)—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt's interest in the strangling of Vivian Gordon, vice first informant, infused new life into the hunt for her slayers today.

The governor revealed at Albany that District Attorney Charles J. McLaughlin sent him a report on the case a week ago, adding that he had not requested it. He refused to say whether he would sponsor a state investigation and authorities here were equally reticent concerning his plans.

RESIGNATION OF FARM HEAD IS ACCEPTED

Pres. Hoover Puts Stamp Of Approval On Action of Alexander Legge

Washington, March 6.—(AP)—President Hoover has accepted the resignation of Alexander P. Legge as chairman of the Farm Board.

Mr. Hoover plans to make a formal announcement later in the day. It could not be learned whether he would announce Legge's successor then.

Vice-chairman Stone has been often mentioned as the next chairman. Legge sent his resignation to the White House nearly two weeks ago. President Hoover is understood to have attempted to persuade him to remain another year.

Yesterday Legge conferred with President Hoover for more than an hour.

The resignation creates the first of four vacancies expected soon on the Farm Board.

C. C. Teague, representing fruits and vegetables, has an understanding with the President that he may retire as soon as his office affairs are in shape. His term expired last June and he accepted reappointment on condition he be permitted to return to his extensive fruit and nut interests in California about the middle of 1931.

The terms of Sam R. McKelvie, representing grain, and William F. Schilling, representing dairy interests, expire on June 15. McKelvie has announced his intention of managing a 4,000 acre ranch in Nebraska.

The personnel on which the new Farm Board membership will be built includes James C. Stone, of Kentucky, representing tobacco. He is vice-chairman and has been recommended by Legge to succeed to the chairmanship.

Others are C. B. Denham, of Missouri, representing livestock; Carl Williams of Oklahoma, cotton; and Charles Wilson of New York, fruits and vegetables.

Former Edgecombe Sheriff Sentenced To the Penitentiary

Tarboro, March 6.—(AP)—Former Sheriff John D. Lancaster, of Edgecombe county, convicted of embezzling \$11,500 of public funds, today was under a sentence of two to six years in state prison.

A jury in Superior court here found the former official guilty yesterday after several hours of deliberations.

Defense attorneys filed notice of appeal, and Judge W. C. Harris, presiding, set the appeal bond at \$5,000.

New Monoplane To Undergo Test Today

Burbank, Cal., March 6.—(AP)—With one speed mark already to the credit of its sister ship, a swift monoplane which may assault other air records waited in a hangar here today for Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh.

Embodiment of a combined retractable landing gear-streamlining feature that is the product of the flying colonel's brain, a trim Lockheed Sirius plane proved its mettle yesterday in the first long test flight made since the Lindbergh idea was adopted.

With Vance Breese, test pilot, at its controls, the ship sped from Oakland to Burbank—estimated 355 miles airline—in one hour and 33 minutes, lowering the previous mark of the hop almost 20 minutes and averaging 229 miles per hour.

A similar plane with a higher powered engine is awaiting Colonel Lindbergh's pleasure at the plant here.

"Colonel Lindbergh can go after any of the commercial records now, if he cares to," Breese said. "With better weather conditions it would have made faster time."

The Lindbergh-planned ship has a longer wing spread than standard makes. The landing gear is drawn up after the take off, into the low wing of the monoplane by means of a crank turned in the pilot's cockpit.

Ask Gardner To Turn Over N. C. Ballot Boxes

Washington, March 6.—(AP)—The Senate Elections subcommittee named to hear the contest against the election of Senator Bailey of North Carolina today, requested Governor Gardner to take steps to turn over the ballot boxes in the last election to the investigators here.

The governor was requested to direct the State Legislature to instruct the election officials to transmit the election material to Washington.

This was the same procedure adopted in the Alabama contest which former Senator Heflin has brought against Senator Bankhead, although in the latter case the Senate adopted a resolution calling on the State Legislature to act.

In the North Carolina contest, the sub-committee acted in the belief it had the power to impound the boxes without the Senate having passed a resolution.

Senator Bailey appeared before the sub-committee today and promised to co-operate.

Former Representative Prichard, Republican, brought the contest against Bailey, charging "illegal practices, gross frauds, and irregularities" in the election.

Rule Banks Waive Collection Rights On Old Vet Loans

Washington, March 6.—(AP)—Banks increasing loans to veterans from the 22-1-2 per cent of the old law to the present 50 per cent of certificates' face value, waive their collection rights on the old paper.

The Veterans Bureau decided today a bank could not issue a new note for half the certificate's value, covering an old loan and present it immediately for collection.

Bureau officials explained the regulation requiring banks to hold the notes for six months before submitting them for collection remains in force. The combined loans in a new note are considered as a new loan, eligible for collection six months after issuance.

The Federal Reserve Board has advised Administrator Hines that simplified instructions have been issued to member banks to expedite handling loans.

Bandits Captured By Posse In Fla.

