Whitley And Cox Draw Terms In Pen For Part In \$4,200 Hold-Up Here

Judge Frizzelle Sentences Youth From 7 to 9 Years in State Prison; Jury Returned Verdict Shortly After 12 O'clock Saturday Night With Recommendation for Mercy

Convicted on a charge of highway robbery, Elmer Whitley and Rodney Cox, two young white men, were sentenced to from seven to nine years each in the penitentiary by Judge Paul Frizzelle, in the final session of the two-week term of Pitt County Superior court at this city Saturday night. The case went to the jury shortly after 11 o'clock and the verdict was returned a few minutes past 12 o'clock.

The jury recommended mercy for the defendants, and Judge Frizzelle announced that this fact had been duly considered in pronouncing sentence.

A crowd, which had packed the court room since the beginning of the case last Tuesday, was present when the decision was announced. There was no demonstration of any sort. The two defendants accepted their fate stoically, maintaining the equanimity which had marked their conduct throughout the trial.

The case grew out of the hold-up and robbery of Mrs. G. H. Ballard in the southern section of the city the latter part of last December. Mrs. Ballard said two men slipped up behind her as she walked home from church, blinded her with their hands, and then dragged her behind a garage and snatched the pocketbook containing the money.

She said she recovered and chased one of the highwaymen down the street. During the chase, she declared she recognized the highwayman as Whitley. The other had run into a nearby house.

The state produced scores of witnesses to bear out certain phases of the case, among them being a negro woman and the husband of the principal witness who declared they recognized Whitley as he fled down the street.

A negro man testified that he had collected the ashes for Mrs. Ballard at the time the piece of the pocketbook was found. Later, however, the ash pile was examined by a member of the local police department who succeeded in finding the key.

It was testified that the key fit the Ballard box at the postoffice and failed to work in any other box in which it was tried out. The defense contended that the piece of metal was a part of an old shoe and not a portion of the pocketbook. It also contended that it was possible for the key to have been slipped there by someone interested in the conviction of the parties, but the state scouted both of these opinions and produced witnesses to corroborate evidence produced by the principal witnesses.

The state also contended that fingerprints found near the garage corresponded to those of the defendants, the defense contended that the tracks had been "planted" by Mr. Ballard in an attempt to incriminate the two defendants.

Following the activities of Whitley and Cox after the robbery, the state produced a considerable amount of testimony showing that the two young men had spent freely for sometime after the hold-up although it was proved that they had been in poor circumstances prior to the incident.

It was shown that Cox purchased a motorcycle in Norfolk, then traded it in for a new one within the next few days. He also bought several accessories, the total bill amounting to between three and four hundred dollars. The state brought a witness from Norfolk to testify regarding the transactions.

The defense found a discrepancy in the dates of the invoices. One being dated January 1931 and the others 1930. In the final argument for the state, Colonel Allison Dunn showed that the numbers on the bills ran almost consecutively, and included the contention that the Norfolk firm had made only two or three sales from the period of 1930 to 1931 as contended by the defense.

Evidence was presented to show that Whitley had made an extensive trip or so after the robbery, defraying the expenses of two or three other people who accompanied him, in addition to making extensive purchases from time to time.

FAVOR CHANGE OF CODES OF TWO CHURCHES

Episcopalians And Presbyterians Recommend Extensive Changes in Canons

New York, April 27.—(AP)—Changes in church codes are proposed in reports published today by official groups within the Protestant Episcopal church and the Presbyterian church in the United States of America.

An Episcopal commission appointed six years ago recommended the adoption of virtually a new canon covering the church's attitude toward divorce and remarriage. A commission of the Presbyterian church, deploring the increasing divorce rate, gave its approval to birth control and suggested the establishment of courses for instruction in marriage.

The revised canon of the Episcopal church advocated the creation of ecclesiastical courts to pass on problems of marriage. It would permit ministers to marry communicants and divorced persons under certain circumstances, eliminate all mention of ground for divorce and remarriage, and define new causes for annulment. Even though a minister should officiate at the marriage of a communicant and one divorced, the ceremony could not be conducted in a church edifice nor could the book of common prayer be used.

At present an Episcopal minister cannot in any circumstances officiate at the remarriage of a guilty party in a divorce granted for infidelity, although he can marry the innocent party with the consent of the bishop.

