NORRIS WANTS PROGRESSIVE AS PRESIDENT

Urges Election of Independent at Final Session of Progressive Conference

Washington, March 3.—(AP)—The national political campaign culminating in the 1932 Presidential election was underway today propelled by a second conference of political leaders in as many weeks.

Election of a "Progressive President" was called for yesterday by Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, in concluding the last meeting of election portents—the two-day Progressive conference for which he presided.

The unusually early popping of political phenomena has occurred in the three distinct groups—Democrats, Republicans and Independents. It has gone far already in defining issues and developing candidates.

Prohibition, power, unemployment and the tariff stand out as issues projected from the early swirl of conferences and maneuvers.

As for candidates, President Hoover, titular head of the Republican party, is unchallenged so far within the regular ranks and the Republican national committee has centered its efforts in support of his administration.

There are a host of Democratic possibilities, including wets and dries. Some are just in the speculative stage. Others have been advanced formally by their states.

The Progressive conference leaders centered their attacks upon President Hoover and made it plain he was not acceptable. Turning to the Democrats, Senator Norris, warned that the platform Chairman Raskob submitted to the Democratic national committee last week was unacceptable as was any candidate sponsoring it.

Norris gave declared a third party futile and his remarks were interpreted as a plea to Democrats for a candidate of "Progressive" stamp.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, who led the fight against the Raskob prohibition proposal, has been advanced by his State Legislature as a Presidential candidate.

Governor Ritchie of Maryland, likewise has been put into the Democratic race by his Legislature. He is for repeal of national prohibition. Senator Lewis of Illinois, also has been formally entered in the Democratic Presidential contest by his followers. He, too, is against national prohibition.

But Democracy claims a host of prospective Presidential candidates. Two New Yorkers—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt and Owen D. Young—with Alfred E. Smith, the 1928 nominee, enter the discussion along with Senator Glass, of Virginia; Newton D. Baker, James M. Cox, and Senator Buckley, of Ohio, and a number of others.

Minister to File Specific Charges Against Walker

New York, March 13.—(AP)—John Haynes, Holmes, citizenryman and chairman of the city affairs committee, a citizen's organization, announced today he would file with Governor Roosevelt specific charges against Mayor Walker, involving "incompetence, gross neglect and indifference to the welfare of the city."

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, vice-chairman of the committee, said he favored waiting until the mayor returned from California and that a decision would be made by the committee today. Newspapers predicted the charges would be filed at once.

A committee of the directors of the Greater New York Federation of churches, representing 475,000 members in seven Protestant denominations, has adopted a resolution demanding a non-partisan, city-wide investigation "that shall reveal both the innocent and the guilty."

TWO MILLION DOLLARS PAID TOBACCO HEAD

Salary of American Tobacco Co. President Last Year Given at \$2,283,000

New York, March 13.—(AP)—Having carried on a heated debate on whether an executive is worth a million dollars a year, Wall Street suddenly finds that apparently it has one in its midst who received twice that amount in 1930.

The American Tobacco Company is estimated to have paid its president approximately \$2,283,000 last year, and his services thus rewarded were extraordinary, as viewed from the annual earnings statement.

In a year that was neither lean nor unprofitable for many of the nation's leading corporations, the country's largest unit in the tobacco industry piled up a net income of \$43,000,000 which was more than 40 per cent greater than the previous year when the country was prospering.

Nevertheless, the controversy over how a big corporation should reward executives for extraordinary services rages, starting with litigation over the bonus system adopted by Bethlehem Steel Corp., which netted its president well over a million for 1929, a group of American Tobacco stockholders, headed by Richard Reid Rogers, has obtained permission through the Supreme Court of New York to inspect the company's books to learn details of its stock bonus plan.

The 1930 pay check of American Tobacco's president, George Washington Hill, amounted to a cool million, and in addition, the distribution of stock to employees, approved by the directors last year, put 13,440 shares into his strong box at the low price of \$25 a share, or a discount of about \$1,283,000 from the current market price.

Mr. Rogers and his group charge that this plan, as applied to all officers and employees who participated amounted to a bonus of about \$30,000,000. He seeks to enjoin this use of stock to "insiders," as he called them, at such bargain prices.

It was the Duke family who created the tobacco dynasty but it was a Hill-George Washington Hill—who assumed a heritage left him by his father, and built the company to its present stature.

He is not in wife's Who, nor will you find an imposing list of companies after his name in the directory of directors, but he is Wall Street's two million dollar a year man—for 1930 at least.

Mr. Hill was only 42 years of age when his father, Percival S. Hill, died suddenly in 1925. The son succeeded his father as president, to become one of the youngest executives at the head of a large corporation in the country. The new president had known no other business. He had gone into the office of the American Tobacco Company in 1904 when Williams College gave him a diploma.