Milton, Fla., March 6.—(AP)—Four bandits who terrorized Western Florida yesterday and last night were captured in a swamp near Mulat, Florida, shortly before noon today.

The quartet, two men and two women were brought to the jail here by Chief Deputy Sheriff W. H. Cobb, of Santa Rosa county and a posse of more than 22 men.

They gave their names as Dex Hayes, Bert Olesby, Mable Wertz and Fay Harris.

Deputy Cobb said the bandits were captured in a swamp about four miles from where the automobile in which they had last taken flight was found last night.

They were armed with three revolvers but there was no rifle as had been reported.

PRES. HOOVER TO VISIT SON

Will Spend Sunday At Asheville, Returning to Capital City Monday

Asheville, March 6.—(AP)—This city was buzzing with excitement today at the prospect of entertaining the chief executive of the nation over the week-end.

President Hoover announced last night in Washington he planned to come to Asheville Sunday to visit his son, Herbert Hoover, Jr., who is here resting and recovering his health.

Although the visit was to be purely a personal one—that of father to a son he has not seen for several months—Asheville citizens immediately set about plans to show the President every courtesy possible and make the journey a pleasant one.

Blue Briar cottage on Sunset mountain will be the President's destination. There his son, attacked by incipient tuberculosis, took up his residence last fall to win back his health.

The remarkable success he has achieved is attested by the fact he has since he came here, gained more than 15 pounds in weight and banished practically all appearance of illness.

Recently, with the assistance of his medical attende, he installed an amateur broadcasting station to furnish an outlet for his regained strength and energy. A radio engineer by profession, he has spent many hours operating the station since its installation.

The visit of the President will be the first to his son's Asheville cottage, but Mrs. Hoover, who is expected to accompany him, has been to Asheville since her son came here.

The journey, however, will bring the chief executive to North Carolina for the second time within six months. The first was made to King's Mountain where on October 7, he delivered an address at the Sesqui-Centennial celebration of the revolutionary battle of King's Mountain.

Examiners Report Huge Shortage In Wilmington Bank

Raleigh, March 6.—(AP)—Examiners of the now defunct Home Savings Bank of Wilmington discovered an alleged shortage of \$188,573.90, a report filed with the State Banking Department here today disclosed.

Officials of the State Banking Department said the total shortage in the bank's funds was subject to modification later.

No allocation of amounts of the shortage charged to any one of the three officials of the bank, who are now facing criminal charges in connection with the closing of the institution, was made.

J. F. Roache, vice-president and cashier; M. Douglas Clark, assistant cashier; and Marion D. Armstrong, assistant cashier, were placed under arrest at the time the institution closed, charged with making false entries.

Senate Adopts Joint Resolution To Require All New Bills To Be Introduced Prior To March 10; House Receives Bill To Prevent Convict Labor Working In Competition To Free Labor; Gardner Approves Seawall Banking Bill

Raleigh, March 6.—(AP)—North Carolina's first frank and open legislative fight by railroads against bus companies advanced another step today when the House passed the Newman bill.

Under the measure much stricter regulation than is now in force is imposed on buses and trucks operating on the highways of the state.

The battle had its first inning in committee room, when rail attorneys appeared in favor of the bill.

Taking note of the passage of the bill, the Senate today adopted a joint resolution to require that all new bills be introduced prior to March 10.

The House got a bill today to prohibit the working of convict labor in the state in competition with free labor.

Commissioner of Agriculture W. A. Graham, appeared before the re-organization committee this morning to protest against making his office appointive, as is proposed in an administration bill.

Governor Gardner today announced his support of the Seawall banking bill, to create a new state department of banking independent of the Corporation Commission.

The Senate sent the Wheelbee-Nixon bill to set up a state insurance fund to administer the workmen's compensation act to its appropriations committee. The measure bears a favorable report of the Senate insurance group.

Representative Newman of New Hanover led the fight for his bill, asserting that "most of the teeth" in his original measure had been extracted by the committee.

"There is nothing intended in this bill to give the bus companies preference over railroads or railroads preference over bus companies," he said.

An amendment by Moss of Nash that the effect of the bill should not be to increase rates to the extent they will be injurious to shippers of the state was accepted.

The vote was unanimous.

The Newman measure dealt only with regulation, rates and hours of work of bus operators and the House immediately took up the substitute for the White bill which regulates the size of buses.

The joint finance committee was prepared to stay in session this afternoon and tonight with a hope of reaching some definite agreement as to ways and means to raise \$13,000,000 for schools. They voted yesterday to waive all hearings in order to speed consideration of this matter.

An "exploring" committee yesterday reported a plan which includes two alternate sales tax proposals and additional taxes on power companies, railroads and telegraph companies, designed to bring in the needed thirteen million.

If the "explorers" plan is adopted, the finance committee can report a revenue bill including \$19,500,000 for schools. The bill as it now stands provides for the raising of \$6,500,000 for schools.

The estimated cost of running the six months state supported school term which the House has approved, is \$18,000,000. The remaining \$1,500,000 will be used as an equalizing fund for extended terms in poorer counties.

