MUCH ACTION PROMISED IN U. S. POLITICS

Bursts of Prophecy Causes 1932 Campaign to Take On Additional Interest

Washington, March 27.—(AP)—Burst of prophecy concerning 1932 followed today in the path of developments that promised an interesting if not tumultuous political future.

As observers scanned the horizon, they based their deductions on the following.

Some southern Democrats are saying that business be the issue in the elections and that their party convention ignore anti-prohibition proposals made at the recent meeting of their national committee.

Senator Norris doubts that Independents will help Democrats to organize the new Senate.

Norris and Representative LaGuardia pledged co-operation between House and Senate Progressives.

Dissension between the major political parties over New York and Chicago has brought up Tammany and episodes of the Harding administration.

Leaders of a movement for a special session have been told their efforts probably will be fruitless.

Members of the Southern Democratic wing have begun their campaign to prevent convention approval of some platform planks suggested by Chairman Raskob of the National committee.

This campaign is an outgrowth of the controversy which followed Raskob's recommendations at the recent meeting. Among other things, he proposed retention of the Eighteenth Amendment but convention approval of another Constitutional change to give states control of liquor. Some of his suggestions as to changes in laws affecting business also have been criticized.

The effort to head off the Raskob suggestions was begun at a meeting in the office of Senator Robinson Democrats who joined Robinson were Senators Swanson of Virginia and Hull of Tennessee, and former Governor Byrd of Virginia.

As this movement went forward, Senator Norris said today he had no idea of helping the Democrats to organize the Senate.

"Naturally," the Nebraska Independent-Republican said, "I don't know what the future will bring, but so far there have been no conferences and no talk of helping the Democrats assume control of the Senate. I doubt that the Progressives will do that, although it is too early to say definitely as many things may happen before Congress convenes."

Dynamite Found In Rooms of Men Who Tried to Kill Ace

Rome, March 27.—(AP)—A box of dynamite and several bombs were reported by police today to have been found in the hotel rooms of two Italians arrested March 4 in connection with an alleged plot to assassinate Premier Mussolini. The two men were Ersilio Belloni and Luigi Delini.

The two men now are said to have been acting independently. Instead of having been affiliated with the bombing, headed by Michele Schirrup, a naturalized American citizen who was arrested February 3 and is awaiting trial.

At the time of his arrest Schirrup had two explosive bombs in his baggage. He fired several shots at police and then shot himself in the head. After his arrest police gave out an alleged confession in which Schirrup, said to have lived in New York, admitted that he was an anarchist and planned to kill Mussolini.

CLAIM FRAUD IN RAILROAD DEAL

Washington, March 27.—(AP)—Charging that acquisition of the Chicago and Alton railroad by the Baltimore and Ohio would be a legal fraud, stockholder A. C. C. and A. Line today filed a brief with the Interstate Commerce commission claiming an equity of \$65,000 in the road.

Faith Immunity for Bible

Washington.—As international courtesy immunity from tariff has been granted to the Bible sent to the Right Rev. James E. Freeman, Bishop of Washington, by the Emperor of Ethiopia. The Bible is covered with precious metals and adorned with a cross of gold and silver. It was given to the Ethiopian prelate because he played for the success of the emperor's reign.

SEEKS PROBE OF COLLISION AT CHARLOTTE

Solicitor Will Ask Grand Jury to Investigate Crash of Train and Street Car

Charlotte, March 27.—(AP)—Solicitor John G. Carpenter today announced he would request the grand jury which convenes here April 20 to investigate the collision of a train and a street car here yesterday resulting in injuries to 43 persons.

The solicitor has already begun a personal investigation to determine whether in his opinion any criminal negligence was responsible for the wreck.

Meanwhile, officials of the Southern Railway whose southbound passenger train Number 11 struck the street car and officials of the Southern Public Utilities Company, operators of the street car, were making investigations.

The steam road was blamed for the wreck by officials of the street car company who asserted improper manipulation of the gates guarding a crossing caused it. Southern Railway officials had no comment.

Oxford Man Heads Organization for Tobacco Reduction

Henderson, March 27.—(AP)—Andrew Jamison, Oxford, today headed an organization formed to work for reduction of old bright belt tobacco acreage this year by one-fourth to one-third.

Jamison was elected president of the organization at its initial meeting yesterday. G. W. Knott, of Henderson, was named secretary.

A mass meeting of warehousemen, bankers and tobacco men in general will be held next Monday at Durham to schedule meetings throughout the territory in furtherance of the campaign.

CLASS WINS GOOSE EGGS

New Haven, Conn.—"No" on a typewriter is two taps; one more tap and "yes" is obvious. Students in a Yale biology class took advantage of this to follow the answers of an exceptionally brilliant blind student who used a portable typewriter at weekly "yes and no" quizzes. The instructor caught on; he asked the blind student to reverse his answers; the class won goose eggs.

ONE ARREST REPORTED IN N. Y. INQUIRY

Rollin C. Bastrees, Retired Building Inspector, Held for Irregularities

New York, March 27.—(AP)—Rollin C. Bastrees, who retired last Tuesday as chief building inspector of New York, was arrested early today.

His arrest followed indications that the city-wide investigation voted by the State Legislature would be anticipated by direct action against possibly vulnerable departments and officials on the part of the city administration.

Bastrees was taken into custody on order of Assistant District Attorney Harold W. Hastings, Commissioner of Accounts James J. Higgins, who investigated the building department along with ten others at the request of Mayor J. J. Walker, conferred with Hastings for an hour yesterday.

Details of the charge against the former building official were not made public immediately. Charles Brady, superintendent of the building department, resigned Tuesday.

The conference between Higgins and Hastings gave rise to rumors that indictments would be sought. There was another rumor the mayor would ask for resignations of several city officials on his return from California next week.

The mayor, himself, has yet to answer charges against him which were filed with the governor by the city affairs committee.

One rumor—that Charles L. Kohler, director of the budget, might resign—was promptly denied.