The year he became president the company produced only one-fifth of the country's cigarette production. In the five years of his administration the company's business has virtually doubled and, in 1930, the company manufactured 38 per cent of all the cigarettes manufactured in this country.

417,06 ACRES OF FOREST ADDED TO U. S. RESERVES
Washington.—(AP)—Forest lands totalling 417,064 acres were acquired last year by the United States.

Areas in 15 states were included, and eventually will be proclaimed as national forests, to be added to the 149 existing national forests. Objectives stressed include watershed protection, fire control, demonstration of timber-growing methods and development of other public forest values.

LIQUOR CASE NEARS CLOSE

Prosecution Closes Argument In Charge Against Former Congressman

Washington, March 13.—(AP)—Closing prosecution arguments in the trial of Edward E. Denison, former Illinois representative who is charged with liquor possession, Attorney John J. Sirica today characterized as a "fairy story" the defense claim that the liquor laden trunk found in Denison's office two years ago was not his own.

Sirica asked the jury to consider the case the same as any other criminal proceeding and not give Denison the benefit of the doubt merely because he was a former congressman represented by able lawyers.

He said it was a "strange coincidence" that Denison should bring back a set of dishes as a wedding gift for Mrs. John Layne, wife of a former secretary, nine or ten years after they were married.

He said it also was strange that the trunk of dishes was addressed to John Layne at Denison's office when other baggage belonging to the defendant was addressed in his town name.

He asked the jury why the Denison trunk claimed to contain dishes and later found in New York by Charles E. Lane, Denison's nephew, was not sent on to Washington in stead of being kept by Lane for ten days in New York before taking it to his (Lane's) home in St. Louis.

Closing for the defense, E. Hillton Jackson said the government conducted a "filmy prosecution."

"We say that the government in its prosecution of this case," Jackson said, "carelessly and in disregard of the rights of this defendant failed to follow the usual procedure to establish the integrity of the samples." He referred to three bottles of liquor used as government exhibits in the trial.

HOUSE OF DIET ON DISPLAY AT HEALTH OFFICE

Creation of Students of Second Grade at Model School Boosts Balanced Diet

"The House That Health Built," a diminutive single-story structure fashioned by the tiny hands of students of the second grade of the Model School, went on display today in the office of the Pitt County Department of Health.

Half a dozen students of the grade had charge of the placement and arrangement of the building in the Board of Health offices, and from now on visitors to the department will have an opportunity to view one of the most unique buildings of its kind probably ever constructed by such wee hands in any school of the state.

The house is the outgrowth of a series of studies in health conducted under the direction of Mrs. Eugene Robeson, teacher of the second grade. It embraces every feature of what food specialists consider a well-balanced diet and is a gem both from the standpoint of inventive genius and the idea which it conveys in the effort to stimulate interest in the public health movement.

The students of this grade recently were honored first place in a state contest dealing with school work, and those who have inspected the "food house" believe they stand good chances of gaining state-wide honors in the field of public health.

The house is of a Spanish type of architecture with the stucco effect being represented by a liberal coating of oatmeal. The roof is made of Graham crackers and a quart-sized milk bottle holds a commanding position as chimney.

Prunes constitute the gutter and raisins carry out the effect of windows. Prunes are featured again in the foundation of the building, and crackers are again brought into play in the formation of the porch.

The porch is composed of brown bread and in the rustic stucco reappears several giant peanuts in the form of individuals. Pillars of the porch are made of oranges. Half lemons form the swinging baskets.

Flowers used in profusion about the yard are represented by celery tops. The walk is made of rice, soap of peaches while cakes of soap are used as steps leading to the building.

Bordering the yard may be found plenty of vitamins in the nature of carrots, onions, peppers, potatoes, bananas, lemons, squash and beets. The drinking fountain in the yard has a center of grits, bordered with raisins. A nest of eggs is one of the features used in the beautification project of grounds in the front of the building.

The public is extended a cordial invitation to visit the offices of the Board of Health and look over the little house of health. It conveys a vivid idea of what the schools are accomplishing in inspiring the children to give attention to their health as well as to their minds.

SEVERAL HELD AS RESULT OF LIQUOR RAID

Woman Operator of Charlotte Night Club Among Those Arrested Today

Charlotte, March 13.—(AP)—Federal prohibition agents, assisted by county and city police, arrested 27 persons on various charges of liquor law violations in a series of raids here today.

Kanipe said the raiders held 40 warrants, based on evidence secured by undercover agents, but did not expect to serve them all today. One of the warrants was for Calvin Anderson, a negro who had died since the agents secured the evidence.

Seven of those arrested were negroes, including three women. One white woman was arrested. Mrs. Bertie Scott, former operator of "Scottie's Place," a night club on the York, S. C. road, and Don Anderson, one of her associates, were among those arrested. Mrs. Scott is now under indictment in Federal court for violating the prohibition laws.

