EAKER BEGINS FLIGHT ACROSS UNITED STATES

Army Flier Testing Transport Plane in Non-stop Trip From Coast to Coast

Marion, Ky., March 10.—(AP)—Captain Ira Eaker, noted army pilot, was forced down at noon today near Tolu, 15 miles northwest of here, by engine trouble. His plane stuck in the mud and was badly damaged. The aviator escaped with minor scratches.

Long Beach Municipal Airport, March 10.—(AP)—Captain Ira Eaker, noted army pilot, hopped off here at 2:13 a. m., P. S. T., for the Atlantic coast on a non-stop flight to test his army transport airplane. He said emphatically he would not attempt to better the trans-continental flight record.

"I am carrying 466 gallons of gasoline," he said, "and I am going to fly just as far as that will take me. Maybe I will get to Dayton, Ohio, or I might get as far as Washington. There is an extremely slight possibility that I might get as far as New York."

"Under no circumstances am I going to try for anybody's record. The purpose of the flight is to test the high speed of this transport airplane. We are trying to find a ship that will be able to keep up with pursuit airplanes. We have no planes that are capable of doing this now."

"On this flight we will check the consumption of gasoline, the performance of the motor, what high speed it is capable of attaining and the performance of the ship as a whole. After the flight the ship will be returned to Rockwell Field, San Diego."

Captain Eaker, who was a member of the crew of the army plane "Question Mark" when that ship established a world refueling endurance record over Los Angeles more than two years ago, brought his plane here from San Diego yesterday.

Joe Nikrent, official-timer of the National Aeronautic Association, recorded the takeoff at 2:13 a. m. So in case Captain Eaker is favored with tail winds and reaches New York and in better time than Captain Frank M. Hawks' record of 12 hours 25 minutes 3 seconds, the new mark would stand. The army flier estimated the gasoline consumption of his plane at 8 gallons an hour and pointed out it hardly would be possible for him to reach New York in 10 hours.

So great is the fuel load in the swift monoplane that the flier could carry no baggage and managed only to take a few sandwiches and a vacuum bottle of coffee. The plane is virtually a flying gasoline tank. Extra fuel tanks in the cockpit augmented the wing supply. It is a Lockheed High Wing, all-metal craft with a 425 horsepower motor equipped with a super-charger, which makes it possible for the engine to develop 700 horsepower.

A skeleton type landing gear adds to the ship's speed, which Lockheed engineers estimate at a top of 225 miles an hour and 190 for cruising.

R. C. FLANNAGAN IS IN RACE FOR MAYOR HERE

Tosses Hat Into Ring On the Platform of "Equal and Exact Justice for All"

Pledging a program of "equal and exact justice to all," Roy C. Flannagan, well known lawyer and business man, this morning announced his candidacy for the office of mayor of Greenville in the municipal election to be held here on May 4th.

Mr. Flannagan will oppose J. Con Lanier, present incumbent, who, it was understood, would seek re-election although public announcement to this effect had not been made today. Five aldermen will also be elected at the same time.

In addition to pledging equal justice to all, Mr. Flannagan promised "strict economy in the spending of the public money." He declared "that we should support the city government for the benefit of all and not for any private interests."

Mr. Flannagan is one of the best known citizens of the community. He is a native of Greenville and has spent practically all of his life here. Although this is the first time he has ever sought political office, he has been prominent in the religious, fraternal, social and business life of the community.

He is at the present engaged in the dairy business, having retired from the active practice of law several years ago.

"It shall be my purpose if elected to render the highest type of service possible to the people of the community," he stated this morning in tossing his hat into the proverbial political ring, "and my campaign will be conducted strictly upon the platform of justice for all."

Raleigh, March 10.—(AP)—A widespread search was under way in North Carolina, South Carolina, and surrounding states today for Patti Perkins, 15-year-old daughter of Mrs. Charlotte Story Perkins, Raleigh newspaper woman.

The girl, a patient at the state hospital here, escaped February 25 with Mrs. Carrie Wooten of New Bern when the two overpowered a nurse and took her keys.

She is known to have gone to New Bern but has not been heard of since February 26.

BITTER COLD STILL SWEEPS OVER EUROPE

Storms Lift in New England and N. Y., With Snowdrifts Ten Feet High

Bitter weather continued general over Europe today. Cold winds swept the quake-torn Balkans. Snow and rock avalanches destroyed telegraph lines and interrupted rail traffic at Chambéry and Thionon-Les-Bains, France.

The Black Forest and Rhine Valley in Germany were buried under the deepest snow of years.

English roads were encrusted with ice or piled high with snow. Ships groped through blinding snow and buffeted upon turbulent waves.

New England and upstate New York storms lifted, with drifts often to ten feet high left on highways.

The Balkans rumbled a fourth time as disintegration continued beneath the Greek mountains. There were new fissures but no additional damage of consequence.

Boston, March 10.—(AP)—New England took account of stock today after a snowstorm had claimed the lives of five fishermen, endangered ten motorists marooned in White Mountain snowdrifts, and left washed up on Massachusetts shores the battered parts of a plane and a flier's helmet and goggles.