All of the rumors jibed with the general supposition that Tammany, the city's Democratic organization, intended to make a thorough house-cleaning of the city's official life before the Legislature investigating committee begins work.

COLONEL LEA MAKES BOND

Other Tennessee Bankers Also Go to Asheville to Arrange Bail Today

Asheville, March 27.—(AP)—Col. Luke Lea, Nashville financier, Luke Lea Jr., his son, and E. P. Charlet, treasurer of Col. Lea's Tennessee Publishing Company, indicted last week on charges of violating the North Carolina Banking laws, arrived in Asheville this morning to post bonds for their appearance at a special term of court beginning here on April 27.

With the three defendants were John Gardner, attorney of Columbia, Tenn.; Giles Evans, Nashville attorney; and R. H. Claggett, editor-in-chief of the Lea-Caldwell owned Knoxville Journal. Mr. Claggett came with the party as a newspaperman assigned to the story for the Journal.

Surety bonds for the three defendants were being arranged during the morning by Samuel J. Fisher, insurance man, the bonds will be posted with J. B. Cain, clerk of Superior court as soon as the papers have been arranged.

A bond of \$10,000 is asked for the senior Lea and \$5,000 for each of the other two defendants.

Shortly after the Tennessee arrived, Albert L. Cox, of Raleigh, North Carolina, attorney for the defendants, reached Asheville. On the same train came L. P. McLendon, of Durham, who has been commissioned to assist Solicitor Zeb V. Nettles as prosecutor during the special term.

Negroes Jailed At Gadsden for Attack On Girl 'Bummers'

Gadsden, Ala., March 27.—(AP)—The nine negroes charged with attacking two white girls "bumming" in a freight car were in jail here today without protection of the national guard, but officers said no trouble was anticipated.

The negroes were brought here yesterday by guardsmen from Scottsboro, Ala., the guardsmen were called to Scottsboro Wednesday when a mob of mountaineers gathered around the jail there shouting threats against the prisoners.

The alleged attack took place near Stevenson, Ala., Wednesday. The girls, aged 17 and 21 and wearing overalls, were with seven white youths in the freight car en route from Chattanooga, Tenn., to Huntsville, Ala.

THE ARIZONA IS RETURNING PARTY HOME

President Hoover Gives Himself Over to Complete Rest on Way to Capital

U. S. S. Arizona, March 27.—(AP)—The Arizona, carrying President Hoover and his party back to Washington, ran into cool bracing weather during the night after a week spent in the tropics, which left the faces of most of the party, including President Hoover's, turned to a deep red.

The President turned to enjoyment of a complete rest in the three days which remain before the battleship reaches Norfolk and the party go on to Washington.

Mr. Hoover in a statement commented upon the progress the people of Porto Rico had made in self government and establishment of Democratic institutions. He said the island was recovering from the hurricane, drought and business depression.

The President's views of the Virgin Islands was less hopeful. He said that although opinion was divided they might have some military value sometime, but that we were acquiring an effective poorhouse, comprising 90 per cent of the population. The people cannot be self-supporting either in living or government without discovery of new methods and resources."

Commenting that the reason for change of jurisdiction from the naval to a civil department was to see if industry would not be developed, he said: "Viewed from every point except remote naval contingencies, it was unfortunate that we ever acquired the islands. Nevertheless, having assumed the responsibility we must do our best to assist the inhabitants."

The President spent part of the day being shown the intricacies of the battleship's bridge. He inspected a number of new devices for depth finding and fire control, installed in the Arizona during its modernization and not heretofore used in any battleship.

The weather was clear and brisk and the Arizona rode through whitecaps without pitch or roll. The quarter deck on which the President took an early walk was sprayed now and then by a high wave.

Mr. Hoover planned to take an active part in the celebration of the birthday of Colonel Campbell Hodges, for whom the cook baked a special cake.

Buffalo Man Cleans Up \$886,360 In Sweepstakes

London, March 27.—(AP)—C. C. Woods, 32, Buffalo, New York, won approximately \$886,360 in the Irish Hospital Sweepstakes at today's Grand National at Aintree with his ticket on Gregalach which placed second. His ticket had cost him about \$2.50.

The other two big prizes in the sweepstakes went to Emilio Scala, London cafe owner who had the ticket on the winning horse "Grakle" and to George Diamond of Cape Town, South Africa, who won third place with his ticket on Annandale. Scala's prize is approximately \$177,720 and Diamond's approximately \$90,905.

Scala must divide up his prize of more than one and three-quarters millions, however, as he sold part of his ticket before the race. Wood's ticket was shared by five members of his family. It was unknown whether

er Diamond retained full rights in his ticket. The fourth place ticket on Rhydlow, the holder of which just missed stepping into the laurels, was held by the caretaker of the Bolivian legation in London. He saved something of his hopes, however, as he sold half of his ticket in advance for approximately \$10,000.

Buffalo, N. Y., March 27.—(AP)—Five members of the family of Clayton C. Woods, 32, of Buffalo, held a ticket on Gregalach, which ran second in the Grand National Steeplechase at Aintree, England, today, according to reports here, they stand to win \$361,541.92.

The family rejected two offers for the ticket, one of \$15,000 and one of \$50,000, preferring to take a chance on winning a larger sum. They plan to travel to Europe on their winnings.

Body Also Approves the Inheritance and License Tax Schedules in Their Entirety; Newly Inserted Tax Provides for Football and Baseball Games, Dances and Bathing Beaches; High School Athletic Associations Are Exempted; Senate Receives Two Bills

Raleigh, March 27.—(AP)—Hurry through its revenue bill in an attempt to have it completed today by the committee of the whole, the House this afternoon inserted a 10 per cent tax on all amusements except motion pictures and approved the inheritance and license tax schedules in their entirety.

The amusements tax will apply to all football, baseball and other athletic contests except those of high schools and will also be levied on dance halls and bathing beaches. It was offered by Moss and Woodward of Nash.