The revised canon covering the point reads: "Any person to whom a divorce from a former marriage has been granted for any cause by a civil court may after the expiration of one year from the granting of the divorce apply to his bishop or the ecclesiastical marital court of his diocese for a certificate of fitness for marriage."

JONES GETS PROMOTION

Former Pitt County Man Made Deputy Attorney-General of Maryland

Willis R. Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Jones, of Bethel, has been appointed Deputy Attorney-General of the State of Maryland, according to information received by relatives in this city. Mr. Jones was formerly Assistant Attorney-General and his appointment came as a part of the reorganization of the state's legal office.

Mr. Jones is a native of Pitt county, having been born and reared near Bethel. He is the brother of Dr. Paul Jones, of Bethel, and has hosts of friends in this section who will be interested in announcement of his advancement in the official circles of the State of Maryland.

The following story regarding the appointment appeared recently in one of the Baltimore papers:

Willis R. Jones, Assistant Attorney-General, has been appointed Deputy Attorney-General as part of the reorganization of the state's legal office. It has been announced.

The appointment was made by W. Preston Lane, Attorney-General, as soon as Governor Ritchie signed the bill providing for the reorganization of his staff, but was not made public until Saturday.

Besides creating the office of Deputy Attorney-General and providing for a salary for this post of \$4,500 the new law also makes it possible for the Attorney-General to appoint two new general assistants at annual salaries of \$4,000; a special assistant for the State Roads Commission at a salary of \$4,000 and a special counsel for the State Industrial Accident Fund at \$3,000 annually. The present salaries of assistants is \$2,500.

Mr. Jones was appointed an assistant in 1923, when the late T. H. Robinson took office as Attorney-General for his first term. Mr. Lane has not announced when the appointment of the four new assistants would be made.

Defense Seeks To Quash Indictments Of 27 Men In Asheville Bank Case

Argue That Indictments Were Returned By Six Months Grand Jury Which Was Illegal in Buncombe County; Judge Barnhill Takes Request Under Consideration

Asheville, April 27.—(AP)—The defense today sought to have the indictments of 27 men here on charges of violating the state banking laws quashed as trial of the first case was begun, contending the grand jury returning them held office improperly.

Attorneys for Wallace B. Davis, president of the defunct Central Bank and Trust Company, said the indictments were returned by a "six-months" grand jury which they asserted was illegal in Buncombe county. They argued grand jurors must be drawn at each term of court.

If Presiding Judge M. V. Barnhill should allow the motion, it would invalidate all grand jury acts for months.

Lengthy arguments and a search for records began after the motion was lodged.

Judge Barnhill took the motion under advisement and adjourned court until afternoon to study the arguments and records.

Davis was arraigned with Dr. J. A. Sinclair and C. N. Brown, directors of the bank, on a charge of making a false report to state banking officials.

Judge Barnhill granted a defense request for a bill of particulars covering stocks, bonds and notes alleged by the state to have been listed by the bank as assets although worthless.

He also took under consideration motions to quash the indictments on the grounds they were general and insufficient.

Judge Barnhill indicated that he might not rule on the motion questioning the status of the grand jury for several days and meanwhile would proceed with the trials.

Solicitor Zeb V. Nettles served notice on counsel for Luke Lea, Nashville, Tenn. publisher; Luke Lea, Jr., and E. P. Charlet, of Nashville, that two charges against them of conspiracy to defraud the Central Bank and Trust Company would be consolidated for trial.

None of the Tennesseans were present.

A packed court room heard the dull and colorless morning session.

Stock Exchange Firm Suspended In New York City

New York, April 27.—(AP)—West and Company was suspended from the New York Stock Exchange today for insolvency.

The firm, a well known New York and Philadelphia house, maintained several branch offices in Pennsylvania.

The suspension, announced from the exchange rostrum about 11 o'clock this morning, was the second in a few days. Pynchon and Company was suspended last Friday.

FINISH PLANS FOR ELECTION

Aldermen Appoint Markers for Municipal Election To Be Held May 4

Final plans in connection with the setting up of machinery for the municipal election to be held in this city May 4th have been completed, and election officials, assistants and candidates are merely marking time today awaiting the coming of the date for deciding upon a mayor and five members of the Board of Aldermen.

Meeting in special session at the city hall the latter part of last week, the Board of Aldermen appointed markers to assist voters in the preparation of their ballots. Each of the candidates for mayor was allowed markers and chose one each. Although having the right to ask for markers under the Australian ballot system, the candidates for aldermen concluded none would be needed to assist in this field.