The two sales tax plans were offered by Senator Hinsdale, of Wake, and Representative Day, of Onslow.

Hinsdale's bill levies a "commodity" sales tax and is estimated to raise \$7,000,000. Representative Day's plan, a "gross sales tax" on retail merchants is estimated to raise \$9,000,000. If the Hinsdale plan is adopted, the "exploring" committee has suggested a public utility tax to make up for the \$2,000,000 difference between it and the Day plan.

New Duck Speed Record

Washington.—(AP)—A new speed record for migrating ducks is reported by the United States biological survey. A mallard duck, banded November 23, 1930, at Green Bay, Wis., was killed five days later near Georgetown, S. C.

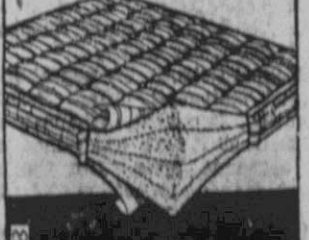

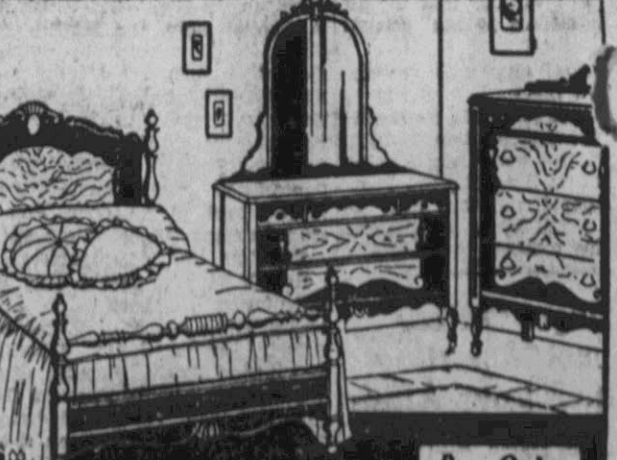

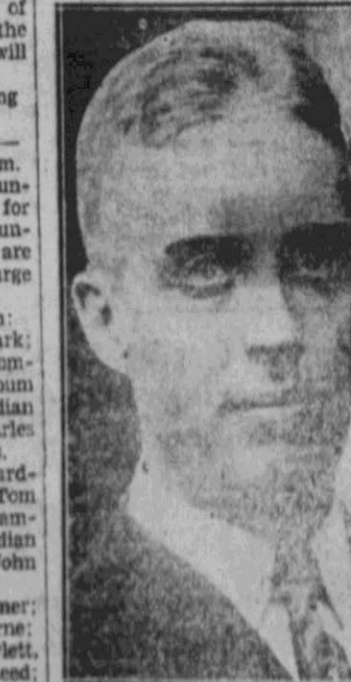

Salt Lake City.—(AP)—Marion Ryan, University of Utah, co-ed, earned her way through school the winter by driving a horse-drawn snow plow over the sidewalks.

Seated in a narrow cockpit. Bull will operate the boat from a small switchboard, from which electrical wires run to the rockets, packed on either side. A rudder bar, similar to that in an airplane, enables the pilot to steer with his feet.

Unlike the German car, which carried its rockets in the rear, the boat will be pulled instead of pushed by the exploding rockets.

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RADIO CITY IS PLANNED FOR METROPOLIS

Rockefeller Plans Tivantic Development At Cost of \$250,000,000

New York, March 6.—(AP)—A glittering city within a city; a development covering three square blocks; the birth of a new architecture; a wedding of radio, the stage and business—such is the \$250,000,000 project of John D. Rockefeller, Jr.

As a plaster model of "radio city" revealed under a spotlight last night, the first definite plans for its construction were announced. Work will start in June on a mid-town site bounded by 5th Avenue, 6th Avenue, 48th street and 51st street. The first units will be ready for occupancy in the fall of 1932 and the completed project is scheduled for 1934. S. L. Rothafel (Rox) will be the first "mayor."

There will be nine separate buildings, demanding 125,000 tons of structural steel and 28,000 windows. Their soaring walls and challenging towers will be reared in what the designers call the "New York style." There will be a central plaza dotted with splashing fountains and brilliant shrubbery. There will be shops ministering to every human need.

Towering over all else will be the new home of the National Broadcasting company, the largest man-made structure ever planned. Though not as tall as the Empire State building, its 68 stories will contain 150,000 more feet of floor space, 2,000,000 in all. On one side it will exhibit 675 feet of unbroken wall—on the other it will present the appearance of an obelisk with a touch of Egyptian or sarcophagus lines. It will house 30 broadcasting studios, equipped to handle television as it is perfected.

Flanking the center building will be two office skyscrapers, 45 stories in height and identical in design. On the ground floor of one will be the R. K. O. vaudeville theatre and in the other the R. K. O. motion picture theatre. Completing the ensemble will be an oval building, fourteen stories high and contrasting in its rounded symmetry with the sharp angles and sheer walls overshadowing it.