Planning to finish consideration of its revenue bill as a committee of the whole before adjournment tonight, the House voted at 3 o'clock to recess until 5 o'clock for lunch. This afternoon, from 3 until five o'clock the first afternoon meeting of the 1931 session will be held and at 8 o'clock tonight the body will recess until the committee of the whole has completed the bill.

The Senate received a couple of new bills by Baggett of Harnett relating to taxes, one to levy a surtax on foreign and domestic corporations after an allowance of 10 per cent in net earnings, and the other to make income tax data available to the public.

Reaching its special order, the Senate displaced three banking bills set for consideration today and reverted to its special order of last night, the Newman and White bills placing regulations on highway carriers.

The upper House passed the Hamilton act to allow the use of \$44,000, paid the state annually by the Norfolk-Southern railroad for the lease of the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad, to erect terminals and piers at Morehead City. The grant is for five years.

The House refused to adopt the Ewing amendment to reduce the tax on ice cream from one-half a cent a gallon to one-fourth of a cent.

Representative Ewing of Cumberland contended that the section, as it was adopted, provides an increase in tax on ice cream manufacturers of 400 per cent and was unfair in that bottlers were let off with a 100 per cent increase.

A number of amendments to correct typographical errors in the revenue bill were adopted.

The section providing for a new system of taxing "for hire" vehicles and trucks was adopted.

"For hire" automobiles will be taxed \$1.90 per hundred pounds weight; excursion and sight-seeing automobiles will be taxed from \$2 to \$4 per hundred pounds weight, according to seating capacity; and trucks for hire will be taxed from \$1.25 per hundred pounds weight to \$4 per hundred, according to carrying capacity.

An amendment by Halstead of Camden to limit the tax on rural restaurants to \$15 was defeated. The tax provided as \$1 per person provided with a chair, stool, or bench, with a minimum of \$5.

Under the Moss-Woodward amendment football games, bathing beaches, baseball games and dance halls are taxed. All high school athletic contests are exempted.

Exempted was granted to insurance paid ex-soldiers by the federal government when the inheritance section was reached, upon motion of Cherry of Gaston.

Schedule A of the bill, leaving inheritance taxes, was adopted in its entirety with the amendment, and schedule B, the license tax section, was also adopted.

SNOW STORM SPREADS OVER WESTERN AREA

Blizzard Reaches Fanlike From the Rockies to South-east and Mid-west

Kansas City, March 27.—(AP)—A blizzard spreading fanlike from the Northwest today blew its icy breath over sections of the Rocky Mountain, southwest and middle-western areas.

Sub-zero temperatures prevailed in parts of Montana, Wyoming, and Colorado, where clearing weather generally was predicted as the storm moved eastward.

Precipitation totaled 26 on an inch in Denver, but snow was extremely heavy in sections of Wyoming. Snow had prevailed south to Albuquerque, N. M., where the flakes melted as they fell.

Below normal temperatures were reported at Salt Lake City, where seven inches of snow fell Wednesday. Trains were resuming normal schedules after meeting considerable difficulty with drifted snow.

To the eastward a north wind howled its way over cities, plains, and farm land. Damage to fruit and stock was expected.

Zero temperatures and drifting snow paralyzed traffic, disorganized communication lines and grounded mail planes in Nebraska.

In the western part of the state the mercury dropped to zero and a 50-mile gale drove snow into deep drifts.

The season's worst storm was reported at Norton, Kas., four inches of snow, of great value to winter wheat, followed a rain. Temperatures fell steadily.

Ponca City, Okla., in the northern part of the state, was gripped by the blizzard.

The "norther" reached the Texas Panhandle country last night. Snow fell at Lubbock and Pampa. At Texline the mercury registered seven degrees. General rains were reported in the central and southern part of Texas.

Fruit crops were given up as lost at Amarillo, Tex., where the thermometer dropped to 11 degrees.

Snow fell at Kansas City, and other western Missouri points. Air traffic was brought to a standstill.

Senate Passes Highway Carrier Substitute Bill

Raleigh, March 27.—(AP)—The Senate today passed its committee substitute measure to impose stricter regulations on size, weight and operation of highway carriers.

The bill of the committee was adopted without amendment.

Under it no vehicle may be more than 90 inches wide, 12 feet high, 33 feet long (or with trailer 55 feet), nor shall it at its load exceed 16 tons in weight. No truck may be operated faster than 35 miles an hour, with the limit for trucks and trailers 30 miles.

HIGH POINT NOT WITHOUT GOVERNMENT

Representatives Attempt to Clear Up Sentiment on Transfer of City Charter

Raleigh, March 27.—(AP)—Representatives Wayne and Turner of Guilford today issued statements terming "excitement" which has arisen over the status of the city government of High Point "much like a mare's nest" and a matter "preposterous on its face."

Last night High Point city officials were advised by a New York bond attorney that the new city charter left them without a legally functioning governing body.

Mr. Wayne's statement follows: "The conclusion drawn in High Point yesterday that the city is without a government; due to the enactment of the new charter shows what I regard as an amazing misconception of the law."

"I understood that the excitement followed an opinion by High Point's legal financial advisers, in New York and that their opinion was based on the fact that the charter bill did not provide specifically that the present governing board members should hold office until their successors were elected and qualified."

"I have not yet been advised in detail of the criticism, but if the report in the press is accurate, then it appears to me that the critics have overlooked a well-recognized principle in civil government in this country—that no government is abolished until its successor is elected and qualified."

"North Carolina has written that principle into its statute law, section 3305 of the consolidated statutes, and even if it had not, no court in this state would hold that the government of the city had been abolished in advance of the qualification of its successor, in my judgment."

"Certainty of this matter must await a full hearing of the criticism of course, and I am disposed to go even further than I consider necessary to cure any portion of the act questioned by competent legal opinion. At this time, however, the whole matter looks very much like a mare's nest."

Turner's statement follows: "I concur in the statement of Mr. Wayne in connection with the supposed abolition of the city government. The matter is preposterous on its face. The charter in the main as finally enacted, with the exception of the partization feature, was prepared by a committee of the High Point Bar association, representing the best legal talent in the city, this fact alone should show the utter absurdity of the statement that the city is now without government."