E. R. Duley was appointed to assist Roy Flanagan, candidate for mayor, with W. C. Clark acting as alternate.

Mrs. Henry Martin was appointed to assist Mayor J. C. Lanier, with George Woodward acting as alternate.

The board also considered a request from representatives of the Carolina Gas & Electric Company, that the city waive all rights to the sale of the local plant, it being stated that the company desired to sell. The board, however, declined to relinquish this privilege, and asked that figures regarding the plant be submitted today. The commission (Continued on page six)

WILL DECIDE LUXURY TAX LATE TODAY

Conferees to Meet This Afternoon to Decide On Dunlap Compromise

Raleigh, April 27.—(AP)—No intention that either side has made any new recessions was evident today as legislators awaited the result of an afternoon meeting of conferees on the biennial revenue bill.

Chairman Spence, of Moore, of the House conferees group said before the meeting "the situation is unchanged" and Senator Folger of Surry, an opponent of any form of sales tax, joined him.

Members of the conferees group would not commit themselves but intimations were dropped by various members that the present conferees groups might be discharged tonight and new ones appointed.

For 10 days, an unprecedented length of time, the conferees have been unable to compromise on the sales tax question. Every effort, including Senate acceptance of the luxury tax provided it was submitted to a referendum in 1932, has failed to break the deadlock.

Raleigh, April 27.—(AP)—House and Senate conferees are due to decide today whether or not they will continue the deadlock on tax and school legislation which has kept the North Carolina General Assembly in session for 111 days.

The conferees committee, of 11 men, seven from the House and four from the Senate, was to meet at 3 o'clock this afternoon to decide if they will accept the Dunlap compromise, which calls for a luxury sales tax for the next biennium, with the provision that the voters will decide in 1932 whether it shall be adopted as a permanent part of the tax policy of the state or not.

MUSIC CLUBS RATE SECOND

Local High Amasses Total of 57 Points at State-wide Contest in Greensboro

The music clubs of the Greenville High School returned Saturday from Greensboro where they participated in the twelfth annual state-wide music contest. This school took second place in schools of its size in the state. It amassed a total of 57 points as compared with a total of 11 points last year.

In music contest the high schools of the state are divided into three classes. Class "C" enrollment of 200 or less. Class "B" enrollment of 200 to 500. Class "A" enrollment of 500 or more.

The local high school orchestra tied for first place in orchestra contests. This is considered rather remarkable because of the fact that the local high school orchestra contains only 18 pieces, while all the orchestras opposed to it had from 35 to 50 in the organization. The band took second place in Class "B" schools under the same conditions. The local band contains 25 pieces while the opponent bands contained as high as 100 pieces. The reason for the difference in size of these bands and orchestras is to be found that those schools give free tuition and furnish instruments free, while the Greenville high school has to charge for tuition and the pupils are required to buy their own instruments. In the "Unchained Boys Voice" Ben Herring represented the local high school and tied for first place with three others from Class "A" schools. The girls trio, mixed chorus, and girls club all scored second and third places respectively giving Greenville a total of 57 points and taking second place as compared with 72 points with Lenoir taking first place.

The teachers who are in charge of music in the Greenville High School who are therefore responsible for the fine showing in the local high school in the state contests are Miss Ona Shindler, director of public school music; Miss Eva Hodges, teacher of piano and accompanist; Mr. E. T. Robeson, teacher of band and orchestra.

Bishop Darst and Dr. William L. Poteat to Be Commencement Speakers

The closing exercises of the Greenville City Schools will begin on Sunday night May 31 and close Friday night June 5. On Sunday night the annual sermon to the graduates will be preached by Bishop Thomas C. Darst of Wilmington. This service will be held in the high school auditorium. A very fine musical program is being prepared by the combined choruses and orchestra of the high school to assist in this service.

On Thursday night June 4 the annual Class Night exercises will be held in the high school auditorium. On Friday morning June 5, at 10:00 o'clock the graduates of the Intermediate School will be received into the high school.

On Friday night June 5 will be held the graduating exercises of the class of 1931. The feature of this occasion will be the address to the graduates by Dr. William Louis Poteat, President Emeritus of Wake Forest College. MAY'R WALKER ASSAILS REDS

Ascribes His Troubles to Communist Activities in the City of New York

New York, April 27.—(AP)—Mayor Walker, who is facing removal proceedings on charges of condoning incompetency and encouraging corruption, ascribes his difficulties to Communist activities.