Space for the most complete opera house in the world has been reserved. Originally included in the plans, the Metropolitan Opera company tentatively withdrew in disagreement over details. A final decision awaits the return to the city of R. Fulton Cutting, chairman of the board.

DISSEASE KILLS FIRST VICTIM IN 30 YEARS

Rochester, Eng.—(AP)—A rare skin disease, which last caused a death in England more than 30 years ago, brought death to George Douglas Dow here. Medical evidence at the inquest showed that the cause of death was pemphigus, a scratch on his thumb. An ulcer formed and the infection spread.

Pemphigus is a skin eruption in which large blisters occur.

Russell, Ill., March 6.—(AP)—A few boys from Russell, Ill., a station on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul and Pacific made page one because train robbers picked it as the scene for their \$2,000,000 hold-up.

But Russell, a neighboring hamlet on the same line, went Round-out one better today by getting on page one because there wasn't any robbery, and that's hard to do.

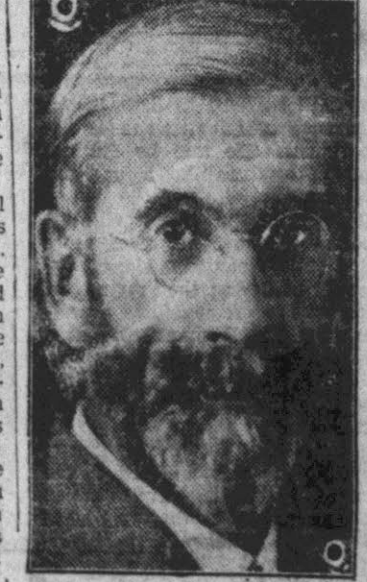

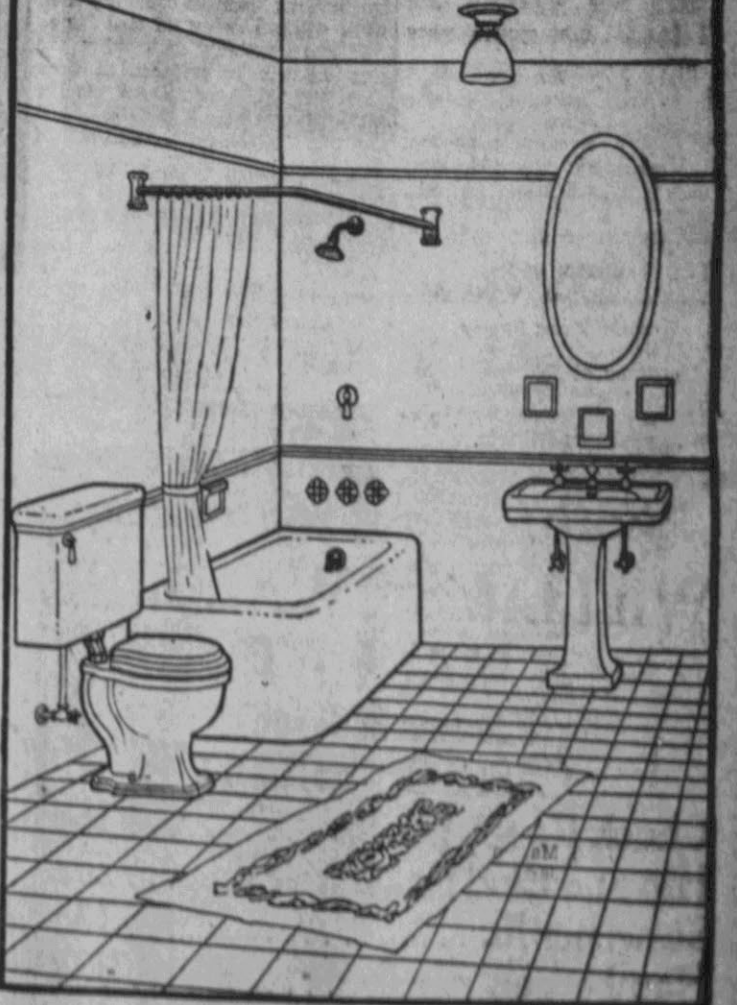

With a reward of fifty dollars offered for information leading to arrest and conviction of the party or parties responsible for Greenville's recent series of false alarms maybe this foolish practice will stop even if no arrests are made. At least the city authorities are in dead earnest about this matter and they are determined to break up this business of false fire alarms. Mayor Lanier has announced that he is going to give the limit sentence to any person convicted in his court on this charge. In addition to proving costly these false fire alarms are a menace and it is to be hoped that this effort to stamp them out will accomplish its purpose.

As was expected Representative Flanagan did not get far with his resolution to cut the pay of legislators but it did bring out one fact—that it's a whole lot easier to prescribe for others than to take some of the medicine yourself. At least the action of the legislators in quickly killing the measure would indicate that fact.