PENNSYLVANIA CITIZEN SEEKS RECORD OF OLD COMMISSION IN PITT

Members of the intelligentsia who are well informed concerning the history of Pitt county, particularly that period preceding the Revolutionary War, should go to the rescue of Frank Harrington, clerk of Superior court.

The affable clerk this morning received a letter from M. J. Boyer, member of the faculty of public schools of Allentown, Pa., asking aid in ascertaining the signature of the clerk of court during the year 1769.

Mr. Boyer stated that he had in his possession a commission to one Benjamin Prince to practice law in Pitt county, but that he was unable to determine the signature of the clerk because the name had been partially obliterated by age.

Mr. Harrington said the courthouse records for that period were destroyed by fire many years ago and it would be impossible for him to furnish the information unless some person with a keen recollection of the history of the county came to his rescue.

CIVIL COURT CONTINUES WORK AFTER BRIEF RECESS

Mrs. Ray Tyson, Jr. was paid \$275.00 in an action against the Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company as result of injuries which she sustained when she stepped into a hole made by the company employees on Fifth street.

J. F. HARRINGTON INVITED TO ADDRESS LAW SCHOOL

Frank Harrington, Clerk of Superior Court of Pitt County, and a recognized authority on activities dealing with this important office, has been invited to address the law class at the University of North Carolina, either during the spring or fall terms, but he has not been able to decide just when he will be able to accept the invitation.

Mr. Harrington received the invitation from Albert Coates, head of the University law department, who said that students entering the law field usually were poorly informed concerning the workings of the office of the clerk of court where much of their work is done, and expressed a desire to more fully acquaint his class with this phase of activity.

It was stated that other well-known clerks of court would be invited to appear before the class from time to time.

Another Man Missing In Haywood County

Washington, March 27.—(AP)—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of Scott Brown, and Mims White from the Big Bend section of Haywood county last August became more complicated today when it was learned that another man had been missing for months.

Gray Henderson, 50-year-old resident of the Big Bend community, has been missing from his home since last August 1, and is believed to have met the fate of Brown and White, who walked up a mountain trail last summer and never returned. Henderson is believed to be dead.

Henderson was visiting at the home of Bob McGaha, in Green county, Tennessee, last August 1, and is said to have left several days later for his home in Big Bend section. He did not reach his home and has not been seen or heard from since.

Henderson's wife left the community sometime ago and her whereabouts are not known. They have several children, it is understood.

Henderson's disappearance was reported to Haywood County officers this morning when two residents of the Mt. Sterling community near the Big Bend section, appealed to the sheriff for aid in enforcement of laws at Big Bend.

odds, old hands at Westminster say they have but slim chances of tangible success; that Mosley is throwing away a brilliant future.

The Mosley answer is that old England is in a bad way, facing a national emergency on such problems as unemployment, slumping foreign trade and industrial troubles.

Desperate remedies are needed, Mosley believes, and he offers a "National plan," parliamentary re-

form, import tariffs and a mellowed dictatorship or executive control of government.

For their realization Mosley stakes his political life in a gallant venture for those to whom national problems mean more than loyalty to old parties.

Already this rebel scion of an old family has moved about the British political stage a dozen years, "doing everything by turns and nothing long," the cynics say.

In 1918, at the age of 22, he sat in Commons for Harrow as a socialist. Bolting the conservative camp, he became an independent, flirted with the liberals and then embraced labor.

Meanwhile he had espoused the comely Lady Cynthia, daughter of Lord Curzon of Kedleston and

granddaughter of Levi Leiter of Chicago.

Schooled at fashionable Winchester and at Sandhurst, the British West Point, the war saw him a lawyer and an aviator. He has wealth of his own, and Lady Cynthia shares the Leiter millions.

NACIENT MOUNDS PICTURE RACE OF INDIAN TRADERS

East St. Louis, Ill.—(AP)—Prof. A. B. Kelly of the University of Illinois, after a month's laboratory study of relics removed when an Indian mound near here was razed for truck garden acreage, concludes that the prehistoric mound builders stripped the flesh from their honored dead before burial.

Beads and shells, discovered in large quantities, lead him further

to suppose that the aborigines were active in trade, probably trafficking in girth tribes far distant from their now extinct metropolises.

The Cahokia mounds, one of the largest groups in the United States center about Mounds' mound, the largest in North America. Its builders lived in a city stretching over at least six miles.

"The construction of such large mounds," says Dr. Kelly, "require vast reservoirs of labor and the strongest of motivations, such as the vanity of a powerful king or the driving force of religion. The latter suggestion is more in keeping with what is known of the culture of the mound builders in other parts of the country."

LEO BROTHERS IS IDENTIFIED

Father John Reynolds of Notre Dame Says He Resembled Man At Lingle Killing

Criminal Court Building, Chicago, Ill., March 27.—(AP)—Father John Reynolds of Notre Dame University appeared as a state witness in the Leo Brothers murder trial today and testified that "Mr. Brothers" answered the description of the man who fled from the Alfred Lingle slaying.

Clark Applegate, Kentucky turfman and a state witness, was dismissed from the stand today after the defense had failed to shake his story that he saw Brothers drop the pistol that killed Alfred (Jake) Lingle, newspaper reporter, last June.

Cross examination of the red-haired, affable, race horse trainer was only brief and brought out little in addition to his sensational testimony of yesterday.

He did not see the pistol in Brothers' hand, Applegate said, but he saw him toss the weapon about 15 feet from the body of the slain reporter.

"Well, he couldn't toss it with his foot, could he," snapped back the witness.

Applegate was the fifth state witness to testify that he saw a man running from the Randolph street pedestrian tunnel after the shooting and to identify Brothers as that man, but he was the first to say he saw Brothers throw down the gun. He did not testify he saw the shot fired.