Eight Groveton, N. H., high school students, their basketball coach and a chauffeur were found late yesterday in the impassable drifts of snow that severed Crawford Notch, N. H., from the rest of the world.

For 18 hours they were without food as the drifts piled higher and higher. Four of their number, who had gone for help, nearly perished in the attempt and they were finally led to safety by railroad workers and state highway men, who came upon them in an abandoned camp.

At Gloucester, Mass., part of a cockpit and an airplane wing were washed upon the beach. There was no identifying sign on them and after a search of the shore line the belief was expressed that the sea finally had given up a ship that had failed to make a trans-Atlantic crossing.

At Winthrop, a Boston suburb, an aviator's helmet and goggles were found. A minute search by coast guardsmen failed to reveal anything that might explain them.

Earlier yesterday the sea cast up planks and spars at Newburyport, all that remained of the Boston Fisherman Julia, whose crew of five was lost during the storm of Sunday night and Monday morning.

Another fisherman's boat, the St. Providence, was missing with her crew of four.

In Vermont, the storm was the worst experienced in many years. Abandoned automobiles dotted the main highways and plows, tractors and large gangs of men worked throughout the night in an effort to break a road out across the state from Rutland to White River Junction.

GANDHI BACK HOME AGAIN

Monster Crowd Grooms Nationalist Leader Upon Arrival At Ahmadabad

Ahmadabad, India, March 10.—(AP)—After a year's absence Mahatma Gandhi was back in his own home town today, a conquering hero.

Thousands turned out at every station as the train bearing the Nationalist leader sped from New Delhi, where Gandhi last week won from Viceroy Lord Irwin concessions which Indians largely consider a victory over the British government.

Climaxing the day of ovations, the largest crowd of all met the Mahatma at the railroad station upon his arrival here bent upon paying homage.

The monster crowd surged toward the tiny 65-year-old sage and for a time it was feared he would be crushed to death. He was rescued by Nationalist volunteers who bore him aloft to an automobile.

Gandhi who was observing his weekly day of silence, made no answer to the ovations, but tears rolled down his cheeks as thousands knelt and those nearest him scrambled forward to kiss the hem of his homespun garments.

Gandhi, attended by the ever faithful Miss Madeline Slade, daughter of an English admiral, rode here in a dilapidated third class coach. He carried a mattress and tin utensils which he has used for preparation of his food.

SEEK DEATH PENALTY FOR YOUNG KILLER

Trial of Virgil Kirkland Nears Close At Valparaiso, Ind., This Afternoon

Valparaiso, Ind., March 10.—(AP)—Arguments asking the death penalty for Virgil Kirkland and pleas for acquittal today brought near to a close the trial of the former Gary high school football star for the slaying by criminal attack of his sweetheart, Arlene Draves, during a drinking party last November.

The prosecution asked the jury to send the youth to the electric chair, asserting it had proved that Kirkland attacked Miss Draves, knocked her to the floor and later left her in an unheated automobile.

The defense pleaded that the charges had not been proved and that in fact Kirkland was the girl's fiancé, who took too much liquor along with others at the party and pointed to a second autopsy as having proved that the defendant had not knocked Arlene down with his fist but had tried merely to revive her.

Mrs. Murrill Clemons, Arlene's sister, collapsed and was carried from the courtroom during the emotional appeal of Edmund Peun, a states attorney who, exhibiting Arlene's torn garments demanded of the jury "let these unchanging murders."

After addressing remarks to various members of the jury Peun turned to the defendant and shouted: "Kirkland, I can't understand why you didn't plead insanity for you." Again he turned to the jury and exclaimed: "Why men, you can't turn this fiend loose, this youth who could do what not even the lowly beast would, invite others in to mate with his mate."

In closing Peun said that if the defense "ever succeeded in milking your heart what excuse will you give your wives and mothers sisters and daughters? Womanhood looks to you."

The arguments were to close with today's session of court and a charge to the jury was to follow.

Increased Deposits Mark Re-opening of Polk County Bank

Asheville, March 10.—(AP)—The Polk County Bank and Trust Company, which closed November 22, reopened this morning with a total of \$3,000 on deposit. Fred W. Blanton, president of the reorganized bank, estimated that between \$10,000 and \$12,000 would be deposited before the close of business today, saying the institution was receiving fine co-operation from the depositors.

The bank, upon reopening, increased its capital from \$15,000 to \$22,500.

VACATION MOTORING RANKS AS THREE BILLION INDUSTRY

Washington, March 10.—(AP)—Vacation motoring in the United States ranked as a three billion dollar industry last year.

Domestic and foreign motorists, touring the country for recreation, are estimated by the American Automobile Association to have spent \$3,000,000,000 during the year.

The total, while declining 15 per cent from 1929, was nearly half the world's estimated travel bill.

BEGIN MOVE FOR CONTROL OF CONGRESS

Progressives to Outline Definite Program at Washington City Tomorrow

Washington, March 10.—(AP)—Progressives who hope to hold the mastery of the next Congress looked expectantly today to a meeting here tomorrow and next day as their legislative program took a more concise form.