If you haven't procured your city automobile license tag, you'd better get busy. Officers are making a round of our streets checking up on cars not carrying the 1931 tags. Get yours now and save yourself some embarrassment as well as the extra cost that might be added should court action be taken against you for operating your car without proper licenses.

ABOUT TOWN

Democrats who were trying to prevent a renaissance of the liquor controversy in this country had their hopes blasted yesterday when Chairman Raskob proposed that the national committee sponsor a movement for state control of the liquor question in the next Presidential election.

It was just like applying a match to some highly inflammable material and the committee found itself engaged in one of the bitterest debates in years.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, long an advocate of national prohibition, bitterly resented the suggestion by the party chairman, and declared "You cannot write on the banner of the Democratic party the skull and crossbones emblematic of an outlawed trade and expect the party to accept your recommendations without resistance."

He declared further "that this is a subject on which both political parties are divided, and the only hope of the Republican party for victory is to rely on the lack of wisdom of those who lead the Democratic party."

In addition to his pronouncement on the prohibition question Raskob asserted that the "Democratic party should rededicate itself to make it one of all the people and a Liberal party."

It is difficult to determine what the chairman means by the term liberal, but if it implies a determination to tear asunder prohibition by opening up a way for the "wets" to demand more detrimental changes, his suggestion most assuredly will be received with nausea by members of his party.

Nobody will deny that the 18th amendment has its imperfections but there are those who realize that these are few compared with the inestimable advantages derived from its enforcement.

Mr. Raskob has started the ball to rolling in what undoubtedly will make the next Presidential election one of the most spectacular the nation has seen in many a day.

The Blount bill to require a state-wide drivers' license for all motor vehicle operators was reported favorably to the Senate yesterday, and the public will look on expectantly as the legislators determine whether or not the measure will be enacted into law.

The bill is meeting with considerable opposition because of the fact that it will mean additional expense to the automobile drivers, while on the other hand it is being heartily supported by those who believe that the financial consideration involved in obtaining a license is insignificant compared with the reduction of the loss of life which assuredly would result from the bill.

Human life cannot be valued from the standpoint of dollars and cents, and it is believed the legislators will realize the fact and accept the bill for its intrinsic value to the public generally.

Belvoir township is to be provided with a new school building to replace the one destroyed by fire several months ago. We are told that the structure will be more modern than the former one and will take care of the needs of the community for years to come.

It was unfortunate that the township should lose the building at the time it did, but the department of education provided for the situation by transferring the majority of the students to other schools, thereby enabling them to complete their work without losing all that time.

Plans actually materialize the students will be installed in their new home at the opening of the fall term this year and Belvoir then can boast of the newest and one of the most up-to-date consolidated buildings in the county.

Money spent for schools is invested in a great cause and nobody will regret the eventualities that enable the Belvoir community to move up among the front ranks of the educational system from the standpoint of building and equipment.

Under-privileged children will form the basis of the discussion at

the regular meeting of the Kiwanis club Friday night, and the outcome of the deliberation of this important matter is being awaited with interest.

Not so long ago the Kiwanians approved a suggestion by the committee for the establishment of a clinic to provide medical attention and examination to the children of the indigent population of the county, and while plans so far have not been completely worked out it was believed they would assume more concrete form in the future.

In view of the fact that the children of today will be the citizens of tomorrow it is nothing but fitting and proper that an effort should be made to provide for their physical welfare, and anything the Kiwanians and other organizations of the city may accomplish in this connection will be that much done in behalf of increased longevity of the men and women of tomorrow.

The movement to expand activities among the under-privileged children is in an incipient stage at this time, but if the men and women who have the welfare of the poor at heart continue to hammer away they will be able to see definite results in much less time than expected. The proposed clinic most assuredly provides an advanced step in the realization of the dream for increasing the chance of service of the unfortunate children and the committee should not relinquish its efforts until the ambition becomes a glittering reality.

Elementary tendencies are the foundation of this plan for increasing the opportunities of the physically unfit and only good results should be the outcome.

Mayor Lanier explained the passage of legislation in the General Assembly that provided for the transfer of the present library site from the School Board to the City of Greenville. This action was agreed upon by the two boards prior to the erection of the Shepard Memorial Library, the site being a gift from the School Board to the city.

Alderman John Ivey Smith was complimented on the splendid condition of the new cemetery. He invited the aldermen to visit the cemetery and note the improvement which had been made from time to time. Alderman Smith was authorized to buy a lawn mower to replace the one now in use, it having been reported beyond repair.

G. V. Smith, president of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce and N. G. Bartlett, secretary, appeared before the board in behalf of the exposition to be held here April 27. Mr. Bartlett asked that the city take a double-page advertisement in the booklet to be assumed prior to the exposition, and the board agreed to do so.

The cost was \$60.
A motion was adopted to ask representatives of the county in the General Assembly to assist the city in obtaining reimbursement for paying in front of the Eastern Carolina Teachers college. The amount involved was approximately \$200. A request from the Parent-Teacher organization for paving in front of the Model school at the college was deferred for future consideration.