The defense tried to go into detail over the financial transactions Applegate had with Lingle, but the state's objection that the ground had been covered already was sustained by Judge Joseph Sabath.

Yesterday the turfman said he and Lingle were good friends and often cashed checks or loaned each other sums up to \$1,500. He also said Lingle talked to him two days before he was killed about buying a pair of race horses.

Gandhi Appointed Chief Delegate To London Conference

Karachi, India, March 27.—(AP)—Mahatma Gandhi India's "great soul" emerged today from weeks of strife and turmoil in which radical Nationalist elements assailed his leadership with greatly enhanced power and prestige.

The working committee of the all-India National congress assembled here in its annual convention, today appointed him chief delegate to go to London and negotiate for complete Indian self-government, with full independence in financial, military and external affairs at the forthcoming second round table conference.

Simultaneous the active opposition to his leadership led by Mayor Bose of Calcutta agreed to support the congress platform outlined by the working committee, thus removing the principal dissent making certain practically unanimous approval of Gandhi and his program when it comes up for a final vote.

The congress working committee ratified Gandhi's true with Lord Irwin viceroy, which closed the civil disobedience campaign, and reiterated the Nationalist demands for complete, not the partial or qualified self-government which Britain proffered at the first round table conference.

Governor Gardner Promised Support In Reduction Drive

Raleigh, March 27.—(AP)—A concerted movement in four southern states for a reduced 1931 tobacco and cotton acreage today was Gov. O. Max Gardner's remedy for low prices for these commodities.

After telegraphing the governors of Virginia, South Carolina and Georgia urging them to join the

drive, Governor Gardner last night turned to the task of appeal to North Carolina farmers to take the leadership in acreage reduction.

He asserted, "we can put cotton and tobacco on two thirds of the land we have planned to give these crops and make more money than three thirds would bring, at the same time saving the extra acreage and extra labor for growing feed for farm folks and farm animals."

"The whole state," he said, "has a vital interest in this matter, but for Eastern North Carolina, where a live-at-home policy has been so generally ignored in the past, the issue is almost one of life and death, financially speaking."

"Thus far we have set no tobacco and planted no cotton. There is still time, therefore, for our farmers, cur bankers and our merchants to take thought about the present situation, fraught as it is with great danger."

Gov. Irbis C. Blackwood, of South Carolina said he would be glad to join in the movement for tobacco acreage reduction. Gov. L. G. Hardman, of Georgia, announced he was giving the proposal careful consideration, while Virginia farm leaders urged farmers to trim their tobacco acreage.

Practically all over the world this afternoon the newspaper will herald the winning of nearly three millions of dollars by a like number of individuals on the Irish Hospital Sweepstakes this morning at a cost of \$2.50 each, which is the kind of news that spreads among our people the desire to gamble in the hope of getting something for nothing, but these news reports fail to mention the millions of people, many of them robbing their families of bread to do so who bought tickets and won nothing. For every dollar won, more than that amount was lost by somebody else and probably many little mouths are now hungry as a result. The same is true with all gambling and this instance only emphasizes the wisdom of the legislature in its recent refusal to legalize such practices in North Carolina.

It has been a long time since the new bridge over Tar River here was built and the approaches paved, but there is one feature necessary for the protection of all who cross this bridge that apparently has been overlooked. The missing feature is that no guard railing has ever been erected along the long dam leading to the bridge from the north side of the river. In its present form this piece of highway is a great danger to every motorist, driver of animal drawn vehicles and pedestrians who cross the bridge. Fortunately, so far, there have been no serious accidents here, but that apparently is more a matter of luck than anything else and it is to be hoped that the Highway Commission will erect this guard railing before somebody loses their life because of no railing being there.

WHERE IT SHOULD COME FROM

The legislature continues to wrangle with no end in sight and the burdened landowners of our state continue to wonder what, if any, of the promised tax relief, they are going to get at the hands of this legislature. As has been stated many times, there is only one way to raise the necessary revenue to carry out the provision of the McLean school bill and that is to get the money from where the money is—power companies, tobacco companies and kindred industries that are making large profits and paying stockholders handsome dividends on watered stocks, and from the individuals who are now escaping taxes on millions of dollars

invested in stocks in foreign corporations.

A just levy of taxes, against the above mentioned industries together with the repeal of the present exemption for foreign stocks would raise practically enough revenues to put the McLean bill into effect and that balance could be easily raised through the luxury tax on non-essentials. Of course no one wants any form of taxes, luxury or what-not, despite the fact that for some time we have been paying gasoline sales taxes, and should it become necessary to place a luxury tax at this time to make up the deficiency it should be clearly understood that such a step would be an emergency measure to be removed just as soon as additional sources for the necessary revenue could be determined. In the meantime, every department of the state, county, and municipal governments should be charged with the task of cutting their operating expenses to the minimum without impairing the efficiency of the service to the people of the state.

ABOUT TOWN

Thirty thousand people were killed by automobiles in the United States last year. Seven hundred thousand were injured, and property damage directly attributable to automobile wrecks was estimated at \$300,000,000.

Eight out of ten accidents were caused by carelessness of the drivers, and two per cent of the total was attributed to bad roads and defective cars.

The over-confident driver, statistics show, is one of the most dangerous problems which officers have to deal with. His surplus confidence causes him to take risks other people would never take, and eventually results in either loss of life or property.

From these figures it is evident that it behooves the best of drivers to operate their cars as carefully as possible at all times thereby prolonging their own life and the lives of thousands of others who travel over the public highways from day to day.

With the coming of springtime Greenville people will increase their effort to direct more attention to the beautification movement.

Already the plan has been crowned with wonderful success in different parts of the city, but there is plenty of work remaining to be done, and the bulk of it should come during the next two or three months when the people begin to tingle with the first thrill of the spring season.

By the planting of trees and flowers, even the plainest kind of home can be transformed into a thing of beauty. The experiment has been tried repeatedly the last several months, and the results were astonishing in numbers of instances.