Their principals already narrowed down to five general subjects, they knew the principal propositions that will be debated under the guidance of five senators.

Each of the senators designated to lead a round-table discussion has advanced heretofore specific suggestions he contends past administration-controlled houses arbitrarily killed. These proposals, possibly in a new form but embodying the same principles, unquestionably will come up for consideration at the meeting.

The export debenture farm relief plan once more had become of political portent. Senator Borah, Idaho Republican, who ardently believes in the debenture plan and sought to limit the last tariff revision to agriculture, was chosen to guide one of the five round-table discussions.

Senator Cutting, Republican, New Mexico, will head the round-table discussion of what Progressives call a return to representative government. The many congressmen they contend are elected on issues they forget as soon as they come to Washington, devoting their time to legislation for special interests.

The Senate's most consistent opponent of what he describes as the "power trust," Senator Norris, Nebraska Republican, will direct debate on public utilities.

Unemployment insurance and old-age pensions will draw the attention of a group headed by the independent Republican from Wisconsin—Senator La Follette. Senator Coughlin, a Colorado Democrat and a former member of the Tariff Commission, will be chairman of the group which considers changes in protective rates and their administration.

Regardless of what program finally is decided upon, the Progressives are hopeful of concessions by Democrats or Republicans or both. The support of Progressive means control of Congress, if party lines otherwise hold.

Sandino Claims to Have Won Several Recent Victories

Mexico City, March 10.—(AP)—General Augusto Sandino, Nicaraguan insurgent, in reports sent to Pedro Jose Zepeda, his Mexican representative, claims to have won five recent battles with Nicaraguan national guardsmen, killing 150 of them, and to have captured considerable American military equipment.

The last battle, the Sandino headquarters at Segovia reported, was a four hour engagement March 1, during which 1,000 1,000 mounted Sandinistas captured Duran, in the department of Jinotega. The report said 109 guardsmen were killed, the town captured and a relief column under Lieutenant Clark, a United States marine, put to flight, and all its equipment captured.

In another engagement at El Cayalito, the report said, the guardsmen lost 27 dead and ten wounded, while the Sandinistas lost 14 dead and 25 wounded. The insurgents claimed to have captured 80 rifles, ten pistols, two machine guns, and 3,000 rounds of ammunition.

Graham to Speak at Catawba

Salsbury, March 10.—(AP)—Announcement was made here today that Frank Graham, president of the University of North Carolina, will deliver the commencement address at the Catawba College this year. The exact date of the address had not been determined but it will be the latter part of May.

Bill Seeks Union of Two Counties

Raleigh, March 10.—(AP)—Union of Forsyth and Stokes counties was proposed in a bill introduced in the House today by Representatives Marshall of Forsyth, and Leake of Stokes.

Merger of Forsyth and Stokes counties was urged in the report of the Brookings Institution to Governor Gardner.

Agitation for the Union of the two counties has been under way for some time and petitions bearing the names of thousands of citizens of the two counties favoring the merger have been prepared.

Bitter Debate Follows Introduction Of a Bill For Repeal School Law

G. O. P. WILL NOT HOLD ANY MEET SOON

Meeting Delayed Because Nation Suffering From Overdose of Politics

Washington, March 10.—(AP)—James Francis Burke, general counsel of the Republican national committee, said today there would be no early meeting of the national committee because the country is suffering of an overdose of politics.

In a formal statement issued shortly after Senator Fess of Ohio, chairman of the committee, had said at the White House plans were being laid for intensive work of the organization, Burke said the committee would not attempt "to usurp the functions of the national convention in shaping political policies."

An overdose of politics, he said, is one of the worst maladies that can afflict a nation particularly when it is struggling to recover from any economic disorder and business depression.

President Hoover, he said, has been devoting himself to assisting in business recovery "with an intelligence and an industry unsurpassed by any other individual in any other government on earth. Never in the history of the White House has there been such continuous, intelligent devotion to duty."

The country, Burke said, is regaining its economic equilibrium and the time has come when sanity will have more front seats and have more space on the front page.

"Our conduct," he said, "will be less critical and more constructive, our news will be less sensational and more substantial. The political atmosphere will be more amenable and the business atmosphere will be more buoyant."

The national committee, he declared, has nothing to do with shaping policies or nominating candidates.

"The national convention will do that as it has always done during the history of the party."

TWO STILL SEIZED TODAY

Federal Officers Also Nab Distiller and Liquor In Raid On Tranter's Creek

Two distilling plants, a distiller, 60 gallons of whiskey and 1,500 gallons of beer were captured by federal officers on Tranter's Creek in the lower end of Pitt county today.

The distiller, Emmett Tetterton, was confined in the Washington jail today awaiting hearing at the next sitting of Federal court.

The officers passed through Greenville this afternoon with one of the stills, a large copper kettle of about sixty gallons capacity. It was said to be one of the finest type of stills used in the distillation of the illicit beverage in this section of the country. The remainder of the paraphernalia taken in the raid was left at Washington.