University, Va., March 6.—(AP)—Appointment of Edward R. "Butch" Slaughter, for the last four years line coach at North Carolina State College, to the coaching staff of the University of Virginia was announced today by James G. Driver, athletic director.

Coach Slaughter, a former Michigan all-American guard, will teach the Cavalier next fall. His selection completes the Virginia staff of coaches which includes Fred Dawson, formerly at Nebraska, as head coach; and Gus "Reb" Lett, of North Carolina State as backfield coach; and Gus Welch, Carlisle Indian captain and coach at Washington State, as scout and reserve coach.

Snowstorm Sweeps Western Fringe of Mississippi Valley

Kansas City, March 6.—(AP)—A March snowstorm, praised by wheat farmers, feared by cattlemen, swept into the western fringe of the Mississippi valley states today from the white capped peaks of the Rockies.

A brisk northwest wind bore the storm upon Nebraska, Kansas and Iowa, while its approach was heralded in other states of the region by rains, cloudy skies and falling temperatures.

Clearing skies were forecast today for Wyoming and Montana where the blizzard left a heavy blanket of snow. New Mexico was at the mercy of a snowstorm which reached blizzard-like proportions last night while Colorado was digging out from under huge drifts.

FIVE UPLAND ACRES YIELD RECORD SEVEN-BALE CROP

Summerville, Ga.—(AP)—Seven and a half bales of cotton on five acres is a good yield any year, in Georgia.

But in 1930 it was considered strikingly unusual when it occurred in the driest part of the state and on an upland farm.

Billy Reynolds, Chatoga county farmer, reported such a yield to score the highest record of 51 contestants in the Georgia five-acre cotton contest. His county agent, B. M. Drake, of Summerville is authority for the report.

Reynolds says a crop of sweet clover grown on the land the year before was partly responsible for the good yield.

Grain Not Cheap for Dairies

Durham, N. H.—(AP)—George L. Waugh, extension dairyman, University of New Hampshire, says that in spite of the fact that grain is \$3 a ton under last year's price, it is not cheap as compared to the present price of milk. He says 100 pounds of milk will buy less grain now than a year ago.

FIREPROOF SAFES TESTED IN HEAT OF 1,700 DEGREES

Washington.—(AP)—Conditions of a real fire are simulated in testing steel safes, to see how they protect their contents, at the Bureau of Standards.

The locked safe and contents are enclosed in a brick furnace and heated to a temperature of 1,700 degrees Fahrenheit for one hour.

Then the safe is hoisted and allowed to drop 30 feet. Replaced upside down in the furnace, the safe again undergoes the trial by fire.

New Orleans, March 6.—(AP)—Although the "Big Four" of their batting attack appears to have been reduced by one—Eddie Morgan having decided the box and crate industry needs him more than baseball—the Cleveland Indians will hit the American League war path next month with brighter prospects than they had a year ago.

Roger Peckinpaugh's tribe was good enough to pull up fourth in 1930, notwithstanding a scourge of injuries and the failure of Willis Hudlin to pitch winning ball. The casualties have recovered, Hudlin has announced ready to do a comeback, so Peck feels he has every right to be optimistic.

With the brilliant Eddie Morgan married, on his honeymoon and an avowed baseball deserter, there remains Johnny Hodapp, Earl Averill and Dick Porter to carry the batting burden. They were three of the most dangerous clubbers in the league last season. If Lew Fonseca, who will fill in for the errant Morgan at first, should regain his sticking form of two years ago, when he led the circuit, the Indians would have enough punch for all practical purposes. The uncertain strength at third base appears to be Peckinpaugh's greatest problem.

In Wes Ferrell, the youngster who has won 46 ball games his first two years up, the Indians have the foundation for a fairly strong mound staff. Ferrell was credited with 25 triumphs last season and was second only to the great Grove in that respect.

Clint Brown, Mel Harder, Walter Miller, Milburn Shoffner, Pete Jablonowski and Hudling are other veterans returning.

With Fonseca anxious to step into Morgan's big shoes at the initial corner and Hodapp back at second, the right side of the Indians' infield gives Peck no worry. Jonah Goldman, who looked great the latter part of '30, is tagged for the shortstop assignment. Johnny Burnett, a mild sensation until a broken arm laid him out last season, and George Detore, a 350 slugger from New Orleans, comprise the third-basing hopes.

Miami, Fla., March 6.—(AP)—The mystery of just how good Primo Carnera is as a heavyweight fighter was not much nearer solution today as a result of the celebration but financially unsuccessful battle of the cracked rib.

Nevertheless, the big fellow from Italy, as a result of gaining the referee's decision over Jimmy Maloney of Boston in a brisk ten round swiftest last night, successfully overcame disconcerting obstacles and moved in the general direction of a championship match later this year with the winner of the Stirling-Schmeling title contest.