Speaking before a communion breakfast of 2,000 members of the New York City Fire Department, he said he was merely the "temporary target" and that the attack would be widened to include other public men. His object, he said, was to tear down American institutions.

"The efforts will become more manifest as the movement to destroy confidence in city officials grows," he said. "It is a matter not so much for me to worry about as business to worry about. After they undermine public confidence in the city municipal government, then the state, then the nation, then they will go into the business world."

The mayor, without mentioning names, referred to men "who ascend to the pulpit pretending a background of Christ's holy word or the Torah." A week ago in his reply to Governor Roosevelt, the mayor made caustic mention of Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and John Haynes Holmes, pastor of the Community Church, who signed the charges against him.

Mr. Holmes, at the Academy of Music in Brooklyn, yesterday attacked Mayor Walker, Tammany and the "Republican machine" which he said, "shares in the spoils." He proposed a revision of the city charter in which the mayor would be nothing more than a figurehead and predicted that it would take 10 years to clean up New York.

"The mayor is obviously getting panicky," the Rev. John Haynes Holmes said today. "His address shows a frightened and desperate mind" said Dr. who, with Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, signed the accusations made to Governor Roosevelt against the mayor.

"Last week the mayor denounced Rabbi and myself as Socialists. Yesterday he described us as Communists. I imagine that tomorrow he will discover we are Anarchists. It's all very amusing, but, like (Continued on page six)

BUTLER CUT OFF ON RADIO

Stormy Petrel of the Marines, However, Says Incident Is a Closed Matter

Philadelphia, April 27.—(AP)—Major General Smedley D. Butler said today that, so far as he is concerned, the interruption of his radio talk Saturday night is a closed incident.

The general was cut off the air when he used the word "hell" while making an address over the privately owned station, WELK. The owner of the station, Howard Miller, considered the word profane, and officials of the Radio Commission in Washington said he was within his rights in putting an end to the speech.

The incident occurred while General Butler was telling the 312th Artillery Association of the capture of Fort Riviere, Haiti, by the marines in 1915. He had reached a (Continued on page six)

JACK DIAMOND IS SHOT DOWN

Gangster Is Seriously Wounded By Bullets of Unknown Assailants Early Today

Catskill, N. Y., April 27.—(AP)—Jack (Legs) Diamond, gangster, for the second known time, was cut down and seriously injured by the gunfire of unknown assailants today.

The gang chief, who six months ago was shot and almost fatally injured in a New York City hotel room, went down today under the pattering fire of buckshot, sent in to his back as he stepped from a Catskill mountain roadhouse west of this village. The shooting occurred three days after Diamond had been released in \$25,000 bail, pending trial for a charge of assault.

Like the New York City instance, mystery clothed the shooting. The gangster himself could give no information and the companion who snatched his fallen chief back into the shelter of the roadhouse could only say that the gunfire came from a distance of about twenty paces from the building.

A hatful of empty shells, still reeking of the smell of freshly discharged powder and apparently fired from an automatic shotgun, were picked up between the glassed-in porch of the Arratoga Inn and the highway. The gunman obviously fired in haste and fled. Of the nine shots fired, each carrying a dozen pellets, only one shell load struck Diamond.

The fallen gangster, bleeding freely from wounds in the shoulder, back and arm, was hurried to an Albany hospital. While seriously injured, his condition was not believed to be fatal. (Continued on page six)

JUDGE LAUDED BY PITT BAR

Lawyers Pay Tribute to Judge Frizzelle During Recent Term of Criminal Court

Resolutions expressing appreciation of the fine services rendered here by Judge J. Paul Frizzelle, of Snow Hill, in the recent term of Pitt County Superior Court, were passed by the Pitt County Bar Association during the latter part of last week.

Judge Frizzelle, elected Judge of the Fifth Judicial District, in the last election, presided over his first court in Pitt county during the recent term, and his fair and impartial judgment in the many cases coming up for consideration was a matter of much favorable comment.