She was tried and acquitted in County Recorder's court several months ago on a charge of murder in connection with the death of a girl who leaped or was thrown from Mrs. Scott's automobile and was fatally injured.

All those arrested were to be carried before United States Commissioner Huggins this afternoon for hearing.

TWO HELD IN BANK CHARGE

Col. Luke Lee and Rogers Caldwell Released Under \$15,000 Bond

Nashville, Tenn., March 13.—(AP)—Colonel Luke Lee and Rogers Caldwell were free on bonds of \$15,000 each today while the government prepared to try them on charges of violating national banking laws and a state legislative committee put the finishing touches on a preliminary report about the fallen banks in whose affairs they were associated.

Dodging reporters and photographers the pair slipped into the Federal building here last night and surrendered on indictments returned last Saturday by a grand jury in Greenville, Tenn., charging them with conspiring with J. Basil Ramsey, president of the closed Holston Union National Bank of Knoxville, to have \$98,000 placed to their account at the expense of the bank's credit. Ramsey previously surrendered for arrest in Knoxville and was released on \$25,000 bond.

Caldwell's bond was furnished by his father, James E. Caldwell, and W. G. Simmons, of Nashville. Wallace Smith, foreman of the composing room of the Evening Tennessee here of which Lee is publisher, Mrs. Smith and Jesse Beasley, Sr., Muffreesboro capitalist, went on Lee's bond.

Caldwell, Lee and Ramsey will be arraigned at the session of Federal court at Knoxville, May 25.

NANCY BOWEN SENT TO JAIL

Indian Woman Draws 1 to 10 Years for the Killing of Artist's Wife

Buffalo, N. Y., March 13.—(AP)—Nancy Bowen, 63-year-old Seneca Indian woman, today was sentenced to imprisonment for one to ten years for manslaughter, in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Clotilde Marchand, wife of Henri Marchand, an artist, in Buffalo, last March.

The effect of the sentence was to set the aged Indian woman free immediately, the judge stipulating that the year she has already been held in jail since her arrest should be counted on her prison sentence.

Nancy, who freely admitted the killing but declared it had been done because she believed Mrs. Marchand was a "white witch," pleaded guilty Tuesday to the manslaughter charge which was reduced from one of murder, first degree.

LEGION POST TO HOLD MASS MEETING HERE

Roy McMillan, of Raleigh, to Be Principal Speaker at the Court House

J. S. Elliott, commander of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion, issued a statement this morning urging all former service men of Pitt county to attend the mass meeting at the court house tomorrow night at 7:30 o'clock.

This will be one of the most important meetings held by the post in months, the commander said, and it is important that all men who served in the great conflict to defeat German autocracy be present to participate.

Simultaneous meetings will be held by all other posts of the state and the state commander will deliver a radio address dealing with questions which vitally affect the life of the organization at this time.

Mr. Elliott stated that a radio would be installed in the court house so that those attending the meeting may hear the message of the state commander.

Forms for application for loans on compensation certificates will be provided and any veteran desiring to obtain a loan will be given the assistance of members of the committee appointed by the post some time ago to aid the farmer service men in taking advantage of the opportunity to realize on their certificates.

One of the highlights of the meeting will be an address by Roy McMillan, of the Raleigh Legion Post. Although the subject of his talk had not been announced today, it was stated that he would deal exclusively with issues affecting the Legion in this and other sections of the country.

Mr. McMillan, a member of the Raleigh Bar Association, is considered a speaker of recognized ability, and members of the post are looking forward to his address with interest.

Special Term of Court Sought for Buncombe Bankers

Asheville, March 13.—(AP)—A special term of Superior Court, to try the cases of 17 bankers and former public officials indicted as the result of disclosures made following failure of several banks in this community, is being sought here.

Eighteen were originally indicted but former Mayor Gallatin Roberts killed himself a few days after the grand jury acted against him.

Solicitor Zeb V. Nettles, who asked Governor Gardner for a special term, said it would probably be held between April 13 and May 13.

Special auditors are still busily engaged in ferreting out details of the high financing here over a period of years which finally resulted in closing scores of banks and practically bankrupting Buncombe and other counties also the City of Asheville. Additional indictments are expected before the cases now pending are brought to trial.

Hendersonville Man Killed In Auto Collision

Hendersonville, March 13.—(AP)—Emmett Stepp, 23, of Hendersonville, was killed instantly when his automobile collided with another driven by Mrs. J. M. Pain, wife of the publisher of the Hendersonville Times-News, here at 11 o'clock last night.

Stepp was employed as a meat cutter at an Asheville chain store. Henderson County deputy sheriffs said today that Stepp was going west on Fifth avenue and Mrs. Pain, north on Clement street. After the collision Stepp's car hit the curb crashed into a telephone pole and overturned. His head was crushed beneath the body of the vehicle.