The raid was staged by federal officers from Wilson and Williamsburg. Both of the stills were in operation, and the distiller was taken completely by surprise.

Secretary Cotton In Critical Shape

Baltimore, March 9.—(AP)—Joseph P. Cotton, under-secretary of state, continued in a critical condition this morning at Johns Hopkins hospital where he has been seriously ill for more than six weeks. He took a sudden turn for the worse last night and oxygen was being administered.

Mr. Cotton, who had been in poor health for some months, has undergone two major operations since he came to the hospital. On January 11, Dr. Walter E. Dandy, brain specialist, removed a spinal tumor and on February 16 his right eye which had become infected, was removed. A few days later his right knee was lamed when the infection spread to that area.

TWO SPEAKERS ADDRESS THE LOCAL ROTES

Citizenship Theme of Highly Entertaining Program of Club Last Night

"Citizenship" was the theme of the Rotary program last night and club members heard two speakers discuss the subject in a brilliant and lucid manner.

The program was in charge of Dr. K. B. Pace, chairman of the Social Service committee, and J. H. Waldrop presided. The regular supper and song program was enjoyed.

The speakers were Jule Brown, attorney, and Rev. W. A. Lillycrop, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church.

Mr. Brown declared that American citizenship was a valued and highly prized privilege, offering as it does innumerable opportunities for growth and development in all walks of life.

He stressed the duties and dangers of citizenship. Under the division of dangers of citizenship he referred specifically to the centralization of governmental power.

Mr. Lillycrop, discussing the subject from a local angle, brought out the obligations of professional, personal, home, and spiritual citizenship. He urged his hearers to be forever cognizant of the responsibilities resting upon them as private citizens and to exert every influence in the constant development of a higher type of living.

Woman Dies of Bullet Wound

Richmond, March 10.—(AP)—Mrs. R. L. Lowry Whiteside, 38, died today in a local hospital from a bullet wound in the head which her husband, William F. Whiteside, told police was inflicted by the accidental discharge of an automatic early this morning.

Whiteside was arrested immediately after the shooting and was charged with murder after Mrs. Whiteside's death several hours later. The husband, a traveling salesman told police the automatic discharged as he laid it on a table. He said he had been illustrating a world war experience.

Attempt to Speed Building Program

Washington, March 10.—(AP)—The Justice Department moved today to speed the administration's public building program for unemployment relief.

The names of former Representative F. Dickinson Letts, of Davenport, Iowa, and Charles Verner, of Tuscaloosa, Ala., were under consideration as special attorneys in the Justice Department's public lands division, with prospect of their almost immediate appointment.

They would concentrate upon the institution of condemnation proceedings upon lands desired for public projects, working under new legislation signed by President Hoover two weeks ago.

Action by Senator Bernard Throws Senate Into a State of Turmoil; Measure Referred to the Senate Education Committee; Much Interest Centered About Discussion of Sales Tax Question Tonight

Raleigh, March 10.—(AP)—Taking opponents by surprise, Senator Bernard of Buncombe threw the State Senate into turmoil and heated debate today with a bill to repeal the MacLean school law.

The bill was referred to the finance committee following its introduction by a 31 to 15 vote but later in the session Mrs. McKee of Jackson, started the fireworks with a demand that it be recalled and sent to the education group.

Various charges that the bill was sent to the finance committee so that school legislation would be killed and that the Johnson machinery bill for the state supported six months term was being deliberately delayed by the Senate education committee featured the warm discussion.

Finally by a vote of 32 to 12, the measure was sent to the education committee.

The House hurried through its public calendar to dispose of a number of state-wide bills including passage of the Buncombe bill to allow racing and pari-mutuel betting, the Ewing corrupt practices bill, the Connor automobile reciprocity measure, and the Jeffries bill to allow rental of school books by counties.

The House appropriations committee favorably reported the bill to reappropriate \$400,000 for a new central prison and the Senate got approval of the bill to reorganize the park department from one of its judiciary groups.

Much legislative interest centered in the separate meetings this afternoon and tonight of the Senate and House finance committees, which separated last night. The dissolution of the joint committee was an unprecedented legislative procedure and was generally believed to have been brought about by Senate opposition to any form of a sales tax, the principle of which was later approved by the House group.

The MacLean bill, a substitute for two other measures introduced by Senator Lindsey of Brunswick and Representative Young of Harnett, passed both houses with substantial majorities.

As a result of the mandate of the act, the joint finance committee appointed an "exploring" committee to seek out the \$13,000,000 in new revenue which would be needed if the schools were to be run for six months by the state with no ad valorem tax.

The committee reported to the finance group that some form of sales tax would be necessitated if the money was to be raised without a tax on land and yesterday more than 2,000 merchants came to Raleigh to protest against any form of sales tax.

The two sales tax plans offered were by Day of Onslow, to tax gross receipts of retail merchants, and by Hindsdale of Wake, a selected commodity sales tax.