The resolutions follow:

At a call meeting of the Greenville and Pitt County Bar held in the court house on the 25th day of April, 1931, for the purpose of expressing appreciation of the services of Honorable J. Paul Frizzelle, resident judge and presiding over the April 1931 Criminal Term, Pitt County Superior Court, Honorable F. C. Harding acting as chairman and Honorable S. T. Carson and Honorable Julius Brown acting as secretaries, the following resolutions were offered and adopted:

THAT, WHEREAS, the Honorable J. Paul Frizzelle, of Snow Hill, Greenville County, assumed his official duties as Judge of the Fifth District on January 1, 1931, and has so favorably impressed the bar and public with his learning as a lawyer, his patience, composure, professional skill and as a Judge, and

WHEREAS, in the beginning of his career we are so favorably and gratefully impressed with his promptness and unusual equipment and dedication of the same to the service of his state, and

WHEREAS, we have been so favorably impressed with his exact knowledge, care and pains-taking proficiency in and familiarity with the law, and natural ability as a Judge, be it resolved:

First: That we acknowledge the preamble to these resolutions as our estimate and characterization of Judge Frizzelle.

Second: That we bespeak and prophesy for him a long, useful and efficient career as a Judge eminently qualified for the high office to which he aspired, and to which the people of our district have elected him.

Third: That we request the Court to insert these resolutions in the minutes of this term, and a copy of same, under the seal of the clerk of this court be furnished the Judge and copies of same be furnished the press.

WETS PREDICT VICTORY SOON

Believe Prohibitionists Will Be Routed In Next Session of Congress

Philadelphia, April 27.—(AP)—Modification of the prohibition law to permit the manufacture and sale of light wines and beer is seen as a possibility at the next session of Congress by labor's national committee for modification of the Volstead act.

A report of the committee, based on a congressional survey, asserts that there are only 17 "die-hard" prohibitionists in the Senate and 43 in the House of Representatives and that "victory is in sight if those who have voluntarily enlisted in this cause will make their wishes known to the senators and congressmen from their states."

The report was prepared for submission today to the national conference of organized labor's anti-prohibition group.

Of the 36 members of the United States Senate, the report states "34 are willing to vote for the modification of the Volstead act permitting the lawful manufacture and sale of beer and light wines; 15 believe that beer is non-intoxicating, but claim they are not justified in voting to change the present legislation; 12 admit that a majority of the people of their states are producers or consumers of illicit liquors, but claim that the organized church vote is of so much importance that they do not feel it good policy to oppose it; 10 feel that both the Volstead act and the 18th amendment should be repealed and the entire matter left to each state for the people of the state to decide what they want to do, and eight refused to state their views."

"Our survey of the House shows that there are 144 members who are ready to vote to modify the Volstead act; that 54 believe the act should be modified permitting the consumption of beer and light wines in the homes and each family limited as to the amount that may be purchased each month; that 35 congressmen admit the majority of their constituents are producers and consumers of illicit liquors, but are fearful that the organized dry influence, while in a minority, are so well organized that its demands cannot be openly flouted; that 55 members, mostly from grain and fruit producing areas, are unwilling to vote to modify the laws; that 34 others fear that with modification would come racial troubles in their districts, and that 67 members refuse to indicate how they feel on the question at this time."

President Hoover Proves Good Sailor

Washington, April 27.—(AP)—President Hoover had the opportunity last night to demonstrate that he was a good sailor.

Returning to Washington from Cape Henry, Va., aboard the Commerce Department boat Sequoia, the party met with rough seas. Brisk winds on Chesapeake Bay caused the 140 foot boat to roll and pitch vigorously.

The boat, however, put into dock promptly at 9 o'clock as had been scheduled when it left Cape Henry.

Both President Hoover and Governor Pollard, of Virginia who received a cheering, seemed to take cheerfully the vagary of weather which broke up a celebration of the 324th anniversary of the landing of the first permanent English colonists in the new world.

Skies were threatening when the large crowd gathered to witness the exercises in a natural amphitheatre where a huge wooden cross has been erected, marking the landing place of the Cavaliers. Bishop A. C. Thomson, of the Episcopal diocese of southern Vir-

ginia was delivering the opening prayer and the president stood with bared head when the first real down-pour began.

A coat was thrown around the Chief Executive's shoulders, but neither this, an umbrella nor a tarpaulin covering the stand served for the official guests. The rain which was driven in by a heavy wind and almost immediately had everyone's clothes sodden and dripping. The exercises were stopped and they hurried some 300 yards to a railroad station. There they found shelter and near suffocation as a crowd jammed in to share it.

Governor Pollard's special train had been removed in anticipation of the ceremonies lasting for an hour and automobiles were brought into service for the return trip to Little Creek Hotel, where the Sequoia was waiting. Tea was served while the official party, which was scattered in the dash for shelter, was being rounded by Mrs. Hoover ignored the wreck of her blue spring hat but continued herself about the comfort of a large delegation of girl scouts who were attending the exercises.