They had everything but a stretch in Carnera's corner for the crowning touch to this winter's fistie flops under the palms. However, not a doctor or hypodermic needle was put into action, as the huge wild-swinging Italian alternately lumbered and danced, grunted and winced through ten rounds of erratic fisticuffing with the veteran Irishman.

Referee Elmer (Slim) McClelland of Detroit, showed no hesitation in lifting Carnera's glove in token of victory, basing his decision on Primo's aggressiveness and more effective punching—when the blows connected.

The crowd of perhaps 20,000 spectators, occupying less than two-fifths of the Madison Square Garden Stadium, disagreed violently with the verdict and remained for fully fifteen minutes to boo lustily.

It was a close fight on points, but the Associated Press score-sheet credited Maloney with five rounds and Carnera only three, with two others even. Scoring unofficially, Miami Boxing Commission judges favored Maloney on two sides of the ring but the majority of critics agreed with the official verdict.

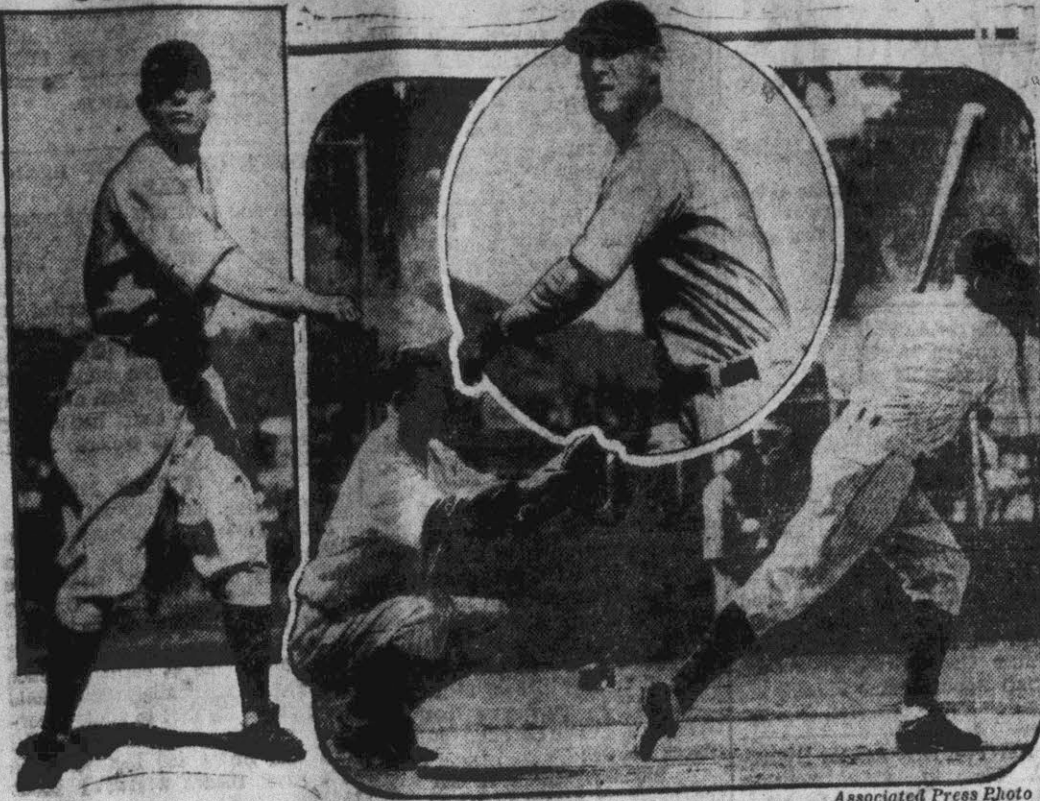
Maloney weighed 199 1/2 to Carnera's 273.