Opposition to any form of sales tax has been expressed by many legislators but last night the House finance committee voted 15 to 13 in favor of the "principle" of the sales tax and is to meet tonight to decide which of the two suggested plans it will report to the lower division of the Assembly.

Bills to support the schools by the levy of a state-wide ad valorem tax are already in committee. There has been no state ad valorem tax for a number of years.

After the Bernard bill had been referred to the finance committee the Senate heard repercussions of last night's split between the House and Senate finance groups when Mrs. McKee, only woman member of the upper house, called for the bill to be taken from the finance group and sent to that on education.

Sensors Blount of Pitt, and Ward of Beaufort, joined Mrs. McKee. Blount charged the bill was introduced and sent to the finance committee in light of its action in separating from the House group before a vote was taken on the "principle" of a sales tax.

Ward termed the bill "a scheme to kill the school legislation" and said its introduction had been anticipated "and arrangements had already been made to kill it in the House."

Senator Bernard denied that his

NERVES WATCHED GROWING INSIDE TADPOLES' TAILS

University, Va.—(AP)—Tadpoles' tails are telling University of Virginia scientists a new story of first aid nerves.

The tails are transparent. Within them living nerves are watched under the microscope by a method reported by Dr. Carl C. Spindel of the medical school to the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The nerves start as tiny sprouts, grow, extend and finally branch into networks. But, like plants breaking through soil, they meet obstacles. On such occasions tiny cells are seen occasionally sliding along the nerve to the point of trouble.

These first aid cells are makers of the sheath which insulates all nerves. Sometimes it almost seems that a nerve reaches back home for an extra supply of sheath cells.

The latter have been observed migrating along one nerve to transfer at some crossing to another nerve fiber.

Man of Many Loves Hanged for Killing Unidentified Man

Bedford, England, March 10.—(AP)—Alfred Arthur Rouse, man of many loves who last November tried to "die by proxy" in an effort to escape the responsibilities of his amorous adventures, today was hanged for the murder of an unidentified man.

He was the first person in 145 years to be executed for the murder of an unidentified victim.

The body of the man he killed was kept unburied throughout his trial and subsequent incarceration in the hope that Rouse in a last minute confession would tell who he was.

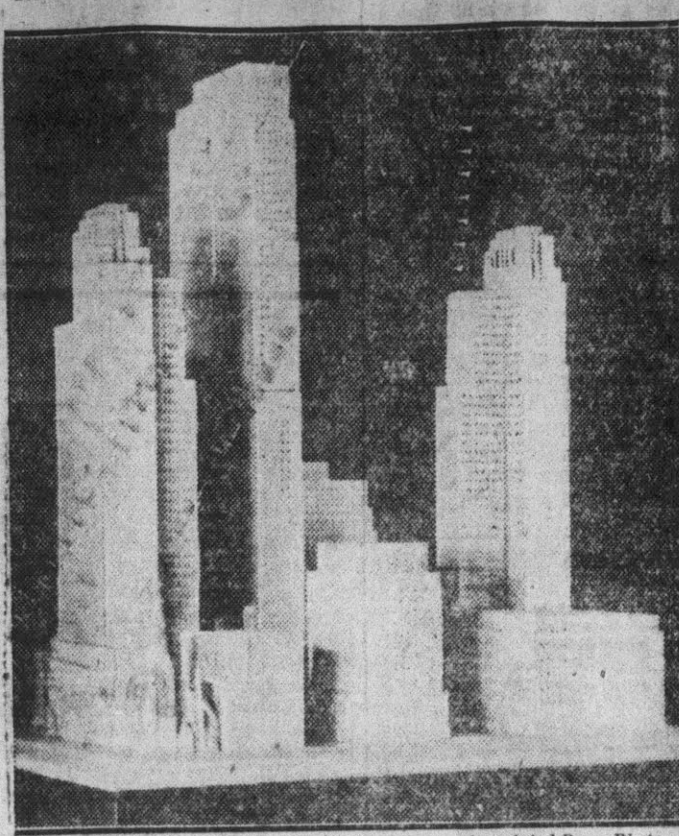
Prison officials carried this hope even to the shadow of the gallows, but so far as was known the doomed man revealed nothing. During the trial Rouse said that the victim was a hitchhiker whom he had given a lift and who had accidentally set fire to his car while he was outside effecting temporary repairs.

The case was marked by the unswerving loyalty of his wife and one of three women with whom he lived, the mother of his child. After his arrest the wife and the other woman, a Miss Campbell, joined forces and until yesterday attempted to get a reprieve or commutation of sentence.

Rouse, a 35-year-old traveling salesman, drove from Northampton early in November of last year and when his automobile was found burned by the roadside it was at first believed that he had died by accident.

Investigation revealed an extremely complicated love life. Experts theorized in court that he had become convinced that death offered about the only solution and had conceived the plan of a double which would permit him to "die" legally at the expense of another's life.

Labor Government Faces Challenge On Indian Question

London, March 10.—(AP)—The Labor government, which hitherto has had almost unanimous backing in the House of Commons on its Indian policies, today faced a serious challenge in what many regarded as a right about face by Conservative leaders.