Greenville educators were signally honored at the general session of the State Education Association held at Raleigh last week. R. G. Fitzgerald, superintendent of Pitt County Schools, was elected to the vice-presidency of the organization, and J. H. Rose, superintendent of City Schools was elected Superintendent of the Association of City School Superintendents.

Both Mr. Fitzgerald and Mr. Rose have taken a prominent part in educational activities of the state for years, and the recognition accorded them by the state organization was very deserving.

Considering the fact that the best interests of the people are at stake, and that some form of taxation is necessary for support of the MacLean School Legislation, it seems as if the two bodies might reach a decision and return home with the satisfaction of knowing they have done their best by one of the most controverted questions tackled by the Legislature in its history.

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Escaped Sing Sing Convict Captured

MORRISTOWN, N. J., April 27.—(AP)—James J. Mannery, fugitive from Sing Sing and once member of the notorious Cunniff-Rodgers gang in New York City, was back in prison today after three years of liberty. He was captured by a "small-time" patrolman with a memory of faces and gave up without a struggle.

With a woman companion Mannery drove into Dover, N. J., and made the mistake of parking in a space provided for automobile busses. Patrolman Charles E. Ripley, who had intended merely to tell him to move out of the place, recognized him from photographs as he approached.

"Where's your license?" Ripley asked. Mannery reached for his inside pocket. Ripley pushed a gun into his ribs and ordered him to throw up his hands. While Ripley marched his prisoner through the center of town the woman, Patricia Pearl Smith, drove off in the car only to be captured later.

The automobile was a small arsenal. A loaded automatic was beneath the dashboard, a revolver was hidden in each of the four pockets, and a machine gun was stored under the rumble seat. Mannery himself carried a tear gas gun in his pocket.

Mannery has been sought since his escape from Sing Sing in July, 1928, where he was serving a sentence for participation in a hold-up in which a man was slain. It had been known for some time that he was hiding out in New Jersey and police, as a result, were on the lookout for him.

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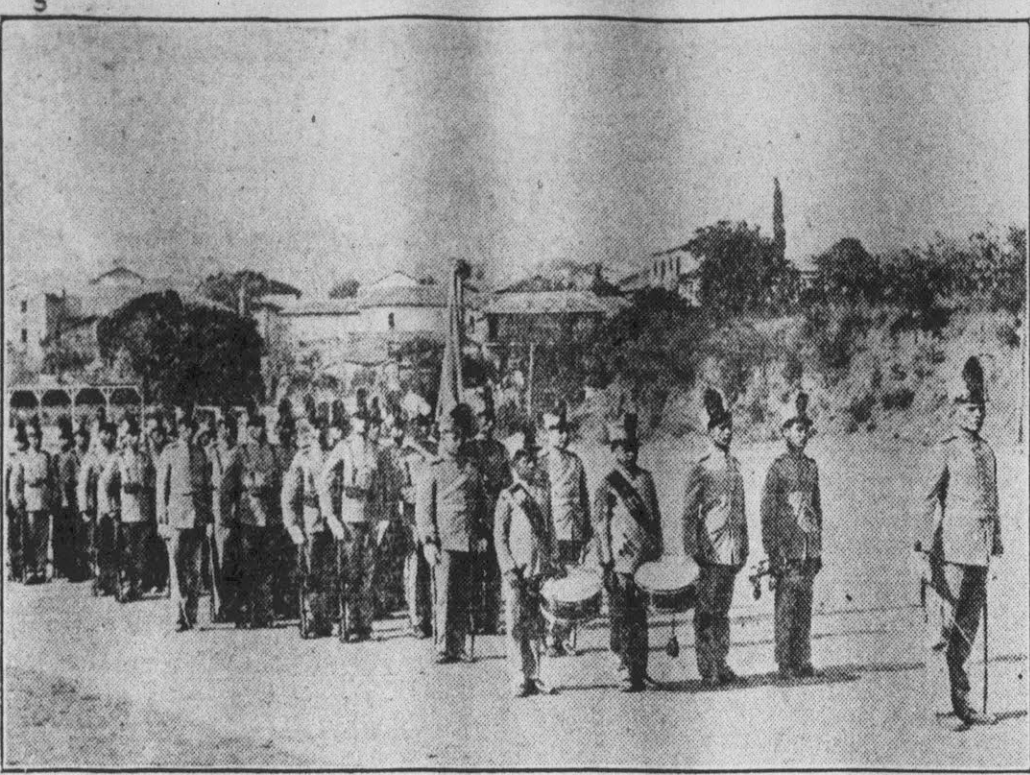
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CLAIM VICTORIES OVER HONDURAN INSURGENTS