A coroner's jury was impaneled here today to view Stepp's body, but the inquest was adjourned until tomorrow or Monday because of the nervous condition of Mrs. Pain. Mrs. Pain is not under bond.

Charged With Murder



William F. Whiteside of Richmond, Va., was charged with murder after his wife died from a gunshot wound. Whiteside said a revolver was discharged accidentally.

RHODES CASE GOES TO JURY

Hendersonville Banker Charged With the Embezzlement of Money From Bank

Hendersonville, March 13.—(AP)—The case of J. Mack Rhodes, charged with embezzling \$21,000 from the First Bank and Trust Co. here while he was its president, went to the jury at 12:35 p. m. today.

Arguments of counsel, interrupted by introduction to the court of Max Abernethy, assistant secretary of state brought a certified copy of the original charter of the bank, showing it to be subject to state banking laws, were completed this morning.

The person of the defendant was introduced as evidence after Judge Sink had indicated he would not allow discussion of Rhodes' physical condition without it.

Rhodes is alleged to have misappropriated six different sums, ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000, during the period from July, 1928, to September, 1929, and to have made false entry October 1, 1930, in an effort to cover it up.

Hess on W. Gaither Rhodes, is serving a prison term for embezzling \$40,000 from the bank while he was its cashier.

Senate Passes Bill Prohibiting Women Working Nights

Raleigh, March 13.—(AP)—Night work in industry for women under 18 years of age in North Carolina will be prohibited under the new law passed by the Senate today. The measure had already passed the House.

The bill was considered in conjunction with the Jones bill to prohibit night work for all women. The present law prohibits nights night for women under 16 years of age.

Considering the Jones measure on a majority report, the Senate killed it and then passed the Neman measure without a record vote.

Efforts Still Underway to Defer Revaluation Until 1933; House Pauses Long Enough to Have Picture Snapped With Governor Gardner; Much Interest Centered About Public Hearing On Buncombe Gambling Bill

Raleigh, March 13.—(AP)—For the second time during its session, the 1931 General Assembly today postponed the quadrennial reassessment of property scheduled to have started January 1.

The Senate added its approval to the Halstead bill, passed in the House yesterday, which postpones revaluation until April 1, 1931. Efforts are still being made to postpone the reassessment until 1933.

Mandatory reduction of gross tax levies by county commissioners to reflect any savings effected by "tax reduction" measures passed by the 1931 General Assembly was also approved by the Senate today when it passed the Connor-Woodard bill.

The measure will become law upon ratification.

The House worked slowly after stopping its labors to allow a photographer to picture the body in company with Governor Gardner.

Much interest centered in the public hearing before the Senate committee on counties, cities and towns this afternoon on the Reed bill, to allow pari-mutuel betting in conjunction with horse and dog racing in Buncombe county.

The Cherry anti-syndicalism bill, opposed by labor and liberals, received an unfavorable committee report in the House and the Johnson bill to limit work of women in industry to the 35-hour week came in favorably reported but immediately was sent to the committee on manufactures.

In the Senate final approval was given the Johnson bill to allow counties to levy special taxes for certain general fund expenses and the Whedbee bill top provide for extension of special assessments passed its second reading.

Providing for licenses for all drivers of motor vehicles in North Carolina, the Senate again approved the Blount-Lawrence bill which it recalled when contradicting sections were discovered.

The bill remained in the same form as before after its second passage when an amendment by Senator Hicks of Granville to strike out any requirements that licenses be sold was defeated 23 to 21.

Under the measure one section stipulates sheriffs and officers may issue licenses free of charge but this is nullified by another section stipulating non-owners must pay \$1 annually. One free license will be issued with each automobile tag.

Spirited debate developed in the Senate when Senator Pritchett of Bertie moved immediate consideration of the Halstead bill, which passed the House yesterday.

Senator Ward of Beaufort attacked the measure as a part of a plan to eventually postpone the revaluation until 1933, which was advocated by Governor Gardner in his biennial message.

Efforts to carry the resolution over until tomorrow were made, with Senator Hindsdale of Wake leading the fight, and Senator Baggett of Harnett sought vainly to exempt his county.

The passage was without a record vote.

In urging the assembly to postpone the revaluation two years, the governor pointed out that lands were at unusually low valuations at this time due to the nation-wide depression and expressed the opinion reassessment should not be made in times of unusual stress.

Schroeder Convicted In Manslaughter Case

Indianapolis, March 13.—(AP)—Convicted of voluntary manslaughter for the death of an unknown hiker whose body he admitted burning in his automobile near here last May, Harold Herbert Schroeder, Mobile, Ala., today faced a 2 to 21 year term in the Indiana state prison.

Judge Frank P. Parker, who presided at the trial of Criminal court will pronounce sentence Monday morning.

The verdict was reached by a jury after three hours 35 minutes deliberation. The state had sought conviction of first degree murder and imposition of the death penalty.