The India committee of the Conservative party met last night and passed a resolution reading: "This committee welcomes the decision of Mr. Baldwin that the Conservative party cannot be represented at any further round table conference to be held in India, as now foreshadowed by His Majesty's government."

The reference to Stanley Baldwin, Conservative chief, who January 28, announced his endorsement of the policies worked out at the London round table conference, was inexplicable to most politicians outside the inner Conservative circles, but several explanations were advanced.

One of these was that Mr. Baldwin had surrendered to the small die-hard faction led by Winston Churchill, which has strongly opposed further concessions in India, and another was that the outcome of recent negotiations between the viceroys, Lord Irwin, and Mahatma Gandhi, had displeased him. A third was that the resolution referred only to a second round table conference to be held "in India" and not one which might be held in London.

The puzzle apparently will not be solved until Thursday when the Commons will debate Indian developments.

Animal Paradise.

Washington.—All the caribou in the country—400 head—will be government charges when Isle Royale in Lake Superior becomes a national park. They are there now, along with 2,000 moose and sundry beaver and deer. Isle Royale is an animal's paradise, with 56,000 acres in which to roam.

Enfield, N. C.—(AP)—John B. Rives was instantly killed near here when struck by a passenger train of the Atlantic Coast Line.

Raleigh, N. C.—(AP)—Ralph Davis, Forsyth county convict at state prison here, will be tried at the prison tomorrow for murder in connection with the death of Thurman Luther, Cherokee county convict, during an altercation at Cary prison farm Saturday.

BEES GOOD FOR TOUCHY TONSILS

Atlanta, March 10.—(AP)—If you have a sore tonsil, go to the doctor and let him put a "bee" on it.

The "bee" is an electrocoagulator and is part of the exhibit of medical appliances at the South-eastern Surgical Congress meeting here.

The treatment is known as diathermy electrocoagulation of tonsils, but it is not as hard as it sounds, say those interested in calling it to attention of the medicals.

The doctor simply places two cathodes, or "stingers," about the tonsil and opens the throttle. The frequency is too fast for a sensation of shock. The tonsil merely gets warm.

A little of the shock in a few days part of the tonsil withers up and you blow it away. Three or four treatments and the tonsil is gone.

McBride Conducts Forum On Dry Laws At Florida Meeting

St. Petersburg, Fla., March 10.—(AP)—An open forum on prohibition legislation, led by Dr. F. Scott McBride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of America, held the attention of delegates to the organization's annual southern convention here today.

The morning session was given over entirely to general discussions on the liquor problem and steps the federal and state governments have taken in an effort to make enforcement of the 18th amendment a success.

Among speakers assigned to the afternoon meeting was Dr. David Hepburn, Richmond, superintendent of the Virginia Anti-Saloon League.

J. M. Doran, United States Commissioner of industrial alcohol and former Federal prohibition commissioner, told the convention he believed a majority of the people are convinced prohibition is a sound policy and that "we are going to see that it is maintained."

"Our problem is to push ahead and not lose heart. Stand by your officers and don't let anyone tell you prohibition cannot be enforced."

Comb Departments for New Evidence In Tennessee Case

Nashville, Tenn., March 9.—(AP)—Legislators investigating the relationship between the State of Tennessee and the defunct banks of Rogers Caldwell and his associates today were formed into scouting units to comb various departments of the commonwealth with assistance of auditors.

Results of this minute inspection of individual departments will form part of the report to be presented to the legislature next week.

Meanwhile Caldwell and his principal associate, Colonel Luke Lea, Tennessee publisher, awaited arrest under indictment of a Greenville Federal grand jury that charged violation of national banking laws in connection with the closed Holston Union National bank in Knoxville. The indictments made public yesterday, charged that Caldwell, Lea, and J. Basil Ramsey, president of the bank, conspired to make a false entry of \$98,000 to the joint account of Lea and Caldwell and misapplied the bank's credit in that amount.

Caldwell yesterday was indicted here by the Davidson County grand jury on fraudulent breach of trust, grand larceny and receiving stolen property, as well as being accessory to these offenses, in connection with Hardman county, Tenn., road bond issues for \$200,000 and \$270,000 respectively.

Hawks on Way to Texas

Atlanta, Ga., March 10.—(AP)—Captain Frank M. Hawks, speed flier, arrived here at 10:59 A. OUTLINE PLAN TO PUSH CAUSE PROHIBITION

Gigantic, Nation-wide Organization Promoted by F. Scott McBride in Florida

St. Petersburg, Fla., March 10.—(AP)—Plans for a gigantic, nationwide organization to espouse the cause of prohibition were outlined today before the southern convention of the Anti-Saloon League of America by Dr. F. Scott McBride, general superintendent.

He suggested formation of units of prohibition supporters in townships and counties throughout the country to assist state organizations, which in turn would correlate their work with the national association.

"If we are going to take care of this second campaign against prohibition," Dr. McBride declared, "we must depend largely on what is done back home in the counties and townships in carrying on our legislative program."