Flowers, shrubs and trees help brighten up the landscape just like a fresh coat of paint adds to the appearance of buildings, and it is to be hoped every civic club will stress the importance of planting during the vernal season.

Members of the Legislature went to Raleigh nearly three months ago with a clear mandate from the people to reduce taxes on land, but so far they have failed miserably to live up to the responsibility placed upon them.

If controversy counted for tax reduction, the Legislature unquestionably would be able to claim far-reaching results. The most they have done since going to the capital city is of an argumentative nature, and counts for little toward relieving the oppressed property owners of the burden they have shouldered for so long.

With the luxury tax idea abandoned, it seems the only hope at this time is the sales tax, and it is a ten to one bet opposition in this direction is so strong that the bill will never get further than debate.

The McLean school bill passed at the first of the session provides for state-wide support of schools from taxes other than ad valorem. With the luxury tax abandoned and the sales tax as good as doomed it is impossible to see where the school funds are to come from.

It may be the lawmakers have their eyes set on some other form of taxation. If so they are mighty slow getting to it. It will be a relief to the public to learn what it is.

Recently an aged man was murdered and robbed in the Monkey Den section of Belvoir township. Meagre information obtainable at first pointed to the work of highwaymen.

The coroner's jury investigated the killing, but was forced to abandon hearing on account of the lack of information.

Sheriff's officers began work and in less than a week after the crime was committed, they had a clue which led to the arrest of six men. A single member of the party is charged directly with the crime and the others with complicity.

While the principal defendant maintains that he did not commit the murder, he has admitted the victim died in his house and that he dumped the body out on the side of the road in the hope of not becoming implicated.

Officers put little faith in the statement, and are adhering strictly to former conclusions that the man was killed by the defendant they have charged with the crime.

The public will await further developments in the case with interest. Mysterious circumstances surrounding the killing gripped public attention at the outset, and everybody will watch for developments with the hope of actually determining how the man came to his death.

Shadows of "Big Money" Deals Cloak Lawyer's Murder

By SHERMAN J. McNALLY

St. Louis (AP)—Out for a Sunday morning canter on May 1, 1927, Judge Sam Hodgdon of St. Louis county pulled up his horse, which had shied suddenly at some thing along the lonely road.

The "something" proved to be the body of a man, half propped against a clay bank and pierced by six bullets.

Thus was the curtain raised on one of the most baffling murder mysteries this community has ever encountered—the slaying of Clifford M. Hicks, promising young attorney, law partner of former Gov. Elliott Major, Sunday School superintendent, one-time Methodist minister and director in a bank.

The investigation which followed covered a period of months, bringing men and women from many walks of life to police headquarters. First and most sensational of the disclosures was the revelation that Hicks, only 25 years old, had become financially involved to the point where he owed \$207,000, and had taken out life insurance policies totaling \$385,000.

A finance company operated by Hicks had been credited with bank deposits of nearly \$3,000,000 in the five months before his death, yet his actual estate—aside from the insurance—was found to be less than \$25,000.

He had told his wife that his life had been threatened and that he intended to leave town. He is known to have spent most of his last day desperately attempting to raise money.

Partly because of a trip they made to Clifford Hicks' office early on the morning of May 1, before the body had been discovered.

Glenn Hicks and William Davis, a burglar ex-convict, were taken into custody. Glenn admitted removing papers from his brother's office and destroying them, but claimed they were of a personal nature and that Clifford had asked that they be burned in case "anything happened."

A few days after Hicks' death, the bank in which he had been a director closed its doors.

To resolve doubts of the victim's identity, arising from rumors that the killing was a gigantic insurance fraud, Hicks' body was exhumed. Glenn Hicks and Davis, after questioning, were released.

This, coupled with the marked reluctance of several business associates, creditors and members of

the family to testify, brought matters to an impasse. Chief of Detectives Robert H. Kaiser believes not one but several of the witnesses could still clear up the mystery if they would. "But there was too much money involved," That's his explanation. Did Hicks take his own life? Was he killed by gangsters for "holding out" the proceeds of spoils he had marketed? Or did supposedly respectable associates, learning of his plan to "run out" on them instead of committing suicide, take matters into their own hands? Except by chance the law may never find out.

The St. Louis Cardinals, whether or not they repeat in the National league pennant race this year, have satisfied all and sundry observers with the almost sensational success of their chain-store system for the development of baseball talent.

The assortment of players in the Cardinals camp at Bradenton is one of the sights of the "Grassroots Circuit." Correspondents are astounded, rival managers and scouts awe-stricken by the quantity and quality of material collected for examination by the parent member of this elaborate system.

The wonder is at least 1-2 in the pennant race, with such talent to build from, and the answer is that they have won three pennants in five years and otherwise been distinct threats ever since this system. In one of the three games that the World's Champion Athletics lost to the Cards in the spring "world's series," Manager Gabby Street worked three young pitchers. No one seemed quite sure about their names. They were not on the just there it developed for a little inspection before being sent to Danville, Ill., St. Joseph, Mo., and Greensboro, N. C., but they were good enough to blank the world's champions in eight out of nine innings.

Bill Rourke scout for the Cincinnati Reds, told of an important visit he once paid to the training school, operated by the Cardinals in connection with the Danville club. He found something like 150 ambitious youngsters learning their baseball A B C's. They were numbered, to simplify identification.

Rourke was impressed by the work of a lad whose number was 156 or thereabouts. He made inquiries, but was told the price would be quite high in fact too high for the Reds to consider. The lad was Jimmy Collins, a sensation as first baseman with the Rochester Internationals last year and now under study to Jim Bottomley with the cards.

"I had the satisfaction at least of knowing I had picked out a ball player," Rourke remarked.

Much of the success of the Cardinal system lies in the fact a young ball player can be placed where he will have best chance to develop. There are cubs available in every classification for training purposes. They can be "promoted" during the course of a season, if their performance merit such speedy development, as in the case of the young pitcher, "Daisy" Dean.

"All this efficiency on the part of the St. Louis organization has failed to meet the approval of baseball's high commissioner, K. M. Landis, but the answer seems to rest in that old familiar phrase: 'If this be treason, make the most of it.'"