Trs. M. Holmes, defense counsel, announced he will not file any motions to set aside the verdict, but said he would confer today with Schroeder's relatives.

COMMENT PITT SOLONS FOR STAND ON BILL TO LEGALIZE GAMBLING

Pitt county members of the State Legislature have been heartily commended for their action in voting against the bill seeking to legalize gambling on races in Buncombe county.

Numbers of citizens who have been keeping close check on the activities of the General Assembly today expressed their appreciation of the work of the Pitt county representatives, and declared they should receive the commendation of the entire community.

The Pitt county men have also voted judiciously in other matters affecting the public life of the state, and have made a favorable impression at the capital as well as in their home town communities.

FOUR CASES GIVEN AIRING IN POLICE COURT TODAY

Only four defendants appeared for trial in the regular Friday morning session of Police court today, which was marked by unusual brevity.

James Pitt, colored, charged with operating an automobile while under the influence of whiskey, was turned over to the next sitting of county court.

Dave Turnage, colored, charged with assault upon his wife, had judgment suspended upon payment of cost.

J. W. Squires paid a fine of \$5 after being convicted on a charge of drunkenness.

A similar fine was imposed upon Francis Dancy, appearing on a like charge.

BELIEVE LEGISLATORS WILL ACT ON TAX QUESTION SOON

One of the largest delegations ever to attend a committee meeting of the State Legislature went to Raleigh yesterday to protest against the bill for the repeal of the McClellan school bill and to impress upon the members the desire of landowners for an appreciable reduction of taxes.

This was the opinion expressed by Greenville men who were among the several thousand farmers and business men who attended the session.

The delegation expressed itself definitely in favor of a luxury tax instead of the proposed sales tax, and urged the legislators to take immediate action with a view to relieving the landowners of some of the burden which they have been carrying so long.

Opinion was expressed that the Legislature now had some definite sentiment upon which to base its action, and it was believed something would be accomplished in the half of tax reduction soon.

Seniors Will Strike Is Suspended Pupils Are Not Graduated

(St. Paul, Minn., March 3.—(AP)—More than 100 seniors at the University of Minnesota Farm School today threatened to "walk out" of commencement exercises March 23 unless 12 of their fellow classmates, suspended for liquor drinking, are allowed to graduate.

The thirteen were among seventeen students at the school involved in suspensions. While the campus seethed with indignation over what students termed "unfairness," preparations were made to launch a legislative inquiry into the circumstances of the case today.

Two investigations may be started by the law makers—one into the general liquor situation at the University of Minnesota, situated in Minneapolis, and the other into the suspensions at the local institution, which is an agricultural high school branch of the university.

J. O. Christianson, acting principal at the school, announced the suspensions. University authorities declined to discuss the matter, but students said all had been called before the principal and asked whether they drank liquor. The seventeen who admitted they did, were suspended.

Thirty Thousand Applications For Loans Received

Arthur B. Corey advises that the regional office of the United States Veterans Bureau at Charlotte, gives out the information that up to and including March 11, it had received approximately 30,000 applications for loans on adjusted service certificates, which are being paid off at the rate of about 600 per day. It may require 50 days to pay all these applications. That all applications are being paid in the order in which they are received in the regional office, and that as high as 5,000 applications have been received some days. That it requires eight to ten working days to handle such a day's receipts. So it is entirely possible for two men to forward their applications on the same day, but there will be an interval of ten days in receipt of checks.

There is also a method provided for handling extreme emergency cases of service men suffering or in distress.

WALES TO OPEN BRITISH SHOW

Prince to Raise Curtain on Mammoth Trade Event in Argentine

Buenos Aires, Argentina, March 13.—(AP)—The Prince of Wales will throw open here tomorrow the greatest British trade show ever held outside the empire, climaxing Great Britain's effort to recapture first place in Argentina's foreign trade. The finishing touches were put today to the exhibition in preparation for tomorrow's inaugural.

Twenty million dollars worth of British-made goods have been assembled in Palermo Park—a display calculated to win back to Britain the Argentine trade supremacy which was always hers until the United States wrested it away during the World War.

The exposition, the visit of Wales and Prince George, the presence of British warships and war plans mark the crescendo of Britain's trade attack, after careful inquiry into why it lost to the United States the affections of Argentina's buyers of foreign wares.

Two years ago D'Abernon Mission visited Argentina and proposed a pact under which Argentina's credits for the meat and grain it sends to Britain would be used in the purchase of British manufactured goods.

No agreement resulted, but the mission planted the slogan: "Buy from those who buy from us." It was taken up by the Argentine Rural Society and by others whose export business the new American tariff law injured.

The Argentine government has befriended the British exposition by admitting duty-free all exhibits which are not to be sold here. The British automobile trade, which sells but one car in Argentina to every 200 of American make, is particularly well represented. Many other British firms have sent exhibitions and will maintain branch offices here after the show ends.