"We cannot take care of such a plan unless the people are organized. We can't fight a battle against any army that is organized with an army that is not organized."

He said there are ten more prohibition advocates in the House and ten more in the Senate today than when the Eighteenth Amendment was voted.

"Not only are there more dries in Congress," he added, "but the dry sentiment is even stronger. Congress has been getting drier every election since prohibition was voted. In 1928 there were more dries elected than at any other time, and we also elected a dry president."

In 1930, however, the wets have taken an advantage. Multimillionaires have taken advantage of dry inactivity and have elected some wet senators who should have been defeated by dries.

"If three dries in each of 30 states were to be defeated by three wets in each of 30 states, the majority in the House would be wet, but we still would have enough dry states to keep prohibition in force."

But whenever the House has a majority of wets there would be mighty little comfort for us. We must not merely hold our own, but keep Congress and the state legislatures dry.

"There has never been a time when we need to keep up the fight like we do today."

Finances May Prove Setback In Election Inquiry in Carolina

Raleigh, March 10.—(AP)—Gov. O. Max Gardner is willing, he says, to cooperate fully with the U. S. Senate sub-committee in the proposed investigation of the Bailey-Pritchard election, but financial and other difficulties may prove serious handicaps in the inquiry.

After George M. Pritchard, Republican, had charged Josiah W. Bailey, Democrat, had won the Senate contest through election fraud and irregularities, a sub-committee headed by Senator George H. Moses, announced it would scrutinize the North Carolina election.

Replying to a request for aid in the undertaking, Governor Gardner yesterday wrote Senator Moses he was quite sure it would be possible to send the ballot boxes and other records to Washington as had been asked.

Since no notice of a contest or request for impounding the ballot boxes was filed within the North Carolina legal limit, Governor Gardner informed Senator Moses he was not prepared to say whether the ballot boxes were preserved or what had happened to them.

The governor pointed out the state had no funds for copying records and that it would be impossible to send the registration books to Washington, because they are, they ask for future elections.

THREE HINDUS ARE HELD IN MURDER CASE

Death of California Student Takes On Appearance of An Oriental Mystery

Sacramento, Cal., March 10.—(AP)—Three Hindus were held by Solano county authorities today as the hunt for the murderers of Sant Ram Pande, 31, University of California student, took on ramifications of a sinister oriental mystery.

The State Bureau of Criminal Identification, for which Pande gave up his studies in order that he might work on the unsolved killings of thirteen of his countrymen in California in the last five years, allegedly had been under surveillance by Hindus in the Sacramento Valley.

Clarence S. Morrill, head of the bureau, said state criminal records were being guarded by armed men because of the surveillance by Hindu characters.

The manner in which Pande met death, Morrill said, recalled the activities of the Thuggees of northern India, the strange cult who worshipped the black goddess Kali and practiced murder. Pande's headless body was found trussed to a tractor wheel in the Sacramento river near Dio Vista week. The head evidently had been severed by someone with a knowledge of surgery. Decapitation was a rite of the Kali followers.

Udham Singh, Shajha Singh and Nagahar Singh, fellow countrymen of Pande, were arrested at a ranch barn near Rio Vista last night.

In the barn, officers said they found a harrow, one side of which was weighted with a tractor wheel similar to that found with Pande's body. Officers said they regarded the fact the other side of the harrow was minus a counterbalance weight as significant.

The three Hindus, officers said, admitted they were in the United States without proper credentials.

Real Estate Men Meet On the Hill

Chapel Hill, March 10.—(AP)—North Carolina real estate men were learning about the realty business today from Guy W. Ellis, of Detroit, and Paul Stark, Madison, Wis., prominent realtors.

Both addressed the annual real estate institute here yesterday with additional talks by them reserved for today.

To membership on this council were appointed Senators Dickinson of Iowa, and Capper of Kansas, and representatives Simmons of Nebraska, and Farnell of Indiana.

Dickinson, who will head the group, believes its work will do

much to offset claims that the Republican party's farm relief efforts have failed. He said in a statement:

"It is the belief of those interested in this movement that it will be a source of real strength in furthering the interest of the Republican party in the rural localities, especially in the middle west and north west."

The educational work will begin immediately. It will be conducted from offices in Washington and in the far west at a point not yet selected.

To carry out the program, Senator Dickinson, who was a farm leader in the House until his election to the Senate last November, expects to obtain "proper political contact in various localities outside the regular political channels and interest these parties" in the spread of "proper information" concerning the legislative policies of the administration.

Raleigh, March 10.—(AP)—It's the people—the voters—who are responsible for law law enforcement, Gen. Smedley D. Butler, stormy petrel of the Marine corps, contends.