We were talking about great hitters and how they can be developed at the plate, if at all.

"I'll tell you the only thing to do with fellows like Ruth or Simmons or Hornsby," remarked Bill McKee, the soft-spoken, shrewd pilot of the Boston Braves.

"Stick it straight down the middle."

This seemed a little surprising on the assumption that, under the circumstances, not even the great hitters would have any difficulty connecting.

"The answer is that's the one thing they don't expect," Bill explained. "They are looking for a bad ball. They are just as likely, perhaps more likely to put a bad ball out of the park than they are a good one."

The chances are, in a pinch, they will hit a good ball straight at the pitcher or a fielder. At least, I have seen it work that way and I don't know any other way to keep a really good hitter from doing his stuff, unless you walk him.

"Of course, even the best get into a slump once in a while. There is no accounting for it and there may be no weakness apparent. It just happens, as in the case of Hornsby and the rest of the Cubs in that 1929 series."

"There was a reason, however, for Jim Bottomley's failure to hit last year in the series. He had finished the season with a bad hand. He could play but he could not get any snap into his swing, due to the injury."

Watch the Cubs Slug.

Eastern critics have not as yet had a chance to size up the Chicago Cubs, or compare their prospects except on paper with those of Brooklyn, St. Louis, New York and other entries in the National league pennant derby.

They feel, however, that if Manager Rogers Hornsby stages a comeback and is able to play regularly at his old keystone post, the Cubs will be the team to beat.

"Put another 370 batter into that Chicago lineup and it may be all over but the hollering at Wrigley field," remarked one manager. "Not even this gang of Brooklyn sluggers will be able to take punch for punch with the Cubs, if Hornsby is back in form."

Georgia Power Body Seeks to Bring End to Warfare On Rates

Atlanta, March 25. — (AP) — Losing business despite lower rates in competition with the Crisp County-owned hydroelectric plant, the Georgia Power company sought today to end a rate war that has attracted nation-wide attention in circles interested in electric power.

Appearing before the Georgia Public Service commission yesterday, Preston S. Arkwright, president of the power company, asked permission to raise its rates in the Crisp area 35 per cent to the level of the county charge.

Arkwright also testified that before the county plant was in operation the power company had 1,100 customers in the area with gross annual revenue of \$81,000 while today the company has only 125 customers with an annual gross revenue of \$5,691. He added that the company pays the county and the City of Cordele, near which the county project is located, \$6,316 a year in taxes.

The county-owned plant—said to be the only county-owned hydroelectric project in the country—was completed last year after local residents maintained the power company rates were too high. The

new plant started operation with a 25 per cent reduction from the company rates, and the company's cut its rate to 35 per cent below the county rate. The Public Service commission then issued an order citing the power company to show cause why this rate should not prevail throughout the state.

After a court battle the commission's order was sustained and it was during a hearing on this order that Arkwright made his request for increasing the company's Crisp rate. The commission took under advisement the briefs of the power company that it had a right to reduce its rates to meet competition without affecting rates elsewhere.

STOCK MARKET

New York, March 27.—(AP)—The stock market still felt a bit wobbly today.

The several dividend cuts in the past two days have been about as pleasant to the speculative community as pulling teeth, and the last one, National Cash Register, came hard. Wall street had placed an over-optimistic interpretation on the recent remarks by President Patterson, and was taken unawares by the omission of the cash register disbursement.

The list worked lower during much of the session, although sporadic efforts were made to bid up specialties. Cash Register dropped 4 to the lowest price since listing in 1926.

Eastman lost as much, and issues of 2 or more included American Telephone, Union Carbide, Corn Products, Goodyear and Underwood Elliott. U. S. Steel lost a point, and several oils, including Texas Corp., and Standard of New Jersey, New York and California, eased further into new low ground. American Can and Case were bid up against the general trend, however, and some of the gold mining issues were notable firm spots, Alaska Juneau rising about 2 points to above 12, the best price for this issue in some time.

The bond market was inclined to sag. Call money was in fair supply at 1 1/2 per cent, after yesterday's upturn to 2, but some of the slack in the money market has been taken up by government withdrawal of deposits, and the Treasury will sell another offering of \$100,000,000 in bills next week. The railroad obligations were depressed by the rather sorry showing being made by February net operating income reports.

Notable among these was Pennsylvania, reporting only \$2,383,937, against \$6,239,642 in the same month of last year.

The weekly building statistics were only very mildly encouraging. A. W. Dodge reported that contracts let in the states east of the Rockies in the third week of March were at a daily average of \$12,706,725, a reduction of about \$3,000,000 from

Odell and Herbert Collette, brothers of the man killed Saturday night, were arrested by Sheriff Henry Broughton and charged with today's shooting.

Walter Parsons had told officers he shot Creed Collette in trying to prevent the holdup of his (Parsons') filling station, and had named Collette as leader of the robbers. Walter Parsons was to have been examined today by the county judge.

The shooting occurred as spectators and witnesses were making their way into the courtroom.

Three of those injured were bystanders. All three were shot in the legs.

The shooting prevented the examining trial before County Judge George Van Dever of Ed Philpot, Cart, Ky.; Steve Golder, a taxi driver, and Ed Brock, charged with attempting to holdup a filling station at Blackmount Saturday night in which Creed Collette was killed.

FRED BURKE IDENTIFIED BY OFFICERS

Chicago Detectives Visit St. Joseph, Mo., to Take Charge of Criminal

St. Joseph, Mo., March 27.—(AP)—Harry Ditchburne, assistant state's attorney from Chicago, announced today that Fred Burke, notorious gangster, had refused to waive extradition to Chicago, where he is charged with the St. Valentine's Day massacre of seven Moran gangsters.

St. Joseph, Mo., March 27.—(AP)—Identification by local officers of a man arrested near Milan, Mo., yesterday as Fred Burke, notorious gunman, was confirmed promptly upon the arrival of five Chicago detectives here early today. All said they had seen him before.