The British government transported some of the exhibits in its own warships and has erected one of the largest pavilions on the exposition grounds.

There are two types of ponies, said Dr. Arnold, who is professor of bacteriology and preventive medicine at the University of Illinois College of Medicine.

One type, he declared, defies crumbling. Prepared with coarsely ground whole meal and water, this type would require more than the average human strength to crumble it into pot likker.

The other type, to which eggs and clabbered milk are added, would crumble even before it reached the likker.

"The whole question now threatening to divide the solid South," Arnold said, "resolves itself into a question of whether a person was raised on corn meal and water ponies or on corn meal and eggs—clabbered milk ponies. Corn meal and water pone eaters are dunkers, the others are crumblers. Which settles that."

Arnold became almost poetic in his praise of the health giving qualities of these southern combinations.

"A more nourishing, health-giving, disease preventing food can hardly be found," he declared. "Pot likker is a concentrate of vitamins, salts and other essential foods," he added. "Iron, calcium,

magnesium and other salts, extracted by boiling the leafy parts of turnips, wild dock and thistle plants, builds good red blood cells. It's good for anemias."

Real corn ponies of both types, he said, when made from whole corn meal, are rich in the growth promoting and vitality giving vitamins. If milk and eggs are added so much the better, since it—especially the milk—is rich in fats and sugars.

"Corn meal furnishes the fuel, greens the vitamins salts and proteins," he summarized. "Corn ponies and pot likker furnished a diet of low protein, high vitamin and essential salts, and medium sugar or carbohydrate content. They have a real health value. They are good wholesome and protective foods."

"It does not matter whether you are a dunker or a crumbler."

ABOUT TOWN

Chairman Wickersham of Presi-
dent Hoover's Law Enforcement
Commission, is at a loss to under-
stand why the "wets" should be so
displeased with the commission's
report on prohibition when it was
obviously in their favor.

The question isn't difficult to an-
swer. The "wets" like the majority
of people of this country were un-
able to determine exactly what the
report favored and were waiting for
Mr. Wickersham or some other
member of the committee to lead
them out of the wilderness. The
committee should see that the non-
enclature of the next report is not
so equivocal.

The movement to improve the
appearance of Greenville by the
planting of flowers, shrubs and
trees seems to be gaining momen-
tum in all sections of the city.

Numbers of such improvements
have been made by some owners
the last several weeks, and that they
will increase their efforts in this
direction with the coming of balmy
weather may be expected.

Nothing adds more to the appear-
ance of a community than trees and
flowers in the midst of well kept
premises, and it is to be hoped
that members of the various organ-
izations sponsoring the beautifica-
tion program will not cease their
effort until they are satisfied that
their mission has been fulfilled.

One of the most conspicuous im-
provements is that to the rectory
house lawn. While the results of
this work will not be visible for
the next several weeks the time will
come when the citizenship will view
the courthouse property with ad-
ditional pride. By the planting of
new grass, flowers and shrubs citi-
zens hope to make the location one
of the prettiest in the city.

It is cheering news indeed that
the Carolinas will receive approxi-

and rivers. This will play an im-
portant part in restoring condi-
tions to normal. It will mean ad-
ditional employment for hundreds
of men who have walked the streets
without work for the last several
months.

Other parts of the nation were
awarded similar amounts for im-
provements and like the Carolinas,
all derive much benefit from the
pending of the appropriation.
Improvements of this kind not
only provide something the various
districts have been needing for years
but will do their bit toward restor-
ing some of the prosperity which
hit the toboggan with the coming
of the period of deflation.

The Senate unquestionably did
the right thing when it sent the
bill for legalizing of gambling on
races in Buncombe county back to
committee for public hearing.

The favoring of such a measure
for one county would mean that
other sections would demand simi-
lar action in their behalf, although
there are countless numbers of
communities in North Carolina
whose citizens would not resort to
gambling in an attempt to relieve
depression.

It was to be expected that mem-
bers of the Ministerial Association
and other leaders of the state would
oppose the renaissance of this kind
of gambling and that the legislators
would do well to listen to their
plea is not to be questioned.

The measure was introduced for
the purpose of producing better
economic conditions in Buncombe
county, but just where the public
generally would benefit is yet to be
seen. The public moral of a com-
munity is worth inestimably more
than the county could possibly de-
rive in dollars and cents from such
chicanery, and members of the
legislature would do well to con-
sider this fact before taking defi-
nite action.

Plots Against Machado Bring Cuba to Crisis

Havana (AP)—Cuba's critical po-
litical storm, which has raged for
nearly a year, shows few signs of
abating.

Foes of President Gerardo Mach-
ado have sought to unseat him
and while he has kept his large
but disorganized opposition at bay,
scarcely a week passes but that
some move by his enemies gives
him cause for worry.

Economic troubles due to the
sugar slump, have added to his diffi-
culties.