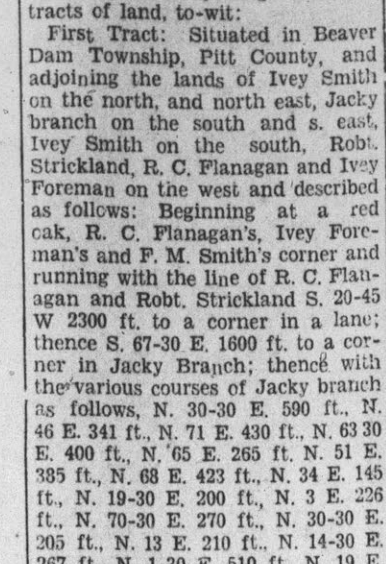

The surprising thing was that it was Jones who had the highest score, a 75. Diegel and Olin shot 78 on the wet 69-par course while Mortie came out with the honors, a 73.

Even on Bobby's thirty-seventh putt, a dramatic 5-footer which had it dropped, would have won the match on the eighteenth, did Calamity Jane fail. Jones stepped ankle deep into a flooded baranca to explode his submerged ball almost into the cup.

Mortie Dutra and Diegel were in similar difficulties and were less fortunate in getting out. Willem's third was 15 feet from the pin. Bobby took unusual precaution as he addressed the ball. It was no use. He explained it later.

"I knew the putt was lined up right, but after such a miserable chowing on the greens, I had lost confidence, and pulled the shot slightly." The ball rolled 3 inches to the left of the cup, but allowed him to halve the hole, for Olin also was down in 2 for a 5.

Bobby took 33 strokes on the Greens, whereas Diegel and Olin used 32 each and Mortie 30.

October sold off to 10.60 at the opening but later rallied to 10.64, day fluctuated between 9.90 and 10.01. The general market was holding about steady at the end of the first half hour.

Liverpool cables reported continental and Bombay selling in that market and a bearish sentiment in Liverpool with cotton cloth and yarn buyers cautious. Egyptian futures in Alexandria were 20 to 49 points lower and the Indian spot quotation in Liverpool 7 points lower.

STOCK MARKET

New York, April 27.—(AP)—The deflation of share values received fresh impetus from the suspension of a prominent Philadelphia investment house.

The stock market pointed upward for a few minutes in the initial transactions, with Continental Inc. and related issues rising briskly, in response to the announced reorganization of the management of Continental. Large-scale liquidation soon appeared, however, and, although there was a brief letup after announcement of the West & Co. suspension, fresh waves of selling soon swept the market.

Oils dropped sharply. Steels also plunged downward. U. S. Steel dropping 3 points to still another minimum level since 1927. In the rails, New York Central broke to the lowest in 8 years.

Miscellaneous issues losing 2 to 5 included American Can, American Telephone, Case, Johns Manville, Union Carbide, DuPont, Allied Chemical, Paramount, Nash Motor, Westinghouse, Eastman, Western Union and others. Only mod-rate losses appeared in General Motors, General Electric and North American. The decline, however, was one of the broadest since December.

While selling of the oil shares was in such volume as to suggest a recession liquidation, the Snowden message proposed a 50 per cent increase in the tax on gasoline, which may restrict British consumption. Petroleum issues were weak on the London as well as the New York market.

In general, credit was a little firmer, despite the fresh reduction in the Federal Reserve's bill buying rate. Call money was unavailable under the official rate of 1-1/2 per cent, although there had been offerings at 1 per cent last week.