The detectives, made the trip from Chicago by motor car, went immediately to the jail and Burke was awakened.

Two assistant state's attorneys were expected here shortly with four of the seven warrants issued in Cook county for Burke's arrest.

The detectives said plans had been made to carry on extradition negotiations between the governors of Illinois and Missouri by airplane to Chicago, which named the Day massacre of 1929, police here conceded prior claim to Burke following his capture in a Missouri farmhouse yesterday. Nevertheless authorities of a half dozen cities where his name has been linked with murder, robber and kidnapping forced their attention on disposition of the man known as the most dangerous criminal in America.

Burke would say nothing of the Chicago massacre and his toll of seven, felled by machine gunfire, but the science of ballistics had pointed to him nearly two years in a search spurred by Cook County rewards of \$41,000.

Trapped by an amateur detective and captured by officers as he lay in bed, Burke came unshackled to St. Joseph from his Sullivan County farm home of his father-in-law, between which and a house in Kansas City he had divided his time for nine months.

He had no message, he said, for his 20-year-old wife, a Kansas City nurse, who with the Sullivan County community had known him as Richard F. White. Blonde and blue-eyed, the former Bonny Porter expressed disbelief to Kansas City police that the man she married last June, after a fortnight's courtship, could be Burke.

Burke, police said, came to Green City, Mo., soon after he fired three slugs into the body of Charles Skelly, young St. Joseph, Mich., traffic policeman. He met the girl when she returned to the home of her father, Barney Porter, neighbor of the family with which Burke was living.

To Joseph Hunsaker, truck driver with a flare for detective magazines, went much of credit for snaring the killer. He grew suspicious of Burke's apparent affluence. Then he read an account of the fate of the seven Moran gangsters, and behind the mustache of Richard F. White he beheld the grim visage of Fred Burke, alias Fred Dane, alias Thomas Camp.

Hunsaker confided with Allan Morrison, realty salesman, and Sheriff L. C. Hoover. The Department of Justice, to which they appealed, referred them to St. Joseph police. Detectives awaited return of Burke from Kansas City, surrounded the farm house in the dawn of a chilly day, and arrested him.

Lansing, Mich., March 27.—(AP)—Extradition papers for the return of Fred Burke, now held in Missouri, to Michigan, where he is wanted for the slaying of a St. Joseph, policeman, were signed today by Gov. Wilbur M. Brucker.

Republican to Plead Guilty to Selling of Postoffice Positions

Atlanta, March 27.—(AP)—John B. Dove, former member of the state Republican central committee, was on record here today as saying that he would plead guilty to the charges of bartering and selling to federal offices.

Dove made his announcement of a guilty plea to newspapermen last night, assigning as his reason a "desire to protect the interests of those leaders of the party who have faith and confidence in me, and in order to avoid bringing their names into this mess." He added that he was "still in politics and will continue my activities in behalf of the Republican party."

The federal grand jury yesterday indicted Dove on 21 counts, eight of which charged that he sold a position as deputy clerk of the United States District Court to Charles S. O'Neal for O'Neal's son, Wade H., on March 28, 1929. Twelve counts alleged Dove solicited and sold the position of collector of internal revenue, held by Josiah T. Rose, head of one of the Republican factions of Georgia, to Carl E. Westbrock for \$1,000 on January 22, 1929. Another count alleged partial payment was received by Dove for \$3,500 damages in connection with this purported deal.

Dove also was indicted last November on allegations that he sold the postmastership of College Park, Ga., for \$400 to J. P. Denson for Denson's son, Ernest.

Irish Statesman Dies At Ripe Age

Dublin, Irish Free State, March 27.—(AP)—The Saorstait, today mourned Timothy Michael Healy, Irish parliamentarian extraordinary and its first governor general, who died in the night after a three weeks illness. He was 75 years old.

The end had been foreseen for several days, although he was ill with what was thought to be only a bad cold for some time before seriousness of his malady, a bronchial affection, was appreciated. He took a turn for the worse yesterday morning and his son was summoned to his bedside. Death came at 7:50 P. M.

As a member of parliament for what is now the Saorstait Healy founded a tradition of his own, the "Irish Nights" in which he would sit back with his silk hat tipped over his nose, pretending not to listen to debate. Suddenly he would arise, obtain the floor and make a speech of vitriol coated with honeyed Irish words.

He withdrew from the House of Commons when the Free State got its own parliament and became first Saorstait governor general.

Says Republicans of South to Demand New Order Politics

Washington, March 27.—(AP)—Horace Mann, the leading southern organizer in the Republican campaign in 1928, served notice on party leaders today that Dixie would send a solid bloc of 232 delegates to the next national convention demanding "a new order of politics."

Mann, who broke with the party organization after the 1928 campaign, said he has continued the reorganization of Republican ranks in the south begun during the campaign.

He said national headquarters would be opened here in December to organize the party in opposition to the national committee.

Mann declined to say whether the southern delegates would attend the convention pledged to oppose the renomination of President Hoover and committed to former President Coolidge.

His friends said, however, that this was the purpose of the movement and that the southern delegation would support either Mr. Coolidge or someone else equally available.

The delegations which will make up the bloc of 232 delegates, or almost a quarter of the total representation at the convention, Mann said, would be from Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi.

SENTENCED TO PRISON FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Elizabeth City, March 27.—(AP)—John T. Barnes, convicted of manslaughter for the killing of McDaniel Skipper, today was sentenced by Judge A. M. Stack, in the Superior court at Gatesville, to five years in state's prison, to be suspended if he pays \$1,350 into the court clerk's county school fund and \$250 to Skipper's widow.

Skipper was shot by Barnes after he, a boarder, had been accused of misconduct with Mrs. Barnes.

The slayer was placed under \$2,000 bond for his appearance at the next term of court to prove he had made the payments.

Barnes gave notice of appeal to the State Supreme court.

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DANES GET CHEAP FRUIT FROM PALESTINE FARMS