The balance of power rests with
the army and the president is
bending every effort to keep his
15,000 well-trained troops satisfied.

The latest plot against Machado,
however, involved some of the sol-
diers. A private on guard on the
roof of the presidential palace low-
ered a bomb through a ventilator
with the intention of exploding it
in the presidential bath room. It
failed, however, to reach its mark.

The opposition is centered in the
Nationalist Union, a political or-
ganization headed by two former
presidents, Mfnoch and Zayas.

It reached menacing strength last
fall, just before the November con-
gressional elections, and threaten-
ed to postpone the balloting until
it could get recognition as an official
party.

A month before the ballots were
to be cast, congress gave Machado
power to suspend the constitutional
articles which guarantee freedom
of speech and assembly and in-
violability of the home. The power
was not exercised, but the authori-
zation restored tranquility and
administration forces swept the
polls.

The guarantees were, however,
suspended on November 13, when
there was a student outbreak in
which several were killed. Troops
stopped that disorder and congress
then authorized extension of the
emergency powers of the president
for another 60 days.

On November 25 the cabinet tried
to quit, but Machado refused to ac-
cept the resignation. Three days
later secret service police thwarted
an attempt to seize the national
arsenal. On Christmas Eve another
major plot was squelched.

Student difficulties caused all
higher schools in the islands to be

portance in the country. Some of the
editors were deported.

As the 60 days' suspension of
guarantees was about to expire,
congress authorized the president
to continue the measure indefinitely,

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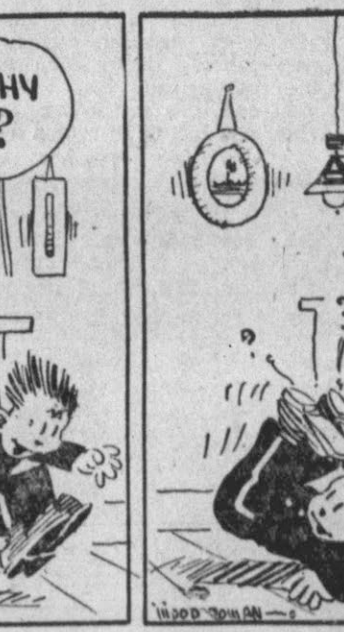

Marse Joe McCarthy, late of the Cubs, now undertaking at least a two year term as manager, has inherited an assortment of great ball players led by Babe Ruth, a flock of pitchers of all sizes and capabilities, plus a few choice problems.

If he's worried about them, Marse Joe doesn't manifest it. Nevertheless he is busy trying to make the various parts in the puzzle fit. The Yankees have floundered since the death of Miller Huggins. In Ruth and Combs of the outfield, Gehrig and Lazzeri of the infield they still have the main cogs of Huggins' last championship club.

This early in the training season, it appears the veteran Joe Sewell, long one of the greatest American League infielders with Cleveland, may solve McCarthy's infield puzzle. If he fits in at third the infield will be rounded out with Tony Lazzeri at second, Lyn Lary at short and Lou Gehrig on first.

The only debatable outfield post is left field, Allen (Dusty) Cooke. If he has found himself, will get the call, but he will have to outthrust Sammy Burd.

Seago, Moyer, Warren, Turnage, Wells, a freshman, and J. B. James, round out the aspirants, and they are all pretty good.

The season will start around the last of March or the first of April, and the games will be announced through this paper, so be on the lookout and everyone come out who likes the high school and wants to support her, for she certainly needs the support in athletics about as bad as in any other way. Reasonable season tickets will be put on sale at the first game; the price has not yet been determined, but will be about \$2. SHIRES FAILS TO SHOW UP WITH THE BREWERS