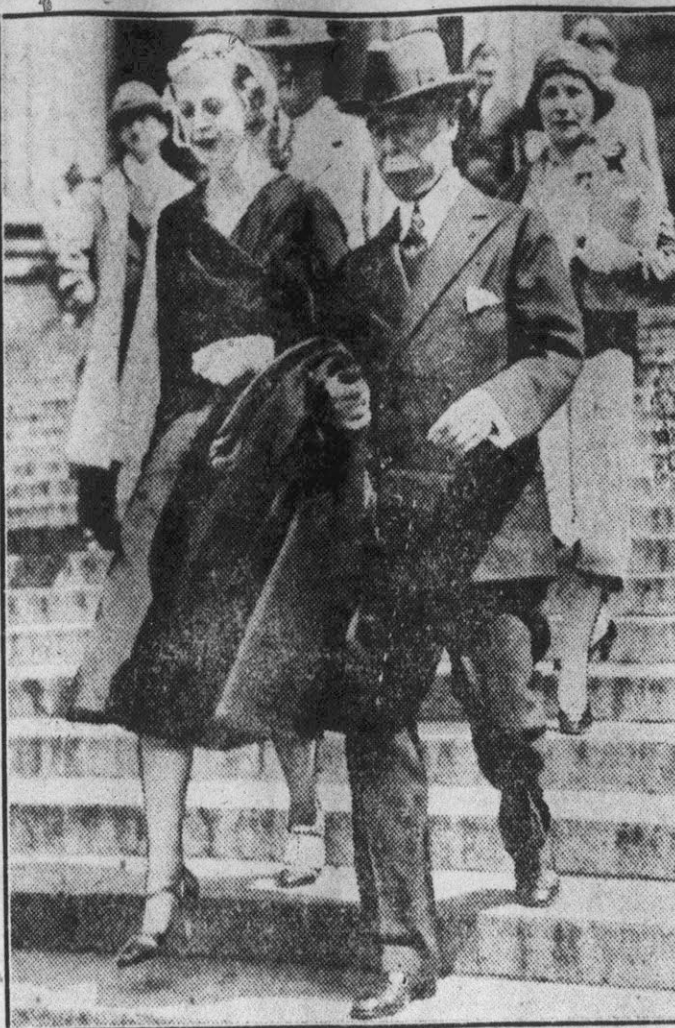

Legislators Head for 'Rump' Session At Jackson, Miss.

Jackson, Miss., April 27.—(AP)—Members of the Legislature headed here today for a "rump" session while Governor Theodore G. Bilbo headed elsewhere with the admonition that the lawmakers would do better to "help the Lord instead of the big four."

The "big four" are Speaker Thomas Bailey and chairmen of the leading House committees—Lawrence Kennedy, Joe W. George, and Walter Sellers—who have long been political foes of the governor. The governor's suggestion to "help the Lord instead of the big four" was for the legislators to call off their "rump" session and donate their estimated traveling expenses to the Juniper Baptist church. The governor was once a preacher of the Baptist faith.

The "rump" session originally was made necessary when Bilbo decreed today a legal holiday for Confederate memorial services.

"Choose ye this day whom you will serve," said the governor in a Sunday message, "the big four or the Lord."

The governor reiterated that he would not sanction a special legislative session, unless pledges were signed by a majority of the solons that no impeachment or investigation would be started against him. He declined the proffered substitute of a resolution to that effect, saying resolutions could be rescinded with the same ease that they are adopted.

Meanwhile, the legislators profess belief that some way may be found to fill the empty treasury of the commonwealth. Bankers have agreed to take care of the state's due bonds and notes, but a deficit of upwards of \$7,000,000 threatens suspension of charitable and educational institutions.

HORIZON GUIDE HELPS PILOT FLY "BLIND" ON EVEN KEEL

Oakland, Cal.—(AP)—The "horizon," installed in the cockpit of Boeing airplanes flying the transcontinental and coastal mail, has proved its worth when the natural horizon is obscured or in blind flying.

The instrument's face is circular, with blue on the upper half for the sky and a bar across the face representing the true horizon. Fastened to the outer case of the device is the outline of a small airplane representing the ship in which it is installed.

In flight, the model is kept in proper relation to the bar representing the horizon.

"If the bishop or court permits the proposed marriage, a minister of the church may solemnize the marriage, provided, however, that he shall not solemnize it in the church or by the form contained in the book of Common Prayer."

In giving its approval to birth control, the commission of the Presbyterian church said: "Earnest christian people are asking for the church's guidance on the subject of birth control. This subject demands attention today as never before. Economic conditions and a worthy standard of living make it wrong to bring into the world children without adequate provision for their future and proper consideration for the health of the mother."

If birth control is practiced, the report continues, "it should only be in fidelity to the highest spiritual ideals of the christian home."

The church reaffirmed its position that "nothing but adultery or such wilful desertion as can in no way be remedied by the church or civil magistrate is cause sufficient for dissolving the bond of matrimony."