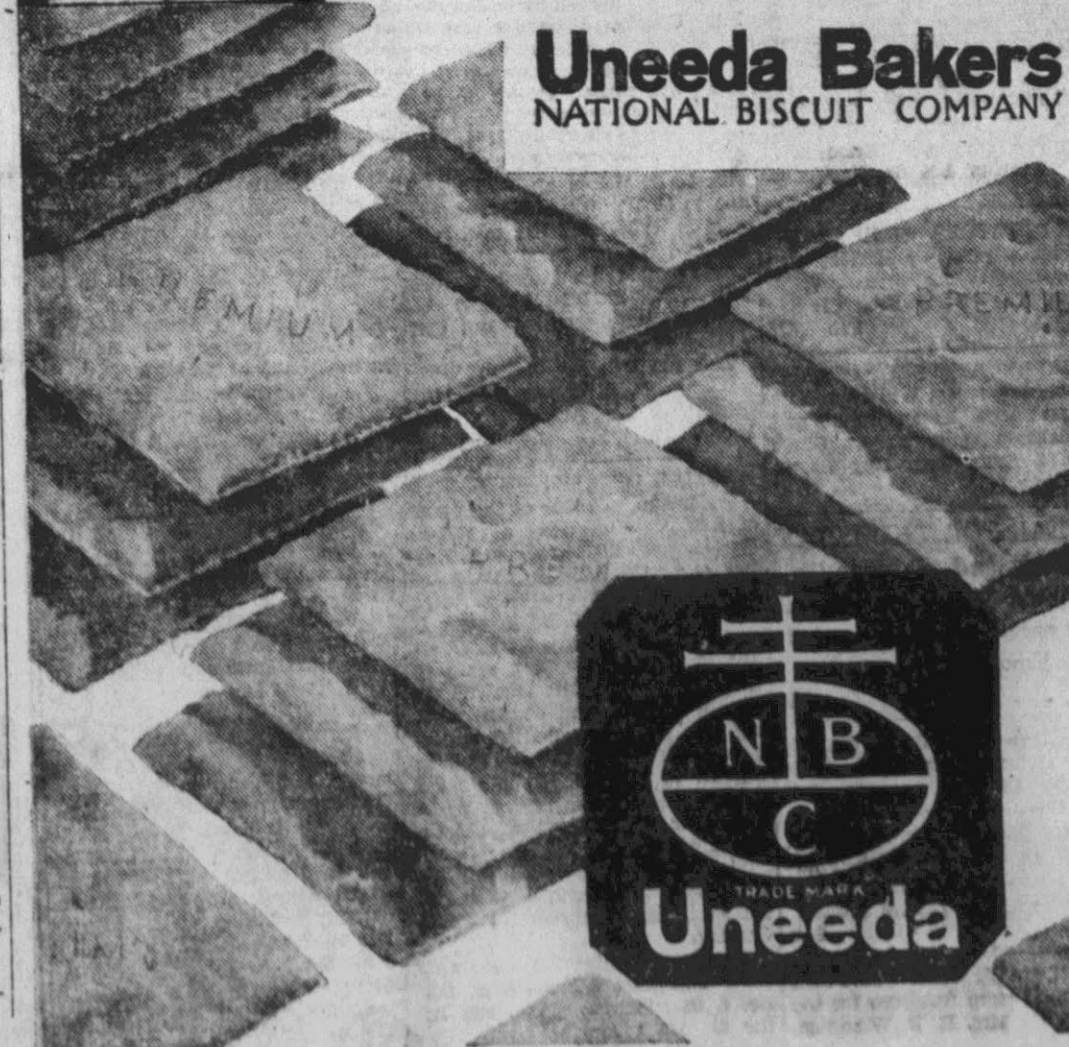

STOCK MARKET
New York, March 6.—(AP)—Trading in the stock market degenerated into a knock-out and drag-out battle between the bulls and bears today, with bears appearing to have a decided edge for the moment.

The market advanced a point or two in the early trading, dropped about 1 to 1 1/2 in the middle of the day, then recovered 1 to 4 in the early afternoon, only to start down again during the decline. Pool support appeared to have been temporarily withdrawn from some of the recent speculative rises, and some of the high priced issues were subjected to concentrated bear selling.

The early upturn represented a continuance of the bullish activity in the utilities and steel. Auburn, however, dropped steadily during the morning, getting down almost 15 points. It recovered 4, and declined again. Mullins, which had surged up violently of late, fell back more than 7. Allied Chemical dropped about 4 points, recovered, and again turned downward. Several shares lost 3 to 6, although many recovered a point or two later. They included American Telephone, Westinghouse Electric, Eastman, Macy, Case and Western Union. U. S. Steel and American Can lost about 1 and 2 points, then recovered.

Stilling of Auburn, which had surged up from a January low of 101 1/2 to a recent peak of 217 1/2, was presumably in part a response to publication of an unconfirmed report that the State Bureau of Securities was inquiring into the action of the stock. Mullins, lost a sizable fraction of its recent peak price of 35 3/4, had an even more spectacular rise, starting from a January low of 8 3/8.

Call money was firm at 1 1/2 percent, after yesterday's late rise to 2.

Tennessee Farmer Earns \$11 A Day From Poultry
Port Collins, Tenn.—(AP)—It isn't any farmer who can make \$11 a day from all his activities. But Mel R. Scott had a net profit of \$11.21 a day from his flock of 800 hens during November, he has reported. Scott averaged 507 eggs a day, which he marketed wholesale at 35 cents a dozen. He received a gross return of \$14.75, but his feed cost \$3.55 per day.

Scott devotes only one-tenth of his time to the care of the poultry. Last year during the same winter months, with 1,000 hens in his yard, Scott had a net profit of \$591 for November, or a clear cash income of \$19.75 daily including Sundays.

New Farm College Dean To Be Third In 44 Years
Madison, Wis.—(AP)—The deanship of the University of Wisconsin college of agriculture is one of long service.

When Chris L. Christensen, former executive secretary of the Federal Farm Board, assumed the chair this spring, he will be the third man in the college's 44-year history to serve as a dean.

Dr. William A. Henry, now living in California, was the first dean, taking office with the establishment of the college in 1887. He served until 1907 when he was succeeded by Dr. Harry L. Russell.