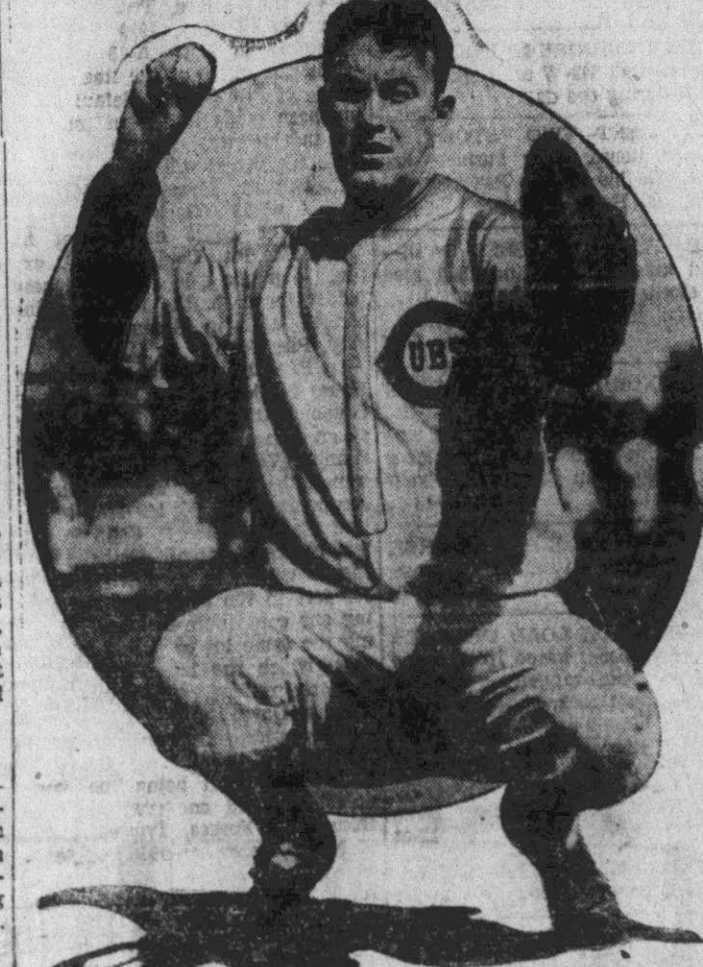

COTTON MARKET

New York, March 13.—(AP)—Cotton opened steadily today at an advance of 7 to 10 points in response to relatively steady Liverpool cables and sold about 10 to 12 points net higher during the first few minutes with May advancing to 11.03 and October to 11.60.

There was considerable covering as well as some trade buying, and brokers credited with operating for the cooperative interests were said to be buyers of October and December. There was some selling here for continental account in the later months, however, and after the initial demand had been supplied, prices eased off slightly under some local selling. Very little selling was reported from the south during the early trading.

The steadier ruling of Liverpool following yesterday's decline was attributed to continental and Bombay buying, covering and a scarcity of contracts. Fair sales of cotton cloths were reported in Manchester to the British home trade with a moderate demand from India. Egyptian cotton in Alexandria was 33 to 40 points higher and the Indian spot quotation in Liverpool showed an advance of 15 points.

STOCK MARKET

(Associated Press Financial Editor)

New York, March 13.—(AP)—The downward drift of share prices persisted quietly for the fourth successive day in today's stock market.

The most encouraging aspect of the situation was again the slim volume of selling, too slim to offer much encouragement to the bears, but bulls still found the situation very much deflated by rumors of further dividend reductions, and lack of pronounced business recovery.

Losses were in the main moderate. Such shares as U. S. Steel, General Electric, General Motors, and radio were supported slightly under yesterday's closing levels. Allied Chemical, however, remained a sore spot, dropping about 6 points to a new low for the past three years. Eastman lost as much as 2 to 3 points, including Bethlehem Steel, Union Carbide, Westernhouse Electric, North American, Public Service of N. J. National Power and Light, Caterpillar tractor, electric auto lite, and American Water works.

Wall Street regarded the secretary of labor's employment report for February as distinctly encouraging, although the betterment was not sufficiently pronounced to be translated into rising share prices. The 71-2 percent gain in factory payrolls which was an upturn more than 50 percent larger than usual was impressive.

Credit conditions appeared to have returned to the status of February. Call money was officially quoted at 11-2 percent, but outside funds were available at 1 percent. Brokers' loans were too small to count. A gain of \$29,000,000 in attract much attention, although it seemed to indicate that pools may have accomplished some distribution to the public.

Memoranda—A first dividend totaling \$62,000 will be paid to depositors of the defunct Bank of Union Saturday, it was announced today. The bank closed in April, 1930, with \$775,000 on deposit.

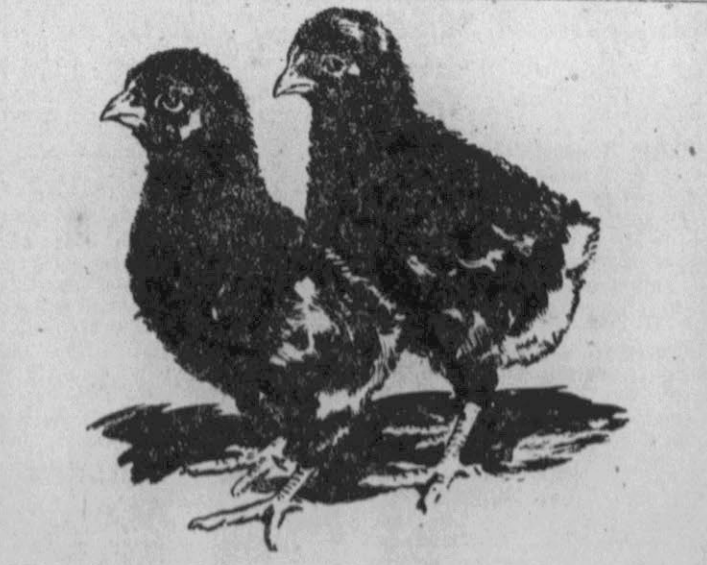