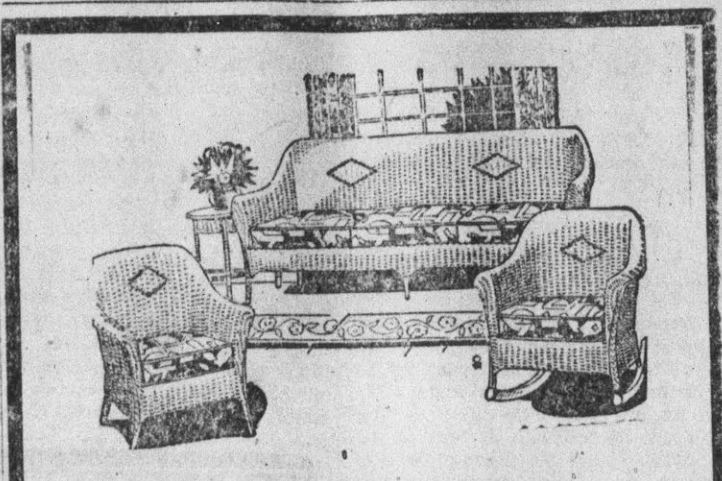

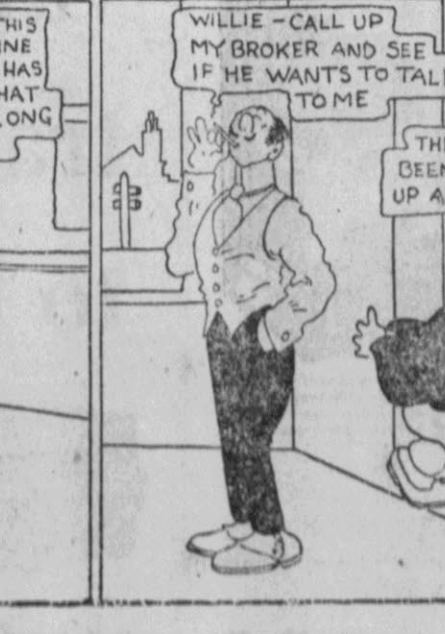

"We have wonderful pitching to expect from such men as Rheim, Baines, Grimes, Hallahan and Johnson of last years regulars. I do not hesitate to say we expect great things from two new comers, 'Dizzy' Dean, who came up from Houston late last year, and Paul Derringer, from Rochester. Both have the stuff."

Most of Street's worries are due to an embarrassment of riches. If the colorful, 36 year old Dean and equally promising Derringer fulfill expectations, Street may not have enough work to go around. LOCAL GIRLS PLAY KINSTON HIGH TONIGHT

The new golf ball seems to have stimulated low-scoring among women players, to judge from the way such players as Helen Hicks and Virginia Van Wie have been pounding the larger and lighter sphere along the palm-studded fairways of Florida courses.

"It doesn't seem to cost us much, if any distance with the wood, and there is no question in my mind but that the new ball is easier to handle on the greens," remarked Miss Hicks, after a round in which she handed a trouncing to the slim blonde English champion, Diana Fishwick, at Palm Beach.

Miss Hicks' performance substantiated her statement. The sturdily built Long Island girl averaged something over 200 yards off the tee and she made men's par look easy on the long holes. She is a much improved putter this year, due perhaps to the coaching of Johnny Farrell at St. Augustine and should be well up to the top in major competition.

Miss Van Wie's sensational 72 on the Palm Beach course, where men's par is 68 for the layout of 6,744 yards, is one of the lowest rounds ever registered by a feminine star in competition anywhere.

The feature of this round was an inward nine of 32, two under men's par, and unquestionably a new low mark for women. It was the more remarkable because the Chicago girl, playing out the bye holes after settling her match, three-putted the last two greens, hereby spoiling the prospect of a miraculous 30.

Most of the star professionals feel the new golf ball has added a stroke or two, on the average, to their games, yet they have swung around to casting a vote of confidence to the new sphere.

I queried Willie Klein, the blond Long Island star who tutors at the famous LaGorce course, Miami Beach, in the winter time.

"I don't think it makes much difference," he replied. "My best score last year on LaGorce with the old ball was 67. This season I have had to be satisfied with 69. 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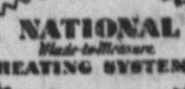

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Market Report Cotton--Stocks--Grain

COTTON MARKET

New York, March 10.—(AP)—Cotton opened steady today, 2 to 4 points lower in response to lower Liverpool cables and a renewal of realizing or liquidation which was probably coupled by some further selling for a reaction.

Houses with foreign connections were buyers and there was some buying of October by brokers who were credited with operating for Japanese interests which absorbed the offerings around 11c for May and 11.53 for October. A few more March notices were issued without apparent effect on the market which showed net losses of about 5 points at the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables reported a poor strike in that market and attributed the decline to selling by Bombay and Alexandria. Egyptian futures market in Alexandria was 21 to 35 points lower and the spot quotation for Indian cotton in Liverpool showed a decline of 6 points. Manchester reported an improved inquiry for cotton cloth from South American, Egypt and the Continent.

Money continued firm, reflecting easy withdrawals to meet some bonus checks, and other influences. Call money renewed at 2 per cent, the first time a higher renewal rate than 11-2 had been noted since January 2, when loans renewed at 2. After mid-day however, outside funds were offered at 3-2 per cent.
